

Making connections on the campaign trail

Canton's Loren Bennett pushing Republican agenda across state

Loren Bennett buttoned his suit jacket, hopped down three steps from the vehicle to face a brisk fall wind and marched into the Pick-A-Bone restaurant on Six Mile. He personally congratulated Livonia political maven Mary Carter during a surprise 90th birthday party and made a few quick remarks to the Suburban Republican Women's Club before heading out the door under the concerned gaze of

an aide eyeing the day's schedule. Nothing in his gait - or his mood - suggested he'd repeated the routine hundreds of times over the last two months and was spending his 52nd straight day on the

road across Michigan as the Republican nominee for lieutenant governor. Many of those days stretch to 15 and 16 hours in a motor home affectionately dubbed "The Beast."

On Thursday, Bennett's "entourage" included state Rep. Laura Toy, who is running for a seat in the newly carved 6th Senate District; two of her staffers; and driver Ryan Boeskool, 29, who works to the state Republican Party.

The campaign swing through the 6th District - where Toy faces a tough battle

Student hike adds cash

Increased student enrollment in Plymouth-Canton has helped raise the district's fund balance more than \$1.5 million higher than was originally anticipated.

This school year, according to unofficial estimates, 220 additional students were enrolled, 90 more than predicted. Last summer, the district predicted that 130 students would be added to enrollment fig-

This helps paint a brighter fiscal picture than was predicted when the district passed its budget last summer. Plymouth-Canton Interim Superintendent Jim Ryan described the enrollment news as good, but not without its down-

"That's one of the good news problems," Ryan said. "Increased enrollment is a life saver, but it me cautious. It makes me keenly aware that we need to continue long range planning."

Eatery's move is good news for local Goodfellows group

Nancy Spencer was thrilled a couple of weeks ago when she received word that the Canton Goodfellows would be getting a donation when the new Bob Evans Restaurant on Michigan Avenue near Home Depot opens on Monday, Oct. 28.

The donation was to be 50 cents for every customer who came to the restaurant on opening day. Normally, according to a Bob Evans spokeswoman, that amounts to at least \$500.

But last week Spencer, president of Canton Goodfellows, got another call saying there had been a change of plans.

I thought she said they were giving us \$5,000," Spencer said. "But then I started thinking maybe I misunderstood. Maybe she said \$1,000."

Mandy Jordan, spokeswoman for Bob Evans Farms Inc., said Spencer's hearing was just fine.

"Every restaurant we open we donate toward a local organization," she said. 'Typically that's 50 cents for every opening day customer. But this is the 500th restaurant for the entire company. We wanted to do something special.'

That "something special" was decided by corporate headquarters to be a \$5,000 donation.

'That's (the \$5,000 donation) about as special as I can think of. Thank you, God, and thank you, Bob Evans.'

"Our restaurant operations group felt this was a way to recognize our employees on this special occasion and to benefit the local community," Jordan said.


She said it was the largest contribution the company has made in conjunction with a restaurant opening.

Canton man to serve 32 years for 2 murders at trailer park

A man accused of a double murder in Canton in September 2001 has pleaded guilty to two counts of second-

degree murder and one felony firearm count.

Brian William Sewell entered the plea in Wayne County Circuit Court on Wednesday, Oct. 23. He was accused of killing his wife, Nikki Sue Sewell, 30, and Ricky Wayne Jones, 32.

Police discovered the bodies after finding Sewell's truck abandoned near Independence Park on Denton Road between Proctor and Geddes. After finding the truck, officers ran his license plate and then went to

his Mott Road home to check on him.

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There they found Nikki Sewell and Jones dead of multiple gunshot wounds.

On Sept. 19, 2001, Sewell was vears in prison. arrested while on foot on Gotfredson Road south of Ford Road in Washtenaw County. He was unarmed and was apprehended without incident by members of the Canton Police Department's Special Operations Team with assistance from the Washtenaw County Sheriff's Department.

Sewell faces a two-year sentence on the felony firearms charge and 30-50 years for the

\$11.7 million in fund equity. With the increased enrollment, that figure now \$13.2 million, an increase of \$1.5 million.

Estimated expenditures decreased from the budgeted \$126.3 million to \$126 million.

The accounting firm Plante & Moran of Southfield presented the district's audit report during a regular school board meeting Monday. A financial forecast also was presented to the board during the meeting.

"Obviously we're very pleased with the Plante & Moran report," Ryan said. "Everybody wants a clean opinion and to hear good things about finance and operations."

Plymouth-Canton is among a handful of larger metro-Detroit school districts audited under new reporting requirements, featuring:

that she was pleased with the financial audit and forecast. "We're doing pretty darn good for a district with such a miserable foundation

allowance," said Patricia Brand, executive director of business services for Plymouth-Canton. The district's foundation

grant is low compared to neighboring districts, with Bloomfield Hills on the high end at \$11,755 per student, and South Lyon on the low end with \$6,556 per student. Plymouth-Canton's is \$6,825.

"It's going to be imperative to go to Lansing to force (lawmakers) to look at our special circumstances," Mardigian said, referring to the district's low foundation grant.

Plymouth-Canton has not benefited from Proposal A, which took away property tax increases as a source of school revenue. This means growing districts like Plymouth-Canton do not benefit from growth.

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
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

against Westland Democrat Eileen DeHart – was fast-paced but hardly glamorous. Such is political life when you're holding down the Number Two spot on the ticket.

ENERGIZING EXPERIENCE

But Bennett wouldn't have it any other way. The 51-year-old Canton resident and state Senator says Dick Posthumus' decision in August to tap him as a running mate has given him a new perspective on state government and life in Michigan.

"It's been an eye-opener for me," Bennett said as The Beast rolled through western Wayne County. "I always thought life was wonderful but in a small way – my family, my neighborhood. But now I look all over this state and I realize it's not just me.

"I've met wonderful people, seen some great local programs and heard about great hopes and dreams from people all over Michigan. You can't see what's going on here by watching the news, you have to get out there and talk to people."

Of course, Bennett recognizes there are plenty of problems that need attention as well, from the state's teetering economy to preservation of the Great Lakes. That's the major reason he's out on the trail day after day – to convince voters that Posthumus and the Republicans offer better solutions than Democrat Jennifer Granholm.

STILL OPTIMISTIC

His optimism is unfailing, even as most polls show Granholm maintaining a double-digit lead. "I just don't believe it," he said of the surveys. "I don't put stock in the polls. If you did, then Gil Hill would be mayor of Detroit."

Bennett said internal polls within the campaign show

Posthumus trailing slightly. "There are a huge number of people who haven't been paying attention and won't make their minds up until the last couple of days," he said.

Asked if themes like values and integrity, which the Republicans have made a staple of the campaign, resonate with voters, Bennett said they are "sub-issues" that do have an impact. "Most people don't make up their minds on who to support based on just one thing," he said.

Bennett also called Granholm's stand on reparations "a real issue," and not just a trumped-up charge by the Republican Party meant to divide black and white voters. "Look, in Chicago they just passed an ordinance that bans the city from doing business with any companies that have a history of using slave labor – even if it was 200 years ago," he said.

"I don't think it's unreasonable to believe that something like that could be implemented at a state level."

While Thursday's focus was on supporting Toy, Bennett shook his share of hands during stops at the birthday gathering, a Livonia nursing home, Schoolcraft College, Central City Park in Westland and Clarenceville High School. (The evening schedule included a chamber of commerce business mixer in Novi, a Town Hall Meeting in Allen Park and a return to Westland to meet with a local homeowner's association.)

A stop for lunch at Westland's Beaver Creek restaurant was a 50-50 split between nourishment and campaigning as Bennett worked the small room, attempting the delicate task of making an impres-

sion but not interfering with diners.

PERSONAL CONTACT

Back on the motor home, Bennett referred to a study that put the eventual outreach from one personal contact at 85 people. "Of course, they could be saying positive things about you or negative," he said.

The Beast – a Michigan-made CruiseMaster 3400 with 50,000 miles on the odometer (high for a recreational vehicle) and an interior that apparently dates to the Reagan administration – has been Bennett's home away from home since Labor Day. He's been as far north as Calumet at the tip of the Upper Peninsula and as far west as Lake Michigan.

It's hardly anonymous with it's huge red and blue "Posthumus/ Bennett:

Michigan Values, Ready to Lead" signs adorning both sides. People are always honking and waving as they pass, Boeskool said.

They keep a small, running "campaign clock" on board, which on Thursday showed 279 hours to go before the election. Bennett, who's something of a whiz in the kitchen, had jars of his homemade pumpkin butter to distribute as well.

As for lighter moments, there was the time Bennett was standing in the stairwell as the door flew open at 65 mph. The candidate declined to comment for the record on what he said to mark the moment.

Earlier last week they "lent" The Beast to Posthumus, after his campaign motor home broke down.

Then there was the Columbus Day snafu. On a tour of Macomb Township, a local supervisor forgot municipal offices were closed. "We did end up touring the Fire Department and stopping at a couple of restaurants that weren't on the schedule," Bennett said.

Bennett and Boeskool spent Wednesday in the Kalamazoo area. The itinerary included stops at three schools, the Pfizer plant, a radio call-in show and a fund-raiser for a Senate candidate. Bennett hit his front door in Canton around midnight.

PARTNERSHIP

"We have a whole system worked out," Bennett said. "While Ryan's driving I get to rest and when I go in and do an event he can get some sleep."

Bennett calls Boeskool his "coach" and something of a confidant. Boeskool isn't afraid to issue stinging criticism of something he's said from the stump or a gentle pep talk about staying upbeat and on point, according to Bennett.

At the Clarenceville stop, block scheduling was the main topic of conversation between principal David Simowski, Toy and Bennett.

The governor's race drew a mixed reaction from some Clarenceville students during the late-afternoon visit.

"I'm interested, but I don't follow it that much, at least as far as who's running," said senior Matt Tuomi. The 17-year-old Livonia resident said he was most interested in environmental issues like the Great Lakes.

Senior Amy Nestor of Redford has been working against Proposal 4, the state ballot issue that would change the way money from the tobacco settlement is distributed. "It affects me directly because it would take away my (MEAP) scholarship," she said.

It's that kind of give-and-take that makes the grueling hours and extended travel worth-while. Bennett said.

"This is the same as running for township board. It's just on a bigger scale."

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

He said the developers have

been working on the site since the meeting with township officials to resolve the issues.

"There is a light pole to be installed that is on order," Amann said. "Asphalt paving will be completed pending the engineering approval process."

Norman Mackay, a resident of Phase I who spoke at the earlier meeting, told commissioners that there has been "a lot of activity in the past few days."

After the meeting he said residents were taking a wait and see attitude, but it looked like some progress was being made to address their concerns.

Commissioners approved the site plan request, which is for 62 rental units on an eight-acre site north of Cherry Hill Road and east of Lotz.

This program, called the MERIT Award program, pays each graduating student who passes the MEAP test up to \$3,000 (\$2,500 currently and up to \$3,000 starting with the 2004 graduating class) no strings attached towards instate college or vocational programs. About 10-15 percent of the annual tobacco settlement money is used to fund this program.










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2 seats open on education board

With the race for two State Board of Education seats less than two weeks away, candidates are voicing their plans for improved accountability in schools, curriculum standards and the question of autonomy within Michigan schools.

Democratic candidate Elizabeth Bauer said her 40 years of involvement on the front lines of education as a teacher, administrator, and special education advocate would bring a needed dimension to the board.

"We need to maintain high standards for our public education, and the Board's biggest focus should to be to get our state plan in place so that our schools continue to be wellfunded and aren't set up to fail," she said.

Bauer served as executive director of the Michigan Protection & Advocacy Service, Inc., training director the Michigan Department of Mental Health, and as a speech therapist.

State representative and Democratic candidate Nancy Quarles (D-Southfield) said if elected, she would enhance adult and special education services and resources, and develop strategies to improve achievement in underperforming schools.

"A good education is how we get productive citizens," she said. Quarles is in her third term of representing the 36th District in

Oakland County. Prior to election, she also served as an Oakland County commissioner and a teacher.

Republican candidate Michael Warren said he feels his three prior years of experience on the Board would be instrumental in helping bring about the changes the Michigan education system needs. He plans to support an American Freedom Curriculum to ensure that students learn about American civics and history in each grade.

"There are huge gaps in student knowledge of American history, civics and in the founding principles of our republic," Warren said.

He was appointed to the Board in 1999, and served as Board secretary and Chair of Task Force on Embracing the Information Age. He was also the executive director of the **New Common School** Foundation and the secretary of Cornerstone Schools, as well as a former partner of Honigman Miller law firm.




"I am passionate about an emphasis on the importance of early childhood education," Curtin said.



Celebrated restaurant closing after 30 years, but tradition continues

Mention the Golden Mushroom to most any lover of fine food and most assuredly a smile will come to their face as they recall a favorite dish or a special event they celebrated at the renowned Southfield restaurant.

First dates, wedding receptions, anniversaries, birthdays - many milestones have occurred around the tables of the Golden Mushroom.

"We held our wedding reception in the Mushroom Cellar," recalls JoAnn Wolf of West Bloomfield. "The food was perfect and everyone had a great time.'


The couple liked it so much, that they are planning JoAnn's mother's 80th birthday party at the same

location. "My brothers and sisters discussed options and we all agreed that we had to come back to the Mushroom one more time."

After 30 years as a mainstay of fine dining, the Golden Mushroom will close its doors on Jan. 1. Renown for culinary excellence and as a training ground for some of America's finest chefs, the restaurant brought cutting-edge cuisine to metro Detroit.

In 1972, Golden Mushroom owner and president, Reid Ashton, saw the growth potential of the city of Southfield. He purchased a large deli at the corner of 10 Mile and Southfield Roads, remodeled the facility and opened it as a full-service, fine-dining restaurant called the Golden Mushroom.

His combination of casual elegance, 800-selection wine list, and Continental cuisine was an instant hit. Over the years, the Golden Mushroom has been featured in many publications and was rated among the nation's top restaurants. Today, trophies and awards line the

walls of the staircase leading from the dining room into the Mushroom Cellar. Ashton says that the restaurant and its staff have received more culinary awards and acclaim than any other Michigan restaurant.

The decision to close was difficult. Ashton said that he recently signed an agreement to sell the property. "After much deliberation, considering how the events of Sept. 11, 2001 and the economic downturn have negatively affected our business, we decided to sell," Ashton stated.

Since announcing that the restau-

rant will be closing, many friends and past customers have come back to enjoy the Golden Mushroom's cuisine one more time.

And what do they order? "They want our classic dishes, the ones that we're famous for" says Certified Executive Chef Michael Trombley. "They start with Golden Mushroom soup or lobster bisque. Then they have our house salad of field greens, dried cherries, walnuts and bleu

What's hot and what's not in wine now

ecently, we asked Master Sommelier Robert Jones, National Sales Director for Virginia-based importer Kysela Pere et Fils, to

give us his perspective on what's currently hot and what's not in wine.

Thoroughly-American Fran Kysela, founder of the wine import house,

had his focus set on France when he chose a company name some years ago. Over

the years, Kysela has broadened his global view and as Jones indicated, "we represent the hot wine regions today."

Jones marked the Languedoc region of southern France as having wines with the flavor profile American's prefer and offering the biggest bang for the buck currently. "These wines," he said, "are rich with ripe fruit, a kiss of wood and softer tannins.'

Good examples illustrating his description are 2001 Coteaux du Languedoc Domaine de la Brune \$8 (50 percent syrah). Syrah from the northern Rhone Valley of France is about as hot as a wine varietal gets. The 1999 Domaine des Entrefaux Crozes-Hermitage

\$13.50 is 100 percent syrah with an attractive peppery-spice finish.

Personally, we believe wines from the Cotes-du-Rhone region of southern France cannot be beat for value. In the Kysela portfolio, we like 2001 Domaine de la Mordoree \$10. Juicy and generous red fruits lead to a supple, smooth and silky finish in a wine with surprisingly good length at this price.

Staying in the southern Rhone, Chateauneuf-du-Pape continues to offer big mouthfuls of delicious wine in the \$20 range.

A good example is 1999 Vignoble Alain Jaume Chateauneuf-du-Pape \$22 that sports plump flavors of grenache in a stylish rendition.

GREAT STUFF FROM ITALY

Southern Italy and particularly red wines from Sicily are "in." Nero d'Avola is an indigenous grape to the region that's redolent of ripe fruit with nicely balanced acidity. A fun wine in a rather New World style is 1999 Mezzo Giorno Nero d'Avola/Shiraz

"Sangiovese from California," Jones remarked, "is nothing like this variety from Tuscany. The beauty of a Tuscan Chianti Classico (principally sangiovese) is the tart, sour cherry flavors cutting straight through the middle.

It's a wine that begs for food." A good illustration is 1998 Carobbio Chianti Classico \$24.

CONSIDER SPAIN

"Spain is the hottest European wine region of all," Jones suggest-ed. "This country is serious about top quality wines. Some are terrific bargains."

In the bargain category, he cited 2000 Castillo Labastida Rioja \$8, a well-fruited everyday quaff. A big step up in character, which generally means a ramp up in price, is the stunning 1999 Pago de Carraovejas \$24, a blend of 75

GOLDEN MUSHROOM SOUP

occasion.

1/2 cup butter 1/2 cup chopped onion 2/3 cup flour 6 cups good chicken broth, hot 1 small bay leaf 1/8 teaspoon nutmeg 1 tablespoon salt 1/4 cup butter 11/2 pounds fresh mushrooms,

2 egg yolks 1 1/2 cup whipping cream

Melt 1/2 cup butter in a 2 quart heavy bottomed sauce pan (preferably enameled or stainless

washed and sliced finely

steel), add onions and cook slowly until onions are transparent. Add the flour, stir over fire 3 minutes, add the chicken broth and seasonings, whip until all lumps are dissolved.

Bring to boil, simmer slowly, stirring occasionally for 15 minutes, strain.

Heat a good size skillet onmedium. Add 1/4 cup butter and mushrooms.

Cook over high heat until mushrooms turn gray, but do not brown. Add to soup and simmer 10 minutes or more.

Just before serving, heat soup up to boiling point. In a separate bowl, mix yolk with cream. Start adding hot soup, whipping steadily with a wire whisk. When half of soup is added, pour it all back into the remaining soup in

the sauce pan. Do not boil (it will curdle). Serve immediately. Serves 8.

MOREL MUSHROOMS WITH COGNAC AND CREAM

3 ounces whole unsalted butter 8 ounces fresh morel mushrooms I teaspoon finely minced shallots 2 ounces good cognac, or a good brandy

I cup neavy cream I tablespoon sliced chives Salt to taste

Heat a saucepan or skillet on high until the pan is hot, then turn down to medium heat.

Add half of the butter, then fresh morels and cook for a minute or so.

Adjust heat if needed.

Now add shallots and cook until translucent. Be sure to stir constantly to prevent the shallots from sticking.

Add cognac and reduce until dry then add cream and reduce this until thick and it clings to the morels.

Season with salt and pepper to taste and fold in the remainder of the whole butter. Taste and adjust seasoning if needed. Sprinkle with sliced chives.

Serves two.

BACON WRAPPED PHEASANT

2 pheasant breasts - skin on and cleaned of fat 4 strips of smoky bacon

Pheasant spice blend (see recipe below)

Salt and pepper to taste 2 cups chicken stock enriched with trimmings of pheasant and reduced in half by boiling

Sprinkle breast with game spice evenly, then salt and pepper. Wrap pheasant with bacon. Heat a skillet on high until hot, and sear bacon-wrapped pheasant on all sides until brown. Place in the oven at 350° F. until done, (15 minutes, or cooked through). Let rest and slice thinly. Serves 2

The Golden Mushroom features this dish with braised spinach, julienne pears and smoked gouda whipped potatoes.

Escoffier 1/2 teaspoon thyme 3 bay leaves

10 peppercorns

cheese. The wild mushroom sauté and the morel appetizer dishes are also flying out of the kitchen.'

The restaurant is famous for wild game and many people-choose the pheasant orvenison for their main course. Trombley says that these are all signature Golden Mushroom dishes, developed first by Master Chef Milos Cihelka, who was responsible for putting Michigan on the culinary map 25 years ago.

Cihelka came to the Golden Mushroom when Reid Ashton wooed him from the London Chop House in 1976.

He was the first Certified **Executive Chef in Michigan** and in 1981 became the first Master Chef certified in the United States. A highly respected chef worldwide, he has won numerous gold medals in culinary competitions around the world, including a perfect score in the 1984 Culinary Olympics in Germany, and was the manager of Michigan's first

Culinary Team in 1988.

One of Cihelka's most noted accomplishments was the creation of an apprenticeship program at the Golden Mushroom. Many of Michigan's top chefs began their careers in the kitchens on 10 Mile Road. Trombley, was one of the stars of this apprenticeship program.

"It was an eye-opening experience, one I'll never forget," said Trombley.

Although the Golden Mushroom will shut its doors in January, its cuisine will live on through Golden Mushroom Catering, Inc., which provides food service for St. John's Banquet and Convention Center and the Ambassador Hotel (formerly the Michigan Inn), in Southfield. Trombley, will oversee the kitchens of both venues.

MAKE YOUR WINE VOICE HEARD

Earlier this month, the Federal Trade Commission held a threeday workshop to address how state regulations and private business practices have anticom-Detitive effects on E-commerce in nine industry segments, including wine.

Wine industry spokespersons provided testimony in support of consumer choice and direct shipping of wine. The hearing was another positive sign that the Federal government is acknowledging the negative effects of laws restricting free trade and E-commerce.

During the hearings the FTC

indicated that they want to hear directly from consumers frustrated with prohibitions on direct-to-consumer, interstate wine shipments.

Action: By Nov. 10 share your concern about Michigan's ban on direct shipping of wine and its anticompetitive effects on Ecommerce with the FTC by sending an e-mail to: ecompetition@ftc.gov and copy your e mail to

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Celebrate the autumn season with Oktoberfest beers

all is my favorite time of year. Fresh apples, butternut squash and wild game are all on my fall dining table,

usually paired with a malty Oktoberfest lager from my local pub. If you still have yet to try Oktoberfest-

style brew, you are missing a true Jones treat. These beers are usually very well

balanced, smooth, and malty, with a toasted caramel note that is exceptionally pleasing, and they pair extremely well with food. (If no Oktoberfest beer can be

found, you can substitute any hearty red ale).

Fall is also the perfect time for walks in the woods and early afternoon Sunday dinners. One of my favorites is Roast Pork Tenderloin with Fennel and Lager glaze. It is a very simple dish that is hearty and heartwarming, and is a natural compliment to the Oktoberfest-style beers. In the recipe below, the pork tenderloin browns nicely during cooking, playing up the wonderful roasted flavors that actually compliment the beer! You can pair this meat with any vegetable, but I suggest roasted squash and baked apples with cinnamon. It will be a treat to remember.

The crisp fall days spent with family and friends will make for some great memories that

you'll always remember. Take some time to go to the cider mill, to take the kids to pick apples or for a hayride, and, of course, be sure to venture out to one of your local pubs for an Oktoberfest celebration or just to pick up some fresh beer to accompany your Sunday din-

As always, never trust a skinny Brewmaster.

In the following recipe, it's very important to use the pan size the recipe calls for. A smaller pan or one with higher sides (like a roasting pan) will cause pork and fennel to steam, and thus prevent proper browning.

ROAST PORK TENDERLOIN WITH FENNEL AND LAGER GLAZE

(Total preparation and cooking

time 30 minutes) 2 medium bulbs fennel (about 1 pound each), trimmed and cut lengthwise into

with fennel. In small bowl, stir sugar, fennel seeds and remaining 2 teaspoon oil, 1/4 teaspoon salt, and 1/8 teaspoon pepper. Rub fennel-seed mixture all over

Roast pork and fennel, stirring fennel occasionally, 20 to 25 minutes or until meat thermometer inserted into thickest part of pork reaches 155 F. In small bowl, combine parsley and lemon peel; set aside. Pour Lager Glaze over pork. Transfer pork to cutting board; cut into slices. Place sliced pork on large platter; sprinkle with half of parsley and lemon peel mixture. Toss fennel with remaining parsley mixture and arrange around pork. Garnish with herb sprigs.

Makes 4 main-dish servings.

LAGER GLAZE

1 cup red lager or ale 1/2 cup honey 4 tablespoon apple cider vinegar 2 teaspoon cornstarch whisked with 1/4 cup water 1 tablespoon butter

In a small saucepan whisk ale, honey, & vinegar over med high heat 3-5 min. whisk in cornstarch until incorporated and no visible lumps simmer whisking constantly till thickened and finish by whisking in butter. Pour over entire tenderloin. Slice and serve.

Time to eat your fennel - it's loaded with antioxidants

You might not know unless you grew up in Europe, where fennel has been eaten for centuries, but the season for this delicately flavored vegetable has just begun.

Fennel looks something like celery and is occasionally confused with dill. It has a fragrant bulb, celery-like stems, feathery fronds and gold-yellow flowers. It is sometimes called by its Italian name, finocchio, or anise, because of its delicate, licorice taste.

Fennel contains vitamin C and beta carotene, a powerful antioxidant believed to help reduce the risk of cancer, enhance immunity and prevent cataracts.

Both the bulb and stems can be eaten raw or cooked. Their slight anise flavor complements many cooked dishes, especially fish, as well as salads. The leaves are used for garnish or added to a dish just before serving, to enhance flavor. Fennel seed, found in the spice section of markets, is used in both

sweet and savory foods. Look for fennel bulbs with no discoloration, firm stalks and bright green, perky fronds. Cut off the stalks across the top the bulb where it turns white. Discard them or use to flavor sauces and broths. Slice off the root end. Peel away the tough outer layers. Halve the bulb vertically. You will see a triangular, hard core; using a small knife, cut out most of it, leaving enough to keep the layers

attached if roasting or grilling. If serving fennel raw, slice the stantly, until fragrant and slightly

bulb into thin wedges. Prevent discoloring by dropping the slices into a bowl of water and the juice of half a lemon added. Just before serving, drain them, pat dry and use in a mixed green salad.

Or serve them on their own, fanned out on a plate and drizzled with a little olive oil. To add to a casserole or to braise for a side dish, cut the fennel bulb into chunks and cook until tender. To grill or roast, simply lightly coat with an oil spray and sprinkle with salt and pepper beforehand.

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

darker, about 1 to 2 minutes, watching carefully to prevent burning. Remove coriander from pan immediately and transfer to a small bowl.

To the bowl add vinegar, juice, salt, oil and mint. Whisk until well blended. Cover and keep chilled until ready to use. (Dressing may be made I day ahead.)

Cut onion in half crosswise, then slice very thin. Soak separated onion rings in a medium bowl of ice cubes and cold water for 15 minutes.

Meanwhile, remove peel and pith from oranges. Cut oranges crosswise into 1/4-inch thick slices. Cut fennel bulb crosswise into thin slices.

Drain onion rings and pat dry

between paper towels. Arrange fennel, onion and orange alternately in a spiral ring design on 6 plates. Shake or whisk dressing to re-combine and drizzle over salad. Garnish with mint leaves, if desired. Makes 6 servings.

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West Bloomfield resident pens fantasy-history story for children

Pee Wee Mulligan is only six inches tall, but at age 60-plus he's practically ready for retirement.

Don't bet on it, though. After publishing his first book, The Adventures of Pee Wee Mulligan, this year, Raphael Adler, Pee Wee's creator, is just warming up.

He devised 39 Pee Wee stories when he created the fantasy character in 1936 and thought up dozens more since.

Adler, 80, brought Pee Wee Mulligan to life in a few sessions of storytelling, while entertaining rambunctious children in a Catskill Mountains resort. He was 17 and singing for his pay, which he'd send home to his

"They'd have me play classical records at lunch, but the kids would be interfering with the folks eating," said the West Bloomfield author. "They said, keep the kids busy. I kept them busy with Pee Wee stories."

It didn't take long for parents to sit in on the storytelling sessions.

"They'd say, 'don't tell the story until we come out of lunch."

Little Pee Wee's appeal was beginning to grow.

Adler wrote a comic book scenario — pitting Pee Wee against Hitler - and then a cartoon

script. He put the project aside for 60 years while embarking on his own adventures. "I came to

met my wife. Instead of going back to New York, we were married after 10 days."

Windsor and

The couple settled in Detroit where Adler continued a singing career that started when he was 13 years old and singing Yiddish and English songs on a children's radio show in New York.

"I became a singing bartender at my wife's uncle's bar while I was doing some TV work here. My fantasy was that I'd run my own nightclub here."

He sang and made drinks at night and attended classes at Wayne State University during the day.

"At first I thought I'd go into public relations, but then I got into teaching. It all fell into place in the strangest way."

Adler taught English and speech at Berkley High School, while taking graduate level classes in audiology and speech pathology and eventually earning a doctorate degree in brain trauma and neuropsychology.

He retired from Berkley High in 1968, but continued his education career as an adjunct professor at Oakland Community College, where he taught ethics and philosophy — what he calls "rocking chair" courses because few teachers are interested in teaching them.

While teaching part-time, he took a full-time position as director of the speech and hearing clinic at St. Joseph Mercy Hospital in Pontiac where helped stroke patients and brain trauma victims regain their speech.

He stayed until 1984 when his day job began to conflict with his teaching.

"They wanted me to give up the teaching post and I would-

He continued teaching, writing poetry and songs and dusted off his long-languishing Pee Wee Mulligan story five years ago.

"I was talking and joking with one of my neighbors and I said, once upon a time I wrote this story."

He told her a Pee Wee tale

and she made him promise to

put it on paper.

"It took so many different forms. I had a long form and kept sending it out, but no one was interested in that," said Adler, who prefers writing with a pen rather than a computer keyboard. "Then I met some young people who run a film institute. I said, 'look I have this long thing, help me figure out a way to shorten it.'

"They started using it like a movie script. Everything was still too long. That's when I switched to poetry to move it along. I shortened it and came up with new characters."

By 2001, The Magical Adventures of Pee Wee Mulligan was ready for a publisher. 1stBooks, a print-on-demand, eBook publishing company produced the tale earlier this year as a 97-page paperback.

The book tells the story of Mary, who meets the magical Pee Wee after inadvertently freeing him from a book in her grandmother's attic. The pair travel through time to colonial America where they meet Benjamin Franklin and other friendly - and a few menacing – characters.
















Bracket your shots to achieve correct exposure

ave you ever picked up your prints from the lab only to discover to your chagrin that your shots are

you slide shooters, were your pictures from last year's vacation just not up to **Photography** par exposurewise and you don't want to repeat the Nagler problem this

year? Well, a negative can be reprinted and you may possibly get a good print but why take the chance? Slide film is very unforgiving and if your exposures are off the mark, you may be out of luck.

Simple solution: Bracket your shots. Think of bracketing as "photo insurance" because you're bound to get an exposure that is perfect.

Bracketing means taking three shots of the same scene: The first at the actual meter reading, the second at one stop underexposure, and a third at one stop overexposure. You have just "bracketed" the initial exposure to assure you'll get the ideal shot.

Bracketing can be accomplished either with the aperture control, or by adjusting the shutter speed.


With slide film, I would definitely recommend bracketing as described above. With the more forgiving color negative and black and white film, a more experienced photographer need only bracket on the high side, that is, one shot at correct exposure and one shot

Remember, even though you won't get as many pictures out of a roll, film it is still relatively inexpensive and bracketing will assure you'll get that special

Other advantages of bracketing are that you'll often get an acceptable second print or slide you may be able to put to good use. Also, if a negative or slide should ever be damaged, you'll have a backup.

Bracketing your shots makes good sense both at home and when traveling. After all, you take an extra set of clothes or an extra traveler's check just in case. Think of bracketing in the same way. An extra shot or two covers you just in case.


New York Times columnist speaks at Jewish Federation fund-raiser




the Chiefs up 7-0.





"You get into a hole early against them, it's not going to be easy," said Cummings, noting seven starters were missing from his lineup — including his top receiver, Brian Bradley, who injured his knee a week earlier. "But we played them tough. We played tough all year.'

The kickoff return by Wilcox, who has been a demon the last couple of weeks on special teams (he returned two punts for TDs against Northville Oct. 18), couldn't have been worse for Salem. It was going to be tough for the Rocks to get their offense in sync in the monsoon-like weather, particularly with so many starters out.

But to fall behind by two touchdowns before the first quarter was half over made the task far more difficult.

"You know, the two best teams we played all year -(Westland) John Glenn and Canton - we had to play in a downpour," said Cummings.

Considering the superior speed the Chiefs showed on offense, a dry field may have made the situation worse for Salem. The Rocks did bottle up Canton's runs between the tackles rather effectively, but once the Chiefs started taking

the ball outside, the outcome was never in doubt.

"They weren't going to let us do what we wanted to do," said Baechler. "But our quarterback had a good game on the outside."

Indeed Dave Nicoloff did. In the first half alone, the senior carried the ball four times and on his first three, he scored touchdowns. Nicoloff had 111 rushing yards in the first half. Making matters worse, the Rocks suffered two interceptions and a lost fumble in the opening half. They had four turnovers for the game. Canton didn't have any.

Mike Kerul plunged in from a yard out and, even though the extra-point kick missed, Salem was on the board, trailing 14-6.


But after that, the Chiefs reigned supreme. On their





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Folic acid

Both men and women should increase their intake of folic acid to help reduce the risk of heart disease and stroke.

Researchers at the University of Ulster in Belfast, Ireland, found folic acid, a B vitamin also know as folate, and other B vitamins prevent the accumulation of high levels of homocystein, a risk factor in heart disease and stroke. The risk of high homocystein is similar to the risk of high cholesterol. While folic acid breaks down levels of homocystein, three other B vitamins - vitamin B-12, vitamin B-6, and riboflavin - also prevent its buildup.

All adult men and women should consume 400 mcg of folate each day. Pregnant women need 600 mcg per day. Folic acid is needed before a woman becomes pregnant to help prevent neural tube birth defects.

B vitamins can be found abundantly in enriched grain-based foods, including bread, crackers, bagels, English muffins, flour, pasta, rice, and fortified cereals. Other sources of folate include legumes, yeast, dark green leafy vegetables, and some fruits.

Need motivation?

A personal trainer just may be the answer

Are you tired of trying to motivate yourself to workout? Have you tried different diets and exercise programs that just weren't giving you the results you wanted? Hiring a personal trainer might be what you need to become educated on the proper workout program and achieve the results you are striving for.

Regardless of age, everyone can benefit. Personal trainers can be great assets to your health and wellness. Some people choose not to hire one because it is not in their budget, or they think they can meet their goals on their own.

Before you think you cannot afford it or can get the same results by yourself, consider the benefits of working with these health professionals. They can assist with performing the proper technique of lifting weights or the proper amount of time or exertion for cardiovascular exercise and the right nutritional choices.

MAXIMUM BENEFIT

"There are times when I see people exercising in the fitness center," said Teresa Maguran, a personal trainer at the Livonia Family YMCA. "It is great to see them in there, but they may not realize they are not performing the exercise to get maximum benefit, or even to avoid injury. That is where I can help them."

Personal trainers can also help you set realistic goals according to your schedule and lifestyle, and help motivate. They can educate you on the importance of maintaining a healthy lifestyle so you stay in shape and stay at your target weight without gaining it back.

"I like to educate my clients," said Tom Arbaugh, personal trainer at the Summit in Canton. "If they have not learned what they can do on their own to maintain a safe and effective workout program in the future, then I have not done my job."


Whether you don't know much about exercise, or are an individual with medical concerns, an athlete, or completing your rehabilitation with a physical therapist, personal trainers can work with you. Most personal trainers offer a consultation first so you can get to know each other, assess your current fitness level and establish realistic goals.

GOOD COMMUNICATORS

Being a good listener and being able to communicate are essential skills a personal trainer should have. Your personalities should be compatible to get the most out of the time spent together.

"Personalities should be like yin and yang," said Peter Nielson of Nielson's Town Center Health Club in Southfield. "It is important that the personal trainer listen to what the client wants to accomplish, and be able to motivate him or her in an animated, non-threatening way."

A good trainer not only creates a positive relationship with the client, but also with his or her doctor, or physical therapist if there are medical concerns.

Leisa Golden of Northville has been working with Chris Jeffries, a personal trainer from Northville's Water Wheel Health Club for six months, two days per week. She has lost 12 pounds, and more importantly, reduced her body fat percentage by 10 percent.

"I had been working out for a long time, but I was really surprised how much I did not know before I started working with Chris. He is very knowledgeable, and he makes it fun.'

Working with a personal trainer isn't always just using weights or the treadmill. It can involve strength and flexibility training with therapy balls, medicine balls and fun cardiovascular exercises inside and outside of the gym. A trainer should customize your workout.

GOOD NUTRITION

Jeffries has educated Golden on the importance of the nutritional component of her program.

"I didn't realize I was not eating the right foods. I wasn't eating much and I thought I was eating healthy, but I was not losing weight" she said. "Chris has really been a great resource for me."

Along with being great motivators, having good communication skills, and knowledge of nutrition and exercise, personal trainers should have a CPR certification, be nationally certified and have at least a few years of experience in the field. Some nationally recognized certifications are American Council on Exercise (ACE), National Strength and Conditioning

Association (NSCA), American College of Sports Medicine (ACSM), National Association of Sports Medicine (NASM), and Aerobics and Fitness Association of America (AFAA). Personal Trainers are also required to take a specified number of continuing education credits per year to maintain their certification, so they are frequently learning new material.

If you work with someone who also has a bachelor degree in exercise science, physiology, kinesiology or physical education, it is preferable, but not ultimately

Experience, knowledge, attention to safety and ability to get you moving are key factors in choosing a personal trainer.

"A trainer can have a degree, but not the skills or experience to help you achieve your goals. However, on the same token, he or she could be without the degree and be very motivating, but not have all the knowledge to design a safe and effective workout specific to your needs," said Nielson.

SEEK REFERENCES

Asking the trainer for references is encouraged. Obtaining testimonies of current or past clients is worthwhile. Ask around at the fitness center where you belong to find out who is recommended. Do your research and sign up for a consultation (most are free) to get to know

the trainers before you hire one. Some trainers or fitness centers may offer a few free sessions with the club membership. Prices can range from \$25-

\$200 per one-hour session depending on the trainer or club, whether the trainer works with you in the fitness center, or at your home. Working with a trainer in your home can be more costly. Average cost in a fitness center is most likely between \$30-\$60 per one-hour session.

Location is important, so call around to health facilities near your work or home, or ask to set up an appointment with a trainer at your cur ter if you already belong.

You may even want to purchase two to three sessions first, before purchasing a package to see if your personalities are compatible, but be sure choose another trainer if it doesn't work out.

Don't feel intimidated by the thought of working with a personal trainer. A good health and fitness professional will be patient, encouraging and educational. If you want to improve your health and well-being, just like working out on your own, it takes time and commitment to change your lifestyle. Don't expect results overnight. It takes at least six weeks to start seeing the benefits of your effort.

You can spend \$30-\$50 easily in one hour dining out, a couple times a week. Save the money and spend it on bettering yourself. You may be able to get fit on ! your own, but the questions is "Have vou?" Also, when was the last time you felt that good? Mushrooms may help reduce breast cancer risk

Preliminary studies conducted by the Beckman Research Institute of the City of Hope in California suggest that the humble white button mushroom may play an important new role in treating or reducing the risk of breast cancer in postmenopausal women.

City of Hope, a National Cancer Institute-designated Comprehensive Cancer Center, is a leading research and treatment center for cancer.

Researchers at the City of Hope, under the leadership of Dr. Shiuan Chen, a scientist in the department of immunology, have found that a substance in white mushrooms appears to suppress breast cell proliferation by reducing the level of estrogen, a hormone that can stimulate the development of breast cancer. The substance, yet to identified, appears to inhibit the activity of the enzyme aromatase, involved in the production of estrogen.

THE ROLE OF AROMATASE INHIBITORS

Estrogen is a hormone necessary for childbearing and bone and heart health in women, but lifetime exposure to estrogen may influence breast cancer risk. After menopause, the ovaries no longer produce estrogen; instead, the enzyme aromatase converts adrenal androgens into estrogen. Aromatase inhibitors limit the amount of estrogen being produced, thereby making less estrogen available to stimulate growth of estrogen-responsive breast cancer cells.

In vitro aromatase inhibition studies were performed by City of Hope researchers using mushroom extract prepared from fresh white mushrooms. A 50 percent inhibition of aromatase activity was achieved. Portabella and crimini mushroom

extract also demonstrated significant anti-aromatase effects. The researchers are now in the process of identifying the specific substance or substances in mushrooms that suppress aromatase.

"Knowing the substances in mushrooms that slow d3wn the production of estrogen could enable physicians to make dietary recommendations that have the potential for affecting the development of breast cancer," said Dr. Chen. "Mushrooms re not a miracle cure, but with cancer, treatment advances are typically small, adding up over time to make significant progress in our battle against this dread

Meaty mushrooms are a welcome addition to any diet, having few calories (virtually fat free and low in carbohydrate) and contributing B-complex vitamins and essential minerals, including selenium, though to reduce prostate cancer risk.

For thousands of years, Eastern cultures have revered mushrooms as both food and medicine. Eastern tradition has it that there are more than 50 species with healing properties. Studies conducted over the past 30 years - mostly in Asia - have provided data suggesting that mushrooms or substances extracted from mushrooms may aid in the treatment of certain types of cancer, boost the immune system and reduce risk of coronary heart disease. Much of this research has focused on shiitake and maitake mushrooms. The City of Hope study is one of the first to focus on white

Mushrooms are exciting interest in other quarters, as well. Cancer Research UK, a private cancer research organization in England, has just published Medicinal mushrooms: their therapeutic properties and current medical usage with special emphasis on cancer treatments, the most comprehensive review to date of the use of medicinal mushrooms in Japan, China and Korea. Many of the studies cited in the 250-page report focus on the ability of purified isolates - especially the beta-glucans and other polysaccharides - to act as antitumor agents and immune system enhancers. The Cancer Research UK report also reports research suggesting that medicinal mushrooms may also help

Almonds fight cholesterol

Almonds significantly lowered bad cholesterol levels in a study of people with high cholesterol reported in an August issue of Circulation: Journal of the American

Heart Association. Canadian researchers conducted the study, funded by The Almond Board of California and the Canadian government, to determine whether almonds can help reduce heart disease risk by lowering high cholesterol and at what consumption level.

Some previous research has suggested that nut consumption reduces the risk of coronary heart disease. Because previous research has suggested that eating more nuts increases calories, nuts generally are not recommended for people who need to restrict calories.

Twenty-seven patients with high cholesterol (15 men and 12 postmenopausal women, average age 64) completed the three-phase study. Their average total cholesterol level was 260 milligrams per deciliter (mg/dL) at baseline.

Three one-month diets were undertaken. For one 74 grams), which represented for the full dose by the fourth

a little less than one quarter of their total daily caloric intake. For one month they took a half dose of almonds (average 37 grams), described as a "handful" of almonds. In the last month, they ate a low-saturated fat, wholewheat muffin as a daily snack.

The muffin snack served as the control diet because it had about the same amount of calories, protein and saturated and polyunsaturated fats, explains lead author Dr. David J. A. Jenkins, director at the Clinical Nutrition and Risk Factor Modification Center, St. Michael's Hospital, Toronto.

Researchers measured cholesterol levels, blood pressure and weight in the subjects. They found that patients reduced their low-density (LDL, or "bad" cholesterol) an average 4.4 percent with the half portion of almonds and 9.4 percent with the full portion.

"We were quite impressed," says Jenkins. "If you look at the ratio of LDL to HDL (high-density lipoprotein, the "good" cholesterol), the month each participant ate a reduction was 7.8 percent for full dose of almonds (average the half dose and 12 percent

week. That ratio is very important in assessing cardiovascular risk.'


The patients' cholesterol levels did not significantly drop after the muffin phase.

Jenkins says that practitioners should encourage patients to eat almonds as part of a healthy balanced diet as long as they are natural or "dry roasted" without added oils or salts.

Nuts do not have cholesterol and are a good source of protein, according to the American Heart Association. However, the association stressed that the potential benefits of nuts may be negated if they are added rather than substituted for other foods in the diet. While nuts and seeds tend to be very high in fat and calories, most of the fat is polyunsaturated or monounsaturated (e.g. almonds, pecans, wal-

Metro Detroit area ranks 15th in urban sprawl study

(AP) - People flocked inland from Pacific coastal communities to more affordable homes in the Riverside-San Bernardino area of southern California over the past two decades. Businesses followed.

That growth propelled the Riverside-San Bernardino metropolitan area to become the most sprawling metro region in the country, according to a study released recently by Smart Growth America.

The group promotes the protection of open space, neighborhood revitalization, affordable housing and more transportation options.

The next two areas on the list are both in North Carolina: Greensboro-Winston Salem-High Point and Raleigh-Durham.

Another southern metropolis, Atlanta, is the hub of the fourth most sprawling area.

Detroit ranked as the 15th most sprawling of 83 metro areas measured by Smart Growth America. The Building Industry Association of Southeastern Michigan has keyed on Smart Growth issues in recent years.

The only Northeastern area in the top 10 of Smart Growth's rankings is the Bridgeport-Stamford-Norwalk-Danbury area of Connecticut, home to many suburban commuters to New York City.

More sprawling metro areas tend to have more fatal traffic accidents and worse pollution, in large part because of an increased reliance on cars to get to work and do errands, the report said.

People drive more miles and mass transit options are often limited.

"People define sprawl and smart growth in a lot of different ways and we want to

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
bring rigor to the debate," said Don Chen, Smart Growth's executive director. "What we hope people will gain is a better understanding of how sprawl affects peoples' quality of life."

The report ranked areas by population and housing density; the mix of homes, iobs and services; the availability and use of town centers or downtowns; and the

focus on reviving abandoned properties and neglected communities, create places where homes and businesses are in close proximity and encourage development in already built-up areas.

It's super easy to see why the Ford Crown Victoria has become the car of choice for most police departments.

Not only is the Crown Vic comfortable, it's also got a lot of room. I mean head room, leg room, hip room, shoulder room, room, room, room. There's actually 132 cubic feet of interior room in there.


I think you can actually live in the car. The new police version is called the Interceptor.

In reality, however, peek inside a fully outfitted police cruiser (rear cage, computer, rifle rack, ticket book, report portfolio and all the other stuff) and there isn't all that much room anymore.

But for you and me, there's more than plenty. Interior space and comfort is at a premium. Front seats are bench style, which suits me fine. Both driver and passenger can enjoy an 8-way power seat. You'll easily seat six without a problem. And with four doors that open very wide, you'll enter and exit the Crown Vic with ease.

There's also a lot of cargo room in the trunk - a whopping 20.6 cubic feet of storage space. The way the trunk lid is configured, you'll only have a 26.6-inch liftover height so you can put all your worldly belongings in there. There's an optional trunk organizer that you would be well advised to pick.

The Crown Vic tested this week was an LX model with a cloth interior. You can also choose the LX Sport model. Floor mats are standard.

Especially enjoyable was the illuminated entry system. It has automatic on/off headlights and dual sun visors. Exterior side mirrors are heated for those really cold mornings that are ahead of us here in Michigan.

The steering wheel has built in audio and climate controls. Up ahead is larger-thanlife electronic instrumentation that stretches across the front panel. Something perfect for the height challenged - power adjustable pedal.

Like I said, the ride is extremely smooth and you could plan a cross country trip with this vehicle without a worry. And with the optional handling and performance package, you really won't have a worry.

You won't hear any road noise either. The Crown Vic is a rear-wheel-drive vehicle and has a suspension that should be on every Ford vehicle. There's speed-sensitive variable-assist power steering as well.

The Crown Vic tested was outfitted with a 4.6-liter overhead cam sequential fuel injected V8 engine that gives you 235 horses under the hood.

It's also outfitted with a fail-safe cooling system that protects the engine - even when it doesn't have any coolant in it. It's also got a dual exhaust system.

All the safety issues are taken care of, too. Two years ago, the Crown Victoria was awarded a five-star frontal crash test rating for front passengers in the U.S. government's crash test. Five stars is the highest, by the way.


Its personal Safety System adjust deployment of the airbags based on data transmitted to the car's computer during the first milliseconds of a collision. Front outboard seat belt pretentioners activated even before the airbags ignite.

The Crown Vic is also outfitted with an anti-lock braking system, and as an option, you could get an all-speed traction control system. In the rear trunk you'll find a florescent release handle, just in case a kid - or you - get locked in the trunk.

I don't care too much for the styling of the Crown Victoria, but there really isn't too much you can do with a vehicle that large to make it pretty or more sport. Besides, most cops probably wouldn't drive something "pretty," right?

I liked my week in the Crown Vic. The comfort issues alone were so pleasing that I would recommend it to anyone that needs a people-hauler with a no-nonsense attitude. Go take a look.
