**School Tax Collections Reached 98 Per Cent**

**OYSTER BAY**—Taxpayers of the mid-Island area paid more than 97 per cent of the taxes due for School Districts to Town Tax Receiver David Welsh before June 1. In the township, Welsh disclosed, 98 per cent was collected on a warrant of \$13,571,349.17 before the rolls were returned to County Treasurer Bogart Seaman.

In Hicksville district 98.99 per cent was collected on a school tax levy of \$2,377,209.64. Other mid-Island collections were: Jericho District, \$322,228.91 or 97.17 per cent; Plainview, \$854,634.75 or 99.11 per cent; Old Bethpage, \$64,535.05 or 99.21 per cent; Bethpage, \$1,296,580.66 or 98.90 per cent and Plainedge, \$1,108,659.54 or 98.19 per cent.

Final notices were sent to all delinquent taxpayers that unpaid 1955-56 school taxes are now payable to the County Treasurer at the New County Courthouse in Mineola.

**Crossing Victim Wants \$300,000**

**NEW YORK CITY**—Ralph Martin, driver of the 30-ton earth mover which derailed a Long Island Rail Road locomotive and mail car in a collision at the Bay Ave RR grade crossing in Hicksville last year on May 21 has brought suit against the LIRR and others for \$300,000 in damages, it was learned today.

Martin, 31, a resident at that time of Happaugue, narrowly escaped with his life when the heavy equipment collided with the diesel engine and turned it down E. Barclay St.

Martin was hospitalized for a long time with head and other injuries.

LIRR crews and highway workers were at the scene for 18 hours to get the engine back on the tracks and clear the crossing.

Papers have been served upon defendants in the \$300,000 action taken in U. S. District Court, Southern District, here.

The same Barclay St. - Bay Ave. grade crossing was the scene of another accident during the week when a car driven by Frank Alessio, 39, of 21 Adams St., Hicksville, was hit by the city-bound train at 6:45 in the morning.

The train struck the car in the rear, tearing off part of the side and throwing the gas tank 20 feet. Alessio was thrown unconscious from the vehicle but suffered only minor injuries, it was reported.

**Ex-Chief Munch Served 32 Years**

**HICKSVILLE**—Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at Henry J. Stock Funeral Home by the Rev. Dr. M. G. Gosselink of the Parkway Community Church for Daniel Francis Munch of 207 First St., who died on Saturday, June 9.

Mr. Munch was an active member of the fire department for 32 years and a former captain of Co. 4 and an ex-chief. He was a charter member of the Exempt Firemen's Assoc. and served as its treasurer for 16 years. He was employed by the LI State Park Commission at Jones Beach.

**HICKSVILLE**—Hundreds of circus fans, young and old, were up at the crack of dawn, Tuesday, to see the arrival of the circus train at the LIRR freight yards here. The first of a 3-section train began to unload at the yard at five in the morning. Rubber-tired trailers loaded with circus gear rolled down E. John St., Woodbury Rd., Park Ave. and Plainview Rd. to the area next to Hillside Terrace where, almost magically, tents rose and the grounds took shape.

After performances on Tuesday and Wednesday, afternoons and evenings, the Ringling Bros. and Barnum & Bailey Circus just as efficiently packed up again and rolled out of the depot last night and headed for Stamford, Conn. and a tour thru New England.

The 30-car train came here in three sections. Extra-long flat cars, when emptied, were shunted to Plainlawn and Mineola while others were unloaded here. The entire operation of bringing the circus in and out of town required close cooperation and timing for the LIRR, circus people, local police. 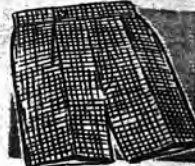

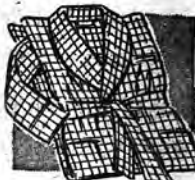

# Allen Mfg. Builds 3 Plants Here in 3 Years

HICKSVILLE—An embryonic empire is emerging in this community's industrial section, right in the midst of Long Island's fishermen and sailors.

The Allan Manufacturing Co. has been building a new plant here every year since it moved to this community three years ago. Almost every fishing rod made and many boats have Allan metal fixtures on them, according to John R. Powers Jr., Public Relations and Sales Promotion Manager.

Five of Allan company's nine manufacturing operations are housed in the three plants here, in addition to numerous administrative divisions.

The Allan Manufacturing Co., which came here first, is at 400 Duffy Ave., near Wantagh State Park. It is a factory producing rod mountings and puts finishing on products made in the other plants—for a price. Although this is the parent company for all the plants, and includes purchasing, sales, factory planning and security services which the other plants use, it acts a charge for the others on finishing their products and any other manufacturing services.

The Allan Manufacturing came here three years ago. A year later, the G & M Co. followed and moved here from New York City. The G & M is seven years old, the oldest division in the company. Its two-year old plant was built on Frank Rd., not far from Allan Manufacturing. G & M produces screw machined parts.

About two months ago, the third plant was opened, called Allan Marine. It stands next to G & M on Frank Rd. This is the Marine Division of Allan Manufacturing Co., which produces marine hardware—metal fixtures such as bits, chocks, carlocks, and running lights.

Allan Marine division also makes an automatic pilot which the United States Coast Guard has installed on some of its Geodetic Survey boats. Powers estimated that 30 or 40 of these pilots have been sold so far. Set for a particular point on the compass, the pilot will keep the boat on a straight course without human steering.

The beginnings of two other Allan branches are housed in this newest plant. One is a division which produces frequency modulators for the United States Signal Corps. The division is called Colortone Electronic Co. It may grow large enough in the future to warrant a plant of its own.

The other is the Allan Air Products Corp., which produces air conditioners. This division, too, is being watched for signs of future expansion into an independent plant.

In addition to the five manufacturing operations in this community, the company has four other plants. They are in Middletown, Conn.; Newark, N. J.; Paterson and Brooklyn. Administrative divisions, also organized as separate companies, operate from the Allan Building at 400 Duffy Ave.

Powers compared the Allan network with a miniature General Motors organization—in which nu-



merous divisions compete with one another and perform services for one another and make use of central facilities provided by a parent company. The joint facilities provided by the Allan company include secretarial and joint purchasing arrangements.

"Actually it isn't as complicated as it sounds," Powers said. "We just do business with one another. But if the prices aren't right, we buy outside." Eventually it is planned that all Allan plants will be located here. Allan Manufacturing Co. owns the land around Frank Rd. which would be the center for future buildings.

Powers pointed out that few people in Hicksville realized that Allan Manufacturing Co. is the world's largest manufacturer of rod mountings. Practically every fishing rod that a fisherman buys has some Allan fixture—either a tip top, a rod guide, a ferrule or a reel seat.

This area is particularly appropriate for the fishing rod company. Long Island is the center of fishing activity throughout the country, Powers said. There are more licensed fishermen per square mile and more boats here on Long Island per person than anywhere else in the country, he said.

The facilities the island offers for leisure time activities is important to Allan in other ways. One consideration in the company's move to Hicksville, Powers said, was that the company personnel would be close to recreational facilities such as swimming and boating. "That's what makes it worthwhile living on the island," Powers concluded.

Besides providing leisure time activities for its workers, this area provides a good labor supply for the company. Powers said that the company approved of the desirable workers here. They tend to be steady, and many are homeowners, he said.

The non-unioned Allan employees make more than union wages, Powers said. They share in the company's profits and stocks, too, he added. About 325 full-time personnel are employed by the company. Its total annual payroll runs to about \$750,000.00, Powers said. He estimated total sales volume at four or five million dollars annually.

The major stockholders of the company are Alan Gittleson, president; Chris Chion, vice president; Arnold Klein, general manager of the Allan Marine Division; and Henry and Sel Gittleson.

Powers attributed the rapid expansion of the Allan operations primarily to "new blood" in management. The major executives average 40 years of age, he said, which makes the company administration vital and progressive.

Boats and fishing are increasing in popularity and this, too, accounts for some of the company's

### Drutman Sees Change In Board

To the Editor: Isn't it strange how school board members change when they graduate from a "minority bloc" to a "majority bloc"? For years Messrs. Szendy and Eirich wrote letters after public letter attacking the "compact majority" on the following issues—

1. The "majority" ignored the expressed wishes of the "public" (26 names on a petition) by appointing a successor to Mr. Schoel.
2. The "majority" exerted pressure upon administrators by asking

them to participate in controversial matters—such as new school construction for single session classes.

3. The "majority" denied Mr. Eirich unlimited access to all files and correspondence—including those of a personal nature.

Now that the elections are over, Messrs. Szendy and Eirich take an altogether different view of their former grievances.

1. The Szendy majority intends to ignore the expressed wishes of the public who voted overwhelming at the annual budget meeting for

higher salaries for principals and teachers, for a referendum on a recreation program, and for more flexible transportation policy.

2. The Szendy majority doesn't exert pressure on administrators to intimidate the Superintendent and fires administrators by mail even before the new majority takes office. It tells the Superintendent in advance whom not to recommend, or else. In addition, it attempts to fire a principal and three custodians by setting up new age and residence requirements.

3. The Szendy majority denies to the rest of the board a copy of a letter sent to the Superintendent signed by Messrs. Eirich, Szendy, Carpenter and Eaton which in substance fires Assistant Superintendents Walling and Miller. This is an official letter since it deals (possibly illegally) with school policy.

Those who are concerned with the quality of the education received by their children for the next three years should watch for the following danger signs—

—Further dismissals and resignations over personality clashes.

—A "spoils" system of choosing replacements for district clerk, school attorney, custodians, clerks, principals.

—A do nothing policy on construction of badly needed classrooms, even those already voted for.

—Direct interference by board members into matters of purely school administration.

—A watered down curriculum.

We can only hope Messrs. Carpenter and Eaton will rise above the present atmosphere of petty recriminations and personal vengeance, an atmosphere which certainly ruin the future of the Hicksville school system.

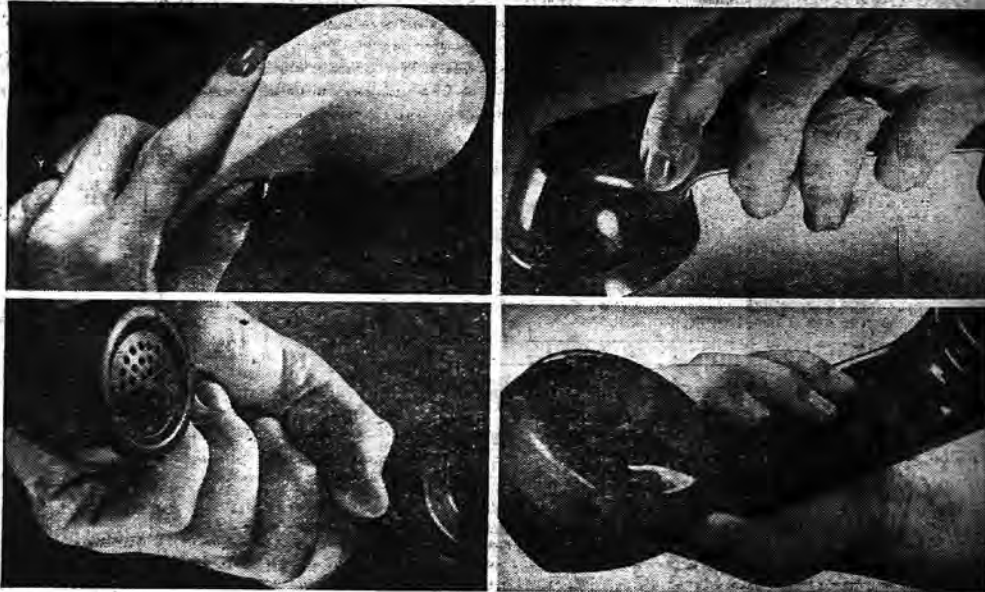

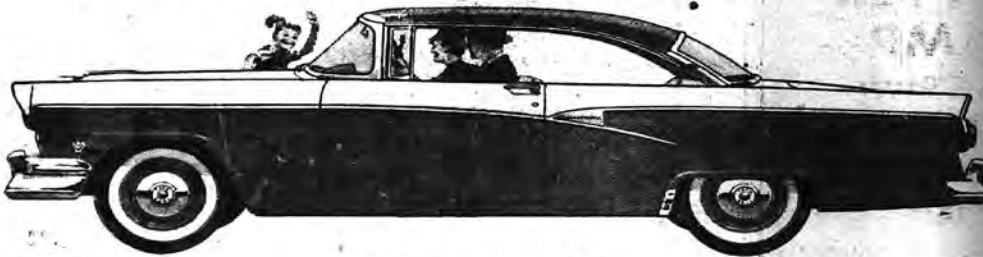
