big fish have developed a taste for publicity. For most people, the shark is little more than a source of fear and loathing. Many fish-haters for his refusal to respect man's top position in the food chain. But for others, people willing to put aside their narrow prejudices, the shark can be an endless source of wonder and amusement. It is for these true "seekers after the shark" that this guide is written.

How to Know Your Shark

ON JULY 25, 1975, while the niece of Peter "Brockley's Jaw" was playing a full house in Mission Valley, Brian Hawthorne, owner of the 66-foot San Diego speed-fish boat *Heather B.*, was busy harpooning his own "Jaws," a 196-foot White off Catalina Island, 20 miles northeast of San Diego County. When the 1400-pound monster was discovered as one of a few weeks later, its stomach was found to contain two human-size harbor seals, one weighing 115 pounds, the other 175.

The summer of '75 saw the capture of over a dozen White Sharks off the coast of southern California. This past summer an 18-foot, 4,150-pound White was taken by the San Diego fishing boat *Camaro* and was the largest White Shark ever caught off the west coast of North America. The feeling among area specialists is that there may be more White Sharks present in local waters these past two years than at any time since 1959. With so little known about the natural history of sharks, people are reluctant to venture a guess as to why this might be. One theory is that after years of being fished by people like Jacques Cousteau and Peter Gimbel the

sharks" of Baja are well known for this trick. As your shark comes closer you might study its teeth. You'll notice that they are sharp and serrated, like steak knives, and set in rows, one behind the other. As the front teeth wear down or break off, the rear teeth move forward to replace them. Now quickly strike your shark across his sensitive snout with a hard object. This should ward

him off. Good! Despite a highly developed sense of smell and the ability to pick up vibrations through the water, the shark has a very primitive nervous system. A large killer White might have a brain the size of a chicken's. Of course, intellect isn't everything. If chickens had hundreds of razor-sharp teeth and weighed up to four tons each, we'd probably treat them with a lot more respect. (Certain the

price of eggs would be higher. Where to Find Your Shark OF THE 250 known species of sharks about 30 can be found in and around the waters of San Diego. These include the White, Blue, Mako, and Hammerhead. The first place you might want to look for your shark is at Sea World. The park's nine large, mean sharks (two Nurse Sharks

Human Relations Go Awry

Still reeling from a recent dose of bad publicity, the County's Human Relations Commission last week approved a major restructuring that could open it to even further criticism. Following the suggestion of newly-appointed executive director George Williams, the Commission's Governing Board eliminated the positions of education officer Virginia Glass, law and justice officer Dick Leslie and employment officer John Fischer.

Williams said the restructuring was necessary to "point the Commission in a new direction" and aware that it would receive funding from the Board of Supervisors to continue its work. But in a strongly worded statement read to the Commissioners before the plan was passed, Fischer and

Leslie charged that the restructuring was "no more than the culmination of a scheme" that began after the ouster of former executive director James Fukumoto last April. Fukumoto resigned after investigations by the District Attorney's office raised questions about his handling of travel and expense accounts.

Leslie said last week that he and Fischer had alerted the D.A.'s office that the Commission's Governing Board eliminated the positions of education officer Virginia Glass, law and justice officer Dick Leslie and employment officer John Fischer.

Williams said the restructuring was necessary to "point the Commission in a new direction" and aware that it would receive funding from the Board of Supervisors to continue its work. But in a strongly worded statement read to the Commissioners before the plan was passed, Fischer and

The Commission has been a hotbed of controversy since it was first formed by the Board of Supervisors in 1969. Newspaper coverage has been almost totally negative, and Supervisors have been openly skeptical of the benefits received from the over \$1,000,000 spent to keep the Commission afloat. It has gone through three executive directors over the past five years, weathered the resignation of at least two Governing Board members, and seen the restructuring of its board from 48 to 18 persons.

Last year, after the Fukumoto incident, County Supervisors placed the Commission under direct contract so they could better measure its benefits. They also slashed the Commission's budget by 27 percent.

"We just couldn't tell what the Commission was doing," said Bill Martinez, an aide to Supervisor Leo Taylor. Both Supervisor Supervisors Leland and Tom More pointed to the Commission's funding last

year and newly-elected Roger Hedgecock this week asked Leslie to appear before a special meeting of the Board on February 22 to answer the restructuring will be discussed.

Leslie, a 36-year-old attorney who formerly received the ACLU's "Civil Libertarian" award last year for work done with the Commission, and Fischer, who is also a lawyer, will fight their dismissal and sue appeals boards and courts as a platform to undermine the credibility of the Commission.

As it appears, the Supervisors will be willing to hear them. Mounting pressure by taxpayers to cut county spending may see a number of programs drastically reduced or completely cut from the budget, ones like the

commission that perform intangible services will be heavily scrutinized. "Every program will have to show results or it's in trouble," said Diane Berlin, an aide to Supervisor Hedgecock. "It's simply a cost-benefit thing." The Commission is requesting a 65 percent increase over last year's \$300,000 budget.

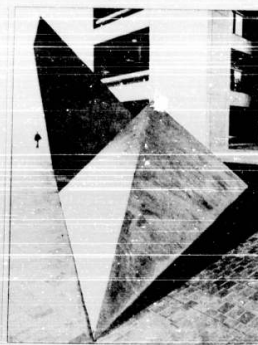

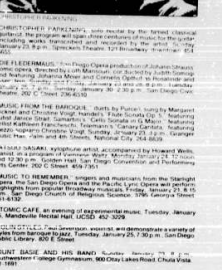

Eleven garments and 11 headpieces of fantasy clothes and fantastic costumes at the Arco Los Angeles continuing through February 19.

Four artists are represented in a gallery space of about 1500 square feet. Johanne Laffie works with pottery and leads to construct headpieces reminiscent of queens of the Nile or Al-Jinn. She also creates headdresses, neckpieces, and masks of feathers. As in the case of garments they may be made to fit the design to give the wearer any degree of freedom of movement.

Faith Porter, who has two garments in the display, is a collector. She saves buttons, sequins, shells, and other normally discarded items of modern life. One of her costumes, called a "cyclops", includes headpieces, neckpiece, boots, and cape, and more than 15,000 pearl buttons plus sequins and shells. Her other costume is a whole ensemble which carries the plasticity of contemporary clothing to the ultimate extreme with small pieces of fabric sewed by gold, wax, and unadorned garment.

Garments by Kathleen Newton include a "Regulation" character costume. There is a navy wardrobe with tails of chaircase silk protruding in patches from small openings.

There is a multiple dress tufted with bits of steel wool, a cape composed completely of finger-painted bits of unbacked muslin, and an octopus dress of hand-painted chiffon. 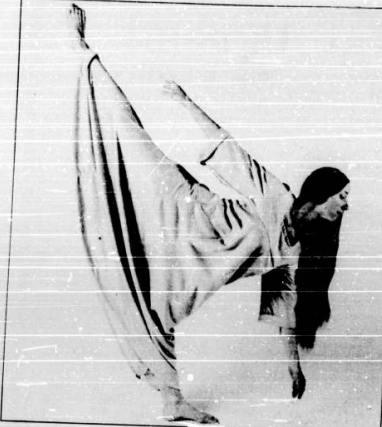

RECORD REVIEW

STRAUSHEAR: Tangerine Dream, *Seven Records*

Based solely on outward appearance, the unfamiliar listener might be tempted to compare Tangerine Dream with Kraftwerk. Both groups hail from Germany and each predominantly features synthesizers and similar electronic devices. Interestingly, although both have attained considerable success, neither group has been successful in reaching the top of the U.S. attention charts where Kraftwerk, via the help of U.S. attention seekers like Krautrock, has done so well. There, the similarities end. Unlike Kraftwerk, Tangerine Dream does not insist on launching an all-out mechanical attack on the listener, instead viewing electronics as a means rather than an end. Where Kraftwerk's futuristic beat music has all the trappings of a serious, albeit subliminal, message, Tangerine Dream is decidedly subtler. Most important, however, Tangerine Dream's music stands on its own, and not just as computerized gimmicks. That said, *Seven* is not a masterpiece of the group's most palatable work to date, and may very well represent to Tangerine Dream what Dark Side of the Moon represented to Pink Floyd: the ticket to mass commercial acclaim by which the group is converted from avant-garde cult figures to international stars. For all that, *Seven* has made its music less subtle and more melodic. Furthermore, the group is nowhere as cerebral as on past outings, opting instead for a more "straight-ahead" pop approach. As a result, they are no longer to be regarded by the uninitiated as "strange" or "weird." For the adventurous listener who would like to see what's so exciting about George

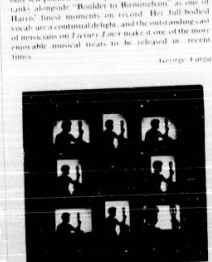
