## HUNDREDS SEE VANCO RECEIVE AWARD

### Tests Show Water To Be Purest In Many Years

After weeks of looking at the cool waters of Lake St. Clair, Grosse Pointers have been taking advantage of the lifting of the bathing ban from the municipal park beaches and have swarmed to cool themselves in the water. Residents of the Farms

and St. Clair Shores began swimming Friday night, followed by the City and Grosse Pointe Shores on Saturday morning. The Park residents had to wait until Tuesday morning before they could do any swimming.

The delay in the Park was due to the concern of the village manager, E. B. Lane, in regard to pollution from Fox Creek. The danger from Fox creek comes with a heavy rain storm or an upstream wind. In the case of the rain storm, the Fox Creek pumping station will take care of the situation; however, if an upstream wind should take place swimming will be prohibited immediately.

It was explained at a Park meeting that tests taken of the waters at the four municipal beaches show that the water is the safest it has been in years.

The Farms was the first to allow swimming. Friday night, Murray Smith, DPW superintendent and Dr. Thomas Davies, pronounced the water safe for swimming. Three Farms trustees, Gerveys Grylls, George Schlaepfer and B. Dave Bushaw, were present at the Farms pier. Mr. Grylls, accompanied by a group of youngsters, officially opened the swimming season by taking the first plunge.

#### Residents Continue Complaints About Chickens in Woods

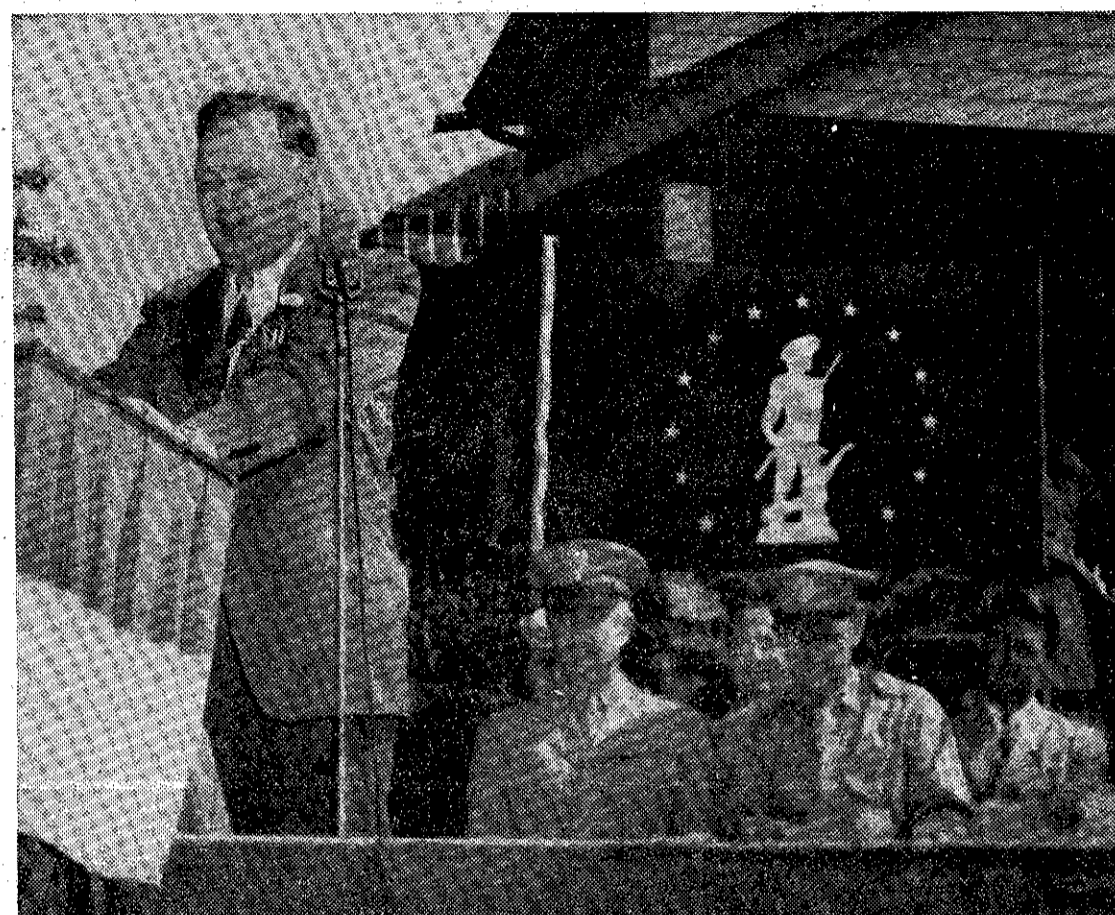

### Marine Aviator Dies in Crash While Leading Squadron

The body of Maj. Robert Cyrus Kennedy, USMC aviator, who was killed Saturday while leading a flight of Marine fighter planes near Flagstaff, Ariz., will arrive in Detroit this week-end under military escort.

Services will be held from the Van Deweghe chapel, 15798 East Warren, at one o'clock and military services from Christ church, 61 Grosse Pointe boulevard at two o'clock Tuesday afternoon, Aug. 1. Interment will be in White Chapel cemetery.

Major Kennedy was born Oct. 3, 1915, and was the son of F. J. Kennedy of 166 Beaupre road, Grosse Pointe Farms and the late Mrs. Frances A. Kennedy. Surviving are his father; the widow, nee Virginia M. Bleicher; sister, Mary Jane Kennedy, of Grosse Pointe.

The deceased and Mrs. Kennedy, who were married May 16, 1942, resided in Santa Barbara, Calif. Mrs. Kennedy is the daughter of the C. E. Bleichers, 1009 Yorkshire road.

Major Kennedy had over two thousand hours in the air and was executive officer of a Marine fighter squadron stationed at Santa Barbara, preparing for duty overseas. He entered the Marine Corps in the autumn of 1939 and began naval flight training in December, 1940. He received his wings and was commissioned as a Marine aviator Sept. 6, 1941. He was instructor in preliminary and instrument flying in Corpus Christi before he was transferred to Santa Barbara as squadron officer.

He attended Northwestern high school in Detroit and graduated from the University of Michigan. He was a member of Sigma Chi fraternity.

Memorial services were held yesterday, at his home in Santa Barbara, with officers and men of the squadron in attendance.

### 'Popcorn Wagon' Ballots Being Sent to Park Village Clerk

Park residents, as well as other Pointers, who mailed the public ballot which was found in last week's Review regarding the decision handed down in the "Popcorn Man" case, will be glad to know that the Park village clerk is in receipt of approximately thirty ballots, of which many contain two or three signed names.

Of the ballots received, 21 persons from Grosse Pointe Park favor the Bishop road parking while 19 do not favor the vendor's ordinance. Three do not favor Bishop road parking and four favor the vendor's ordinance.

Examining the ballots from other Grosse Pointers, it was found that seven Farms residents and two from the City favor the parking on Bishop while three from the Farms and one from the City do not favor the vendor's ordinance.

The ballot was brought about by the action of the Grosse Pointe Civic League who asks that the Park commission rescind their decision prohibiting Bishop road parking from Jefferson avenue to the lake, and revising the vendor's ordinance, thus making it necessary that Ernest "Tony" Koinis remove his well-known popcorn wagon from the Park streets.

All who have not sent in a signed ballot are requested to mail one in today. A prepared ballot appears elsewhere in this paper.

### Canning Center Changes Policy

The Grosse Pointe community canning center which is sponsored by the AWVS, the Garden Club of Michigan, the Grosse Pointe OCD, the Grosse Pointe Lions club and the board of education, will be open for canning on Monday's, Wednesday's and Friday's instead of Monday through Friday, starting Monday, July 31.

It is hoped that people of Grosse Pointe will take advantage of this opportunity to respond to our government's request to can all food possible this summer. It has been emphasized through newspapers, over the radio, and by many national publications that our people need to can 25 per cent more food than was canned in 1943.

Due to present world conditions, many people have been lulled into a sense of false optimism. We, as a nation, are going to have to feed many millions of people of European nationalities after the fighting is over in Europe. Everyone should realize his responsibility toward the starving nations of the world and process every bit of available food.

The Grosse Pointe canning center is very fortunate in having two trained supervisors and a trained staff of workers to help further this patriotic cause. In order to make this project self-supporting, a charge of 5 cents a jar has to be made.

### Owner, Employees Complimented By Army-Navy Chiefs

Presentation of the joint Army-Navy "E" award for excellence in war production to Vanco Machine and Engineering was made Monday afternoon in impressive exercises at the plant, starting at 4:30. The army and navy had joint jurisdiction over the program, representing his office of the undersecretary of war, Robert P. Patterson, by whose order the award was made. Upwards of a thousand people were on hand for the program, which was ever held in Grosse Pointe.

A brightly uniformed band from the Detroit Federation of Musicians, precluded the presentation exercises with an excellent concert of popular and classical band numbers. Five minutes before the start of the program, Vanco employees halted production temporarily and filed out of the building, taking their places behind the band, facing the speakers' platform. The huge crowd assembled at the scene, spontaneously broke out with a round of applause as tribute to the men these men had done. Another round met the army and navy officials as Jasper Van Opynen, owner of Vanco Machine and Engineering and other principals as they ascended speakers' platform promptly at 4:30. The stage was decorated with white and blue bunting and garlanded with flowers in patriotic color scheme.

Although not appearing officially on the program, Mrs. Van Opynen was seated on the speakers' platform and was asked to stand, by the master of ceremonies, Maj. Harvey Humphrey, USAAF, who explained that a lion's share of the success Vanco was due to the loyal ability of the owner's wife. She was given a fine ovation.

The methods and system used by Vanco were expressly lauded by Major Humphrey who pointed out their achievement was both unique and outstanding when it is known that during three short years, the company has reduced costs 400 per cent while increasing production 50 per cent. In many instances, making their prices 50 per cent less than competitors for the same items.

Acceptance of the Army-Navy "E" pins for the employees was made by Jack Refior, Harry Nelson and Wendell Hadley, with the latter as spokesman stating that employees dedicated themselves to a united effort to continue on the same and higher plane. Staff Sergeant George Lee, veteran of Guadalcanal and other battles of the South Pacific, was asked by Commander Cohan, USN, to assist in token award of the "E" pins. A native of Detroit, Sergeant Lee is a patient at Percy Jones hospital, Battle Creek.

we hired Henry, a man 72 years old, and he really started working. After that day, we could almost eat on the floor. That all is again an example that everyone must work and do his share to make a success of business and of life. It is Jack, it is Herb, it is Harry, it is Pete, it is Ray, and it is everybody, including our neighborhood, the grocery store and even the drug store.

"America gives opportunities to everyone, regardless of where he was born. I can say that I was born in The Netherlands. I was one of those fellows who was standing in Hoboken with two suitcases, one on each side, and didn't know whether to go east, west or north. I know very little of what is going on in this world, but I am sure that America cannot lose this war, if everybody puts his shoulder to the wheel. What Germany produced in 10 years, we did in two. When we start something, we finish it. We do not believe in half measures. That spirit and those American ideas are also in every employee of Vanco Machine. We will keep on going to finish our job now, and after this war.

"We believe in freedom and equal rights for everyone. We have principles and ideas that many countries do not understand. "May God save this country and give everyone the right to live like human beings are supposed to live. Thank you."

Lieut. Colonel Hart's Remarks- Lieut. Col. P. G. Hart of the USAAF, congratulated the Vanco employees on their personal, real and effective contribution to the war effort. He said, "In the glaring light of the invasion in Normandy, the invasion in Italy, the invasion of the islands of the Pacific, you have any doubt as to your part in the struggle, just pause a moment to think what would have happened had our troops not had the support of our air forces... flying into battle in planes powered by engines a part of which you made here at this plant."

"The time was, three short years ago, when there were not enough engines. Not enough engines, because the very parts you now make here were not available. This company — and each one of you is the company — stepped into the picture and the bottleneck was broken. Of your work your principal customer, Ford Motor company said, 'When we had difficulty in obtaining these particular parts, Vanco took hold of this job and in a very short time had the stuff flowing to us in quantities. High quality, few rejections and delivery promises were always kept. We feel that Vanco has made a definite contribution to the war effort.' As army air forces representative in the Ford plant where

the University of Holland and served in the Netherland Royal Navy as an engineering officer, second class, for three years. # SERVICE PARADE

An Advanced 7th AAF Base in the Marshalls. — Master Sergt. John P. Rieger, son of Mr. and Mrs. Philip Rieger, 1438 Wayburn, Grosse Pointe Park, is crew chief of the 7th AAF Liberator, "Bat Out of Hell," which has completed 32 successful bombing missions against the Japs in the Central Pacific.

To make possible the plane's record for never having had any serious mechanical trouble, Sergeant Rieger and his ground crew had to sweat several hours over the "Bat" in the heat and dust of coral atoll bases for every one of her 638 hours of combat flying time. The record includes many hours of search missions as well as the bombing sorties.

Both Sergeant Rieger and the plane's combat crew have been lucky for, in spite of anti-aircraft fire and Jap fighter interception, the "Bat"

has come through with only three bullet holes. It meant that Sergeant Rieger had very little patching or replacement work to do on his charge.

Before coming into the army Jan. 20, 1942, he was a seat installer at Hudson Motor Car Co., Detroit.

**Two Local Men Land With Forces in D-Day Operations in France**

Daily papers this past week have carried stories of the exploits of two Grosse Pointe men who have taken part in D-Day activities with the American forces in Normandy, France.

The first concerns Sergt. Wallace Caldwell, 25, of 97 Vendome Place, who with some of his buddies fought their way through bush to a ledge on a hill, after battling the Nazi line of 11 miles. All about them were German troops, paratroopers and infantrymen. But through it all, Caldwell and the others stormed the lines and ended up occupying captured Nazi dugouts.

The hill which was captured was one of the keys to the Mahlmann line which, thought the Germans, the Yanks would not be able to break through, but after withstanding 20 counterattacks in 24 hours, the attack was carried down the hill. Throughout the advancement of the American lines, the men were under heavy artillery fire. After some ten days of this, the boys were given a short rest.

The second Grosse Pointe man who we know to have taken part in similar activities is Maj. Martin S. Hayden of 610 University Place. He was in command of a Negro battalion, whose job it was to keep the supplies rolling to the invading forces from Great Britain. The major, whose promotion was made soon after landing on French soil, had a smaller force after hitting the beaches of Normandy, but those men who were left displayed an amazing amount of courage, and were able to go on with their work almost immediately.

Sergeant Caldwell's wife is the former Jane Colton, while the former Elizabeth Dodds is Mrs. Martin S. Hayden. The Haydens have two children.

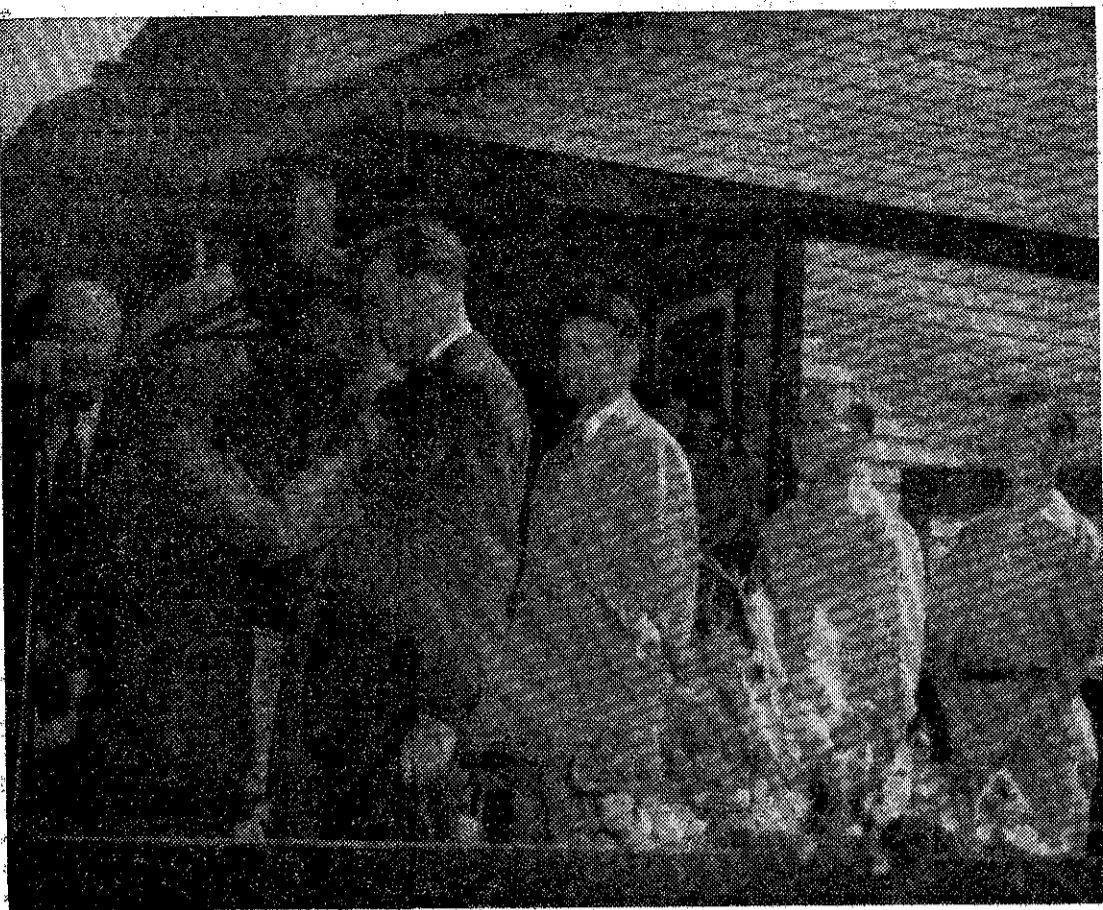

**Fire Losses Show Saboteur Failure On Home Front**

A communique from the home front this week reported enemy resistance stubborn, but progress satisfactory. It was signed by Commissioner Oscar G. Olander of the Michigan State Police.

The report concerned control of the No. 1 weapon of the enemy — fire. It showed that while Michigan's fire loss for the report period had increased, the gain was not in proportion to the increase in the country as a whole.

In the matter of both loss of life by fire and in fire destruction of rural property, there were decreases.

Statistics gathered by Arnold C. Renner, chief of the fire division of the State Police, showed the fire loss of the nation had increased approximately \$84,000,000 last year over the previous year. Yet the increase in Michigan, arsenal of a global war, where the saboteur's torch might break the fortunes of men at the front-increased but \$3,441,751.56.

The increase was "not alarming," therefore, in the opinion of Chief

Renner, who points out that part of the increase can be attributed to "inexperienced help in our manufacturing plants, speed-up war schedules, worn heating elements for which parts are not available and lack of sufficient help to maintain proper 'housekeeping' conditions in places where fire risks are great."

**Red Cross Sends Special Foods to Interned Children**

Wayne county people may be startled to realize that American children are in German internment camps but this fact is emphasized by the announcement that the American Red Cross is supplying special food to help them grow strong and healthy, William J. Norton, chairman of the Wayne Red Cross chapter, said today.

"Citizens of Wayne county should be happy to know that their contributions are helping to bring a balanced diet to the boys and girls who are civilian internees along with their parents," Mr. Norton said.

"To meet their nutritional needs, the American Red Cross has de-

signed a special infant's food package, shipped regularly through the International Red Cross committee."

Contents of the new package include: Two two-pound tins of whole milk powder, five bars of soap, seven pearls of vitamins A and B, a package of cereal, tins of spinach, carrots, peas, green beans, applesauce, liver soup with vegetables, custard pudding, apricots, prunes, pure concentrated orange juice, package of biscuits, package of granulated sugar and a tube of abolene.

Prepared by volunteers at the Red Cross food packaging center in

Philadelphia, the infant's food parcel is the sixth type package supplied by the American Red Cross for U. S. prisoners of war and civilian internees in enemy hands.

Coast Guard this week celebrates its 154th anniversary. The service has the longest record of unbroken service of all the nation's sea forces and has taken a fighting part in all our wars.

From post-Revolutionary days when it operated a handful of tiny 48-foot cutters concentrating on the collection of revenues for the infant republic, the coast guard has expanded in scope of its activities and in size until today it has more than 160,000 officers and enlisted men on its rolls and is fighting the Axis on major sea fronts all over the world. Peacetime activities of the coast guard center around the safety of life and property at sea, aiding navigation and enforcing federal laws at sea. The coast guard operates surf stations and cutters to spring into

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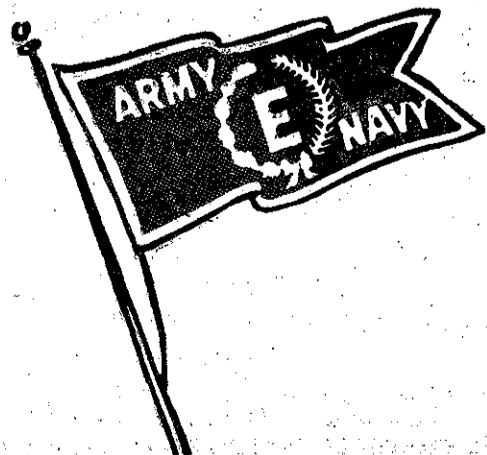
