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Neighbors cool to sharing 'copter cost

Stung by local criticism to his plan to purchase three military surplus helicopters for police surveillance, Canton Supervisor Harold Stein has decided the program won't get off the ground unless he sells the idea to officials and police chiefs of four neighboring communities.

The helicopters are to be offered to local communities through the federal Office of Emergency Preparedness at a price of \$500 each. While the copters may be a bargain, Canton pilot Robert Schaeztl, for one, feels that the maintenance and training costs make helicopters prohibitive to five, out-county communities.

First impressions of the proposal among officials in the City of Belleville and the townships of Van Buren, Huron and Sumpter are mixed. Responses vary from the unenthusiastic opinion of Mrs. Pat Cullin, supervisor of Van Buren Township, to the optimistic views of Belleville Police Chief Mick McLaughlin and Huron Township Police Chief Joseph Carney.

All five communities belong to a

new, federally funded Central Dispatch System which will feature a centrally located radio headquarters and antenna in Belleville. A \$100,000 grant from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration was pledged to the communities Oct. 7, but those funds won't cover helicopter expenses.

SO STEIN has invited local officials to the Bishop Airport in Flint to view a helicopter program that is being run with surplus copters in Flint and neighboring Genesee County.

Mrs. Cullin isn't going up to Flint, but Van Buren Police Chief John Willet is.

"Stein mentioned to us, at a meeting of the Central Dispatch communities, that he planned to purchase three helicopters, and would we be willing to share in the cost of their operation?" Mrs. Cullin said.

"The matter will be brought before our board. But, I can tell you right now our board is not going into the helicopter business. For one thing, we're right in the flight pattern of Willow Run and Metro airports. Before

we could have helicopter patrol, we'd have to have it cleared or we'd have to wait between flights. But, further, we don't have the money. We have one mill to operate our budget. We don't even have money for a full-time police department, so they're (Canton) in a different situation than we are.

"Again, this is not board official, but I know our township board is not going into the helicopter business. We just don't have the money."

Van Buren Police Chief Willet is a bit more receptive. He said he'll check the helicopter system out in Flint, but "Stein will have to sell the idea to other communities."

"I'm interested in helicopters," Willet said. "They can be very helpful in police work. But it is an expensive item and I wonder if it would get a lot of use. The money we're getting for the metro communication system has nothing to do with funding something like this; so he'll have to do some salesmanship job on my board."

IN BELLEVILLE, Police Chief McLaughlin said he's "not against the idea."

McLaughlin noted that figures on cost per flight hour—released by Stein in a reprint of an article which originally appeared in Aviation Week and Space Technology—were impressive.

That article, which was reprinted in a Bell Helicopter house publication, claimed that a piston-powered helicopter cost the City of Los Angeles \$36.09 per flight hour.

"That's cheap when you consider the area a helicopter can cover in one man hour," McLaughlin said.

That 1971 figure of \$36.09 "includes depreciation, insurance, maintenance and all other costs associated with the aircraft except crews," read the article. But maintenance costs, listed in the same article, came to another \$30.49 per hour.

IN HURON TOWNSHIP, Clerk Sandra Rhodes said officials are waiting to see full cost information before deciding "one way or the other." Huron Township spent about \$200,000 this year on its 14-member full-time police department.

But Police Chief Carney is one of the

biggest backers of Stein's helicopter proposal. He thinks it would be a great help in tracking criminals in rural areas if five or more municipalities shared the cost.

"I don't think we'll jump into any-

thing like this right away, but it's worth some looking into," Carney said. "I don't think it's too far out as some people seem to think."

Carney told of an incident in Huron

Schools maximize interest

There's no such thing as "idle money" in Plymouth-Canton Community Schools.

Tax receipts are received one day and, within an hour, are deposited in an interest-bearing account. State aid funds are received another day and within minutes are invested. Money is borrowed and invested almost instantly.

And the bottom line of all this maneuvering is thousands of dollars in income earned from interest that otherwise wouldn't be available to meet operating expenses.

This constant investment of funds in the financial market has become sound money management for school and municipal fiscal administrators. The whole aim is never to allow a buck to be idle, but to maximize interest income with sound, secure investments for every incoming dollar.

MOST OF THE investment decisions for Plymouth-Canton Schools are made by Ray Hoedell, assistant superintendent for business, and Dan White, director of finance.

"We invest all our idle cash," says Hoedell. "If it doesn't have to be used immediately to pay bills, meet the payroll or cover other expenses, then we place that money in a secure investment."

"For real short investments, we might just place the funds in a bank savings account earning daily interest. For investments of 30 days or more, we'll consider CDs (time certificate

deposits) or commercial paper, which, most of the time, earns more interest."

Commercial paper is notes sold by private corporations, such as General Motors Acceptance Corp., on the open market. The corporation will sell the note because it needs instant cash to meet current expenses. Most of the time, to attract buyers, commercial paper is offered at a higher interest rate.

State law allows school districts and municipalities to buy commercial paper, although it does regulate the length of time notes may be held and the quality (only high prime rating) of the paper purchased.

"For a long time, school districts and municipalities stayed away from commercial paper and relied on saving accounts and CDs for investments. We've discovered that if the market is right, a lot of money can be earned by buying good commercial paper," says Hoedell.

THE IMPORTANCE of sound money management can be seen in the amount of income the district earns in interest.

In 1976-77, for instance, the school district earned \$246,336 in interest from an operating budget with expenditures totalling \$20.9 million.

This year, with an operating budget of \$25 million, the district expects to earn \$300,000 in interest. Because one mill represents almost \$17,000 in revenue, the school district would have to raise taxes by more than 1/2-mill if it

didn't earn the \$300,000 interest.

"We must start with a pretty good cash flow chart so we know how much money we must pay out at any given time," explains Hoedell. "That way, we know how much we should invest and for how long."

"It's also necessary to keep a close eye on the financial market. We are in touch with three to four investment consultants constantly, to find out what types of investment bear the greatest interest."

White adds: "The market is cyclical, and you can't take anything for granted. About 80 per cent of the time, commercial paper will yield the highest return."

"But there was a time last year when daily interest bank accounts were the best investments. Right now, commercial paper is best. Early this week, we purchased \$1 million worth of commercial paper for 30 days which will earn us interest of 6.75 per cent."

MUCH OF THE district's success in investments is due, in part, to the cooperation of Plymouth, Canton and Plymouth townships, according to Hoedell.

"The local governments are super about notifying us when tax collections are coming in. We'll get a telephone call in the morning from a city or township treasurer that a check for so much money is being written for taxes. We'll make arrangements to deposit the funds, or buy commercial paper, and as soon as the money is in our hand, it's invested," says Hoedell.

"It's important to operate that way. If \$5 million is coming in in tax collections, you can lose a lot of interest by waiting a day before depositing. The local governments have been great in informing us when the tax monies are being turned over, and we've been able to invest quickly."

THE SCHOOLS ALSO make quick investment decisions when they borrow money to meet current expenses.

"Because our taxes come in only in December, we must borrow each year to meet obligations from July through December," says Hoedell. "But, of course, we don't spend all the money

Stein dips into his pocket to start local library fund

You can't start a library on \$10. Despite a three-month appeal by Township Supervisor Harold Stein for private donations to establish a public library, \$10 is all that has been collected.

Until last week—when Stein decided to trek to the Wayne Bank to see how much largesse had been deposited—there wasn't even a library account. Not one penny had been contributed.

"I just thought, 'Hell, I'll open an account myself,'" Stein said. "I just thought I had to get something going. I've been talking about starting a library ever since I started this job."

BUT TALK, won't pay the start-up

costs of a new library.

The accounting firm of Seidman & Seidman concluded last July that the township could operate its own library for only slightly more than its share of running the Dunning-Hough Library in Plymouth.

But to get the library going, the township will have to spend at least \$163,000 to buy a minimum supply of books and shelves.

Another \$60,000 would be needed to pay the first-year salaries of a director, librarian, aides and co-op students. That compares with the \$55,000 the township will pay the Dunning-Hough Library next year if a Canton library is not established.

Stein says the additional \$5,000 cannot be afforded without a millage increase.

As an alternative, he proposed formation of a "friends of the library" program last July. The only response came from Dr. James Gilling, who agreed to join a library committee as the Rotary Club's representative.

STEIN BELIEVES the lack of support for his fund raising idea does not mean residents are uninterested in the library proposal.

"I just think the people of Canton Township are fed up with the political goings-on," he said. "They don't want to get involved in things because they think politics are involved. But politics have nothing to do with this."

Police chief is certified

The Michigan Law Enforcement Officers' Training Council unanimously decided Thursday that Canton Police Chief Walter MacGregor did not lose his police training certification.

MacGregor's training status was questioned by Canton Township Trustee Robert Myers, who noted that an officer with five years experience loses his police training accreditation if he is out of police work for two years. MacGregor took a premature retirement from the City of Wayne police department July 11, 1975 after 30 years service. He was hired as Canton's second police chief on Aug. 8, 1977, a little more than two years after he left Wayne.

But MacGregor, who tested for the police job June 4, put his name on the list of Wayne's auxiliary police unit on July 1, some 10 days before his two-year certification deadline arrived.

The Michigan LEOTC board ruled that MacGregor's certification had not expired because he had 30 years service, was testing for a police job, and made an effort to keep his police service current by signing up with the auxiliary department. MacGregor never served or was paid as a Wayne auxiliary policeman.

An uncertified police officer cannot make an arrest unless accompanied by a certified officer in most instances. MacGregor had vowed to resign if the council ruled that his certification expired.

Canton Supervisor Harold Stein accompanied MacGregor to the Lansing hearing. After the decision was rendered, Stein noted that it was MacGregor who petitioned the LEOTC for the ruling on his certification status.

Guethlein is bound over for trial on six felonies

William Guethlein, 18, accused of four counts of assault with intent to commit murder after an armed confrontation with sheriff's officers Sept. 30, was bound over for trial on six felony counts at a bond of \$65,000 Thursday.

Guethlein's pre-trial examination is set for Oct. 27 in the prosecutor's office. In addition to the four assault charges, Guethlein also faces one breaking and entering charge and a possession of a firearm in commission of a felony—"the one with a gun, gets you two charges," according to Det. Thomas Sheedy of Wayne County Sheriff's Department.

On Sept. 30, police from four departments were called to an area west of Haggerty Road, south of Ford Road, after an assistant principal at Eriksen Elementary noticed two men walking with guns in the woods between the school and Bedford Villa condominium complex.

Police accuse Guethlein and a 15-year-old alleged accomplice of stealing 10 guns from Guethlein's father's home. All of the guns except a derringer were recovered by police. Guethlein had not been living with his parents, but with Gary and Sheila Slocum, while he awaited trial on car theft and breaking and entering charges which

were brought against him and the same 15-year-old earlier that month.

The 15-year-old boy, who lived with his father in Bedford Villa condominiums, is presently lodged in the Wayne County Juvenile Home pending a hearing on one breaking and entering charge in the Sept. 30 gun theft.

Police claim only Guethlein fired a weapon at officers—first striking a helicopter twice and later firing a volley of shots at Officer Bill Messenger who entered the woods on foot.

S'craft College office workers protest inadequacy of pact offer

The members of the Schoolcraft College Association of Office Personnel (SCOAP), after months of negotiations, has decided to "place a few facts before the public."

The association, which has been without a contract since June 30, said the board of trustees' offer of a 14 per cent pay increase, which would be spread over two years, is unsatisfac-

tory. "All the board is really offering us is two per cent plus our annual step increment," said the association in a letter circulated to the local news media.

Gerald W. Munro, director of personnel and the board of trustees' chief negotiator, said, however, that the step increases were not guaranteed, as the secretaries' bargaining group seems to have assumed.

"It isn't automatic. It is automatic from year one (of the last contract) to year two. After the contract, though, its provisions are null and void," Munro said.

He said the board of trustees has determined that a seven per cent package, including salary increases and retirement payments, for this year and the next is a "fair and reasonable offer."

The SCOAP personnel have also charged that the board of trustees had recently settled the college's classified employees for a "seven per cent increase across the board."

Munro, however, said the recently-agreed upon contract was basically the same as the package the board had proposed for the secretarial bargaining unit.

The bargaining unit also has continued to oppose the board's demand that its employees contribute to health insurance premiums. Previously, they had been paid entirely by the college.

"In addition," reads the SCOAP letter. "We are expected to assume 10 per cent of any future increase in insurance premiums. No other group on campus, administration, faculty, classified employees or physical plant employees have to pay insurance premiums."

Munro, however, contends that the principle of employee contributions to the college insurance plan has been established.

He said beginning next July 1, the board will impose that system on its administrators and that it has been plugged into the classified employees' contract.

The cost of health insurance has skyrocketed over the past three years, Munro said. Since 1975, the college's premiums have increased by 33 per cent and 28 per cent annually, he said.

He said the college currently pays \$2,400 per person for health insurance. "If it were to go up \$600 next year, we'd be asking them to pick up \$60 out of a \$3,000 premium," Munro explained.

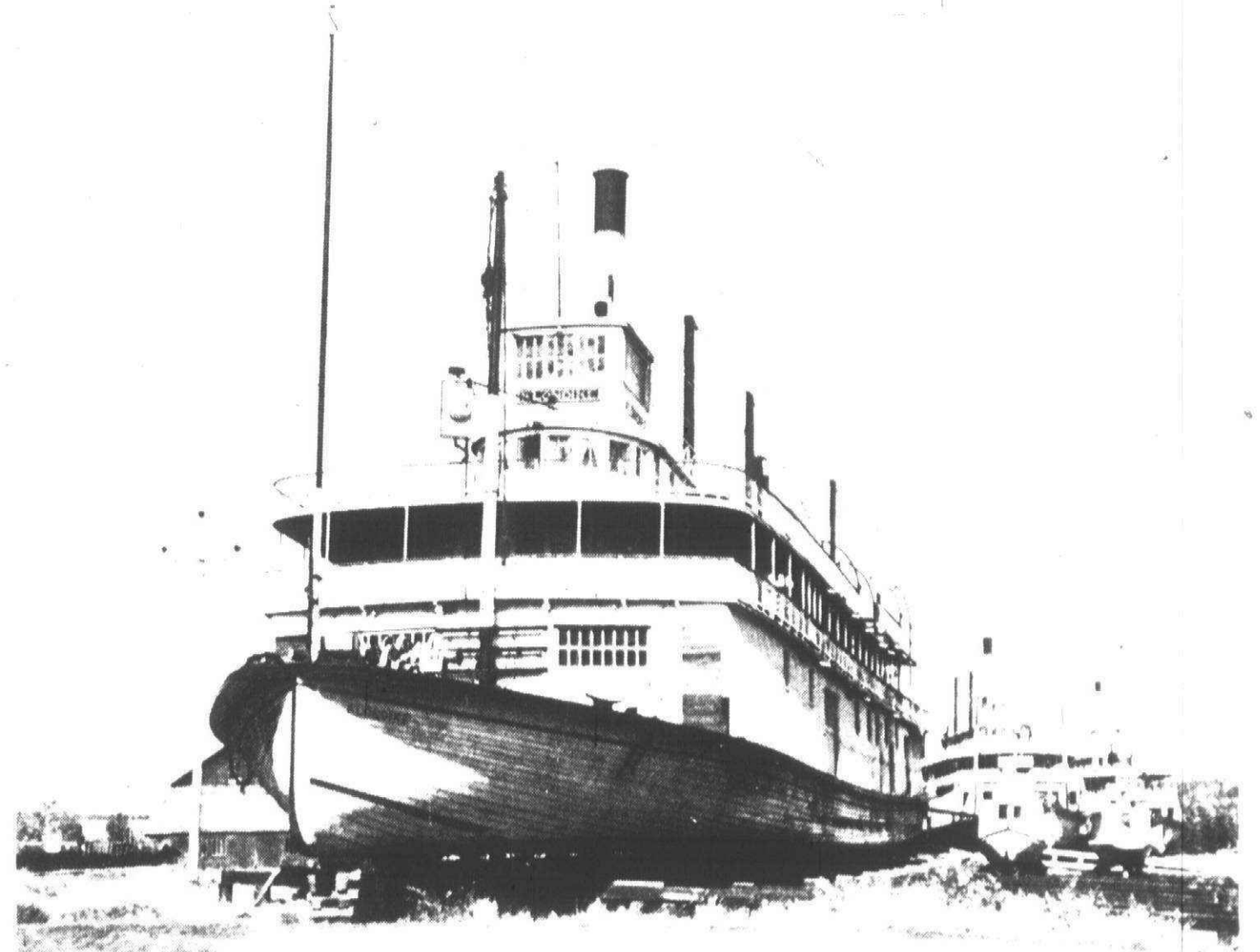
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'Alaska Adventureland' to kick off travel series

great north highways leading to the innermost parts of Canada, the Yukon and Alaska.

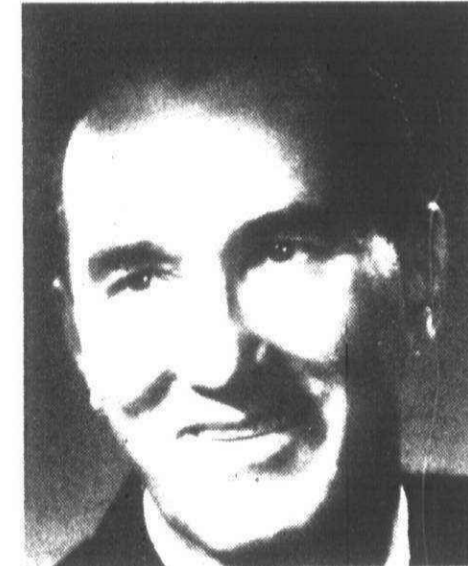

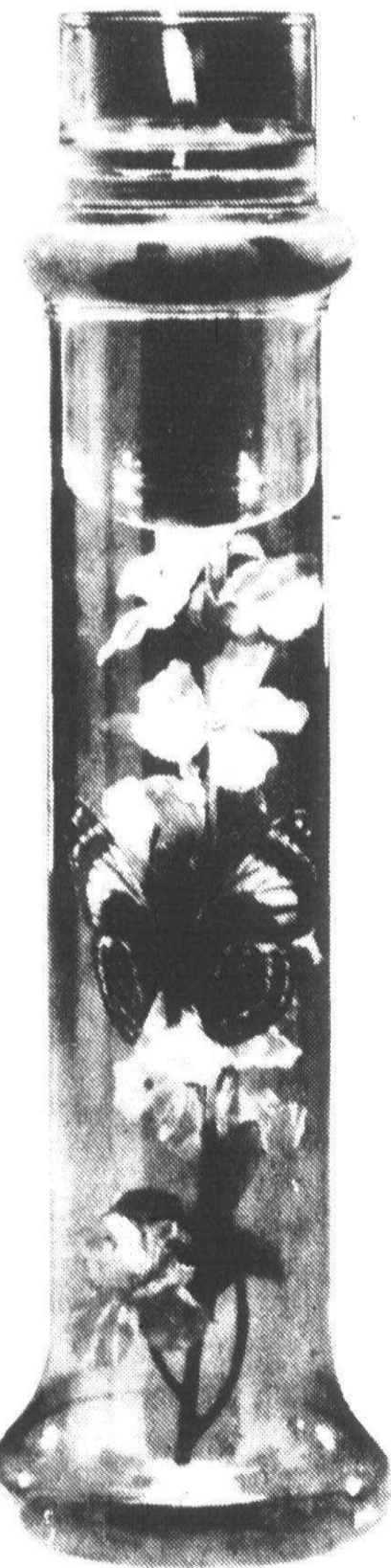

The 'Great Pumpkin' adventure turning to gloom by economics

The day of the pumpkin patch in Plymouth and Canton is coming to a sad end.

The economics of growing the Halloween trademark has taken a strong turn for the worse and a handful of local farmers are harvesting their last pumpkin crop.

It already is common for merchants in Wayne County to bring in pumpkins from outside sources, according to Jerry Draheim of the county extension service.

"The reason why we don't see too many pumpkin fields in the county is because it isn't one of the more profitable crops to grow," Draheim said.

"Wayne County is densely populated and the cost of land is great, so farmers must produce profit bearing vegetables to stay ahead. Pumpkins take up a lot of space and are often difficult to get rid of."

ONE EXCEPTION to Draheim's explanation is the Wilfred Bunyeya farm in Plymouth Township, where 60

acres of pumpkins were grown this summer.

Last year, the Bunyeas grew 100 acres of pumpkins but cut back to 60



this season because they would be easier to get rid of. The Bunyeas have already sent truckloads of pumpkins to Louisiana and Texas.

The secret to the Bunyeas' success is organization and just "plain hard work," according to Margaret Bunyeya. "We get involved with brokers to sell across state lines and deal with many supermarkets."

The Bunyeas plant in late May and have to hoe the fields once a year, in addition to cultivating twice. Young teenagers are hired to help with the summer work in the fields. The pumpkins are also sprayed by plane or helicopter. The only remaining chore is to make sure the fields are not overrun with weeds and the rest of the work involves waiting for harvest time.

This year on the Bunyeya farm is no different from past. "This past summer has been great in moisture," Mrs. Bunyeya said. "We're told everything out in the field is sold—it's just a matter of getting 'em out."

RAIN SHOWERS earlier this week has made it difficult to load trucks in the field. But the Bunyeas hope to sell

every pumpkin this fall. The Bunyeas also make pumpkins available to individuals and small groups. Their fields on North Territorial and Godfredson Roads are open to the public through the end of this month.

The pumpkin picture isn't as rosy for other area farmers, however. The Roadside on Joy Road in Canton Township will cease producing pumpkins this year.

"We've got 2,300 pumpkins for sale this year and that'll be it," said one pokesman. "You stand out there in the cold weather for 25 or 50 cents to listen to people argue over what pumpkins to buy."

Homer Reeder in Canton Township has a couple acres of pumpkins on his farm at Ford Road and Lilley but says this will be his last also. Pumpkin sales don't raise enough funds to meet high township taxes, Reeder said.

Perhaps the most discouraging fall news is that pumpkins grown for Halloween are too large and too soft for good pumpkin pie-making.

Canned squash or smaller pumpkins three times the size of a softball are ideal for pies, Draheim said.



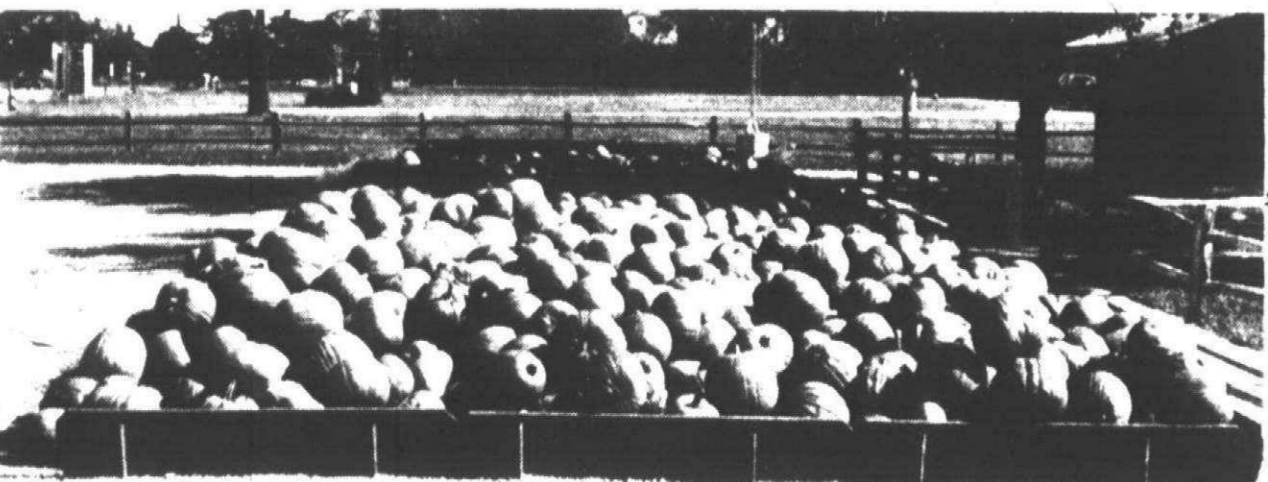

ESY classes overloaded in one track

Editor:

Is the Plymouth-Canton School District providing an equal opportunity for a quality education for all the children in the district? No!

We give this negative response because of the inequalities of class size on the different tracks at some of the Extended School Year (ESY) schools. There are inequalities at all grade levels. Can the administration justify that children have an equal opportunity for a quality educational setting when some classes have 10 more children than in others? This is happening at the same grade level at the same school in the Plymouth-Canton School District.

The teachers are giving 100 per cent to their classes whether they have the 32 or 22. Is it fair to the teachers with

a high number of children in their classes to carry a much heavier load? Is it fair to the child who will receive half the teacher's individual time as others?

If this imbalance would have been dealt with in July or August there would be no need for this letter. If the schools involved were traditional, the teacher-pupil ratio would be reasonably balanced as in the past. The fact is the schools involved are among tracks. This would also allow for the expected growth due to the new homes being occupied within the track boundaries.

PRESENTLY, the administration has said they prefer to close a track. This would mean that new students moving within a track boundary would be placed in another track. These chil-

dren would not have neighbor children as classmates. They would be in school when neighbor children are on vacation.

It is too hard for a child to make new friends and feel accepted in a new neighborhood. We must not penalize him any more. If a track is closed, then another track must assume the anticipated growth of the closed track as well as their own.

This is not fair to the children or the teachers of the new track. This would only put another track in jeopardy of losing a quality educational situation.

We are paying for a quality education. Mr. (John) Hoben, the superintendent, has pledged "the finest quality education possible within available resources to the parents and children of this fine community." We are not giving an equal opportunity for a quality education to all of our students. This would change with the addition of another teacher to the tracks with a high teacher-pupil ratio.

Who put the 'why' in ESY program

Editor:

Last winter the parents of students in the Plymouth-Canton School District were given a questionnaire as to what they felt was the best solution to the growth the school district was facing. Among the alternatives were: split sessions; Extended School Year (E.S.Y.); portable classrooms; higher millage to build more schools; a higher teacher-pupil ratio.

It was my understanding that E.S.Y. was chosen as the best alternative to a growing need for classroom space. We supported this decision.

We now have E.S.Y., but why? We have as many as 36 children in a class. We have 32 children in split first-second grade classes. Other classes in the same schools are in the low twenties. Is this just?

The administration was farsighted enough to build into the system a tool to facilitate the balancing of tracks. This was the block start. They were blind in its use. Changes in tracks were not made prior to the start of E.S.Y. We have been told that individual tracks will be closed in order for classes—lower in teacher pupil-ratio—to grow into the thirties.

IF THIS is the educational setting that the administration intends for our

children, then why are Isbister and Gallimore on E.S.Y.? These schools could provide space for their existing enrollment and have some room for new growth as a traditional school. This would eliminate additional teacher costs, maintenance costs, clerical costs, transportation costs, administration costs, and computer costs that come with E.S.Y.

I thought that E.S.Y. was going to maintain a quality setting for all our children to receive a quality education. It has not, nor is the administration heading E.S.Y. in that direction. If this is true, why have we paid the high price of E.S.Y. at these schools?

We believe the hiring of additional staff members is the most educationally sound solution. This would enable the administration to maintain a balance between tracks without losing the quality setting that some tracks enjoy now.

E.S.Y. will work. E.S.Y. will be more economical. E.S.Y. has the capability of providing a quality education. The administration must take measures to insure quality education is not lost in the Extended School Year.

Township this summer where two men, wanted for attempted rape, were being hunted in a heavily wooded area. The Wayne County Sheriff's helicopter arrived and served to "contain the men in one small area." Hours later, after the helicopter had left, the men were caught by a patrol car in the area.

"But I might be a little more receptive to helicopters because I was involved with helicopters in the service. In the Marine Corps, I had some co-pilot time."

Like Carney, Stein feels the helicopter will do its most good in the rural areas of Canton Township. He argued that a helicopter can cover areas that are inaccessible by car, and in one hour, a helicopter can cover an area that would take five hours by patrol car.

Stein has received no word from the Office of Emergency Preparedness on when the surplus helicopters will be put up for sale at \$500 each to local governments.

Stein has already received approval to spend \$1,500 from the Canton Board of Trustees, and said he'll bring along Barney Stutesman, owner of Canton's Hi-Lift Helicopters, to the government surplus yard to examine the helicopters' condition.

there seems little chance the Sheriff's road patrol will be cut to save money.

The 28-man unit, which provides patrol service to Plymouth and Canton townships, as well as five other out county townships, has been a political football for more than a year.

The board of commissioners would like desperately to get out from under having to pay the bill to keep the cars and the men on the road. The Sheriff's union along with township officials want to keep things just as they are.

With the new county budget just several months away from being adopted, the commissioners are threatening to lay off 700 employees to reduce the anticipated deficit.

Almost 600 of those expected to be pink slipped work at the two psychiatric hospitals at Wayne County General Hospital (Eloise). The other lay-offs are scheduled to come from the Sheriff's Department. In addition to the township patrol, the commissioners have proposed cutting 53 officers from the Metropolitan Airport squad and 20 officers from the county narcotics division.

THE BOARD maintains that it simply cannot afford the salaries, and the cuts are needed to prevent a huge deficit for the coming fiscal year.

But Jim Akhtar of Plymouth Township, president of Sheriff's Local 502, says the board is trying to use scare tactics.

"We're in negotiations right now, so they're (the commissioners) trying to paint the picture as black as they can. According to our contract the number of budgeted positions have to be maintained."

The Sheriff's contract with the county expired July 1 of this year. When no settlement was reached, a state arbitrator was appointed to mediate between the two parties.

Even though Akhtar says he is confident that no manpower cuts will take place, he admits that the county's financial picture is fairly bleak.

"I'd be foolish not to be concerned," he said. "The county does have severe money problems. But they have been building for years."

The board is trying to save money by cutting people. And the commissioners are using that threat to force us to become "reasonable" at the bargaining table."

Commissioner Royce Smith, who represents the Plymouth-Canton community on the board, took exception to Akhtar's comments.

One dim hope for both the townships and the board of commissioners is that the state will underwrite the county with some funds to keep the sheriff's department at full staff.

That possibility, however, seems remote because Gov. Milliken has said he will veto any such request from the legislature.

on July 1, so most of it is immediately invested.

"This year we borrowed \$7½ million on July 1 and had it all worked out in advance how much and where we'd invest. Almost within minutes of getting the check, the investments were made."

The interesting thing about this year's tax anticipation notes, Hoedell adds, is that the district received a much more favorable interest charge.

"Last year we borrowed \$5.9 million and paid out almost \$198,000 in interest. This year, with a \$7½ million loan we'll pay only \$181,000 interest. So even though we borrowed \$1½ million more, we saved \$17,000 in interest expense."

"Also important is that by making sound investments we can earn more money in interest than we have to pay out for loans. This year, on operation alone, our interest income exceeded our interest expense by some \$119,000."

Schools itemize recommendations of CAC implementation by board

Interest has been expressed in follow-up reports on recommendations to Plymouth-Canton Community Schools by the 1976 Citizens Advisory Committee (CAC) as the schools embark on a new program of citizen involvement in long-range planning.

Mixed responses were given to the Observer by members of the '76 CAC work groups when asked if their recommendations had been implemented and when asked if they'd join another advisory committee.

The report from the 140-member CAC went to the school board in April 1976, after which a joint workshop with committee chairpersons and trustees was held. The recommendations were reviewed again at a school board meeting on May 10 and at a workshop meeting of trustees on implementation of CAC recommendations on June 6, 1976.

THE SCHOOL DISTRICT'S newsletter of October 1976 reported to all residents the outcomes of CAC suggestions in the 1976-77 school year. That report showed about eight of the CAC's 55 recommendations were turned down.

As of October 1977, the major innovations and changes in the school district are in line with the report of the CAC, states Florence Beier,

administrative assistant for community relations who helped establish the CAC and new citizens' group. In addition, some specific actions which were recommended but not possible last year have been added this year, she states.

THE DEVELOPMENT of goal-based curriculum, now under way, relates directly to the following CAC points:

- Uniform curriculum objectives and progression K-12.
- More uniformity in the middle school programs.
- Curriculum guides with objectives for all grade levels K-5.
- Introduce district-wide sequential reading program with basic skills to be mastered.

The expansion of Extended School Year (ESY) to five more schools, with revised transportation and boundaries also follows through on these CAC recommendations:

- Continue ESY at Miller Elementary and consider it for more schools.
- Promote concept of neighborhood school.
- Pupil placement should be determined by parent, teacher and principal working together.

CHANGES IN THE high school program have relied greatly on CAC sug-

gestions, adds Mrs. Beier.

Intensive work now is going on through an ad hoc advisory committee and the administration at Plymouth Centennial Educational Park for next year's program in light of space and budget problems. These are the modifications in effect this year:

- Seventy-five per cent of ninth graders and 30 per cent of tenth graders have traditional schedules.
- Discipline and attendance is better controlled through the Student-Teacher-Planning (STP) program and the attendance officer.
- The school board has passed a new graduation requirements policy, including the science requirement recommended by the CAC.

RECOMMENDATIONS WHICH were not implemented last year because of time or cost factors but have been added this year are:

- Hire a director of elementary education.
- Establish continuity of music instruction through appointing a music coordinator.
- Implement K-12 career education with expanded publicity and in-service.
- Supply 12-month student job placement service.
- Cut maintenance costs through central maintenance program.

•Expand women's sports to meet Title IX guidelines.

•Institute intramurals at high school.

•Marching band for each high school.

•Add professional staff for special education.

•Initiate program for talented and gifted students.

•In-service for teachers on working with exceptional children.

•Budget for in-service for implementation of CAC recommendations.

A FEW RECOMMENDATIONS from the CAC aren't being considered for implementation now. They are listed with the reasons for their rejection:

- Pre-school programs in most elementary schools (not sufficient space and no state funding).
- Reduce class size for first grade only (too costly).
- Hire district reading coordinator (being handled by director of elementary education).
- Establish district media center (no space available).
- Hire director of career education (job being done by careers counselor).
- Add pay-as-you-go ride system for after school activities (has not appeared practical in light of needs and state regulations).

Left-footed Scott Evans was perfect on every Goint after touchdown, aiding the 35-point total.

Despite trailing by the two touchdowns at the half, Canton had its chance to get back into the game early in the third period. But a fumble on the Chiefs' second offensive play of the half led to Western's third score of the night.

And from that point, it seemed as though Canton totally quit playing football.

"We just folded up," said Schuele. "We're not half the club that played Bentley (at the beginning of the season). We just have to go back to work."

It marked the 11th consecutive setback for the Chief netters this season.

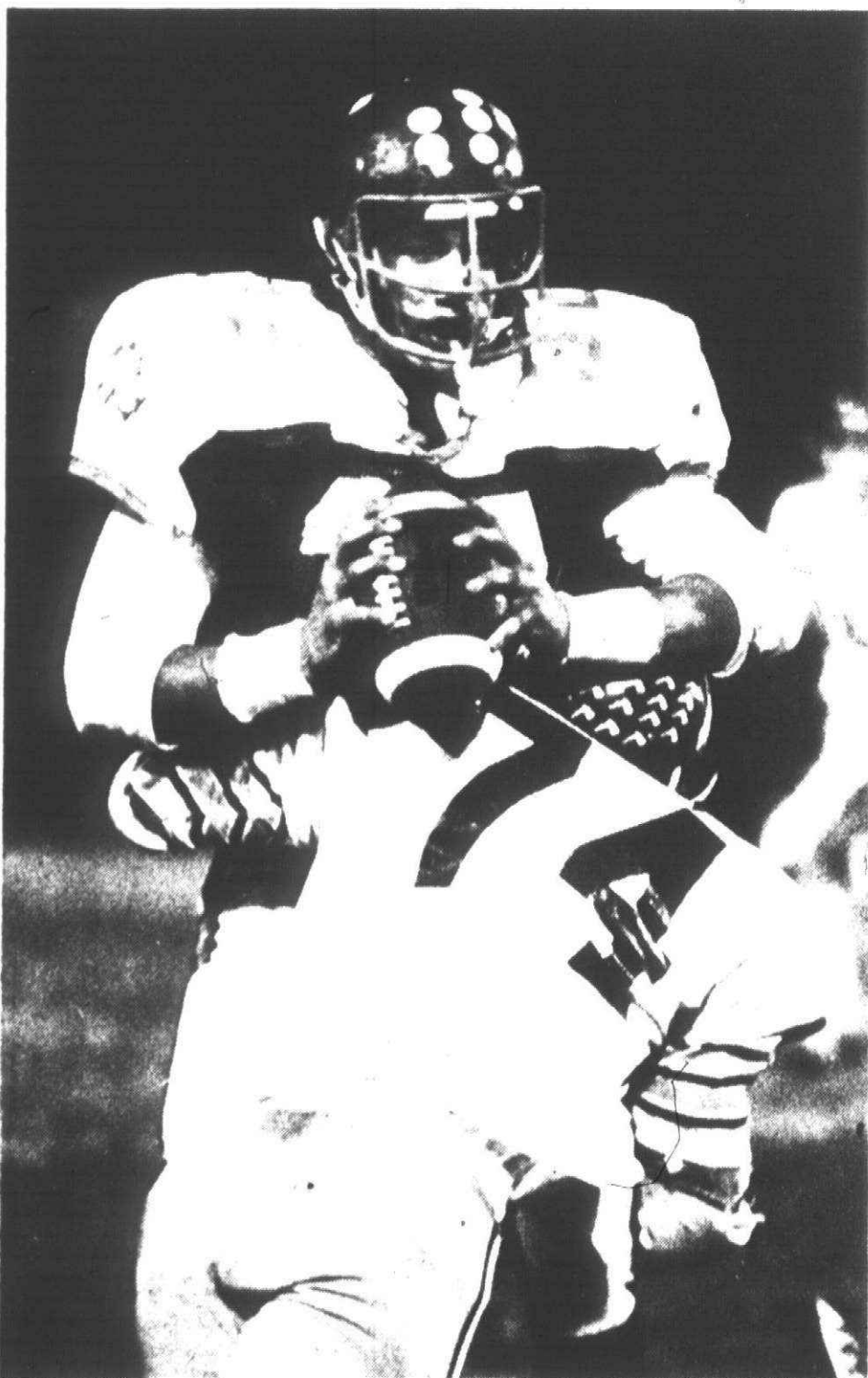
Harrison, the perennial champions of the Western Six League, dominated the Chiefs during the entire match.

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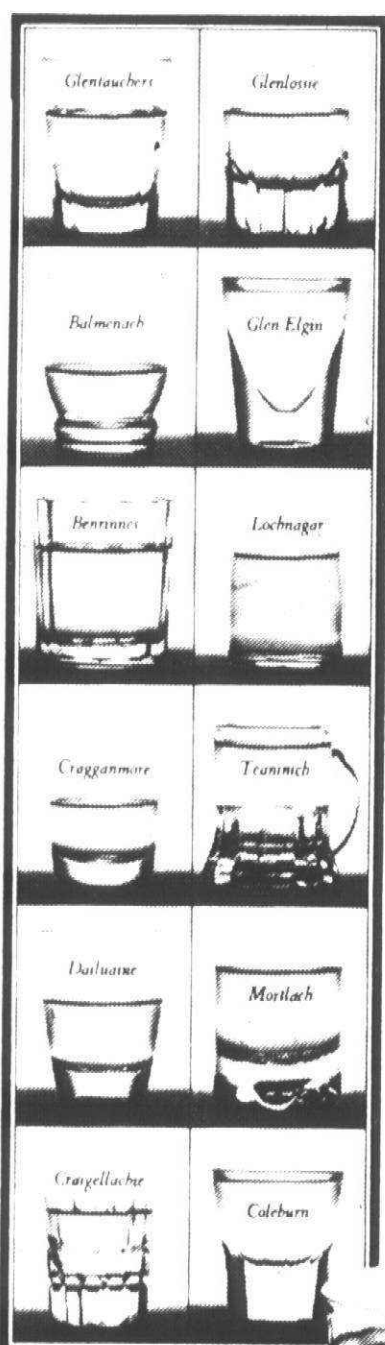

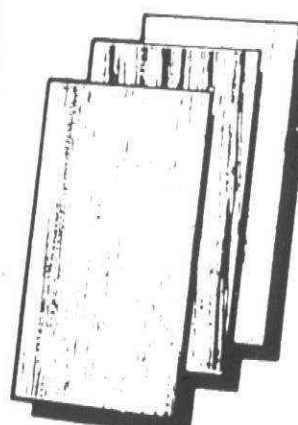


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Canton tankers edge Harrison

In diving action Jamie Zuberink came in second with a point total of 137.6. Annette Piethe finished second, swimming the 100-yard butter fly.

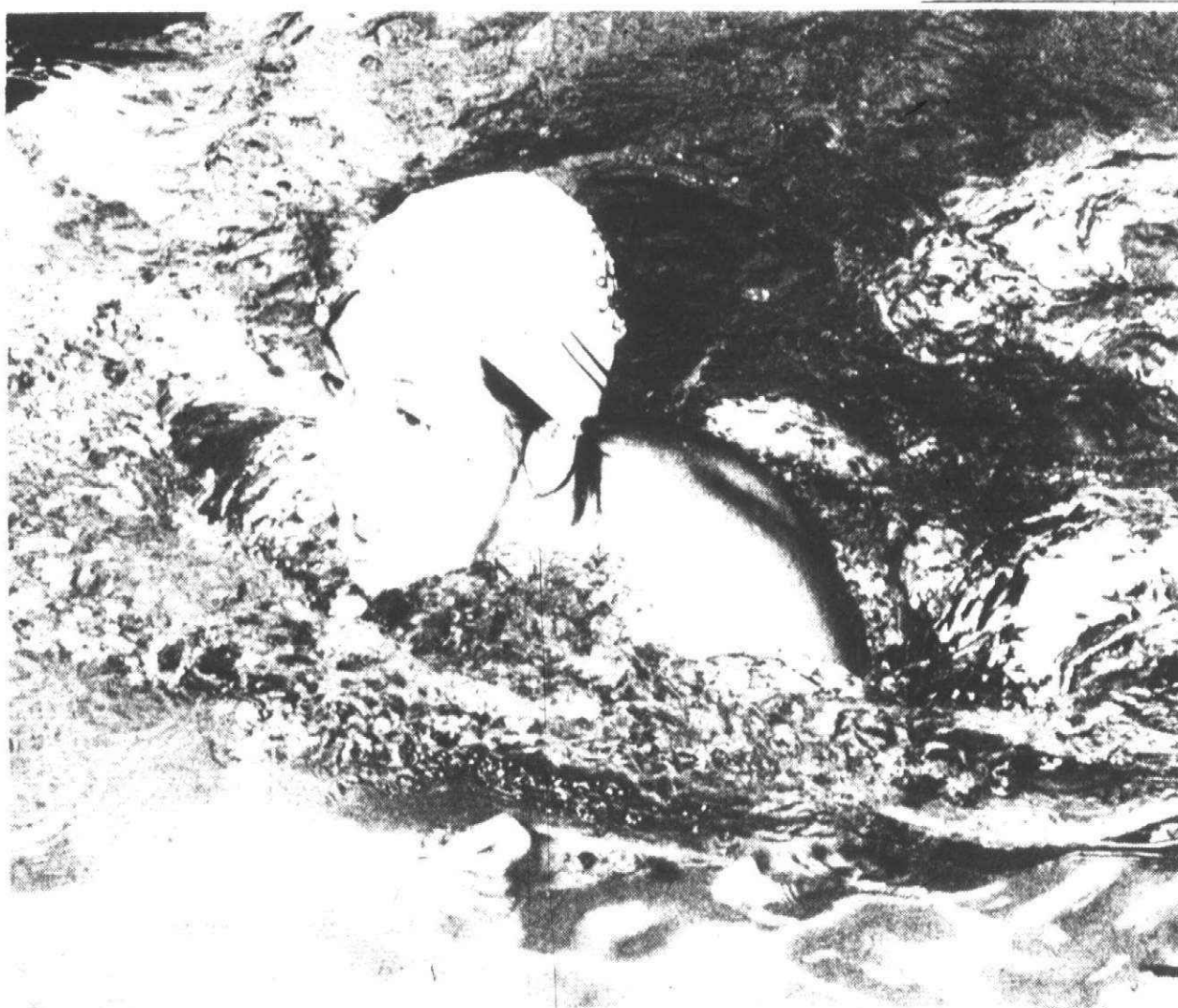
"Our depth, our second, third and fourth place finishes, won the meet for us," said Massey.

Panthers clipped

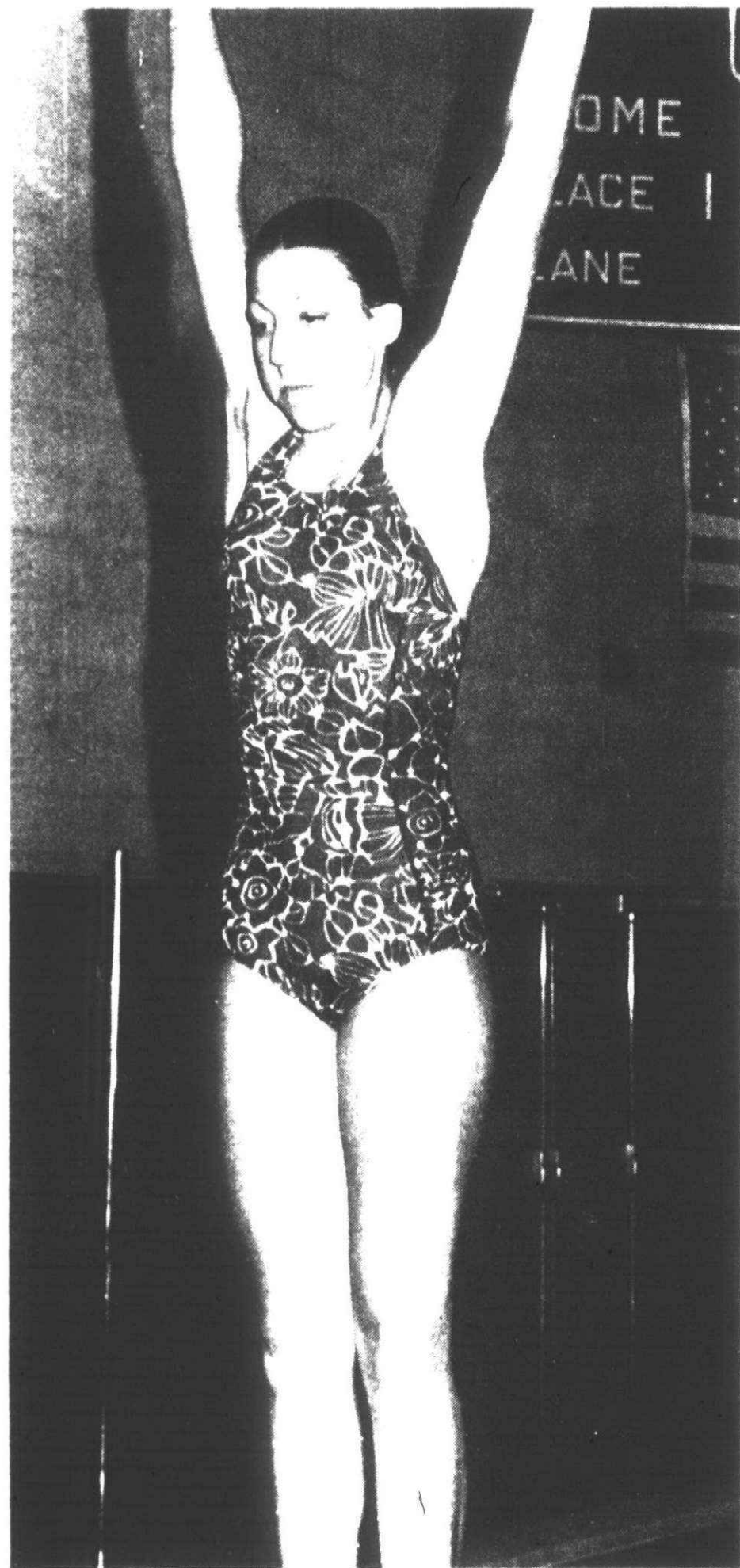

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ORDINANCE NO. LI

TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH
WAYNE COUNTY, MICHIGAN

AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE CERTAIN TRESPASS UPON ANY LANDS, TO PROHIBIT THE POSSESSION OF A LOADED FIREARM OR DISCHARGE OF A FIREARM WITHIN THE LIMITS OF THE RIGHT OF WAY OF ANY PUBLIC HIGHWAY ADJOINING CERTAIN LANDS, TO PROHIBIT THE POSTING OR ENCLOSING OF LANDS EXCEPT BY THE OWNER OR LESSEE OF LANDS OR BY HIS AUTHORIZED AGENT, TO PROVIDE FOR PENALTIES AND TO REAFFIRM CERTAIN ORDINANCES.

THE TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

PART I. The Township of Plymouth pursuant to Act No. 246, P.A. 1945, as amended, being Sections 41.181, et seq., C.L. '48, for the purpose of regulating the public health, safety and general welfare of persons and property, and without limitation of the foregoing to regulate certain trespass upon any lands, to prohibit the possession of a loaded firearm or discharge of a firearm within the limits of the right of way of any public highway adjoining certain lands, to prohibit the posting or enclosing of lands except by the owner or lessee of lands or by his authorized agent, to provide for penalties and to reaffirm certain ordinances, and the Township Board of Trustees of the Township of Plymouth hereby ordains and establishes Ordinance No. LI in the form and substance set forth in PART II, below.

PART II. ORDINANCE NO. LI.
Section 1. This Ordinance shall be known and may be cited as the "Recreational Trespass Ordinance."

Section 2. (1) A person shall not enter in or remain upon the lands of another, other than lands which are farm lands or connected farm wood lots or which are platted, for the purpose of hunting; fishing in a private lake, pond or stream; operating a snowmobile, off-road recreational vehicle, or other motorized vehicle without the written consent of the owner, his lessee or agent, under any of the following conditions:

(a) The lands are fenced or enclosed and maintained in a manner to exclude intruders.

(b) The lands are posted in a conspicuous manner against entry. The minimum letter height on the posting signs shall be two (2) inches and the signs shall be so spaced as will enable a person to observe not less than one (1) sign at any usual point of entry upon the lands.

(2) A person shall not enter upon lands which are farm lands or connected farm wood lots or which are platted for any of the purposes cited in subsection (1) without written consent of the owner, his lessee or agent, whether or not the farm lands or connected wood lots or the platted lands are fenced, enclosed, or posted.

(3) As used in this section:

(a) "Off-road vehicle" means an ORV as defined in Section 1(j) of Act No. 319 of the Public Acts of 1975, being Section 257.1601 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.

(b) "Snowmobile" means a snowmobile as defined in Section 1(e) of Act No. 74 of

the Public Acts of 1968, as amended, being Section 257-1501 of the Michigan Compiled Laws.

Section 3. (1) A person shall not discharge a firearm within the right of way of a public highway adjoining or abutting any platted property, fenced, enclosed, or posted lands; or lands or connected farm wood lots without the written consent of the owner, his lessee or agent, of the abutting lands.

(2) As used in this section "public highway" means a road or highway under the jurisdiction of the Michigan Department of State Highways and Transportation or the Board of County Road Commissioners of the County of Wayne or the Township of Plymouth.

Section 4. A person shall not, without due authority for posting or enclosing lands from the owner, his lessee or agent, erect posters or enclose lands so as to prohibit the public enjoyment of hunting, fishing, trapping or other recreational activities on the lands.

Section 5. (1) A prosecution under this Ordinance shall be in the name of the people of the Township of Plymouth, and shall be brought before the 35th Judicial District Court, and within 1 year from the time the offense charged was committed. (2) In a proceeding for a violation of this Ordinance, the presence of a person on the enclosed, fenced, or conspicuously posted premises of another, or upon any lands which are farm lands or farm wood lots connected therewith or which are platted without having in said person's possession the written consent of the owner, his lessee or agent, shall constitute prima facie evidence of unlawful entry.

(3) A constable of the Township of Plymouth, a peace officer or a police officer may enforce this Ordinance upon complaint of the landowner, his lessee or agent, or pursuant to Act No. 147, P.A. 1968, as amended.

Section 6. No cause of action shall arise for injuries to any person who is on the lands of another, including farm lands and connected wood lots and platted lands, without paying to such other person a valuable consideration for the purpose of hunting, fishing, trapping, camping, hiking, sightseeing, motorcycling, snowmobiling, or any other outdoor recreational use, with or without permission, against the owner, his lessee or agent, of the premises unless the injuries were caused by the gross negligence or wilful and wanton misconduct of the owner, his lessee or agent.

Section 7. The Township Attorney shall prosecute all persons charged with violating this Ordinance.

Section 8. A person shall not resist or obstruct a Township constable, peace officer or police officer enforcing the provisions of this Ordinance.

Section 9. A person who violates this Ordinance is guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction, the penalty for violation shall be a fine not exceeding \$500.00 or by imprisonment not to exceed 90 days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 10. This Ordinance shall take effect on November 17, 1977.

PART III. Ordinances No. XXXIX and No. XXXX are ratified and reaffirmed, the intent of the Township Board being said ordinances and this Ordinance shall be construed in pari materia. If any portion of this Ordinance or the application thereof to any person or circumstance shall be found invalid by a court, such invalidity shall not affect the remaining portion or application of the validity of this Ordinance as a whole, provided such remaining portions are not determined by the court to be inoperable, and it is hereby declared to be the legislative intent that this Ordinance would have been adopted had such invalid provision not been included.

PART IV. This Ordinance was adopted by the Township Board of Trustees of the Township of Plymouth, Wayne County, Michigan, at its regular meeting duly held on the 11th day of October, A.D., 1977, and ordered to be given publication in the manner prescribed by law.

Kevin Kitzke, from Garden City East, placed fifth; Tobin Jones, from Chur-

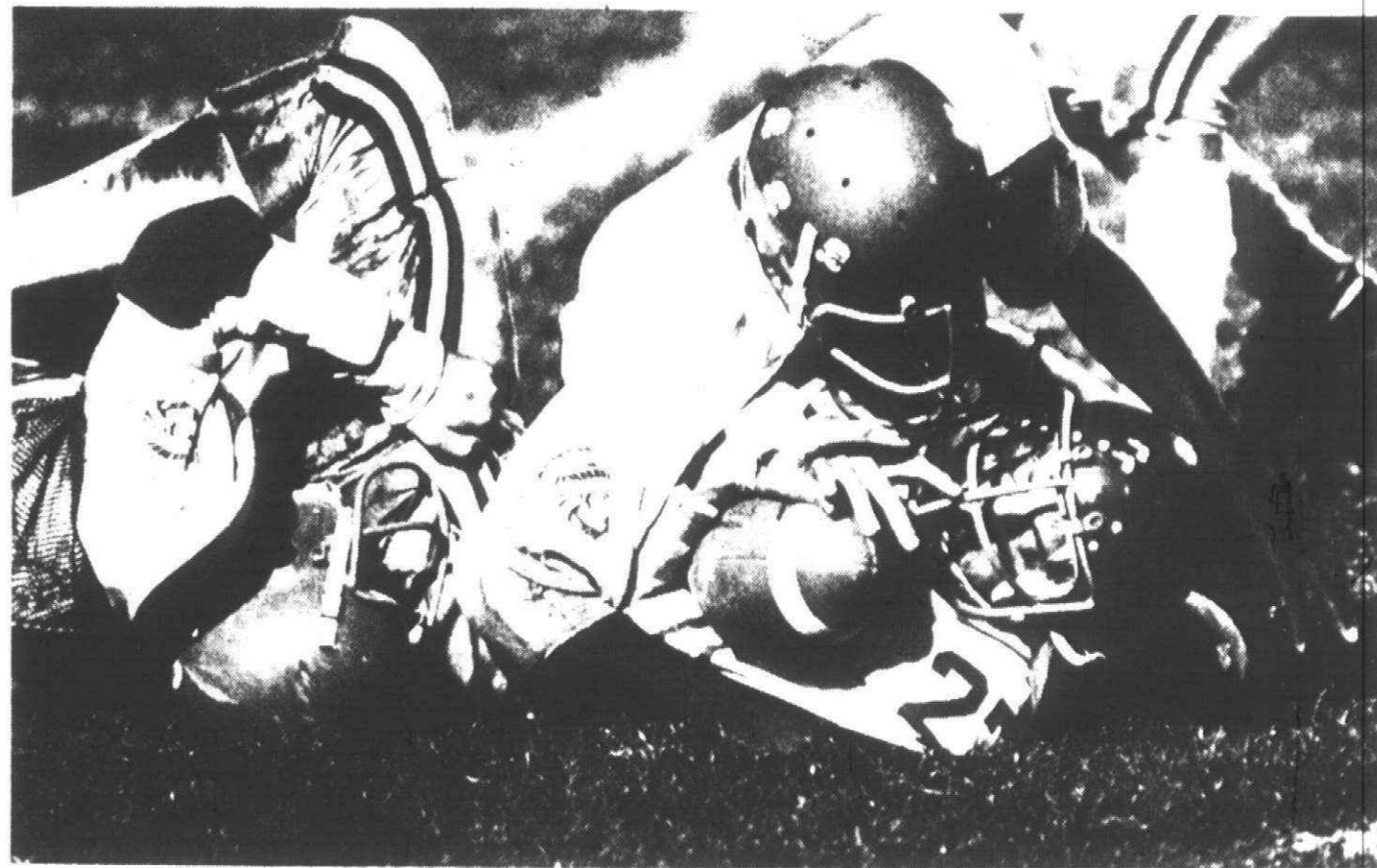

With one tick of the clock, wild cheering turned to cries of disbelief as Inkster Cherry Hill kicked a last-second field goal to spoil Garden City West's homecoming, 16-14, in a Friday night Tri-River League football game.

Through the game's first minutes, though, things seemed to be going right for Copeland's Tigers. The defense swarmed and pursued enough to keep Cherry Hill from going anywhere on its first possession.

After a Cherry Hill punt, which rolled dead on the 48 yard line, Smith took Ryan's handoff off left tackle all

the way for the TD. Ryan, however, pushed his extra point kick to the right and the score stayed 6-0.

Later in the first quarter, a Tiger drive stalled at the 16. Ryan stayed on to try a field goal from the 23, a 33-yard attempt. It had the distance, but not the direction and the score remained 6-0.

Cherry Hill came back to knot the score with only 1:30 left in the first half. The Spartans drove from the 49 to the 12 before fullback Tom Minor blew through the middle on a draw play for the score. He also tried the kick for the extra point, but drove it left of the goalposts.

The Spartans pulled some deception from their bag of tricks for the score which initially put them out in front.

It appeared that their drive had rolled to a standstill at the 16 yard line when quarterback Scott Dawson and Minor set up for a field goal attempt.

"After that first play we just didn't get any blocking up front," Copeland said, still shaking his head in disbelief.

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The Stroller

DNR's a puzzler

Every now and then when he pursues the public prints over his morning coffee The Stroller becomes what his Dutch ancestors called befuddled.

When this happens he often reads and re-reads the article just to be sure that he is wide awake and that the printed lines really are puzzling.

This happened the other morning when he read, with great surprise, that the Department of Natural Resources had decided to turn its collective back on Newburgh and Wilcox lakes and leave their improvement up to future generations.

This was puzzling because only a year or two ago the DNR, working with the Wayne County Road Commission, started what was said to be the first step in a vast improvement pro-

gram to not only beautify the lakes, but make of them modern recreational areas that would provide swimming, fishing and even boating of several kinds.

THE WORK was heralded by all communities in the western suburbs.

The sight of the fishing docks, extending far out into the waters with railings to guard the children, caused a collective sigh "At last."

The work included the building of a wall at the end of Wilcox Lake that would cause the water flowing down the Rouge to travel faster and thus help to partially eliminate the algae that always choked the lake.

There were all sorts of dreams of what would happen in the future. The City of Livonia, taking a cue from the

Camp Dearborn facilities near Milford, planned for a side-wheeler boat that would cruise a round Newburgh Lake.

WHILE THE City of Livonia was looking forward to this added recreation program, plans were even more fantastic in the Plymouth area.

Concerned that the area might be lost in the intersection of the new highways I-275 and M-14, plans were initiated for the erection of a fountain in Wilcox Lake.

It was not to be an ordinary fountain. It was to shoot water about 300 feet into the air and be enhanced with colored lights.

It was the feeling that if more than one million people a year travel to Yellowstone National Park to view "Old Faithful" the Wilcox Lake fountain would be a great identification mark for Plymouth.

At the time, the planners were given some hope when they learned that the state budget allocated money for the dredging and cleaning of the two lakes.

When the sum was reduced, and the lake work was put off for a year, planners were told that the sum would be restored in the budget and things would be fine if only they were patient.

NOW COMES WORD that the DNR has turned its back on the lakes. An official statement, that really has The Stroller puzzled, said "dredging will only deepen the lakes." What else would they expect? It also was said that there was no place nearby to deposit the waste if the dredging was done.

This was a peculiar reason for abandoning the work. No thought was given to the possibility that a ski hill could be built in Hines Park. In all of its 30 some miles there is only one toboggan hill. Even that is small.

Even more puzzling in the DNR statement was the claim that if the lakes were dredged they would only fill up again. What an intelligent remark.

To top it all off, and possibly in an attempt to appease the planners, the DNR officials said the lakes should not be written off—that they could be ideal places for future generations.

Western Wayne state reps vote no on easing grass law

Eight Mile Road seems to be the dividing line for suburban support on some issues. A recently defeated bill, which would have softened penalties for possession of small amounts of marijuana, is a classic example.

All six state representatives of western Wayne County—John Bennett (D-Redford), Thomas Brown (D-Westland), William Keith (D-Garden City), Jack Kirksey (R-Livonia), Robert Law (R-Livonia) and Roy Smith (R-Ypsilanti), whose district includes most of Plymouth—voted no.

Their Oakland County counterparts, meanwhile, supported Rep. Perry Bullard's (D-Ann Arbor) bill, 4-2.

Voting yes were: James Defebaugh (R-Birmingham), Joseph Forbes (D-Oak Park), Ruth McNamee (R-Birmingham) and Sal Rocca (D-Sterling Heights), whose district includes a portion of Troy.

Reps. Wilbur Brotherton (R-Farmington) and Richard Fessler (R-Union Lake) voted against the bill.

The vote defied party lines. Of 12 state representatives of western Wayne and Oakland counties, the Democrats voted against the measure, 3-2, and the Republicans disapproved, 5-2.

Reconsideration of HB 4603 was defeated, 51-48. It was the third time this year that the Michigan House had debated the bill. The House passed it June 28 with few votes to spare, and defeated it the next day by an equally slim margin.

It is unlikely that the bill will be considered again in this session, according to a number of state representatives.

EVEN THOUGH the measure was defeated, representatives from both sides of the voting column feel that Michigan's present marijuana laws will eventually be changed.

"Eventually, down the line, its gonna come. It has to. We can't have an unequal distribution of justice," Rocca said.

"I felt that the marijuana laws, the way they are enforced, are grossly unfair. Marijuana, let's face it, isn't good for your health. Cigarettes aren't good for you, either. And neither is alcohol," he said.

"But it's unfair that we take this one substance and say you can't consume it," he said. "If you do consume it and are caught, we can throw you in jail

for a year, with effects that are going to follow you for a long, long time."

A primary concern of Bullard's bill was to wipe out the criminal record of those who were convicted of having small amounts of the drug in their possession.

BROTHERTON, who voted against the bill, said, "I really am sympathetic to the young person who gets caught. He winds up with a record and it affects his life for some time to come."

The vast majority of minor violations are never prosecuted, he contended. So a police record is not a "real danger," he said.

He agreed that in some areas, judges because of their "personal convictions," "threw the book" at even those charged with minor violations.

Kirksey said, "With or without (the bill), the pendulum has swung. Public opinion has changed. It filters to the judges, who are no longer giving the harsh penalties for possession of less than an ounce."

ROCCA ALSO recognized that the laws were not being equally administered, but said that the situation had to be corrected.

"It's not a fair and equitable system," he said. "There is no consistency in the law. The bill would have made the system fair and equitable."

"Sure, it's easy for people to say 'lock up all the potheads' but what happens when it's their own kid?"

"It's a fact—people want to throw their neighbor's kid in jail, but they wouldn't do it to their own children. That's a fact," he said.

Rocca blamed the defeat of the bill on the political climate which had evolved since Bullard introduced it last spring.

"It turned into an emotional issue rather than one based on fact and reality. They voted on emotions," he said.

BROWN CRITICIZED the atmosphere differently, and said that the bill's passage would have created a "leisurely" atmosphere and would have encouraged its usage.

He said Bullard's bill would have been misinterpreted. He said that in trying to help some people, the legislature would unwittingly be promoting marijuana usage among the state's youth.

CEP marching band fares well at meet

Last Tuesday night, the Michigan School Band and Orchestra Association (MSBOA) sponsored its first marching band competition. Included was the Plymouth Centennial Park marching band in its first marching band competition.

The Plymouth band, under the direction of Jim Griffith and Tom Brownlee, performed in the class AAA division along with two other bands. Among the three bands Plymouth went up against were the "Rocket" marching band from Westland, John Glenn and the Wayne Memorial "Tiger" marching band.

In a MSBOA festival, a band is rated from one to five, with one the best. But

the bands are not placed first, second or third.

Being judged on both the marching and maneuvering of a specific drill and the musical ability of the band while executing the drill, the Plymouth Band received a first division rating.

"We didn't perform as well as we could and not nearly as well as we did at the University of Michigan's band day," commented one of the band members.

The marching band also performed Saturday afternoon at the "Cavalcade of Bands" at Western Michigan University but the results as to how the band placed had not been determined at press time.

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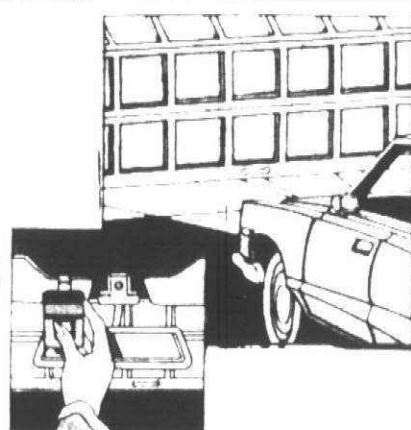
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It's farewell light rail as SEMTA faces cuts

A scaled-down light rail rapid transit system, with fewer miles of subway, and smaller buses on lightly traveled suburban lines seem in the cards for patrons of the Southeastern Michigan Transportation Authority (SEMTA).

General Manager will outline several alternatives next week to SEMTA'S 15-member policy-making board, which must then pick and choose between them.

The cutback from earlier plans was caused by the federal government's announcement it would stand by its \$600 million commitment to SEMTA of October 1976 but wouldn't commit any more funds than that.

SEMTA'S plans had called for a \$1.3 billion program, including underground light rail lines in the Woodward and Gratiot corridors.

THE NEW program, Salci told a press conference, will keep within \$750 million—the \$600 million federal commitment and \$150 million in state-local funds, an 80-20 formula.

Without being specific, Salci said his alternatives "will try to minimize subway." Transportation experts generally say subway costs 10 times as much per mile to construct as grade-level tracks.

While he didn't discuss it, there is also a possibility of eliminating the Gratiot corridor from the program.

For the suburbs, Salci said alternatives would involve more demand-response buses—which is transit jargon for dial-a-ride service.

"One thing our public hearings taught us," he said, "is that people are interested in service within their own community as well as inter-community travel."

To use a biological analogy, SEMTA will give more attention to the capillaries of the overall system and less to the arteries.

"The buses we just purchased from General Motors cost \$97,000. To run a full-sized coach on 22 Mile Road doesn't make sense," the general manager said.

SEMTA HAD been planning to add some 800 buses in 10 years to its suburban fleet. Salci's comments mean fewer large coaches will be acquired and smaller dial-a-ride vehicles will be substituted, in some combination.

"I want to get away from the institutional approach—having a big bus on every mile road for the sake of having it there—and use a demand-response approach," he said.

One method of ascertaining demand, Salci went on, will be a marketing study. While regional planning agencies (the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments and its predecessor Transportation and Land Use Study) studied travel patterns, he said, no one ever did a marketing study to see where demand for public transportation really was.

Salci said a successful public transit system generally attracts six to seven

per cent of travel-trips, with private autos serving the rest. So far, SEMTA and the Detroit bus systems are getting only two per cent of the travel-trips.

"A YEAR AND a half ago," Salci said, "SEMTA expanded bus service 30 per cent. For this we got a two per cent increase in ridership and a 1.5 per cent increase in revenue."

"I just cancelled four park-and-ride

services. We were getting five or six persons on a bus in some places."

Salci said the new plan to be presented to the SEMTA board would look at more commuter rail service for the long term, but he went into no detail.

A major problem facing the region, he said, is SEMTA's plan to acquire D-DOT, a condition the federal government says must be met before any of the \$600 million is delivered.

D-DOT has some 2,500 employees and 7,500-plus buses; SEMTA, supposedly a seven-county authority but actually serving only Oakland and Macomb counties and suburban Wayne County, has 535 employees and 250 buses.

The complication in the merger negotiations is what to do with D-DOT's unfunded pension liability of \$85 million—a liability that exceeds the of

value of D-DOT's assets of only \$25 million. The state has funded the pension obligation for the last two years.

Salci is eager to put the heat on Detroit officials to merge the systems, although SEMTA board have openly complained Mayor Young's administration is dragging its feet. Salci said he looks for some progress once the mayoral election is over in November.

Nurses urge lice check

School nurses are urging parents to check their children for the head lice which frequently appear this time of year.

The Plymouth-Canton Community School nurses send letters home with youngsters with instructions for identifying and getting rid of the annoying insects which live in human hair.

Head lice can be acquired by personal contact and by putting on infested garments such as hats or scarves. They can be picked up from upholstered furniture or even loose hairs.

Once a child comes to school with head lice, they often spread to many other pupils. The only solution to the problem is treatment by the parents at home. School nurses send home instruction sheets with all the children in a school where head lice have been detected.

Lice-killing shampoo can be obtained at the Wayne County Health Department or with a doctor's prescription. Parents also must take additional steps to clean clothing, combs and bedding.

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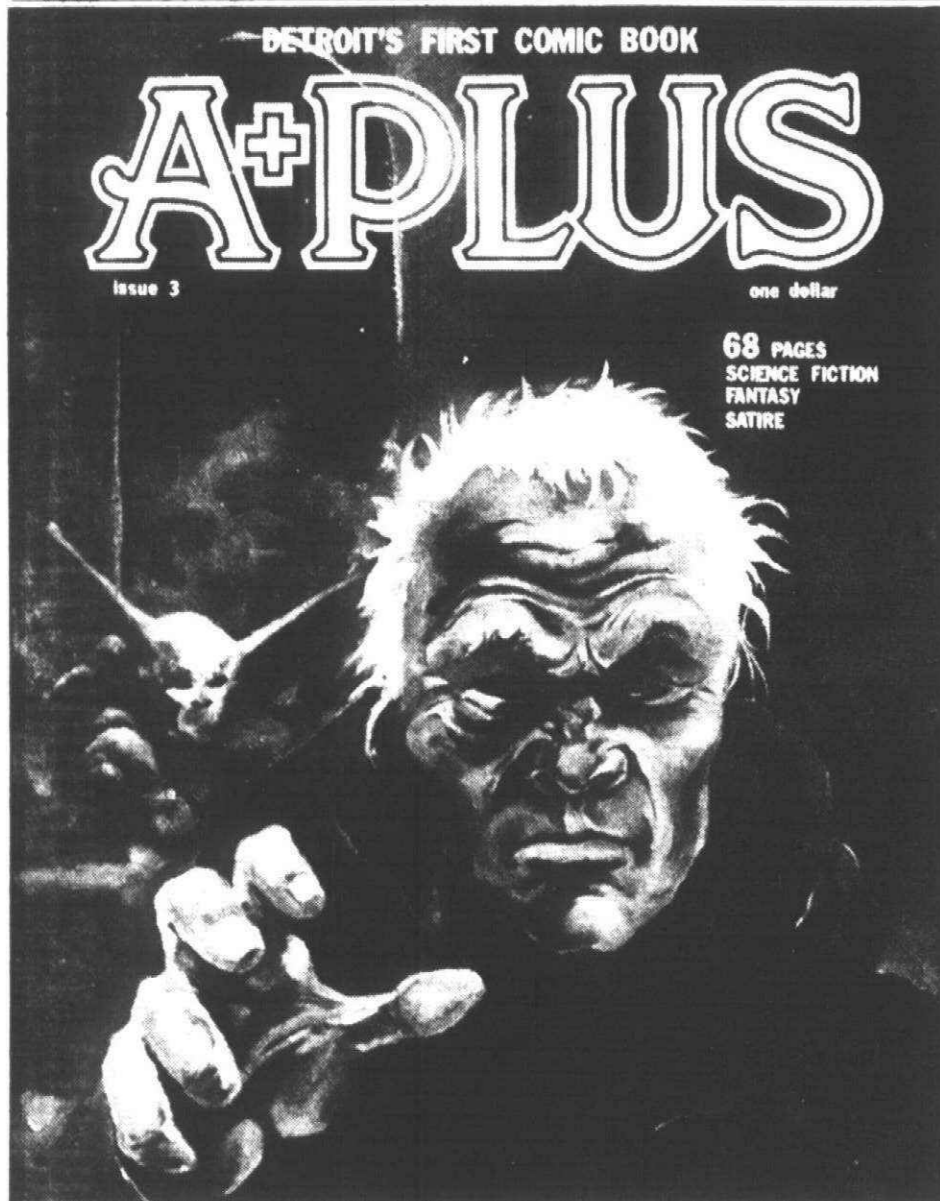
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Breeders flying to bird bash

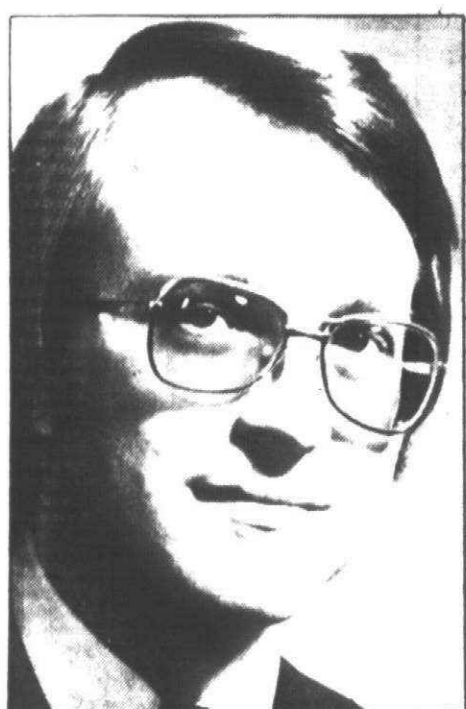

WDET, the Detroit area's only public radio station, needs your help. The station, located at 101.9 on the FM dial, is currently in its annual fund-raising drive to gather up the necessary cash to continue its wide scope of programming for the coming year.

remains its chief message. Music of the classical persuasion is the station's main fare. It even brings the Detroit Symphony Orchestra into your livingroom, thanks to the technical skill of Plymouth resident Bob Shafer, 25, a WDET producer. "We have the best reproduction of any big city orchestra," he says. "That's because we give it T.L.C."

But if you're into jazz, rock, blues, reggae or experimental tunes, there's a greater range available on WDET than on any other Detroit area station.

In fact, as local rock stations have tightened up their formats in recent years, WDET has loosened up so much it is sometimes unrecognizable from its former staid, snooze-producing self. In September, for example, the station's several shows which specialize in jazz or rock devoted large chunks of time to Jimi Hendrix. Ever hear a Jimi Hendrix-Jim Morrison jam? One was played on WDET last month.

The station has also boosted up its power and improved its signal in recent months. Credit for that goes to another local behind-the-scenes technical wizard, Paul Grzebiak, 30, of Westland, WDET's chief engineer. "We play what the others won't," he says.

WDET uses a small paid staff, but over 100 people from 80 to 18 volunteer their services each month. The station is almost totally listener-supported; it receives about 30 per cent of its funding from its owner, Wayne State University, but for the rest, it must rely on the public. There are no commercials, and that alone may make it worth listening to.

The financial future looks fairly bright; President Carter asked Congress last week to authorize \$1.4 billion for public radio and television over the next five years.

But today, the WDET staff is passing the hat electronically. Nothing special in the way of programming is planned for this pledge period. The staff just asks that people give the station a listen. And then pitch in.

WDET beams out several public-interest shows each week, but music
