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## Millage squeaks by, bond defeated

Plymouth-Canton school district voters narrowly approved a millage renewal issue Saturday but soundly defeated a proposed \$30 million bond issue.

Voters defeated the bond issue by a 2-1 margin but approved the five-mill property tax renewal by 271 votes.

The final unofficial tally for the millage renewal was 4,218 yes and 3,937 no votes. On the bond issue, 5,700 residents voted no and 2,409 voted yes.

Only 27 per cent of the school district's 30,000 registered voters turned out to vote Saturday—an overcast, rainy day.

Some school administrators were surprised that the millage passed, believing that it would go down the first time and be approved in June. But the renewal received supporting mar-

gins in nine of the 14 precincts. All the precincts voting against the renewal were in Plymouth.

Although all precincts voted against the bond issue, the no margin was widest in Plymouth. In Plymouth precincts, the bond issue went down by margins of from 3-1 to 6-1 while in Canton precincts it was defeated by margins of 2-1 and 3-2. In some Canton precincts, the issue lost by as few as 20 or 50 votes.

The last-minute teacher's settlement (see story below) may have had an impact on the millage renewal, but had little if any effect on the bond issue. Absentee ballot voters, who cast ballots without knowledge of the settlement, voted against the renewal by a much heavier margin. On the bond issue, though, the absentee

voters also cast a 2-1 no vote.

The five mills will be levied for six years. The school board is expected to place another bond issue on the ballot in the future—maybe for a reduced amount—but won't be able to for at least 180 days.

After the results were known, Flossie Tonda, board secretary, commented: "I'm very pleased that the renewal passed. I never felt it would go down. A lot of people say they are going to vote against it, but when it comes to pulling the lever, they realize it's their own children."

On bond issue, she added: "People had a lot of questions on the bond. Taxes have gone up. They didn't feel they could support any additional millage. They want alternatives to be used."

## Teachers OK tentative pact

Ratification of a new three-year contract between the Plymouth-Canton Board of Education and school teachers appears to await nothing more than printing of the tentative agreement.

More than 400 of the district's 1,700 teachers met at 6 a.m. Friday in the auditorium of Plymouth Salem High and gave unanimous, informal approval to a tentative agreement announced five hours earlier by negotiators for both sides.

Shortly after the settlement was reached late Thursday night, school board members were individually polled by telephone, and a majority agreed to the tentative contract.

After the faculty voted Friday morning, the leadership of the Plymouth Education Association (PEA) urged all teachers to get to the polls Saturday and vote "yes" on both the millage renewal and bond issue. Prior to the agreement, the PEA had not taken a formal position either for or against either ballot position.

**THE INITIAL ANNOUNCEMENT** of the settlement was made to the Observer at 1 a.m. Friday by Irvin Rozian of Plymouth Township, who has been serving as a facilitator for the past 2½ months. Negotiations started last June.

"A tentative agreement has been signed by both parties, and we'll have final settlement as soon as the contract is printed and ratified."

Rozian said he was pleased to have had the chance to participate in the process. "It was a long process, and I learned a lot from it. During that time I have made friends on both sides and have a lot of respect for the team members of each side."

While Rozian wouldn't admit to playing a major role in the settlement, the other parties in negotiations highly praised his contributions. Norman Kee, chief negotiator for the school board, described Rozian's participation as "invaluable." Derald McKinley, chief negotiator for the PEA, said Rozian "played a very important role. In fact, without him it's very likely we wouldn't have a settlement today."

**THE GIVE AND TAKE** which pro-

duced the settlement were all in the areas of health insurance, extended school year, the stipend schedule for teachers performing special duties, the "safe harmless" clause, and reduction in the salary schedule of ½ per cent.

The board agreed to give up its demand that both sides share the cost of insurance premiums above an agreed upon level in the third year of the contract. Another board concession was on eliminating positions in Schedule D—those teachers who receive stipends for special duties. Psychologists and social workers are eliminated from the schedule, but those now receiving stipends will be "grandfathered." Any new teacher assigned to these duties won't receive the stipend, while those now receiving it would continue to get the stipend.

The PEA agreed to give up its right to negotiate any implementation of Extended School Year (ESY).

The PEA also agreed to a reduction of ½ per cent from the economic package. The previous Tuesday the union was willing to have the ½ per cent taken from the pension contribution, but Thursday night agreed that it could be taken from the salary improvement in the first year.

The PEA also agreed to a "safe harmless" clause which the board wanted. The clause states that the school board is free from any legal liability in the event a teacher fired for not paying union dues files a lawsuit.

**BY REDUCING** the first year salary improvement by half a per cent, says Kee, the school district will save about \$200,000.

"This savings will cover the increased health insurance costs we expect in the third year of the contract and also will cover the \$18,000 expense generated by the concessions we made in Schedule D."

McKinley said the PEA wouldn't have settled without the concessions made on Schedule D. "This was very important to us. After all, some of our teachers have been receiving these stipends for 8-10 years and we couldn't agree to elimination."

From the PEA's standpoint, McKinley said, settlement became possible once the board removed the shared cap on medical premiums and changed its stance on Schedule D.

## Recall sheets 'full of errors'

Women working in the clerk's office checking the names on the first batch of petitions to recall Supervisor Harold Stein say the 1,308 signatures received bear many mistakes and names of unregistered voters.

With about half of the stack of petitions already checked against the voter registration cards, Sally Hannan, township employee, said she had already discovered "95 to 100" names of people who are either unregistered or not registered to vote in time for Saturday's school election.

However, Ms. Hannan explained, people who registered to vote after March 25, the deadline for Saturday's school election, would not yet be listed on the official registration cards.

Recall leaders believe most of those apparently unregistered names are people who registered after March 25.

"I'll have to check those 95 or so names with another sheet to see if they are newly-registered voters," said Hannan.

Doris Kelley, secretary for Clerk John Flodin, said in checking the recall forms she found petitions signed and dated by the petition circulator which show earlier dates than the dates listed next to the people who signed the circulator's petition.

Under recall law, the petition circulator must sign his name and affix the date only after the last person has signed the sheet. The sheet may have only one signature but the person who signed and dated it must do so before the circulator signs and dates the official form.

Mrs. Kelley also noted that a petition turned in by Peter Bundarin had erroneously carried the date "May 17" instead of "April 17." It will be up to the Wayne County Office of Elections to determine if those petitions

will be counted toward the necessary total of 1,251 signatures needed to force a recall election in Canton.

**CLERK JOHN** Flodin and recall chairman Peter Gabbert said an incorrect number of recall signatures submitted Monday was released to the press. By transposing the last two digits, the number was placed at 1,380 signatures, when actually 1,308 signatures were turned in.

There has also been a discrepancy regarding the number of signatures necessary to force a recall election. Recall statutes state voters must collect signatures equal to 25 per cent of the total number of votes cast in in Canton for governor in 1974.

Flodin had previously announced that 1,243 signatures were needed to force a recall because, he said, 4,975 votes were cast for the post. But Flodin was informed by Wayne County Director of Elections Joseph Martina that he had only counted the votes cast for Republican and Democratic candidates. Counting the minority candidates, 5,001 people voted for governor in Canton in 1974, Martina said.

And, Martina said, 1,251 signatures must be turned into Canton's clerk 90 days after the petitions started circulating to force a recall election.

The first petition was circulated on March 25, according to Gabbert.

"I feel very confident that we'll achieve our goal soon," Gabbert said. "We've got about 300 to 400 more petitions out there and on Monday we should drop off another batch."

Informed of the high number of petition signers who were not registered for Saturday's election, Gabbert said that was because many of the people who signed had just registered recently.

"Sometimes we would ask the person if they wanted to sign, we found out they weren't registered. So we got them registered and then got their name," Gabbert said. "We dropped off a whole bunch of new registrations when Cindy Monks and I dropped off the first batch of recall petitions."

## Apply now for garden plots

Canton families will have the opportunity to exercise their green thumbs this year.

The township's parks and recreation department is offering garden plots to residents who wish to apply. Registration for the gardens is from 7-10 p.m. May 10 at the Canton Township Recreation Center. After that, applications can be made any day between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 5 p.m.

There is a limit of one garden per family, and residents must apply in person. The gardens are at Warren and Lilley Roads.

## Developer may be forced to clue buyer on light levy

Subdivision developers may be forced to finance installation of street lights in their developments, if Canton officials decide to incorporate that requirement in a revision of the township's 1969 subdivision ordinance.

Walter J. Guth, an attorney for the township, recently said Canton officials may require developers' plans for street light installation as a condition of subdivision plat approval.

In addition, he recommended an amendment to the township's street lighting assessment ordinance which would require builders to inform home purchasers of any upcoming assessments for street lighting.

If developers are forced to install street lights, housing prices will probably be hiked to cover the cost.

Canton Clerk John Flodin said township board members will soon discuss Guth's opinions on the street lighting matter. The township board tabled the issue some weeks ago upon the request of trustee Robert Myers, who said he wanted to research the matter further.

**CURRENTLY**, developers do not install street lights or finance the instal-

lation costs. After most homes in the subdivision are occupied, builders ask the township to petition Detroit Edison for street light installation.

Special assessments for installation and maintenance costs are then levied on the homes. According to chief building inspector Chuck Thompson, builders are not legally forced to inform home purchasers of the assessment.

Township officials asked Guth for an opinion on developers' obligations to install street lights after former planning commission member Tom Timbario last fall accused township board members of ignoring a 1969 subdivision ordinance.

The ordinance, he maintained, placed the financial responsibility of street light installation on developers. At the time, Timbario objected to the \$34 average annual assessments for street light installation which were levied on nine already-completed Canton subdivisions.

Section 409 of township ordinance 32 reads:

"The subdivider shall be entirely responsible for installing the following surety bond acceptable to the township board to the township, sufficient to permit the completion of all con-

templated improvements, before the final plat shall be accepted by the township."

"Street lighting" the ordinance continues, "shall be required to be installed at intersections and at other locations deemed necessary by the township board throughout the subdivision."

Timbario wanted developers to install the lights before homes in new subdivisions are occupied. That way, he maintained, labor costs would be

## Pollution watchdogs act after dust storm

People who live in Plymouth Landing and Carriage Hills subdivision did not eat dust in vain on April 15.

Besides paying taxes on that day, residents complained to the township, the Observer and the county air pollution control center about the amount of blowing dust from the WindeMere subdivision, under construction at Warren between Canton Center Road and Sheldon.

Paul Fekety, an investigator for Wayne County Air Pollution Control, reportedly observed a worker for the John Carlo, Inc. company using a snow brush attachment to sweep dirt and dust off the new road.

"Clouds of dust were kicked up in the process," said Howard Murray, director of public information for the county agency.

Pictures of a path swept clean by the broom were taken by Fekety and a violation notice was mailed to the Carlo company the next week.

John Carlo, Inc. previously had been given a violation notice by the

county air pollution agency last October 1976 for creating "airborne pollutants." Carlo representatives pled guilty to the criminal misdemeanor charge before 35th District Judge Dunbar Davis. Sentencing was postponed for one year to allow the judge to assess any progress made in 1977 by the company.

The Carlo company headquarters is in Mount Clemens.

Mike Donahue, company spokesman, said he was aware of the October violation notice, but did not know of the April 15 incident.

"But that kind of stuff happens in construction," Donahue said. "On a dry, dusty day things of that nature can happen."

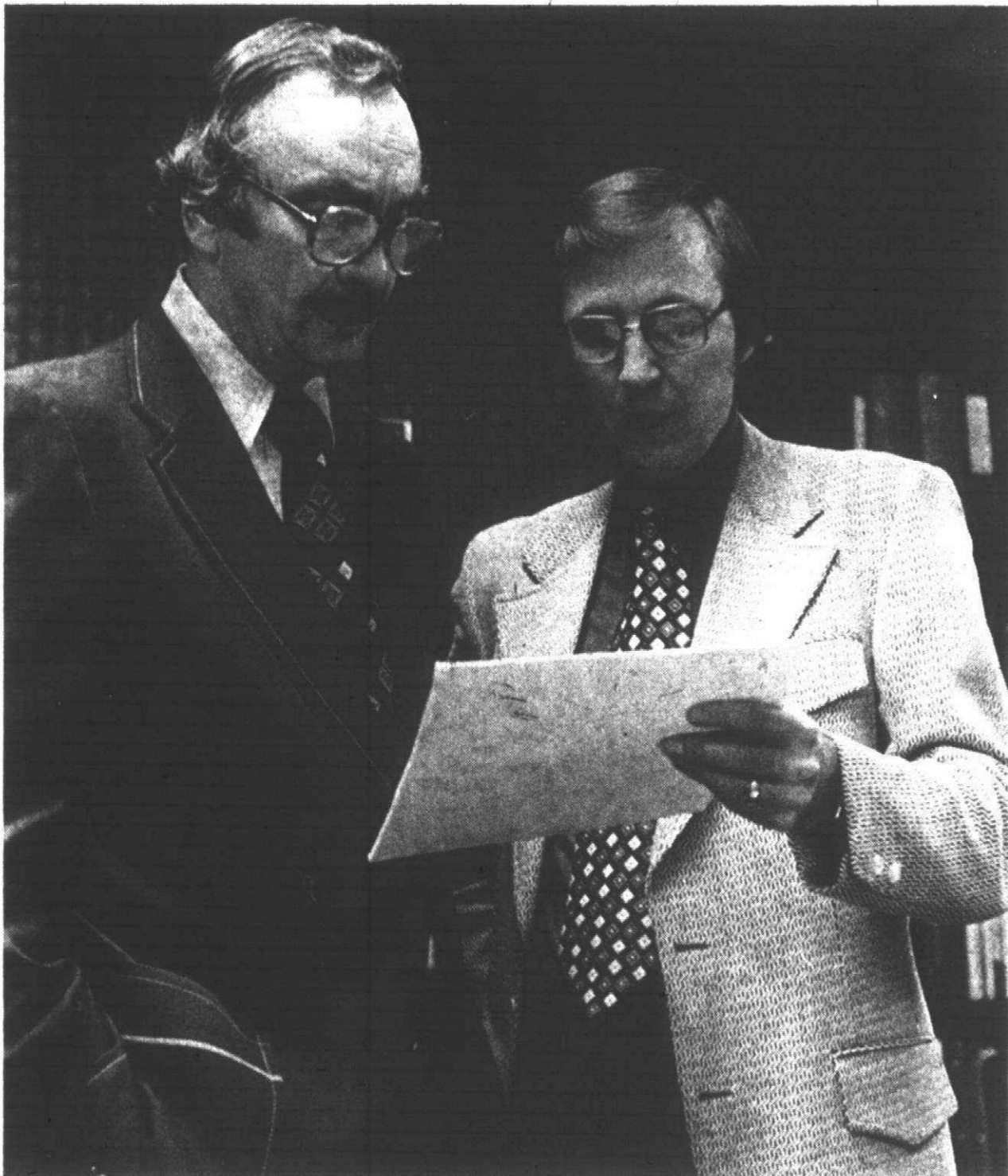
County pollution control officials say that the dust problem could have been avoided by either wetting down the dust or using a street cleaner machine that contains the dirt.

No date has been set for a court hearing on the most recent violation notice.

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Last year, a major political controversy in Canton Township was whether board meetings should be taped. ### Holmes meets new boss

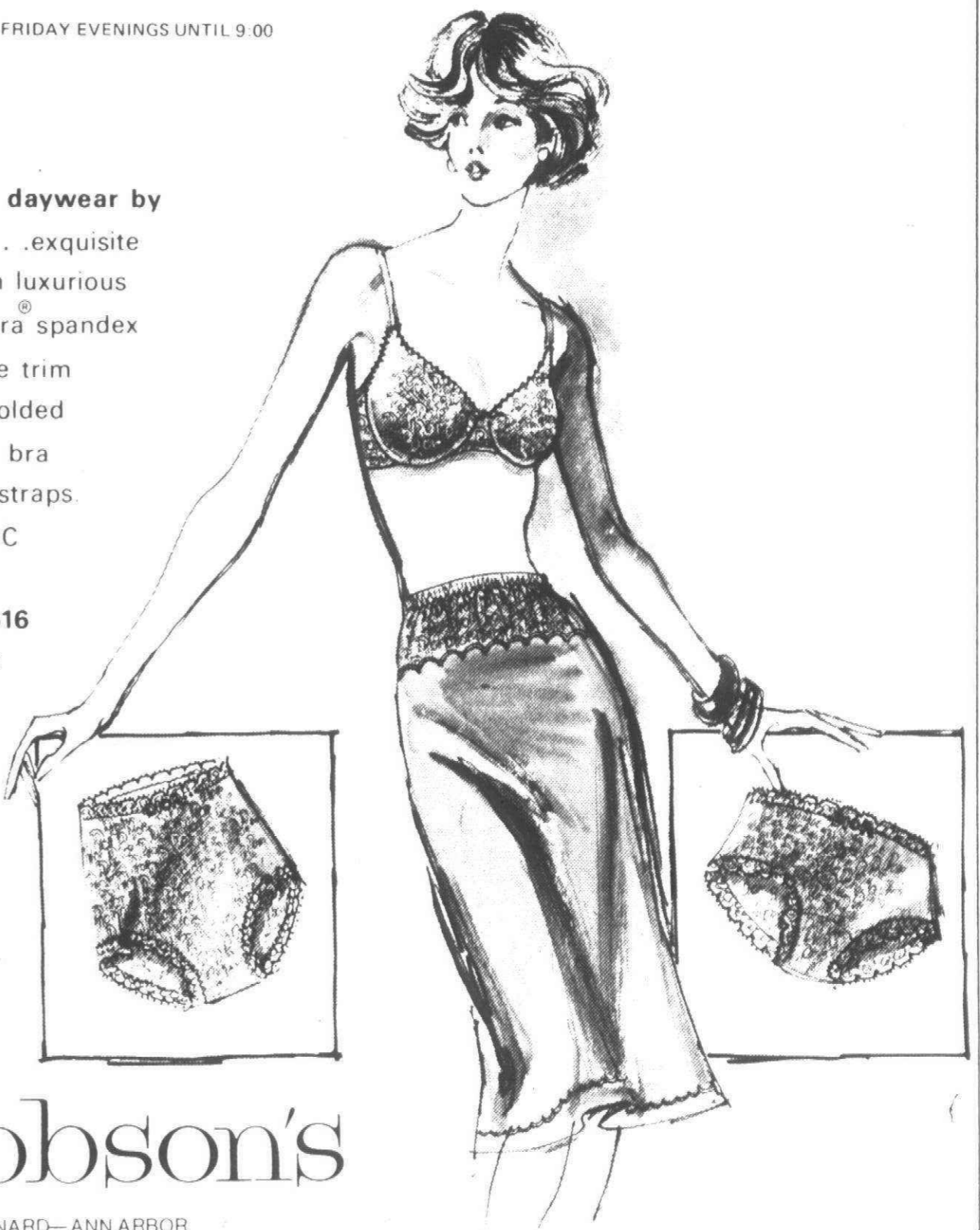

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## Steel exec runs for SC board again

I have construction experience for an era when Schoolcraft College is planning a major construction program."

- Executive experience—"My 12 years of executive experience in making decisions will fulfill this requirement. My collective bargaining experience means I will be able to help give the college's bargaining team realistic guidelines."

- Education—"Having returned to school after 27 years to complete my degree with a bachelor of science in business administration, I not only fill

this requirement, but it is also a recent experience, and I will be very familiar with the problems of the part-time student." Hayward is receiving his degree this month at Madonna College.

- Availability—"The facts that I live and work in Livonia and travel very little in my job will allow me to be available to the college at most times."

- Motivation—"Education has been my avocation, and this is my second campaign for the board, which I think is an indication that I am motivated and will add some more motivation to the board."

HAYWARD JUMPED into the 1975 campaign after reading an editorial calling for persons with industrial experience to lend their talents to Schoolcraft.

"I've always been interested in education. A citizen should contribute, and I have something to offer," he said.

A 12-year resident of Livonia, Hayward is past president of Toastmaster Club 1660 of Plymouth; an instructor in religious education at St. Aidan Catholic Parish, Livonia; and a past vice-president, board member, division director and coach of the Livonia Hockey Association.

# Farming under glass a blooming success

In spite of inflation, the energy crunch and all around hard times, some industries continue to flourish. Greenhouses are businesses enjoying, for the most part, record sales.

Ever since the house plant boom began to bloom a decade ago, greenhouses and florists have had little to complain about.

The demand for foliage plants has turned the horticulture industry into a healthy year-round operation. Previously, greenhouses relied on blooming plants and cut flowers to get by.

In the late 1960s, consumers started discovering the beauty of plants in the home. Builders began to construct skylights and mini-greenhouses for new homes. Plant doctors made house calls and specialists began talking to plants. The green revolution was underway.

By the early 1970s, it was only a matter of time before the horticulture industry would emerge as a major

business. Spurred by increasing house plant demand, greenhouses are still recording record profits year after year.

"People want plants that will grow and last longer," said John Schultz of Canton about the house plant craze. "The demand is a part of a back-to-nature sort of a thing. Everyone wants to get their thumbs green."

**IF YOU'RE THINKING** of getting into the greenhouse business, don't bother.

Nearly all of the existing businesses in Plymouth and Canton have been around since the end of World War II. While few have folded since then, none have entered the market, according to Schultz.

The first of many deterrents to opening a greenhouse is the initial investment. Schultz's property in Canton consists of nearly one-half acre of glass. Hitt & Son's operation in Plymouth contains 20,000 square feet

of glass.

Success in the plant-growing industry is not as easy as selling hotcakes. It takes years for a greenhouse to establish itself as a solid business because most rely on customers coming back again and again.

Worse yet, the growing process is not a simple seed, water and sell operation. Nearly 50 per cent of Schwartz's plants were once flown in from faraway places like Europe, South America and as close to home as California.

Although the switch to plants in pots has changed growing patterns, most greenhouses still rely heavily on outside growers.

The Plymouth-Canton area has a number of greenhouses that are known for their quality supply. Schwartz said. Many plants are shipped from western Wayne County greenhouses to other states. Florist shops from Indiana, Illinois and Upper Michigan make regular trips to

local greenhouses to purchase a wide variety of plants.

**HITT'S GREENHOUSE** operation is typical of many in the area. The Hitt family began growing orchids as a hobby in the mid-1950s before it turned into a full-time business.

Set back by a gas leak that wiped out their entire crop, the Hitts began growing blooming plants in 1962, and have since expanded annually both in profits and production.

A wholesale and retail business, the Hitt greenhouse sells more than 30,000 pots each year, most of which hold geraniums and foliage plants.

The center of greenhouses in the Plymouth-Canton area is at the Joy and Lilley roads intersection, where three businesses are located—Sparr's, Mettetal's and Schwartz's. Other local greenhouses include Heide's in Old Village, established in 1899, and Graye's Greenhouse on Lilley Road in Plymouth Township.

## Burgoyne restates opinion:

# Hall exempt from height limit

Despite two opinions from Bert Burgoyne, Canton's counsel, stating that the planned three-story administration building is exempt from a two-story local zoning restriction, Peter Bundarin and Robert Greenstein still believe otherwise.

Both men believe the \$2.7 million federal grant from the Economic Development Administration could be revoked if Canton officials do not get a zoning variance from the township zoning board of appeals (ZBA). Presently there are two ZBAs claim-

ing to be the legal board in Canton, which is the subject of an upcoming legal battle. But even if that problem was settled today it would not be possible to get the variance in time for the April 30 deadline for groundbreaking on the hall site. If the deadline is missed, the money is lost.

Bundarin and Greenstein, both lawyers, researched Canton's zoning ordinance and came to the conclusion that "essential services" such as utilities, police call boxes and traffic signals, would be exempt from zoning

restrictions, but not buildings.

Greenstein said he called Burgoyne last week to tell the attorney his legal opinion may be incorrect. Burgoyne said that after hearing the two men's criticism he researched the matter further but arrived at the same conclusion he made April 5.

"My opinion is that Canton doesn't have to allow the restrictions set up in the zoning ordinance," he said.

Burgoyne said Bundarin and Greenstein are correct in saying that buildings are not considered "essential services" in Canton's zoning ordinance.

"BUT THAT" portion of the ordinance does not say whether Canton Township buildings are exempt from the ordinance in the first place," Burgoyne said. "I say they are not subject to the zoning ordinance in the first place so you don't have to find an exemption."

In a written opinion addressed to the supervisor, Burgoyne cites numerous precedents in which municipalities carried out governmental functions without regard to local zoning restrictions.

"The greatest difficulty lies in determining what is within the category of 'governmental function,'" wrote Burgoyne. "The courts have sustained the following uses to be within the category of governmental function: courtrooms, a meeting place for the legislative body, administrative office space, city hall, schools, fire departments and police departments."

Burgoyne cited a 1926 California case (C.J. Kubach v. McGuire) which dealt with a dispute over the height of a city hall.

"In this case the proposed structure as designed would violate height restrictions as set forth in the city charter," Burgoyne explained. "The court upheld the petitioner's contention that

the city was not bound by the zoning ordinance vote unless the language of the limitation is clear and unmistakable to the effect that the city itself should be so bound."

**WHEN MUNICIPALITIES** build governmental, not money-making, structures zoning ordinances don't apply, said Burgoyne, unless the local zoning ordinance specifically includes governmental functions under its jurisdiction.

But Bundarin and Greenstein both feel that if construction is started on the administration building without getting a zoning variance, the federal government could revoke the grant.

"I don't want to do anything to jeopardize the grant," Bundarin said. "But if they (the township board members) knowingly spend money in violation of the terms of the federal grant, it is possible that the federal government would pull the grant and the township would be out any money expended to get the project started."

"Individual board members could be held liable for money already spent. I think they have a duty to correct the problem by getting a deadline waiver from the Economic Development Administration. Then they could convene the ZBA to get the variance."

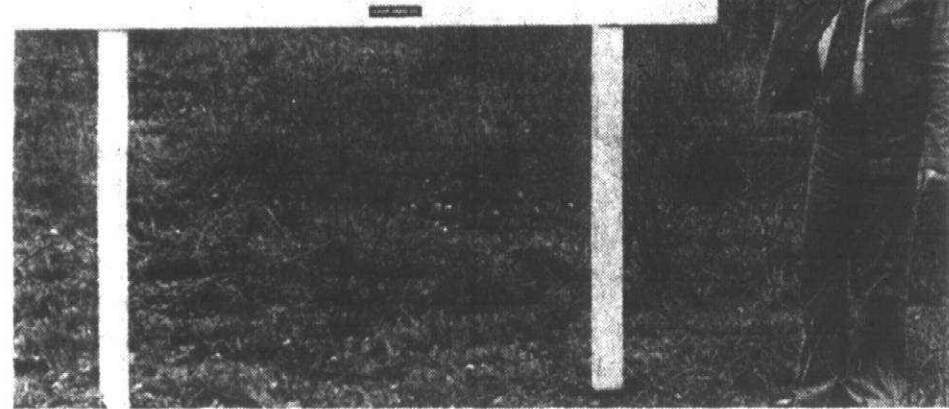
Greenstein claims Supervisor Harold Stein went lawyer shopping again to receive the opinion that the township was immune from its own zoning ordinance.

"He did it because he doesn't want our zoning board to reconvene," Greenstein said. "But if the feds catch him at it, we lose a \$2.7 million building that I and Carl Parsell worked so hard to get."

Greenstein also was irked that he didn't receive an official invitation to attend the April 30 administration building groundbreaking.

# 'Saturday Night Live' writer edits 'Titters' for funny ladies

Are women funny? Certainly, thought Ann Beatts, so it came as quite a shock when her boss disagreed. Ms. Beatts, 29, was working at National Lampoon, the popular monthly humor magazine, at the time.

"'Chicks aren't funny,' that's what he said," Ms. Beatts told an audience of about 100 students and others at UM-Dearborn. "If I had been a man, I would have punched him in the nose. But I'm a writer, so he did a book."

The result is "Titters," the world's first anthology of humor by women, which Ms. Beatts and friend Deanne Stillman co-edited. The 192-page book, which is neatly designed and crammed with spiffy artwork, is a collection of parodies, satires, comics, one-liners, gags, essays, poems, and several categories which defy classification. One hundred women worked on the project.

Among other things, "Titters" contains a parody of "Mademoiselle" and "Glamour" called "Slammer," in which female convicts serve as guest editors. Angela Davis is pictured on the cover. "Whole Birth Catalogue," a guide to birth for hip parents, gives advice on what modern moms and dads are naming their kids. "Moonunit" and "Khoutek" are two suggestions. Former Southfield resident Gilda Radner, now a star of NBC's "Saturday Night Live," offers her particularly bizarre diet tips:

- Chew every bit of food 100 times.
- Eat everything out of a dog bowl.
- Chew gum with your food.

MS magazine, which also is savaged in a "Titters" parody, called the \$7.95 book "screamingly funny, intelligent and hilarious." Ms. Beatts claims "it's funnier than earth shoes."

The author, a tall woman with a frizzy, brown bowl of hair who toled a huge, floppy purse, pointed out that even though there are jokes in the book "which only a woman could tell," "Titters" is not for women only. "It's humor by women, but it's not women's humor," Ms. Beatts told her sexually-mixed audience as she took off a silky beige blouse to reveal a pink "Titters" T-shirt.

And, she stressed, it proves women are funny indeed.

"There's an idea floating around the vast jelly-like substance called 'the public' that women have no sense of humor," said Ms. Beatts, who last year won an Emmy for her writing on "Saturday Night Live."

"But a sense of humor's weird. No one will admit to not having one. If

**MS. BEATTS SAID** that even if women are funny, their upbringing effectively squelches any mirthful impulses. "It's true, girls aren't supposed to be funny. I wasn't brought up to be funny—it just wasn't part of the package."

During her 90-minute talk, she cracked numerous jokes herself, pushed her book and delved into the concept of humor. "How many people have to think something's funny for it to be funny," she asked in a slightly nasal New York accent. "One? Two hundred? Who do (the laughers) have to be? What if they're convicts? It seems like if you say something and one person laughs, then it's funny."

Ms. Beatts also addressed the question of bad taste, which some people say fills National Lampoon and "Saturday Night Live," because both find plenty of chuckles in things like sudden death, teenage zits, ethnic groups, John F. Kennedy and Canada.

MS. magazine for instance, after heaping generous praise upon "Titters," also termed it "disgusting." Ms. Beatts herself said however, she defended bad taste.

"What is going too far? Why is it OK to make fun of farting but not cancer," she quizzed the generally appreciative crowd. "Humor is like holding up a fun house mirror to life—if it's there, it's there. How can you go too far? Didn't God go too far? He created all of this."

**ANOTHER SENSITIVE** topic, which Ms. Beatts took up eagerly, is the criticism some women have hurled at her for the rough treatment "Titters" dishes out to several feminist tenets. Lilly Tomlin actually quit the editing team because she thought the book's title was sexist. The MS. reviewer read the section entitled, "Women Poets Who Have Killed Themselves...Or Ought To," and then asked herself: "How can I like a book that, among other things, desecrates (poet) Sylvia Plath?" Ms. Beatts just laughed.

"No political movement is noted for its humor," she said. "Did you ever hear anyone ever ask Ceasar Chavez to tell a lettuce joke?" She did say, however, that her editors rejected everything that was "self-deprecating, jokes about rape, and stuff that wasn't funny."

That answer appeared to satisfy at least one female critic, a U-M student who grabbed a seat before the talk and huffed to a friend, "No, I'm not going to laugh. I already don't think it's funny." That quickly ended, however, the first time Ms. Beatts let loose with a string of wisecracks. "You're laughing," the critic's companion pointed out. "I know," she shot back. "This chick's a scream."

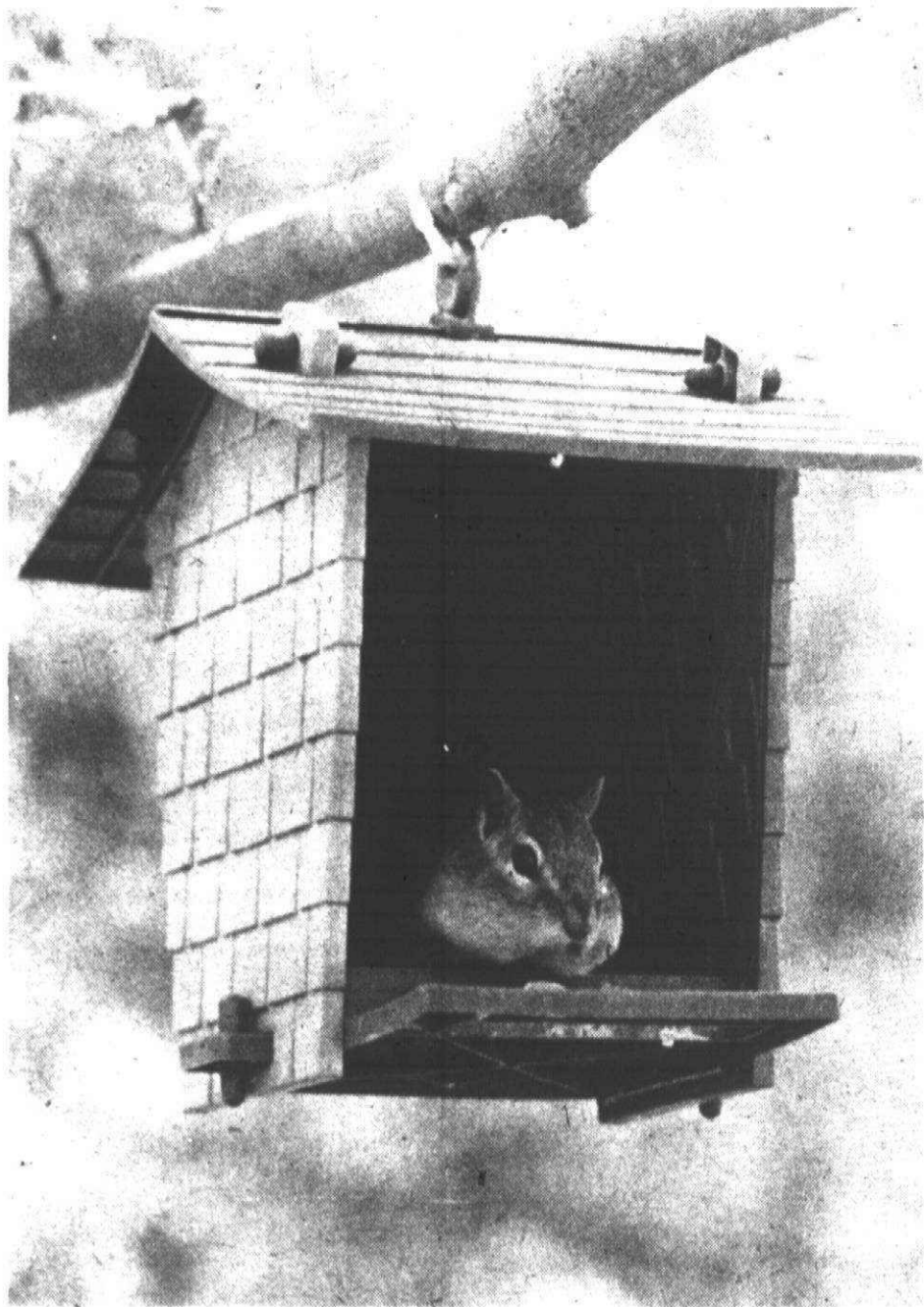

## PEA and board reach a contract

Kee said, from the board's standpoint, it was critical to obtain management right on ESY and to receive the half per cent reduction off the salary improvement of the first year.

During recent weeks the key roadblocks were the ESY language and the insurance shared cap. Thursday's settlement was accomplished in less than a week from the time President Carter announced his proposal to control medical costs by limiting insurance increases to nine or ten per cent a year. That proposal awaits congressional approval.

**THE ECONOMIC PACKAGE** agreed to calls for a 24 per cent improvement over three years, not counting increments (added money paid on the basis of seniority).

Counting cost-of-living payments, the total cost would be from 34 to 34½ per cent for the three years—just slightly more than 11 per cent a year for those teachers receiving increments.

The first year, teachers will receive a three per cent salary improvement and two per cent for contribution to the pension fund for a total five per cent economic package.

For 1977-78 teachers will receive 3.4 per cent contribution to pension and cost-of-living of four to six per cent—depending on the federal Consumer Price Index. In the last year of the contract, teachers will receive a three

per cent salary improvement and cost-of-living adjustments of four to seven per cent.

In the area of fringes, the contract includes life insurance of \$17,500 and a dental rider for 1977-78. In 1978-79 life insurance will rise to \$20,000, and a long-term disability policy will be added.

**AFTER THE SIGNING** late Thursday, both sides issued a joint statement that the agreement would now allow each to concentrate on working together to seek the best possible educational experience for students.

McKinley and Kee noted that the board and teachers still will be working cooperatively on educational programs, including expanded ESY programs. "The key Rozian kept stressing was 'participatory management,' that teachers and administrators would work closely together in developing new programs," said McKinley. "With this attitude, it becomes less important who has the final power on ESY. What is important is that we do work together."

McKinley also issued a statement thanking all PEA members, and the steering committee headed by John Ryder, for standing behind and supporting the bargaining team all year.

"This particular settlement doesn't put us ahead or put us behind other school districts in this area," McKinley concluded. "It allows us to keep pace, and that's fair."

less, because ground and lawns would not have to be dug up.

**ALTHOUGH GUTH** has affirmed the township's legal right to force developers to install and finance street lighting, he says the township's 1969 ordinance is somewhat unclear. He suggests rewording of the ordinance to clarify developers' obligations for installing street lights, if township board members decide to impose the requirement.

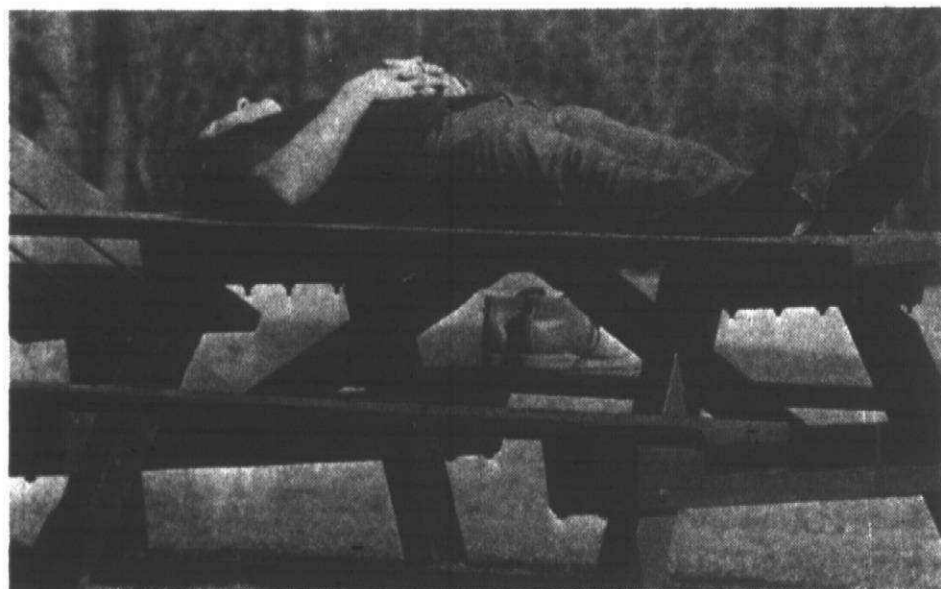
"I think they could have forced developers to do it under this ordinance," Guth said. "But we read the ordinance and felt they could have worded it more clearly."

Timbario, who now lives outside Michigan, was unavailable for comment on Guth's opinion.

But, even if township officials force developers to install street lights, Canton residents will still pay the costs, Flodin noted. Home prices would increase to cover installation fees, and assessments would still be levied to cover electricity and maintenance costs.

Flodin said township officials will have to discuss Timbario's suggestion that street lights be installed before homes are occupied.

"Let's say there's a depression, and no one's buying the homes," Flodin said. "Then we'd be paying for electricity to light a vacant field."

### We subdivision dwellers control the township

Editor:

With regard to Hank Rupert's letter in the April 7 edition of the Canton Observer, it's a classic case of "the hand is quicker than the eye," or "what you don't know can't hurt you."

I agree with Mr. Rupert when he says that he attends township board meetings regularly and that he can't see where Harold Stein has done anything wrong or anything that warrants a recall.

In most instances, when a subject arises that is the least bit sensitive to Mr. Stein, he simply ignores the mat-

ter and the person bringing it to his attention.

Point in case—the residents of Windsor Park are very upset regarding Mr. Slavik's plan to construct 135 apartments in their backyards. Mr. Stein responds by avoiding the issue once, then again and again, hoping that if he buries his head in the sand, the problems will disappear.

Mr. Stein promised the people at a township board meeting that there would be no changes in the police department until the study group brought back their report.

What he actually did was to reduce the number of patrol cars by almost

half, remove one police chief, hire another, fire the second chief, hire a police coordinator, declare himself police chief, refuse to purchase necessary equipment for officers (one officer was nearly killed because of a lack of flares at the scene of an accident), ban the officers from 1-275, and tell the officers not to enforce the law (that is for the Wayne County Sheriff).

**MR. STEIN'S** response when questioned? There was none.

Mr. Rupert is in error when he says that Mr. Donahue, Mrs. Linda LaBell and Mr. Peter Bundarin have charges against Mr. Stein for a recall. I have not charged Mr. Stein with anything, to date, other than general incompetence. I am not running any recall; Pete Gabbert is running this recall with Mr. Bundarin's able assistance.

**I AGREE** with Mr. Rupert when he indicates that it takes a majority of the board to make a decision, not just Mr. Stein. Therefore, if there's going to be a recall, it ought to be against a majority of the board. There has been a total lack of concern for the homeowners in this township by a majority of the board and its members ought to be removed from office.

The subdivision homeowners in this

township clearly outnumber all other groups combined. We are now in control of the government and its policies, and we have no intention of relinquishing any of our rights as the majority of this township. Hear that loud and clear.

I must clarify my statement regarding the Zoning Board of Appeals. It is very unimportant to the average person, until they have need for it. The ZBA is a body which the average citizen must rarely deal with.

This board, however, is charged with maintaining the integrity of the zoning ordinance; that when the variances are made in the ordinance they are given only when the variance is in the best interest of the community.

While it has always been true that to the victor goes the spoils, appointments to the ZBA cannot, by state law, be considered one of the spoils. Such positions as executive secretary to the supervisor, etc. are the only posts which can be so treated.

I suggest to you, Mr. Rupert, and to all other Canton residents who care about their future, to dig into the facts. I warn you—it will be a difficult chore to uncover the truth in a time when our local governors work so diligently and unendingly to keep that truth from us. Good luck.

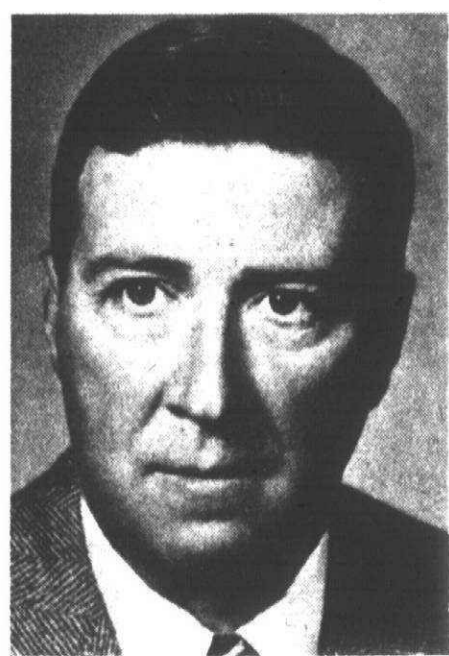

# Jeffries freeway to open this fall?

"We anticipate the Jeffries Expressway (I-96) will be completed in the fall," reports Frank Simmons to residents of the western suburbs who have been champing at the bit and gnashing their teeth over the delays in the seven-year project.

Administrative assistant of the metropolitan district of the Michigan Department of Highways and Transportation, Simmons nonetheless dashed the hopes that the link between Telegraph and the Southfield Road interchange would be opened soon.

"The whole section from Southfield to I-275 will be opened at the same time," he said.

But where is everybody, area residents are wondering? Where are the men in their hard hats and the heavy machinery now that the weather has improved?

Councilmen Robert Bennett of Livonia is one of those who has been pondering the lack of activity on the

Jeffries. A frequent complainer about delays in the projected freeway, he has already written a letter to John Woodford, director of state highway and transportation department, announcing his disappointment about the lack of activity.

SIMMONS OFFERED an explanation.

"The construction season has not opened. The water is not out of the ground. We have to wait until it dries out. By May we will be working with a full head of steam."

Activity has begun just west of the five-level Southfield interchange where ramps descending toward the wet have been completed. Although a gleaming white, they are all dressed up with no place to go. At their feet and to the west no concrete has been laid.

However, a sand subbase is being put down to prepare the ground for the concrete to come, and the contract for paving has been let.

The area to be paved, from South-

field to Evergreen, is one of the most difficult construction spots on the Jeffries. It had to tunnel beneath the huge marshalling yards of the Chesapeake & Ohio Railway.

In Livonia, a 3 1/2-mile section is yet to be paved. The freeway runs a total of six miles through Livonia. Bennett claimed that construction of this six miles "is taking longer than it took to build the American-built portion of the Panama Canal." Residents living near the Jeffries have had to contend over an extended period of time with such construction woes as noise, dust and traffic problems, he said.

Asked if he would put in an appearance at opening day ceremonies for the completed Jeffries, he said, "If I do it will be to say, 'At last.'"

Redford Township Supervisor Patrick McDonald said that residents of his community would be glad to see an end of freeway problems such as dust, traffic hazards, dangers to children and the possibility of cars falling down the freeway embankment.

"Because of the increased surface traffic on Schoolcraft, nearby residents also found it difficult to drive from their subdivision onto the street," he added.

SIMMONS RESPONDED to residents' anger at priorities for the long-awaited Jeffries. Why did they complete I-275 running north and south through a much less populated area before the Jeffries?

The answer is, it was easier.

"The Jeffries is a devil of a lot more complicated to build," said Simmons. "Being rural, I-275 required no underground sewer system, no service drives and no interchanges. The complexity in building the Jeffries was a factor in this."

He added that the Jeffries is bottling out a year later than anticipated because of the bankruptcy of the Yeager Steel Fabricating Co., with which the highway department had contracted for steel for many bridges across the freeway.

# Local energy reaction is gloomy

This may come as a real surprise to the members of congress who heard President Carter make his fervent plea to save energy—but Main Street in the City of Plymouth could be one of the real bottlenecks in the success of the program locally.

This was the consensus of many people following the president's complete explanation of the program he is offering the country to meet the energy crisis.

"He never mentioned the waste of gasoline at railroad crossings," Plymouth Police Chief Tim Ford commented. "Yet there is plenty of gasoline wasted there every day when motorists are forced to wait for the passing of the long freight trains."

The chief's comments were only a few of the many voiced by residents as they pondered the requests and the threat of higher taxes and the possibility of splitting the country into two classes—owners of big cars and those who drive compacts.

"I'm anxious to find out where the tax money is going to go," Ralph Lorenz, owner of the Mayflower Hotel, said. "If you listened to him (the President), he said the heavy taxes on big cars would be returned to the buyers of smaller cars. But he didn't say American-built smaller cars. I certainly wouldn't want the money to go the builders of the foreign imports."

"Another thing I noticed, commented Earl West, a former auto dealer, "he never said a word about using car pools to save gas. During the war we used car pools and a lot of gas can be saved when four to six persons ride in a single car instead of each driving his own."

"Why didn't the President suggest that we do what we did before—ration gas. Sure, there'll be some cheating, but the program worked when we had it."

One of the loudest in his criticism of the proposed program was Leo Calhoun, a Ford dealer on Plymouth Road. "I'm deeply concerned," he said, "because I don't think we, as automobile men, can do what he wants."

"There's no way we can boost the mileage and have emission control. We need a compromise. Otherwise, we'll never be able to afford a new car or afford to drive one if we bought it."

As an afterthought he added: "The trees in our back yards give off more carbon dioxide than automobiles."

George Kenyon, a clerk in the National Bank of Detroit office, commented: "I don't know how it can be done. And I certainly would like to know where the tax money is going to be refunded. If the program goes as stated, it will be young people buying small cars and the older folks, who need comfortable cars, again will be ignored."

"The energy problem is one we must face," Pat Tomlinson, a teller at the bank confessed. "But I am afraid the plan the president offered will hurt Detroit and communities like ours and we'll be right back in the depression again."

"Another thing," she continued, "if we are only going to have small cars and big ones, what happens in a collision? The people who can only afford the small car will not have a chance."

One of the clients at the bank remarked as he left. "It seemed to me that Carter is going to try to match FDR and his four terms in the White House. It will take him that long to get his program through Congress—if he gets it all." He went out the door smiling before his identity could be obtained.

Police Chief Ford dwelt at length on the problems that are sure to come to light in the President's program.

"If you noticed," he said, "the

President never mentioned airplanes and boats among the gas guzzlers. Neither did he mention recreation vehicles that are among the real gas guzzlers."

Catching his breath a bit, the chief called attention to the program for home insulation to save energy.

"Do you realize," he asked, "that a resident will have to spend about \$2,200 in one year to get his home fully insulated? And for that he will be given a tax credit of \$410. At the same time, industry will be given a 10 per cent refund for everything it spends. I think the citizens should, too."

"Personally, I think the President should check all of his agencies and really find out if all the emission standards now being put forth are necessary."

"He wants higher mileage out of gasoline and then asks for cleaner air. As a result, you lose everything you gain."

"And don't forget," he added, "the Japanese cars now being imported into this country are not required to meet many of the standards. They are not required to have the catalytic converter, so at the moment they are unfair competition."

The chief was really getting into the subject when he suddenly said, "The President mentioned mass transportation as part of the solution. But I have to ask, 'Where is it?' We don't have mass transportation."

The long delays at the railroad

crossings struck a responsive chord with Chief Ford.

"Do you realize," he said, "that if you are held up five minutes at a crossing, that is the equivalent of driving four or five miles. So what a waste of gasoline it is when you see long lines of automobiles being held up on Main Street, Ann Arbor Trail, Sheldon and even on Starkweather."

"The railroad people claim that they must have longer freight trains to stay in business. They also claim that a train with 100 cars can pass a crossing within the five minutes we placed on them. But often there are trains much longer."

It was called to the chief's attention that one afternoon long ago one of the trains passing through near the rush hour had four engines and 315 cars. It required 20 minutes to clear the crossing.

"That isn't surprising," the chief countered. He has made a study of the crossing delays and commented,

"There is only one answer—build overpasses or use underpasses. Because of the cost they are out of the question."

"At least the President didn't mention them in his message to Congress."

So it looks as though the City of Plymouth will be a trouble spot in the president's program—and there seems no way, at the moment, to eliminate the waste.

One auto engineer revealed that it takes more gas to start a car after stopping at a crossing than it would use if the driver kept the motor running.

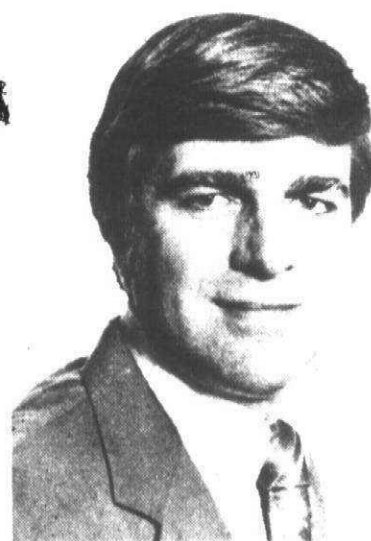

Classes will begin as early as 7 a.m. and may run as late as 7 p.m. Some students may be required to appear on some Saturdays. All classwork must be completed within four weeks.

PRESIDENT C. Nelson Grote and board Chairman Paul Y. Kadish will confer four honorary degrees on persons whose identity will be announced at commencement.

Academic marshals will be Dr. Marvin Gans, president of the Association of Administrative Personnel, and Richard Arlen, president of the Faculty Forum.

The College Orchestra, directed by Becki Fairman, and the Schoolcraft Chorale, directed by Bradley R. Bloom, will provide music.

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# Tape issues divides board

A proposal to restrict tape recording of Schoolcraft College board meetings seems certain to divide trustees when they adopt rules on audience participation at their April 27 meeting.

Under the new state Open Meetings Law, the public must be given a chance to address the board—a requirement that has been no bother at Schoolcraft in years.

But some trustees at an April 20

study session had qualms about a proposed rule which says:

"Any person in the audience wishing to record the proceedings of the board or any special hearings conducted by the board through a mechanical means such as a tape recorder must request permission to do so at the beginning of the proceedings. Any mechanical recording made by an individual without proper authorization shall be subject to confiscation."

PRESIDENT C. Nelson Grote said that rule was drafted on the advice of the college's labor relations attorney, Virginia Metz of the firm of Butzel, Long, Gust, Klein and Van Zile. The attorney's reason was that an employee relations case could later be the subject of a court suit.

Grote said a distinction had to be made between a general board meeting and a hearing involving an employee.

The problem arose after an April 6 meeting at which someone, apparently the friend of an employee appealing her firing, secretly recorded the session. It made some board members furious.

TRUSTEE Ron Cowden, however, saw no problem with recordings, especially under the new state Open Meetings Law, which provides that all deliberations of a public body must be public.

Some trustees also disliked the section of the rule saying an authorized recording "shall be subject to confiscation."

The wording apparently means the college can try to confiscate the tape, but the person making the recording may refuse to surrender it. The wording, however, does not indicate that the person may refuse.

OTHER PARTS of the audience participation rules are likely to be adopted without controversy.

The rules provide for "introductions and comments from the audience" following roll call and "comments from the audience" prior to adjournment.

Persons may be recognized during the meeting, but not when a motion is before the board.

No time limit is set for audience comments, although one may be set if many persons wish to speak.

# The Stroller

## Reason to smile

It's too bad she wasn't around the other day when the U.S. Supreme Court handed down a verdict that said it was perfectly legal for a school teacher to slap a student or to use a ruler to inflict a stinging feeling as a means of punishment for wrongdoing in class. But you can bet there was one happy person up in that Valhalla where all good teachers go.

As he read the verdict of the country's highest court, The Stroller leaned back in his chair and smiled as the mental picture of Sally McIntyre came clearer and clearer through the mist of years.

She was a member of the old school of teachers. During her career she became a legend in the Pennsylvania school system. The honor was well-earned, for she was the only teacher in that section of the country back home who defied the various school boards—and got away with it.

A maiden lady who was built on the order of a five-by-five, she ruled her room with an iron hand—or an 18-inch ruler. Strange as it may seem today, parents often appealed to the powers-that-be to make certain their children had a place in Sally McIntyre's room.

No one ever learned her age. But her appearance caused many a battle among the officials. Well endowed by nature, Sally McIntyre never wore anything except what was then called a dressing sack. There was no attempt to hide what the Good Lord had given her. And she gloated that no one ever would make her change.

Well, The Stroller recalls that during his stay in her room, the school board discussed her appearance in official session. The members agreed that she should be asked to dress more in keeping with the times. That is, they all agreed until it came to name the member who would give her the board's verdict.

That was the snag. No one wanted to face her and discuss her mode of dress. So the message never was delivered and Sally wore a dressing sack until the day she passed away.

MUCH LIKE the dressing sack, her 18-inch ruler came in for a great deal of discussion. She used the ruler to punish those who misbehaved in class. If you ever felt one of the slaps she gave you on the hands with that ruler, you wouldn't want to come back again.

There was a time, too, when the school board felt she should be asked to discard the ruler and substitute verbal punishment. But she would have none of it. In fact, she dared the school board to try to stop her. Not a single member approached her face to face.

The Stroller well remembers his first day in her room. As he approached, she grabbed his hand and said, "If you are half as good a student as your father was, we'll get along all right."

She had taught most of the parents in town and she knew the whims of every family. But it was her first order that The Stroller recalls.

As the class assembled, she took her place in the front of the room and announced that she would stand "no foolishness." She said we had come there to get an education and that, under no conditions, was she to be called "Miss Mc Intyre."

"Just address me as 'teacher,'" she said, and that request carried through the years. Even her old-time students who went on to higher things, never called her anything but "teacher."

She was a teacher among teachers. She conducted her classes as she wanted—with no rulings from the board. For instance, she counted a holiday every year at county fair time and took her entire class to the fair, paying their streetcar fare, and picking up the bill for their meals.

In the spring, she loved nothing more than to provide uniforms for her baseball team, and she always sat on the bench as manager.

Nothing pleased her more than to have her "boys" beat the high school team whose players had been her students only a year or two before.

When the circus came to town she saw to it that there was a matinee, and she always was host to her class under the big top.

ALL THESE things vexed the school board. But her actions endeared her to her students. Even getting whacked with the old ruler was taken in stride.

On one occasion The Stroller felt the sting of that old ruler and complained about it when he returned home.

His father, after listening to the complaint, quietly said, "If she slapped you with the ruler you must have had it coming."

All the parents felt like that, mainly because at one time they had been her students, and they relished the times she defied the school board over the question of her method of punishment.

You can bet she wore a broad smile, wherever she is, when word of the supreme court ruling reached her.

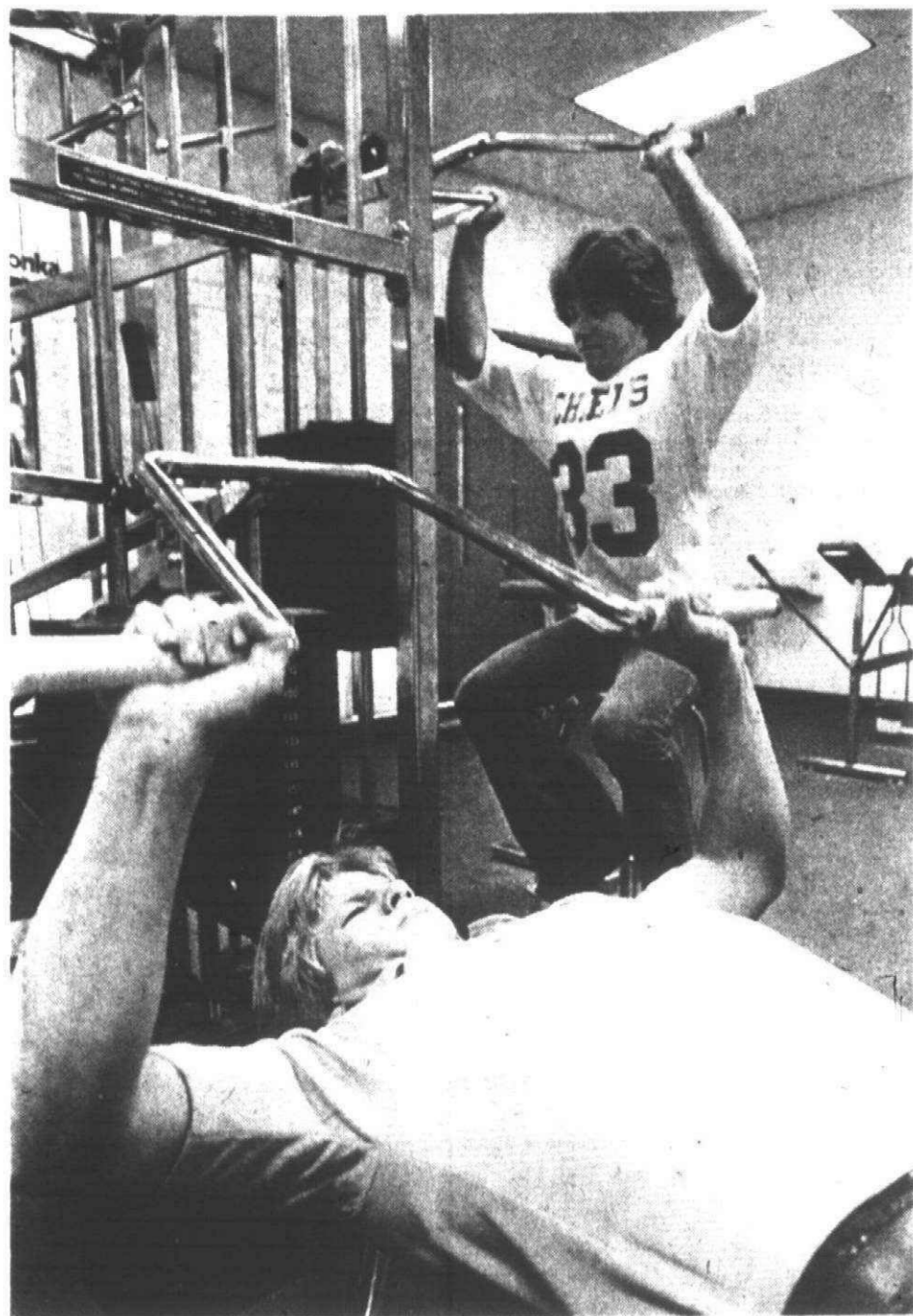

# Salem batters explode, 11-5

The Rocks scored their final run of the inning on three walks and an error.

Singles by Mike Stevens and Benny Wilcox scored two of the Rocks' first three runs. The other was scored on an error.

Tom Chiatialis started and went the distance to pick up his second victory of the season. He struck out four and walked four.

SALEM WAS SCHEDULED to battle Redford Union Friday afternoon but the continuous rains postponed that game to 4 p.m. Monday at Salem.

The fifth public meeting pertaining to the overall Detroit regional pollution control system will be held on April 28 in the Council Chambers of the City of Southfield, 26000 Evergreen Rd., at 8:00 p.m.

The Overview Plan Study is being conducted for the tri-county area of Wayne, Oakland and Macomb in conjunction with the Detroit Facilities Plan Study. This combined study, ultimately, will outline modifications and additions to the Detroit system. Several hundred million dollars of new construction are contemplated for sewers and wastewater treatment facilities in the Overview Plan area.

The two-hour session will cover the overall progress of the Detroit Facilities-Overview Plan Study and particularly its relationship to Oakland County Sanitary and Storm Sewage disposal.

## Jeff Mangan dies suddenly

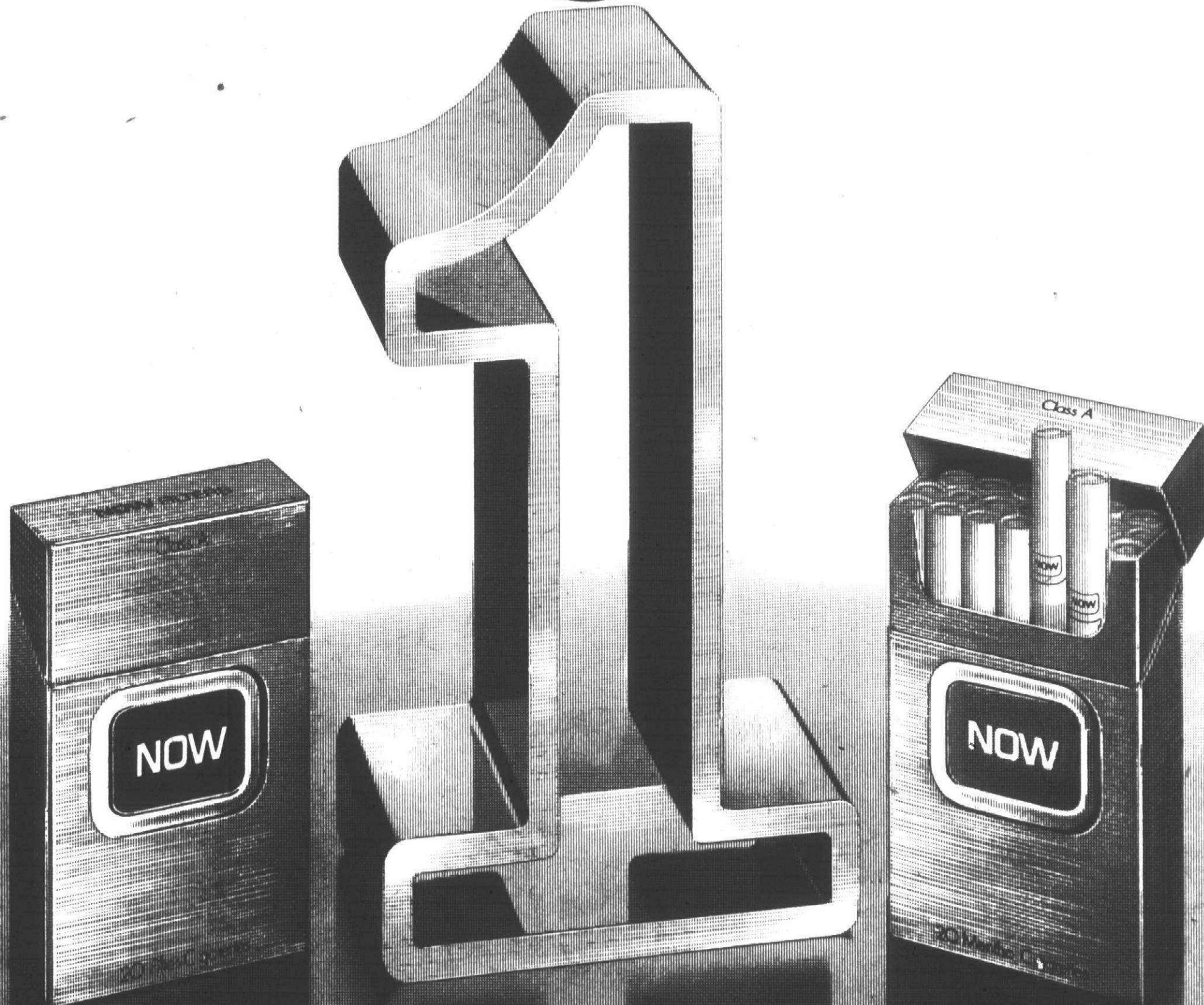
Jeff Mangan, 17, a member of the Plymouth Salem High School track team, died early Sunday morning from complications which arose after an attack of appendicitis.

But severe infection developed after the operation later in the week. Mangan underwent nearly six hours of surgery Saturday afternoon in Annapolis Hospital before dying hours later.

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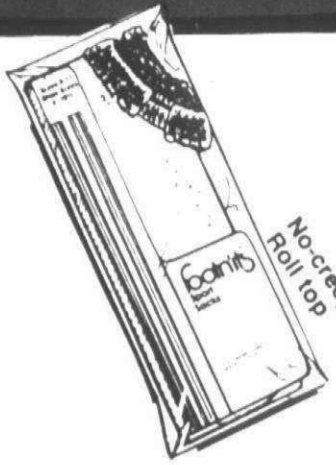
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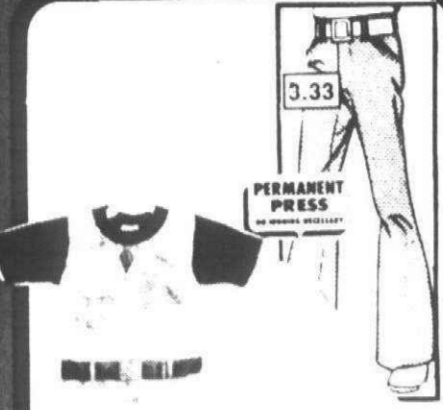


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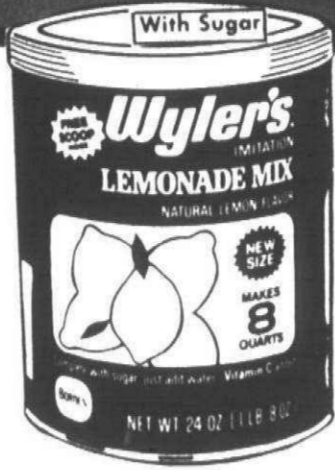


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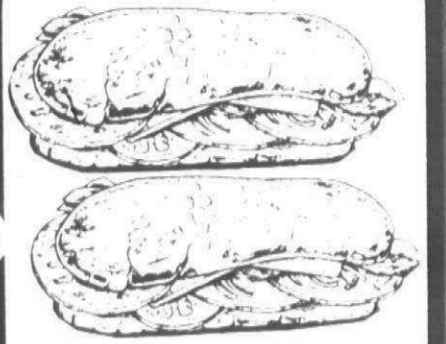


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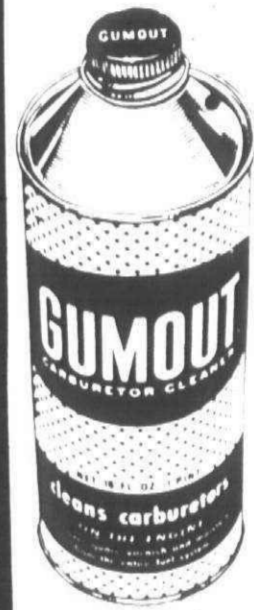
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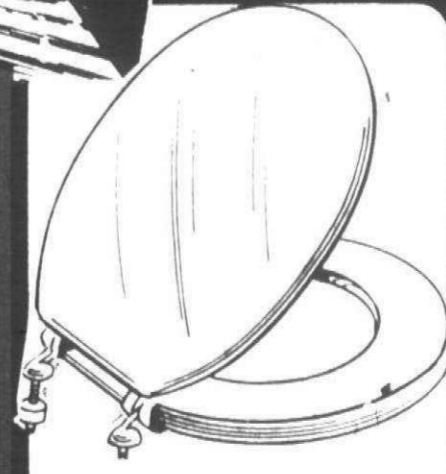


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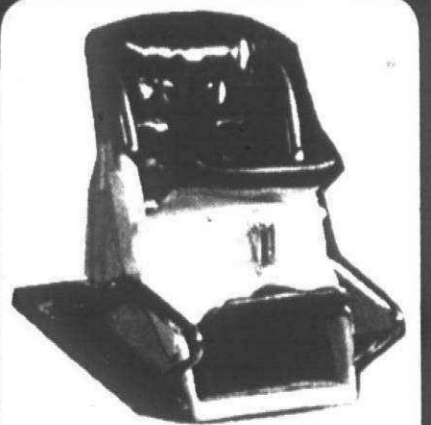


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# Plymouth Grange joins nation in celebrating Grange Week

Members of the Plymouth Grange are joining more than 500,000 fellow Grangers in celebrating Grange Week, April 24-30.

The national organization is 110 years old. It was formed in 1867 and the Plymouth branch was organized just four years later, in 1871. The local group took over an old horse barn on Union Street as its meeting place in 1913. It has been meeting there ever since.

A display in the Detroit Edison Company window, Main Street at Ann Arbor Trail, depicts the history and accomplishments of the farm fraternity.

**THE GRANGE** has played a powerful role in effecting legislation and changes in Michigan.

Its accomplishments include: championing the establishment of a state-wide library system; acting as a forerunner to parent-teacher associations; and requiring the Michigan Agricultural College (now Michigan State University) to admit women on an equal basis with men, and securing passage

of legislation which requires all schools to fly the American flag. National achievements of the Grange are enactment of anti-trust laws, Rural Free Delivery, cooperative extension service and early support for the interstate highway system.

Grange members have continued their interest national and local affairs. Currently they are seeking further legislation to fully utilize the efficient productivity of family farmers and at the same time assure consumers reasonable prices. They are active in other legislative and regulatory areas such as land use planning, tax reform, food stamp program, communications, conservation and transportation.

The Grange is the country's only fraternal farm group and was the first organization of any kind to show no discrimination in granting membership to women.

**GOVERNOR WILLIAM** Milliken proclaimed Grange Week and cited the organization's contributions to rural America.

The governor said, "The Michigan Grange has been a leader on behalf of agriculture and the general welfare of the citizens of the state. A fraternal farm and rural organization, the Grange has aimed at achieving practical goals within the framework of the finest traditions of America.

the development of its goals of building character, inspiring leadership, encouraging education and promoting appreciation of high ideals and community responsibility."

The Plymouth Grange has evolved to the point where there are no farm families among the membership. There is the senior Grange, the young married and the junior Grange.

The senior group has rummage sales, bazaars, and their Plymouth Fall Festival projects to finance donations to local charities and to finance annual scholarship programs.

Grange members have investigated the benefits of a group purchasing plan. Originally designed for buying farm machinery, the plan now includes all types of appliances, furniture and vehicles. Members of the Grange are eligible to join the cooperative and hope to realize savings through the plan.

As members of the only farm family fraternity in the world, the Grangers continue to foster the tradition of the American family unit, providing opportunities for communication not often found in today's society.

Gae Renaud, the accountant, admits it's sometimes hard to believe Gae'tane, the poet, has a newly published book of poems in bookstores across the nation.

"I remember that for a long time, 'The House by the Side of the Road' was my favorite." Looking back, she believes her own lonely and rather

mixed up childhood was responsible for her choice.

**GAE'TANE WAS** born in northern Ontario. "From what I heard, it was one of those far north dramas. My father went off to summon the doctor, miles away, while an Indian midwife took over and delivered the baby."

Her mother died when Gae'tane was three years old. The young French-Canadian family had moved to the Detroit area. After his wife died, the father tried to keep up a home for himself and Gae'tane. But his work made it impossible to settle in one place. Gae's childhood was a series of schools, convents and orphanages.

"My Pisces perception and my Canadian money sense have served me well," smiled Gae'tane.

"**POETRY IS** for everybody. It should be simple, but eloquent." Mrs. Renaud believes "This is a time of searching. There are so many false gods. The thing they overlook is themselves—and they are beautiful."

She says that if her poetry makes just one person realize this, "I will have justified my existence."

Her first poem is not in the collection "Cache of Pearls."

"I am saving it for something else," she said.

After talking to her publisher in New York last September, she set about choosing 24 poems from the more than 50 she had written.

"Deciding on titles for them was harder than writing them," said Gae'tane. She also described the difficulty in choosing a title for the collection. "Somehow it had to be 'pearls.' But nothing seemed just right to go with it. Finally, I thought of 'cache.' That was it. There was no more doubt."

In response to the question "Which do you like best?" she responded without hesitation.

"I like 'Tears,' and 'Reflection of New Year.'" She said her poem "The Vision," was the result of a true happening. "I was driving down Ann Arbor Road one sunny afternoon, and I actually saw it."

**MRZ. RENAUD** works at the Kroger plant in Livonia. She has been

pleased with the reaction of her co-workers to her new book.

"They are wonderful people to work with. Just to have them say 'It's a lovely thing.'"

She already is working on a second collection of poems and also has a pilot script completed for a television series. "In addition to the pilot, I have story ideas for 18 episodes," she said.

Mrs. Renaud lives on Luann in Canton Township. She has three children. Her daughter Jacqueline attends Plymouth Canton High School.

Besides writing, Gae'tane enjoys bowling, reading, crocheting, horseback riding and cross-country skiing.

"Cache of Pearls" (Exposition Press, Inc., 51 pages; \$4.50) is available at Hudson's, Dalton Book Stores, Walton Book Stores, Little Professor, Plymouth Book World, and book stores in Detroit and Ann Arbor.

She has not yet had an autographing session in a book store. "But, I think I would enjoy it," said Gae'tane.

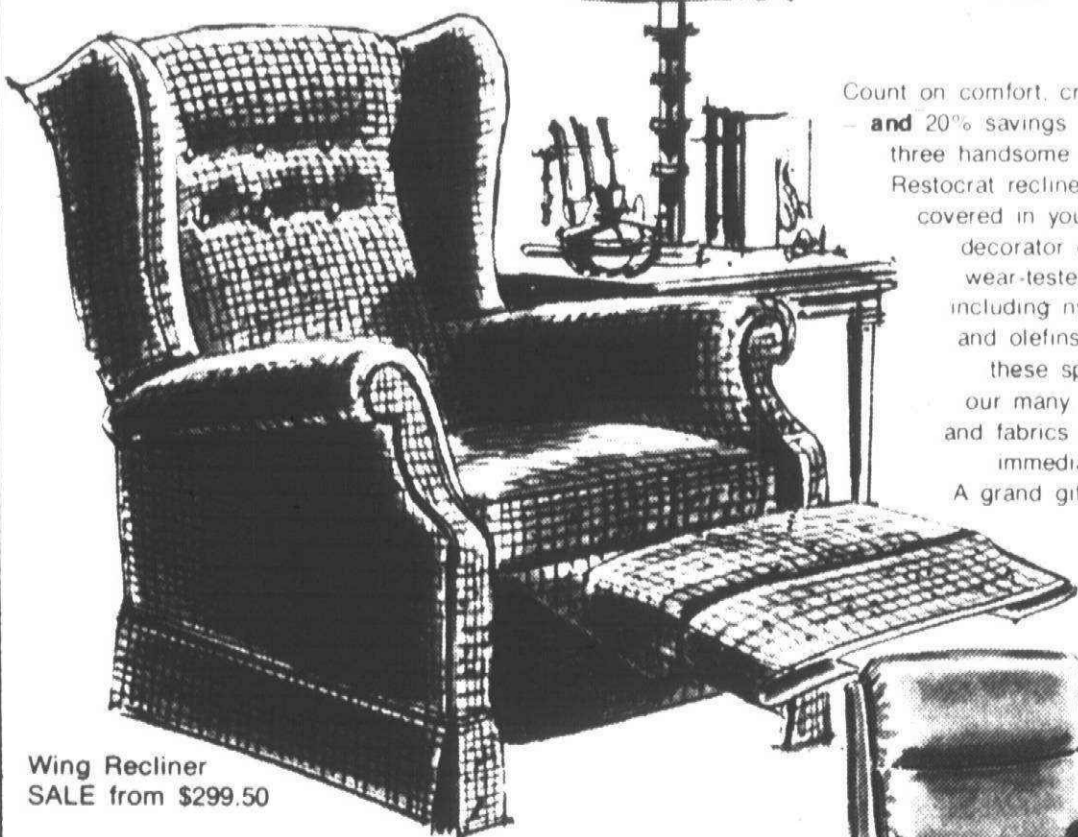
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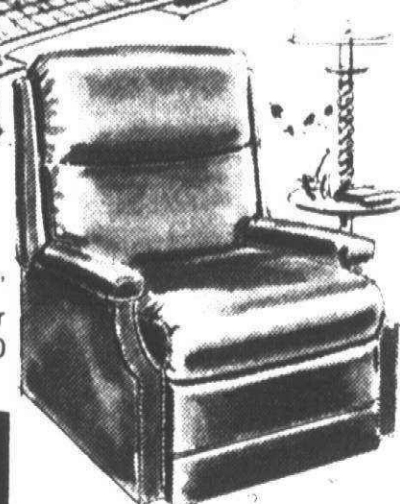
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# Canton's rural days recalled by seniors

## 'Pumping Iron' lacks muscle

Does art imitate life or life imitate art? For more than 400 years people have admired the muscular youths Michaelangelo painted on the Sistine Ceiling. At Gold's Gym in Venice, Calif., we find men trying to fashion their bodies toward that same idealized form.

"Pumping Iron" (PG) is about this curious subculture of body builders who strive to mold their flesh into mounds of bulging muscle groups.

Arnold Schwarzenegger, ex-Mr. Universe and Mr. Olympia, even compares his body building to the sculptor's art. He is concerned with proportion, pose, definition. But what the sculptor and painter add, quickly with clay and color, the body builder acquires from the inside out, through months and years of strenuous weightlifting and exercise.

With all this devoted effort, why don't the living models look as beautiful as the painted ones? The painted nudes are distinguished by their grace, their poise, and most of all by an aura of effortless ease that surrounds them.

**WHAT WE ARE** aware of among the builders is the effort—that the straining, grunting, sweating effort. In the long shots, their forms are breathtaking sights. In the close-ups, they are grotesque convolutions of bulging muscles and taut, twisting veins.

In a semi-documentary fashion, the movie tells the story of the preparation, psychological tension and suspense as these men train and compete for the world amateur and professional body building contests. Mr. Universe and Mr. Olympia.

The principal contenders are revealed in autobiographical sketches. Each talks about his childhood, his interest in body building, his ambitions, and even his plans for psyching out opponents.

There is not enough individual distinction among the group to keep the movie from being exhaustingly repetitious. To watch each competitor train is to watch the same thing over and over. Once the initial straining of viewer curiosity has been satisfied, the storyline is inadequate to sustain interest.

But a greater failing is the absence of candor, which the movie promises by its style but does not deliver. Is everyone as straight as pictured here? No one even utters one little swear word. Neither drugs, sex nor money are ever an issue, even a problem.

SCHWARZENEGGER compares the sensation he gets when the blood flows to his veins, and he's pumping iron, to an orgasm. Other than that, sex, either heterosexual or homosexual, doesn't appear to be of interest to anyone.

Louis Ferrigno swallows a variety of pills, but no comments are made about that or the controversial use of drugs in body building. Very little is said or shown about the quality of men's lives. No one seems to have a job except for Mike Katz, the schoolteacher.

The closest one gets to any insight is from Schwarzenegger—sharper, more articulate, more humorous than the others. He discusses his sexual highs in training, his paternal role as a champion and how he uses it to misadvise anyone who becomes too threatening, and his single-mindedness and determination that make him a winner.

He relates, without embarrassment, that he did not attend his father's funeral, because he did not want to "mess up" his mind with any outside emotions or distractions two months before the Mr. Universe and Mr. Olympia competition.

"Pumping Iron" purports to reveal the subculture. It spotlight's some rippling muscles, but not the waves underneath. One gets the feeling that there's been a lot left out.

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# Rite of spring

## It's car-cleaning time

### It's car-cleaning time

The car that weathered the big winter storms of '77 deserves a spring clean-up and some cosmetic pampering to help preserve its beautiful body and interior.

To guide owners with an automotive beauty treatment in mind, John Farley of Chrysler Corp., offers 13 tips, starting with the interior:

1. Most car upholstery fabrics are treated with soil-resistant finishes that make dirt sit on the surface. Prevent loose dirt from working into the fabric by frequent vacuuming. Or keep a whisk broom in the glove compartment and brush frequently unless fabric has raised tapestry threads that brushing could damage.

2. To clean the new velours and other fabric upholstery or auto carpeting, vacuum loose dirt and treat stains. Then use foam cleaner or a mild detergent or soap. Apply suds first to an inconspicuous area to be certain it won't damage color or finish. Rub sparingly with a sponge into small area at a time. Wipe off excess suds and moisture, first with a damp cloth, then a clean, dry cloth.

3. Clean vinyl or leather upholstery with suds from a bar of mild, nonalkaline soap or special leather or vinyl cleaner. (Some vinyl upholstery cleaners also clean vinyl tops.)

4. To remove water-based stains (ketchup, milk, ice cream, coffee, some candies), use a dull-edged knife to remove as much substance as possible. Wipe with a cloth dampened with warm water. If stain persists, rub lightly with cloth wet with cleaning fluid.

5. Scrape oil-based stains (butter, mayonnaise, grease, lipstick) with a dull knife. Use solvent-type spot cleaner. Start outside and work to center to avoid leaving ring. Blot up excess and loosened oils with clean white paper towel.

6. Chewing gum or tar should be hardened by chilling with a cube of ice. Then proceed as for oil-based stains.

7. White stains left on carpeting by salty snow and slush can be removed by vacuuming, then careful work with a stiff bristle wire brush. For stubborn stains, apply a solution made with one cup of table salt to a quart of water. Wash off with foam-type upholstery cleaner.

8. Vinegar cuts the film on inside and outside glass. Use two tablespoons to a pint of water.

9. Mud and corroding road salts can be removed from unseen spots at a do-it-yourself car wash. Aim the water, pressurized soap spray from the hose underneath the car, particularly at fender wells, rocker panels and inside surfaces of bumpers.

10. The liquid soap that relieves dishpan hands (not strong dishwashing machine soaps) helps the do-it-yourself car washer by preventing water spots.

11. Don't wash the car in the sun or when paint is hot. After soaping and rinsing, don't wipe with a dry cloth. It can scratch the paint surface. Use a damp towel or squeezed-out chamois.

12. To restore showroom shine to an older car, use a cleaning paste or liquid specifically recommended for deeply imbedded grime. Then apply polish. A one-step cleaner and polish will do for a newer car with only a mild coat of road film.

13. A daub of wax over a small break in paint stalls spread of rust. Better yet, treat with a touch-up paint coded to your car's color. Put a minimal amount of paint on the touch-up brush and stroke lightly.
