Oakton investments unaffected by stock market

Last week's stock market plummet had no effect on Oakton's extensive financial investments, said David E. Hilquist, treasurer, during the Oakton College Board of trustees

at Tuesday's meeting. Oakton has not invested in bonds. Bonds and other interest holdings such as GNMA's comprise the bulk of Oakton's investments. "I am in the process

Library board approves referendum in 5-2 vote

In a vote of 5-2, board members of the Niles Public Library District approved a committee recommendation to attempt passage of a referendum in March to increase taxes the library receives. Action occurred Wednesday, October 14 at a regular board meeting.

The referendum, if passed, would increase the tax rate to .281 mils from .15 mils and would result in property owners paying 28.1 cents for each \$1,000 of their equalized assessed valuation (EAV). The library now receives 2.8 percent, or \$25.74, of an "average" Niles tax bill, according to library figures.

In last November's election, the library failed to pass a .25 rate.

Board Chairman Terri Carman said, "By getting the tax rate in-

creased, we are only looking to maintain present services. If we hadn't closed the branch library

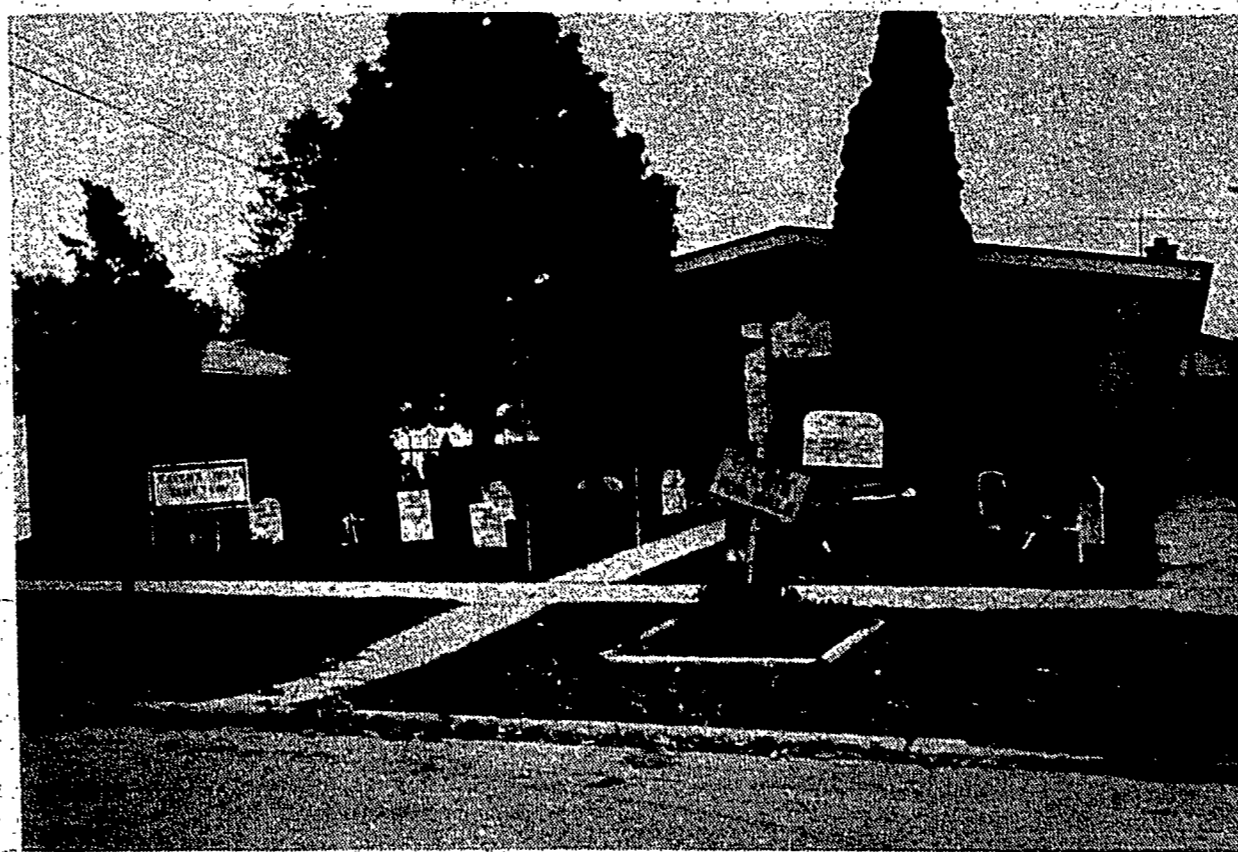

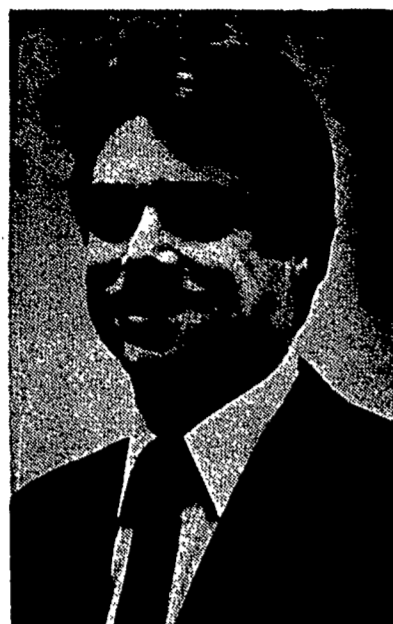
Skokie resident appointed by Hynes

Local parishes in a process of discernment

Four of the parishes of the Niles/Park Ridge area, St. John Brebeuf, St. Isaac Jogues, Mary, Seat of Wisdom, and Our Lady of Ransom, are working together in a process of discernment. Discernment is a decision making process which involves learning, prayer, and discussion. Although this is a common practice in daily living, it will be a new experience in parish life, which hopefully will be repeated again. The current topic in question for the four parishes is when is the best time to celebrate the sacrament of Confirmation. In the United States, each diocese has developed a separate policy. the next step which is to include all parishioners in the process of discernment.

The unique qualities of this effort are two - the four parishes are working together and will make the decision together, not a voting process. The process involves listening to the Spirit with openness and responding to His direction in a prayerful setting.

Monday, October 26, and Wednesday, October 28, at 7:30 p.m., a presentation by persons who have experienced Confirmation in High School and parish program staff members will be given. (The same presentation will be given both evenings.)

On Wednesday, November 18 at 7:30 p.m., Our Lady of Ransom Parish, 8300 N. Greenwood, Niles will host an evening of Prayer and Discernment. In order to make a decision responsibly, a spirit of openness, participation and input by all parishioners is essential. State gives traffic rules

Rapid temperature changes in Illinois this time of year can result in fog, which reduces visibility and makes driving hazardous.

The best safety rule for motorists is to avoid driving in fog whenever possible. However, if you must drive, take the following safety precautions and drive defensively:

1. Always dim your headlights. Low beams direct light onto the

road ahead and help you see more clearly. Light from high beams hits the fog and is reflected off it. Never drive in fog with parking lights only.

2. Reduce your driving speed sharply. Reduce speed even more if you see headlights or taillights in front of you. Headlights may be on a vehicle coming down the center of the road. Taillights can indicate a stopped vehicle or one that is barely moving.

3. Stay within the limits of your vision and be prepared to stop in an emergency. If the fog becomes so dense that you can barely see, pull off the road cautiously and stop. Do not drive on a highway at five or 10 miles per hour.

Driving safely in fog requires concentration and patience. Remember to dim your headlights, reduce your speed and be prepared for any emergency.

Traffic Safety hints

A car that malfunctions or stalls in traffic, while a nuisance in good weather, becomes a genuine safety hazard on ice and snow when sudden stops and turns cause many accidents. Recent vehicle inspections arranged by the AAA-Chicago Motor Club indicated that one out of every three vehicles had faulty cooling systems, batteries, fan belts or other problems that might cause a car to stall.

October is National Car Care Month. A number of mechanical things that affect traffic safety should be included when you have

your vehicle "winterized." Make sure your windshield wipers are working properly, the wiper blades are in good condition and the washer fluid level is high. Your defroster fan should also be working properly. Never start driving in winter until all of the windows are clear, both inside and out.

Being able to see and be seen is critically important. Therefore, a winter checkup should include headlights and taillights. Burned out lights create an additional hazard on snow-covered streets

when visibility is poor. The power steering belt, tires and brakes should be in top condition for winter. The ability to control your vehicle on ice and snow depends on well functioning parts as well as driving skill.

Other major mechanical components, such as the battery, carburetor, electrical system and cooling system, should be fine-tuned for winter to guard against a breakdown that could cause an accident. A breakdown is frustrating for the driver and is hazardous for other motorists.

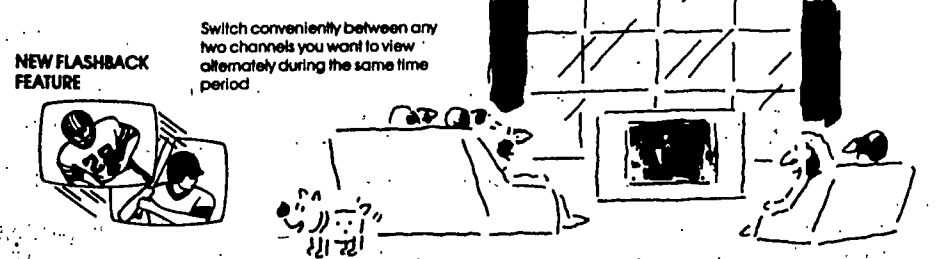

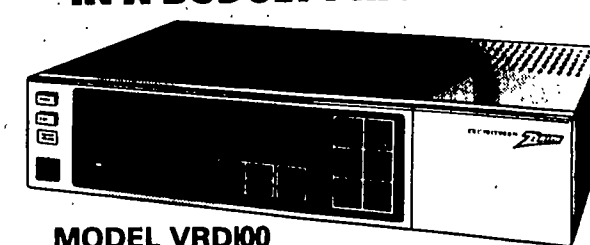

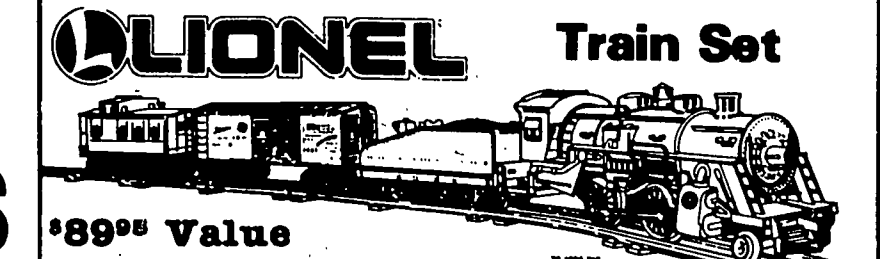

Hypertension study volunteers needed

Kenneth Miller, M.D. and Harold Bregman, M.D., members of Health Care Medical Foundation, a 90-member multi-specialty physician group affiliated with Lutheran General Hospital are looking for volunteers with mild to moderate hypertension to participate in a drug study. This study will test the effectiveness of a new medication. This product belongs to a new class of drugs called the angiotensin converting enzyme inhibitors which are safe, relatively free of side effects, and need only be taken once a day.

For this study, mild to moderate hypertension is defined as a diastolic reading between 95 and 115. Two numbers make up a blood pressure reading. These numbers refer to the pressure

during two phases of the heart cycle. The first number (systolic pressure) is the pressure during the brief period when the heart is contracting (the beat) thus forcing blood into the arteries at a temporarily increased pressure. The second number (diastolic pressure) is the lower pressure during the resting phase between the heart's contractions.

Persons must be 18 years of age or older to participate in the study. Volunteers are welcome who are diagnosed as hypertensive or those who are presently on medication for high blood pressure and are experiencing unpleasant side effects.

Illinois Bell distributes
\$2 million in customer
refunds

About one out of every two
Illinois Bell customers will see a
one-time \$1.37 credit on their Oc-
tober telephone bills.

The credits, totaling \$2.25
million, are part of a 1986 out-of-
court settlement that ended a
lawsuit challenging the manner
in which customers were enrolled
in Illinois Bell's inside wire main-
tenance plan. Customers will
receive the credit if they paid for
inside wire maintenance after
Aug. 16, 1982 without requesting
the service and if they did not
choose earlier settlement op-
tions. This part of the settlement
will affect about 1.6 million of the
company's 3.6 million customers.

The credit will be listed as the
"inside wire maintenance
residual fund" on the page of the
telephone bill that lists other
charges and credits. The monthly
inside wire maintenance plan will
continue uninterrupted.

One of the earlier settlement
choices included discounts of up
to 40% when customers chose to
upgrade existing telephone ser-
vice with Touch-Tone, Line-
Backer or Custom Calling
features. Under the second op-
tion, eligible customers received
a one-time refund of \$5.29 and
their monthly wire maintenance
service was discontinued.

Under the monthly inside wire
maintenance plan, Illinois Bell
repairs and maintains telephone
wiring inside customers'
premises without an additional
charge per visit. The monthly
charge is 39 cents for residence
customers and 44 cents for small
business customers.

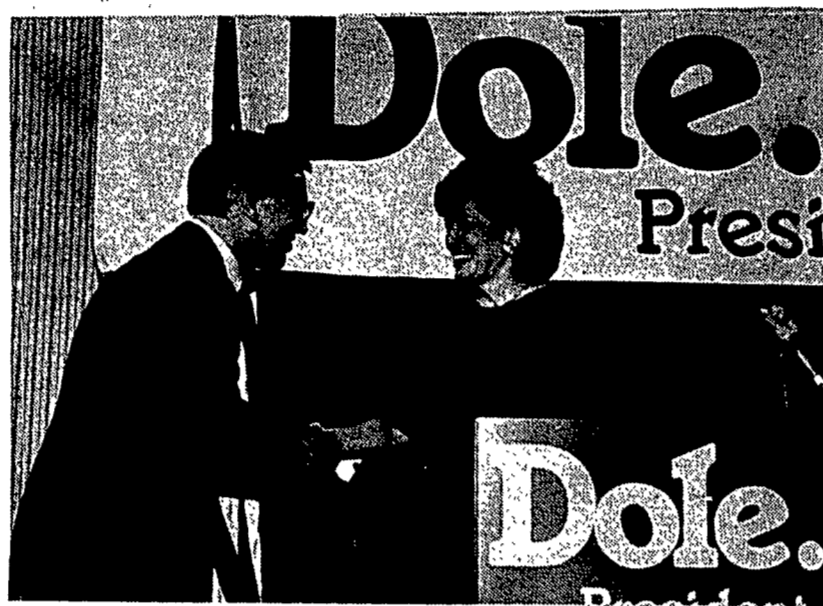
The council meets regularly with Daley and his staff to voice its concerns, enabling the prosecutor's office to adapt its programs to better address the needs of the community.

Dudycz seeks override elder abuse bill veto

State Sen. Walter Dudycz (R-7th, Chicago) says he will ask his legislative colleagues to override the Governor's Sept. 11 veto of legislation he co-sponsored to better protect Illinois' older citizens from abuse and neglect.

"I plan to do everything I can to convince my fellow legislators to override the Governor's action on Senate Bill 1228," Dudycz said. "While I agree that he needs to veto some proposals to hold the line on spending, he has overestimated the real cost of this program. Weighed against the benefits, it should provide a very cost-effective way of handling a disturbing problem facing Illinois' older residents."

"Recent studies have revealed some rather troubling data about the number of our senior citizens being abused, neglected or exploited," Dudycz said. "They show that a statewide program could expect to process more than 2,500 reports of abuse and neglect in just one year. Too many of our older citizens are spending their retirement years alone and afraid."

Senate Bill 1228 directs the Department on Aging to design and maintain a statewide program to assess alleged or suspected abuse or neglect of people 60 or older and provide necessary services. The first-year cost is estimated at \$12 million.

"Cuts of this nature would not have been necessary if our Democratic colleagues had supported the Senate Republican's '502 Plan,' which redirected the state's budget priorities to basic programs for senior citizens, education, mental health and other social services," Dudycz said.

Tuition payback has second hearing

Chicago - Further debate into the question of reimbursement for tuition paid to private and parochial schools will take place in hearing No. 2 of State Senator Walter Dudycz's (R-7, Chicago) special task force Monday, October 26, 10:00 a.m., State of Illinois Center, 16th floor, room 504.

On September 22, Dudycz conducted a hearing into the matter at Resurrection High School on Chicago's Northwest Side. That hearing focused on testimony from representatives of the parochial school community. They spoke in strong support of a reimbursement plan.

The October 26th hearing is expected to include witnesses representing public school PTA's, The Chicago Board of Education as well as spokesmen from private and parochial schools.

GOP hopeful seeks balanced budget

"Under Gram-Rudman, Congress was supposed to balance the budget by 1991," said Zenkich. The Republican candidate noted that his opponent, Frank Annunzio, voted for both the increase in the debt ceiling and for the delay in the Gram-Rudman Act.

FADA President should resign

"Federal Asset Disposition Association (FADA) President Rosalyn B. Payne should resign," Representative Frank Annunzio (D-Ill.) told the House Financial Institutions Subcommittee at oversight hearings on FADA operations today. FADA is a corporation owned by the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation (FSLIC) to liquidate assets from failed savings and loan associations.

"Ms. Payne was hired because of her expertise and background in the real estate field. Her expertise did not come cheap. Her salary is \$250,000; \$50,000 more than the President of the United States," said Annunzio. "Ms. Payne has not lived up to her advanced billings. She has not even lived up to her own predictions."

"Upon her appointment in February 1986, she stated that the aim of FADA 'will be to break even.' Rather than breaking even, FADA had a net operating loss of \$3.5 million in 1986."

"Ms. Payne envisioned 'a small core group of very smart real estate people' for her staff. At the end of March, FADA had a staff of 209 employees. Now FADA has 350 employees and expects its staff to grow to 400 by year end."

"Employees close to Ms. Payne have done well financially. In 1986, the top 17 officers of FADA were paid a total of \$2.1 million in salary. These 17 employees received two-thirds of the total payroll paid to FADA employees in 1986."

"No one would begrudge these employees a cent of their wages if FADA was performing as intended. Unfortunately, it hasn't. As of June 30, FADA had sold only 45 assets valued at a mere \$89 million. This represents only three percent of the \$3 billion in assets placed in its control."

"FADA apparently has no marketing strategy for selling its properties. Its marketing efforts consist of a few mimeographed sheets of property listings in contrast to the FSLIC itself, which has slick color brochures and videotaped tours of the property available under its liquidation program. As a result of Glasnost, its easier to get information out of the Kremlin than out of FADA," Annunzio charged.

"Difficulties in potential bidders contacting FADA have discouraged likely purchasers. Purchasers have a better chance of contacting Greta Garbo than Rosalyn Payne."

"Ms. Payne has not brought strong management to FADA. The corporation has been racked by charges of favoritism toward certain contractors; allegations of bribery; lack of responsiveness to prospective bidders; and foot dragging in response to cooperation with the Subcommittee investigation. Two weeks ago, Ms. Payne refused to answer further questions and stomped out of an interview with a television reporter."

"Ms. Payne may run, but she can't hide from the facts. Under her management FADA operations have been a fiasco. Rather than increasing FSLIC liquidity, it has drained money from FSLIC. Rather than disposing of properties more efficiently than FSLIC, it has been inefficient. Rather than streamline the disposition process and cut red tape, it has discouraged purchasers," said Annunzio.

Annunzio concluded his remarks to the Subcommittee stating, "the best managerial move Ms. Payne could do now is to resign. She should resign, and if she doesn't resign, she should be removed."

NI-Gas meter readers put pencils back in pockets

When your Northern Illinois Gas (NI-Gas) meter reader stops next time, you will see one of the company's latest technological applications in action. Meter readers no longer carry pencils and notebooks because they now take readings with electronic, hand-held computers.

NI-Gas' approximately 120 meter readers are keying readings directly into the new units, rather than recording them with paper and pencil—a technique hampered by harsh weather conditions.

The basic system was developed by ITRON in Spokane, Washington. Functions tailored to NI-Gas' specifications were designed into the system, based on input from the company's meter reading personnel.

One major revision was accommodation of same-day billing. "Many utilities will not bill customers until the route is complete," said Jim Stansbury, NI-Gas' general coordinator of automated business systems. "It is NI-Gas' policy to bill whatever accounts are read each day. This enables our customers to receive their bills on a regular basis."

Each two-pound unit is the size of a walkie-talkie and is operated by a battery pack carried by the meter reader. The packs, recharged overnight, can function 12 to 14 hours. Information for up to 1,241 accounts, such as customer's name, address, meter number and location, is loaded nightly into each device via a telecommunications process.

At each customer's residence, the meter reader records the reading through the customized keyboard of four rows, 16 characters each. The unit will audibly and visually alert NI-Gas employees to special instructions and conditions.

"If there's a dog to be avoided or if someone needs a little more time to answer the door," Stansbury explained, "the device lets our readers know before they

arrive." The meter reader can also record new information that might be helpful the next time the meter is read.

When finishing with a day's route, the meter reader returns to the office where each device is placed in a small microprocessing unit. From

there, recorded data is transmitted through telephone lines to NI-Gas' main computer for billing. The process is repeated daily.

Although fully operational only since April, the system has allowed NI-Gas to achieve increased customer and employee satisfaction; its top two priorities.

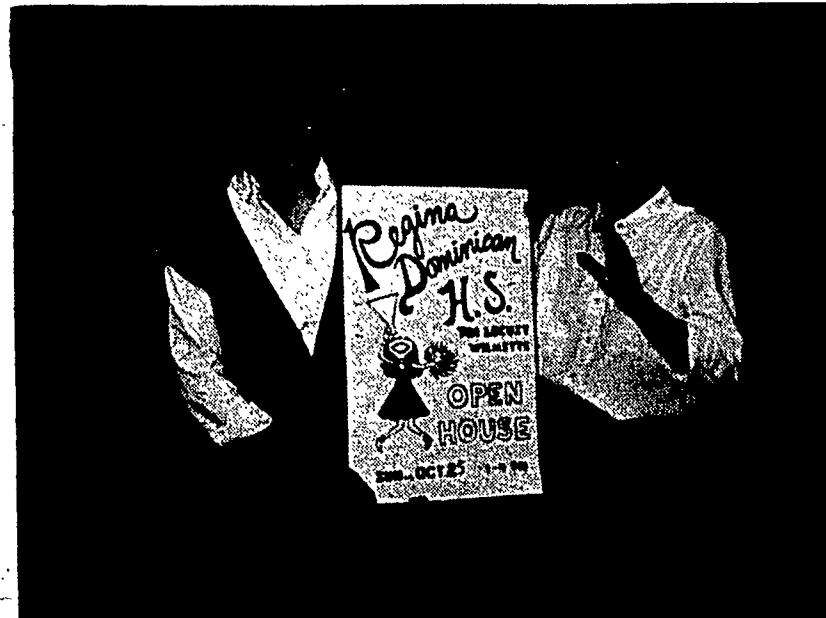

Repeat drunk driving bill signed into law

Secretary of State Jim Edgar Thursday praised Governor Thompson for signing legislation to increase penalties for repeat drunk drivers.

"It is not fair that those convicted of endangering human lives by driving drunk again and again should face the same penalties as a first offender," Edgar said. "This new law will rectify that injustice by providing a harsher penalty for the more serious offense of repeat drunk driving."

The measure, which was proposed by Edgar, will increase the minimum penalty for a second drunk driving conviction from one year to a three year drivers license revocation if the offenses were committed within a 20 year period.

Three time offenders will lose their drivers licenses for at least six years and will be subject to Class 4 felony penalties of 1-3 years in jail and a \$10,000 fine.

"I commend the bipartisan sponsors of this bill for passing it and Governor Thompson for signing it. These new tougher penalties for those repeatedly convicted of drunk driving, coupled with our already strong deterrent for first offenders, will con-

tribute to keep Illinois in the national forefront on this important highway safety issue," Edgar said.

There are presently 27,000 Illinois drivers with two DUI's on their records and 9,000 with three or more DUI convictions.

Edgar also commended Thompson for approving other legislation aimed at deterring teen drinking and driving. The law will ban fake identification cards designed to resemble Illinois drivers licenses.

"One of my priorities during the coming year is to reduce teenage highway deaths," Edgar said. "This new law will help work toward that goal by making it harder for young people to obtain false identifications."

The law bans ID cards which copy the size, color or photograph location of a real drivers license, use such words as "official," "state" or "Illinois," or show a map of Illinois. Such cards will also be required to carry a disclaimer in black, 12-point type.

Violation of the statute is a Class A misdemeanor, punishable by a maximum one year jail sentence and \$1,000 fine.

The legislation approved by Thompson becomes effective Jan. 1, 1988.

Chief sponsors for the fake identification card laws are Representatives Countryman, McCracken, Cullerton, John O'Connell (D-Western Springs), John Matijevich (D-Waukegan) and John McNamara (D-Oak Lawn); and Senators Barkhausen, Marovitz, Adeline Geo-Karis (R-Zion) and Virginia Macdonald (R-Arlington Heights).

Truck safety measure signed into law

Legislation creating tough new standards for drivers of heavy trucks is now law, Secretary of State Jim Edgar announced Monday.

HB 2208, proposed by Edgar and signed by Governor Thompson, is intended to improve highway safety by establishing uniform licensing requirements for commercial motor vehicle operators and removing bad drivers from the road.

"A person who drives 80,000 pounds of steel and cargo down a highway should be held to a high standard of competence," Edgar said. "Not only does a tractor trailer operator need greater skills, he needs a greater measure of accountability because of the potential for death and injury in the event of a serious accident."

Under the new truck safety law:

- 1) No person who operates a commercial motor vehicle may have more than one drivers license;
- 2) Illinois truckers who receive tickets, either in-state or out-of-state, must report the convictions to the Secretary of State within 30 days;
- 3) Operators must notify employers of any license revocation, suspension or cancellation within 30 days;
- 4) No employer shall knowingly allow an employee to operate a commercial motor vehicle if that person's license is revoked, suspended or cancelled;
- 5) Drivers must provide a 10-year employment history to future potential employers.

In February of this year, the U.S. Department of Transportation designated Edgar's office to be the lead agency among the 50 states to develop minimum national standards for training and testing truck drivers.

"Although Illinois already has stringent licensing requirements and the vast majority of drivers are safe drivers—some states have lax standards," Edgar said.

"We believe this new law will play a role in improving highway safety, particularly for out-of-state truckers who travel through Illinois."

Studies have shown that one in five drivers hold more than one license. Multiple licenses are used to hide bad driving records or to enable those with revoked or suspended licenses to continue driving. The new truck safety law specifically outlaws the practice of holding more than one drivers license.

HB 2208 was sponsored by Reps. Roger McAuliffe (R-Chicago), Alfred Roman (D-Chicago), James Stang (R-Oak Brook), John O'Connell (D-Western Springs), and Terry Parke (R-Schaumburg); Sens. Frank Watson (R-Carlyle), and Timothy Degnan (D-Chicago). The law, which takes effect immediately, is the product of a Task Force on Truck Safety created by Edgar in 1986.

Currently, 528,620 Illinois drivers are licensed to operate vehicles weighing over 26,000 pounds.

Tips for more Safety, Economy, Convenience

"Cooling System Tips"

Some car manufacturers now recommend lighter-weight oils, which can break down faster under heating extremes. The results can be overheated vehicles and unhappy motorists.

There's a simple way to keep your car going through summer and winter, and that's to take care of its cooling system parts. Heat will do more damage to a car than any other single problem.

The first thing all drivers should do is practice simple maintenance. Checking belts and hoses and topping these fluids, (such as antifreeze/coolant and oil) as needed is something everyone should do.

That means watching after the cooling system, which is like the blood circulation system in the human body, carefully. You can do this without any special tools or mechanical knowledge. When the engine is cool (never touch a hot engine or a running engine), see that the rubber seal in the radiator cap is still flexible; that the hoses aren't too loose; and that there are no visible leaks in the cooling system. If you do find any problems, the bad belt or hose should be replaced immediately.

Just checking the cooling system will do the trick to make sure the system is operating as it should, but you may also want to consider replacing certain original equipment parts with technologically advanced parts that will prolong your cooling system's life, while adding performance and economy.

For one thing, you can replace your conventional radiator fan with a flexible or variable pitch fan and save as much as ten horsepower. These fans have blades that change their angle as more air passes by them because of increased speed. The result is that they need less power at higher speeds while still passing the required amount of air into the engine compartment.

Another way is through the use of thermal clutches. These cut out at highway speeds and when they're not needed. Since the clutches keep the fan from turning on until the engine is warmed up, warm-up time can be cut as much as 50%.

Owners of older vehicles that have fans that run constantly, drawing on the engine's horsepower and actually creating extra under-hood heat, should consider installing an electric fan which kicks on only when needed. These are more efficient since they automatically shut off when not needed, such as at high speeds or in very cold weather. Consider this: when you start the car on a cold day, the engine is working to warm up while the fan is working to cool it off. An electric fan eliminates this problem. These fans can be used with a temperature sensor inserted in the cooling system that shuts off the fan whenever the temperature drops below a certain predetermined temperature (typically between 190 and 210 degrees), depending on the cooling system and capacity.

These fans can improve mileage and horsepower, help with faster warmups, aid fuel economy, reduce water pump bearing wear, cut noise, and cool engines better at low speeds or when idling.

One manufacturer reports electric fans are generally sold to replace the old, pulley driven fan, to serve as an auxiliary fan, or to replace the original equipment electric fan.

Many drivers don't know about electric cooling fans. Next time you're in your favorite repair shop, ask your mechanic if he or she feels an electric fan would be an advantage for you.

State gives traffic rules

During the fall harvest season, motorists traveling on county roads and two-lane highways must share the road with slow-moving farm vehicles. Be prepared to slow down quickly if farm machinery suddenly appears on your side of the highway.

Farm tractors and implements not only move slowly but usually are wider and longer than other vehicles. Do not pass farm machinery unless you can do so safely while staying on the road. Watch for machinery that may not be properly secured for towing.

Some farmers show courtesy and concern for traffic safety by pulling over to the right to allow more room for other motorists to pass. However, implements being driven on the edge of the road may be driven onto the road

occasionally because of a bridge or culvert. Be alert to this possibility.

Farm tractors, implements of husbandry and animal-drawn vehicles can be identified by a slow-moving vehicle emblem mounted on the rear unit.

All vehicles displaying a slow-moving vehicle emblem are required to display at least one flashing amber signal light after dark or when visibility is poor. The light should be mounted as high as possible and visible to the rear for at least 500 feet in normal sunlight.

been taken years ago via comprehensive land planning during the building boom in the 1960's and '70s. Over the years, they say, open green space has been covered with concrete in the overbuilding of large building complexes and parking lots.

Engineering experts point out heavy rains causes water to take the line of least resistance and goes to the first point of retention. With sewers filled to capacity, overlaid water eventually finds relief at nearby rivers resulting in disastrous flooding problems in the area.

A case in point regarding preventive measures was the heavy flooding that occurred last August in the unincorporated area of Des Plaines. Residents who were hardest hit vented their anger at Maine Township officials, who in turn said that Cook County had never followed through on requests to implement flood control measures in the area.

The burden of "mea culpa" can be targeted to county zoners, who with a little foresight could have alleviated flooding problems with orderly development of the area in the 1960's-'70s. Often called the architects of poor land planning, county zoners gave tacit approval over the years to developers to cover open land with ribbons of concrete under "highest and best use of the land."

The big question is...how come they never thought of best use for the people?

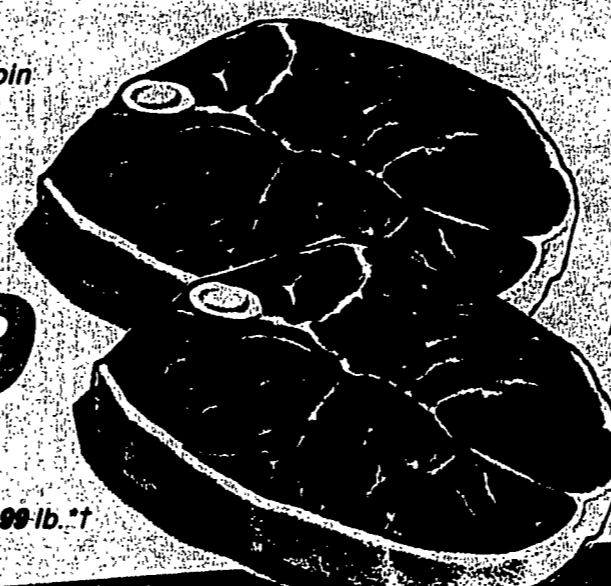
