Amendment implements pay

In addition to the 11.7 percent pay increase recently approved by President Jimmy Carter, other proposals have been signed in conjunction with the Military Compensation Bill.

UNDER THE provisions accepted for variable housing allowance, the system will be based on the difference between based on the difference between average monthly housing costs and 115 percent of Basic Allowance for Quarters. Author-ized amounts of allowance will be determined by the Secretary of the Navy. Also, a joint service effort is in the works to assist in

developing the appropriate geographical groupings. This effort will establish the average housing cost in a given area and assist in developing precise payment formulas. The allowance is slated to become a permanent is slated to become a permanent entitlement, payable by grade, and takes effect Oct. 1. Dependents who remain in the United States while the servicemember is stationed overseas are also affected

ALSO INCLUDED in the amendment is a provision concerning travel and transportation allowances. An 18.5 cents per mile reimbursement has been

implemented for members making permanent change of station moves. Although the change also applies to dependents, their travel rate will remain unchanged for the time being.
Aviation Career Incentive Pay

Aviation Career Incentive Pay and Enlisted Aircrew Pay will increase by 25 percent. Up to \$61 per month will be awarded those servicemembers receiving ACIP, while recipients of EAP will receive. up to \$26 per month.

The bill also authorizes

payments of fiscal year 1982 sea pay, plus up to an additional 15 percent, depending on cumulative years of sea duty.

FOR CERTAIN members, revisions in the "save pay" provisions for enlisted and warrant officer personnel who received commissions are received commissions are approved. They include basic pay, BAQ, BAS, pay raises and longevity increases that the member would have ordinarily received as an enlisted or warrant officer.

Induction of these proposals, and the subsequent signing of the Military Compensation Bill, formed what is believed to be the largest benefits package ever awarded armed forces members.

Applicants chosen for the fellowship program will work for the Cabinet Agency, Executive Office of the President or the Vice



EDITOR'S NOTE: in a four-part series designed to inform the 19,000 patients treated by the Naval Regional Medical Clinic, Branch Clinic MCAS, Kaneohe Bay on quality health care and the ways patrons can help improve the services.

Promotions, commissaries, exchanges. retention, pay and allowances, retirement benefits as well as a host of other similar topics seem to be at issue these days. Sneaking into their midst, the topic of quality health care also emerges as a frequent agenda item.

HISTORICALLY. because of a paucity of personnel, in Septem-ber 1978, a major realignment of Navy Medical Department resources on Oahu was necessary. Medical personnel were routine-ly standing watches of almost 36 hours dura-tion and, with no chance for rest, were rendering health care while dog-tired. We realized we were compromising quality health care in favor of quantity and patient convenience: a totally defenseless situation.

At our Branch Clinic, which is at least 25 people short, it meant we could no longer provide 24-hour emergency room coverage. After - hours medical officer coverage was established between 4 and 10 p.m. daily and 7:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. weekends and holi-days. The medical

officer is subject to a 15 minute recall in the event of airfield emergencies and for consultation by hos-pital corpsmen on duty.

Priority after-hours treatments were estab-tished as follows: (1) active duty personnel with legitimate need for minor acute illness and (2) patients other than active duty with minor problems would be referred to the appointment system the next regular working day. Those with more urgent medical problems would be referred to the Tripler Army Medical Center emergency room or Pearl Harbor Branch Clinic. If they so elect, they could also utilize the Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Uni-formed Services.

OBVIOUSLY, OBVIOUSLY, we have not vigorously enforced that policy. We publicized the changes and were exceedingly gratified by the cooperative response. Weekend emergency room abuse (where frequently as many as 200 patients were seen in a 24-hour period) dropped to an period) dropped to an all-time low. We were able to do as much as we could with what we had, and this trans-lated to better patient care ... quality care.

Shortly thereafter, Col Mel Sautter, commanding officer, MCAS / Kaneohe Bay organized the various station councils, the Health Care Services Council among them. This council, under the able leadership of Barbara Collins and

membership comprised of repre-sentatives from station organizations provided a valuable forum where ideas and problems
could be exchanged,
complaints evaluated
and appropriate response initiated.
The council promulgated, disseminated,

collected and evaluated a survey of those who use our services. We found that a majority liked and appreciated our services. Through the survey and the Health Care Services Council several prob-lem areas were identified and suggestions were presented which implemented when feasible. As a matter of fact, the survey proved of such value that additional surveys, with appropri-ate modifications were taken at all "Navy Hawaii" treatment facilities. Through these efforts, the "complaint system" was medified to better evaluate problems real or otherwise. Moreover,

THESE priorities were mandated, but reasonable, when one looks at the primary function of the Navy Medical Department, which is to keep the active duty forces able to respond to hostil-ities. In brief, the priorities we must place on patient care are in accord with our mission to keep "the company" operable.

the priorities of the patient categories for which we are respon-sible were defined for

It necessitates that services be rendered to active duty personnel (including reserve

with job related prob-lems, dependents of active duty personnel, retired personnel and their dependents and

finally, all others and "humanitarian," roughly in that order. In regard to who has the "right" versus the "benefit" of medical care as a military medical facility, please be aware that the only right to medical care is held solely by active duty personnel. All other categories of patient have a benefit contrary to what only when the military facility is able to provide assistance without sacrificing care to those who have the right -those on active duty. Again, it is precisely this distinct tion that CHAMPUS evolved to provide a partial payment program for dependents and retirees, a program for which the active member is not eligible. However, let me assure you that I have never met anyone

who didn't recognize

and respect the impor-

CURTAILMENT of services as mentioned before, is always predicated on a "can do" spirit that must give way to a "can't do" reality. And no one at the air station, in spite of our current manning posture, is seriously considering curtailment of services as long as we have the means with which to render care. But there are realities we must address in order to provide quality care.






The parade ended late in the afternoon at Kapiolani Park. But as the parade came to a close the Aloha Week festivities and the spirit



Sheel Scoop Disrespect defies written authority

I remember reading a quote that said:
"Being a woman is a terribly difficult task
since it consists principally in dealing with
men." I can't quite recall who said it but
recently I had a chance to witness a
situation that related well to that quote.

While walking down a street I came across a woman Marine sergeant apparently admonishing a male lance corporal for something or other. As I came closer I overheard some of the conversation taking place and, in my opinion, it was less

than pleasant.

I became curlous and decided to stop and cavesdrop to find out what was going on. I discovered that the sergeant had politely suggested that the male Marine extinguish his cigarette before continuing down the street. With cigarette still in hand, the lance corporal was attempting to defend himself by suying he had seen staff NCOs and officers doing the same thing.

The sergeant replied that that wasn't the point and if he ever expected to make

point, and if he ever expected to make corporal, he should disregard the wrongdoings of others and set a good example for himself. The male Marine began to spice his language with a few profane words and that's when I decided to speak up.

"Pardon me, sergeant, are you having trouble?" I asked.

"I was just trying to get this Marine to put out his cigarette but he just won't listen

to reason," she replied.
"Hey Marine, you know it's not a custom

of ours to smoke while in uniform and walking down a street, so why not just put it out and light it up later," I suggested. "Yeah, okay sarge," he said.
With that, the woman Marine departed leaving me and the lance corporal standing there. As she turned a corner, he looked at me and said, "I didn't mean to be so stubborn, but I don't like no woman telling me what to do."

"Marine, she is a sergeant and outranks you. Besides you were wrong to begin with. It would've saved you and her a lot of time if you'd done as she asked. If she were a staff NCO or an officer, you would've cooperated quickly, right?" I asked.
"Yeah—but that's different."

"You would've cooperated because they are senior to you. Well, she is also your senior, so there's no difference."

The Marine shragged his shoulders and went on his way, without the lit cigarette in his hand, and I continued about my business. That situation stayed on my mind for awhile, and I recalled other women NCOs complaining of being considered unimportant by junior male Marines.

Maybe some Marines don't choose to remember it, but our promotion warrants read "all personnel of lesser grade to render obedience to appropriate orders" means just that regardless of the gender of the senior person. It's the Marine way to cooperate.



All-weather coats available through Exchange system

HQMC, WASHINGTON, MCNews — The all-weather coat is now available to Marines through the Marine Corps exchange system.

The coat, costing an estimated \$85, may be worn on all occasions including ceremonies, formations and inspections. It may also be worn with all service dreas and utility uniforms, depending on weather conditions. The top button of the coat may be left open with the collar neatly folded back to the lapel.

DURING THE winter months, all Marines wearing the coat are required to wear or carry black gloves. Women Marines who wear the coat

black gloves. Women Marines who wear the coat are required to wear a red scarf during the winter uniform period.

The coat must be large enough that when worn, all sleeves, collars and undergarments are not seen. The coat has a detachable zippered liner, which can be removed during summer months.

For maintenance, the coat should be dry cleaned only. The sleeves and collars of the coat should be dry cleaned only. The sleeves and collars of the coat should be rolled pressed and not creased. Except for a center back pleat, the coat is crease-free. After every four or five dry cleanings, a water repellency treatment should be applied to the coat.

RANK INSIGNIAS will be worn on the coat RANK INSIGNIAS will be worn on the coat similar to the way they are worn on raincoats. The coat is authorized for wear with civilian clothing as long as rank insignias aren't worn. Murines who have the all-weather coat will not

Marines who have the all-weather coat will not be required to keep the overcoat and raincoat. However, Marines who do not have the all-weather coat must have a raincoat and overcoat. The all-weather coat will be issued to recruits sometime during fiscal year 1982. A four-year wear-out period, beginning from the date of initial issue to recruits, will be established as the date of wear for the raincoat and overcoat.

The all-weather coat is now on sale at three Marine Corps exchanges: Marine Corps Development and Educational Command, Quantico, Va.; and Marine Corps bases Camp Lejeune, N.C., and Camp Pendleton, Calif.

Two exchanges handle women Marine all-weather coats: Camp Pendleton and Quantico. For Marines located at commands where exchanges do not sell the all-weather coat, two options are available:

THEY CAN PLACE a special order through their local Marine Corps exchange, or by submitting a special request order to the exchange officer at one of the commands where the item is stored. The request must contain the Item description, size and quantity desired and full payment to include anticipated postage costs.



Army outpost fades into shadows

Mokapu Peninsula bears a long and distinguished history as a military strong-hold. This tradition dates back to the early Hawaiian monarchy and includes such legendary warriors as Peleiholani, a 16th century king of Oahu, Kahekili, the fierce

warrior who reigned over Maui, Lanai and Molokai and finally Molokal and finally Kamehameha the Great, military tacti-cian and revered leader who united the Hawaiian Islands. Each of these warrior kings is closely linked to the story of Mokapu. Their military legacy was

continued when the United States, estab-lished the first of its three military facilities.

MOKAPU Peninsula became an estab-lished home to part of the United States defense system during World War I. President Woodrow Wilson sign-ed Executive Order 2900 in July 1918

establishing a tiny 322acre Army outpost on the Windward side of Oahu as Kuwasohe Military Reservation. Better known as Camp Kuwaaohe it was one of the oldest U.S. military installations in the islands.

At some point during the late twenties or the late twenties or early thirtles, Camp Kuwaaohe became

Camp Ulupau. In February 1941, it was again redesignated. This time it was titled Ft. Hase. The outpost was named in honor of MajGen William Hase, U.S. Army, former commander of the Hawaiian Department of the Army's coastal defense system. It was during World War II that Ft. Hase assumed its greatest signifi-cance. It became an invaluable link of the Windward Coastal Artillery Command and served as headquarters for the harbor defense of Kaneohe

> FT. HASE was originally designed to handle a small force of two battalions. Once World War II heated up its size increased along with its mission

When Kancohe Naval Air Station became established, Ft. Hase Air ecame responsible for coastal defense: Protection was pro-vided by French Battery situated in the area between Helcloa Beach and the house that now serves as the commanding general's quarters. A second. nore familiar emplace ment was situated at the tip of Mokanu Peninsula and was known as Battery Pennysivania or Penn Battery. This facility wasn't fully operational unt four days before VJ day and never played an active part in the defense of Mokapu.

A STRING of 155mm guns faced the open sea between Penn Battery between Penn Battery and the estern base of Ulupau crater. Since the guns were designed for mobility they were not placed on stationary mounts. They were located in the general area of the present rifle range complex, however, there is no longer any visible evidence of any visible evidence their existence. This artillery unit had the distinction of being the only one to see action at Kaneohe. This defen-

sive arsenal was credited with the sinking of a Japanese submarine off-shore in 1942.

Emplacements for Emplacements for three-inch guns were situated on the western face of Ulupau. Their purpose was to repel and defend against any landing craft attempting to embark Ft. Hase beach. The installation is still visible on the face of the volcanic tuff

Defense along Heleloa Beach was provided by 50-caliber machine gun emplacements stretching from Pyra-mid Rock to the seaward side of Ulu-

QUARTERS FOR the soldiers stationed at Ft. Hase consisted of a tent city at the southwest base of Ulupau. By 1945, most of these tents had been replaced by small wooden structures. Today that same site is the location of MCAS Kaneohe Bay's newest base housing units and is home to a large number of Marines and their dependents. It's commonly known as Ulupau housing area.

French Battery was a low mound of earth lying inland from Heleloa Beach. It was designed to accommodate six-inch guns but, for some reason long forgotten, eight-inch guns were installed on stationary Panama mounts. The guns mounts. The guns supposedly were designed in 1888 and constructed in 1917. The mounts are said to have come from dismantled railway cars. The guns were considered to be only "fairly accurate." The walls of this beach front fortress were 20 feet in height and overall height of the emplace-ment was 82.6 feet.

BY 1945, Ft. Hase's rapid growth demanded more breathing space. An additional space. An additional 474 acres of land were acquired by the Army

from Harold Castle who owned a great deal of the land on Mokapu. The Capehart housi area now occupies this

same location.

By the time World War II finally drew to a close, thousands of soldiers had been either stationed, trained or had traveled through the vicinity on their way to the Pacific front.

When the 98th Army Division departed Ft. Hase in late 1945 for occupation duty in Japan the bre became a virtual ghost town as shown in the February 9, 1946 issue of the Kaneohe Klipper, the base newspaper when Kaneohe Bay was still a naval air station. The 98th was busily pre-paring for the antici-pated invasion of Japan when hostilities abruptly ceased.

Ft. Hase, which had at one point during the war been home base for elements of three divisions, became a skeleton outpost of Ft. Ruger in April 1947.

In the mid-fifties. after the Marine Corps had taken over the old Kancohe Naval Air Station, the Corps also acquired the rest of Makapu Peninsula, For the first time since the reign of the Hawaiian monarchy Mokapu was again under the jurisdiction of one military organization. Sadly, the once fast-paced Army outpost known as Ft. Hase faded into the mists of Mokapu's colorful past. Today the existence of Ft. Hase is only hinted at by the bears its distinguished



Marine Corps Order dictates military voting privileges

HQMC, WASHING-TON MCNews — The upcoming national and local elections will continue to dominate the news for the next couple of months. Servicemembers are encouraged to carry out their obligations and

their obligations and rights as citizens, but there are a few things they should remember.

Marines can do plenty to actively select the political candidate of their choice. How ever, as a member of the armed forces, Marines are limited in what they can do.

Marines can:

register, vote and express their personal opinion on political candidates and issues, providing they do not do it as armed forces representatives: representatives;
— contribute money

to a political organiza-tion and attend political meetings and rallies as spectators when not in uniform;
- promote and

encourage other mili-tary people to exercise their right to vote, provided they promote without attempting to influence or interfere with the outcome of the

- serve in local, parttime, non-partisan civil offices, as long as the position does not interfere with their military duties; and military duties; and they get prior approval from the Secretary of the Navy or one of his designated persons;
— sign petitions as private citizens for specific legislative action or place a

action or place a candidate's name on an official election ballot;

write letters to newspaper editors, expressing their per sonal views concerning public issues as long as these letters do not espouse a particular political party's or candidate's views;

personal letters, not for publication, expressing preference for a specific political candidate or cause; and

- place political bumper sticekrs on

their own cars.
While Marines have several rights as citizens, there are some things they are not permitted to do.

Marines cannot:

— use their official:
authority or influence
to interfere with an
election or affect the
course of its outcome;

generally cannot members of a civil office and cannot participate in political management or cam paigns, or make public speeches on behalf of a candidate;
— make a campaign contribution to another

member of the anned forces or to a civilian officer or employee of the United States for the purpose of promot-ing a political objective

solicit or receive campaign contributions

from other members of the amred forces or from civilian officers or employees of the United States for the purpose of promoting political objectives or causes;

write partisan political articles for publication in newspapers and magazines;

- serve in any official capacity or be

listed as a sponsor of a partisan political club, can they before a partisan political gathering of any kind to promote a political party or

participate in any radio, television or group discussion program as a supporter for a political pa candidate; and party or march or ride in a partisan political parade or display a large political sign, banner or poster on their car.

If you are in doubt about what you can or cannot do regarding polítics, check Marine Corps Order 5370.7 entitled "Political Activities," or see your unil legal officer.

Travel benefits broaden

HQMC, WASHING TON MCNews — Marines authorized indirect travel on permanent change of station orders with delay en route can travel space-required on Military Airlift Command transporta-

According to officials here, travel on MAC contracted transportation in a space-required status can now be provided, when available, for all or part of the circuitous route.

PREVIOUS to the change announced in Marine Corps Order 4650.30J, Change 2, of July 2, 1980, Marines traveling on MAC transportation under PCS orders with authorized delay en

route were limited to those segments of the circuitous route that did not exceed the cost of the direct route.
Marines traveling in a circuitous status must pay the difference between the direct route and segmented route.

For example, a Marine stationed on Okinawa desires delay en route in Hawaii while traveling to the continental United States on PCS orders. The cost of MAC travel from Okinawa to CONUS is \$345. The segmented cost would be Okinawa to Hawaii (\$393), plus the cost from Hawaii to CON-US (\$154), for a total cost of \$547. The excess cost of \$202 would be

ANOTHER example would be a Marine stationed on Okinawa desiring a delay in the Phillipines while traveling to CONUS on PCS orders. The cost of MAC travel from Okinawa to CONUS is MAC travel from Okinawa to CONUS is \$345. Marines experiment with new rations

performance Test measures galley's

QUANTICO, Va. — In the near future, shipboard and field Marines may be eating fewer 'C' rations and more 'A' and Tray Pack

It's part of a 12-day test currently conducted on Marine Corps Expeditionary Shelter System International Standards Organiza-tion galley by the Development Center's Mobility and Logistics Division at Camp Upshur.
The test began July

22 on the five-shelter garrison-type dining facility. The galley is capable of feeding between 200 and 1,000 Marines in one and a half hours or less.

The galley test will determine whether it's cheaper to feed Marines

rations. Test officials added that the meals will be more nutritional

Officials claim that 'C' rations won't be replaced, but will be supplemented by the 'A' and Tray Pack rations on ship and in the field.

"The 'A' rations are fresh foods," said LtCol B.J. Barents, head, agistics Branch, M&L. Division. "They're the same as dining facility foods."

· Under the test plan, 'A' rations will be served in the 1,000 feeding capacity module for six days, and in the 200 and 500 feeding modules for two days.

Tray pack rations are something new," explained Barents.

containerized food service module system that's 40 feet long, 20 feet wide and 8 feet high, is a five-shelter unit. It has three general purpose rigid shelters (used for cooking) and two knockdown shelters.

"The two outboard shelters are serving lines, the other three shelters are used for cooking purposes,' Barents explained.

"Within the cooking shelters, we have a four-feet by two-feet griddle, a three-well steam jacketed kettle-steam table combination, and a convention al oven that's capable of holding 10 full-sized steam, table pans," Jackson cited.

Additionally, the food service module has a two-well sink with sump pump, a frypan (24" × 40"), two half-steam table pans, work tables and other kitchen wares and utensils.

Thus far on the Camp Upshur based project, the Marines have been eating from disposable wares and utensils contently. But, inade-quate ventilation has caused modifications caused modifications and additions to be made on the galley.

"Then, opening the shelter doors for ventilation, we ended up with two problems," he explained. "We got rid of the flies by putting an air curtain on the doors. We added fans because even with the fans going and shelter doors open, it was still hot.

"I feel that we'll have to redesign the module," Barents said. "We're going to have to get the hot air out by means other than the vent fans we're using now. That's because containers must be of specific

measurements on ship.
"Our vent fans stick
out too far from the top of the shelter," he added. "The only way the galley could fit on a container vessel now is by putting it on top of the other containers.

The test, which ended in early August will give the Corps insight on the capabilities and performances of the newly developed galley. Once data is collected and needed changes are made to the food Corps could be in for another change in taste—'A' and tray pack rations.

Manpower officials minimize hardships for deployed Marines

HQMC, WASHINGTON, MCNEWS — Some junior Marines can expect to spend less time at attackide duty stations between overseas tours and deployments, according to ALMAR 133-80.

Previously, Marines completing a dependents-restricted tour in the Western Pacific, who were assigned to a Continental United States Fleet Marine Force command, received no protection from metricipation in corresponding to the protection from the continent of the protection of the protecti from participation in overseas unit deployments to WestPac.

IN JULY 1979, however, a 24 month protection from 6 month temporary additional duty unit deployments was afforded WestPac

returnees.
Since then, shortages in first-termers available for participation in the unit deployment program have required a reduction of the 24 month protection to 12 months. This measure is anticipated to be in effect only until all units scheduled for participation in the unit deployment program become fully involved.

Another change revealed in the ALMAR affects first term Marines who complete one TAD unit

deployment overseas. Previously, no protection was afforded. Consequently, many Marines found orders assigning them to a 12 month dependents-restricted WestPac tour when they returned from an oversens deployment. In July 1979, an 18 month protection period was instituted for Marines in this situation. Because this policy resulted in reduced availability of first-term Marines to fulfill WestPac personnel requirements, the protection period was reduced to 12 months. 12 months.

SECOND TERM Marines will continue to receive the 24 month delay between a 12 month dependents restricted WestPac tour and a TAD unit deployment as well as the 18 month protection between a single 6 month TAD deployment and a 12 month permanent change of station WestPac assignment. Exceptions may occur due to skill shortages and operational

According to the ALMAR, one of the unit deployment program's goals is for Marines to

become stabilized within a deploying unit by remaining with that unit for the duration of their FMP tour. Marines can therefore anticipate remaining with a unit after being deployed, which reduces personnel turbulence and increas readiness. These stabilized assignments should result in two unit deployments but, in some cases, may include a third deployment.

IN ADDITION, many Marines can expect less chance of receiving a 12 month dependents restricted tour to WestPac as more units participate in the Unit Deployment Program, Phase IV. Instead of spending a 12 month tour, Marines may spend two or three six-month deployments in WestPac.

Efforts are being made by manpower officials to reduce, as much as possible, the hardships imposed on Marines and their families as a result of the Corps' commitments overseas. According to the ALMAR, the Commandant continues to support the concept of a defined minimum period of non-deployability where conditions will allow

Marines offer knowledge

Wolfhounds from Schofield Barracks and Devil Dogs from MCAS Kaneohe Bay joined forces Sept. 15 through 18 for a joint service

Boarding a 40-foot aviation rescue boat provided by Station Operations and Main-tenance Squadron Waterfront Operations, Army infantrymen were taken into the heart of Kaneohe Bay. Three-man groups piled into a small rubber raft attached to the rescue boat and awaited further orders

> ONE BY ONE, the Army warriors got the signal and dropped themselves into the water. Every time a soldier plopped out of the raft another was ready to take his place.

from the recon Marines.

Leaving at least \$50-foot interval between each man, the soldiers gave thumbe up signals to let instructors inside the rescue boat know they had made safe

aquatic insertions.

Re-entering the boat proved to be a more taxing experience.

To reenter the rescue boat, soldiers had to make sure each man make sure each man was positioned directly behind the body in front of him. The rescue boat then began its

recovery approach.
Two reconnaissance
Marines readied themselves inside the rubber raft and prepared to pick up the water-soaked soldiers.

ASTHE RAFT sped past, the Wolfhounds hacked their arms through the rabber loop held by a Marine at the front of the raft, Marines at the rear of the raft assisted the

wet landlubbers back into the raft. Many soldiers appeared to welcome the sight of the red rubbery loop. They clutched it tightly once it was within reach. When a soldier was

when a source unable to grasp the recovery loop, several attempts were made to pick him up. A small safety rescue boat, also provided by Waterfront Operations, was on site

Operations, was on site in the event an infantryman had difficulty boarding the reacue boat.

Except for looks of shepticism on the faces of non-ewimmers, the unit fared exceptionally well during the training. But there was more to come.

NOT EVERYONE dreams of throwing his body off a rocky cliff into a 100-foot chasm. into a 100-foot chasm.
But members of the
visiting Army unit
spent several days
doing just that. The
platoon was on Ulupau
Crater learning the
"edgy" business of rapelling. Prior to rapelling off

the crater, the soldiers spent a day at the alr station's rapelling tower getting acquaint-ed with techniques and enfety precautions. Once their Marine instructors were satis-fied with their perfor-mance, the soldiers were ready for the big time.
Careful preparations

were made. Equipment was checked and strapped on before going "over the hill."

After ensuring that the "Swiss seat" (a

separate piece of rope tied in a specific fashion around the waist and upper leg portion) was tied correctly, the soldiers hooked onto the rapelling rope itself.

AFTER MAKING sure his feet were shoulder width apart, and taking that last look down the hill, the well-nerved infantry soldier leaned back and cautiously stepped off the cliff. Once at the bottom, he hand-climbed back up the hill. Some of the soldiers

became daring and went down the cliff "Australian-style." This form of rapelling constrains the individual to walk down the

hill face forward.
"We never experienced any type of unit enced any type of unit segregation between the Marines and Army during the training," claimed Spec4 Henry Stanley, a team leader with the soldiers. "Everyone really got along well."

company commander was pleased at the way training allowed both branches of service the opportunity to look at the composition of each other's units and the manner in which they

PATYKULA pointed out, "The exercise essisted in building up the confidence of the troops in themselves and in their leaders. It also afforded us the opportunity to view some highly motivated Marines in setion,"

Marines approve Army supplement to unit instruction

HQMC, WASHINGTON, MCNews — An innovative training method developed by the U.S. Army has recently been adopted by the Marine

Army has recently been adopted by the Marine Corps.

The Training Extension Course ranges from sanitation and squad tactics to aircraft maintenance. "Actually these aren't courses but periods of instruction," said MSgt Bonald Ward, TEC multi-media coordinator at the Murine Corps Institute. "These periods of instruction last between 30 and 40 minutes each.

"THE TEC is designed to supplement unit training going on in the field," continued Ward, "the course will help Marines who need additional help on a subject." Subjects covered include up to five different periods of instruction.

"Although the program offers four different formats, the audiovisual is probably the best," said Ward.

THERE ARE three types of formats in addition to the audiovisual format:

The audio format, which utilizes a cassette player, enables a person to listen to the information as he is reading it.

"The second type of format is used primarily in the field," said Ward. "Marines use the job nids, a series of manuals which are water resistant, that serve as field manuals."

The last format is the printed textbook which is similar to Marine Corps Institute courses. Individual Marines interested in taking a course

should go to their Traning and Audio Visual Support Center to see what courses are offered. In addition, Quantico's TAVSC also has a complete catalogue listing all TEC programs

Where the Marine Corps and Army overlap on doctrine of the courses provided, the Army's doctrine is adopted, according to Ward.

"THE BEST THING about the TEC program," Ward concluded, "is that it doesn't cost the unit a cent to use. Everything is paid by Headquarters Marine Corps. All the unit has to do is contact their base TAVSC and get the courses
