## Levitt To Run His Pools Again

### Civil Defense Sign Up At High School Friday

HICKSVILLE—Registration of new Civil Defense volunteers and issuance of identification to those previously registered will take place tomorrow (Friday) night at the High School, according to Frank Sutter, CD director. The complete fingerprinting, photography and registration staffs will be present to handle all recruits of the Hicksville-Plainview area. Urgently needed, Sutter said, are aid wardens and auxiliary policemen.

### Start To Cut Up Huettner Bldg

HICKSVILLE—Demolition crews are at work remodeling one of Hicksville's best-known landmarks, the Huettner building at the corner of B'way and Marie St., this week. Charles Montana of Montana Realty, agents for the owners, told the HERALD this week that the first floor will be divided into five stores with modern fronts with the second floor converted for business offices. Occupancy for the stores is scheduled between August and September this year, he said. The entire brick building will be painted white and the marquee on Broadway will be taken down during the remodeling program.

### Water Waste Causes Deficit

HICKSVILLE—"Incredible variations in the use of water" by Levitt homeowners in this community, particularly by those who excessively water their lawns, was one of the factors in deficit escrow notices issued recently by the Bowers Savings Bank, it was revealed at the NLHOA meeting, Tuesday night. While the average bills for water used is around \$18 to \$20, some instances have been found of bills as high as \$66, the group was told. The Bowers declined to send a speaker to the meeting.

# REGISTER ON SATURDAY 3 Board Candidates For School Election

HICKSVILLE—Friends of three candidates for the school board in a special election set for next month were today plugging to get a peak registration of new voters this Saturday, May 24, at the high school between 4 and 9 p.m. The sign-up is for those who had not registered during April for the May annual election.

Allen S. Carpenter of 11 Loretta Lane is a candidate to succeed himself in the June 4 election. On the final date for filing for nominating petitions, last Monday, Mrs. Anthony J. Apicella of 340 Acre Lane submitted her document also. In addition, there was a surprise filing of a third candidate, Edward R. Ripple of 14 Bridle Lane, making three in the race.

#### NOW ON BOARD

Carpenter is serving by appointment, being named in April to replace Robert Corcoran who re-

signed. The term of office, would normally expire June 30, 1953.

Mrs. Apicella was an unsuccessful candidate with the backing of the Education Assoc. and North Levitt Home Owners Assoc. in a contest on May 7. She was defeated by Emil J. Szendy who will succeed Lawrence McCaffrey on July 1 for a three-year term.

Ripple is also a resident of the Levitt-built home area. His nominating petition was circulated by neighbor T. O. Thrash of 15 Bridle Lane.

The NLHOA at a special meeting Tuesday night heard Mrs. Apicella repeat her platform, which she says is exactly the same as for the May 7 election, and added "my platform never included issues other than education." Ripple was also a speaker, stating his platform is the same as Mrs. Apicella.

### Ask 3 Candidates To Speak Tonight

HICKSVILLE—The three candidates for election to the school board on June 4 have been invited to speak tonight (Thursday) at the Civic and Community Assoc meeting in the Firehouse auditorium on E. Marie St. Election of officers takes place at the same session.

William L. Geyer of 21 Grew St., first president of the Assoc when it was organized in 1948, is the nominee for election as president to succeed Stanley Mruz. The by-laws prohibit the president from holding more than two consecutive terms of office.

Other nominees include: Michael Smoith, vice president; George Blackley, treasurer; Fred J. North, secretary; Olga Cannistraro, financial secretary; with Leon Gebhard, Mruz, Florence Vryn, Anthony Cannistraro and Walter Warner for trustees.

Newly elected officers take over with the June meeting of the Association.

All residents of the community are invited to attend the HCCA meeting tonight when committee reports for the year are also expected.

HICKSVILLE—Levitt house owners in this community will be asked to "donate" \$1 per family to get new tags and help defray the expenses of maintaining the men at the entrance gates of the Levitt & Sons swimming pools at Newbridge Rd. and Levittown Pk'way this summer, it was voted at a special meeting of the North Levitt Home Owners Assoc. Tuesday night. The plan for pool operations this year was predicted exclusively in the Herald last week.

Levitt & Sons has "graciously consented" to bear the full expense of operating the two pools again this year, President Charles C. Miller, told the audience. Referring to the pools "in North Levitt town", the attorney for the Levitt organization, had written Miller that Levitt will "defray the full cost this summer" of operating the two pools and "has no objection to a charge of \$1 to a family to hire gate guards" provided that no direct charge for use of the facilities is made and that swimming.

### 3 Blasts For Fire At Sanatorium

HICKSVILLE—Signal "3" has been designated for Hicksville Fire District for notice of a call for fire emergency to the Nassau County Sanatorium in Old Bethpage, it was learned this week. The call will be three short blasts on the sirens it was revealed by Henry Gebhardt, custodian of the firehouse, at the Lions Club meeting last Wednesday.

Seventy-seven alarm boxes in the district are currently being numbered, he told the club, with six designations being set-up for six zones. In addition, 98 call numbers are being assigned for various locations in the district and the entire system will be keyed to an illuminated map in fire headquarters.

Provision is being made in the alarm system to provide a call box for each new school in the district and plans are set to accommodate future development of open areas.

Citing the increased activity for the vamps, Gebhardt said the firemen answered 330 calls last year with 127 already recorded this year. There were 118 calls for the 12 months in 1948.

Among those who urged unsuccessfully that the NLHOA "demonstrate its vote-getting power to professional politicians", by supporting a candidate for the school board were President Charles C. Miller, Vice President Jack Surkin and David Schwartz, chairman of the grass roots committee.

#### CARPENTER PLATFORM

A community-wide committee has been formed to support the Carpenter candidacy and to urge registration of voters this Saturday. In a statement to the Herald this week, Carpenter said "my sincere belief is that the calm, considered approach to our school problems will advance our district more speedily and more surely towards our goal than 'heiter-skelter' tactics."

"The calm understanding and hard work of our present school board", he continued, "is meeting the demands being made upon our schools without fanfare and panders. In spite of the fact that the population of the district has increased over 70 per cent in the past two years, almost all of our classes will open this fall with single sessions, and our school tax has been kept at a reasonable rate while it skyrocketed in neighboring districts."

A temporary canvas shelter was rigged over the corner of the front entrance of the building to cover the participants. A few residents of the neighborhood occupied an incomplete classroom to witness the brief ceremony conducted by Dr. E. H. LeBarron, superintendent of schools.

Speakers and participants included Dr. LeBarron, Henry C. Brenzel, board president; Edna Kuhns Sutton, board vice president; Rev. Howard Rogers, pastor of St. Stephen's Lutheran Church; William E. Koutensky, president of L.I. National Bank; Audrey Sutton, representing senior class of the high school.

Presentations of tokens for inclusion in the cornerstone included

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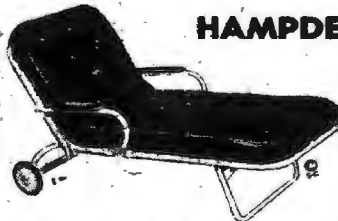
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**Cancer Crusade At Double Goal**

**Town To Fix Roads About June 1**

At a special meeting held on May 13, Ernest F. Francke, County Clerk; John R. Brandt, Highway Supt. and Frank Chlumsky, Town Councilman, were present to answer questions pertaining to Town government responsibilities to roads, speeding, garbage and park areas. As stated in last week's special bulletin in the HERALD, work will begin on the resurfacing of the roads and application of bluestone on June 1st.

Brandt stated that there were no laws or ordinances to compel the installation of curbs, but with permission of the town he would

substitute a plant mix to give curb effect and prevent the collection of water in front of residences, especially on corners. With regard to the question of drainage a profile survey has been made of the entire area and if found practical a sump may be built and fenced in by the Highway Dept. providing such land is made available by the builder. Chlumsky assured the members present that this work would be completed and gave Mr. Brandt's department the go-ahead to complete the repairs on these roads including bluestone application.

Francke asked Brandt would Chlumsky if these repairs would be of a permanent nature and was

assured that they would be. Next the question of speed limits in a residential area was asked of Mr. Chlumsky. He stated that it was not a town function but that of the State Traffic Control Commission. Correspondence was introduced by the President on the speed question and Brandt informed the membership that he has recommendations of State Traffic Control Commission at his office and would make a copy available to the association for further study.

Chlumsky stated further that no speed limit can be maintained except at intersections.

The present speed limit of 50 mph except at intersections is certainly a ridiculous situation and everyone can rest assured that the association and residents will not tolerate any speeding whatsoever in our area. Stop street signs where town roads meet town roads should be erected. The Assoc. therefore will present a petition to the Town Board to have a hearing granted for permission to obtain these stop signs as soon as possible.

The question of park and parking facilities for the residents in Hicksville Park and Parking District was presented and Chlumsky was told of the offer recently made by Mr. Spiegel for the purchase of certain of his properties which appeared in the HERALD and advised that he had not been approached by Spiegel, but would be willing to discuss the matter. He also told of one acre of land that the Town Board is requesting Frank & Staekler, builders to set aside when they build on North Broadway, near Bethpage Rd. and Willets Ave. Another parcel of land on James St. adjacent to the new Burns Avenue School is also a possibility.

# Riding The Microwaves

with **MARGARET SAVIN**



**IF YOU FIND IT HARD TO DEFINE** the term "humor" which has an abstract meaning look for your answer by tuning into Channel 2 Tuesdays at 8 p.m. **HUMOR** is a bespectacled school teacher from Brooklyn named Sam Levenson.

Sam Levenson is more than a TV performer and more than a comedian. He is the embodiment of the specific facet of human nature known as "a sense of humor." In a modified sort of way the old adage that only thru suffering can you achieve greatness is confirmed in Sam's case. A fellow with a name just like so many others and an appearance that could help him be nominated the man most likely to get lost in a crowd "made it" as we say in show business. He has his own television show. Apart from the personal satisfaction which Sam must get out of this achievement he also scores by proving that the saying "it's not what you know, it's whom you know" is utterly untrue.

Sam comes from a large family and his early youth was overshadowed by the depression. But the strifes that inevitably result when the purse can not keep up with the needs of a growing family have not affected his ability to be gay. What's more, he manages to pass his natural gaiety on to whomever is within ear range of his contagious laughter.

During one of his shows the lead-in made it clear that the topic will be a funeral but somehow both Mr. Levenson and his studio audience were roaring with laughter when he finally managed to pronounce the rather solemn word.

CBS dresses the show up with visiting celebrities and variety acts. That's fine. But for our part, we would be perfectly satisfied with just fifteen minutes or a half hour of pure, undiluted Sam Levenson.

**PRODUCER WARREN WADE** has answered many a televisioner's prayer when he conceived the plan for WOR's "Broadway TV Theatre." Few suburbanites have the possibility to see more than a couple of Broadway hits during a theatre season. This explains the warm welcome with which they receive most of the dramatic programs. Due to the code of functioning which governs television transmission certain programs come into our homes on certain days. As fate may have it hubby's boss might drop in for dinner the day our favorite drama is on the air. It might have been a minor tragedy of this type that prompted Mr. Wade to bring us the TV Theatre five days across the board. Thus he brings us a new kind of television freedom: The freedom to watch a play because we feel-like sampling this particular type of entertainment and not just because it happens to be Wednesday.

As on the legitimate stage the selection of suitable TV scripts is usually connected with a lot of trial and error, plenty of error Mr. Wade has overcome this problem by offering us only time-tested Broadway hits. Many a landmark in theatre history has been brutally maimed in the name of TV time requirements. Yet the time limitations can only be accepted as an explanation, not as an excuse, why the play in question lacked its original punch and intelligibility.

Veteran showman Wade must have suffered, just as I did, thru many a compressed version of what once had been a great play. Consequently he decided to do something that made theatre lovers of the old school very happy. He now brings us a ninety-minute dramatic show. I enjoyed the flawless performance of "Angel in the Pawnshop", a clever little play built around a frightened girl who tries to hide from reality by transposing herself into a 18th century dream world.

Out of professional curiosity I watched the same play for three consecutive nights. Mine was a heartwarming experiment because I proved to me that theatre, real theatre of Broadway standards, is possible on TV. So far about ten million viewers share my opinion and I bet any amount of my microwaves that "Broadway TV Theatre" will become a weekly MUST for every adult TV set owner.

## Jetties At Point Lookout

Immediate construction of three stone jetties, ranging from 450 to 750 feet to build up sand and help stop shoreline erosion at Point Lookout was assured this week when the Town Board of Hempstead passed a resolution to share with the State of New York the cost of the \$775,000 project.

Professional politicians of the state, county, town and community," he said, "are interested in the civic spirit of a community. They are interested in how much voting power we display."

He indicated that failure to participate actively in such local elections could seriously jeopardize projects of the group—such as the efforts to split the Hicksville Park and Parking District.

It was pointed out that linking of a school-election, for example, with the educational future of our children at stake, to a political question is "unfortunate" but, according to the NLHOA leader, such activity guides the politicians.

David Schwartz who had told the Town Board at the May 9 hearing that he is closer to the people than anyone else because he is head of the NLHOA block workers, carried on the theme advanced by Miller. Obviously distressed, Schwartz said a civic group must either convince "people in high places that it can swing elections" or it becomes a debating society.

Schwartz went on to charge that "there is a force in this community seeking to create dissension with an alleged plot to break up dear old Hicksville."

He went on to claim that the move to incorporate Hicksville as a village with its own local government is all part of a grand scheme to create sectionalism.

We fail to see, even if we tried to agree with Miller and Schwartz, how a movement to incorporate ALL OF HICKSVILLE into one village could be "sectionalism." It appears that the pot is trying to call the kettle black. By the very name of the organization, the NLHOA has fostered sectionalism from the start.

JUST ABOUT A YEAR AGO we wrote a piece citing the tax-wise, dollars and cents advantage of being a resident of Hicksville. The past 12 months have proven what we predicted. Tax rates in Hicksville, because various facilities have already been paid for by the hard work of our taxpayers over the years, are lower than neighboring districts to the south. The advantage will become more distinct as the years roll on.

The flurry of excitement caused in the NLHOA executive ranks when it was suggested that a move to split be clean-cut—right through the fire, street lighting and other districts, also proves that those who talk the most about being part of the "way of life" that they say Levittown represents, are just talking.

Must we redefine the meaning of a community? When people live under the same government, send their children to the same school, vote in the same elections, attend the same churches, they have to "build together" with pride and neighborliness for their mutual happiness. Constant bitterness and fighting will not "build". Sectionalism will not "build". Pride in a community, its progress and its position in the events of the world are essential as a cornerstone upon which to grow in peace and harmony.

In the past two years many have come to evaluate events about them what they read and what they are told. The declining influence of the NLHOA proves that the people know the score.

GI home loans are available to eligible World War II veterans and to unmarried widows of World War II veterans who died in service or as a result of service-connected disabilities. For loans made by private lenders (banks, organizations or individuals), Veterans Administration is empowered to guarantee the lenders against loss up to 60 per cent of each loan, with a maximum guarantee of \$7,500.00. Minimum down payments are required on the GI home loans under credit control requirements of the Defense Production Act. These down payments are less than for non-GI loans. Eligible veterans and unmarried widows in the permitted class have until July 25, 1957, to apply for guaranteed GI home loans.

## Another Citation Against Split

The following is a letter I have sent to the Oyster Bay Town Board:

I respectfully urge you to maintain the boundaries of the Hicksville Park and Parking District as they are

I am sure there is a way of giving the Levitt home owners exclusive use of the swimming pools without resorting to splitting the present Park and Parking District with its attendant complications and undoubted increased costs.

The following is an outline of my reasoning.

1. When extreme divergence of opinion such as we have in Hicksville today, exists on any issue, there is usually a middle road which in the way of wisdom, I believe splitting the district to be an extreme action.
2. Very properly the owners of Levitt homes want to retain the use of their pools for themselves. Also, very properly many citizens do not wish to disrupt the present district which is identical in area to our other districts. I believe that the desires of both groups can be mutually compatible.
3. Let the swimming pools be re-

organized as the "Selling Gimmicks" they really are. Free use of the pools was promised. Did Levitt & Sons mean in perpetuity? Or did they mean some shorter time? This must necessarily be considered in determining how the pools are to be governed.

4. There are several alternatives which will fulfill the desires of both groups. For instance, it may be possible for the present district to accept the pools from Levitt & Sons for the exclusive use of Levitt home owners. Per-

haps more desirable would be a but without saying for how long. Foundation or non-profit corporation to administer the pools. If the Community Hall is a factor the foundation method would have considerable advantages. The members of the Board are to be commended for their patience in listening to all who wished to be heard at the public hearing. I sincerely hope that you will find a solution which will be satisfactory to both groups.

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## One Vote Is Important

"Our forefathers fought for the right to vote—but do we care much for that right today?" wrote Hugh Forster, Chairman, Civic Committee, Lancaster, Pennsylvania. "Apparently we don't!"

Mr. Forster then cited some facts which should make America ashamed of itself. In a recent election, 90 per cent of Belgium's eligible voters went to the polls. Almost as many eligible Italian voters cast ballots in the election that rebuffed Communism, and 82 per cent voted in the last British election. Other nations have comparable records. But only 51 per cent of eligible Americans voted in the Presidential election of 1948.

It's an easy alibi to say that just one vote doesn't matter, so why take the trouble to visit the polls. The fact is that one vote can be overwhelmingly important. Mr. Forster described cases where a small number of votes made history. As an example, in 1884 James Blaine lost New York State by much less than one vote per precinct. Had he carried New York he would have defeated Cleveland and become President.

Such exceptional cases to one side, every American freedom rides solidly on the right of franchise. The secret ballot is the greatest defense against tyranny ever devised in the tangled history of mankind. No one who fails to vote can call himself a good citizen. He is, instead, a shirker of the worst possible kind.

**NORTH EAST REPORT:**

**Protect Birch Trees From Insects**

By Lee Chanin  
Hicksville 3-8553 R

I learned the answer to a serious condition which occurs to birch leaves in the spring. Last year every birch tree I saw had leaves that looked like they had been singed by fire and it both puzzled and annoyed me. Our trees seemed hopelessly doomed.

The cause is the birch leaf miner. You may have noticed clouds of tiny black flies hovering over your birches. They are sawflies, adults of the miner, laying eggs in the centers of the leaves. From ten days to two weeks after the egg is deposited the miner hatches out and begins to eat away the tissue between the upper and lower surfaces of the leaf until it becomes hollow and turns brown. As many as three and four generations of the miner develop in a season.

To check this condition you must start early with the first generation. An insecticide called lindane kills both the larvae in the minor and the egg. Better results are obtained if the underside of the leaves are covered with the spray.

This certainly looks encouraging for birches this season.

I don't know in which Township Dept. the following belongs (perhaps the Highway Dept.) but I feel it necessary to call attention to it: Driving along Willet Ave. and also Bethpage Rd., I've noticed many insect nests attached to the branches of the trees growing on either sides of the road. Shouldn't steps be taken to have these sprayed and destroyed before they hatch out millions of pests to plague us this summer?
