

Rule the Deck rules the pack in Rainbow Silver Cup

Rule The Deck never gave her eight foes a fighting chance in the second running of the \$150,385 Rainbow Silver Cup at Ruidoso Downs on Sunday, June 20.

The mare threw a hammerlock on her competitors on the first jump of the 440-yard journey.

Unable to catch their breath, these eight enemies of Rule The Deck could do nothing but scramble for secondary positions in the prestige sprint tailored exclusively for four-year-olds.

Rule The Deck, owned by Dirk Jones of Lubbock, Texas, racked up her seventh straight victory, and also logged the most important win of her career. The win was worth \$75,192.

The mare's headwind clocking of 21.78 seconds set a seasonal record, knocking a few ticks off the 21.81 standard Rule The Deck had set a week earlier in the Silver Cup trials.

The victory margin was three-fourths lengths. Jack Wallace, as usual, got the riding assignment from trainer R. D. Hay. The outcome clearly vindicated Wallace's judgment. Earlier in the week, he'd said: "This mare is sharp and ready. She's going to run a strong race."

After the Silver Cup triumph, Wallace

said: "This is the best she's been. She seems to be getting better every year and this is her third year of racing."

Wallace added: "She's one of the greatest horses I've ever ridden." But he quickly corrected himself: "No, she's probably the greatest."

Asked to recount the Silver Cup victory, Wallace responded this way: "She hesitated on the first jump, but three jumps out I think she made the lead and we didn't lose it."

Although Rule The Deck won with relative ease, the track condition and Rule The Deck's rail post position had concerned owner Jones. "We would have preferred the outside, but there was nothing we could do about it," he said. "When it started raining (early in the afternoon), I was worried to death. I just feel fortunate we won."

The track, listed as fast early in the program, was downgraded to good following some heavy (but not lengthy) rains. When it came time to run the Silver Cup, the track was again listed as fast.

Jones went on: "She got a bad bump out of the gate. But then she came and got it. We knew it was between us and the black horse (Lucks Gay Chic)."

Rule The Deck has now won eight of her last nine starts. The only non-winning effort was running third, beaten only a neck by Higheasterjet in last August's \$1 million All-American Derby at Ruidoso Downs. The win was her third this year and the victory slice boosted her 1982 bankroll up to \$78,732. Last year, she pulled in \$177,672 with a handsome record of 8-1-1 from 13 starts.

Although the Silver Cup was Rule The Deck's biggest victory, it wasn't her biggest payday at the races. That came with that third in the All-American Derby, which provided a check for \$82,000.

The Silver Cup was viewed by 4,704 patrons, who favored Lucks Gay Chic and put a 4-5 price on the valuable property owned by the Travis Ranch of Norman, Oklahoma. But Lucks Gay Chic, who had clear sailing all the way from the outside post, was thoroughly outlegged by Rule The Deck.

Baby Hold On, a mare owned by Gerald and Darlene Blue of Amarillo, Texas, finished third in a game effort. She ended up a half-length behind Lucks Gay Chic, running as a 13-1 outsider.

Rule The Deck, a Scout Leader mare out of Mar Deck, handed out betting returns of

\$5.20, \$2.60, \$2.40. Lucks Gay Chic refunded \$2.60 and \$2.20. The runnerup slot was worth \$25,565. Baby Hold On collected \$15,038 and returned a \$3.20 show price.

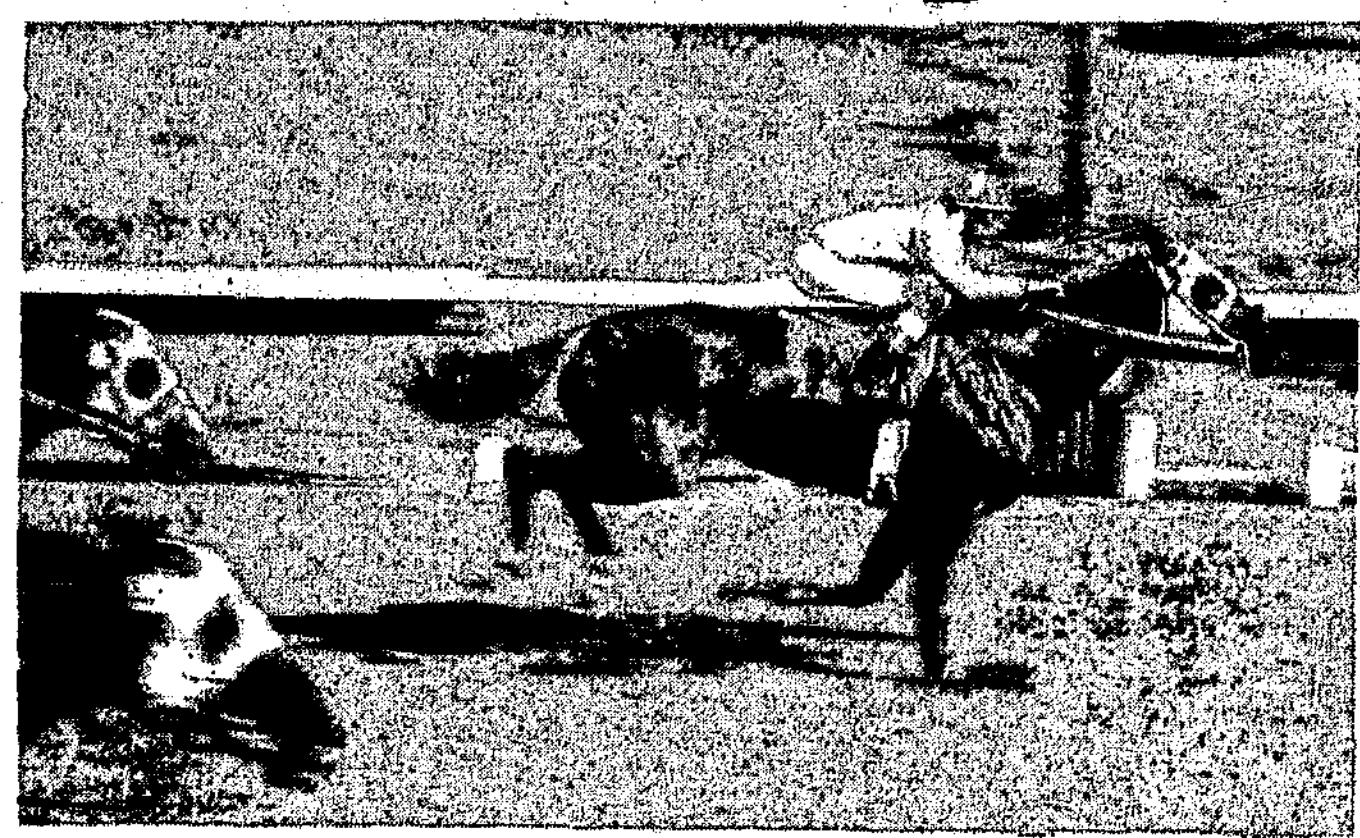

The Silver Cup turned into a cut-and-dried affair, with Rule The Deck grabbing an early foothold and steadily tightening her grip. After about 100 yards, the outcome looked fairly certain.

At the half-way point, Rule The Deck surged ahead commandingly. In the last 50 yards, Lucks Gay Chic was making obvious headway, but never managed to offer a serious challenge.

Baby Hold On, who had broken alertly to take second, was forced to concede to Lucks Gay Chic in the final stages.

Lucks Gay Chic was ridden by Jacky Martin. Hugh Tucker does the training. The pilot on Baby Hold On was Jerry

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REVENUE FROM TRACK TO BE DISCUSSED

Downs officials to Santa Fe

Ruidoso Downs mayor J. C. Day and village trustees are scheduled to meet with the secretary of the Taxation and Revenue Department in Santa Fe Tuesday to discuss possible ways the village can receive more revenue from Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

The meeting was arranged by Senator Charlie Lee, who contacted Day after reading in the May 27 issue of The News that the mayor was upset about the amount of revenue the village receives from the track.

Lee said Thursday that he is working on developing a bill, to present to the Legislature during its January session,

which would allow the village to get some tax revenue from concessions at the track. He said such a bill would probably be a temporary measure, but he also hopes to introduce legislation that would establish a recreational tax.

This tax could benefit several small communities in the state, including Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs, by establishing a tax on certain services provided for recreational purposes.

Lee said the recreational tax idea would be "not so hard to sell" to the Legislature because it would benefit more than one municipality.

He indicated that it is unlikely the Legislature would agree to release any gross receipts tax funds it receives from

the race track to the village of Ruidoso Downs.

"The state is very jealous about gross receipts as a whole," he said. A lot of people in the state government feel revenue from oil and gas is on the decline due to decreasing production, he explained, so they feel the state will need to rely on gross receipts tax income.

"They don't want to turn loose of any part of the tax at this time," Lee reported.

Day had complained at the May 24 trustees meeting that Ruidoso Downs is not getting its "fair share" of the revenues from the race track, due to legislation which exempts the track from paying gross receipts taxes to the village. He reported that the village does receive some gross receipts tax from the Jockey

Club, but he did not know how much.

Lee said that he discovered after researching the matter in Santa Fe that Ruidoso Downs does not, in fact, receive any money from the track from gross receipts taxes nor from a business license fee.

"They do have a real problem," Lee admitted. He said he understands that the village does not have sufficient money to operate on and is in need of additional revenues fast.

He said he and the secretary of the Taxation and Revenue Department feel the best recourse is to attempt to get gross receipts taxes from concession stands at the track. The village and state officials will discuss this possibility and other ideas on the matter at the meeting Tuesday.

Concern over man-caused fires told

Ollie Cuddy, Ruidoso fire prevention officer, Thursday relayed to members of ComFIRE (Committee for Insuring Ruidoso's Environment) his concern regarding a high number of man-caused fires in recent months.

At the committee's regular monthly meeting, Cuddy suggested that the village is "going to have to do something (about) these fires."

He referred to two small grass fires Tuesday that he said were caused by children playing with matches. The fires occurred within one hour and were located only 20 yards apart.

Following those fires, which burned two small patches of grass surrounded by residences at the corner of Second and D Streets, the Fire Department issued a message on suspiciously caused fires.

The message states that fires caused by negligence or intentionally set will be prosecuted to the full extent of the law.

Adults who are caught in connection with a suspicious fire will be cited into court, Cuddy said, and juveniles will be referred to the juvenile probation office.

After the Tuesday fires, Cuddy noted that the penalty for being convicted of causing a fire is a maximum \$300 fine or 90 days in jail, or both.

When asked how many fires have been man-caused in past months, Cuddy indicated that the number is high, but he was

content. The pieces of wood reflect the dryness of the most prevalent small diameter fuels, he noted.

The observations are fed into a computer, Makowski said, and, from the readout, the daily fire danger level is set.

In other matters, ComFIRE also discussed problems of pine needle buildup. People who allow pine needles to accumulate on their property can be cited for allowing a fire hazard to persist, Cuddy indicated.

The fire prevention officer recently announced that the village will no longer empty the needles from dumpsters. Persons are permitted though, to dispose of needles free of charge at the Fort Stanton landfill.

ComFIRE chairman Rich Seeley said he thinks it is unfair to cite people if the village refuses to pick up the needles.

"How can you prosecute if the city refuses to pick up pine needles?" he asked.

Seeley suggested the committee recommend that the village purchase a trash compactor for disposal of the needles.

Seeley also reiterated his criticism of a new village ordinance that prohibits use of untreated wood shingles, known as cedar shakes, as roofing material for new construction.

At the May ComFIRE meeting, he leveled criticism on the ordinance because the treated shingles, which are impregnated with a fire retardant, cost as much as three times more than untreated shingles.

He also questioned the ban as a means of fire prevention.

He also noted his concern that insurance will not cover costs of replacing untreated shakes with treated shakes on a damaged roof. Under the ordinance, if 50 percent of a roof is damaged and the shingles must be replaced, the owner must replace the entire roof with treated shingles.

Thursday, he mentioned that insurance companies will pay only for replacement of "like kind a quality" materials. He explained that means owners will receive from insurance companies only that amount which the insured material would cost to replace.

In other business, ComFIRE:

—Heard from police chief Richard Swenor that the Police Department has been looking into getting a 911 emergency call service for Ruidoso. He said the village phone system may be ready to accommodate the service as early as next spring.

—Was asked by Swenor to lend its full support to the July 6 election on the water bond issue. He asked the committee to do all it can to keep the public abreast of the issue.

—Heard from Cuddy that village manager Jim Hine has received notice from a trucking company in El Paso that it will reimburse the village for costs incurred on a cleanup of a gas spill that occurred April 6 in downtown Ruidoso. Cuddy said Whitfield Tank Lines has agreed to pay the full \$4,500 cost for the cleanup.

Airport group meeting cattlemen

The Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) meets today with the New Mexico Cattle Growers Association in Las Vegas to present its case regarding the location of a regional airport on Fort Stanton Mesa.

SBAC has been embroiled in a conflict for more than six years with New Mexico State University (NMSU) regarding a proposed airport site on land that NMSU uses for research.

The university leases over 26,000 acres on the mesa from the Bureau of Land Management. NMSU refuses to relinquish about 600 acres for the airport, because, it contends, an airport would cause scientists to abandon long-term experiments.

SBAC chairman Fred Heckman said Friday members of the commission will present a map of the Fort Stanton site to the Public Lands Committee of the association. He said the map portrays the relative size of the airport to land leased by NMSU.

The Cattle Growers Association is holding its quarterly meeting in Las Vegas this week.

State Senator Charlie Lee in May proposed the meeting after scientists studying the mesa declined to listen to SBAC's case. A National Academy of Sciences (NAS) team assigned to evaluate the research for

the Department of the Interior (DOI) was in the area May 6 to inspect the site. DOI plans to use the evaluation to determine if an airport and the research can coexist.

The study group had scheduled to meet SBAC at the time, but the scientists failed to appear for the meeting.

Lee, who was at the May meeting to show his support for the airport, advised the commission to take its case directly to state livestock and agricultural groups. He indicated the commission should inquire if the groups have derived benefits from the Fort Stanton research.

Friday, the senator reiterated his position.

"There's been a lot of misunderstanding (concerning SBAC's proposal)," Lee said. "They (SBAC) should go talk with the allies of the university and get their input into it."

Lee, who previously opposed the airport when he was president of the Cattle Growers six years ago, thinks the organization will now favor SBAC's proposal. He said in May that the university should have completed some of its research on the mesa, and he that felt NMSU could now make adjustments for the airport.

"I feel real optimistic (about today's meeting)," he added. "I think they (Cattle Growers) will be sympathetic."

Motorcycle Festival may have problem with site ownership

Planning for the September 29 through October 2 Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival by the Ruidoso Business Association (RBA) continues despite potential obstacles.

Concern about the availability of the 12-acre festival site, located between the Villa Inn and the Holiday Inn, arose again at Thursday's RBA meeting.

Jim O'Leary of Vista Investments in El Paso, Texas—and former owner of the Holiday Inn—owns nine acres of the land on which festival planners want to hold the event. However, O'Leary and business partner John Reddington are trying to sell the land.

The other three acres adjacent to the Holiday Inn are owned by the Holiday Inn, which presents no problem to motorcycle festival planners, O'Leary mentioned that his first objective is to sell the nine acres, but that a tent could be raised on the three-

acre site if need be.

"Ourselves (Vista Investments) and the present ownership (of Holiday Inn) are very much for a convention because it brings business to Ruidoso for a week or so. Everybody in town should be for it," O'Leary told The News.

He stated he was "willing to play ball and provide premises" for the Ruidoso Motorcycle Festival. However, if the nine acres are sold, said O'Leary, festival planners must understand that the situation is out of his hands.

"It (motorcycle festival) could still be there if the buyers don't start construction right away," O'Leary added.

No offers have been made on the nine acres of land yet, commented O'Leary. He pointed out that the property is not speculative land, but rather land to be used for immediate development. O'Leary quoted a price of \$4 to \$5 a foot for the nine-acre parcel, which makes it worth about \$2 million.

RBA secretary Fran Smeal told The News that Friday she met with representatives of Harley Davidson, motorcycle manufacturers. She reported that Harley Davidson has reviewed plans for the motorcycle rallies planned for the same weekend in Ruidoso and Durango, Colorado.

Harley told Smeal that it is considering attending both motorcycle events. One rally will probably receive a delegation from the manufacturer's main headquarters while the other will be attended by representatives from the regional sales office, Smeal told The News.

Smeal added that she has been corresponding with all of the other motorcycle manufacturers. None have committed themselves to either motorcycle festival, said Smeal. She stated that final decisions as to which motorcycle festival the other manufacturers will attend are expected by the end of the month.

Forest Service seeks volunteers

The Smokey Bear Ranger District of the Lincoln National Forest is currently seeking volunteers for a variety of projects, stated Nancy Brommer, volunteer program coordinator.

Program reductions resulting from budget cuts, said Smokey Bear recreational lands officer Dennis Roy, mean that work usually done will have to be put off this year. In particular, Roy mentioned that trail maintenance will be severely curtailed.

However, with the spirit of voluntarism, Brommer and Roy hope that individuals will offer their assistance to Forest Service professionals who need help in the areas of recreation, wildlife, range management, timber, fire management, and clerical assistance.

Brommer noted that anyone interested in volunteering may contact her at the Smokey Bear Ranger District, Drawer F, Ruidoso; or phone 257-4095.

The volunteer program is not only beneficial to the Forest Service, which receives badly needed help, said Brom-

mer, but also provides a variety of benefits for the individual. Brommer remarked that the volunteer program is an ideal opportunity for people to be active during retirement, to get into the back country, to develop new skills or to improve existing talents.

She added that a volunteer can aid his or her career development through obtaining career-related work experience and making professional contacts.

The volunteer program is also for people who may be interested in protecting endangered species or resources, people wishing to facilitate a hobby or personal interest, or people wanting to satisfy a need for a challenge, she said.

There are also opportunities available for club organizations who want to volunteer their group's services for adopt-a-trail or adopt-a-campground programs, stated Brommer.

Various organizations, such as the Boy Scouts, Girls Scouts or Audubon Society, literally adopt a trail and are totally responsible for its upkeep. They see that their trail is kept clear of debris and overhanging branches and maintained so that water runs off properly, Brommer commented.

Brommer said a few of the available projects for which volunteers are needed include:

- Campground maintenance—painting, traffic control barrier installation and campfire ring installation.

- Public interpretive services—personnel to give talks and walks to visitors, Scouts, school children and church groups.

- Trail maintenance and reconstruction—sign posting, limb and tree removal, and tread maintenance.

- Recreational opportunity guide developers—field collection of timber stand examination data and fuelwood and Christmas tree area hosts.

- Water resource assistants—trick tank inventory and maintenance, wildlife escape and access ramp construction, and spring development.

- Wildlife assistants—wildlife water development, fish structure planning and inventory, and predatory bird surveys.

"We're also open to people's ideas to see what different areas they're interested in," said Brommer. She stated that after an interview to determine what skills and interests a potential volunteer has, individuals will be put to work.

Capitan reacts to teacher assignment

A group of about 40 teachers, students and parents attended the June 10 meeting of the Capitan Board of Education to protest a decision to reassign home economics teacher Angeline Provine to physical education and study hall classes next year.

The decision was made upon the recommendation of superintendent Ira David Lee, during an executive session at the May 13 school board meeting. Lee refused to comment on his reason for the recommendation, but said that teachers' contracts state they are subject to reassignment.

"She was not hired in a specific job," Lee commented, "she was hired to teach school."

Provine has taught home economics in the Capitan schools for 18 years and plans to retire at the end of next school year. She said her evaluation by high school principal Glen Crane stated he had observed "minimal effort to stimulate or motivate students in the learning environment."

"It was such a total shock to me when he principal gave me my evaluation," she said.

Pat Sullivan, president of the National Education Association chapter (NEA) in Capitan, presented statements at the June 10 meeting from about 40 community members attesting to Provine's teaching abilities in home economics.

Sullivan also read a letter from

Provine's doctor which said, "After receiving her medical history, I would strongly recommend that she not participate in any physically strenuous activity. Mrs. Provine has already undergone lumbar disc surgery, and it was the orthopedic surgeon's recommendation that she restrict her physical activity in order to prevent the need for future spinal fusion."

Following the appeal by Sullivan and other community members, the school board held an executive session to discuss the matter. Board member James McDaniel afterwards made a motion to ask superintendent Lee to change his recommendation, but the motion died for lack of a second.

"I was disappointed in the way the board reacted," Sullivan told The News recently. "I definitely feel like the school board made a mistake on this decision," she said. "I feel very strongly about it."

"It leaves us all open to such action—arbitrary reassignment," Sullivan stated.

Provine said she feels it is "a heartless injustice they've done to me in my last year of teaching."

She said she plans to remain and teach physical education next year, though. "I certainly will, unless my health breaks down. I do intend to stay."

"I'm not a quitter. I'm not going to let my community down when they came to my rescue," Provine stated.

"I feel this will help other teachers in the future in Capitan."

Wednesday racing to commence this week

Glo Billy Sims, the gelding who was recently purchased for a record \$450,000 by Dan and Jolene Urschel of Canadian, Texas, launches his assault on the Rainbow Futurity during Wednesday's program at Ruidoso Downs.

The Wednesday agenda is the first of three straight qualifying days for the first round of the \$680,000 (estimated) Rainbow Futurity.

All together, 394 two-year-olds will take part in the three-day span. There'll be 14 400-yard races each of the three days. The regular first post of 1 p.m. stays in effect throughout the week.

Wednesday's program also marks the first of six Wednesday cards on the '82 season. Wednesday action is also booked for June 30, plus August 4, 11, 18, 25.

This week's schedule covers five race

days, culminating on Sunday. Highpoints include Saturday's \$7,500-added Flying Charm Stakes at 870 yards and Sunday's \$153,767 Norgor Thoroughbred Futurity at four furlongs. The Norgor is the richest thoroughbred race in Ruidoso Downs history.

In order to survive this week's opening round of the Rainbow Futurity trials, a contender must finish in the top two in his trial heat. These top two finishers—a total of 84 from the three race days—will advance into the final trials on Friday, July 9. The issue on that day will be decided strictly on time. The Rainbow finale, the second leg of the coveted Triple Crown, comes up on Sunday, July 25.

Glo Billy Sims kicked off his career at Sunland Park during the spring, but didn't show much firepower—most likely as a

result of a nagging shoulder injury. The best he could do in his first three spins was a fourth. But the gelding exploded in the trials for the \$304,632 Sun Country Futurity, blasting in with a neck victory in a swift clocking of 17:31 seconds for 30 yards.

That clocking caught the attention of Don Tyner, the well known horse trader from Oklahoma City, and Tyner passed along his endorsement to Dan Urschel. Following Glo Billy Sims' length win in the Sun Country finale—a win which netted a paycheck of \$106,341—negotiations to buy the gelding got underway in earnest. The gelding's three owners asked for \$500,000, Tyner (on behalf of Urschel) suggested \$450,000, but a compromise figure was \$450,000 was finally hacked out. That was the highest price ever paid for a two-year-old quarter horse gelding.

Glo Billy Sims made his first appearance for his new owners in the trials for Ruidoso's \$768,040 Kansas Futurity, won smartly by one and three-fourths lengths, but his clocking of 18:58 seconds for 350 yards put him in the Second Consolation.

Glo Billy Sims declined the issue, traveled to Los Alamitos on the West Coast, where he earned a berth in the consolation of the \$700,000 Kindergarten Futurity.

Glo Billy Sims drew into Wednesday's fifth race, and will break from the number four post with Larry Byers at the helm. Included in the field is Tres Pass, who qualified for the Kansas finale, then ran sixth, earning \$28,708. Primetime Wrangler, who finished ninth in the Kansas finale, goes in Wednesday's 10th race-

Nicodemus. The mare is trained by R. W. Werner.

Trial winners were Rule The Deck, Lucks Gay Chic and Kiss A Toad.

The field included two graduates of the 1979 All-American Select Yearling Sale at Ruidoso—Baby Hold On (purchased for \$46,000) and Layover Charlie (\$7,500).

IRISH JO JO, a roan colt who'd won his only start in impressive fashion last month, made his encore appearance in Thursday's program at Ruidoso Downs and cruised to a one and a fourth length victory.

The colt covered the four furlongs in 46 4/5 seconds, which equalled his own

seasonal mark.

It was an opportune time for Irish Jo Jo to turn in another snappy performance, since Thursday's outing was one of six elimination trials leading to the \$153,767 Norgor Thoroughbred Futurity.

The Norgor, upon its renewal on June 27,

will become the richest thoroughbred race in Ruidoso Downs' history. In order to assure a berth in the finale, a contender had to win his trial heat on Thursday. The four remaining berths will be filled via a draw among the six second-place finishers.

Tickets for a lithograph by acclaimed New Mexico artist R. C. Gorman will be sold at the Aspen Tree gift shop and book store through July.

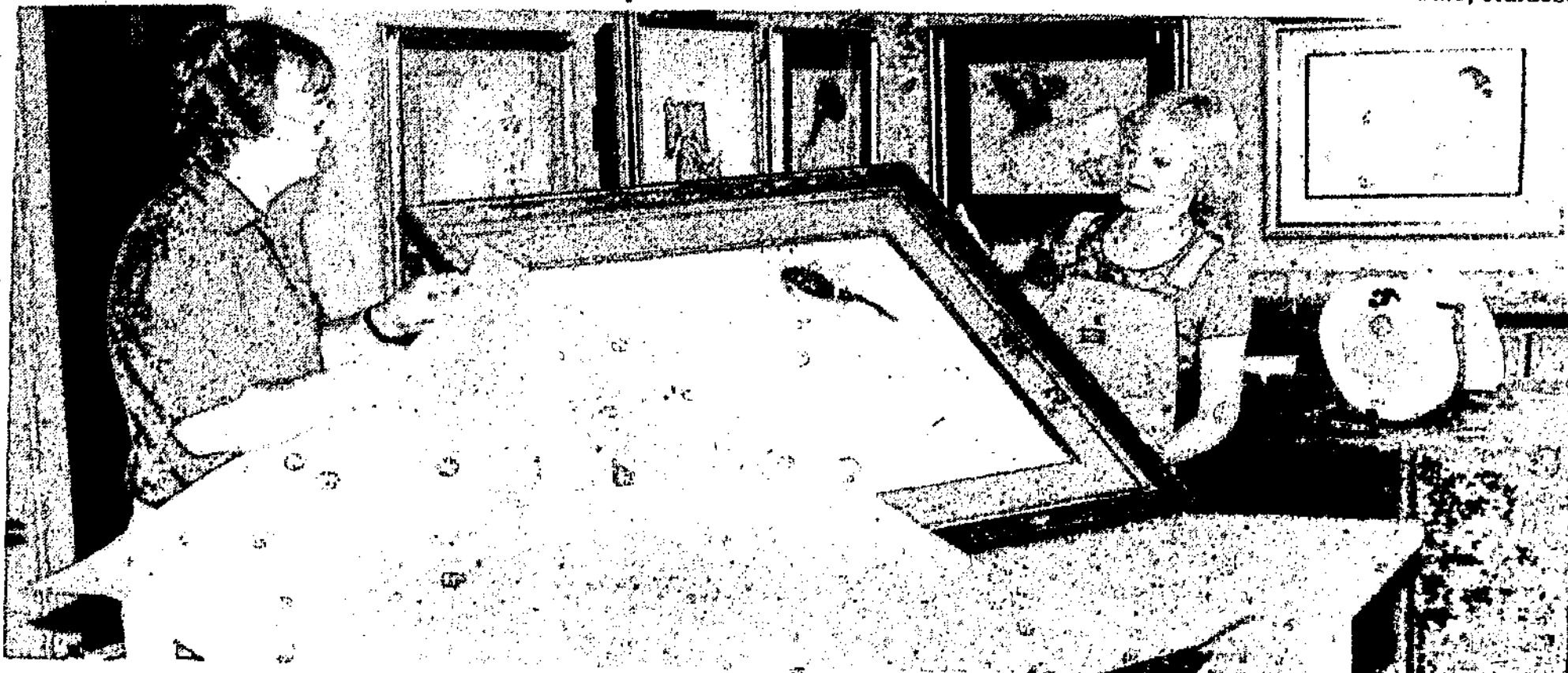

Sunday's competition was played both indoors and outdoors. Rain forced most of the quarterfinals and the semifinals to be played indoors but the finals were played outside under sunny but windy conditions.

Whitwam and Johnston played a consistent game all through the tournament. They topped Ora Marie Templeton and William Wallizer in straight sets (6-4, 6-3) in the quarterfinals and defeated Stretch and Lynn Meadows 6-3, 6-0 in the semifinals. The Meadows' had defeated

Johnston, who owns Johnston's Jewelers in the Ski West Center, admitted he hadn't had much tennis competition this year.

"This is my first competitive action this year," he said. "With the Sierra Swim and Racquet Club out of business, there isn't much tennis action around here. I'm hoping there can still be a way to hold the racquet club's two tournaments anyway."

A total of 40 players competed in the tournament Sunday. They came from all over Southeastern New Mexico and West Texas.

The next event on the Inn's agenda is its club tournament later this summer.

Here we are in late June and there's still no sign of an agreement between the National Football League (NFL) players and the owners.

Thus, it appears more likely that a threatened strike by the players will come off.

A lot of sports fans will be unhappy if a strike comes off and the sports scene in this country would probably be more unsettled than it was during last year's major league baseball strike.

Pro football has really dominated the sports calendar during the fall months, despite the presence of big-time collegiate football.

It seems like most college football fans do not follow the pro version of the sport that closely. Neither do many pro football fans follow college ball closely.

If you walk into almost any bar in the country on Friday nights during the fall, NFL football is much more likely to be the subject of discussion than college football.

Baseball does not have any major competition during the spring and summer months. The National Basketball Association (NBA) season drags out into June and by that time many people have lost interest in it. Professional soccer (played in the spring and summer) has not yet reached the level of popularity achieved by baseball, so it doesn't present that much of a challenge yet.

However, the football season falls at the end of the year, with the playoff games coming during the holiday season. Thus, the year seems to come to a climax with the end of the football season, particularly on the pro level.

Some sports fans I know go through the baseball season and the hot summer months looking forward to the start of the NFL season.

If the proposed NFL strike comes off, the collegiate football season in the fall is

going to be somewhat of a letdown.

Oh, the country will survive. Areas where collegiate football is really big like Alabama and Oklahoma will continue to prosper sports-wise.

But it will be the big cities and suburbs where the sports fans will suffer a letdown. Places like Pittsburgh, New York, Chicago, Boston, Detroit, Green Bay and San Francisco will have a long, boring fall to look forward to.

Some of the larger cities have plenty of other activities which people can devote their free time to.

But places like Pittsburgh and Green Bay, where freezing weather and smoky steel mills are the rule rather than the exception, will probably have a long, boring football season.

Speaking of pro football, several of the pre-season magazines have come out and they offer a few surprising predictions.

One of the magazines sees Dallas finishing third behind Philadelphia and New York in the National Conference Eastern Division.

True, New York made the playoffs for the first time in 18 years last season. But it's still hard to see how they could finish ahead of the Cowboys, who have made the playoffs almost every season since 1966 and have a better all-around team than the Giants.

Philadelphia faltered in the latter stages of the season last year and was eliminated in the wild card playoff by the Giants. Eagle coach Dick Vermeil pushes his club to the extreme during the regular season and by the time the playoffs roll around Philadelphia has already peaked for the year.

Dallas still seems the team to beat in the Eastern Division this year (if there is a season), despite the fact it has lost two straight seasons in the conference championship game.

The Billy the Kid Golf Tournament, scheduled for Carrizozo Golf Course Saturday and Sunday, was also cancelled because of lack of entrants.

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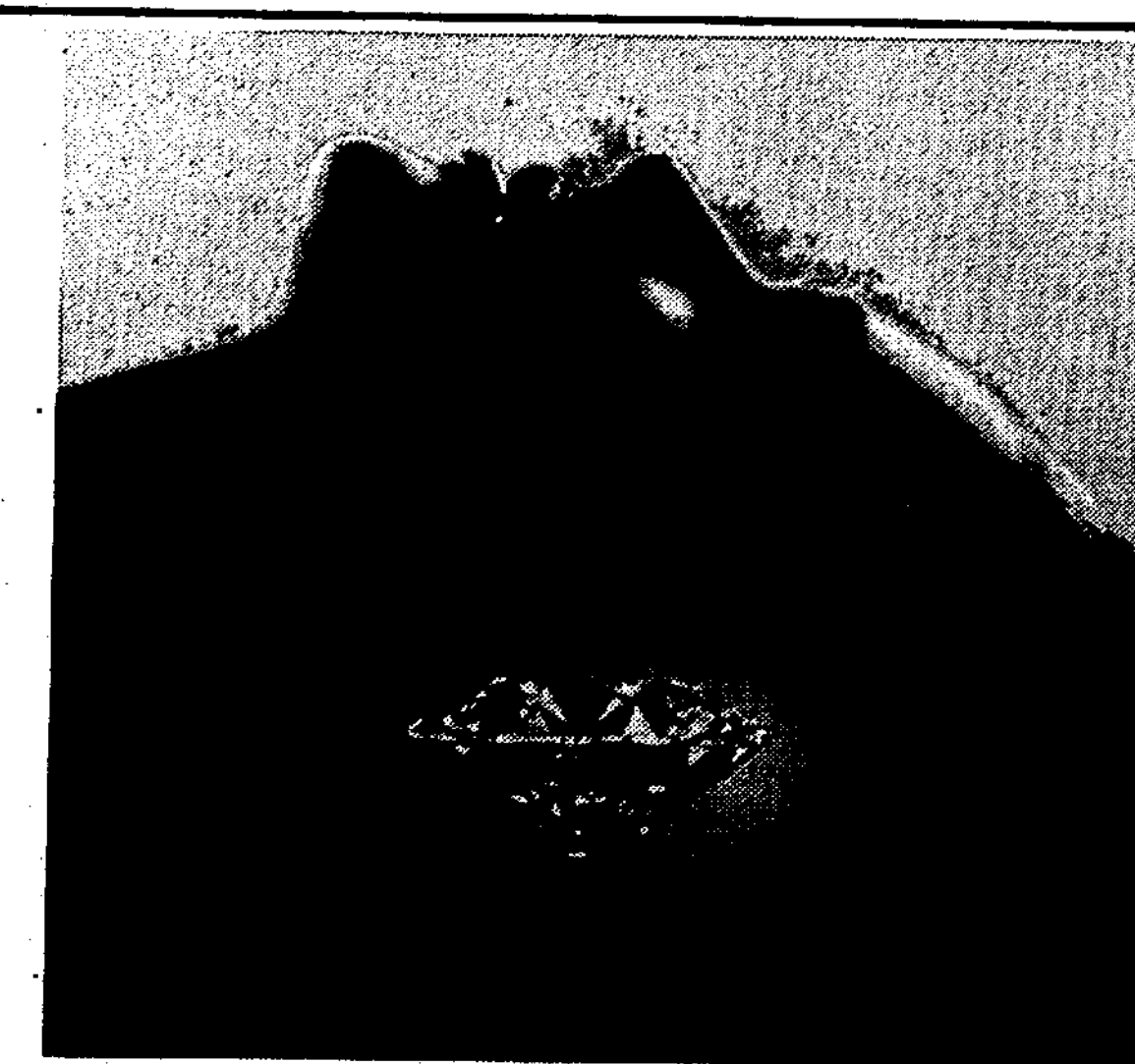
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WEIGHTLIFTING and SUMMER CAMPS

Junior tackle Craig Carson, a 5-9, 195 pounder, will represent the Warriors at the camp. Carson started at defensive tackle last season.

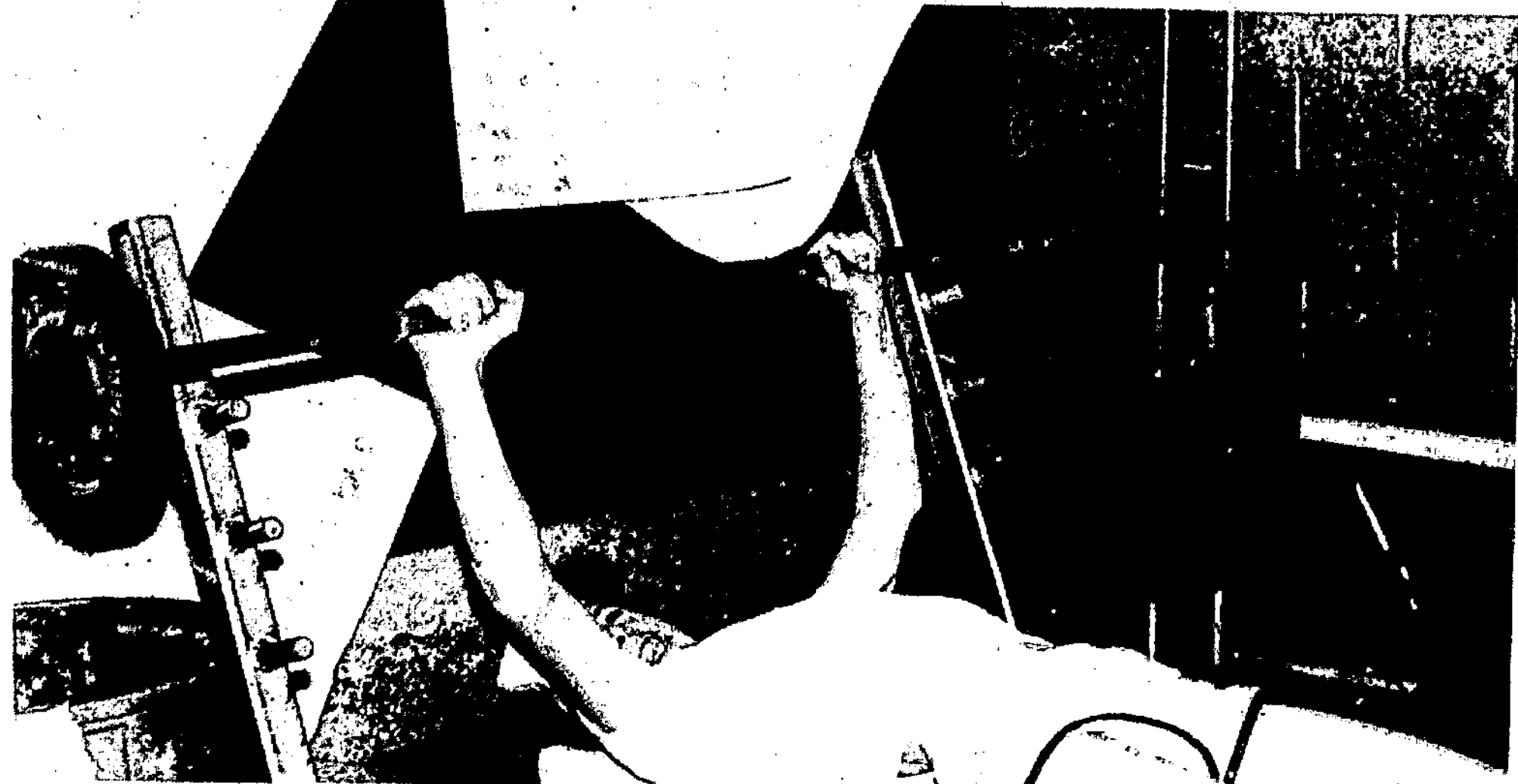
The camp will have several pro football players aiding Clausen, the Philadelphia Eagles defensive line coach.





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

After working in the automobile business in Florida for 30 years, Jake was advised by his doctor not to work any longer.

"It gets tiresome not working, so I got out my rocks and set up a shop," he said. He moved to Ruidoso about four years ago "to get away from the crowds," and established a rock and gem shop on Carrizo Creek Road.

The lapidary said New Mexico is a good mineral state, although this area in particular is mostly limestone. The western and northern parts of the state are very good for minerals and rocks, though, he commented.

Most mines in the country have been closed to the public for the past 10 years or so because of liability laws, so Jake buys most of his rock and mineral specimens from mineral supply companies and private mine owners.

He admits he misses being able to actually collect his own specimens.

"It's fun looking, but you don't always find anything worthwhile; sometimes you spend a lot of time looking and not find anything desirable," he observed.

So what does a lapidary do with the rocks he does find?

First, he saws them off into slabs. Then, he marks each slab into the size he wants and grinds it out on diamond wheels or corundum. Then he polishes it with a fine abrasive. The entire process of cutting and polishing a rock takes about an hour, according to Witherspoon.

"It's hard to tell till you cut and polish it what you're going to get," Jake noted.

"It's fun, and it's something to do," he stated.

Jake sells mostly specimen rocks in his shop, for collectors who are looking for a particular rock or mineral from a certain area to add to their collection.

He also has a few gemstones, including topaz, amethyst, emerald, garnet, aquamarine and tourmaline. He stocks all kinds of rocks in his shop. Iron pyrite, or fool's gold, is most popular, he said, just because it is pretty.

The natural form of iron pyrite is a cube, but 99 percent of it is deformed from the pressure of rocks under which it grows, Jake explained.

It is not worth that much, even in its rare cubic form, he noted. "It's just a curiosity."

The qualities which separate gemstones from rocks are rarity, hardness and beauty, the rock collector explained. "They're both beautiful," he commented.

Although most people probably consider diamonds the most valuable gemstone, Jake dispels that myth. Alexandrite is much more expensive, because it has not been mined since 1917, in Russia. Therefore it is more scarce than diamonds.

A good natural emerald could also be worth more than a diamond, he said.

The qualities which determine the value

of all gemstones are color, clarity, cut and carat.

Jake said that more people are getting interested in rocks and minerals than ever before. Amateurs are quite active in rock collecting as a hobby, he reported, and most towns have mineral clubs with members doing lapidary work.

A lapidary class was taught a year or so ago at the Adult Recreation Center in Ruidoso, but is no longer available, probably due to lack of interest, Witherspoon said.

He relates the surge of interest in rock collecting in most areas to new improved equipment.

"People are cutting and polishing rock and making jewelry and ornaments they were never able to do before," he said.

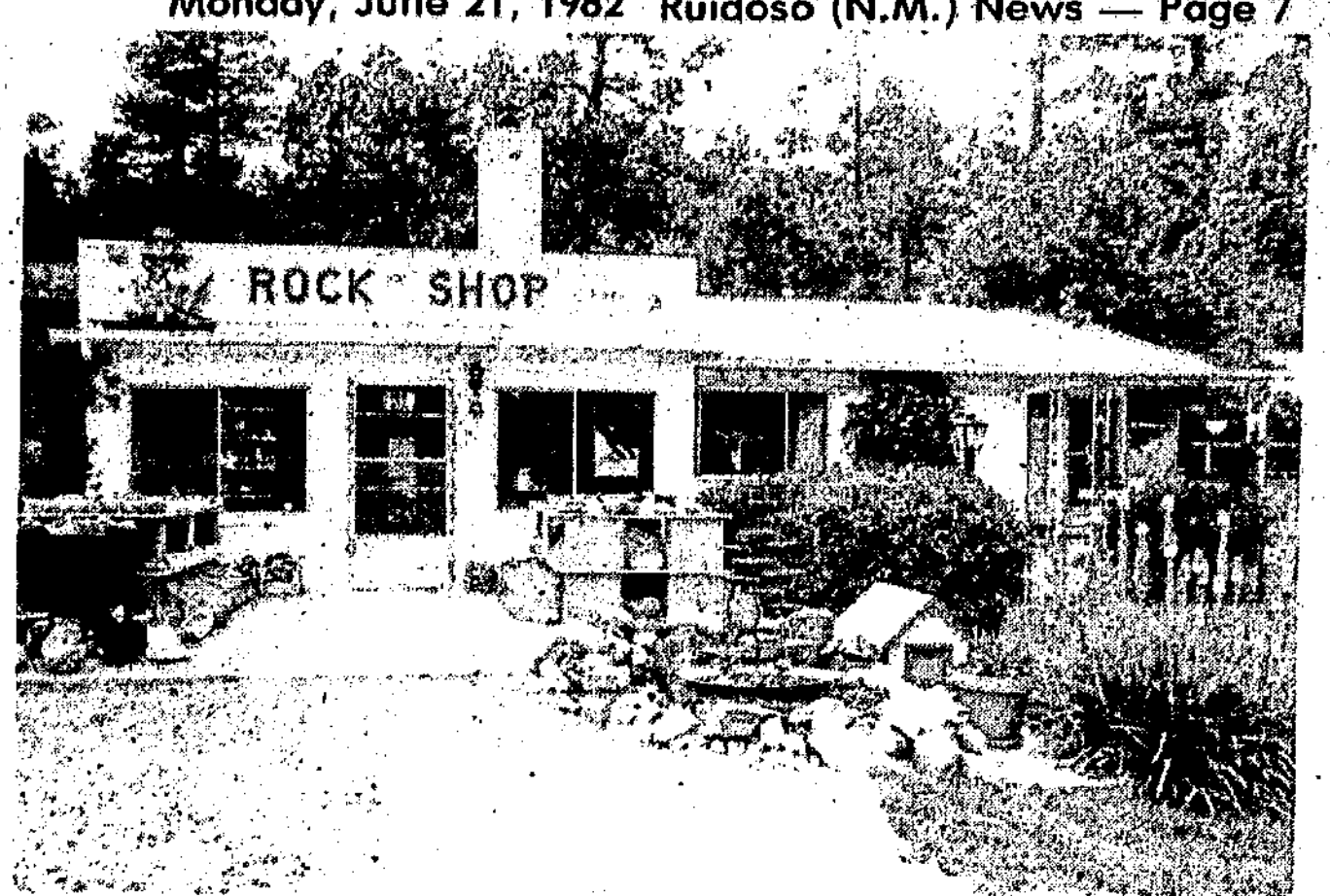
"With new equipment, it is easier to make gemstones from rocks you ordinarily wouldn't look twice at."

Lapidary work is certainly not new, Jake noted. It is an ancient art developed thousands of years ago. It probably originated with the ancient Egyptians, who used gemstones for ornament.

His hobby-turned-into-a-business is therapeutic, Witherspoon commented.

"You get involved in it; to see a rock take beautiful shape, form and color with grinding and polishing is very interesting," he related.

"You can never learn all there is to learn about rocks and minerals," the veteran rock collector concluded.


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


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
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Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE — "If they're so smart, let them do it."

As the week during which we held this year's third session of the state Legislature went on, that sentence more and more expressed the feelings of more and more members of the group of lawmakers which was meeting.

"They" in that context means the members of the federal court in Albuquerque.

"We," on the other hand, are the elected lawmakers of the state of New Mexico.

"They" hand down decisions.

"We" hand down a way to put them into practice.

What was the spirit of those who had to find a plan?

It was that they would prefer to be almost anywhere else than where they were during the week of June 14.

State legislators were frustrated and impatient.

Here they were, facing a lot of imperatives. Included among them were things like these:

— Compliance with an existing federal court order;

— At the very least an awareness of other federal decisions about redistricting legislatures, the project on which our own lawmakers were now launched;

— A willingness to learn the art of the demographer, so as to divide the state properly and primly; and

— The ability to walk a tightrope between the evil side and the good side of "political considerations" which would, if accomplished, do credit to members of the Wallenda family.

Maybe it would have been better if "they," the federal judges, had done this redistricting in the first place.

Reasons why that would have been good:

— Judges are, presumably at least, non-partisan;

— They are probably more objective about such matters than legislators, who will have to run in and be elected by the districts they are presently bounding;

— They are salaried and full-time, in contrast to the state's lawmakers, who are neither; and

— They have said, in effect, "If members of the Legislature do not do this job, we will take it on."

Many of us here in the capital city, after having watched the charades of the past week, think almost any other system would be better.

Why not, we say, an objective panel, not to include any legislators, who would accomplish this redistribution of power in the state?

If the federal judges don't want to do it either, how about the Legislature itself naming a non-partisan, objective committee to handle such problems?

The power to do that is vested in the members of the Legislature, yet they are the most unlikely people to be able to reapportion in a clear, calm manner.

There are indeed some of us in New Mexico who think this action — describing the district from which you yourself will run — is the ultimate conflict of interest.

So when the Census Bureau gives us a set of figures in 1990, how about having a group of political scientists and others who will work with those figures thereafter?

Giving the assignment to the members of the Legislature is obviously not the way to go.

How many New Mexicans did we kill on the highways during the month for which we have the latest results?

Just 54.

In case you are keeping score, we New Mexicans have killed 207 of our fellow citizens on the roads during the first five months of this year.

That compares with our record for killing 183 people in the same way and during the same time last year.

Being true Americans, we are doing better every year.

What will we be doing by 2002?

I proposed the idea that raising money by either an increase in gross receipts tax or in water rates was unfair to the people who live here. Since we need more water to supply the "growth" anticipated why not let the people who want to move here pay for the growth needed in the supply system. This might best be done by raising the tap fee.

Court Report

Continental Telephone Company of the West filed a complaint May 11 against Paul Thorpe for alleged debt and money due in the amount of \$1,650.85 for phone service, long distance charges and toll calls on open account.

A complaint was filed May 11 by R. Daniel Smith against Jack E. and Helen F. Mundell for alleged debt and money due and foreclosure of real estate contract. Smith is seeking payment of \$7,656.25 plus interest; \$11,000 plus interest; \$5,000 plus interest and \$10,000 plus interest.

A petition for review of amendment to zoning ordinance and request for writ of certiorari was filed May 12 by B. F. and Ann Phillips and Jerry and Myrna Rheidasil against Ruidoso mayor George White; all members of the board of trustees of the village; John Cupp, village planning and zoning enforcement officer; and Sarah Crossley, village clerk. The petitioners are asking for a reverse of the decision of the board of trustees of the village of Ruidoso concerning the Sierra West Limited property.

El Paso National Bank filed a foreclosure complaint for alleged default on a promissory note and overdraft against Paul C. and Mary Dean on May 13. The bank is seeking payment of \$442,427.40 plus interest and attorney's fees in the amount of \$44,240 and that the plaintiff's mortgage be foreclosed with a Special Master's Sale to be held with proceeds to be applied towards the alleged debt.

Pioneer Savings and Trust Association filed a complaint for foreclosure against Delton K. and M. Ovella Estes and Marvin E. and Lovetta Faye Sago. Pioneer Savings and Trust is asking for payment of \$27,717.80 allegedly due on a note and for lien on defendants' property, with a Special Master's Sale to be held and proceeds to be applied towards the alleged debt. Filed May 13.

A complaint was filed May 14 by Citizens State Bank against Felicia Knapp for money allegedly due on promissory notes. The bank is seeking payment of \$2,700 due on the principal, plus interest of \$154.46 in Court I, and \$2,000 plus accrued interest of \$127.12 in Court II.

Dorgan-Smith Enterprises, d/b/a Incredible Restaurant and Saloon, and Tom J. Dorgan and Jennifer K. Smith are seeking payment of \$50,000 for compensatory damages and \$500,000 for punitive damages from Security Bank, Ruidoso, for allegedly causing denial of a Small Business Administration loan to plaintiffs. The suit was filed May 14.

A complaint for alleged debt and money due for child support payments was filed against Robert E. Souther by Kathleen V. Bates, formerly Kathleen V. Souther, on May 17. Bates is seeking payment of \$3,164.16 and that judgment of divorce be

domesticated in the state of New Mexico for all intents and purposes.

Priscilla L. Pickens filed a complaint against Kenneth P. Payne May 21 for enforcement of divorce settlement. Pickens is asking the court to order Payne to deliver to her copies of all objects of art made by him not yet delivered and award her judgment for a reasonable market value of all art objects he is not able to deliver and render an accounting of all art objects he has made since the divorce settlement agreement.

A default judgment was rendered May 24 in favor of Rawson Incorporated, d/b/a Las Cruces Door, against Ted Johnson d/b/a Three Rivers Company for damages in the amount of \$218.49 plus \$21 for court costs.

On May 24 Robert J. Stearns, d/b/a J. G. Moore Insurance Company, filed a complaint against Arron Burton for payment of \$2,418.28 allegedly due on a promissory note, plus interest at 16 percent per annum from May 18, 1982, and attorney's fees not less than 15 percent of the amount of the principal.

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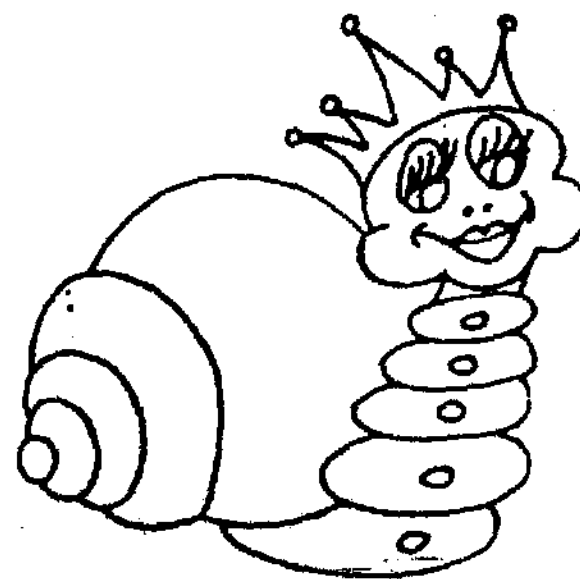

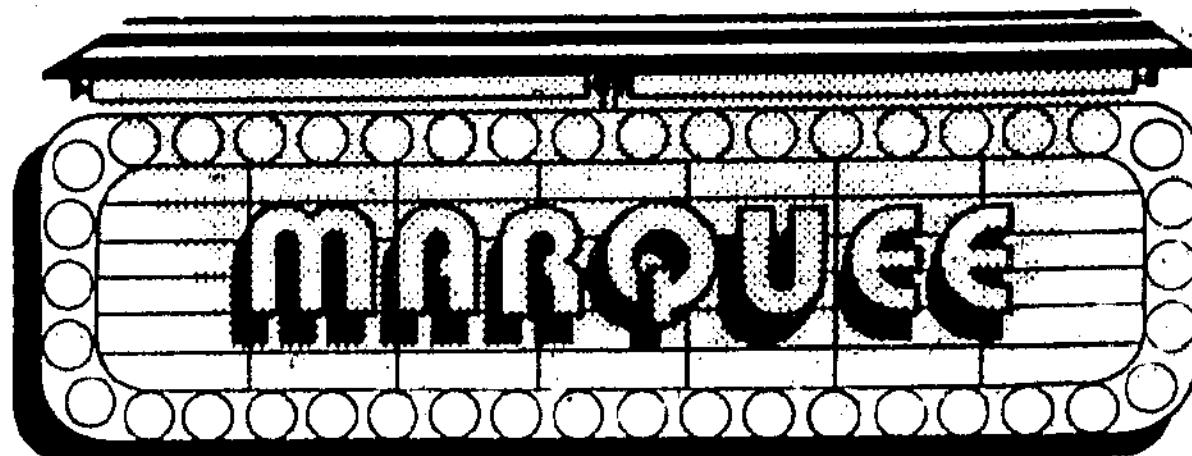

"Annie" is slated to be the film of the summer. If one were to believe the producers, it is the film of "Tomorrow." Certainly no film this season or this year will be as expensive, but that expense has already been recouped in a vast number of financial dealings, especially the marketing rights to such things as Annie ice cream, for instance.

Far from being the film of tomorrow, however, "Annie" is more like a film of yesterday, or even yesteryear. Big lush, extravagant Hollywood musicals are a thing of the past, and that is where "Annie" belongs. Annie may be a 55-pound, 10-year-old bundle of joy, but "Annie" is also something of a dinosaur.

Whatever one may believe about the actual cost of the film, the attitude of excess is everywhere. Dancers don't merely dance — they leap, tumble, twirl and twist in movements that would give Russian gymnasts backaches.

Showing people walking along and suddenly breaking

into song with an orchestra coming out of nowhere is a bit too silly for today's audiences, especially in overpowering wide-screen splendor. People tap dancing don't tap any better in Dolby, eight-track stereo.

But certainly everyone tries, and not without some degree of success. Aileen Quinn as Annie has cloned the cuteness of a Shirley Temple, but isn't given enough to do to demonstrate the resourcefulness of the comic-strip character. Albert Finney hams it up quite well as Daddy Warbucks who manages, even as a bomb is thrown into his office, to still make a million-dollar deal over the phone. As the head of the orphanage, Carol Burnett is a delightfully dippy Miss Hannigan.

There is so little family entertainment around nowadays that "Annie" is fine for the kiddies. But spending a million more on dancers won't make them jump any higher or tap any quicker.

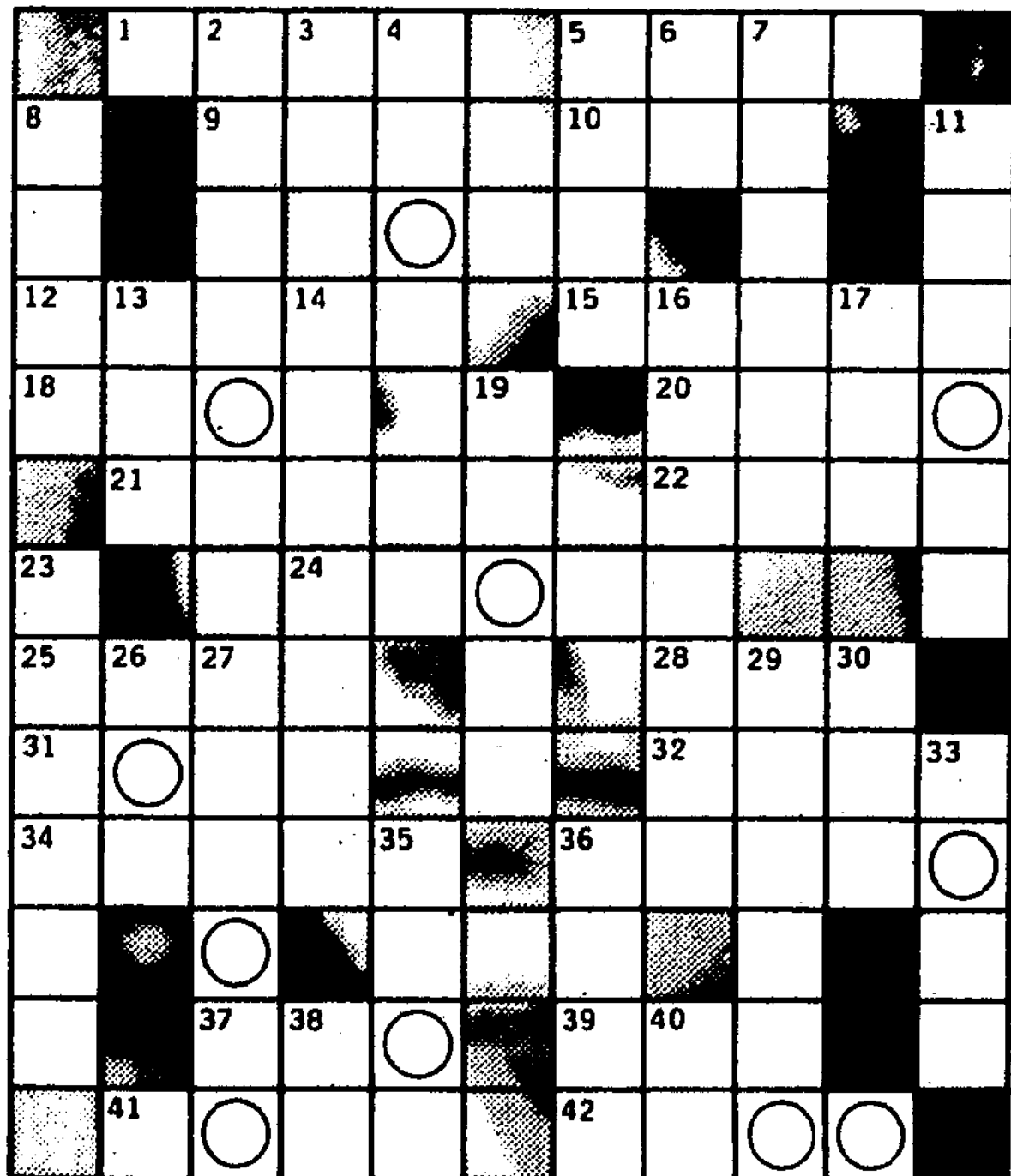

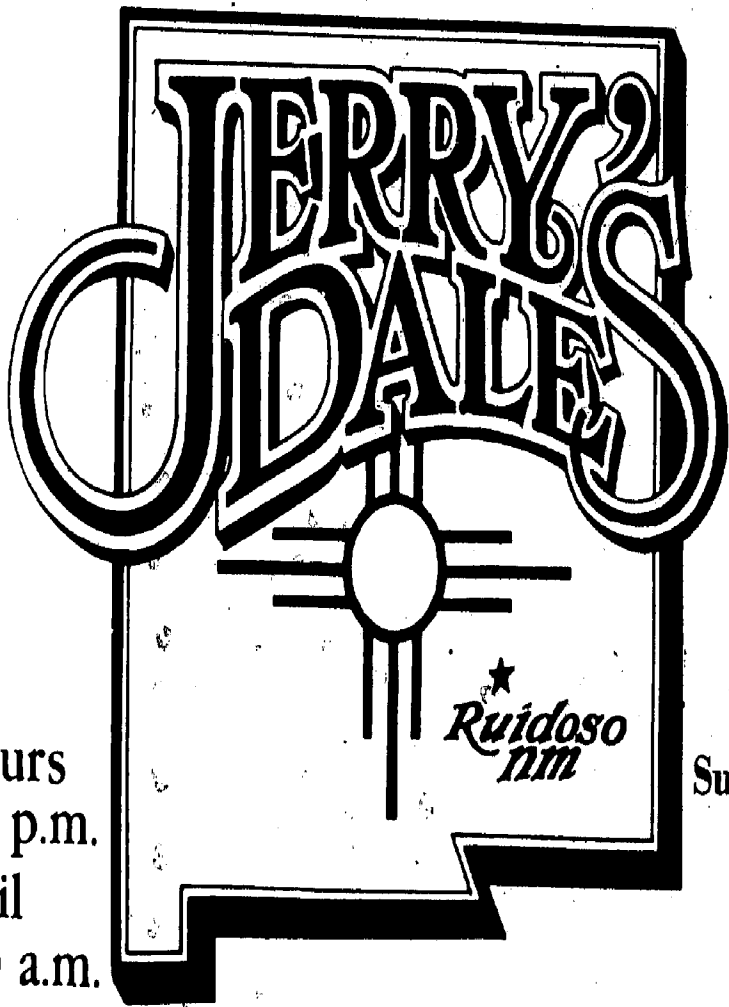

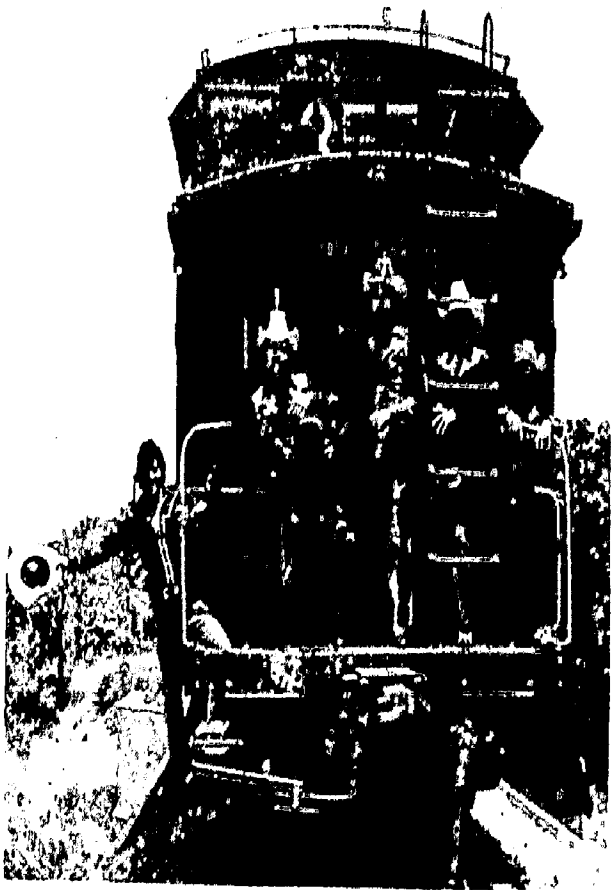

**A HORSE BY ANY OTHER NAME
IS A BIG FAT 'NO-NO'**

Are you afraid they will run a ringer in on you?
...and you ask, "What is a ringer?"

A ringer, in race parlance, is switching horses resulting in a false horse running in a race under the name of another.

Well, you can relax, for there is fat chance of that sort of thing happening at Ruidoso Downs or any other track in America. Identification of horses has evolved into a fine science and the scurmdudgeon who could outwit official identifiers nowadays would have to be a real Houdini.

Photographs, tattoos, nighteyes or chestnuts, cowlicks (hair swirls), markings, major scars and other unusual identifying features are all recorded on records...and the records are on file at the Jockey Club or the American QH Association.

You can tell a horse from a jockey without a program, but you can't tell a right horse from a wrong horse without an identifier.
