

Clay Pots for Sale


At the Safari Park, we are in the process of phasing out the very heavy old clay pots we have been using in the Display House for many years.

As you can see from the photo, these clay pots come in two styles. Many of them were sourced locally, from

Tecate, Baja California Norte, Mexico. They look as though they may have been recovered from the ruins of Pompeii, and you may imagine they once graced the gardens of the villa of Pliny the Elder. They have been carefully cleaned with a stiff brush to remove the grime of millennia while at the same time, preserving their rich patina.

There are currently approximately 80 of these clay pots available for sale at \$10.00 each. All proceeds will benefit the continued maintenance of the SDES's epiphyllum collection at the Safari Park. If you are interested in them contact

Many people venture to the Casa del Prado on Mother's Day explicitly to purchase epi cuttings and plants. But many others come to revel in the array of magnificent color with hundreds of epies from all members' collections making their way to room 101. The theme only adds to the fun. Figuring out a way to display the blooms in a thematic setting can really stretch your creativity and imagination.

When everyone contributes, however big or small, it makes things easier, runs more smoothly, and we all have more fun. If you have not helped before, don't worry, everyone is friendly and will help you out. Another reason to help is in spite of the work, we really do have a good time.

If you have cuttings or need help making cuttings please contact any board member, phone numbers and email addresses are on page 2.

Here is a schedule to give you an idea of what needs to be done and how you can help.

Friday, May 6

- 4:00- Deliver plants and cuttings to Room 104;
 - Sort / price plants
 - Ensure rooted cutting plants are labeled clearly with white sticks
 - Some people may need help with transporting plants and cuttings contact a board member for assistance

Saturday, May 7 Early Bird Sale

Morning set-up

- If you can help with set-up (move everything from Room 104 to the Arcade) starting at 7:30 a.m., please do!
- We must assemble the table racks and put out bagged cuttings in alphabetical order.
- Bring spare epi flowers for the sale

• Sale will start at 9 a.m. if we get everything ready.

Afternoon

At 4 p.m. we will close the Early Bird sale. We will need volunteers to help set up the canopies in the lower patio, move all the plants and cuttings under the canopy, and help set up Room 101 for the show!

Sunday, May 8 Mother's Day Sale

Morning

- Set-up will begin about 8 a.m. (or as soon as the gates are unlocked).
- Sale starts at 9 a.m.
- We need cashiers and sales assistants.
- Sale closes at 4 p.m.
- We need people to disassemble canopies, table racks, Room 101, and load trucks for transport to storage.

Staffing needs

- Someone to mind the photo albums (2 people)
- Someone to mind the special table for miscellaneous epiphytic cuttings (2 people)
- At least 6 people for the registers on Sunday, perhaps fewer on Saturday. Each of the two registers on Sunday should have one person on the register and one person to count cuttings plus another for relief.

Final notes

- <u>Do not store</u> prepared cuttings in plastic bags; use open paper bags or roll up in newspaper (at least one open end). Secure with tape - rubber bands may cut into epi stems.
- If you have any small, flat, open cardboard boxes or trays to spare, please bring them with you to the April 13th meeting or to the sale. We can use them at the sale.

Rules for Exhibitors at Balboa Park

- \checkmark No helium-filled balloons are permitted in Balboa Park
- \checkmark No spraying is allowed in Balboa Park
- ✓ No moss can be disposed of in Balboa Park trash cans
- ✓ If your exhibit sits directly on the floor, the floor must be covered
- ✓ No sand or similar material is allowed directly on the table covers. If you plan to use any such material, please bring your own heavy table cover and clean up any spills before the show opens and clean up thoroughly after the show closes.

Tricks of the Trade

How do you transport your blooms so they retain their shape, don't stick to other flowers, and don't move around when they're riding in your car to the show?

Keep your blooms from sticking together:

Use funnel-shaped coffee filters. They're cheap and the petals don't stick to the filter. Cut a hole in the bottom for the stem.

Transport your blooms without disaster:

Many members use the black nursery trays—Put one with the large mesh upside down into another one (big or little mesh holes– it doesn't matter). This creates a "box" into which will fit at least a dozen blooms– if they have been protected in a funnel.

Others use boxes and punch holes for the stems

Transporting with water doesn't seem to be vital to the overall well-being of the bloom.

Keeping your flowers looking fresh:

Unless you're dealing with "Monastery Garden", most blooms will hold up pretty well during the show. Most members use plain water in small tubes as vases.

Some members add a small amount of 7-Up to the water (1 Tbsp. per quart) The acidic citrus component acts as an anti-bacterial agent; the sugar helps to maintain freshness.

If the bloom is really large and/or floppy, keep it in its "funnel" to help maintain its shape.

Some members carefully snap (not cut) the flower away from the branch and don't use any water to show the fower and the flowers hold up pretty well

Marking your cuttings:

Use a "regular-point" Sharpie– depress the point onto a hard surface to make it blunt. (If you leave the point sharp, it could pierce the skin of the cutting and moisture from the "cut" would prevent your pen from writing at all!

Kathy Barto uses a white "paint pen" from Michaels. It doesn't damage the surface of the cutting at all, is quite permanent, and can also be used for labeling the pots themselves.

Use a latex or other plastic glove on the hand that is handling the cutting- that will prevent any spines from lodging in your hands or fingers.

Starting Cuttings:

Some people have experimented with starting their cuttings in plain Perlite. They rarely experience rot (the water simply all drains off). They find it easy to check for roots – just dump the perlite out and, if the roots aren't sufficient to

support the plant, pour the perlite back. If the roots have a good start, transplant into your favorite potting mix. Just corner Bill Greene at one of the meetings and ply him with questions.

Categories and Guidelines for Show Entries

Best Plant: <u>The William and Ruth Nelson Trophy</u>: This trophy is named in honor of the first President and first "First Lady" of this Society. Eligible plants may be either hybrids or species plants of or between the following genera of the cactus family: Selenicereus, Hylocereus, Aporocactus, Heliocereus, Epiphyllum, Disocactus, Rhipsalis, Rhipsalidopsis, Schlumbergera or other closely-related genera. Plants eligible for this trophy must have been grown by the exhibitor for at least the last six months. There must be at least three plants on display for the trophy to be awarded. This trophy is a gift of Richard G. Latimer, Jr.

Best Theme Display:

- Jacob W. and Miriam Troxell Trophy: This trophy is in memory of two of the founding members of this Society. It is given to the best single table exhibit (Division I) and best two or more tables or floor exhibit (Division 2) that reflect this year's show theme. This trophy is a gift of this Society.
- <u>Mildred and Gerry Mikas Trophy</u>: It is given to the best half-table or mini display that reflects this year's show theme. This trophy is a gift of Mildred & Gerry Mikas.
- Best Flower Display: <u>Gus and Marj Schlapfer Trophy</u>: This trophy is given to the display that has the best flower display. This display does not directly reflect this year's show theme. First place in this category is not eligible for first place in the theme display awards. This trophy is a gift of Jerry Moreau.
- Best Newly-Registered Hybrid: <u>Buddy Hurst Trophy</u>: This trophy is a memorial to a long-time Epiphyllum commercial grower of the Los Angeles area. This trophy is given to the best newly-registered hybrid flower in the show. To be eligible, the flower must have been registered within the last five years and been grown by the exhibitor. However, it need not have been registered by the exhibitor. This trophy is a gift of Ernest W. Angus.

Best Small Flower: <u>Don & Judy Francis Trophy</u>: Blooms that are registered extra-small, small, and smallmedium flowers are eligible for this table. There is no limit to the number of flowers an individual may place on this table. However, small blooms of flowers that are registered as medium or large are not eligible for this award. This trophy is a gift of Don and Judy Francis.

- Best Educational Display: <u>Richard G. Latimer, Jr. Trophy</u>: A perpetual trophy awarded for the best Educational Display. There must be at least two displays for the trophy to be awarded. If a display has won this award in a previous SDES show, it is ineligible to win again.
- Best Flower on the Society Table: <u>Eva Clover Trophy</u>: This trophy is a memorial to this founding member and is awarded to the best flower on the Society's display table which is devoted to members who do not have a table or floor entry and have only a few flowers to display. Eligible flowers must be labeled with the exhibitor's name. This trophy is a gift of this Society.
- Best Flower Arrangement: <u>Walter and Penny Bunker</u> <u>Trophy</u>: This trophy is named in honor of these founding members and is given to the best flower arrangement that must include flowers from plants eligible for the Nelson Trophy and other plant material and flower arranging props. This trophy is a gift of this Society.

- President's Choice: <u>The George French Award</u>: This trophy is named in honor of this founding member and is given by the current SDES president for his or her favorite Epiphyllum flower, thus the "President's Choice". Eligibility for this trophy is an open field– nursery, hybridizer, private grower, named or unnamed, seedling, or old favorite. This trophy is a gift of Chuck Everson and Jerry Williams of Rainbow Gardens Nursery.
- Best George French Hybrid: <u>The French Collection</u> <u>Trophy</u>: This trophy is in honor of this founding member and is awarded to the best George French hybrid on display. This trophy is a gift of Jill Rowney and Phil Peck.
- Best Novice Display: <u>The LeBlanc Novice Trophy</u>: This trophy is in honor of Yogi and Carol LeBlanc. This trophy goes to a first time exhibitor. can be a display of any size and not a flower arrangement. This trophy is a gift of Michal McKee and Jerry & Betsy Markle.

- Favorite Flower: <u>The People's Choice Trophy</u>: This trophy is awarded to the best flower on the People's Choice Table and is determined by our visitors. This trophy is a gift of George and Jerry Plaisted.
- Second and Third Place Ribbons will be awarded in all of the above categories except the President's Choice Trophy.
- Blue Ribbons will be awarded to the bloom on each exhibitor's table which is considered by the judges to be that exhibitor's best. Flowers chosen for blue ribbons are selected separately from trophy judging. All blooms except those on the Society's display table and those on the People's Choice Table will be considered.

Every two years one of the three Epiphyllum Societies of Southern California hosts Epi Con. This is an event where epicactus enthusiasts from all over the world gather to compare notes on all things epi-related. This all started back in the fall of 1987 where representatives of the ESA, SDES,

Use of Black Light to Recover Names on Plant Sticks

We've all faced the frustration at one time or another when the epi name on our

plant stick that was written with a black Sharpie has faded to the point that it's no longer readable. In some cases though, it's possible to be able to read the missing name using black light. You'll need a black light powerful enough to do the job. There are several to choose from on line and they are not too expensive. The one that I bought on Amazon cost \$14.99. The picture on the left was taken in room light. As you can see, the names are not

readable, especially the stick on the bottom. The picture on the right was taken with the black light flashlight. It's not too easy to see in the photo, but I was able to decipher each of them. From top to bottom they are cryptocereus, 'Bob Grimshaw" and 'Wrayi'. No writing was visible on the 'Wrayi' stick at all in normal light.

Now is the Time

✓ **Cross-pollinate** as soon as blooms open.

✓ **Remove spent and wilted blooms** by cutting about 1/2 inch from the base of the flower, using a sharp knife or pruning shears. Use this method when cutting flowers for display.

✓ **Continue good grooming** of mature plants by pruning branches that are no longer productive, i.e., branches on which many areolas are callused and scarred from previous blooms. These branches can be used to start new plants.



✓ Protect foliage from hot summer sun. Keep plants in filtered sunlight.

✓ Water regularly. Keep moist, but not soaking wet. As the weather gets warmer and drier, you may

SDES can use your help!

need to water or mist more often.

✓ **Repot last year's cuttings** that have outgrown their containers.

✓ Compare blooms with descriptions in ESA Registry. Only those matching the description exactly are correctly named. Do not share cuttings from plants that are incorrectly named. Change their name tags to read "UNK" for unknown.

✓ Keep an eve out for those ever-present pests.



✓ Continue planning your display for the Mother's Day Show. You can enter a full, half, or mini table display or flower arrangement based on the theme, "California Dreaming".

'Bumpkin' is a George French registered in 1998. This is one of many from the cross of 'Clown' x 'Lady Ruffles'

This cross is one of the more popular crosses George French made. Many of the hybrids were named after clowns. Although 'Clown' is a strong parent the yellow from 'Jennifer Ann' (a parent to 'Lady Ruffles') does come through in many of the seedlings. When visiting George you could always see 'Millennium' sitting on a table and in the spring filled with blooms. 
