# Area Police Officers Told How To Deal With Youth

boring communities are receiv- language. ing instructions in methods of dealing with youth in regular police work in a four-course series which started Friday at the Livonia Police Station.

Livonia will host the series for three more Fridays, on Oct. 25, Nov. 1 and Nov. 8 under the direction of Francis E. Davey, former Inspector for the Youth Bureau of the Detroit Police Department with the cooperation of the juvenile courts.

The four-course series, each of which is for three hours, is under the supervision of the Delinquency Control Training Center of Wayne State Univer-

The purpose of the sessions is to help all police officers to do a better job in their contact with youth. Departments in this area were requested to send a maximum of four regular patrolmen to the classes.

The course is not intended as training for specialized assignments to youth bureaus or other specialized youth work. Davey indicated the four ses-

sions will be divided into the following schedule of topics: 1-Strategy and general principles governing police contact

with youth. 2-Investigation and interrogation where youth is involved as suspects or witnesses.

3-Dealing with youth gangs. 4-Juvenile court procedures and provisions of the juvenile code as to apprehension and detention of juveniles.

The first session dealt with: A-Reaction of youth to various approaches, such as premature accusation, firmness,

Ever wonder what it's like to travel with a professional

Then hop aboard as the Detroit Pistons fly in their luxurious new airplane for a game with the Philadelphia 76ers on the Philadelphia team's home court.

Thanks to the new craft, the Pistons make the round trip in one day. No longer is it necessary to leave the night before and wait until the day after the game to catch a flight home.

It's 9 a.m. when the players start to gather in the Executive terminal at Metropolitan Airport. The building is located at the eastern end of the field, about three-quarters of a mile from where the passenger planes arrive and de-

By 9:15 all hands are on deck. Chief Pilot Don Muzeroll and his co-pilot Tom Herlihy stand guard as the players toss their own equipment bags aboard.

Up the steps you walk into a plane with truly a living room flavor. Restful couches, arm chairs, lamps, tables, a stereo phonograph . . . They all make up the swank interior of the craft Owner Fred Zollner provides his players this

Promptly at 9:30, per schedule, the doors are clamped shut. Muzeroll flips on the engines and the long ride to the other end of the runway-since we were to take off west to

By 9:42 we're airborne. A few of the players read the morning Free Press. Others play a friendly game of poker.

Coach Charley Wolf relaxes and shortly is in the land of dreams. This reporter gathers together the notes he has penned on the various Friday night football games which were played by Bentley, Plymouth, Redford Union and

With the same comfort-maybe more-and no distractions from any of our youngsters, our wife, the dog or the phone, we start pounding away on our typewriter.

By the time we are 30 minutes out of Philadelphia, our work is completed. We wander up to the pilot's quarters . . . watch and listen as Muzeroll teams with Herlihy to bring the craft to a perfect landing at Philadelphia.

The voices of different aircraft controlmen offering instructions come in clearly. It's a hazy morning and the ground ahead is hard to spot.

Muzeroll turns to Herlihy:

"Do you see the airport landing lights?" "Not yet," says Herlihy . . . then, he pops: "There they

Like a cross, lights lead you clearly to the end of the Soon you're on the ground and cabs take you to the hotel.

At 8:33. Referee Earl Strom tosses up the first ball . . . The Pistons fall behind, then take the lead and hang on for a 124-121 victory . . . their first victory.

Now it's time for a quick shower . . . and another cab ride . . . back to the airport. At 11:45 p.m. the Pistons' new "Zebra" heads down the runway in Philadelphia, bound for
