appear on all official ballots; to realize that one's candidacy is to be submitted to each of the more than a million and half voters of the state; to realize the utter impossibility of personally meeting a fraction of that number of voters in the time which elapses between the dates of nomination and election-these factors come to mean a great deal to a candidate whose entire lifetime has been spent in a single county and whose previous efforts at candidating have been confined to the circle of one's immediate acquaintances.

Soon after the convention, the writer spent a day in the city of Detroit. A business errand took him up Woodward avenue for a distance of about five blocks. It was at noon-time. Literally thousands jammed the sidewalks between the city hall and the head of Washington boulevard. This candidate from the county seat of Ingham was probably a little self-conscious. He scanned the faces of those he met. He hoped that out of that throng of office workers, professional people, merchants, shop pers and service people, at least one familiar face would show. Not one appeared. "How in the world can any candidate expect to win an election when all these people who are here are complete strangers? They do not know me. I do not know them. How can one hope to make himself known to these unknown thousands?" Those were the thoughts which perplexed this candidate in the five blocks down on one side and five blocks back on the other side of Woodward. As the campaign proceeded, the perplexity grew. So it was something of a sensation to this small town candidate when out of more than a million and a half of votes cast, the unofficial count showed more than threequarter of a million votes had been marked up in his favor. It was a great feeling to discover, here and there in remote sections of the state, a little advantage over the other candidates and to account for it by realizing that in each of these spots some warm friend had taken more than passing interest in a particular candidacy. In other places the same increase over the others could be accounted for by virtue of some special service having been rendered during ten years in the legislature.

**Cross-Eye In Children** The idea that children will outgrow squint or cross-eye is an erroneous one although there is an element of truth in it for many children who start squinting at about the age of two or earlier do overcome the obvious defect by the tenth year of life. However, they will still retain some visual defect resulting from the cross-eye.

The second erroneous belief is that a child of two years who begins to squint is too young for treatment to be instituted. As a matter of fact such children should be kept under observation from the very moment that squint is noticed.

The two important points about cross-eye are that they give an unsightly appearance and there is a loss of visual function. When the squint occurs in a small child the vision of the crossed eye is diminished. Prolonged suppression soo nproduces ser-ious deterioration in the keeness of the eye and binocular vision is lost. The longer the defect is allowed to continue the harder it will be to reestablish good binecular vision and a sense of fusion which we all use unconsciously.

What should the parent do when the child of two years begins to squint? The first step is to find out whether the child needs glasses or not. If the squint can be controlled in this way further methods a re unnecessary. However, if the glasses do not prevent deterioration of the crossed eye exercises of the eyeball should be begun
