A bigger, better view

Trout Lake Nature Center attempting to buy land from city

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The city of Eustis will have a workshop on July 17 with the Trout Lake Nature Center to discuss an offer for city land that would roughly double the size of the current center.

The Trout Lake Nature Center originally offered \$400,000 for 269 acres next to the center across County Road 44 during the Audience to Be Heard part of the city commission meeting on June 5, according to a city commission agenda for June 19.

One parcel in the offer is owned by the city, but is a part

of the nature center with a conservation designation, according to Eustis Acting City Manager Dianne Kramer.

Joan Bryant, the president of the board for Trout Lake Nature Center, said Friday that the parcel should

not have been included in the offer, making the total size of the proposed purchase 226.52 acres. She said the Trout Lake Nature Center, including that parcel, is currently 230 acres, but a large part of that is in the lake.

"We want the

opportunity to explain further the benefits to the city of taking this and if they feel that they want to negotiate in good faith, we're certainly willing to discuss it," Bryant said.

One of the recommendations in a city commission agenda for June 19 was to not include the sale property north of CR 44 and the property on the south side of CR 44. That area, not including the parcel that is part of the center, would be 140.35 acres.

"I'm not sure that it makes a lot of sense to extend Trout Lake Nature Center across 44, because you lose ... the

Iraq, Syria conflicts merge, feed off each other

BEIRUT — In a reflection of how intertwined the Syria and Iraq conflicts have become, thousands of Shiite Iraqi militiamen helping President Bashar Assad crush the Sunni-led uprising against him are returning home, putting a strain on the overstretched Syrian military as it struggles to retain territory recaptured in recent months from rebels.

The borders between the two countries are being largely ignored, with fighters from the Islamic State of Iraq and the Levant said to be crossing

freely from one side to the other, transporting weapons, equipment and cash in a development that has potential to shift the balance of power in a largely stalemated battle.

The seizure of large chunks of Iraq by militants does offer Assad a messaging victory: he has long insisted that the uprising against him is the work of foreign-inspired Islamic extremists, suggesting that the West needs to work with him to check the influence of jihadis, and that the radicals, not the divided and

Economic Development department evaluating incentive program

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In the coming months, Lake County's Economic Development and Tourism Department is evaluating its entire incentive program to determine whether the county's resources are being used appropriately.

While the idea has been discussed for months, county officials said a recent review — revealing several outstanding incentive grants with auditing

periods that had expired — brought the issue closer to the forefront.

Although all job growth incentive grants require a minimum of a two-year auditing period, six incentive grants, from 2004 to 2008, were found to have incomplete reporting and no opportunity for further information gathering, according to county documents.

The department distributed \$287,000 for 78 jobs created but could

Putin backs Ukraine's cease-fire, warns talks needed

KIEV, Ukraine — Russian President Vladimir Putin expressed support Saturday for Ukraine's unilateral cease-fire in its battle against pro-Russian separatists and appealed to both sides to halt all military operations.

But he warned that Ukrainian President Petro Poroshenko's blueprint for peace would not be viable without action to start peace negotiations.

The qualified Russian backing for Poroshenko's effort to halt the conflict was another in a series of shifting Kremlin moves and statements that leave unclear the level of Moscow's commitment to de-escalating the conflict.

Putin's conciliatory words came on the same day he ordered large-scale military exercises that NATO criticized as likely to raise tensions. U.S. officials also accused Russian troops of moving back into positions near the border with

Ukraine's troubled east.

The Kremlin said in a statement that Putin "calls on the opposing sides to halt any military activities and sit down at the negotiating table."

The statement said Putin supported Ukrainian President Petro Poroshenko's decision to order Ukrainian troops to observe a unilateral cease-fire starting Friday night.

But it added that Putin wanted

Man allegedly beats woman over oversleeping

A 40-year-old man will now spend more time with judges after he was arrested Thursday on accusations that he struck his girlfriend for failing to wake him up for a court appearance.

Keith Allen Quigley, of Leesburg, was charged with domestic battery and remained in the Lake County Jail Friday with no bail.

An arraignment date for the charge is slated for July 15, according to the Lake County's Sheriff's website.

It is not clear why Quigley was scheduled to go to court Thursday. But, according to an affidavit, his live-in girlfriend said she tried to wake him up several times about 7 a.m. Thursday for a court appearance in Marion County.

After several attempts, she gave up.

She added when Quigley finally woke up about 1:30 p.m., he became upset because he missed the court date. He then started screaming and cursing before allegedly slapping her in the left ear. The woman left the home with the couple's child and called police.

The affidavit adds when police caught up with Quigley, he admitted the couple had argued but wouldn't confirm that he struck her and was arrested.

Fire destroys mobile home on County Road 723

A fire destroyed a Sumter County mobile home Friday night.

The blaze occurred on County Road 723 in Webster about 9 p.m.

According to Leland Greek, fire chief with Sumter County Fire & EMS, neighbors reported hearing an explosion, then seeing fire coming from the single-wide mobile home.

Firefighters arrived and heavy flames were showing from the front and rear of the building.

"They performed a quick attack stopping the fire spread and upon arrival of additional units, they entered the home to perform a search and finish extinguishing the fire," Greek said.

The home was a total loss but the owners weren't there at the time of the fire and there were no injuries.

The Red Cross was called to assist the displaced homeowners.

Greek added the cause of the fire is under investigation.

Scott signs legislation on human trafficking

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Members of The Lake County Human Trafficking Task Force could not be more pleased this week with Gov. Rick Scott's signature on two bills that will increase prosecution of human trafficking criminals and provide better

service to survivors, according to the governor's office.

Capt. Todd English, co-chair of the task force, praised the governor's actions.

"The governor signed bills into law that are aimed at helping victims of human trafficking and standing

behind supporting law enforcement to hold these traffickers accountable," he said. "It helps assist law enforcement in the arrest and hopeful prosecution of these traffickers."

House Bill 989 "prohibits minors from working in adult theaters, removes time limitations to allow

a prosecution for certain human trafficking offenses to be commenced at any time and creates and increases criminal penalties" related to human trafficking, according to a press release from the governor's office.

HB 7141 "provides

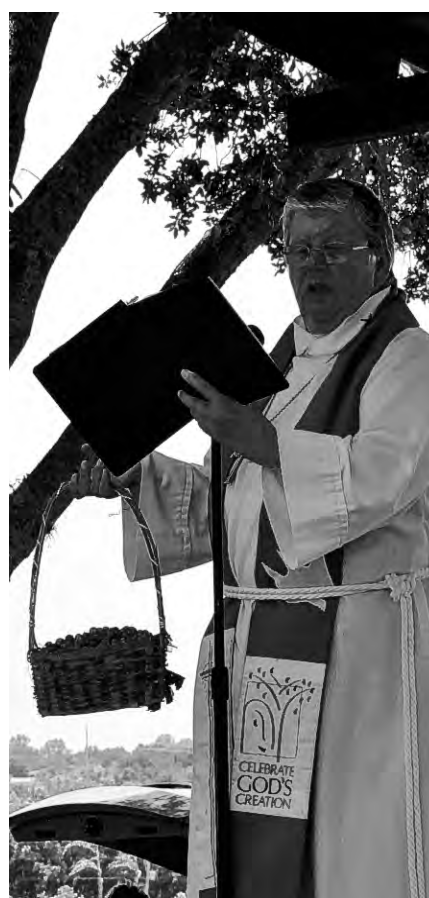

Lake County included in new regional expressway authority

Gov. Rick Scott on Friday signed Senate Bill 230 to create the Central Florida Expressway Authority, incorporating representation from Lake, Osceola and Seminole counties into a larger, regional tolling authority.

Effective immediately, CFX takes over the existing Orlando-Orange County authority, which is responsible for the planning, design, construction, operation and maintenance of a 109-mile limited-access expressway system serving the four county jurisdictions, according to a press release from CFX.

The authority will be governed by a nine-member board, with representatives from each of the four counties, along with the mayor of Orange County, the mayor of Orlando and three gubernatorial appointees.

"Under this new structure, we will have the opportunity to create a board with a majority of elected officials able to oversee toll collections and roadway operations while also providing direct accountability to our citizens," Orange County Mayor

Paratransit services reinstated on Monday

Employment and education trips will be reinstated beginning Monday for Lake County's paratransit service, Lake County Connection, under the Transportation Disadvantaged Program.

A state-funded program, Lake County Connection provides low-cost transportation to individuals who qualify as "transportation disadvantaged" as defined by state statutes for purposes such as medical, nutritional, employment and educational trips, Elisha Pappacoda, the county's public information officer, said in a press release.

The Lake County Transportation Disadvantaged Program is provided primarily for individuals who are mobility and developmentally impaired, at-risk children and senior citizens, she said. This service was established for individuals who do

Leesburg celebrates the end of slavery

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President Lincoln emancipated slaves in the rebellious southern states in September of 1862 but the news didn't get to slaves in Galveston, Texas until June 19, 1865, about two months after the end of the Civil War.

This was the day Union General Gordon Granger stood on a balcony in Galveston — after arriving the previous day with 2,000 federal troops — and read General Order No. 3 that stated slaves across the nation were free.

The next day, former Galveston slaves rejoiced in the streets and the following year Juneteenth celebrations started in Texas to mark the end of slavery.

Now Juneteenth, a portmanteau of June and nineteenth, is celebrated across the country and this past Friday and Saturday in Leesburg.

"It's our Fourth of July," said David Johnson, who recently became the first black chief for the Leesburg Fire Department and

John A. Mortensen, 85, of Leesburg, Florida went to be with his Lord and Savior at the Cornerstone Hospice house in Tavares, FL, June 16, 2014. Dr. Mortensen was born May 11, 1929 in San Antonio, Texas to parents Ernest and Velma Mortensen. John was a Research Professor for the University of Florida in the field of Plant Genetics for 30 years. He was well known in Florida and around the country for his research in grape propagation, and produced Florida's first seedless grape. He was inducted into the Florida Agriculture Hall of Fame in 1993. John began his early agricultural career in Texas at an experiment station that his father managed. Later, he entered Texas A&M where he earned his Bachelor's and Master's degrees in horticulture. During the Korean War, John was a First Lieutenant stationed in Brooklyn on the docks. Because of his grandmother's persistent prayers for his safety, each order that came for his deployment was rescinded. Following his Army discharge, he spent two years in Jordan, visiting his parents, and also taught English to Jordan's military person-

nel. In 1952, he entered Cornell University and earned his PhD in plant breeding. It was during this time that he met his wife, Dorothy (Dottie) and their love for each other has continued to flourish through their 57 years of marriage as God has blessed them. For over 30 years, John and his wife held weekly church services in area nursing homes under direction of Leesburg First Baptist Church where they have been members for many years. John was a gentle, godly, loving and smiling man to all, and his family and friends were his treasures. He is survived by his wife, Dorothy; daughter, Cynthia; brother, James; and grandson, Kevin Flinn (Jessica). He was preceded in death by his parents, Ernest and Velma Mortensen; brother, Charles; and sister, Marie Stockwell. cal Center Wednesday, June 18, 2014. She was born in Moline, Illinois, in 1920 and moved with her family to Michigan at the age of three. After graduation from Mercy College of Nursing in Detroit she worked as a nurse in Pontiac. She married Anthony Gerzanic in 1941, continued in nursing while her husband served overseas in the US Army. Her daughter, Sue, was born in 1946; son Charles was born in 1947. Moving to Florida with her family, in 1959, she worked as a surgical nurse at St. Mary's Hospital in West Palm Beach, retiring in 1985 as Manager of Surgery. Following the move to Florida Mrs. Ruggles broadened her lifelong interest in water activities into scuba diving, becoming an accredited instructor for the National Association of Underwater Instructors. In 1966 she teamed with another woman to win the Woman's National Underwater Spearfishing Championship in Miami. She was very familiar with the waters of South Florida and, with other woman divers, traveled to the Bahamas and other Caribbean dive locations. In 1971 she incurred an injury, believed to be an air embolism, while diving off Palm Beach. Following emergency treatment in a decompression chamber,

and extensive therapy she progressed from wheelchair to crutches, to a cane, and eventually returned to work but no longer as a surgical nurse—a profession she had come to love. She gradually resumed scuba and traveled even more extensively to dive in the western Pacific accompanied by her second husband. After her retirement she continued to travel with several trips to Europe and South America. She also served as a uniformed volunteer with the Palm Beach County Sheriff Department enforcing Handicap Parking statutes. When diving became more difficult she and her husband took up RV travel and continued until 2005 visiting friends and relatives and attending Elderhostel's from Maine to the Pacific Coast. They moved to Cedar Key, FL, in 1993 following a year "on the road" highlighted by a three-month tour of western Canada and Alaska. While living in Cedar Key she was active in the Women's Club and Garden Club and volunteered as docent in both the Cedar Key State Museum and the Historical Society Museum. She has been a resident of Leesburg since 2003. Mrs. Ruggles was predeceased by her son Charles and her sister Yvonne Wood. She is survived by her husband Gilbert, two brothers, Dale Fishwild of Boise, Idaho, and Graham Fishwild of Waterford, Michigan; her daughter, Sue Dobson, and grandson, Eric Dobson, both, of Yuma, Arizona. not have access to any other means of transportation, including public bus service, because of age, disability or income. It is also provided to those who do not receive services from a sponsoring agency, such as Medicaid.

The education trips will cover college and vocational education, but all other students ride free on the county's LakeXpress fixed-route bus system and are not eligible for paratransit services, according to the release.

Lake County Transportation Disadvantaged Program is a limited-ride program with reservations taken on a first-come, first-served basis. Passengers must make reservations at least two business days prior to the date service is being requested. The program is available Monday through Friday from 6 a.m. to 7 p.m.

"We are confident that these additional employment and education trips will offer a broader range of service that will prove valuable to county citizens who need it most," Ken Harley, public transportation manager, said in the release.

Individuals who are interested in using the Lake County Transportation Disadvantaged Program must complete an eligibility application. To obtain one, call 352-326-2278 or go to www.lakecounty-fl.gov.

definitions and makes changes to rules and guidelines to the Department of Children and Families, the Department of Juvenile Justice and community based care lead agencies in administering safe houses and safe foster homes for children who have been sexually exploited," according to the governor's office.

The Lake County Sheriff's Office made its first arrest in April for human trafficking. Members

of the county's Human Trafficking Task Force said it illustrates the organization is remaining vigilant in addressing the issue before it becomes a major problem.

"We want to make sure it does not become a problem in this county," said English. "It is very important to prepare, be aware and trained on how to handle it."

The task force is currently investigating an estimated 10 possible human trafficking cases in the county, representing a relatively low number in comparison to larger

cities, such as Orlando.

State Rep. Larry Metz, R-Groveland, said in a statement the elimination of human trafficking will "require strong leadership and an unwavering commitment over time."

"Human trafficking is an evil and insidious crime that victimizes the young and vulnerable," he said.

The governor, in a statement, highlighted the bills' importance.

"We must do our part to help restore the sense of security for those who have been victims of human trafficking so they can heal," he said.

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Off-the-books adoptees hope to find family via DNA

About 30 people showed up at a Tennessee motel on Saturday to give cheek-swab DNA samples as people adopted through a nearby Georgia clinic hope to identify biological relatives before time for reconnecting runs out.

With no records of their birth parents, DNA testing may be the only way to confirm biological links for some of the 200-plus infants handed off to new parents in the 1950s and '60s through the late Dr. Thomas Hicks' clinic in McCaysville, near the Tennessee-North Carolina line.

Several adoptees gave fresh DNA samples Saturday at a motel in nearby Ducktown, Tennessee, while hoping potential relatives from the area might participate. Melinda Elkins Dawson, an organizer and one of the adoptees, estimated about 70 percent of those who participated could be potential relatives.

"I'm very happy with the turnout," said Dawson, who lives near Canton, Ohio. "This solidified for me that people are ready to embrace the subject and help us

in our journey." Fairfield, Ohio-based DNA Diagnostics Center will compare samples if there are indications of possible matches between the people who gave them. Testing could be done within weeks.

There is unsettled debate about whether Hicks sold babies on the black-market, charitably helped those in need while merely recouping his expenses, or perhaps did both. When it came to light in the late 1990s that there might be hundreds of "Hicks babies," the

town defended him as a good doctor who cared for mothers who were young, unwed or in complicated situations with nowhere else to turn.

Some adoptees gave DNA samples then, and a few have connected with biological relatives. Adoptees say they just want answers and aren't trying to open old wounds or make anyone look bad.

"This may be our last opportunity to get answers about our heritage and medical information and connect to our birth families," Dawson said.

helped to lead the Juneteenth community picnic in Berry Park on Saturday.

The two-day annual celebration was hosted by the West Leesburg Community Development Corp. and kicked off Friday with a Miss Juneteenth Scholarship Pageant, where upcoming Leesburg High senior Amari Garner was selected as the winner.

The picnic included an array of speakers, as well as live acts, a disc jockey, vendors, booths manned by various agencies, games, a bounce house for children and plenty of baked chicken, fried fish, beans, cakes and other food.

Several political candidates on the Lake County ballot for the Aug. 26 primary were at the event, including Thomas H. Poole Jr., who is running for Lake County Commissioner of District 4. Poole said he supported any event

that brought attention to African-American history.

"This isn't just African-American history, but American history," Poole said.

U.S. Congress candidates for Florida District 10, Michael McKenna and Bill Ferree also were introduced to the crowd. Jamie Hanja, a candidate for the Lake County School Board, also made an appearance.

Three Leesburg centenarians were honored at the picnic, including Darby McCants, 104; Maggie Brown, 101; and Mammie Dixon, 100, as well as 92-year-old Annie Sneed.

"These are our pioneer citizens; they helped build the communities," said West CDC Vice President Mary Rowell.

Dixon said her grandparents were slaves, but added she didn't learn anything about the institute of slavery from them.

"They didn't talk about it," she said.

It's debatable why it took so long for the news of freedom to reach the

island of Galveston. Some say a messenger was killed while heading to Texas to deliver the news, some say the slaves' owners purposely hid the news and others blame it on a lack of advanced communication during that time.

"There was no CNN, no television and little radio, so I can see maybe why it might have taken so long to reach a part of the country, but then again you would think somebody in Galveston had to know before the troops arrived," said Gerald Jackson, watching the Men of Distinction drumline perform on stage.

John "Leslie" Johnson is a former Lake County educator who has a Leesburg park named after him. Johnson said he was in the military, stationed in Texas in 1950, when he first heard about Juneteenth after his friends started making celebration plans.

"It's good we have all these Juneteenth celebrations, or many of us would never know about it," Johnson said.

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Openly gay governor candidate leads pride parade

PORTLAND, Maine — A Democratic candidate who reluctantly made public his homosexuality last year found himself serving as the grand marshal of Maine's biggest gay pride parade and festival Saturday and urged activists to continue fighting to eliminate discrimination and promote equality.

Mike Michaud, who would become the nation's first openly gay person to be elected governor if he unseats Republican Paul LePage in November, said it would be powerful for the gay community to have a seat at the table in discussions with governors across the country on equality issues.

"Maine has come a long ways and our nation has come a long ways, but there's still a long way to go," he said in an interview before he marched alongside a white convertible down the roughly milelong route in downtown Portland.

Gay rights activists say the six-term congressman's victory would be a key milestone in their movement

toward equality, inspire other gay leaders to pursue public office and send a positive message to the community's youth.

When Michaud came out publicly last year, he said he didn't want to focus on his personal life in the three-person race with independent

Eliot Cutler.

But his potentially historic candidacy has caught the eye of national groups like the Gay & Lesbian Victory Fund, which has bundled \$30,000 to \$50,000 for his campaign.

During the parade, which drew thousands, Michaud shook hands and took

pictures with supporters who chanted "We like Mike" as he walked in front of the "Loud and Proud" marching band.

He followed motorcyclists wearing rainbow wigs and feather boas and the parade's two other grand marshals — the coordinator at the University of Southern Maine's

Center for Sexualities and Gender Diversity and a transgender student who won a discrimination lawsuit after her school refused to let her use the girls' bathroom.

Aside from fundraising, observers say Michaud's sexual orientation will likely have other political importance in one of the first states to approve same-sex marriage at the ballot box in 2012.

It could turn away some deeply conservative and religious voters, but they likely wouldn't have supported the Democrat anyway, said Michael Cuzzi, a former Democratic campaign strategist.

Michaud has come under fire from his political foes for voting against anti-discrimination laws for gays and other pro-equality measures while in the state Legislature. His campaign said his position on the issues has evolved over the years and he's now strongly pro-equality.

That turnaround and his decision to come out could attract progressives who were not fans of his in earlier elections, said Sandy Maisel, political science professor at Colby College.

VA: 65 percent of senior executives got bonuses

WASHINGTON — About 65 percent of senior executives at the Veterans Affairs Department got performance bonuses last year despite widespread treatment delays and preventable deaths at VA hospitals and clinics, the agency said Friday.

More than 300 VA executives were paid a total of \$2.7 million in bonuses last year, said Gina Farrisee, assistant VA secretary for human resources and administration. That amount is down from about \$3.4 million in bonuses paid in 2012, Farrisee said.

The totals do not include tens of millions of dollars in bonuses awarded to doctors, dentists and other medical providers throughout the VA's nearly 900 hospitals and clinics.

Workers at the Phoenix VA Health Care System — where officials have confirmed dozens of patients died while awaiting treatment — received about \$3.9 million in bonuses last year, newly released records

show. The merit-based bonuses were doled out to about 650 employees, including doctors, nurses, administrators, secretaries and cleaning staff.

There was confusion Friday about the number of senior executives who received bonuses. During a hearing Friday of the House Veterans' Affairs Committee, both lawmakers and Farrisee had indicated that nearly 80 percent of senior executives had received bonuses. Later, however, the committee provided documents showing that 304 of 470 senior executives, or 64.7 percent, had received bonuses. The committee and a VA spokesman said the 80 percent figure referred to the number of senior executives who received very high ratings.

Farrisee defended the bonus system, telling the Veterans' Affairs panel that the VA needs to pay bonuses to keep executives who are paid up to \$181,000 per year.

"We are competing in tough labor markets for skilled personnel," Farrisee said. "To remain competitive in recruiting and retaining the

best personnel to serve our veterans, we must rely on tools such as incentives and awards that recognize superior performance."

Farrisee's testimony drew sharp rebukes by lawmakers from both parties.

Rep. Jeff Miller, R-Fla., the committee chairman, said the VA's bonus system "is failing veterans."

Instead of being given for outstanding work, the cash awards are "seen as an entitlement and have become irrelevant to quality work product," Miller said.

Rep. Phil Roe, R-Tenn., said awarding bonuses to a high percentage of executives means that the VA was setting the bar for performance so low that "anybody could step over it. If your metrics are low enough that almost everybody exceeds them, then your metrics are not very high."

Rep. Ann McLane Kuster, D-N.H., said the VA suffered from "grade inflation, or what (humorist) Garrison Keillor would refer to as 'all of the children are above average.'"

Without fanfare, Obama advances transgender rights

SAN FRANCISCO — President Barack Obama, who established his bona fides as a gay and lesbian rights champion when he endorsed same-sex marriage, has steadily extended his administration's advocacy to the smallest and least accepted band of the LGBT rainbow: transgender Americans.

With little of the fanfare or criticism that marked his evolution into the leader Newsweek nicknamed "the first gay president," Obama became the first chief executive to say "transgender" in a speech, to name transgender political appointees and to prohibit job bias against transgender government workers. Also in his first term, he signed hate crime legislation that became the first federal civil rights protections for transgender people in U.S. history.

Since then, the administration has quietly applied the power

of the executive branch to make it easier for transgender people to update their passports, obtain health insurance under the Affordable Care Act, get treatment at Veteran's Administration facilities and seek access to public school restrooms and sports programs — just a few of the transgender-specific policy shifts of Obama's presidency.

"He has been the best president for transgender rights, and nobody else is in second place," Mara Keisling, executive director of the National

Center for Transgender Equality, said of Obama, who is the only president to invite transgender children to participate in the annual Easter egg roll at the White House.

Religious conservative groups quick to criticize the president for his gay rights advocacy have been much slower to respond to the administration's actions. The leader of the Traditional Values Coalition says there is little recourse because the changes come through executive orders and federal agencies rather than Congress.

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Hundreds protest alleged Afghan election fraud

KABUL, Afghanistan — Hundreds of Afghans protested Saturday against alleged fraud in last week's presidential runoff, part of escalating tensions over what Western officials had hoped would be a smooth transfer of power as violence across the country killed at least 13 people.

Former Foreign Minister Abdullah Abdullah, who is running against Ashraf Ghani Ahmadzai, a former finance minister, has accused electoral officials and others of trying to rig the June 14 vote against him.

Abdullah announced this week that he was severing ties with the Independent Election Commission and would refuse to recognize any results it releases. He also suggested that the United Nations step in, an idea supported by President Hamid Karzai, who is constitutionally barred from seeking a third term.

The IEC's official timetable says initial results are due on July 2. Independent Election Commission chairman Ahmad Yousuf Nouristani

said Saturday that the commission would address or investigate any concern Abdullah had.

Around a thousand Abdullah supporters gathered in Kabul to protest against the electoral commission, accusing it of fraud and chanting: "Our vote is our blood and we will stand up for it!"

Hundreds of anti-riot police surrounded the demonstration, which was peaceful.

"We gather today to protest against the election commission, which

is not an independent commission at all. They are conducting fraud for a specific candidate," said Mohammed Ghani Sharifi, a 23-year-old protester. "The people are so upset and they cannot tolerate such fraud because the people took risks to cast their votes."

While the vote was relatively peaceful, the Taliban had warned people not to participate and carried out a handful of attacks in different parts of the country.

In a separate demonstration, hundreds of

Abdullah supporters marched from the northern part of the capital toward the airport, where they were stopped by a police roadblock that preventing anyone from entering or leaving Kabul's international airport.

The U.N. representative to Afghanistan, Nicholas Haysom, told a news conference that people had a "democratic right" to protest while urging them to remain peaceful and "refrain from inflammatory statements."

Libya suspect a shadowy figure among militias

CAIRO — A strange silence has met the U.S. capture of a Libyan militant accused in the 2012 attack that killed the American ambassador and three others. In his hometown of Benghazi in eastern Libya, there have been few threats of revenge, only speculation among supporters and opponents that Ahmed Abu Khattala was betrayed by an insider.

Abu Khattala had said for months he had no fear of the Americans snatching him, living at his home and saying he worked as a construction contractor. Before U.S. commandos snatched him from Benghazi a week ago, he had been battling alongside the militant group Ansar al-Shariah against the troops of Khalifa Hifter, a renegade Libyan general who has waged an offensive aimed at crushing Islamic militants around Libya, Abu Khattala's brother Abu Bakr told The Associated Press Abu Khattala was

a prominent figure in the eastern city of Benghazi's thriving circles of extremists,

popular among young radicals for being among the most hardcore and uncompromising of those calling for Libya to be ruled by Islamic Shariah law. But he was always something of a lone figure. Even after he joined Ansar al-Shariah — the group accused by the United States of carrying out the Sept. 11, 2012, attack on the U.S. diplomatic mission in Benghazi — he didn't take a leadership position or a post in its decision-making bodies, noted Fadlallah Haroun, a former rebel commander in Benghazi who met Abu Khattala in prison in the 1990s.

"He was always an outsider," Haroun, who opposes the Islamists and whose brother is a top intelligence official, told the AP. "He was a very simple man, who was honest in his talk and independent."

Sunni fighters expand offensive in western Iraq

BAGHDAD — Sunni insurgents led by an al-Qaida breakaway group expanded their offensive in a volatile western province on Saturday, capturing three strategic towns and the first border crossing with Syria to fall on the Iraqi side.

It's the latest blow against Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki, who is fighting for his political life even as forces beyond his control are pushing the country toward a sectarian showdown.

In a reflection of the bitter divide, thousands of heavily armed Shiite militiamen — eager to take on the Sunni insurgents — marched through Iraqi cities in military-style parades on streets where many of them battled U.S. forces a half decade ago.

The towns of Qaim, Rawah and Anah are the first territory

seized in predominantly Sunni Anbar province, west of Baghdad, since fighters from the Islamic State of Iraq and the Levant group overran the city of Fallujah and parts of the provincial capital of Ramadi earlier this year.

The capture of Rawah on the Euphrates River and the nearby town of Anah appeared to be part of march toward a key dam in the city of Haditha, which was built in 1986 and has a hydraulic power station that produces some 1,000 megawatts. Destruction of the dam would adversely impact the country's electrical grid and cause major flooding.

Iraqi military officials said more than 2,000 troops were quickly dispatched to the site of the dam to protect it against a possible attack by the Sunni militants. They spoke on condition of

anonymity because they were not authorized to speak to the media.

Rawah's mayor, Hussein Ali al-Aujail, said the militants ransacked the town's government offices and forced local army and police forces to pull out. Rawah and Anah had remained under government control since nearby Fallujah fell to the Sunni militants in January.

The Islamic State's Sunni militants have carved out a large fiefdom along the Iraqi-Syrian border and have long traveled back and forth with ease, but control over crossings like that one in Qaim allows them to more easily move weapons and heavy equipment to different battlefields. Syrian rebels already have seized the facilities on the Syrian side of the border and several other posts in areas under their control.

Belarus rights chief freed from jail after 3 years

MINSK, Belarus — A prominent Belarusian human rights activist was released from prison Saturday in a move seen as a gesture from the authoritarian leader of Belarus to improve relations with the West.

Ales Bialiatski, the 51-year-old leader of the Vyasna rights group, was released nearly three years into his prison sentence, 20 months ahead of schedule.

Bialiatski was nominated for the Nobel Peace Prize in 2012 and received an array of international awards while imprisoned, including the U.S. State Department's 2011 Human Rights Defenders Award. His group has provided legal assistance to thousands of Belarusians

arrested or imprisoned for challenging President Alexander Lukashenko's undemocratic policies.

He was convicted of tax evasion and sentenced to 4 1/2 years in prison in November 2011. Western governments criticized the trial as politically vindictive. Supporters greeted

Bialiatski at a train station in the capital, Minsk, after he traveled from prison in the city of Bobruisk.

"The international support and the support back home, this is what brought about my release," Bialiatski told reporters. "I will continue to do what I've been doing."

SKorea military searches for shooter

SEOUL, South Korea — The military searched Sunday for an armed South Korean soldier who fled after killing five of his comrades and wounding seven at an outpost near the North Korean border.

The sergeant, identified only by his surname, Yim, opened fire Saturday night with his standard issue K2 assault rifle at an outpost in Gangwon province, east of Seoul, according to a Defense Ministry spokesman. He spoke on condition of anonymity because of department rules.

Yim, who was scheduled

to be discharged from the military in September, fled with his weapon, but it wasn't clear how much live ammunition he had, the official said.

Defense official Kim Min-seok said Sunday at a televised briefing that all the wounded were expected to survive, although two were injured seriously. He said search operations were underway to quickly find Yim, without elaborating.

Park Cheol-yong, the head of Madal village, near the army division where the gunfire took place, said he warned villagers to stay in their houses. Park Jin-soo, a pastor at a church in the village, said that Sunday

services would take place as usual despite the tension over the missing soldier and the shooting.

Thousands of troops from the rival Koreas are squared off along the world's most heavily armed border.

There was no indication that North Korea was involved. But tensions between the two countries have been high recently, with North Korea staging a series of missile and artillery drills and threatening South Korea's leader. The Koreas have also traded fire along their disputed maritime border in the Yellow Sea. South Korea has repeatedly vowed to respond with strength if provoked by the North.



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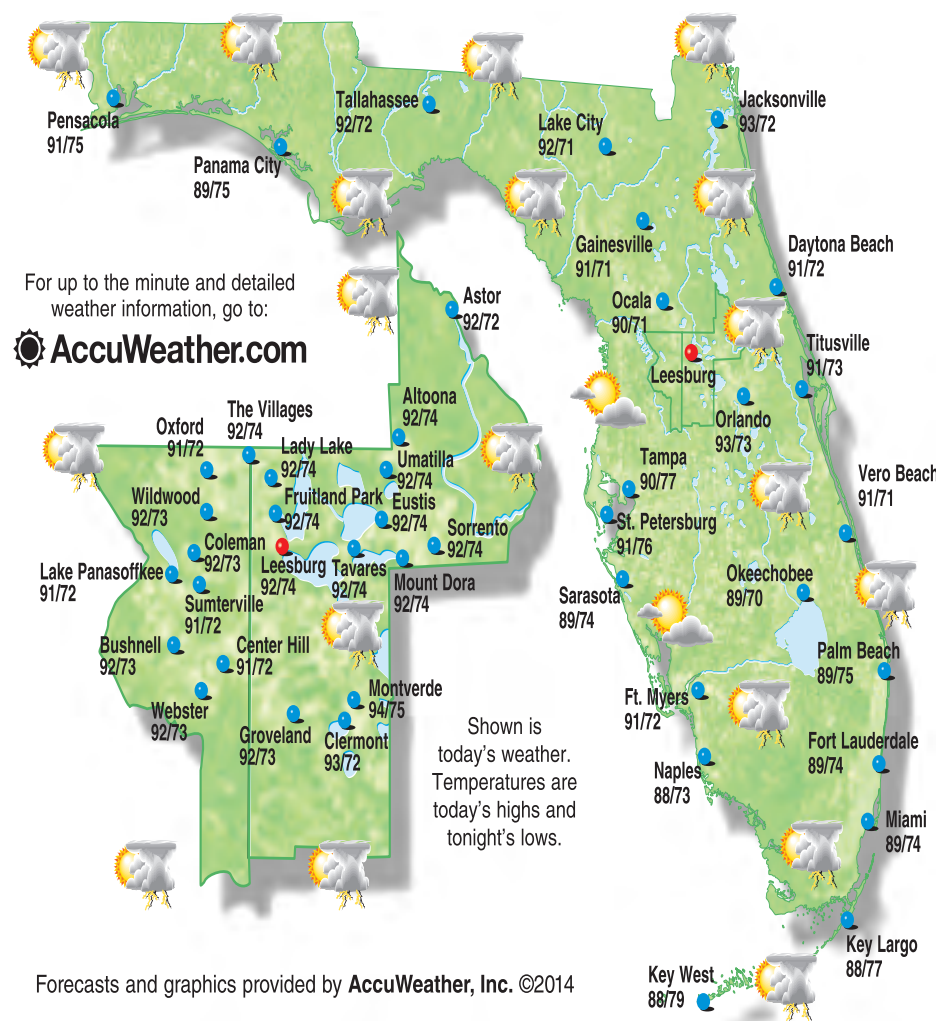
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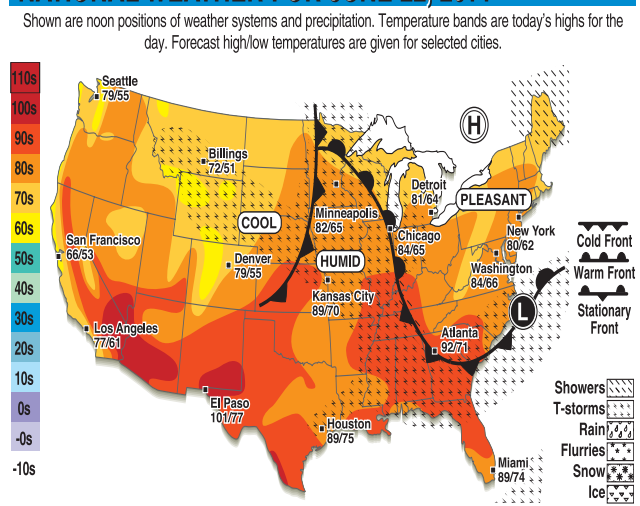

US can advance with win over Portugal

MANAUS, Brazil — Moths and mosquitoes circled when the United States took the field for practice Saturday evening at Arena da Amazonia, a 40,000-seat stadium built in a remote area of the rainforest where the Rio Negro meets the Amazon.

And as the Americans stretched in the heat and humidity in their final training session before

today's World Cup game against Portugal, a double rainbow shimmered — said by some to herald an occurrence with great meaning.

With a win over the Portuguese and reigning world player of the year Cristiano Ronaldo, the U.S. would accomplish a pair of American firsts: reaching the knockout stage of consecutive World Cups and advancing with a game to spare.

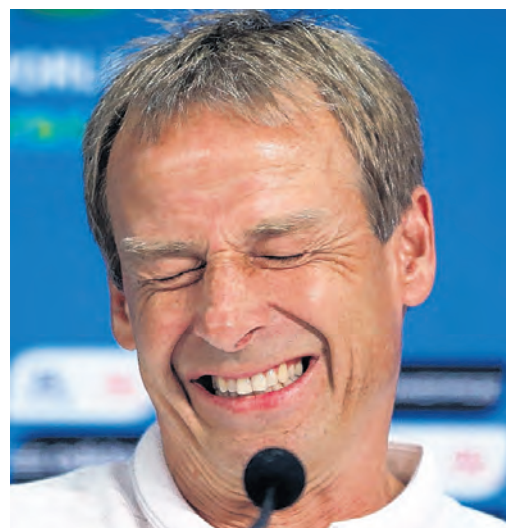

Goodyear points to speed for Stewart tire issue

SONOMA, Calif. — Tony Stewart was running lap times about a second faster than expected at Indianapolis Motor Speedway when a blown tire caused him to wreck this week in a Goodyear test.

Goodyear officials said Stewart's accident 17 laps into Tuesday's 20-lap run was the only incident of the two-day test. The three-time NASCAR champion wasn't injured.

"Our test speeds were extremely fast at Indianapolis," Greg Stucker, Goodyear's director of racing, said in a statement Friday. "Tony was approaching the end of a very strong 20-lap run, with his lap times as much as a second faster than what has become the norm at Indianapolis at that point of a run."

"It appears that increased, sustained

speed over that run generated a significant amount of heat, which eventually caused the right-front to go down." Stewart wasn't upset

with Goodyear over the incident, which he said "destroyed the car, so it was a good hit."

"I am not really sure what the cause of it was,

but that's part of tire testing," Stewart said. "That's why you go to the test. I'm sure they'll learn something from it and we'll go on."

Joey Logano was one of six drivers at the test and said Stewart easily had the fastest car at Indy. Also at the test were Greg Biffle, Clint Bowyer, Kyle Busch and Ryan Newman, the defending race winner.

Stewart, an Indiana native, has two Brickyard victories and puts a huge emphasis on the July race.

Following Stewart's tire failure, Logano said Goodyear made adjustments "to figure out a way to knock some speed out of these race cars." Teams were given a different left side tire to use and will wait to see what Goodyear decides to bring for the race.

"I know when we left they were going to go back and discuss where they wanted to be, but I think they're going in the right direction on making sure they have the security in the tire, making sure it's safe," Logano said. "It's defi-

nately a very big challenge when you come to a race track and you go faster and you're already on edge. You've got to come back with something that's even more durable and that's hard."

Indianapolis has been a difficult track for Goodyear, and the tire brought to the 2008 race was not durable enough to make it more than a dozen or so laps. NASCAR was forced to call a caution roughly every 10 laps to force teams to change tires.

"The thing about Indianapolis is the tough conditions the cars and the tires have to endure," Stucker said. "The surface is very abrasive, the long straightaways and short chutes are fast, cornering is tough with very little banking. Combine that with this new car package, and you've got conditions that put a lot of stress on the tires."

Ambrose looking for 1st career Sonoma victory

SONOMA, Calif. — Marcos Ambrose wants nothing more than to break Hendrick Motorsports' four-race winning streak and his best shot comes on the road course at Sonoma Raceway this weekend.

A win Sunday could earn the Australian his first berth in the Chase for the Sprint Cup championship and solidify his future at Richard Petty Motorsports. Ambrose's current deal with the organization is up at the end of the season.

"I'm in a renewal year with Richard Petty for 2015," Ambrose said. "I'm not really thinking about myself here. I just want the best for RPM. They have decisions to make ... I want to make sure that RPM are on the right path and I'm going to do everything I can to make sure I help them do that."

Ambrose is in his fourth season driving for the Petty organization, and his two career Sprint Cup victories are with the team. Both of his wins were on the road course at Watkins

Glen.

He's still looking for his first victory at Sonoma, where Ambrose is always considered one of the favorites but hasn't managed to grab the checkered flag. Ambrose has five finishes of eighth or better in six career starts at the picturesque 1.99-mile track.

"We know that the race here this weekend and in Watkins Glen, the two road races, are our best chance to win a race this year," he said. "That will automatically lock us into the Chase. Clearly there's a lot to race for at these two tracks for us. We've put a lot of energy and effort into Sonoma."

Ambrose is 23rd in the Sprint Cup standings, and there are 11 races remaining to set the Chase field. To be one of the 16 drivers, he'll likely need the berth that comes with a regular-season victory.

But standing in his way Sunday is the Hendrick Motorsports juggernaut, which has been unstoppable since Jimmie Johnson's win at Charlotte on May 25. Since that race,

Johnson has won three times and teammate Dale Earnhardt Jr. won once. Back it up to Jeff Gordon's win at Kansas and teams powered by Hendrick engines have won the last six races, including Jamie McMurray's All-Star race victory.

The all-time record for consecutive car owner victories is 16 by Carl Kiekhaefer in 1956. The Hendrick organi-

zation won six consecutive races in 2007 to set the modern era record and its best bet for a tie could be Gordon, who has nine career wins on road courses.

Gordon is proud of his success rate at Sonoma, where he's the all-time leader with five wins. Gordon hasn't finished lower than ninth at Sonoma since his 2006 victory, a span of eight consecutive

top-10 finishes.

"We've worked hard as a team to be competitive on road courses and we've had a lot of success at Sonoma. But it's not an easy track to conquer," said Gordon, who grew up in nearby Vallejo.

Ambrose, considered one of the best road course racers in NASCAR, still likes his chances.

"My talents are really

good on road racing in these big, heavy stock cars," he said. "It suits my style, suits the way I like to drive a race car. I get a lot of good feedback for the wheel. I think it's a natural skill set for me."

Since Petty took over sole ownership of the team in 1993, more than a dozen drivers have driven for him and Ambrose ranks among the best with two wins and three poles. His victories match the late Bobby Hamilton and Kasey Kahne. With one more top-10 finish, Ambrose will tie Hamilton's mark of 28.

Ambrose doesn't focus on statistics and instead has his eye on making the Chase.

"There's pressure building, there's a chance to lock yourself into the Chase, which would make your season, you get a chance to win a Sprint Cup race, which you don't get to do very often," Ambrose said. "What I do this weekend is not try to think about it, be normal, try to relax leading into this week. The more you think about it, the worse you tend to go."

Brazil works to warn World Cup visitors of sharks

RECIFE, Brazil — Newlywed Akiko Ishihama let out a nervous laugh when asked if she realized that she was honeymooning on a beach well known for deadly shark attacks.

“Not at all,” she answered as she gazed at the aquamarine water lapping up against the inviting stretch of sand called Boa Viagem Praia. “Maybe I’ll stay on the beach and get suntanned.”

Ishihama, 28, and her husband, Makoto, 32, kicked off their honeymoon by attending Saturday’s World Cup match between Japan and Ivory Coast in nearby Arena Pernambuco. They are among tens of thousands of visitors from around the globe descending on this city in northeastern Brazil to see one of five matches.

The popular, sun-bleached Boa Viagem beach — which translates to safe journey beach — lies only a few miles south of Recife’s city center. Less than a year ago, a woman was killed by a shark here, one of 24 deadly attacks around Recife since 1992.

Brazilians know the dangers, but government officials have stepped up efforts to warn tourists, erecting signs in English and Spanish with

the words “Danger,” and “Peligro,” fire department spokesman Valdy Oliveira said.

The department has increased from 50 to 70 the number lifeguards patrolling the beaches near hotels, Oliveira said. “We reinforced our safety protocol near hotels because of these shark attacks,” he said. “We have specially done it in places where water is murky.”

Yet not everyone notices the signs, and service industry workers can’t effectively warn tourists — most of whom don’t

speak Portuguese or Spanish.

Ishihama said she and her husband probably would have entered the water unaware of the beach’s reputation for shark attacks. No one had said a word to them about sharks — at least, not that they understood. “There’s only one guy working at our hotel who speaks English,” Ishihama said.

Several lifeguards sit together under a tent almost directly in front of the spot where the last attack took place. An-

other, riding a personal watercraft, lurches over the breakers as he takes a path parallel to the beach as if to shepherd swimmers close to shore.

Large warning signs have been placed along a sidewalk separating a tree-lined sea wall from a bustling three-lane boulevard fronting a seemingly endless wall of high-rises. At the center of each sign is a sleek silhouette of a shark with the words “danger,” or “caution,” written in red and blue lettering in both Portuguese and English. Similar post-

ers have been affixed to octagonal refreshment huts atop the seawall. Planted in the sand near the water are a string of red flags emblazoned in yellow with the word “Perigo,” Portuguese for danger.

Some tourists’ eyes widen as they notice the shark symbol while approaching the huts.

According to the state’s Shark Incident Monitoring Committee, 59 people have been attacked by sharks in or near Recife since 1992. Only 11 months ago, 18-year-old Bruna Gobbi of Sao Pau-

lo died after a shark attack at Boa Viagem.

That hasn’t stopped sunbathers and kids kicking soccer balls from flocking to the beach. But it doesn’t take long to see that most don’t venture beyond the distinctive reef walls — from which the city gets its Portuguese name. The reef is submerged during high tide, but still protects swimmers from sharks, so long as they stay close to shore.

As he monitored the chairs and umbrellas he’s been renting on the beach for nearly three decades, David Jose de Lima, 50, pointed to the spot where last July’s attack took place. Video of the attack shows several lifeguards rushing to the young woman’s aid as she struggled to keep her head above water and her blood formed a red streak on the water around her.

De Lima considers it part of his job to tell everyone new to the beach about the dangers and always issues a warning for swimmers not to cross the reef. But he speaks just enough English to do business. And not everyone heeds his warnings.

“It’s dangerous because a lot of people drink, and drink, and they don’t know, or some guys think they’re a big man, and they go on the other side,” he said.

Citizens voted for peace in Colombia

As internal strife with guerrilla forces rages in many parts of the world, on Sunday the people of Colombia cast a vote for peace and continuity.

In a heated runoff, they reelected President Juan Manuel Santos, giving him a second term in the presidential palace. His rival, Oscar Ivan Zuluaga, a candidate for the Centro Democratico party, quickly conceded to President Santos, who won by a margin of 53 to 47 percent.

After his victory, President Santos said this democratic election had been one of the most important in Colombia's recent history: "What was at stake was not one candidate over another, but the future direction of a country."

Here's why: In effect, President Santos and his opponent campaigned on two radically opposed views of domestic peace. President Santos favored continuing the 19-month-old peace talks with the leftist FARC, the

Revolutionary Armed Forces of Colombia, the oldest homegrown guerrilla group in Latin America. At times, it has brought the government to the brink.

But under President Santos' leadership as head of state and while he served as defense minister under the previous president, Alvaro Uribe, the FARC has been dealt crushing blows. U.S. military aid to the Colombian government under at least three administrations has made a big difference in putting the insurgents on the ropes.

Zuluaga took a far more combative stance during his campaign. He wanted no part of the peace talks unless the rebels ceased their hostilities, ended abductions of private citizens and stopped recruiting Colombian children and teens to become cannon fodder.

Political pundits believed Zuluaga's position meant he would likely break off the peace talks and possibly plunge the

South American country into another violent chapter in its 50-year-old civil war.

Most Colombians — thousands of whom have already fled to South Florida — voted to continue the negotiations by reelecting President Santos. Many scribbled the word "paz," or peace, on the palms of their hands on election day. Who can blame them? Some Colombians have gone from childhood to adulthood fearing they would become victims in the war between their government and FARC.

The negotiations between President Santos' government and the FARC have become problematic because of their duration. Many Colombians, though initially supportive, have grown increasingly impatient and skeptical of FARC's intentions. And unfortunately, the talks take place in Havana, capital of the longest tyranny in America.

But the Colombian

government had to make this concession to bring the rebels to the negotiating table. And Cuba's lack of a free press means the Colombian government can maintain secrecy regarding the progress of the negotiations.

Regardless of the location of the talks, Sunday's vote gives Colombians hope that the conflict in their country is nearing an end. It has been one of the longest and bloodiest in the Western Hemisphere, claiming more than 200,000 lives, most of them civilians.

The FARC is no longer as powerful as it once was, thanks in good measure to Santos' strategy of talking while pursuing aggressive military tactics on the ground.

His re-election represents an endorsement of successful policies that may at long last bring Colombia's half-century nightmare to an end.

Nothing relaxing about starting a pot operation from seed

Inside a windowless warehouse here teeming with 1,143 pot plants, one of the state's pioneering marijuana producers waited anxiously to "snap the lights."

To growers, that means putting the leafy stalks on a 12-hour cycle under the lights. The suddenly shorter "days" signal to the plants that fall is coming — in early June.

"That's when we play Mother Nature," said Steve Elliott, an owner of one of Washington's first licensed pot growers, AuricAG. "It puts the plants into hyper-drive."

To propagate the species, the all-female plants then start to flower, secreting resins, sticky with pot's psychoactive chemicals, to attract pollen.



But not a speck of pollen should be around if Elliott and team have done their job. Desperate, the plants get more

sticky, more pungent and more valuable. Their fastest-growing strain should be ready for harvest five weeks

after flowering begins.

As the cycle is repeated in coming weeks, AuricAG's owners will confront crucial questions. Can they deliver to the state's first recreational pot stores a crop that meets purity standards, makes a decent profit and brands them as mature entrepreneurs who view pot more like good wine than hippie lettuce?

Much is at stake, including personal finances and reputations. Even the perceived success of Washington state's experiment with legal weed depends on the first wave of growers getting good products to the stores expected to open in July.

The name AuricAG hardly conjures marijuana, never mind counterculture. But it is a sly riff on the owners' ambition. "Auric"

Organic farming is appealing to a new generation

By 9 a.m., Jack Motter had been planting peas for hours.

He pushed a two-wheeled contraption that deposited a seed every few inches along neat rows at Ellwood Canyon Farms, just outside Santa Barbara, Calif. As clouds gathered overhead, he picked up the pace to avoid losing days of work to the fall rain.

Timing can mean

the difference between profit and loss for the 5-year-old farm.

Motter and his business partner, Jeff Kramer, are part of a growing crop of young farmers choosing to produce food without pesticides and synthetic fertilizers. As consumers demand more fresh and local food, grown with minimal environmental effects, a new generation has taken up organic farming.

TV appearances can be exhausting, exhilarating for small businesses

For the owners of a Morehead City, N.C., bakery, the hardest part of being on the Food Network's "Cupcake Wars" was when it was over: They couldn't talk about their victory until the show aired.

Angela Diaz and her daughter-in-law Kaylee, owners of Happy Cakes Cupcakery, sent in their audition tape in April 2013 and won the mother-and-daughter themed "Cupcake Wars" the following June. Then they had to keep it a secret until October.

"We weren't even allowed

to tell people why we went to (Los Angeles)," said Angela Diaz, 41.

The two, who started the business in fall 2012, rode the wave of celebrity that helped them transform their business from an online outlet

that delivered about 10 dozen cupcakes a week to a brick-and-mortar location selling up to 1,200 fresh treats a day.

"It was crazy," Angela Diaz said.

The Diazes are among many entrepreneurs who have participated in reality television opportunities, from ABC's "Shark Tank" to Spike TV's "Bar Rescue." The News & Observer caught up with the Diazes and other businesses that survived their celebrity to find out what happened after their moments in the spotlight.

Guy Wavra said his moment

is more than the first name of the James Bond villain Goldfinger. It means related to, or derived from gold.

And gold is what the owners of AuricAG hope to grow. It's what they dream of reaping. And it's the standard they aim to set for the new industry.

With their backgrounds, the owners believe they're well-equipped for the mission. "This product is basically a widget. You manufacture it and distribute it. I understand that operation," said Mark Greenshields, the company president.

Sales director Joby Sewell sees pot differently. "Instead of selling two-by-fours or

hammers, this is living and breathing. There's passion involved, and that's why I'm in it," Sewell said.

In any case, those on the team have faced a steady diet of stress. They had to find property where the landlord was willing to break federal law. They had to pass the state's vetting process, including FBI background checks. They had to install security cameras — 29 in all — to cover every inch of their operation. "Treat this like a prison," a state inspector told them.

They've also had to create 911 clones — and counting — from the 232 plants they brought in during a 15-day window in which state officials essentially looked the other way while the industry sprouted from medical-marijuana farms and illegal sources.

There's little rest for prospectors in the first days of Washington's green rush. And even

with their more-than-a-half-century of combined business experience, the local guys who own AuricAG are in deeply unfamiliar terrain as a company that banks won't even serve because of the federal prohibition of pot.

Will they really be forced to deal only in cash? How will they protect it? Is there a chance they could be one of the few pot merchants a local credit union has said it will service on a trial basis?

"It would bring a big sigh of relief," Greenshields said one day earlier this month. That afternoon, a committee at Salal Credit Union would decide if AuricAG was worthy of becoming their first customer in the pot industry.

Two credit unions have stepped up to give legal pot merchants a trial run, Numerica in Spokane and Salal in Seattle.

Credit unions tend to operate within state

and appear to be more comfortable developing programs that meet Washington's pot law than multistate banks, said Scott Jarvis, director of the state's Department of Financial Institutions.

AuricAG's Greenshields was the first potential customer to make a presentation to Salal. Greenshields brought a thick binder with 23 sections, stocked with tax returns, financial disclosures, credit references.

The odds still didn't seem all that favorable.

Salal is starting with no more than seven pot companies in what it calls a "beta test" for the industry. "We aren't sure how labor-intensive these companies are going to be," said Bob Schweigert, senior vice president. "We have to do this right. If we stumble at all, it's going to impact the ability of others."

Formed by Group Health employees in 1948, Salal is the 23rd-largest credit union in the state, with \$366 million in assets, Schweigert said.

He sees great potential for pot business. "It's going to surpass the alcohol industry," he said.

Salal decision-makers emailed Greenshields after their meeting, just after 4 p.m. Impressed by the experience of AuricAG's owners, they said they wanted to make the company a customer.

on "Bar Rescue" lived up to the reality television's show name.

In March 2013, "Bar Rescue" transformed Garner's Characters Quarters, owned by Wavra and parents Charlie and Helen Alexander, into MoonRunners Saloon.

After opening Character's in 2010, the concept, which included waitresses dressed as famous characters in edgy outfits, "got stale quick," said Wavra, 35, of Cary, N.C. The business was losing about \$3,000 a month, he said.

"Bar Rescue" and its expert and star Jon Taffer walked the owners through a high-profile transition and made a \$50,000 investment in a brand and bar makeover to MoonRunners, capitalizing on the area's Southern roots. In exchange, the family aired

its internal struggles, including a rift between Wavra and his sister, a waitress on a loop of being fired and re-hired.

"I don't have anything negative to say about the process. ... It was a little bit embarrassing," but worth the larger goal of saving the business, Wavra said. "We love hard. We fight hard, no matter what. That is just us."

When the business reopened as MoonRunners, revenue jumped 30 percent.

After the show aired

in August, revenue spiked 100 percent two months in a row.

Now, business is up 40 percent compared to Characters, Wavra said, and on track to bring in \$1 million in revenue this year. Owners are working with Broadslab Distillery in Benson, N.C., to create a MoonRunners line of moonshine and are hoping to open a second location within the next year.

"Bar Rescue" is kind of the gift that keeps on giving," he said.

analysis and financial entertainment.

Simply put, it's the difference between *The Economist Magazine* and Jim Cramer. It's the oceans of gray that exist between Project Syndicate and Marketwatch. And it's the stark contrast between Yale's Robert Shiller and CNBC's Rick Santelli.

Entertainment is meant to titillate, to excite, to anger and many times, to frighten. If the NYSE crashed ev-

ery time Marketwatch featured an article predicting that exact occurrence, we'd have all been broke eons ago. Market television is all about ratings and advertising revenue. The numbers may be right, but the information also may be purposefully sensationalized and misleading.

It's no accident that news is presented in an overwhelmingly negative fashion. The amygdala is the part of our brain that, according to Oxford University neuroscientist Baroness Susan Greenfield, applies 10 times more meaning

to negative or threatening inputs than to positive information. Enter dramatic economic television and websites, where doom dominates our attention and our emotions.

True market analysis and productive portfolio management is much more intellectually driven and sedate. It's not screaming hosts, ominous warnings, flashing screens, pithy chants and clanging bells.

It's the painstaking, steady process of balancing equities with fixed income instruments. It's performing

a tax analysis on existing portfolio holdings before initiating further trades. It's understanding what you need your money to do for you.

It's waiting until the market provides a propitious entry point, then monitoring those same investments. It's creating income through investments so you will enjoy enough cash flow in retirement.

Like the man said, "Television does a better job covering revolution than evolution." Things that take lots of explanation, and that require a viewer to

work through an elaborate thought process, are not often wildly popular on television.

Yet, that's what many investors need: carefully planned and well-monitored investments that provide steady growth and crafted, measurable downside protection. For folks nearing and

in retirement, it's not about excitement over the next great thing. It's about getting your financial ship safely to shore.

The two Brawley, Calif., natives, both 30, have learned that small-scale agriculture is neither easy nor lucrative. Their days on the 15-acre farm start at dawn and end with exhaustion.

"There's nothing romantic about it," Kramer said. "It's hard work and long hours for little pay."

Agriculture officials are hoping more young people heed the call to till the land, whether organically or conventionally.

In California, the average age of farmers continues to climb. It hit 58 in 2012, up by nearly two years from 2007, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture's most recent census. In 2012, the number of California farmers 65 and older grew nearly 20 percent to 39,428 during the five-year period — nearly three times faster than farmers ages 25 to 34.

Older agricultural operators outnumber their younger counterparts 6 to 1, the data show. There are fewer than 6,400 farmers ages 25 to 34 in California.

Agriculture trade groups have developed programs, including training and financial incentives, aimed at attracting young people. But many new farmers are motivated primarily by the desire to show that mainstream methods aren't the only way to grow food.

Large conventional farms can churn out commodity crops quickly and economically. The average American farm, tilled by heavy machinery, is now 434 acres, up from 418 in 2007, the USDA reported recently.

But changing consumer preferences for locally grown and organic food have paved the way for young farmers to carve out a niche.

Chris Velez is among them. About 300 miles north of Ellwood Canyon Farms, Velez has spent nearly 10 years farming five acres in Auberry, Calif. He sees the work as a mission.

"The Earth is in a pretty dramatic state," he said. "It's truly calling for people to come tend to the land in a healthy way."

The 38-year-old has taken on apprentices to learn the trade. Farm interns have spent a cou-

ple of months at Stella Luna Farm, named after Velez's 13-year-old daughter, Stella.

Starting a small farm poses big challenges. Large amounts of capital are needed for land and equipment, but novice farmers have a tough time securing lines of credit. Banks don't see big profits.

Velez and others, however, have found creative ways to get their farms going.

Kramer and Motter,

for instance, borrow equipment from farmer neighbors and look for deals on used tractors and attachments on Craigslist. Velez and his wife, Jamie Carr, live frugally and avoid going into debt. Growing their own food helps.

We "might be poor on paper, but farming allows for spending time with kids," said the father of two. "My richness is life."

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Licensing gives artist-entrepreneur room to grow

Retailers attest: there aren't many artists like Caroline Simas.

She's a mother of four and incredibly prolific. She's got design chops and business savvy. And rather than gunning for a gallery wall, she's found a way for her designs to appear on products worldwide.

The difference-maker: Simas licenses her work. In Simas' home studio, a large bookshelf holds the fruits of her labor: dozens of consumer goods bearing her designs — from tumblers to notepads to calendars — most of which include a Bible verse or faith-based message.

And in the past six years, the Charlotte, N.C.-based artist and

mother of four has grown her business from a line of greeting cards sold at a local shop to an extensive line of hand-made designs that appear on hundreds of products sold around the world.

Simas creates designs using a mix of watercolors, acrylics and embellishments, ranging from painted lace to small sticks to Scrabble letters picked up at a flea market.

In licensing her work, she retains the copyrights and essentially rents those designs to companies that work with consumer-goods manufacturers. She then gets a royalty on the sale of each item that has her artwork on it.

Simas says most of her royalties come quarterly and usually range from 5 to 8 percent.

Licensing is a way to build a brand. For example, a paisley pattern of pink and teal, with a Bible verse, that she created could end up on candles, notepads, even garden tools.

"You know what's interesting about her?" said Kim Livengood, spokeswoman for Tervis, an insulated drinkware company that has sold thousands of products

TIPS FOR GROWTH

Below are some more of Simas' winning strategies:

- **MAXIMIZE YOUR WEBSITE:** Although Simas doesn't handle e-commerce on her site, she has direct links to many online stores that sell products bearing her artwork.
- **DON'T BE AFRAID TO OUTSOURCE:** To avoid burnout, Simas says she outsources nearly everything that keeps her from the creative process, from the book-keeping to the tax preparing, image scanning to email chains with manufacturers.
- **STAY NEAR YOUR INSPIRATION:** Simas' art studio has windows facing her backyard, a spot that inspires many of her designs.

with Simas' designs. "Most artists aren't business people. She is both." Simas studied elementary education — not art — and spent six years in the classroom. She stopped teaching a few weeks before her first child, Walker, was born.

But she continued to give art lessons to children over the summer in her garage.

After her second child, William, was born, Simas started the Creative

Palette, a custom painting business. She painted murals on children's bedroom walls, in playrooms and in nurseries. A woodworker made step stools and children's tables and chairs that she would paint.

Then, after finding out she was pregnant with twin girls, she put her business on hold. But while on bed rest, she hand-painted the birth announcements.

"I had so much fun

painting and designing on paper (that) a friend encouraged me to ... match Scripture with art on paper," Simas said.

It wasn't long before Simas had created several dozen greeting cards, which a friend sold at her home art show.

Within a week, the co-owner of 3 French Hens, a gift shop in Charlotte, had commissioned her own batch for the store.

Simas launched her official business, Multiple Blessings — a nod to the twins whose birth inspired her entrepreneurship — with a greeting card line in 2005. Soon, a half-dozen local shops asked to carry the line.

By 2007, juggling motherhood and logistics — printing, warehousing and shipping — was too stressful, Simas said. That's when she looked to licensing.

Her first contract was with a company that sold baby linens. She picked up more clientele after renting a booth at Surtex, a New York trade show for art and design that manufacturers attend to peruse artists' portfolios.

"The first time I was at Surtex, I got signed for fabric and stationery and several gift products," Simas said. "And from there it just started growing and growing."

In 2012, Tennessee-based licensing agency Courtney Davis Inc. contacted Simas. The agency had been watching her growth for more than year and was interested in representing her because of her faith-based artwork.

The boutique agency, which only represents just more than a dozen artists, takes a sizable portion of her sales, she says, but in exchange, they've opened doors to relationships with many of their manufacturing clients, which number in the hundreds.

dummy, and sooner or later concede a club trick. The three remaining trumps in dummy will then be sufficient to ruff his club and diamond losers.
But when he wins the first spade and leads a heart to the ace, he discards the three remaining trumps. This means he cannot afford to draw the outstanding trumps (even with the aid of a finesse), since he would then have only two trumps left in dummy to ruff his three minor-suit losers. South must therefore revise his original plan of play.
He should cash the A-K of diamonds, discarding a club, and ruff a diamond, then play a club to the ace and lead the nine of diamonds. When West covers with the ten, South does not ruff, but discards dummy's last club instead. In so doing, he allows for the possibility that East started with three diamonds rather than four.
As it happens, this one cautious play averts defeat. South is eventually able to ruff two clubs in dummy and take the marked trump finesse to round out his 12 tricks. In effect, South winds up ruffing two clubs and a diamond in dummy instead of two diamonds and a club, as originally planned.
Observe that if declarer tries to ruff his fourth diamond in dummy, East overruffs to defeat the slam.

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BAE Systems challenges Lockheed on F-16 upgrades

FORT WORTH, Texas — Inside a hangar at Alliance Airport, two F-16s await a major overhaul.

The fighter jets, which arrived from South Korea last month, will be the first to be worked over by engineers at BAE Systems, a British company that won a \$1.3 billion contract to install new avionics and other systems on that country's fleet of about 130 F-16s.

To handle the work, BAE has set up shop at Alliance in space formerly occupied by Bell Helicopter. It has hired 175 workers, plans to expand its workforce to 300 by the end of the year and broke ground on a

40,000-square-foot expansion that will add a systems integration lab.

The operation represents another chapter in the long life of the legendary fighter jet that's celebrating the 40th anniversary of its first flight — and a new competitor for its maker, Lockheed Martin Aeronautics in west Fort Worth.

More than 4,500 F-16s have been produced by Lockheed and its predecessor in Fort Worth, General Dynamics, with about half going to foreign nations. By some estimates, more than 1,000 of the 3,000-plus F-16s still in operation could become candidates for upgraded electronic systems in an era when defense funds to buy new jets are tight.

With Lockheed Martin focused on meeting development targets on its next-generation F-35 fighter jet program, which has been plagued by technical delays and

higher costs, BAE believes it can pick up business by focusing on F-16 upgrades, said John Bean, a former Lockheed executive who is now vice president and general manager of global fighter programs for BAE Systems. (It also has about 200 employees in west Fort Worth working with Lockheed on electronic warfare and other systems for the F-35.)

"Customers were clamoring for competition," Bean said.

While the F-35 was designed as a successor to the F-16, many nations are reassessing how many F-35s they want to buy because of the higher costs. As one alternative, some are upgrading their F-16s and flying them longer.

Greece, which has 140 F-16s, is expected to open up bidding for an upgrade contract this year, Bean said. Other countries considering upgrades include Singapore, Turkey, Egypt and Bahrain.

"As many as 1,000 to

1,200 F-16s will need to fly for 25 years or more," he said.

Lockheed has handled F-16 upgrades for years, including mid-life enhancements for the Air Force, and believes that its knowledge of the aircraft is a major advantage over BAE or any other rival, said George Standridge, vice president of business development for Lockheed Martin Aeronautics. Two years ago, it won a contract with Taiwan to upgrade the electronics on 145 F-16s for \$1.85 billion.

"We are the design and development authority on this airplane," Standridge said, emphasizing that it has unique know-how to take the plane to its maximum capability.

Despite budget concerns around the globe, Lockheed doesn't believe that F-16 upgrades will eat into potential sales of its F-35, which comes with stealth capabilities and other features that even upgrad-

ed F-16s won't have.

"There is nothing you can do to a fourth-generation airplane that will take it to the capabilities of a next-generation plane like the F-22 or the F-35," Standridge said. "Even as the F-35 enters into service, we will have F-16s out there in numbers for a long period of time."

Indeed, many nations with F-16s have already placed orders for F-35s, which sell for about \$100 million each. Nine countries, including South Korea, have ordered about 700 F-35s.

And Lockheed could drum up more sales next month, when the plane is scheduled to fly overseas for the first time at the Farnborough International Airshow in England. It expects the fighter's cost to drop as production increases.

At Alliance, BAE engineers will write software and integrate the avionics and other systems to provide all new controls for the F-16s. New systems will include central mission computers, radar, communication, sensors, navigation and weapons targeting. The cockpits will receive high-definition displays and a new helmet system that displays information for the pilot on its visor, Bean said.

The equipment will first be installed in the two planes at Alliance, with ground testing planned for next year and flight testing for 2016. Once the systems have been developed, the upgrades will be installed on the rest of the fleet in South Korea.

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Good Things for Those Who Wait

A: That was it for now, and you didn't miss anything. Season finales — particularly for dramas — are designed that way, to keep you guessing so that you'll come back, provided the show in question gets renewed. "Resurrection" did, and while you may get some answers when the Frances Fisher-starring series returns to ABC this fall, don't bank on everything being resolved right away. That's how they keep you hooked.

Q: Will "The Sing-Off" be coming back, and when? — Natalie Carter, Clearfield, Pa.

A: At this writing, NBC hadn't made a Season 5 of the competition official, but one can't necessarily take that as a sign the



show won't be back. After all, the network canceled it after Season 3 ... only to reverse its decision a year later by ordering a Season 4 that aired over a limited period during the holiday season last December.

Q: Is "24: Live Another Day" the start of another regular, ongoing "24" series? — Tim Scott, Pawtucket, R.I.

A: Though it was designed as a stand-alone miniseries, the current Fox show is billed as "Day 9," thus folding it into the history of the entire franchise. Nothing

had been said about another "24" series at the time of this writing, but we've learned never to count Jack Bauer (Kiefer Sutherland) out. There's long been talk of a feature-film version of the series, too, so it's entirely possible that another "day" still may come for the character and the concept.

Checking in with Chyler Leigh

Chyler Leigh made an eventful exit from "Grey's Anatomy," but she didn't necessarily think she'd become an action heroine afterward.

Two years ago, her Dr. Lexie Grey perished from plane-crash injuries in the ABC medical drama's Season 8 finale, but the actress' series career is being reborn. She tackles another of TV's most popular professions — police detective — in the seriocomic "Taxi Brooklyn," which has its NBC premiere Wednesday, June 25.

"This is one of those opportunities that hardly ever comes up, unless you're Tom Cruise," the lively Leigh muses of the show, which is based on the "Taxi" series of action-comedy movies created by Luc Besson ("Taken").

"It's one of those things," Leigh explains, "where I got a call from my agent, who had gotten a call from (executive producer) Gary Scott Thompson, and he said they were pretty much offering me the role."

Leigh's Detective Cat Thompson finds an ally — not to mention a chauffeur — in Marseilles-born cabbie Leo (Jacky Ido, "Inglourious Basterds"). An international co-production like last summer's NBC series "Crossing Lines," the series also features crime-show veterans Ally Walker ("Profiler") and Jennifer Esposito ("Blue Bloods").

Since many of her characters have been on the order of quirky or offbeat, Leigh admits she was "a little nervous" going into her new role. "I was like, 'Wait. Have they seen what I've done? Are they sure?'"

"I think it was really the vulnerability that they saw. You can start with

somebody who's very tough, but I think it's harder to grab a raw, honest quality from that person than to take somebody who's vulnerable and add an edge to them. And with the kind of swagger Cat has, it's pretty sweet. It's a dream job for me, to be honest."

'The Last Ship' sails to save a dying world

Once, people feared the world would end in a mass conflagration followed by a nuclear winter and ultimate demise either from radiation poisoning or mass infertility.

At least that's what William Brinkley had in mind when he wrote his 1988 post-apocalyptic novel called "The Last Ship." Well, this is 2014, and we've got more things to worry about now, so when TNT premieres its 10-episode series adaptation of "The Last Ship" on Sunday, June 22, it's not nuclear war that devastates the world, but a mysterious plague.

Michael Bay ("Armageddon," "Pearl Harbor," "I Am Number Four") is executive producer, along with writers Hank Steinberg and Steven Kane (also, Jonathan Mostow directed the pilot).

Eric Dane ("Grey's Anatomy") stars as Commander Tom Chandler, the captain of the fictional

warship the USS Nathan James, which, after the pandemic hits, is carrying scientist Dr. Rachel Scott (Rhona Mitra) and her experiments, which may just yield a cure.

Also starring are Adam Baldwin ("Chuck," "Firefly") as second-in-command Mike Slattery; Charles Parnell as Hugh Jeter, the ship's master chief; and Travis Van Winkle as SEAL team leader Danny Green.

Joining them are Tracy Middendorf, Jocko Sims, Christina Elmore, Michaela McManus, Sam Spruell and Marissa Neitling.

But, despite the devastation of the world, the Nathan James is not alone on the seas, and on this day on the show's indoor sets in Manhattan Beach, Calif., a tense scene is being shot as the ship attends to slip away from an enemy vessel.

Other California locations include the decks of the USS Dewey, in port in San Diego (the USS Halsey, which was then in port, was used for the pilot); the former cruise liner RMS Queen Mary, berthed in Long Beach; and the USS Iowa museum ship, berthed at the Port of Los Angeles in San

Pedro (standing in for a Russian vessel).

Tucked into the tight quarters of the bridge set, Dane, Baldwin, Mitra and other cast members create palpable tension as they work to keep control during a dangerous maneuver.

"Maybe that's why I like this character so much," Mitra says

of the tough-minded Scott. "She rolls like a guy."

It's the combination of external peril and internal discipline that lies at the heart of "The Last Ship," filmed with the cooperation of the U.S. Navy.

"How do they hold it together?" asks Steinberg. "How do they preserve the hierarchy and the structure of a system that
