## Alumni News

President Thompson made his annual visit to the Eastern part of the United States during the middle of October. On the heels of Homecoming, the Lincoln Center dedication and the fall meeting of the board of directors, the president flew to the East Coast where he spent 10 days in New England, New York City and Cleveland. Mrs. Thompson accompanied him.

In addition to visiting with alumni, President Thompson held a series of meetings in the Greater Boston area and Connecticut with high school counselors, ministers, and potential students and their parents. The daily schedules were crowded with morning, afternoon and evening sessions.

Next the president spent a full day in New York City visiting with officials of foundations which are headquartered there.

Before returning to Sioux City on the 23rd, he attended the 20th annual conference of the National Council on Philanthropy in Cleveland. The sessions bring together the heads of foundations and other philanthropic organizations together with representatives of institutions seeking aid.

During the East Coast trip, the president and Mrs. Thompson also visited the campus at Yale, where Dr. Thompson received Air Force cadet training in World War II.

## College's Big Weekend:

# Lincoln Dedication, Homecoming

Ahead lay one of the busiest days in Morningside's history as the college community set out on a cool morning, Oct. 12, to celebrate Homecoming and dedicate the new Robert M. Lincoln Center for Business Administration, Economics and Continuing Education.

Committees had been busy for weeks planning both events. The homecoming activities, including the parade, were under the direction of chairman Jim Goede and his student committee; President Thompson headed a committee of some 30 members of the college staff, students and townspeople who planned the dedication.

With a chill wind hurrying the threatening clouds, the marchers assembled at the corner of Eleventh and Pierce Streets. Then at 10 a.m., with the band and Grand Marshall Robert Lincoln's car leading the way, the parade started downtown. Nineteen bands, colorful floats and antique cars carrying the royalty and other dignitaries were in the hour-long line of march.

In spite of the weather, the parade was successful in stirring enthusiasm and was especially welcome after a lapse of several years.

The traditional luncheons for M-Club members and women alumni followed soon after. Dave Mulder, athletic director at Sioux Center high school, addressed the men of the M and new officers were introduced, including Mike Caldwell, president, Don Krone, vice president, and Nathan Goldberg, secretary.

The pre-game show at 1 p.m. in Roberts Stadium featured the high school units which had performed during the parade. The USD and Chiefs bands presented the halftime entertainment.

The game itself was a wide-open affair which roused the Morningside fans, though the Chiefs ended up on the wrong end of a 49-21 score.

Shortly after the game several hundred people assembled in front of the Lincoln Center for the dedication ceremony. Bruce Crary, chairman of the college's board of directors, introduced the platform guests and acknowledged the contribution of individuals, firms, organizations and foundations who helped to build the center.

Dr. David Mobberley, representing the board of ministry and education of the United Methodist Church, led the audience in a special ceremony for the dedication of the building.

A group of Hawaiians, flown to Sioux City for the occasion by friends of Mr. and Mrs. Lincoln, draped a lei across the doors of the center and sang a Hawaiian hymn. Robert Lincoln removed the lei and the building was officially opened.

The outdoor program was followed by tours of the Lincoln Center conducted by members of Phi Beta Mu business fraternity.

President Thompson served as master of ceremonies for the Homecoming-Dedication Banquet at 6 p.m. in the main dining room of the Commons. Nearly 300 people attended as the main speaker of the evening, Thomas S. Nurnberger, president of Northwestern Bell Telephone Company, spoke on the role of profits in society.

The group from Hawaii, led by Don Kualii, a friend of Mr. and Mrs. Lincoln, presented a special program of island music and dancing for an audience of 800 in Eppley Auditorium at 8:15 p.m. The troupe, Tahunah and his Polynesian Revue, is featured at the Kona Inn. Their visit was without charge to the college.

Completing the day's activities was a concert in Allee Gymnasium by Pure Prairie League, a country rock group.

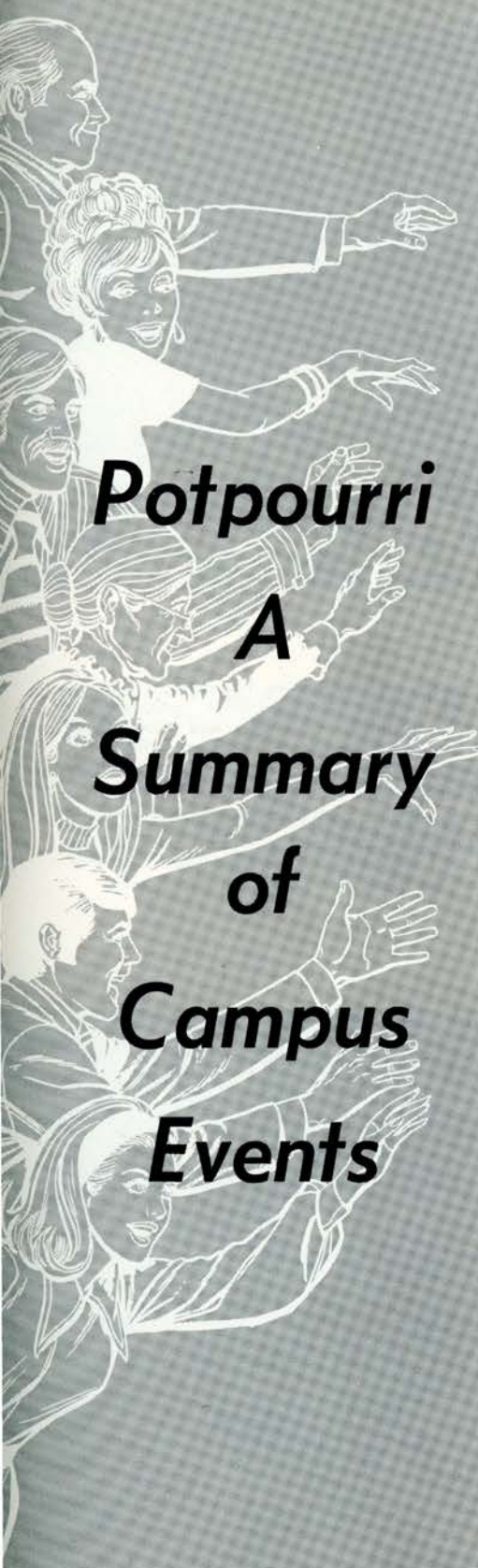

# Potpourri A Summary of Campus Events

## FEDERAL GRANT FUNDS NEW NURSING PROGRAM

Morningside's new four-year program offering a Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree received a \$105,000 grant in July representing complete funding for the 1974-75 academic year.

The award was a special projects grant from the division of nursing of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. According to President Thompson, the money is being used for faculty salaries, to purchase equipment and supplies, and to develop a nursing library.

The college adopted the program after a federally funded feasibility study, initiated in 1972, showed a need for baccalaureate nurses in Northwest Iowa. Mrs. Margaret Sokolowski, director of the study, is continuing as chairman of the new Nursing Department.

Beginning with the fall semester the department's quarters were moved from Jones Hall to the lower level of Lewis Hall in space formerly occupied by Business Administration and Economics.

## ENROLLMENT REPORT: SLIGHT UPS, DOWNS

Fall enrollment at Morningside was down slightly in fulltime students from the preceding year, but the number of part-time students increased, according to the official report from the Registrar's Office.

The latest figures show 1,155 full-time students (those carrying 12 or more semester hours), 12 students less than were registered for the 1973 fall term. At the same time the number of part-time students rose from 305 to 325, according to preliminary figures.

Morningside's total student population—full and part-time, undergraduate and graduate—reached 1,480, compared to 1,472 in September 1973.

In addition to the increase in part-time students (which includes evening school enrollment) the number of entering freshmen was 371, up five from the previous year. Students transferring from other colleges and universities increased by 33.

President Thompson called the report encouraging in view of national trends. He urged the admissions staff,

faculty, students and alumni to redouble last year's efforts to increase enrollment.

"With broad participation among the college community, we can build a stronger Morningside," the president said.

## BOARD APPROVES RAISES, ELECTS BOB KNOWLER

Morningside's board of directors voted at the October meeting to approve a five percent pay increase for members of the faculty and administration for the 1975-76 academic year.

As part of its preliminary budget considerations the board also elected to set aside funds for merit increases. The directors endorsed renewed fundraising and recruiting efforts—with student participation—in order to strengthen the college's financial position.

Opting for a "positive" approach to enrollment and budgets, the board demurred from cuts in the size of the faculty as the best solution.

Because of a strained budget, faculty and administrators did not receive raises for the current academic year.

Bob Knowler, Sioux City retailer and Morningside supporter, was elected to fill the vacancy on the board created by the death of Keene Roadman in June. Knowler, owner of Black Knight Men's Wear in the Peters Park Shopping Center, has been active in community affairs and in support of the college.

## GRUESKIN TO DIRECT SUSTAINING PROGRAM

Earle Grueskin, president of Dividend Bonded Gas and former mayor of Sioux City, will serve as chairman of the college's sustaining program for the coming year.

The announcement was made by President Thompson at a luncheon in September honoring Leslie H. Olson, who has headed the program for the past 12 months.

Olson, president of Toy National Bank, directed some 30 Siouxland business leaders who contacted their counterparts in business, industry and the professions. Funds from the annual campaign are used to supplement other revenues in meeting the college's operating expenses.

President Thompson introduced Darryl Ahnemann, Morningside's new director of development, and the group toured the new Lincoln Center following the luncheon.

### TEN NEW MEMBERS ON COLLEGE STAFF

The 1974-75 academic year opened with ten new persons on the Morningside faculty and administrative staff and several veterans in different offices.

New faculty members include:

**Maud Adams**, former professor of nursing education and human ecology at the University of Kansas Medical Center in Kansas City. Miss Adams is associate professor in Morningside's new Department of Nursing, which is implementing the four-year, Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) program.

**Ruth Margaret Rand**, who has taught or served as an administrator in nursing programs at eight hospitals and universities and most recently as consultant to St. Joseph School of Nursing in Sioux City. Another member of the Department of Nursing faculty, she is ranked as an assistant professor.

**Margaret Mary Barela**, who has been completing her doctoral studies at Indiana University. Miss Barela is serving as an assistant professor in the Music Department. She received her bachelor's degree from the University of New Mexico and a master's with highest distinction from Indiana. Her major field is piano.

**Grafton Hull Jr.**, former supervisor with the Manitowoc County (Wisconsin) Department of Social Services. Hull, who has a master's degree from Florida State University, is assistant professor of Social Work. From 1969-71 he was a captain in the social work section of the Army's Mental Hygiene Consultation Service at Fort Knox, Ky.

**Robert Louis Franklin**, who has been a member of the Westmar College faculty since 1967. He is lecturing in Chemistry at Morningside under a cooperative arrangement between the colleges to share his services. An alumnus of Westmar, Dr. Franklin holds a Ph.D. from Michigan State University.

**John Gordon**, former faculty member at University of Kentucky, Drake University and Westmar. Gordon is ranked as associate professor in the Art Department. He served for several years as artist in residence at the Des Moines Art Center.

**Larry David Sensenig**, who has been working toward a doctorate at Iowa State University. He is ranked as an assistant professor and is teaching in the Psychology Department. Sensenig has a bachelor's degree from Bradley and a master's from Iowa State, where he was serving as a graduate assistant.

Those who have joined the administrative staff are:

**Sharon L. Johnson**, formerly assistant director for student affairs at Ottumwa Heights College. Miss Johnson is serving as assistant dean for student affairs and director of Dimmitt Hall. She holds bachelor's and master's degree from the University of Wisconsin at LaCrosse.

**Darryl O. Ahnemann**, former administrator at Wartburg College and Columbus Academy at Gahanna, Ohio. Ahnemann, Morningside's new director of development, was in charge of the annual fund at Wartburg for five years and served as public relations and development director at Columbus.

**Jerry Baker**, a May graduate of Morningside, is serving as admission counselor in the Chicago area. A biology major, Jerry was active in Student Government and campus life at Morningside and during his senior year was director of the Commons Board of Control.

Among the staff members who are filling new assignments within the college are:

**Roberta Boothby**, assistant dean for student affairs since 1969. Miss Boothby has returned to teaching in women's physical education, where she served from 1965 to 1968. A member of the Morningside class of 1964, she received a master's degree in education from Eastern Kentucky University in 1969.

**Joseph Faltemier**, former chairman of the Sociology Department,

who now is director of the Social Science Research Center. Another Morningside graduate (1963), Faltemier has been a member of the staff since 1969. He received a Master of Social Work degree from the University of Nebraska in 1965.

**Arnold Brandt**, associated with the Physical Education faculty since 1963, fills the new post of director of student housing within the Office for Student Affairs. Brandt will continue as coach of the wrestling team, but is no longer teaching physical education.

**Duane (Dewey) Halford**, who has served during the past year as assistant to the dean of the college, has returned to fulltime teaching within the Physical Education Department. Halford, Morningside's football coach from 1955 through 1973, has been a member of the staff for nearly 20 years.

**Dennis Kuhn**, an admissions counselor, is now assisting John Dornon with the football team. Kuhn, before coming to Morningside, was on the staff at Ellsworth Community College in Iowa Falls. He is working with junior colleges and secondary schools in Iowa and Nebraska.

### 34 RECEIVE DEGREES IN EPPLEY CEREMONY

Thirty-four persons were presented degrees from Morningside College at summer commencement exercises in Eppley Auditorium Aug. 23. The list included 24 candidates for bachelor's degrees, seven for Master of Arts in Teaching (MAT) and three honoraries.

Serving as commencement speaker was Paul Berger, former mayor of Sioux City, who warned against the persistent erosion of power from the people to special interest groups.

Berger was one of three Sioux City men to receive honorary degrees at the evening program. He and the Rev. John Hantla Jr., director of Wall Street Mission Goodwill Industries, were awarded Doctor of Laws degrees, and Gaylord Smith, vice president and comptroller of Security National Bank, received a Doctor of Humane Letters degree.

## GRID VICTORY ELUDES STRUGGLING CHIEFS

The Morningside football Chiefs failed in their first five attempts to reverse a 0-9 winless season last year. But Coach John Dornon, who is in his first year at the helm of the Chiefs, remained hopeful.

At press time, the Chiefs had four more North Central teams to contend with prior to the close of the season. Games remaining included University of South Dakota, University of Northern Iowa, South Dakota State University and Augustana College.

The Chiefs season opener was a first time meeting with the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point. In that game the Pointers of Stevens Point showed their nationally ranked passing powerhouse and defeated the Chiefs by a 30-0 score.

In a final non-conference tilt prior to entering conference action the Chiefs were beaten by the University of Nebraska-Omaha. Morningside held well and second half aggressive-ness would have given the Chiefs a win if the Mavericks had not scored so early in the game. The Chiefs did obtain 21 points but fell 10 short from victory.

The Chief defense sparked in a conference meet with North Dakota State University and held the Bison to 15 points, the Chiefs with 7 stayed at the short end of the victory stick.

The Chiefs steam against the Bison seemingly evaporated in the next two conference games and the Chiefs lost 41-0 to the University of North Dakota and 44-3 to Mankato State College.

## TOM TUCKER WINS NCAA SCHOLARSHIP

Morningside track star Tom Tucker has been awarded a \$1,000 post-graduate scholarship by the National Collegiate Athletic Association.

An important cog in the Chiefs' 440 and mile relay teams last spring, Tucker was one of three trackmen in the nation selected for at-large awards in the scholarship competition among NCAA member schools.

To be eligible for the scholarship, a student-athlete must have a minimum accumulative grade point average of 3.0 and must have excelled on the playing field as well.

A total of 32 scholarships are given each year, 14 from the at-large classification and six from each of the NCAA's three competitive divisions. Tucker, a Sioux Cityan, expects to graduate from Morningside in December.

During his career at Morningside, he was on the victory stand five times at the Drake Relays. He was a member of the 1973 mile relay team from Morningside that set the relays record of 3:15.7.

The other at-large winners in track were Roger Dale George of Fresno State University and Terry Joe Skaggs of Northwestern Louisiana State University. Swimming star John Kinsella of Indiana and distance runner Tony Waldrop of North Carolina were among the division winners.

## RUGGED SCHEDULE AWAITS MAT TEAM

Morningside's Maroon matmen will host their toughest schedule ever, according to head wrestling coach Arnie Brandt. Four conference opponents highlight an attractive, but rugged, eight-meet home slate for the 1974-75 season.

A preview of the Chiefs' talent will be provided Nov. 23 when the matmen set a precedent by taking on an alumni team. The regular season opens three days later as Morningside entertains nationally ranked South Dakota State.

Prior to the Christmas break, the Chiefs will compete in several invitationals against such keen competitors as Iowa State, University of Iowa and Wisconsin.

The team opens the second semester with a tough University of South Dakota team and the following day takes on a national runner up, University of Northern Iowa. After 12 more duals the season will close with the North Central Conference Tournament.

Returning lettermen for the Chiefs report a 74-33-11 combined dual record. Back for a final season are seniors Dave Edmonds and Dave Galler, while underclassmen returning to bolster the squad include Jim Yount, Kelly Greene, Dave Kobliska, Rod Foutch and Tom Meyer.

Central Conference. We've proven we can win." An exciting, running, winning team had developed.

The job of making the Chiefs into a championship contender, however, is not complete. One of the areas in which Callahan hopes for improvement is team depth. Last year Morningside was plagued by injuries in the early going, and this, coupled with a new coach's unfamiliar system, set back the squad's development.

Callahan went to the junior college ranks to recruit the extra manpower, and returned with 6-4 Doug Schultz from North Platte, Neb., J. C., 6-4 Scottsdale, Ariz., J. C. product Owen Lomax, and 6-5 Herb McMath from Ellsworth, Ia., J. C.

Together with highly-regarded freshmen products Dwight Hayes, 6-3; Woody Rhodes, 6-4; and returning sophomores Fred Evans, 6-8 center; and Joe Longo, 6-3 forward, these transfers should give the Chiefs adequate bench strength.

Another area Callahan is looking to strengthen this season is defense. "We will strive for a more consistent defensive effort. If we allow our opponents to shoot 45 per cent, as we did last year, we won't have the kind of season we expect."

And what kind of year do the Chiefs expect? "We all are looking forward to this coming season with great anticipation," offered Callahan. With five players who started at one time or another in 1973-74 returning, including the North Central Conference's most valuable performer, there is good reason for optimism.

The five also have had a full year to adjust to the tough defense-fast breaking style of play instituted by Callahan. Robert Curry, 6-0, Marv Munden, 6-1, Dan Pomerence, 5-10, Doug Marx, 6-5, and 6-11 MVP Dave Schlessler will form the nucleus for what Morningside hopes will be a championship contender.

The center position is the Chiefs' forte. There, the North Central Conference's Most Valuable Performer, 6-11 Dave Schlessler returns. Last year Schlessler led the league in scoring, rebounding, and field goal accuracy. He already holds the team record for single season rebounds and has a chance to set many more records before he is through.

Backing up Schlessler is Fred Evans, 6-8, who missed most of last season with a knee injury.

According to Director James Wood, the group has accepted an invitation to sing for the annual Methodist Conference in Wesley Chapel on Founders Day. In all 15 concerts have been scheduled in English churches and colleges.

Dr. Wood noted that the members of the choir will be bearing the entire cost of the project themselves, and that some who wish to participate may be unable to do so unless help is forthcoming.

Thus small groups of choir members are offering their services in the Siouxland area to sing at Sunday morning services or evening meetings during the winter months. Dr. Wood hopes that offerings will cover the immediate expenses and provide something extra for the tour fund.

The proposed itinerary includes a bus trip to Toronto on May 11, flight to England the following day, and return to the United States on June 3. Choir members would be housed in rural farm homes during their stay.

## GRANTS AID FACULTY IN SPECIAL PROJECTS

Several members of the Morningside College faculty are engaged in special projects which are assisted by awards and grants from public bodies, according to Ruth Green, the college's grant coordinator.

Dr. Robert Jewett, whose recent book "The Captain America Complex" won the 1974 Melcher Award in July, is lecturing to civic and church groups under sponsorship of the Iowa Board for Public Programs in the Humanities.

(In presenting the Melcher Award, granted by the Unitarian Universalist Association, the judges cited Jewett's work for "so penetrating an analysis and critique of the religious character of America's self destiny.")

The Iowa Office of Programming and Planning has contracted with Dr. John Lawrence for a slide photography presentation on land use. Lawrence, with Frank Breneisen and Dalton Maroney, is also engaged in a project entitled, "How Much History Should We Save?" which is sponsored by the Iowa Board for Humanities.

"Democracy and Education," a five part seminar designed to probe the practice of democracy in the nation's schools, is being conducted by Dr. Gary Koerselman under a humanities grant. Keynote speakers include conservative educator and columnist Max Rafferty.

Koerselman also is preparing "Siouxland's Heritage and the Future," a futurist seminar for the humanities board. Jewett and Dr. Carrol McLaughlin are presently conducting a television program geared toward the nation's bicentennial, with the possibility that it too will be funded by a grant.
