

Before you resume the system, please check if the CPU fan on the motherboard functions properly and unplug the power cord, then plug it back again. To improve heat dissipation, remember to spray thermal grease between the CPU and the heatsink when you install the PC system.

According to Intel's suggestion, the EuP ready power supply must meet the standard of 5v, and the standby power efficiency should be higher than 50% under 100 mA current consumption. 

# Chapter 2: Installation

This is an ATX form factor (12.0"  $\times$  9.6", 30.5  $\times$  24.4 cm) motherboard. Before you install the motherboard, study the configuration of your chassis to ensure that the motherboard fits into it.

#### 2.1 Pre-installation Precautions

Take note of the following precautions before you install motherboard components or change any motherboard settings.


- Make sure to unplug the power cord before installing or removing the motherboard. Failure to do so may cause physical injuries to you and damages to motherboard components.
- In order to avoid damage from static electricity to the motherboard's components, NEVER place your motherboard directly on a carpet. Also remember to use a grounded wrist strap or touch a safety grounded object before you handle the components.
- 3. Hold components by the edges and do not touch the ICs.
- Whenever you uninstall any components, place them on a grounded anti-static pad or in the bag that comes with the components.
- When placing screws to secure the motherboard to the chassis, please do not over-tighten the screws! Doing so may damage the motherboard

## 2.3 CPU Installation

In order to provide the LGA 1155 CPU sockets more protection and make the installation process easier, ASRock has added a new protection cover on top of the load plate to replace the former PnP caps that were under the load plate. For the installation of Intel® 1155-Pin CPUs with the new protection cover, please follow the steps below



1155-Pin Socket Overview



Before you insert the 1155-Pin CPU into the socket, please check if the CPU surface is unclean or if there are any bent pins in the socket. Do not force to insert the CPU into the socket if above situation is found. Otherwise, the CPU will be seriously damaged.

#### Step 1. Open the socket:

Step 1-1. Disengage the lever by pressing it down and sliding it out of the hook.

You do not have to remove the protection cover



Step 1-2. Keep the lever positioned at about 135 degrees in order to flip up the load plate.



Step 2. Insert the 1155-Pin CPU:

Step 2-1. Hold the CPU by the edge which is marked with a black line.

Step 2-2. Orient the CPU with the IHS (Integrated Heat Sink) up. Locate Pin1 and the two orientation key notches.

For proper installation, please ensure to match the two orientation key notches of the CPU with the two alignment keys of the socket.

Step 2-3. Carefully place the CPU into the socket.



Step 2-4. Verify that the CPU is within the socket and properly mated to the orient keys.

## Step 3. Close the socket:

Step 3-1. Flip the load plate onto the IHS.

Step 3-2. Press down the load lever, and secure it with the load plate tab under the retention tab. The protection cover will automatically come off by itself.





Please save and replace the cover if the processor is removed. The cover must be placed if you wish to return the motherboard for after service.

## 2.4 Installation of CPU Fan and Heatsink

This motherboard is equipped with 1155-Pin socket that supports Intel 1155-Pin CPUs. Please adopt the type of heatsink and cooling fan compliant with Intel 1155-Pin CPU to dissipate heat. Before you install the heatsink, you need to spray thermal interface material between the CPU and the heatsink to improve heat dissipation. Ensure that the CPU and the heatsink are securely fastened and in good contact with each other. Then connect the CPU fan to the CPU\_FAN connector (CPU\_FAN1, see p.14, No. 3 or CPU\_FAN2, see p.14, No. 4).

For proper installation, please kindly refer to the instruction manuals of your CPU fan and heatsink.

Below is an example to illustrate the installation of the heatsink for 1155-Pin CPUs.

- Step 1. Apply thermal interface material onto the center of the IHS on the socket's surface.
- Step 2. Place the heatsink onto the socket. Ensure that the fan cables are faced on the side closest to the CPU fan connector on the mother-board (CPU\_FAN1, see p.14, No. 3 or CPU\_FAN3, see p.14, No. 4).
- Step 3. Align fasteners with the motherboard throughholes.
- Step 4. Rotate the fastener clockwise, then press the fastener caps down with your thumb to install and lock. Repeat with remaining fasteners.









If you press down the fasteners without rotating them clockwise, the heatsink cannot be secured on the motherboard.

- Step 5. Connect CPU fan connector with the fan header on the motherboard.
- Step 6. Secure redundant cable with tie-wrap to ensure that the cable does not interfere with the fan's operation or contact other components.

# 2.5 Installation of Memory Modules (DIMM)

This motherboard provides four 240-pin DDR3 (Double Data Rate 3) DIMM slots, and supports Dual Channel Memory Technology. For dual channel configuration, you always need to install **identical** (the same brand, speed, size and chip-type) DDR3 DIMM pair in the slots: You have to install **identical** DDR3 DIMMs in **Dual Channel A** (DDR3\_A1 and DDR3\_B1; Black slots; see p.14 No. 5) or **identical** DDR3 DIMMs in **Dual Channel B** (DDR3\_A2 and DDR3\_B2; Black slots; see p.14 No. 6), so that Dual Channel Memory Technology can be activated. This motherboard also allows you to install four DDR3 DIMMs for dual channel configuration, please install **identical** DDR3 DIMMs in all four slots. You may refer to the Dual Channel Memory Configuration Table below.

 For configuration (3), please install identical DDR3 DIMMs in all four slots.




- If you want to install two memory modules, for optimal compatibility and reliability, it is recommended to install them in the slots: DDR3\_ A1 and DDR3\_B1, or DDR3\_A2 and DDR3\_B2.
- If only one memory module or three memory modules are installed in the DDR3 DIMM slots on this motherboard, it is unable to activate Dual Channel Memory Technology.
- If a pair of memory modules is NOT installed in the same Dual Channel, for example, installing a pair of memory modules in DDR3\_A1 and DDR3\_A2, it is unable to activate Dual Channel Memory Technology.
- It is not allowed to install a DDR or DDR2 memory module into DDR3 slot; otherwise, this motherboard and DIMM may be damaged.
- Some DDR3 1GB double-sided DIMMs with 16 chips may not work on this motherboard. It is not recommended to install them on this motherboard.
- For optimal compatibility and stability while overclocking memory frequency, it is recommended to install one memory module in DDR3\_B2 slot or two memory modules in DDR3\_A2 and DDR3\_B2 slots.

# **Installing a DIMM**



Please make sure to disconnect power supply before adding or removing DIMMs or the system components.

- Step 1. Unlock a DIMM slot by pressing the retaining clips outward.
- Step 2. Align a DIMM on the slot such that the notch on the DIMM matches the break on the slot.





The DIMM only fits in one correct orientation. It will cause permanent damage to the motherboard and the DIMM if you force the DIMM into the slot in incorrect orientation.

Step 3. Firmly insert the DIMM into the slot until the retaining clips at both ends fully snap back in place and the DIMM is properly seated.

# 2.6 Expansion Slots (PCI and PCI Express Slots)

There are 2 PCI slots and 4 PCI Express slots on this motherboard.

PCI slots: PCI slots are used to install expansion cards that have 32-bit PCI interface

PCIE slots: PCIE1 and PCIE3 (PCIE 2.0 x1 slots) are used for PCI Express x1 lane width cards, such as a Gigabit LAN card, SATA2 card , etc.

PCIE2 (PCIE 3.0 x16 slot) is used for PCI Express x16 lane width graphics cards, or used to install PCI Express graphics cards to support CrossFireX<sup>™</sup> or SLI<sup>™</sup> function.

PCIE4 (PCIE 3.0 x16 slot) is used for PCI Express x8 lane width graphics cards, or used to install PCI Express graphics cards to support CrossFireX<sup>™</sup> or SLI<sup>™</sup> function.



- 1. In single VGA card mode, it is recommended to install a PCI Express x16 graphics card on PCIE2 slot.
- In CrossFireX<sup>™</sup> mode or SLI<sup>™</sup> mode, please install the PCI Express x16 graphics cards on PCIE2 and PCIE4 slots. Therefore, PCIE2 will work at x8 bandwidth, while PCIE4 works at x8 bandwidth.
- Please connect a chassis fan to the motherboard's chassis fan connector (CHA\_FAN1, CHA\_FAN2 or CHA\_FAN3) when using multiple graphics cards for better thermal environment.
- 4. Only PCIE2 and PCIE4 slots support Gen 3 speed. To run the PCI Express in Gen 3 speed, please install an Ivy Bridge CPU. If you install a Sandy Bridge CPU, the PCI Express will run only at PCI Express Gen 2 speed.

# Installing an expansion card

- Step 1. Before installing an expansion card, please make sure that the power supply is switched off or the power cord is unplugged. Please read the documentation of the expansion card and make necessary hardware settings for the card before you start the installation.
- Step 2. Remove the system unit cover (if your motherboard is already installed in a chassis).
- Step 3. Remove the bracket facing the slot that you intend to use. Keep the screws for later use.
- Step 4. Align the card connector with the slot and press firmly until the card is completely seated on the slot.
- Step 5. Fasten the card to the chassis with screws.
- Step 6. Replace the system cover



In other words, HDCP specification is designed to protect the integrity of content as it is being transmitted.

Products compatible with the HDCP scheme such as DVD players, satellite and cable HDTV set-top-boxes, as well as few entertainment PCs requires a secure connection to a compliant display. Due to the increase in manufacturers employing HDCP in their equipment, it is highly recommended that the HDTV or LCD monitor you purchase is compatible.


## 2.11 ASRock Smart Remote Installation Guide

ASRock Smart Remote is only used for ASRock motherboards with a CIR header. Please refer to the procedures below for the quick installation and usage of ASRock Smart Remote.

Note: CLRCMOS1 allows you to clear the data in CMOS. To clear and reset the system parameters to default setup, please turn off the computer and unplug the power cord from the power supply. After waiting for 15 seconds, use a jumper cap to short pin2 and pin3 on CLRCMOS1 for 5 seconds. However, please do not clear the CMOS right after you update the BIOS. If you need to clear the CMOS when you just finish updating the BIOS, you must boot up the system first, and then shut it down before you do the clear-CMOS action. Please be noted that the password, date, time, user default profile, 1394 GUID and MAC address will be cleared only if the CMOS battery is removed.



The Clear CMOS Switch has the same function as the Clear CMOS jumper.





#### PWRBTN (Power Switch):

Connect to the power switch on the chassis front panel. You may configure the way to turn off your system using the power switch.

#### RESET (Reset Switch):

Connect to the reset switch on the chassis front panel. Press the reset switch to restart the computer if the computer freezes and fails to perform a normal restart.

#### PLED (System Power LED):

Connect to the power status indicator on the chassis front panel. The LED is on when the system is operating. The LED keeps blinking when the system is in S1/S3 sleep state. The LED is off when the system is in S4 sleep state or powered off (S5).

#### **HDLED (Hard Drive Activity LED):**

Connect to the hard drive activity LED on the chassis front panel. The LED is on when the hard drive is reading or writing data.

The front panel design may differ by chassis. A front panel module mainly consists of power switch, reset switch, power LED, hard drive activity LED, speaker and etc. When connecting your chassis front panel module to this header, make sure the wire assignments and the pin assign-ments are matched correctly.







# Chapter 3: UEFI SETUP UTILITY

### 3.1 Introduction

This section explains how to use the UEFI SETUP UTILITY to configure your system. The UEFI chip on the motherboard stores the UEFI SETUP UTILITY. You may run the UEFI SETUP UTILITY when you start up the computer. Please press <F2> or <Delete> during the Power-On-Self-Test (POST) to enter the UEFI SETUP UTILITY, otherwise. POST will continue with its test routines.

If you wish to enter the UEFI SETUP UTILITY after POST, restart the system by pressing <Ctl> + <Alt> + <Delete>, or by pressing the reset button on the system chassis. You may also restart by turning the system off and then back on.



Because the UEFI software is constantly being updated, the following UEFI setup screens and descriptions are for reference purpose only, and they may not exactly match what you see on your screen.

#### 3.1.1 UEFI Menu Bar

The top of the screen has a menu bar with the following selections:

**Main** For setting system time/date information

OC Tweaker For overclocking configurations

Advanced For advanced system configurations

H/W Monitor Displays current hardware status

**Boot** For configuring boot settings and boot priority

**Security** For security settings

Exit Exit the current screen or the UEFI SETUP UTILITY

Use  $< \leftarrow >$  key or  $< \rightarrow >$  key to choose among the selections on the menu bar, and use  $< \uparrow >$  key or  $< \downarrow >$  key to move the cursor up or down to select items, then press <Enter> to get into the sub screen. You can also navigate with a mouse.

#### 3.2 Main Screen

When you enter the UEFI SETUP UTILITY, the Main screen will appear and display the system overview.



#### System Browser

System Browser can let you easily check your current system configuration in UEFI setup.

#### **OMG(Online Management Guard)**

Administrators are able to establish an internet curfew or restrict internet access at specified times via OMG. You may schedule the starting and ending hours of internet access granted to other users. In order to prevent users from bypassing OMG, guest accounts without permission to modify the system time are required.

#### 3.3 OC Tweaker Screen

In the OC Tweaker screen, you can set up overclocking features.



#### No-K OC

For those CPUs that aren't K-series, No-K OC can unleash the CPU's power by boosting its frequency with just one click.

#### Load Optimized GPU OC Setting

You can use this option to load optimized GPU overclocking settings. Please note that overclocing may cause damage to your GPU and motherboard. It should be done at your own risk and expense.

#### **CPU Configuration**

#### **CPU Ratio**

Use this item to change the ratio value of this motherboard.

#### Host Clock Override (BCLK)

Use this to adjust the host clock (BCLK) frequency. The default value is [Auto].

#### **Spread Spectrum**

This item should always be [Auto] for better system stability.

#### Intel SpeedStep Technology

Intel SpeedStep technology is Intel's new power saving technology. Processors can switch between multiple frequencies and voltage points to enable power saving. The default value is [Enabled]. Configuration options: [Enabled] and [Disabled]. If you install Windows® Vista $^{\text{TM}}$  / 7 / 8 and want to enable this function, please set this item to [Enabled]. This item will be hidden if the current CPU does not support Intel SpeedStep technology.



Please note that enabling this function may reduce CPU voltage and lead to system stability or compatibility issues with some power supplies. Please set this item to [Disabled] if above issues occur.

#### Intel Turbo Boost Technology

Use this item to enable or disable Intel Turbo Boost Mode Technology. Turbo Boost Mode allows processor cores to run faster than marked frequency in specific conditions. The default value is [Enabled].

#### **Additional Turbo Voltage**

Use this item to add voltage when CPU is in Turbo mode.

#### **Long Duration Power Limit**

Use this item to configure long duration power limit in watts. The default value is [Auto].

#### Long Duration Maintained

Use this item to configure time window which the long duration power is maintained. The default value is [Auto].

#### **Short Duration Power Limit**

Use this item to configure short duration power limit in watts. The default value is [Auto].

#### **Primary Plane Current Limit**

Use this item to configure the maximum instantaneous current allowed for the primary plane. The default value is [Auto].

#### **Secondary Plane Current Limit**

Use this item to configure the maximum instantaneous current allowed for the secondary plane. The default value is [Auto].

#### **GT OverClocking Support**

Use this item to enable or disable GT OverClocking Support. The default value is [Disabled].

#### **DRAM Timing Configuration**

#### Load XMP Setting

Use this to load XMP setting. Configuration options: [Auto], [Default], [Profile 1] and [Profile 2]. The default value is [Auto].

#### **DRAM Frequency**

If [Auto] is selected, the motherboard will detect the memory module(s) inserted and assign the appropriate frequency automatically.

#### DRAM tCL

Use this item to change CAS# Latency (tCL) Auto/Manual setting. The default is [Auto].

#### DRAM tRCD

Use this item to change RAS# to CAS# Delay (tRCD) Auto/Manual setting. The default is [Auto].

Use this item to change Row Precharge Time (tRP) Auto/Manual setting. The default is [Auto].

#### **DRAM tRAS**

Use this item to change RAS# Active Time (tRAS) Auto/Manual setting. The default is [Auto].

#### Command Rate (CR)

Use this item to change Command Rate (CR) Auto/Manual setting. The default is [Auto].

## DRAM tWR

Use this item to change Write Recovery Time (tWR) Auto/Manual setting. The default is [Auto].

CPU Load-Line Calibration helps prevent CPU voltage droop when the system is under heavy load.

#### **IGPU Voltage**

Use this to select IGPU Voltage. The default value is [Auto].

#### **IGPU Load-Line Calibration**

IGPU Load-Line Calibration helps prevent IGPU voltage droop when the system is under heavy load.

#### **DRAM Voltage**

Use this to select DRAM Voltage. The default value is [Auto].

#### VTT Voltage

Use this to select VTT Voltage. The default value is [Auto].

#### **PCH Voltage**

Use this to select PCH Voltage. The default value is [Auto].

## **CPU PLL Voltage**

Use this to select CPU PLL Voltage. The default value is [Auto].

## **VCCSA Voltage**

Use this to select VCCSA Voltage. The default value is [Auto].

## **User Defaults**

In this option, you are allowed to load and save three user defaults according to your own requirements.

## 3.4 Advanced Screen

In this section, you may set the configurations for the following items: CPU Configuration, North Bridge Configuration, South Bridge Configuration, Storage Configuration, Intel(R) Rapid Start Technology, Intel(R) Smart Connect Technology, Intel(R) Thunderbolt, Super IO Configuration, ACPI Configuration, USB Configuration and Network Configuration.





Setting wrong values in this section may cause the system to malfunction.

#### Instant Flash

Instant Flash is a UEFI flash utility embedded in Flash ROM. This convenient UEFI update tool allows you to update system UEFI without entering operating systems first like MS-DOS or Windows®. Just save the new UEFI file to your USB flash drive, floppy disk or hard drive and launch this tool, then you can update your UEFI only in a few clicks without preparing an additional floppy diskette or other complicated flash utility. Please be noted that the USB flash drive or hard drive must use FAT32/16/12 file system. If you execute Instant Flash utility, the utility will show the UEFI files and their respective information. Select the proper UEFI file to update your UEFI, and reboot your system after the UEFI update process is completed.

#### Internet Flash

Internet Flash searches for available UEFI firmware updates from our servers. In other words, the system can auto-detect the latest UEFI from our servers and flash them without entering Windows OS. Please note that you must be running on a DHCP configured computer in order to enable this function.

## 3.4.1 CPU Configuration



#### Intel Hyper Threading Technology

To enable this feature, a computer system with an Intel processor that supports Hyper-Threading technology and an operating system that includes optimization for this technology, such as Microsoft® Windows® XP / Vista $^{\text{TM}}$  / 7 / 8 is required. Set to [Enabled] if using Microsoft® Windows® XP / Vista $^{\text{TM}}$  / 7 / 8 or Linux kernel version 2.4.18 or higher. This option will be hidden if the installed CPU does not support Hyper-Threading technology.

#### **Active Processor Cores**

Use this item to select the number of cores to enable in each processor package. The default value is [All].

#### Enhanced Halt State (C1E)

All processors support the Halt State (C1). The C1 state is supported through the native processor instructions HLT and MWAIT and requires no hardware support from the chipset. In the C1 power state, the processor maintains the context of the system caches.

#### **CPU C3 State Support**

Use this to enable or disable CPU C3 report to OS.

## **CPU C6 State Support**

Use this to enable or disable CPU C6 report to OS.

#### Package C State Support

Selected option will program into C State package limit register. The default value is [Disabled].

## **CPU Thermal Throttling**

You may select [Enabled] to enable CPU internal thermal control mechanism to keep the CPU from overheating.

#### **No-Execute Memory Protection**

No-Execution (NX) Memory Protection Technology is an enhancement to the IA-32 Intel Architecture. An IA-32 processor with "No Execute (NX) Memory Protection" can prevent data pages from being used by malicious software to execute codes. This option will be hidden if the current CPU does not support No-Excute Memory Protection.

### Intel Virtualization Technology

When this option is set to [Enabled], a VMM (Virtual Machine Architecture) can utilize the additional hardware capabilities provided by Vanderpool Technology. This option will be hidden if the installed CPU does not support Intel Virtualization Technology.

#### **Hardware Prefetcher**

Use this item to turn on/off the MLC streamer prefetcher.

#### **Adjacent Cache Line Prefetch**

Use this item to turn on/off prefetching of adjacent cache lines.

## 3.4.2 North Bridge Configuration



#### **Primary Graphics Adapter**

This allows you to select [Onboard], [PCI] or [PCI Express] as the boot graphic adapter priority. The default value is [PCI Express].

#### VT-d

Use this item to enable/disable Intel(R) Virtualization Technology for Directed I/O.

#### **PCIE2 Link Speed**

This allows you to select PCIE2 Link Speed. The default value is [Auto].

#### PCIE4 Link Speed

This allows you to select PCIE4 Link Speed. The default value is [Auto].

## **Share Memory**

This allows you to set onboard VGA share memory feature. The default value is [Auto].

#### **IGPU Multi-Moniter**

This allows you to enable or disable IGPU Multi-Moniter. The default value is [Enabled]. If you wish to install a PCI Express card under Windows  $^{\otimes}$  XP / Vista $^{\text{TM}}$  OS, please disable this option.

## **Render Standby**

Use this to enable or disable Render Standby by Internal Graphics Device. The default value is [Enabled].

#### Deep Render Standby

This allows you to enable or disable Deep Render Standby. The default value is [Enabled].

## 3.4.3 South Bridge Configuration



#### **Onboard HD Audio**

Select [Auto], [Enabled] or [Disabled] for the onboard HD Audio feature. If you select [Auto], the onboard HD Audio will be disabled when PCI Sound Card is plugged.

#### **Front Panel**

Select [Auto] or [Disabled] for the onboard HD Audio Front Panel.

#### **Onboard HDMI HD Audio**

This allows you to enable or disable the Onboard HDMI HD Audio feature.

#### **Onboard LAN**

This allows you to enable or disable the Onboard LAN feature.

#### Onboard 1394

This allows you to enable or disable the Onboard 1394 feature.

#### Deep Sleep

Mobile platforms support Deep S4/S5 in DC only and desktop platforms support Deep S4/S5 in AC only. The default value is [Enabled in S5].

#### Restore on AC/Power Loss

This allows you to set the power state after an unexpected AC/power loss. If [Power Off] is selected, the AC/power remains off when the power recovers. If [Power On] is selected, the AC/power resumes and the system starts to boot up when the power recovers.

## **Good Night LED**

Use this item to enable or disable Power LED and LAN LED.

#### **Onboard Debug Port LED**

Use this item to enable or disable Onboard Debug Port LED.

## 3.4.4 Storage Configuration



#### SATA Controller(s)

Use this item to enable or disable the SATA Controller feature

#### **SATA Mode Selection**

This item is for SATA3\_0, SATA3\_1 and SATA2\_2 to SATA2\_5 ports. Use this to select SATA mode. Configuration options: [IDE Mode], [AHCI Mode] and [RAID Mode]. The default value is [AHCI Mode].



AHCI (Advanced Host Controller Interface) supports NCQ and other new features that will improve SATA disk performance but IDE mode does not have these advantages.

#### **SATA Aggressive Link Power Management**

Use this item to configure Aggressive Link Power Management.

#### Hard Disk S.M.A.R.T.

Use this item to enable or disable the S.M.A.R.T. (Self-Monitoring, Analysis, and Reporting Technology) feature. Configuration options: [Disabled] and [Enabled].

#### ASMedia SATA3 Mode

This item is for SATA3\_A1 and SATA3\_A2 ports. Use this to select ASMedia SATA3 mode. Configuration options: [IDE Mode], [AHCI Mode] and [Disabled]. The default value is [AHCI Mode].

#### SATA Boot ROM

Use this to enable or disable ASMedia SATA Boot ROM. The default value is [Disabled].



We recommend to use Intel® Z77 SATA ports (SATA3\_0, SATA3\_1, SATA2\_2, SATA2\_3, SATA2\_4 and SATA2\_5) for your bootable devices. This will minimum your boot time and get the best performance. But if you still want to boot from ASMedia SATA3 controller, you can still enable this in UEFI.

# 3.4.5 Intel(R) Rapid Start Technology



## Intel(R) Rapid Start Technology

Use this item to enable or disable Intel(R) Rapid Start Technology. Intel(R) Rapid Start Technology is a new zero power hibernation mode which allows users to resume in just 5-6 seconds. The default is [Enabled].

## **Entry After**

Select a time to enable RTC wake timer at S3 entry. The default is [10 minutes].

#### **Active Page Threshold Support**

This allows you to enable or disable Active Page Threshold Support. The default is [Disabled].

# 3.4.6 Intel(R) Smart Connect Technology



## Intel(R) Smart Connect Technology

Use this item to enable or disable Intel(R) Smart Connect Technology. Intel(R) Smart Connect Technology keeps your e-mail and social networks, such as Twitter, Facebook, etc. updated automatically while the computer is in sleep mode. The default is [Enabled].

## 3.4.7 Intel(R) Thunderbolt



#### Wake From Thunderbolt Devices

This allows you to enable or disable system wake from Thunderbolt devices.

## Security Level

Use this to select the level of security.

## **Thunderbolt Wake Delay**

Use this to configure Thunderbolt Wake Delay.

## Thunderbolt Extra Bus Reserved

Use this to configure Thunderbolt Extra Bus Reserved.

## **Thunderbolt Reserved Memory**

Use this to configure Thunderbolt Reserved Memory.

## **Thunderbolt Prefetchable Memory**

Use this to configure Thunderbolt Prefetchable Memory.

## Thunderbolt Reserved I/O

Use this to configure Thunderbolt Reserved I/O.

# 3.4.8 Super IO Configuration



## **Serial Port**

Use this item to enable or disable the onboard serial port.

## **Serial Port Address**

Use this item to set the address for the onboard serial port. Configuration options: [3F8h / IRQ4] and [3E8h / IRQ4].

## **Infrared Port**

Use this item to enable or disable the onboard infrared port.

## 3.4.9 ACPI Configuration



## Suspend to RAM

Use this item to select whether to auto-detect or disable the Suspend-to-RAM feature. Selecting [Auto] will enable this feature if the OS supports it.

## **Check Ready Bit**

Use this item to enable or disable the feature Check Ready Bit.

## **ACPI HPET Table**

Use this item to enable or disable ACPI HPET Table. The default value is [Enabled]. Please set this option to [Enabled] if you plan to use this motherboard to submit Windows $^{\otimes}$  Vista $^{\text{TM}}$  certification.

## PS/2 Keyboard Power On

Use this item to enable or disable PS/2 keyboard to turn on the system from the power-soft-off mode.

#### **PCI Devices Power On**

Use this item to enable or disable PCI devices to turn on the system from the power-soft-off mode.

## Ring-In Power On

Use this item to enable or disable Ring-In signals to turn on the system from the power-soft-off mode.

## **RTC Alarm Power On**

Use this item to enable or disable RTC (Real Time Clock) to power on the system.

## **USB Keyboard/Remote Power On**

Use this item to enable or disable USB Keyboard/Remote to turn on the system from the power-soft-off mode.

#### **USB Mouse Power On**

Use this item to enable or disable USB Mouse to turn on the system from the power-soft-off mode.

## 3.4.10 USB Configuration



#### **USB 2.0 Controller**

Use this item to enable or disable the use of USB 2.0 controller.

#### **USB 3.0 Controller**

Use this item to enable or disable the use of USB 3.0 controller.

## **Legacy USB Support**

Use this option to select legacy support for USB devices. There are four configuration options: [Enabled], [Auto], [Disabled] and [UEFI Setup Only]. The default value is [Enabled]. Please refer to below descriptions for the details of these four options:

[Enabled] - Enables support for legacy USB.

[Auto] - Enables legacy support if USB devices are connected.

[Disabled] - USB devices are not allowed to use under legacy OS and UEFI setup when [Disabled] is selected. If you have USB compatibility issues, it is recommended to select [Disabled] to enter OS.

[UEFI Setup Only] - USB devices are allowed to use only under UEFI setup and Windows / Linux OS.

## Legacy USB 3.0 Support

Use this option to enable or disable legacy support for USB 3.0 devices. The default value is [Enabled].

# 3.4.11 Network Configuration



## Internet Setting

Use this item to configure internet settings for Internet Flash.

## **UEFI Download Server**

Use this item to select a server for Internet Flash to download the latest UEFI.

## 3.5 Hardware Health Event Monitoring Screen

In this section, it allows you to monitor the status of the hardware on your system, including the parameters of the CPU temperature, motherboard temperature, CPU fan speed, chassis fan speed, and the critical voltage.



#### CPU Fan 1 & 2 Setting

This allows you to set CPU fan 1 & 2's speed. Configuration options: [Full On] and [Automatic Mode]. The default value is [Full On].

## **Chassis Fan 1 Setting**

This allows you to set chassis fan 1's speed. Configuration options: [Full On], [Automatic Mode] and [Manual]. The default value is [Full On].

#### Chassis Fan 2 Setting

This allows you to set chassis fan 2's speed. The default value is [Level 4].

#### Chassis Fan 3 Setting

This allows you to set chassis fan 3's speed. Configuration options: [Full On] and [Manual]. The default value is [Full On].

#### **Over Temperature Protection**

Use this to enable or disable Over Temperature Protection. The default value is [Enabled].

#### **Dehumidifier Function**

Users may prevent motherboard damages due to dampness by enabling "Dehumidifier Function". When enabling Dehumidifier Function, the computer will power on automatically to dehumidify the system after entering S4/S5 state.

#### **Dehumidifier Period**

This allows users to configure the period of time until the computer powers on and enables "Dehumidifier" after entering S4/S5 state.

#### **Dehumidifier Duration**

This allows users to configure the duration of the dehumidifying process

before it returns to S4/S5 state.

## **Dehumidifier CPU Fan Setting**

Use this setting to configure CPU fan speed while "Dehumidifier" is enabled.

## 3.6 Boot Screen

In this section, it will display the available devices on your system for you to configure the boot settings and the boot priority.



#### **Fast Boot**

Fast Boot minimizes your computer's boot time. Configuration options: [Disabled] - Disable Fast Boot.

[Fast]: When selecting "Fast", it is not allowed to boot from a USB storage device.

[Ultra Fast]: There are a few restrictions

- 1. Only supports Windows 8 UEFI operating system.
- 2. You will not be able to enter BIOS Setup by using the keyboard. The only way to enter UEFI Setup is to clear CMOS or run the "Restart to UEFI" utility in windows.
- 3. If you are using an external graphics card, the VBIOS must support UEFI GOP in order to boot.

#### **Boot From Onboard LAN**

Use this item to enable or disable the Boot From Onboard LAN feature.

#### **Setup Prompt Timeout**

This shows the number of seconds to wait for setup activation key. 65535(0XFFFF) means indefinite waiting.

## **Bootup Num-Lock**

If this item is set to [On], it will automatically activate the Numeric Lock function after boot-up.

#### **Full Screen Logo**

Use this item to enable or disable OEM Logo. The default value is [Enabled].

## AddOn ROM Display

Use this option to adjust AddOn ROM Display. If you enable the option "Full Screen Logo" but you want to see the AddOn ROM information when the system boots, please select [Enabled]. Configuration options: [Enabled] and [Disabled]. The default value is [Enabled].

## **Boot Failure Guard**

Enable or disable the feature of Boot Failure Guard.

## **Boot Failure Guard Count**

Use this item to configure Boot Failure Guard Count.

## 3.7 Security Screen

In this section, you may set or change the supervisor/user password for the system. For the user password, you may also clear it.



## 3.8 Exit Screen



## Save Changes and Exit

When you select this option, the following message "Save configuration changes and exit setup?" will pop-out. Select [Yes] to save the changes and exit the UEFI SETUP UTILITY.

## **Discard Changes and Exit**

When you select this option, the following message "Discard changes and exit setup?" will pop-out. Select [Yes] to exit the UEFI SETUP UTILITY without saving any changes.

## **Discard Changes**

When you select this option, the following message "Discard changes?" will pop-out. Select [Yes] to discard all changes.

#### **Load UEFI Defaults**

Load UEFI default values for all the setup questions. F9 key can be used for this operation.

## Launch EFI Shell from filesystem device

Attempts to Launch EFI Shell application (Shell64.efi) from one of the available filesystem devices.

# Chapter 4: Software Support

## 4.1 Install Operating System

This motherboard supports various Microsoft<sup>®</sup> Windows<sup>®</sup> operating systems: 8 / 8 64-bit / 7 / 7 64-bit / Vista<sup>™</sup> / Vista<sup>™</sup> 64-bit / XP / XP 64-bit. Because motherboard settings and hardware options vary, use the setup procedures in this chapter for general reference only. Refer to your OS documentation for more information.

## 4.2 Support CD Information

The Support CD that came with the motherboard contains necessary drivers and useful utilities that enhance the motherboard's features.

## 4.2.1 Running The Support CD

To begin using the support CD, insert the CD into your CD-ROM drive. The CD automatically displays the Main Menu if "AUTORUN" is enabled in your computer. If the Main Menu does not appear automatically, locate and double click on the file "ASSETUP.EXE" from the BIN folder in the Support CD to display the menu.

#### 4.2.2 Drivers Menu

The Drivers Menu shows the available device's drivers if the system detects installed devices. Please install the necessary drivers to activate the devices.

#### 4.2.3 Utilities Menu

The Utilities Menu shows the application softwares that the motherboard supports. Click on a specific item then follow the installation wizard to install it.

# Installing OS on a HDD Larger Than 2TB in AHCI Mode

This motherboard adopts UEFI BIOS that allows Windows® OS to be installed on a large size HDD (>2TB). Please follow the procedures below to install the operating system.

- Please make sure to use Windows<sup>®</sup> Vista<sup>™</sup> 64-bit (with SP2 or above) or Windows<sup>®</sup> 7 64-bit / 8 64-bit (with SP1 or above).
- 2. Press <F2> or <Delete> at system POST. Set **AHCI Mode** in UEFI Setup Utility > Advanced > Storage Configuration > SATA Mode.
- 3. Choose the item "UEFI:xxx" to boot in UEFI Setup Utility > Boot > Boot Option #1. ("xxx" is the device which contains your Windows<sup>®</sup> installation files. Normally it is an optical drive.) You can also press <F11> to launch boot menu at system POST and choose the item "UEFI:xxx" to boot.
- 4. Start Windows® installation.


# Installing OS on a HDD Larger Than 2TB in RAID Mode

This motherboard adopts UEFI BIOS that allows Windows® OS to be installed on a large size HDD (>2TB). Please follow the procedures below to install the operating system.

- Please make sure to use Windows<sup>®</sup> Vista<sup>™</sup> 64-bit (with SP2 or above) or Windows<sup>®</sup> 7 64-bit / 8 64-bit (with SP1 or above).
- 2. Copy Intel<sup>®</sup> RAID drivers into a USB flash disk. You can download the driver from ASRock's website and unzip the file into a USB flash disk **OR** copy the file from ASRock motherboard support CD. (please copy the files under the following directory:
  - 32 bit: ..\i386\Win7 Vista Intel..
  - 64-bit: ..\AMD64\Win7-64 Vista64 Intel..
- 3. Create a RAID array for you system. Please refer to "Intel RAID Installation Guide" file for details
- 4. Install Windows<sup>®</sup> Vista<sup>™</sup> 64-bit / 7 64-bit / 8 64-bit:
  - A. Insert your Windows® Vista™ 64-bit / 7 64-bit / 8 64-bit installation disc to the optical drive.
  - B. Press <F11> to launch boot menu at system POST and choose the item "UEFI:xxx" to boot.
  - C. Start Windows<sup>®</sup> Installation. When you see "Where do you want to install Windows?" page, please click "Load Driver".



D. Plug the USB flash disk into your USB port; select "Browse" to find the RAID driver. Then choose the directory (xx\AMD64\) you have copied in the first step.



- E. Please keep the USB flash disk installed until the system's first reboot.
- F. Continue to install OS by following the Windows® instructions.
- 5. Follow Windows® Installation Guide to install OS.

If you install Windows® 8 64-bit / 7 64-bit / Vista™ 64-bit on a large hard disk (ex. Disk volume > 2TB), it may take more time to boot into Windows® or install driver/utilities. If you encounter this problem, you will need to follow the instructions below to fix this problem.


## Windows<sup>®</sup> Vista<sup>™</sup> 64-bit:

Microsoft® does not provide hotfix for this problem. The steps listed below are Microsoft®s suggested solution:

A. Disable System Restore.

a. Type "systempropertiesprotection" in the Start Menu. Then press

"Fnter"



b. De-select Local Disks for System Restore. Then Click "Turn System Restore Off" to confirm. Then Press "Ok".




- B. Disable "Volume Shadow Copy" service.
  - a. Type "computer management" in the Start Menu, then press "Enter".



b. Go to "Services and Applications>Services"; Then double click "Volume





c. Set "Startup type" to "Disable" then Click "OK".



- C. Reboot your system.
- D. After reboot, please start to install motherboard drivers and utilities.

## Windows® 7 64-bit:

- B. After installing Windows® 7 64-bit, install the hotfix kb2505454. (This may take a long time; >30 mins.)
