## Medical waste site possible

■ A Detroit-area company is considering Canton Township for a medical waste incinerator. The state Department of Natural Resources has not yet received a formal permit application but has received supporting materials for the company's request to locate in Canton.

Despite a Detroit-area company's interest in Canton Township as a possible site for its medical waste incinerator, Township Supervisor Tom Yack said that doesn't mean it's going to happen.

"This is one company's idea of what they would like to do, and that's a long way from it happening," Yack said.

He said he had not received any official notification from the company, Highland Co-gen. Thursday morning he checked his computer's electronic mail and saw a request for a January meeting with company officials to discuss their interests.

In fact, the state Department of Natural Resources' air quality division has not yet received a formal permit application for the incinerator. Wilhemina McLemore in the air quality division said the company has forwarded supporting evidence for an incinerator at 5000 DeWitt, south of Michigan Avenue, near AGA Gas.

"It's perfectly safe," said Plymouth resident Tom O'Rourke of

Highland Co-gen, who calls the incinerator a solid-waste boiler. "On a scale of 1-10, 10 being the safest, it's a 15. These machines are located in metro areas. After 20 years in business, this (manufacturing) company has not had one complaint from res-

idents or from enforcing agencies." Items taken to a medical waste incinerator — things not allowed in landfills — include items such as needles, pathological waste, body parts, cultures, infectious agents, liquid human and animal wastes,

and research animal waste, McLemore said.

O'Rourke said his company has a purchase option on 5000 DeWitt, Canton, he said, is only one of a

## Study sings praises of firefighting setup

Canton's current full-time Fire Department with its own ambulances costs less than switching to full-time and on-call part-time firefighters with private ambulances, a new study says.

"This is where I have to admit the surprise came in for all of us," said Canton Public Safety Director John Santomauro. "We knew we were providing a high level of service, but we didn't realize how cost-effective this system was in comparison to alternative models."

A study of fire and emergency medical services was unveiled publicly Tuesday night before the Canton Township Board of Trustees. "We walked into this very objectively," Santomauro added. "This wasn't done as the result of a problem. We wanted to see which model would best serve the community."

Canton staff members, including Treasurer Elaine Kirchgatter and Trustee Bob Shefferly, were charged with comparing the Fire Department's current method of providing fire suppression and emergency medical services, including ambulance transport, as well as appraising alternative methods of providing service.

"From that study there were a lot of things that we learned," Santomauro said, adding that the next step is a strategic plan for the future.

Models studied by the committee included the existing department that has full-time firefighters who provide fire suppression, emergency medical services, a host of fire-prevention activities and inspections, and who operate four ambulances out of two fire stations.

A second model studied was a com-

bination department with full-time career firefighters and "part-paid" firefighters who are on call. In this scenario, a private company would be hired to provide a floating ambulance that would serve Canton but would not be stationed here.

A third model studied included full-time and on-call part-time firefighters with two ambulances dedicated to Canton.

"We have the equivalent to that now, but it's under Canton (Township)," said Kirchgatter, referring to the dedicated ambulances.

Committee members took three factors into consideration when studying the models: level of service provided, cost of services and community acceptance. They also studied models on the basis that levels of service had to be maintained and no personnel layoffs would result.

"This study was done for Canton. This is not a report card for other communities. Canton is a unique community and we offer a unique level of service," Santomauro said.

What township Financial Services Manager Susan Kopinski discovered in the financial analysis of the three scenarios is that as the years go by, revenue would not keep up with the rate of expenditures for fire and EMS services based on the current 3.10 mills.

In her analysis, Kopinski built in state equalized value (property assessment) growth and increases in salaries and fringe benefits. She also showed the revenue effect for all three scenarios, including the effect on taxpayers.

In the analysis, Kopinski found that if state equalized value increased

## Students at Field go metric for project

Students at Field Elementary gave a helping hand to the needy and got a hand with their homework in the process.

After Field PTO president Karen Jeffries organized a food drive, teacher Pattee Rupert suggested that pupils apply their knowledge of the metric system to measure the food as it arrived.

Each day, Field's 454 students lined up the cans and boxes and measured the length of the line using metric tape measures.

"It's so the kids could have real

life practice using the metric measurements in a way that would benefit the community," said Rick Plecha, whose fourth-grade class was in charge of posting the daily results on a graph.

Among other things, the students found that a line of 10 soup cans equals one meter, and one class proudly collected 22 meters of food.

"They're so enthusiastic when it's concrete like this," Plecha said.

## Dunbar Davis remembered for his integrity

Former 35th District Judge Dunbar Davis was remembered as a dignified Southern gentleman who embodied integrity and tradition.

"He was a classic old-school Southern gentleman," said Judge James Garber, who is retiring from the 35th District Court, a facility that bears Mr. Davis's name.

Mr. Davis, 81, who worked for 18 years as a district judge and 30 years as an attorney, died Thursday, Dec. 22, in Sarasota, Fla., following a long illness.

"Dunbar was my second father," said former U.S. Congressman Carl Pursell. "I've known him since I was 15. I'm going to really miss him. He

was my closest friend. He was a giant among men."

News of his death overshadowed the holiday weekend in Plymouth as friends and admirers mourned his passing.

"He was a very distinguished gentleman of the court. He established the high level of integrity and tradition in the court," said Plymouth Township police Chief Carl Berry.

Pursell recalled helping Mr. Davis with his first campaign for the judiciary in 1968. He was first appointed judge by then-Mayor James Jabara. He opened his first law office in Plymouth in 1938.

"I decided I'd pick a small town, open an office and 'tell 'em I'm a lawyer,'" Mr. Davis said in

1985. He happened upon Plymouth — then a three-lawyer town. He also served on the Plymouth City Commission 1946-48.

Judge Garber remembered Mr. Davis's demeanor as a judge. "He did everything in a gentlemanly fashion. That's how he conducted his career."

Mr. Davis spent his youth in Southport, N.C. His loyalty to the South went as far as his wearing of a narrow bow tie.

Arrangements, by Schrader-Howell Funeral Home, Plymouth, were incomplete. He is survived by his wife, Martha, two daughters, Susanne Steffes and Kay Cole, and eight grandchildren.





# Student leaders at Salem reach out to help needy

than Clinton's plan does. "Maybe it's time to leave some of this money in the taxpayers' pocket," he said. However, Knollenberg has no wish to fire the Capital elevator operators, who often make the difference, he said, in getting to the House floor in time to vote. "You have to have an elevator operator to get you there on time," he said. Rep.-elect Lynn Rivers, D-Ann Arbor, who also represents Canton and Plymouth townships, Plymouth, Westland, Garden City and the southwest quadrant

of Livonia, will replace departing Rep. William Ford on Jan. 5. Unlike most of the Republican candidates this year, Rivers didn't run for election hollering for tax cuts. In an interview last week, she stopped short of advocating tax cuts, but said, "I have no opposition to a tax cut." Rivers' chief concern regarding tax cuts is that the concomitant spending cuts will hurt people. "When you begin to cut the budget, those cuts are probably going to be painful to someone," she said. "Some of the cuts could be

devastating for working families." Asked for examples, she cited potential cuts in small business loans, student loans and changes in Medicare benefits. "Sometimes taking care of one problem means creating a problem in a different area," she said. Rivers added that being forced out of power in Congress might be good for Democrats in that adversity will make them think hard about what they stand for. "A lot of the reform we're seeing is being applauded by both parties," she said.

### There's nothing finer than fresh oysters

I can't imagine spending a holiday without including some form of oyster in my culinary repertoire. Sucking down good oysters to me is like a great wine to a oenophile, a sharp knife to a butcher or a sunny 80 degree day to a mailman; they are much appreciated.

But not everyone shares my enthusiasm. The world is full of people who would cringe at the sight of a bowl of clam chowder, let alone allow the feel one gets when sliding a fresh shucked Belon down one's gullet. Oysters are definitely an acquired taste, and if you haven't coerced your friendly fish monger into bringing in a dozen exotics, I can't think of a better way to reward oneself for making it through the holidays.

The oyster market has grown considerably and due to over harvesting and poor quality control, the cost of exotic fresh oysters is increasing rapidly. Golden mantels and Kumamotos can cost as much as \$1 a piece and when you think about it, that's one heck of an expensive taste.

Less expensive and more common Eastern oysters are usually what you get in bulk form at most fish markets and retailers. If you think those are oysters, well, you obviously haven't had the real thing.

Bulk shipped Eastern oysters come from warmer waters south of Cape Cod and the warmer waters in the Gulf of Mexico. The warmer waters make the oysters spawn and they become milky and tasteless and even at their best, should only be used for stews and chowders.

Generally speaking, the colder the water, the better the oyster. Ergo, if you were to draw a line from Cape Cod to San Francisco, any ocean water north of these two points are the breeding grounds for a great oyster. The saltiness of oysters can vary quite a bit, generally from mild to strong.

Exotic oysters usually have a full sweet flavor with a delicious flinty overtone.

#### Tasty morsels

Surely the best way to enjoy them is on the half shell with just a tiny squeeze of fresh lemon. For your information, only gutless novices swallow them whole and yes, they are (or should be) still very much alive when eaten.

If the shells gape and do not close quickly in handling, discard them as well as those with any broken shells.

Exotic oysters have flavors and tastes unique unto themselves. The Belon, for example, was only raised in the heavily iron laden waters of northern France and recently were introduced to oyster farms off Maine and California. Because the water in which they are raised has a heavy iron content, their flavor is sweetly metallic.

Tiny Olympias from northern Washington state are briny and have a fresh crisp taste.

#### Storage tips

The best way to store fresh oysters in their shell is to keep them relatively cool (about 39 degrees F.) This can best be accomplished by filling a cooler with ice and setting a colander or strainer on top and slightly buried into the ice.

Since oysters are alive, under no circumstances should they be kept in a sealed or tied plastic bag or completely closed cooler. If you received them fresh from a reputable dealer, oysters may be kept stored in this way for up to three days.

To serve, scrub the oysters with a wire or plastic brush under cold running water just before shucking. Never allow the oysters to soak in any amount of liquid.

To shuck, wrap a dishcloth around your holding hand so that the oyster can be held firmly and also to protect your hand should the oyster knife slip. With the rounded part of the shell facing down, push the hinged end of the oyster and attempt to push the tip of an oyster knife into it, between the shells. It is not necessary to plunge the knife completely inside the oyster, but just to be able to get the point into the hinged area between the shells.

Now here is how you can tell a pro from a novice. Once the tip of the oyster knife is embedded, simply twist your wrist while holding the knife securely: pretend you're tuning in a stereo. Usually two or three good twists will break the hinge seal.

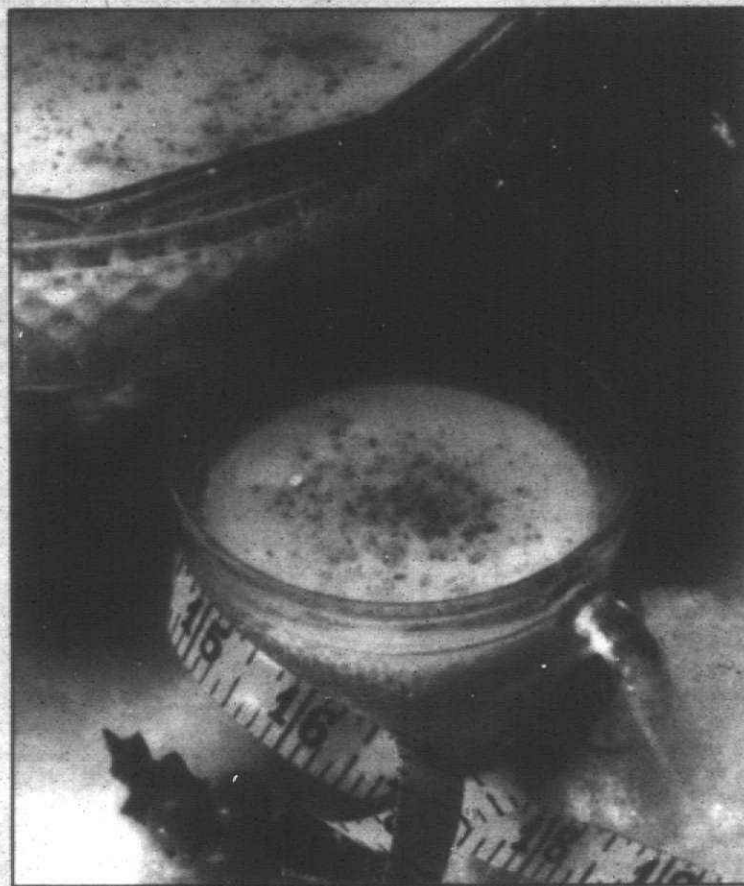

**S**ometimes, the toughest lesson to learn is how to win.

Schoolcraft College's men's basketball team is finding that out now, and thus far this season the Ocelots haven't had many prime, first-hand examples. After Wednesday's 82-72 loss to visiting Highland Park CC, they had just one win in 12 games.

The lesson harvested from that defeat: Control the tempo and control your fate.

SC did neither and lost.

"I told the kids at halftime," SC coach Dave Bogataj said. "I said, 'Guys, you're going at a pace they like. Continue at that pace and they'll like you even more.'"

"We have to control the tempo. We did a great job of it against Henry Ford (a 77-73 loss Dec. 17). It can't be slow, it can't be fast, but we have to control it."

Bogataj's halftime warning came after his Ocelots played a pretty decent first 20 minutes. They trailed by just 48-43 at the break, and then only because the Panthers closed with an 8-3 run.

But Highland Park, which shot a dismal 39 percent (20-of-51) in the first half to SC's 54 percent (18-of-33), got off quickly to start the second, outscoring SC 10-2 over the first four minutes.

That gave the Panthers a 58-45 lead, something the smaller Ocelots could not overcome. The best they could do in the second half was trim the deficit to eight.

Mike Pichan and Mark Cady each scored 13 points for SC. Jason Maschke had 12 and Eric Powell scored 11; Powell led the Ocelot rebounders with 10, while Maschke grabbed nine.

After a solid first-half of shooting, SC cooled off in the second, hitting just 11-of-36 (31 percent). Highland Park was 13-of-37 in the second half (35 percent).

Aaron Turner had 25 points, 10 rebounds and three steals to lead the Panthers.

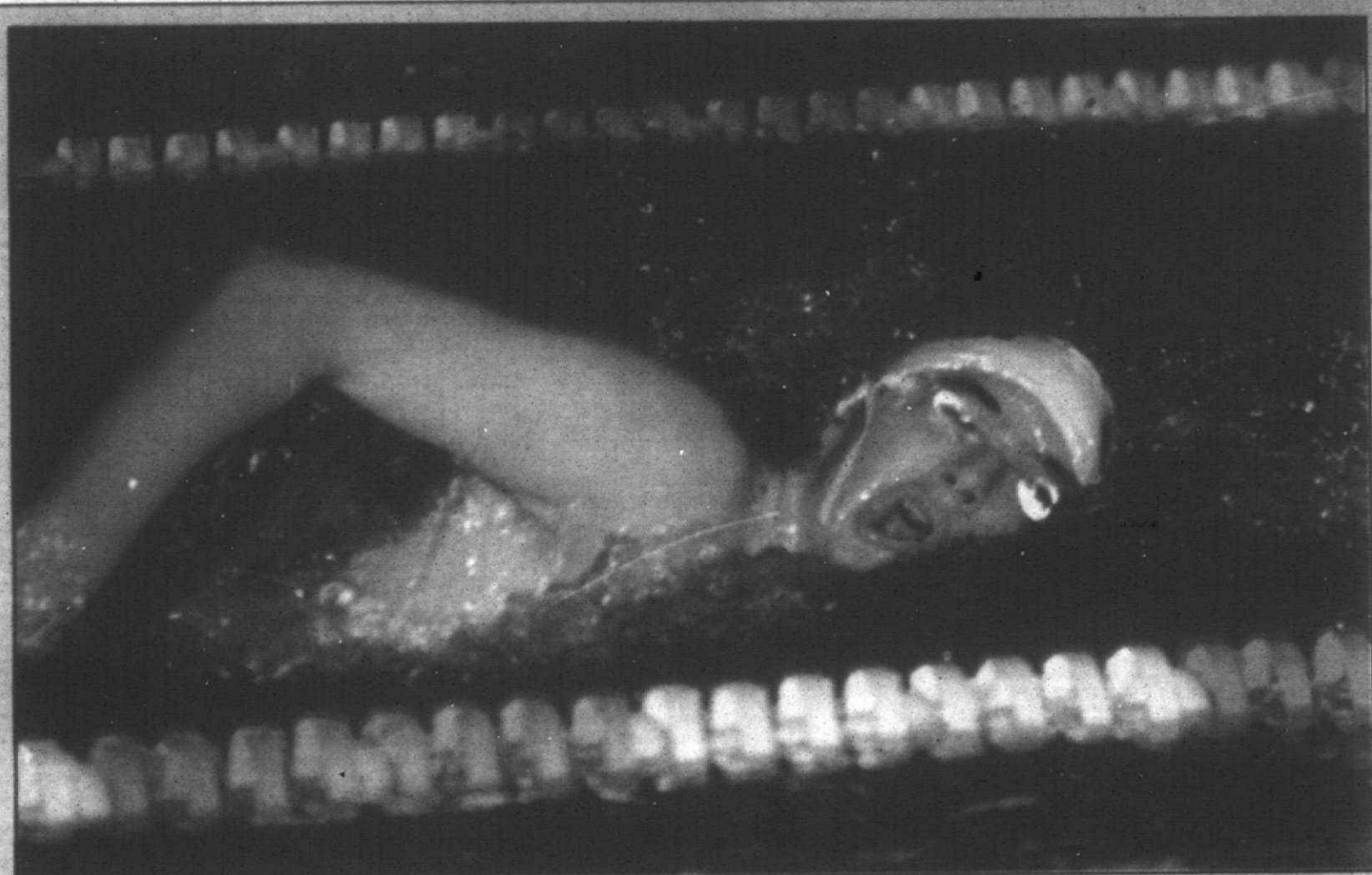

## A stunning start

### Salem swamps Canton in dual opener



**A city rivalry is supposed to be high in energy and emotion, close in score. The Canton-vs.-Salem swim meet Thursday lacked the drama and tension of a close meet, but that could change come February.**

It wasn't much of a dual meet, really. The first of the season for both Plymouth Salem and Plymouth Canton, Thursday's swim meet showed why the Rocks are favored to repeat as champions of the Western Lakes Activities Association. It also showed a Canton team whose peak performances are still in the future. "It's tough to watch your team get the crap beat out of them," said Chiefs' coach Clint Smiley. "But we're better than this. It's just real

tough to go up against the league champ. "Salem's one of the top 10 teams in the state." It certainly looked that way Thursday at Canton — Salem won going away, 134-52. "They've been training real hard," said Salem coach Chuck Olson. "No complaints. "We're ready to roll." Too bad the Rocks will have to wait a couple of weeks to display their talents again in a dual meet. They looked in mid-season shape against Canton, with a pair of double-winners in individual events: Eric Seideman in the 100-yard

(50.10) and 200-yard (1:50.33) freestyle, and Tim Buchanan in the 200 individual medley (2:11.46) and 500 free (5:15.78). Indeed, Salem finished first in every event save one: diving, which the Chiefs swept with Jason Fowler taking first (278.75 points) and Daryl Ballios second (233.25). The rest belonged to the Rocks. Their other individual event winners were Dave Bracht in the 50 free (24.13); Mark Dettling in the 100 butterfly (59.84); John McLenaghan in the 100 backstroke (1:03.14); and Andy Dettling in the 100 breaststroke (1:05.50). The relays sweep started in the 200 medley, with McLenaghan, Andy Dettling, Buchanan and Bracht (1:47.49). Next came Bracht, Marc Levitt, Joe Ervin and Seideman in the 200 free relay (1:38.22), and then Buchanan, Brent Mellis, Matt Martin and McLenaghan in the 400 free relay (3:41.03). Salem's overall power made the

Chiefs' performance look worse than it was. "I was real pleased with the times," said Canton's Smiley. "And I have to be real pleased with our diving." Fowler and Ballios bounced back from a subpar effort in the WLAA Relays meet, in which they finished second and scored more than 50 points less than they did a year earlier. "They both agreed they were not as focused as they should have been (at the Relays meet)," said Smiley of his divers. Smiley called Jason Stirling Canton's "iron man" after he swam the 200 and 500 free, finishing second in the 500 (5:44.17). And he was happy to have two medley relays clock "in the mid-1:50s," he said. And yet, as optimistically as Smiley wants to view his Chiefs, there's no doubting one thing: They won't be able to match the overall power of Salem, although by spring the gap between the two teams should shrink.

## Panthers claw their way past Schoolcraft

A new year, a new beginning. What else can Schoolcraft College's women's basketball team hope for after Wednesday's disappointing effort against Highland Park CC? The Lady Ocelots opened the game by scoring the first 12 points, holding their visitors scoreless for seven minutes. After that, however, SC's will to win gradually began to disintegrate; within three minutes the Lady Panthers had erased the deficit, and five minutes into the second half they led by nine. The final result was a 71-58 Highland Park victory. The loss dropped SC to .500 overall, at 6-6. The Ocelots are 1-3 in the Eastern Conference. "This is the story of our season," SC coach Ed Kavanaugh said afterwards. "We cannot put the ball in the basket." Statistically, Kavanaugh's point is proven. In the second half, the Ocelots converted just 13-of-42 floor shots, a mere 30.9 percent — which explains why Highland Park pulled away so easily. The Panthers made 17-of-32 from the floor (53.1 percent). Sure, size made a difference. Highland Park had 6-foot-3 Kissa Bradley patrolling the middle. "She's the No. 1 junior college center in the country," said Panthers'

coach Leonard Merchant. The Ocelots did nothing to disprove that. Bradley scored inside and out, totalling 24 points — 17 coming in the second half — and 17 rebounds. She also blocked five shots, which intimidated SC's inside game.

And hurt the Ocelots in their most vulnerable spot — confidence. When their shots started bouncing out, they began to hesitate. Throughout the second half, the offense was almost entirely from the perimeter. "We had enough shots to win this

ball game," maintained Kavanaugh. "We're just not finishing. Their confidence level is way down." Identifying the problem is one thing; how to address it is another. "I wish I knew," Kavanaugh said. SC did finish the first half well, overcoming a five-point deficit with a 10-4 run over the last 3:14. Dawn Newlin scored five of her 11 points in that stretch to give SC a 29-28 half-time advantage. However, it should have been greater. The Ocelots missed seven-straight free throws and were just 4-of-12 from the line in the first half. The Panthers' confidence grew as SC's shrunk. They outscored the Ocelots 24-7 in the first nine minutes of the second half, hitting 9-of-14 shots for a 52-36 lead. The deficit never reached single digits after that. Amy Pietila led SC with 13 points; Shelly Sockow (from Plymouth Salem) had 10, with seven rebounds and three steals. Highland Park also got 11 points and 13 rebounds from Rhonda Canty, 10 points and 10 boards from Shawnita Gregory, four points and 10 rebounds from Eurlina Clapton, and nine points and six rebounds from Tamara Owens. The Panthers had a commanding 67-44 advantage in rebounding. Which, combined with SC's poor shooting, spelled disaster for the Ocelots.

# Helsinki Roccamatios offers unconventional AIDS drama

*The Facts Behind the Helsinki Roccamatios*, airing Thursday, Dec. 29, on CBC as part of the Adrienne Clarkson Presents series, takes an unprecedented approach to dramatize a tragedy.

The movie is based on a Yann Martel novella, which is the first-person account of a man whose friend dies from AIDS. It was adapted, produced and directed by Robert Sherrin.

Michael Riley stars as The Author. Michael Mahonen plays his friend, Paul, who gets the disease from a tainted blood transfusion he received years earlier. They are both second-year students at the University of Toronto when the symptoms emerge.

"They just ended up calling my character The Author, because there was no name given, Riley says. "And I think that's kind of appropriate, in a funny way, because he's kind of an everyman kind of a role. Everyone's suffered a loss — everyone's destined to at least."

Paul is soon hospitalized, not yet fully aware of the nightmare that lies ahead. During a hospital visit, the two friends decide to create an ongoing story about a fictional family, which they name the Roccamatios.

"It was much like a play," Riley says. "We had a platform on which everything was shot. If it was a hospital corridor, we'd bring the corridor up on to the platform. If it was a hospital bed or desk, we'd bring that up."

"We shot it in order, which is invaluable for an actor, especially something that has a definite

emotional arc like that piece did," he says. "We could have done it as a play — not that I'd want to. It's a pretty harrowing thing to go through every night at eight o'clock."

The two use major events of the 20th century to devise new chapters in the Roccamatios saga. While they are citing the event, historical footage is seen in the background.

"I think it's ground-breaking television because nothing has ever been seen like this," Riley says. "There's been a lot of great AIDS pieces done, but this isn't strictly about AIDS."

The Roccamatios story is more than just a way to spend time — it reflects the feelings of the two friends as they face the grim reality of the disease.

As Paul's illness worsens, he focuses on darker aspects of history, pushing the family in similarly morbid directions. At one point, he insists Albert Camus was killed in a car accident decades before his actual death, painting a gruesome picture of the incident.

"Like history, you bend it to your own purposes," Riley says. "And Paul, as he gets more and more depressed, the historical events he chooses start to reflect that."

Paul's friend tries to change his mood, offering more inspiring aspects of history for his part of the Roccamatios story. When Paul uses Hitler's rise to power for 1933, The Author focuses on the birth of the Dionne quintuplets in 1934.

When Paul's condition becomes grave, The Author, too, becomes obsessed with history's gloomier images. Through narration, he describes not only the emotions he is

experiencing but how the situation affects Paul's parents as well.

"It was like working on Shakespeare, just in term of the language being used," Riley says. "It was very heightened, kind of poetic language a lot of the time. And the soliloquies the author has are classically structured."

Paul, however, has not completely given up. His wish is to complete 100 years of Roccamatios history before he dies. Therein, Riley says, lies an important message of the drama.

"There is hope, but the hope is at the very, very end," he says. "And it's not a happily-ever-after kind of hope, but it's a real kind of hope — that loss and grief kind of need."

"I don't think it's about the dying; it's about the living and about bereavement and how one has to not circumnavigate it — you kind of have to go through it to the end. I think that's an interesting message."

Riley says he was surprised by the emotional power of the finished film.

"I think the piece, in a strange way, is larger than the sum of its parts," he says. "I couldn't have anticipated how much impact it had until I actually saw it together with the music and the images."

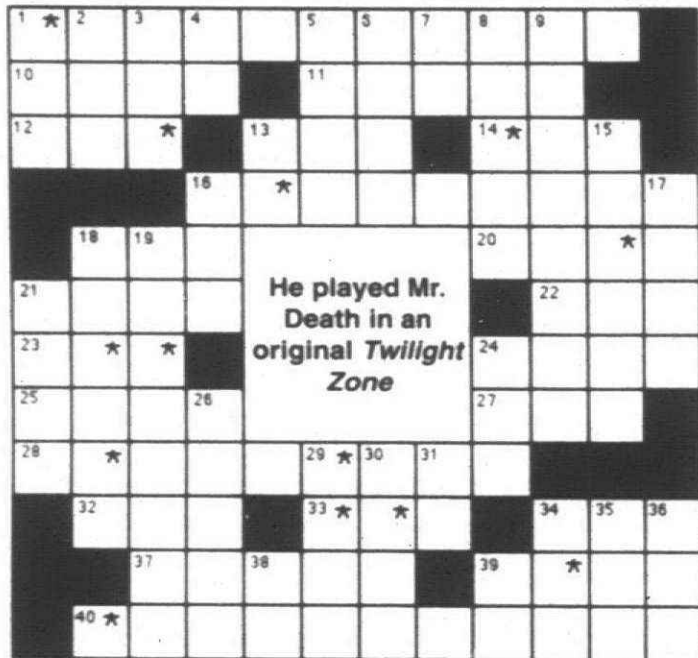

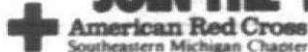

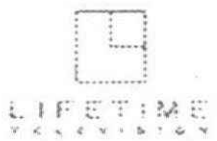
