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Retirement Mandatory

The plan provides that "retirement shall be mandatory for all school personnel who shall attain the age of 65 years prior to the opening day of school in September of any given year."

Thirty days prior to his 65th birthday, but no later than the first of March of a given year, the employee desiring employment upon retirement age, may apply for re-employment in writing.

Closed Hearing

Village to Receive Highway Monies

Cass City is slated to receive \$7,227 as its portion of \$91,938,815 in Motor Vehicle Highway Fund collections being distributed to Michigan counties and incorporated cities and villages by the State Highway Department.

Other area villages slated to receive portions of the money are Gagetown, \$2,507, and Kingston, \$1,847.

Tuscola county will receive the largest portion to be given to the three surrounding area counties. The county's share is \$326,313, as compared to \$313,291 for Sanilac and \$297,355 for Huron.

The total money collected for the fund is approximately \$4,627,070 more than for the same January, February and March of 1963.

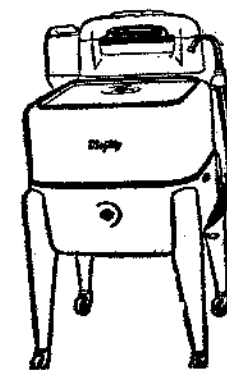

SMELLS FOR LADIES

If perfume manufacturers had to depend on the male population they'd all go out of business. The fact is ladies are just more smell conscious than men and that especially includes lady drivers.

Certain smells are warning signals to motorists of impending trouble. The ladies are more conscious of them so these hints are especially for them, though they're still helpful for any male who can get the pipe smoke out of his nostrils.

Brake fluid has a strong, sweet smell similar to paint remover and is always a warning of danger. It is the usual result of fluid leaking from the braking system and it may mean that the next time you apply your brakes you won't have any. Check it immediately.

There's no mistaking gasoline smells. Gasoline odor comes from raw gas leaking from the carburetor or fuel lines. It usually indicates a flooded carburetor if you are having trouble starting your car. A good way to clear a flooded carburetor is to press the pedal to the floor and keep it there or take your foot off the accelerator until the carburetor has had a chance to clear itself.

Burning rubber is a warning to heed immediately as it could mean smoldering wire insulation or perhaps dragging brakes.

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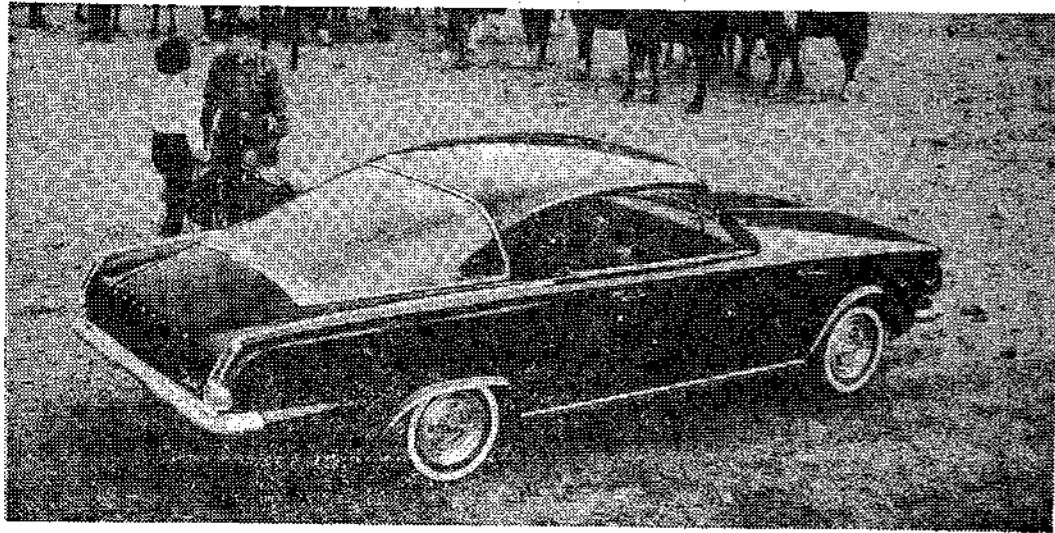

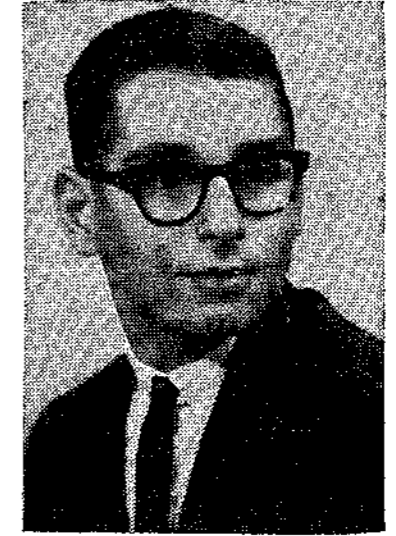

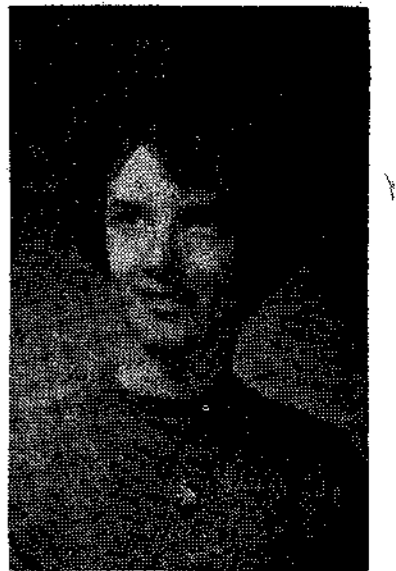

Ways to cope with the latest upturn in fatalities are sought by safety experts, but there is growing indication they are frustrated. All discussions lead back to the same place, and not many people are willing to point their finger.

Concluded from page one. high school auditorium, the visitors will be divided into five groups and will spend a short while in each of the teaching areas.

Instructors will explain the work being done by students, who will be present to demonstrate some of the skills being taught. A rotating program will enable all those who attend to visit each department briefly. This will enable parents and friends of the school to get a closer view of what facilities are available in these fields and how they are being used.

Students in the classes involved will be present in the rooms and will also act as guides for the visitors. At the conclusion of the tour, light refreshments will be served in the gym by girls from the homemaking department.

One person who sat through a meeting where remedies were carefully considered said: "It boils down to the public citizen. He will have to decide whether he wants to pay skyrocketing insurance premiums and take growing chances he will become a traffic victim himself or if he prefers to insist on stricter traffic enforcement and respect for the law."

Police officials state that their officers are discouraged in giving tickets to offenders because too often sentences are light or the ticketed people are not convicted. State officials are equally discouraged with the mechanism to suspend or cancel driver licenses. A high percentage of those who appeal license revocation to circuit courts get their licenses back. Others simply drive without licenses. Most of those who are caught without licenses are punished in only a minor way. Drunk drivers do not go to jail. A high percentage are found not guilty of this serious charge.

As legislators will, today's elected representatives get no more excited about this problem than their constituents. In the session just finished there was no rush of interest or action to deal with the worsening traffic picture.

Remedies will be found when the public wants to stop killing and damage on the highways, not before. All that has to happen is for a sizeable percentage of people in each community to let local judges, policemen and politicians know they care enough to support constructive action.

Sore Point
The number of college students from other states has been an increasingly tender issue between legislators and administrators for a long time. How real an issue is it?

Mrs. Fay is a dental assistant in Caro. The couple have a daughter.

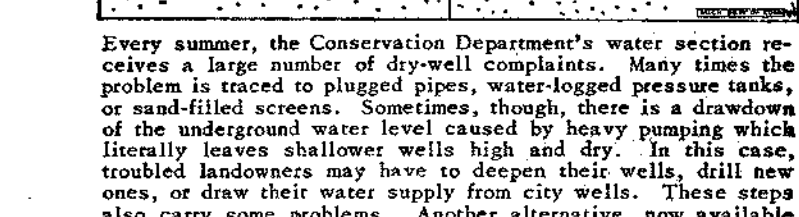

More Water From Wells



Every summer, the Conservation Department's water section receives a large number of dry-well complaints. Many times the problem is traced to plugged pipes, water-logged pressure tanks, or sand-filled screens. Sometimes, though, there is a drawdown of the underground water level caused by heavy pumping which literally leaves shallower wells high and dry.

In this case, troubled landowners may have to deepen their wells, drill new ones, or draw their water supply from city wells. These steps also carry some problems. Another alternative now available to most communities is artificial water recharge. Under this process, large supplies of surface waters from rain, rivers, streams, or lakes are allowed to seep into the ground near heavily-used well fields. These waters replenish underground supplies and in large measure reduce drawdown. There are several ways to bring about artificial recharge; some of them are shown above.

BOOK REVIEW
Novel, Brochure
Both Good Reading
 By the Rev. Robert J. Searls

This book, **THE SPY WHO CAME IN FROM THE COLD**, has headed the best-seller list in Detroit for a fantastically long time. In it, we are allowed one quick look at the problems of the men and women who are the people risking their lives to obtain information about other nations. These critical jobs have never been held in peace time before, but are considered essential to any modern government. In this case, the government of the 'good guys' is England and that of the 'bad guys' is Germany.

Yes, I know that we fought a war with Germany, which was pretty decisive, but Communist Germany is something else again. Leamas is the central figure in the novel. The book starts in a slow-moving account of how he begins to build a 'cover'. A poorly dressed man who apparently did such a poor job that he was pensioned off, he goes from one insignificant job to another. When all his belongings can be held in one small paper bag, it is evident that he has gotten "seedy" in quick order. On one of those jobs, he meets Liz Gold, a librarian who becomes his mistress. While the part played by Liz is only a minor one, she is portrayed as a simple, warm-hearted girl with a compassionate heart. She does not play any role in the espionage, although she engages in the leadership of a small socialist cell.

The story shifts from low-key into high-key only in the closing chapters of the book when a Party trial is held. Then the defendants become the plaintiffs, and vice versa. Leamas and Liz are rescued from prison by a comrade who, up till now, we believed a foreign agent.

In the end, both Leamas and Liz are gunned down while attempting to climb the famous Berlin wall.

What makes this book a best seller? Perhaps it is the fascinating spy tales have for most of us; especially because of the fact that our nation, for the first time in its hours of peace, has built up and maintains a vast espionage network. Or perhaps this novel is liked because it tells the hard truth (?) that persons must be subordinated to some higher end. But, then, I feel a sermon coming on.

I would also like to review the new brochure published by the local Chamber of Commerce, **CASS CITY, PACESETTER OF THE THUMB**. Here, in one place, there is information about our village. Taking a part of village life on each page, this publication tells a prospective business or industrial firm that Cass City has many people, activities and resources which have made it a progressive village in the past, and will continue to do so in the future. Pictures, scattered throughout, make the Cass City "Story" even easier to read. To the local Chamber of Commerce I utter my appreciation, and that of most of you, for doing such a fine job.

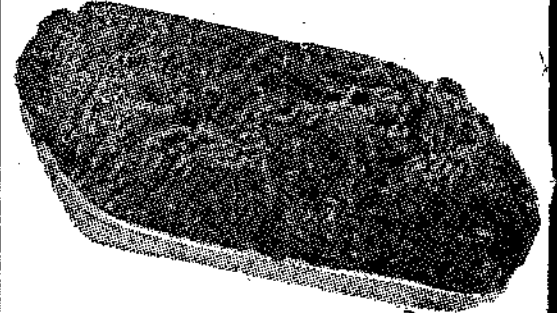

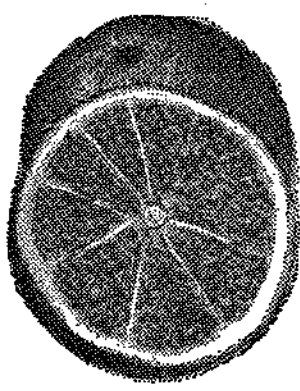

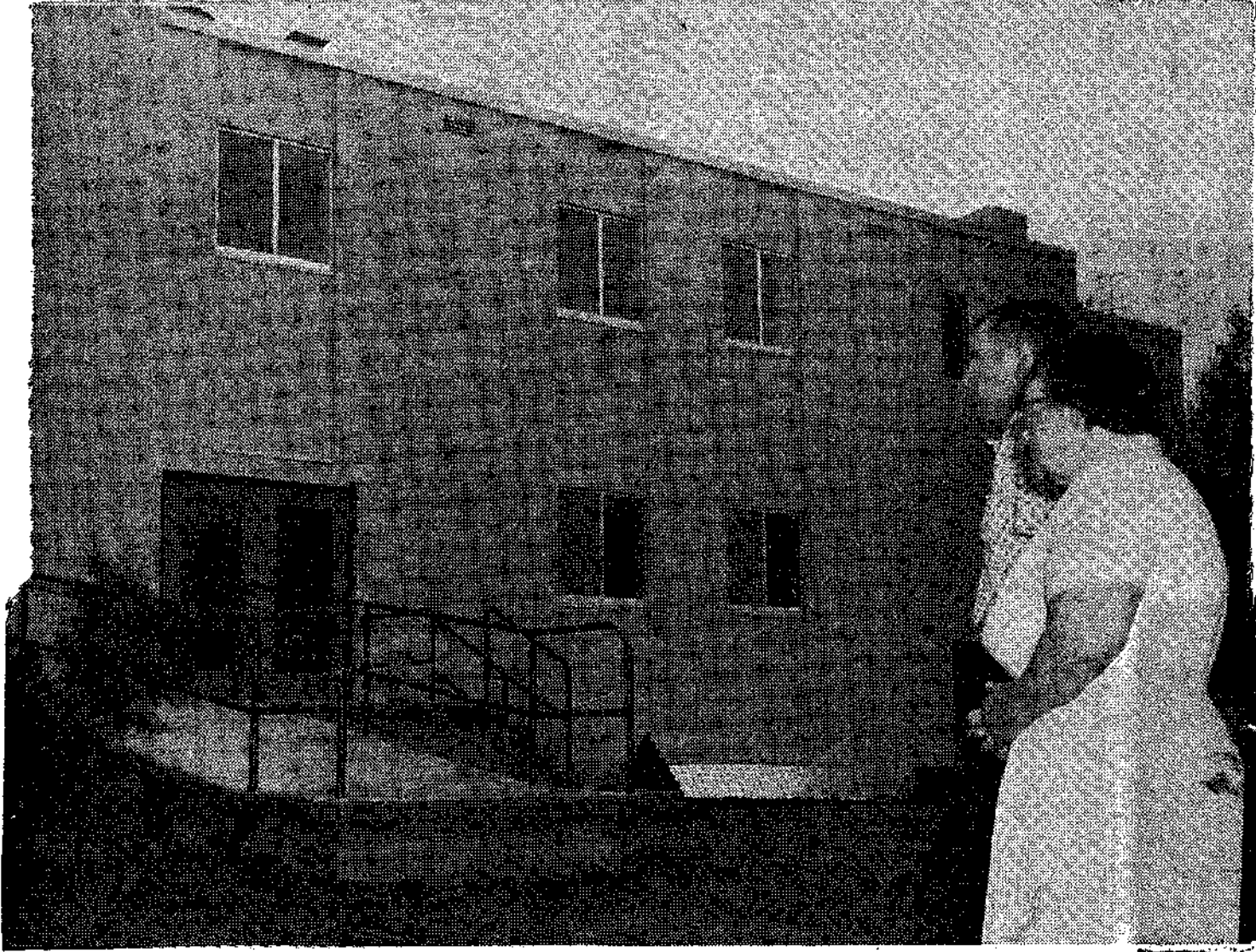

Auxiliary Your Host at Hospital Open House

New Obstetrics Ward to Open First

A Chamber of Commerce ad in this issue of the Chronicle calls the Cass City Hospital, Inc., a "growing facility in a growing community" and to show area residents how much it's growing, the hospital will hold an open house Sunday, May 17, to celebrate the completion of its new \$200,000 addition.

The open house, under the sponsorship of the fledgling Women's Hospital Auxiliary, will feature guided tours from 2:00 to 5:00 p.m. Refreshments will also be served.

The new addition, made possible by donations from individuals and organizations, was begun last spring. After a summer layoff, work was started again last fall and although the unit is not totally completed, it is ready for semi-occupation.

Containing three floors, the unit will house obstetrics on the second floor, intensive care and medical beds on the first floor and laboratories in the basement.

Obstetrics

First to be occupied will be the obstetrics ward, according to Joe Weiler, administrator. Nearly every facet of the ward is directed to the care of the newborn infant.

The ward contains five patient rooms with nine beds. A nurses' station is located in the center, adjacent to the nursery.

The delivery room is located at the far end of the floor and will contain the latest in delivery room equipment.

A call system is connected from patient rooms and delivery room to the nurses' station and patient and nurse can converse from their individual locations.

Weiler estimates the new ward

will be ready for occupancy within two weeks.

Other Floors

On the first floor will be one intensive care ward with the remaining space occupied by medical beds.

Housed in the basement will be the power plant, including a pathological incinerator, electrical generator and electric heating plant. Also in the basement will be the new laboratory and X-ray department, new central sterilizing department and new emergency room.

More Staff

"We expect to increase our staff comparatively as the addition becomes occupied," Weiler says. The hospital staff, including consulting doctors, is currently 34 persons.

Donations Responsible

The new addition was made possible through \$102,000 in pledges by 419 donors, either individuals or organizations.

Pledging was begun in the summer of 1962 and by the end of the campaign the following November, the \$75,000 goal had been exceeded by \$16,690. Since then other contributions have pushed the fund to its present total.

Weiler estimated that the new addition, complete with equipment, will cost \$200,000.

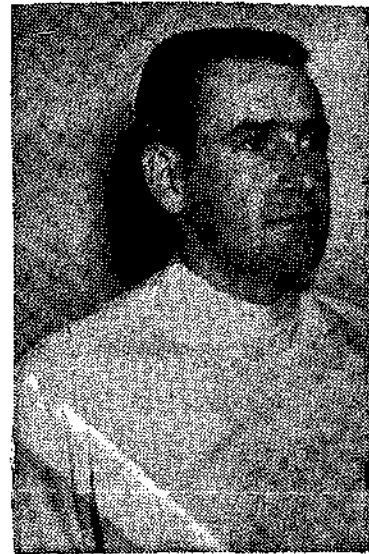

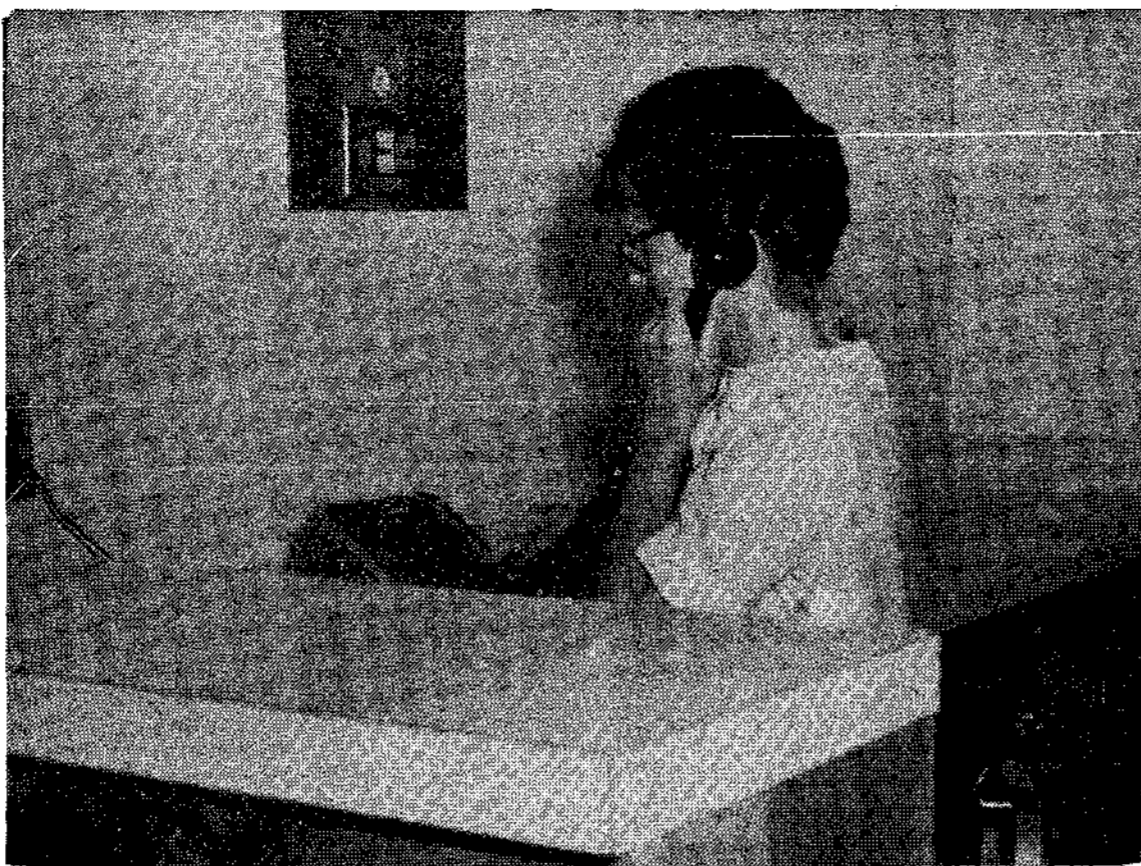

Hospital Grows From Three To 47 Beds in 38 Years

From a three-bed hospital to a 47-room remodeled and modernized facility has been a story of 38 years of progress for the Cass City Hospital, Inc. along with a laboratory in the basement. Although no records are available on the exact age of the original building, Mrs. Alfred J. Knapp, one-time resident of the house, estimated the building to be 85 years old.

Hardly any part of the original 85-year-old frame house is recognizable because of remodeling and additions built since the house was turned into a hospital in 1926 by Dr. F. Morris.

Called appropriately, Morris Hospital, the hospital was nothing more than three beds in the upstairs of the building. Dr. Morris had his office in the front and he and his wife lived in the rear of the house.

In 1948, Mrs. Bertha Hildinger purchased the hospital and it became Cass City Hospital. Most of the renovating and adding to was to take place in the following 16 years.

An X-ray room was added in 1949, along with an office for Dr. James Ballard, chief of staff. The following year, the front of the building was remodeled and the waiting room was added.

In 1952, a second story was added above the X-ray room and office, adding four more beds plus a labor room and enabling enlargement of the operating room and nursery.

A larger kitchen was built in 1956 with rooms over the top. This project added two more patient rooms and a delivery room.

May 15 is a date wheat growers should mark on their calendar, Mike Singer, chairman of the Tuscola Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, reminded producers today. That date is the deadline for signing up to take part in the new 1964 voluntary wheat program. The signup now is underway in all ASCS county offices.

The chairman emphasized that filing an application is the first step necessary to participate in the program. After that, a grower will need to (1) keep his wheat acreage within the farm's 1964 allotment (2) set aside to conserving use an acreage equal to at least 11.11 percent of his allotment in addition to maintaining the farm's normal acreage in conserving use and (3) stay within his wheat allotment on any other farm in which the producer has an interest in the wheat.
