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Griffitts lays it on the line

Bay 'will not survive' without help, commission chairman says

PANAMA CITY - Warning that a lack of disaster relief funding from Tallahassee and Congress will have disastrous consequences, Bay County Commission Chairman Philip Griffitts laid it all on the table during a press conference Thursday to pressure state and federal lawmakers into action.

"Bay County, Panama City, Lynn Haven, Parker, Springfield, Callaway, Mexico Beach, will not survive without help," he said. "They will not survive. You cannot survive when your debris hauling bill is 10 times your budget."

Local communities were drowning, first in the millions of cubic yards of debris left behind by Hurricane Michael in October, now in the massive bills to clean it up. It's estimated the hurricane dropped more than a million trees in Panama City alone. For unincorporated Bay County, the debris hauling bill is about \$380 million, but factoring in the municipalities, Griffitts estimated the cost will end up being about \$750 million.

"That's just not feasible for a community this size," he said.

The county, he said, did a cost analysis, comparing the costs for Miami-Dade County in Hurricane Irma to Bay County's costs for Hurricane Michael. Based on their damage assessment, they found it would have cost each person in Miami-Dade \$130 to bail them out of hurricane

In Bay County, it would cost each person \$3,600.

"So if you all want to pony up \$3,600, we could get out of this real quick," he joked.

Griffitts said that while their local delegation is solid, Tallahassee seems uninterested in passing bills for disaster relief. He said Kionne McGhee, the Florida House

Study says average adult needs to lose 63 pounds

PANAMA CITY - Bay County adults would need to lose 63.3 pounds on average to reach healthy weights, a new study shows.

According to the two-year study, the county's obesity rates are higher than the state and national averages for men and women. The study results line up with federal and state obesity data compiled in recent years, indicating a

Trump catches officials off guard

President 'strongly looking' at releasing migrants in Dem cities just after White House, **DHS** reject notion

WASHINGTON -President Donald Trump said Friday he is strongly considering releasing "Illegal Immigrants" into Democratic strongholds to punish congressional foes for inaction on the border – just hours after

White House and Homeland Security officials insisted the idea had been rejected as fast as it had been proposed.

"Due to the fact that Democrats are unwilling to change our very dangerous immigration laws, we are indeed, as reported, giving strong considerations to placing Illegal Immigrants in Sanctuary Cities only," Trump tweeted. He added that, "The Radical Left always seems to have an Open Borders, Open Arms

policy - so this should make them very happy!"

The reversal, which appeared to catch officials at the Department of Homeland Security off guard, came as critics were blasting Trump for the supposedly-rejected idea, accusing him of turning migrants into pawns to go after his political opponents. It comes as Trump has grown increasingly exasperated by a surge of Central American migrant families crossing the southern border and is looking for new ways to pressure congressional Democrats to change laws that he insists are making the problem

Indeed, last week Trump urged his soon-to-be acting Homeland Security Secretary Kevin McAleenan to seal the southern border and told McAleenan he would pardon him if he were to find himself in trouble for blocking legal asylum-seekers, according to two people familiar with the conversation who spoke on condition of anonymity to describe a private exchange.

It was not clear whether the president was joking, and a Homeland Security spokesman said in a statement: "At no time has the president indicated,

asked, directed or pressured the acting secretary to do anything illegal. "The reported conversation came during the president's trip last week to Calexico, California, a day after he announced he was delaying his threat to close the border because Mexico appeared to be stepping up its enforcement efforts.

Before Trump's tweets on Friday, both the Department of Homeland Security and a White House official had insisted in nearly identical statements that the sanctuary-cities plan had been floated but then flatly rejected.

But not, apparently, by the president, who emphatically revived the idea.

Asked about it by reporters, he said he was "strongly looking at" releasing migrant families into those communities.

"They're always saying they have open arms. Let's see if they have open arms," he said.

There were no indications, however, that officials were taking any steps to move forward with the idea or considered the president's words anything more than bluster.

"Sanctuary cities" are places where local authorities do not cooperate with Immigration and Customs Enforcement officials, denying information or resources that would help ICE round up for deportation people living in the country illegally.

"I don't believe the other 49 states really care about hurricane relief," he said.

growing trend of unhealthy lifestyles. It's an issue area health experts are trying to address with education and better access to healthier foods.

"It's a concern, our numbers are a little higher than the state numbers," Marsha Sumner, diabetes service program manager for the Bay County Health Department, said of obesity rates. "From the state level, it's something that's worked on and then the counties tailor those programs to fit their needs."

The study recently was unveiled by DietSpotlight, a 10-year-old nutrition and weight-loss content website that has more than 30 million visitors annually. The study identifies rates and trends in body mass index or BMI, activity level and preferred diet programs over time and shows how these correlate to gender and age. BMI is a way to determine if a person is at a healthy weight by measuring his or her weight and

The study identifies rates and trends in BMI (body mass index), activity level and preferred diet programs (keto, Atkins, etc.) over time and shows how these correlate to gender, age and even specific neighborhoods in Bay County.

The study shows that men in the county have an average BMI of 31.5, while women have an average BMI of 31. A BMI between 25 and 29.9 is considered overweight and a BMI of 30 or more is considered obese.

The study also states that to reach a normal weight, adults in the county would have to lose an average of 63.3 pounds – an amount

14 percent higher than the state average and 7 percent higher than the U.S. average.

The study is in keeping with older data on the topic.

State statistics provided by the health department show that in 2016, 30.5 percent of the county's adult population was obese, while another 35.7 percent was overweight. Those same statistics show that statewide, the obesity rate for adults is 27.4 percent.

Brittany Loriquet, a registered dietitian and clinical nutrition manager at Gulf Coast Regional Medical Center, said she has observed the area's weight issues for years.

"Actually, prior to this job I worked at a weight loss clinic ... obesity is a significant problem in the area," Loriquet said. "It's something we see in the area and at the hospital."

Sumner said being obese can lead to serious health complications.

"Obesity is the No. 1 risk factor for pre-diabetes and a major risk factor for type 2 diabetes," Sumner said. "It's a major contributor to cardiovascular disease and kidney disease."

To improve residents' health, the department offers a diabetes prevention program and a diabetes self-management program. Under the prevention program, the department uses federally approved, evidence-based education to teach residents what they can do to reduce their weight and their risk of developing diabetes.

"They learn about healthy nutrition, portion control and how to incorporate physical activity in their daily routine," Sumner said.

A person must have type 2 diabetes and an order from a physician

to participate in the selfmanagement program. Sumner said registered nurses and dietitians help teach people how to live better with their diabetes.

This year, the health department has reopened its farmers market, providing fresh fruit and vegetables daily to also address the county's weight issues. The market is open from 8 a.m. to noon Monday through Friday, in front of the department.

Heather Kretzer, spokeswoman for the department, said the area has too few options for healthy foods for low-income residents, especially after Hurricane Michael.

"The goal is for people to eat three fruits and vegetables a day and if you make access to those more convenient, people are more likely to do that," Kretzer said.

Kretzer noted that expectant mothers and mothers with children under 5 years old in the state's Women, Infants and Children program can get money to help them buy food at the market.

Loriquet said while weight loss and nutrition programs are best tailored to each patient, in general, the best way to reduce weight is with a combination of exercise and a proper diet. Exercise alone doesn't work too well for people who regularly overeat, she said.

"It's hard to outrun our calories," Loriquet said.

Loriquet added that people tend to be more successful at losing weight when they do it with family or friends.

"And we try to remind people that they don't have to lose a large amount of weight to improve their health," Loriquet said. "A 250-pound person can really benefit from losing even just 25 pounds."

100 days of wins, stumbles

House Dems take stock of new era

WASHINGTON - Newly elected Rep. Sharice Davids is most proud of setting up a congressional office in part of her Kansas district she said hadn't seen one for years. For Georgia Rep. Lucy McBath, her biggest victory was passing the gun background checks legislation she advocated for after her son's shooting death. And for New York Rep. Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez, her top achievement was the introduction of the landmark Green New Deal.

As the Democratic freshmen lawmakers round the first 100 days of their new majority in the House, they're taking stock of their accomplishments, noting the stumbles and marking their place as a front line of resistance to President Donald Trump.

"When I came here, I said the days of business as usual in the Congress are done, and I think that's what we've seen," said Rep. Lauren Underwood, D-Ill., a nurse and former Obama administration official, who took over a GOP-held seat in the Chicago suburbs.

The first 100 days is often a milestone for a new Congress - an automatic, if arbitrary, moment to assess the workings of the legislative branch. This year, it's even more noteworthy because of the historic nature of the freshmen class. It is two-thirds Democrat, with

more women than men on that side of the aisle. It's also the most diverse ever, with many newbies swept into office in a blue wave that followed two years of Trump.

House Democrats set out an ambitious agenda with legislation on the kitchen table priorities that helped them win the majority – protecting the Affordable Care Act, imposing new ethics rules while engaging in aggressive oversight of the Trump administration. Their investigations extend well beyond special counsel Robert Mueller's probe into Russian interference in the 2016 election as they dig into the president's business dealings and push for Trump's tax returns.

But with the spotlight comes high-profile setbacks. Democrats splintered over Ocasio-Cortez's climate change proposal and exposed party divisions over Israel's treatment of Palestinians. One new lawmaker, Rashida Tlaib of Michigan, stunned some when, on Day One, she told supporters - using an expletive – that the new majority would impeach Trump.

Moreover, few of their bills will ever be signed into law. In fact, most are simply resolutions that are being panned by the Senate, where Majority Leader Mitch McConnell is providing backstop with his Republican majority to keep the measures from ever making it to Trump's desk.

McConnell said Pelosi's challenges resemble those Republicans have keeping their right flank in line. "I was almost tempted to call up my friend the speaker and say, 'Congratulations, you've got a Freedom Caucus on your hands," he told reporters Thursday, referring to the House's conservative group.

House Republicans gathered on the Capitol steps for their own 100-day event, ridiculing the new majority for catering to the liberal left and failing to keep their campaign promises.

"I have one question for the Democrats after their first 100 days: What have you accomplished?" Minority Leader Kevin McCarthy, R-Calif., said on Wednesday. "Name me one problem you have solved."


Another Republican, Minority Whip Steve Scalise of Louisiana, warned that Democrats are veering toward socialism. As he did, a passerby among the crowds of tourists outside the Capitol shouted, "I stand with Ilhan!" - a reference to outspoken freshman Rep. Ilhan Omar of Minnesota.

Democrats know they face challenges ahead, not only in avoiding the internal divisions that stymied House Republicans when they were in power but also in delivering on their campaign promises.

"For me personally, the biggest frustration has been that we're working on a lot of different things. But if you're just looking at the media, the narrative is not showing that," said freshman Democratic Rep. Katie Hill of California. "It makes it seem like all we're focusing on is the president and responding to whatever tweet of the day or the investigation and so on, but we're actually working on the issues that we were elected to do."

SALT LAKE CITY Man angry about virginity pleads guilty to threats

A man has pleaded guilty to a felony terroristic threat charge after authorities said he threating to target women in a mass shooting because he couldn't get a girlfriend.

Utah prosecutor Chad Grunander tells the Deseret News that 27-year-old Christopher W. Cleary of Denver was in court on Thursday.

Police said Cleary wrote on Facebook he was planning to become a mass shooter because he was still a virgin and wanted to kill as many women as possible. He was arrested during a trip to Provo, Utah, on Jan. 19, the same day women's marches were held. Colorado authorities have said he was on probation after stalking and threatening women there.

ATMORE, ALA. Alabama inmate who wanted nitrogen spared lethal injection

An Alabama inmate convicted in the 1991 swordand-dagger slaying of a pastor was spared a lethal injection when his death warrant expired before a divided U.S. Supreme Court voted early Friday to let the execution proceed.

A federal judge on Thursday blocked the execution of Christopher Lee Price to weigh his challenge to Alabama's lethal injection procedure.

Justices voted 5-4 early Friday morning to let the execution proceed, but the death warrant had expired two hours earlier at the stroke of midnight.

Alabama is expected to seek a new execution date from a state court.

MADRID **Venezuela's ex-spy chief** arrested on US warrant

Venezuela's longtime spy chief was arrested Friday in Madrid by Spanish police acting on a United States warrant for allegedly trafficking tons of cocaine.

Maj. Gen. Hugo Carvajal, who for more than a decade advised late Venezuelan leader Hugo Chávez and headed the country's security apparatus, recently became the most influential military figure to declare his loyalty to opposition leader Juan Guaido.

The opposition saw Carvajal's criticism of Venezuela's current government as a possible stimulus to prod other military figures to defect, but the country's armed forces have remained largely loyal to current President Nicolas Maduro.

HELSINKI Finns to vote on how best to save their welfare state

Finns will be voting Sunday in a parliamentary election shaped by debates on how best to preserve their generous welfare model despite having one of the world's most rapidly aging populations.

And in this Nordic nation, which has one-third of its territory above the Arctic Circle, anxieties over climate change are emerging more than ever.

In many respects, the choices facing Finland's 4.5 million eligible voters reflect trends seen across Europe: a populist anti-immigrant, euroskeptic party is rising in opinion polls, while traditional political parties have lost ground. In Finland, the nationalist Finns Party is polling in second place.

OKLAHOMA CITY Oklahoma governor tries 'Ninja Warrior' course

Oklahoma's new Republican Gov. Kevin Stitt is taking a shot at the "American Ninja Warrior" obstacle course outside the state Capitol in Oklahoma City. Organizers of the reality television show that features high-level athletes racing through grueling obstacles say the 47-year-old ex-CEO is the first governor to give the course a try.

Stitt bloodied his elbow completing a rope swing to a landing pad after jumping across a pool of water. A spokeswoman says he finished two of the three obstacles. Filming for the show will continue Friday and Saturday night for the NBC program's 11th season.

Buttigieg, once cordial, now critical of Pence

WASHINGTON - On the campaign trail, Democratic presidential contender Pete Buttigieg blasts Vice President Mike Pence's cultural and religious conservatism. But as the mayor of Indiana's fourth largest city, his tone toward the state's Republican former governor was more muted.

During the four years in which they overlapped in Indiana politics, Buttigieg, the South Bend mayor, had a cordial relationship with Pence. The two collaborated on economic development issues. Buttigieg presented Pence with a South Bend promotional T-shirt that said "I (heart) SB." And at ceremonial events, Pence would lavish Buttigieg with praise.

The relationship between the two men has come under scrutiny as Buttigieg's campaign becomes a surprise hit, raking in \$7 million during the first quarter. As he formally launches his White House campaign on Sunday, the gay mayor has emerged as a celebrated voice for LGBT equality and religious tolerance. And Buttigieg has hardened his rhetoric toward Pence, using President Donald Trump's vice president as a foil representing an oppressive opposition.

At a recent LGBT event, Buttigieg spoke of the importance of his marriage to his husband, Chasten, and framed his sexuality in religious terms.

"If me being gay was a choice, it was a choice that was made far, far above my pay grade," Buttigieg said.

"And that's the thing I wish the Mike Pences of the world would understand: that if you've got a problem with who I am, your problem is not with me. Your quarrel, sir, is with my creator."

He has previously called Pence's religious conservatism a "fanatical" ideology.

By Buttigieg's own admission in his campaign memoir, his relationship with Pence is "complicated." In an interview with CNBC that aired on Thursday, Pence said they had a "great working relationship" and criticized the mayor's characterization of his religious beliefs.

"He knows better," Pence said. "He knows me."

The complex dynamic between Buttigieg and Pence reflects a connection born of political necessity between two men on the cusp of unlikely political and personal paths. And to some fellow Indiana Democrats, it was frustrating.

In a state with few influential Democrats, some hoped to tap into Buttigieg's burgeoning political celebrity to

help them rebut Pence and his policies, according to two party strategists who spoke on the condition of anonymity to discuss a sensitive internal debate. But they found he was often reluctant to take on the then-governor directly or forcefully.

In early 2015, Pence was grappling with an HIV outbreak in southern Indiana and facing calls from political leaders, including some fellow Republicans, to respond by approving a needle exchange program. Buttigieg, who was months away from publicly coming out as gay, was largely absent from that debate.

Pence caused a national uproar that year by signing a "religious freedom" law criticized as anti-LGBT. Republicans including the mayor of Indianapolis demanded that the governor and the GOP legislature "fix this law" and "do so immediately." Buttigieg criticized Statehouse politicians for the "most embarrassing incident" and tweeted he was "disappointed" Pence signed the bill.

Judges reject Afghanistan probe, cite lack of cooperation

BRUSSELS - In a decision decried as "deeply flawed" and a "devastating blow for victims," International Criminal Court judges on Friday rejected a request by the court's prosecutor to open an investigation into war crimes and crimes against humanity in Afghanistan and alleged crimes by U.S. forces linked to the conflict.

In a lengthy written ruling, judges said an investigation "would not serve the interests of justice" because an investigation and prosecution were unlikely to be successful, as those targeted, including the United States, Afghan authorities and the Taliban, are not expected to cooperate, the court said in a statement.

Human Rights Watch slammed the ruling, calling it "a devastating blow for victims who have suffered grave crimes without redress."

In a statement released by the White House, the Trump administration hailed the decision not to investigate U.S. personnel as "a major international victory, not only for these patriots, but for the rule of law."

The ICC decision does acknowledge that the November 2017 request from Prosecutor Fatou Bensouda to open a probe "establishes a reasonable basis to consider that crimes within the ICC jurisdiction have been committed in Afghanistan and that potential cases would be admissible before the Court."

In a written reaction, the court's prosecution office said it "will further analyze the decision and its implications, and consider all available legal remedies."

The decision comes a month after U.S. Secretary of State Mike Pompeo said Washington

would revoke or deny visas to ICC staff seeking to investigate alleged war crimes and other abuses committed by U.S. forces in Afghanistan or elsewhere.

Bensouda's U.S. visa already has been revoked.

In a written statement, U.S. Secretary of State Mike Pompeo pointed out that the rejection followed those measures: "I am glad the Court reconsidered its actions."

Rights groups were not.

Patrick Baudouin, president of the International Federation for Human Rights, called the rejection a "dark day for justice" and a "shocking decision, which is based on a deeply flawed reasoning."

Bensouda's request to open an investigation said there is information that members of the U.S. military and intelligence agencies "committed acts of torture, cruel treatment, outrages upon personal dignity, rape and sexual violence against conflict-related detainees in Afghanistan and other locations, principally in the 2003-2004 period."

She also said that the Taliban and other insurgent groups have killed more than 17,000 civilians since 2009, including some 7,000 targeted killings.

She alleged that Afghan security forces have tortured prisoners at government detention centers.

Sima Samar, the chair of Afghanistan's Independent **Human Rights Commission** who lobbied strongly for the investigation, said the decision was a disappointment for

In a phone interview from Kabul, she told The Associated Press that it risks emboldening the perpetrators of crimes in Afghanistan, who were "at least a little fearful" of facing justice.

Let's not make democratic rule harder

he Michigan state
Board of Education
this week considered new standards
for teaching social studies in public schools.

One of the most hotly debated issues before the board, according to The New York Times, is whether the state curriculum will describe the American form of government as a democracy or a republic.

Unsurprisingly, liberals, who tend to be Democrats, prefer the term democracy — while conservatives, who tend to be Republicans, advocate for republic, notes the Times.

Both sides have a point. The Founding Fathers understood republicanism as majority rule based on the people's input and consent, but with power exercised through their elected representatives - as opposed to democracy's majority rule by the people through a direct vote. Yet we utilize both. Lawmakers elected by us at the local, state and federal levels fashion, implement and oversee policy; yet occasionally in state and local elections we vote directly on measures they will implement.

Currently, the Legislature is considering a change that will make the latter more difficult.

At issue is a measure that would boost the threshold of voter support needed to enact proposed state constitutional amendments from 60% to 66 1/3%.

We understand the argument that the Constitution should remain relatively rigid and difficult to amend, so as not to be in a repetitive state of flux caused by the voters' capricious whim and easily inflamed passions.

But this change is unnecessary and hurtful to the public's chance to redirect government when citizens believe their leaders are an impediment to good policy.

We've been down this road before. In 2006 voters adopted an amendment to increase the level of support for constitutional changes from a simple majority to a 60% supermajority. Since that proposal took effect in the 2008 election, voters have considered 44 constitutional amendments, approving 27, or 61%, according to a Senate staff analysis of the bill.

Lately, though, the Florida Constitution has proven significantly more malleable. The report notes that in the last two election cycles, voters have backed 15 of 17 proposed amendments, or 88%.

Floridians, unless prodded by the very people who now want to make democracy tougher, do not have a large appetite for altering the Constitution. Meanwhile, the barriers to even ask for such changes are formidable. To get on the ballot, a proposed amendment requires nearly 800,000 signatures, coming from at least 14 of Florida's 27 congressional districts, and approval by the state Supreme Court.

Doesn't sound so easy to us.

Lawmakers, especially Republicans, ought not make it harder for Floridians to practice democracy when they have the opportunity. But if legislators are really worried about change occurring too frequently, they should simply quit


asking us to vote on it.

Chevron acquires Anadarko for \$33 billion

Chevron is buying Anadarko Petroleum for \$33 billion, energizing its oil and gas drilling capabilities in Texas and the Gulf of Mexico while vaulting itself into a new league.

The combined company will remain far behind Exxon Mobil Corp. and Royal Dutch Shell Plc. in market capitalization, but Chevron will jump from being the world's fourth biggest energy producer, to second, according to Wood Mackenzie.

The cash-and-stock deal announced Friday comes as U.S. crude prices have shot up 40 percent this year.

NEW YORK Disney's streaming plans boost company's shares

Walt Disney shares are rocketing to an all-time high in early trading after the company moved aggressively into the streaming arena.

The Disney Plus video steaming is being released in tandem with a blockbuster lineup of films coming out this year, including Aladdin, Toy Story 4, The Lion King, Frozen 2 and Star Wars: Episode IX.

Shares in The Walt Disney Co. hit \$129.85 at the opening bell Friday, up 13 percent.

Disney Plus will roll out in the U.S. on November 12 at a price of \$6.99 per month, well below the \$13 monthly fee charged by Netflix.

NEW YORK JPMorgan's 1Q profits helped by higher rates

JPMorgan Chase's first-quarter profits rose 5 percent from a year earlier, helped largely by higher interest rates, which have allowed banks like IPMorgan to charge more for loans. Higher interest rates helped make up for a drop in trading revenue.

The nation's largest bank by assets and profits said Friday that it earned \$9.18 billion, or \$2.65 per share. That's up from \$8.71 billion, or \$2.37 per share, in the same period a year ago.

'I had money and I couldn't pay'

As cashless stores grow, so does the backlash

NEW YORK - Hembert Figueroa just wanted a taco.

So he was surprised to learn the dollar bills in his pocket were no good at Dos Toros Taqueria in Manhattan, one of a small but growing number of establishments across the U.S. where customers can only pay by card or smartphone.

Cash-free stores are generating a backlash among some activists and liberalleaning policymakers who say the practice discriminates against people like Figueroa, who either lack bank accounts or rely on cash for many transactions.

Figueroa, an ironworker, had to stand to the side, holding his taco, until a sympathetic cashier helped him find another customer willing to pay for his meal with a card in exchange for cash.

"I had money and I couldn't pay," he said.

The issue got some high-profile attention this week when retail giant Amazon bowed to pressure from activists and agreed to accept cash at more than 30 cashless stores, including its Amazon Go convenience stores, which have no cashiers, and its book shops. Amazon declined to say when the change would happen.

There is no federal law that requires stores to accept cash, so lawmakers are working on the issue at the state and city

level. Earlier this year, Philadelphia became the first city to ban cashless stores, despite efforts by Amazon to dissuade it. New Jersey passed a statewide ban soon after, and a similar ban is working its way through the New York City Council. Before this year there was only one jurisdiction that required businesses to accept cash:

Massachusetts, which passed a law nearly 40 years ago.

"The potential societal cost of a cashless economy I think outweighs the potential benefits for businesses," said Ritchie Torres, a New York City councilman for the South Bronx who introduced the bill.

Policymakers argue that while cashless enterprises aren't widespread now, the practice could expand to more services, including some that cater to lowerincome people.

Walmart-owned Sam's Club opened its first cashierless store in Dallas last year, using technology that allows customers to scan and pay for items with their smartphones. Kroger has installed similar technology in about 400 stores nationwide.

Stadiums in Tampa Bay, Florida, and Atlanta have started to go cashless, or nearly cashless, and the Barclays Center, where the Brooklyn Nets play, is now effectively cashless as well.

FCC to hold big 5G auction

NEW YORK - The U.S. government will hold a massive auction to bolster 5G service , the next generation of mobile networks, and plans to spend \$20 billion to expand broadband access in rural areas.

5G will mean faster wireless speeds and has implications for technologies like self-driving cars and augmented reality. The rollout started last week in the U.S. and South Korea but will take years.

The Federal Communications Commission said Friday that it would hold the largest auction in U.S. history to boost wireless companies' networks.

"Our goal is to maintain American leadership in 5G technology," said FCC Chairman Ajit Pai Friday on a call with reporters.

The U.S. is jockeying for position with China over 5G. It has effectively banned Chinese telecom equipment maker Huawei from most U.S. networks due to concerns that it might enable Chinese government spying, which the Huawei denies. The U.S. has pushed its allies to do the same, with mixed results. Huawei is the world's largest maker of such equipment.

FCC Commissioner Jessica Rosenworcel, a Democrat, criticized the agency's approach to 5G Friday. She said the U.S. has not auctioned off "midband" spectrum that is better suited to serve rural areas because of how far it can carry signals, and that the Trump administration's actions on 5G have "set us back." She cited tariffs on telecom equipment that have raised costs and said the administration has been "alienating allies" on the 5G security issue.

The FCC also said Friday that it will be "repurposing" funds from existing subsidy programs to provide \$20.4 billion, over a decade, to internet providers, with the goal of connecting up to 4 million rural homes and small businesses to high-speed internet.

PANAMA CITY - Since October, Jamie Williamson has been at the forefront of coordinating donations from her community, WaterColor, to Cedar Grove Elementary School.

"I was involved with the hurricane relief effort from the beginning, as soon as I was able to come back to WaterColor, to our home. We felt almost guilty that we were safe and people so close to us were not," Williamson said. "Many of us immediately started to get involved in hurricane relief efforts. 

"They need help taking the garbage out and all of that." volunteer Colby Redd said. "Some kids are very funny. They hang out with (us). At one autism classroom we go to, this one kid says 'hello big friends!"

Students at Chautauqua are taught to apply life skills into the world by regularly attending lessons and volunteering throughout the county. The school emphasizes that through service, students are being prepared for the world as the world

prepares for them. "I want them to have a chance and I want them to feel like they are valued. I want them to have self-worth and I want them to feel they can accomplish whatever they want to accomplish," said Wojnowski, who began her education career in Exceptional Student Education (ESE). but actually read to learn," Principal Sheila Wojnowski said in agreement.

Williamson was connected to Cedar Grove Elementary School, a Title 1 school that recently absorbed Springfield Elementary after its campus sustained devastating damage from the storm.

"They were concerned about those teachers from Springfield and they came over with supplies - it was just unbelievable. We were taking carloads and carloads of items because those teachers came with nothing," she continued.

Chairs, whiteboards, books and more. Plus, the book club, now on its sixth visit to the school, has developed a sweet relationship with many of the students who look forward to each visit from the group.

Though Williamson's professional background was working in higher education, her commitment to the elementary school is as strong and simple as ever; to give disadvantaged students a fighting chance at a successful future.

"I believe education is the great equalizer and I have been particularly concerned about students who were first generation college who came from families who had economic need," Williamson said. "A child should not have their future defined for them because of whatever ZIP code they grew up in.

House passes bill on access to Canadian drugs

TALLAHASSEE - Floridians eventually could gain access to cheaper Canadian prescription drugs under legislation passed Thursday by the state House, a top priority of Republican Gov. Ron DeSantis.

The GOP-led House voted 93-22 on Thursday for the measure, which if finalized creates a prescription drug importation program that would have to be approved by the federal Food and Drug Administration. A similar bill is moving in the state Senate and the two versions must be reconciled to win final passage.

"The United States pays more for prescription drugs than anywhere else in the world," DeSantis said in a statement. "In Florida, we can change that by employing safe, common sense solutions such as importing FDA-approved prescription drugs from Canada."

The chief sponsor, Republican Rep. Tom Leek of Daytona Beach, said the measure would give Floridians an opportunity to pay less for vital prescription drugs. U.S. consumers pay some of the highest prescription drug prices in the world, as much as 30 percent to 190 percent more than other Western countries, according to a

legislative staff analysis.

The U.S. spends about \$333 billion annually on prescription drugs, or about \$10,739 per person, according to the analysis.

"We have an opportunity today to give Floridians a fighting chance," Leek said. "I hope you can support them."

Leek said imported drugs would have to meet strict FDA standards and has noted that 80 percent of drug ingredients used in the U.S. are foreign-made now. The House bill goes further than the Senate version in opening the door to potentially importing drugs from other countries in addition to Canada.

Opponents warn of risky counterfeit, contaminated, or ineffective drugs and that the program could prove costly to oversee and regulate. A number of medical groups and the pharmaceutical industry are among the leading opponents.

Democratic Rep. Al Jacquet of Tallahassee urged lawmakers to slow down.

"The concept of making sure medication is cheaper is a good one. We have to tailor it in a way that is responsible. We're not ready for this yet," he said. "It's not the time to be going this big, or this far."

There also are questions about whether Canada would permit its lower-cost drugs to be sold in the U.S. and how much a new regulatory framework for foreign drugs might cost Florida taxpayers.

The bill actually would create two programs: one for state-funded entities such as Medicaid and the prison system and another in which the imported drugs would be sold directly to consumers through pharmacies. The second program faces more federal government hurdles in order to become law.

Vermont last year became the first state to enact a prescription-drug importation law, but it has not yet submitted an application to the federal health agency.



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
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Families of massacre victims criticize notification process

SUNRISE - Families whose loved ones died in last year's high school massacre told a state commission Wednesday they waited hours, often alone in aroom, before being told of the death in a process that seemed chaotic and lacking empathy.

Parents of students Luke Hoyer, Gina Montalto and Jaime Guttenberg and the wife of athletic director Chris Hixon told the Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School Public Safety Commission stories whose details differed but carried the thread that the Broward Sheriff's Office had no apparent protocol

for notifying families of a mass tragedy, which led to confusion in the hours after the Feb. 14, 2018, shooting that left 17 dead and 17 wounded.

Their testimony came as 22 victims and families sued the sheriff's office, the Broward County school district, two security officers and a mental health provider for not preventing the shooting.

At the commission hearing, the families spent more than an hour reliving the fear, frustration, grief and eventual anger they felt about the notification process. They said they were not blaming any of the sheriff's deputies and others who had to deal with the crush of anxious

parents crammed into area hospitals and a Marriott Hotel near the school, where families were mostly directed after the shooting. Those low-level employees were failed by a lack of leadership, they said.

The 15 commissioners, who include two victims' fathers and several law enforcement executives, wanted to hear from the relatives so they can make recommendations on how police agencies should notify families after mass shootings.

"Families became last on this list of what needed to be dealt with," said Fred Guttenberg, the father of 14-year-old Jaime. "Whatever gets decided needs to start with families first."

Debbie Hixon, a teacher at another school, said she learned of the shooting about 15 minutes after it ended. She immediately called her husband's cellphone, which was answered by Marjory Stoneman Douglas officials who wouldn't tell her anything, though her husband was dead. A district administrator eventually called, saying her husband was shot but to go to the Marriott for more information. There, she eventually was placed into a room alone, feeling forgotten. She then received text messages offering condolences - her husband's death had been posted on social media before she was told.

"I threw my phone across the room," Hixon said. "It is not how I should have found out."

Tony Montalto said he and his wife, Jennifer, were put in a glass-enclosed hospital office, knowing that likely meant their 14-yearold daughter was dead. When they were told, others outside could see their grief and despite their condition, no one offered them a ride home or walked them to their

The commission's law enforcement members said standard procedure is not to tell family members anything until the dead are positively identified. They asked whether families should be given preliminary information, even if that meant officers

The sheriff's office did not respond to an email seeking comment. It is scheduled to respond at the commission's next meeting in June.

Meanwhile, some slain students' parents and wounded students filed lawsuits Wednesday, alleging the school board and sheriff's office promised a financial settlement but secretly worked to prevent a deal.

"It's a daily struggle. They are not the people they were before Feb. 14,"

Lisa Olson, whose son, William, was shot in each arm, said at a news conference. "My son didn't go to school today. He couldn't and we have many days like that now."

Immediately after the shooting, families were approached by the sheriff's office and school board representatives "who said all the right things. They wanted to be a part of the solution... They wanted to help bring justice. We took them at their word," said Todd Michaels, attorney for the family of Joaquin Oliver, who was killed.

Instead, the agencies lobbied the Florida Legislature to stop the resolution, Michaels said.

Mitch Dworet, who lost one son in the shooting while another was injured, said he wants someone held accountable.

Bill expanding armed teacher program goes to Senate

TALLAHASSEE -Florida senators agreed a school safety bill has many good provisions, but were divided on one issue Thursday as they voted to send it to the chamber floor: expanding a program that allows teachers to carry

The Senate Appropriations Committee voted 11-9 for a bill to revise a school safety law enacted last year after 17 people were fatally shot at a Parkland high school in February 2018. Repeatedly in the more than three hours of discussion, Democrats and Republicans praised portions of the bill, including provisions to

require schools to report all violent incidents, an increased focus on properly assessing and responding to potentially threatening behavior and requiring schools to promote suspicious activity reporting tools.

"Overall, I think this is a really good bill," said Democratic Sen. Bill Montford, a former Leon County school superintendent. "The piece that I can't embrace is ... the idea that more guns on campus makes it safer. I can't get there at this point."

Montford said during his time as a school administrator, he saw tense situations where hundreds of students were gathered and about to become violent, adding, "Quite frankly, if I was in that position today, I would not want a teacher with a gun."

The sticking point for the committee's Democrats and one Miami Republican was expanding the so-called guardian program that allows teachers to carry guns. Right now, teachers are only eligible for the voluntary program if they serve in another role at school, such as an athletic coach or directing an extracurricular activity. School districts have to approve the program and teachers have to be trained by a sheriff's office and undergo psychiatric evaluation. The bill would make all teachers eligible for the program regardless of whether the serve a role outside the classroom.

PANAMA CITY Police find naked child in parking lot; couple arrested





An Ohio couple was charged with child neglect and possession of methamphetamine after Panama City police reportedly found one of their children wandering naked around an IHOP parking lot.

Police officers found the child in the parking lot of the 23rd Street IHOP early Friday, according to a news release.

"Employees arriving for work noticed the child and wrapped him in an apron. They then noticed a van in the parking lot with two adults passed out and they were unable to wake them," the release stated.

"Upon arrival, officers located Jordyn Freeman, 24, and Randy McMillin, 27. of West Portsmouth, Ohio. Both were under the influence of narcotics and narcotics were observed in plain view inside the vehicle."

Nine-month-old twins also were found in the van, one of which was covered with blankets and pillows and wasn't found until officers were searching the vehicle. Freeman is the mother and engaged to McMillin, who is not a parent.

"The children had no apparent major medical issues, but both twins were wet and dirty from soiled diapers and the 21 month old was dirty and naked," the release stated. "Officers on scene cared for the children by changing diapers, dressing them in cleaner clothes and feeding them until DCF arrived to take custody of them."

Freeman and McMillin also were charged with possession of drug paraphernalia.

FLOMATON, ALA. Series of weak earthquakes hits South Alabama

A series of small earthquakes hit South Alabama within hours of each other near the Florida line on Thursday.

The U.S. Geological Survey said a magnitude 2.6 earthquake was recorded about 8 miles northwest of Flomaton about 11 p.m. Thursday. There were no damage reports.

The Geological Survey said a stronger earthquake with a magnitude of 2.8 hit nearby Thursday afternoon, and a magnitude 2.5 quake occurred a few hours earlier.

The cluster is about 45 miles north of Pensacola.

Several other earthquakes have been detected in the same area in recent weeks.

Government researchers are trying to determine whether the quakes are related to oil and gas operations in the area. The U.S. Geological Survey is working with its partners to deploy seismometers around the area.

SpaceX launches mega rocket, lands all 3 boosters

CAPE CANAVERAL -SpaceX launched its second supersized rocket and for the first time landed all three boosters Thursday, a year after sending up a sports car on the initial test flight.

The new and improved Falcon Heavy thundered into the early evening sky with a communication satellite called Arabsat, the rocket's first paying customer. The Falcon Heavy is the most powerful rocket in use today,

with 27 engines firing at liftoff nine per booster.

Eight minutes after liftoff, SpaceX landed two of the first-stage boosters back at Cape Canaveral, side by side, just like it did for the rocket's debut last year. The core booster landed two minutes later on an ocean platform hundreds of miles offshore. That's the only part of the first mission that missed.

"What an amazing day," a SpaceX flight commentator exclaimed. "Three for three boosters today on Falcon Heavy, what an amazing accomplishment."

The Falcon Heavy soared from NASA's Kennedy Space Center, using the same pad that shot Apollo astronauts to the moon a half-century ago and later space shuttle crews.

Nearby beaches and other prime viewing spots were packed with tourists and locals eager to catch not just the launch but the rare and dramatic return of twin boosters, accompanied by sonic booms. The roads also were jammed for Wednesday night's launch attempt, which was scuttled by high wind.

Because this was an upgraded version of the rocket with unproven changes, SpaceX chief Elon Musk cautioned in advance things might go wrong. But everything went exceedingly well and the satellite ended up in the proper orbit. SpaceX employees at company headquarters in Southern California cheered every launch milestone and especially the three touchdowns.

"The Falcons have landed," Musk said in a tweet that included pictures of all three boosters.

NASA offered swift congratulations.

"From our iconic launch pads at @NASAKennedy, we will continue to support the growing commercial space economy," NASA tweeted. Musk replied with three red

Musk put his own Tesla convertible on last year's demo. The red Roadster with a mannequin, dubbed Starman, likely still at the wheel - remains in a solar orbit stretching just past Mars.

Homecoming set for sailor killed at attack on Pearl Harbor

JACKSONVILLE - The Western Union telegram came on Dec. 21, 1941, two weeks after the attack on Pearl Harbor, confirming what Bessie Meyer already knew: Her son was gone.

"The Navy Department deeply regrets to inform you that your son Herbert Joseph Poindexter Jr Seaman First Class US Navy is missing following action in the performance of his duty and in the service of his country. The Department appreciates your great anxiety and will furnish you further information promptly."

In February, another telegram arrived: "After exhaustive search it has been

impossible to locate your son ... and he has therefore been officially declared to have lost his life."

Herbert Joseph Poindexter, better known as H.J., grew up poor in Jacksonville and went to Andrew Jackson High School. In 1936, in the depths of the Great Depression, the Navy seemed a good way out of poverty, so he joined and made his way to the Pacific

He was 24 when he died five years later, a barber on the battleship USS Oklahoma. He figured he would be at sea another couple of years, then move to Arizona, where he had a fiancée and a ranch on which he was making payments.

But war caught up with him on the morning of Dec. 7, 1941, when Japanese planes

torpedoed the Oklahoma, docked at Ford Island. The ship quickly capsized.

Poindexter and 428 other men from the ship were killed, among the more than 2,400 Americans who died in the attack on Hawaii.

Back in Jacksonville, Mayor John T. Alsop paid him tribute at a memorial service at Central Christian Church, as did a representative from Scout Troop No. 230, of which the sailor had been a member.

That might have provided some comfort to Poindexter's mother and his younger sisters, Lilyan and Helen. But they had no coffin to grieve by, no physical evidence of his passing.

H.J.'s body could not be identified among those recovered from the wreck.

Attorney: Mar-a-Lago infiltrator had hidden-camera detector

WEST PALM BEACH -A Chinese woman recently arrested at President Donald Trump's Mar-a-Lago club lied repeatedly to Secret Service agents while carrying computer malware unlike anything a government analyst had ever seen and had more than \$8,000 in cash at her hotel room, along with an electronic device that detects hidden cameras, federal authorities told a judge Monday.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Rolando Garcia told Magistrate Judge William Matthewman during a bond hearing that "there are a lot of questions that remain" about 32-year-old Yujing Zhang.

He said the FBI still is investigating whether Zhang is a spy.

Zhang was arrested March 30 after Secret Service agents said she lied to gain admission to the president's Palm Beach resort and was found to be carrying two Chinese passports, four cellphones, a laptop computer, an external hard drive and a thumb drive containing the malware.

Matthewman adjourned the hearing until Monday as Zhang's public defender said he's still gathering evidence that could justify her release on bail on charges of lying to federal agents and illegal entry to a restricted area. Garcia said he expects Zhang will be indicted by a federal grand jury on those charges.

Catholic missionaries evangelizing on campuses

THE CONVERSATION - More than 20 percent of all adults and more than a third of millennials in the United States are not affiliated with a religion. For at least a decade, this number has been on the rise.

Sexual abuse by clergy and a poor response by the church hierarchy has led many young Catholics to lose trust in their religious institution. Some 36 percent of those without religious affiliation report having grown up Catholic.

But countering this trend is a movement led by millennials who are devoted to bringing Catholicism back on college campuses with a modern flair.

Missionaries on campus

I have spent the past seven years researching these young adults. These millennials are Catholic, and being Catholic is more central to their identity than many of their peers.

These missionaries follow church teachings with an adherence more common with the baby

Generation. They attend worked to make Catholi-Mass every week, go to Confession frequently, memorize Latin prayers and are devoted to saints. As college campus missionaries, they spend their days inviting college students to be similarly committed to Catholicism.

Though a minority among the millennial-generation Catholics, they are part of a movement that has been running parallel to mainstream U.S. Catholicism for just more than 20

Known as the Fellowship of Catholic University Students, or FOCUS, the movement started in 1998 when two male and two female college graduates began working as Catholic missionaries at Benedictine College and the University of Northern Colorado. As students, they had seen the decline in Catholic practice among their peers and wanted to promote an attractive version of Catholicism.

Following the example of Protestant groups like Cru and Athletes in Action, FOCUS began holding Bible studies on campuses. They trained increasing numbers of missionaries to build friendships with college boomers and the Silent students. As missionaries cism look relevant to college students, FOCUS established itself as a religiously affiliated outreach program.

During the course of the next two decades, FOCUS grew rapidly. At first, it was through word of mouth between bishops and priests. Gradually, as more college students attended FOCUS events and began participating in Catholic ritual life, campus ministries on private, Catholic and public universities and campuses began to request a FOCUS team.

Who are these missionaries?

FOCUS partners with Catholic centers on campuses and recruits college students to become missionaries after graduation. Each missionary spends two years on a campus, working with students, promoting Catholicism. Many of the college students who missionaries reach out to describe themselves as "spiritual but not religious," or a "none."

The missionaries are much like any other middle-class young adult in the U.S.: They live on their buy pumpkin spice lattes and love March Madness. Some even have tattoos, often with quotes from

They go through much the same relationship issues as other young adults. I interviewed more than 50 missionaries about their experiences. Over cups of coffee or while jogging, they shared with me their struggles with depression and alcohol abuse. They also shared the pain of losing intimate friendships.

What sets them apart, however, is that unlike most other millennials, they find answers to life's struggles in being Catholic. And they want others to know that as well.

One missionary, for example, told me, "I have seen change in my life" since becoming more Catholic in college. Another said it was difficult for him to watch college students suffer with anxiety. "I just know," he told me, "their lives could be better with Catholicism."

They present Catholicism as relevant and "cool." I heard stories about missionaries hosting foam parties and black-

college campuses.

One missionary told me how she trained for a popular test of physical strength called a Tough Mudder with some college students. Another explained how he used games of pickup basketball to make friends with college students. They also planned gender-segregated camping trips and tailgate parties before sporting events.

In addition to these typical college campus events, these Catholics invited students to prayer, Bible study and to attend Mass.

Growth amid concerns

A media report from March 2018 described the fast growth of FOCUS in just two decades into an organization with 660 missionaries on 137 campuses. That year the organization was spread across 38 U.S. states and at four international locations. In my own work, I watched a campus program in the Midwest grow from nothing to a group of 20 students within the first

iPhones, drink craft beer, parties that are popular on called SEEK2019, some 17,000 Catholics, which included college students and other young adults, met in Indianapolis.

> But critics also have pointed out serious concerns with how FOCUS works. There is a lack of racial diversity among missionaries, who mostly belong to the white middle- and upper-class.

In informal conversations with campus ministers, I have heard concerns about a lack of formal pastoral training given to missionaries. FOCUS missionaries receive just four to six weeks of training during the summer. Their attention to making Catholicism attractive through friendship with "nones" and other college students also has made them inattentive to Catholicism's emphasis on social justice. On a large, public campus, I observed a program close down because of disagreements between the campus ministry and the FOCUS over how to best reach college students.

Nonetheless, at a time when young Catholics are moving away from their faith, the role of missionary organizations such as FOCUS is worth noticing.



Bad inning spells doom for Bay in 4-1 loss

PANAMA CITY - Bay had more hits and fewer errors than Walton during Friday night's District 1-5A contest, but it took just one bad inning from the Tornadoes to open the door for the Braves' 4-1 victory.

For the Tornadoes, it's an issue that has plagued them throughout most of the 2019 campaign.

"Man, it's been one inning

all season long," Bay coach Andrew Starr said. "We have one bad inning. The scary part is it isn't changing. It's alarming that we keep doing the same things. We have eight games left and there's not any improvement, which is kind of alarming. We've got three weeks to get it right and turn things around."

The loss dropped the Tornadoes to 5-11 overall and 3-2 in district play, with Walton improving to 9-7 and 3-2 in league play. Bay will wrap up its league schedule on April 17 against South Waltonwith the completion of a weathersuspended game, while the Braves end their district season against fourth-place Rutherford on April 24.

This was the second game between Bay and Walton in the past three days, with the Tornadoes taking a 9-1 victory in DeFuniak Springs on Wednesday, and with South Walton sitting at 4-1 in

Hamlin hoping for some hometown advantage

RICHMOND, Va. - Denny Hamlin would love to think he has an advantage when it comes to racing at Richmond Raceway.

The Joe Gibbs Racing star has won three times on the 0.75-mile, D-shaped oval and has been coming to the track for much of his life, even long before the Virginia racer became a driver in the Monster Energy NASCAR Cup Series.

"I don't know if there's any advantage for sure, but I certainly feel like I know what I need out of the car to be successful here," Hamlin said Friday. "Certainly this is kind of our wheelhouse for tracks you could say."

The Daytona 500 winner has plenty of reason to feel good heading into the weekend. He's already won twice this year, but his last victory at Richmond came in the fall of 2016. Teammate Kyle Busch swept both races last season, has already won three times this season and is trying to follow up a victory last weekend at Bristol.

Hamlin hopes familiarity can keep his solid start going.

"I've always loved coming to this race track. It is home. It's one that I've been to many, many times when I wasn't racing," he said. "It is certainly the home track for me but it's just exciting because I know that I could very well have a great weekend ahead of us, really focus a lot of my efforts on how can we go out there and dominate the race, not just win, but dominate. Really, that's been the focus for the last five days."

Teammate Martin Truex Jr. has been close to winning with second-place finishes at Atlanta and Phoenix, and said Busch is on the kind of role that makes him seem invincible. Besides his success in the Cup series, Busch has started four races in the Truck series and won them all, and won three of four Xfinity races.

"You look at a couple of races like last week. He even said he wasn't going to win the race and the next thing you know he's leading. They stay out and he's leading and he drives off into the sunset," Truex said.

"This sport is kind of cyclical. There's a lot of highs and lows, but once you get on a roll - I've been on teams where you just get on a roll and you can't do anything wrong. Then there's other times like for us this year, it doesn't seem like you can do

Tiger remains in striking distance

Talk about a Grand Slam leaderboard.

The record five co-leaders after Friday's second round of the 83rd Masters Tournament have all won at least one of the four major championships and one of them, Brooks Koepka, has three.

But only one of them -Adam Scott – has won the Masters.

Then there is one of the guys one shot off the lead 14-time major champion Tiger Woods, who has four

green jackets. "It must have happened at some point, but this is really stacked," Scott said when asked whether he'd ever seen such a star-studded leaderboard. "I think it's going to be an incredible weekend no matter what happens now."

Of the co-leaders, Koepka won the 2017 and 2018 U.S. Opens and 2018 PGA Championship; Francesco

Molinari is the defending British Open champion; Jason Day won the 2015 PGA Championship; and Scott won the 2013 Masters.

They head into the weekend as the largest group of leaders at the halfway mark in the history of the tournament. The previous record was four, in 1973.

With the exception of Scott, who is ranked 29th in the world, the co-leaders are all in the top 20. Koepka is No. 4, Molinari No. 7, Day No. 14 and Ooosthuizen is 19th.

Before a 29-minute weather delay starting at 5:05 p.m., Molinari set the standard at 7-under-par 137 after his 67. Day followed with his own 67, then came first-round co-leader Koepka with 71, Scott with 68 and Oosthuizen with 66.

Woods, playing in the second-to-last group, took advantage of the soft conditions after the delay to fire 68. He did miss a 7-foot birdie putt on No. 12 after the return, but reeled off


Kristina Warford then came up with an RBI sacrifice fly to allow Sisco to tag up and score from third for the go-ahead run.

birdies on Nos. 14 and 15. He just missed a 9-foot birdie putt on No. 17 and a 14-footer on No. 18.

Woods has plenty of company one shot off the lead. He's joined at 138 by Xander Schauffele (low round of the day with 65), Justin Harding (69) and Dustin Johnson (70).

"This is now three straight majors that I've been in the mix and so it's good stuff," said Woods, whose last major championship came in the 2008 U.S. Open.

Lost in the shuffle of the low scores was first-round co-leader Bryson DeChambeau, who followed his opening 66 with 75 and is four shots off the lead. Rory McIlroy, one of the pre-tournament favorites who opened with 73, came back with 71 and is seven shots behind.

Molinari once carried a bag in the Masters, and now he's carrying part of the weight of a 36-hole lead. In the 2006 Masters, he caddied for Edoardo, his older brother who had won the 2005 U.S. Amateur and played the first two rounds with Woods, the defending champion.

Now, Molinari is 36 holes away from winning his second major championship in eight months.

"It's a long, long way to go," he said. "We'll see what we have to do the weekend."

In 2006, he was "miles away" from the golfer he is today, Molinari said.

"I was only starting. It was the beginning of my second season as a pro," he said. "It was a good motivation to see how good the guys were and how much I needed to improve to here. The goal was to be here once. ... I have lots of

memories. Mostly the fact that I didn't really enjoy caddying. I love being here and I love caddying for my brother, but it was just so hard to give him clubs, and it seemed a bit of a nightmare, standing with the bag, waiting for him to hit the shots. It's not great fun to caddie around here."

This is the 18th Masters for Scott, but the first time he's ever been the leader after any round - except after the playoff he won in 2013.

Koepka, the only player in the field without a bogey in the first round, didn't keep that streak going for long Friday. He made double bogey on No. 2 after hitting his drive in the left woods. He played the rest of the way in 2-underpar fashion. With two U.S Opens wins on his résumé, Koepka knows how to grind out a victory.

"So there's no point in getting too excited on a Friday and wasting your energy or whatever it might be," Koepka said. "You've still got a lot of golf to play. So you've just got to hang in there."

When Day finished his round, he was tied for lead but predicted he'd be trailing after 36 holes. He was wrong after Scott, who had moved to 8-under for the tournament after an eagle on No. 15, bogeyed No. 16 and then parred in.

The bogey-par-par finish by Scott moved the cut line from 2-over 144 to 145, bringing nine more players into the weekend. A record 65 players will play the final 36 holes. The previous high, since the cut was instituted in

1957, was 62 in 1966. Since an odd number of players made the cut, the call to the Augusta National bullpen is expected to go out to a marker to fill out the first group pairing with Eddie Pepperell, who goes off at 9:05 a.m..

anything right. It's just the way it goes sometimes an just have to work through it all and keep pushing to try to find more speed all the time."

Busch admits that luck has been on his side at times this season, as well as momentum. If he can keep it going on Saturday night, he'd join three Hall of Famers – David Pearson (three, 1965-66), Richard Petty (seven, 1970-1973) and Bobby Allison (three, 1982-83) - as the only drivers to win three consecutive races on the track.

Such achievements, he said, are not his focus, but nonetheless special.

"If we can win three in a row here at Richmond and match names like that – the Godfathers of our sport that built our sport to what it is today would be pretty cool," he said.

So would keeping the momentum going. Busch has finished in the top 10 in each of his last 10 races.

"There's no question there's momentum. Absolutely," he said. "You can go through the whole beginning stretch of the season - we've had a really good stretch to the beginning of this season and unfortunately we're coming up to one of my most favorite race tracks in the world, Talladega, in a couple weeks, that can certainly end that momentum at any particular moment and knock you down off your pedestal or whatever you want to call it.

"Then you have to figure out how to rebound and get back. I think that's where our strength is and we've had some moments in some of these races that we've kind of been knocked off that we've been able to rebound and come back up through. Just treat it like anything else and focus forward,"

1963: Pete Rose of the Cincinnati Reds tripled off Pittsburgh's Bob Friend for his first major league hit.

1972: The first player strike in baseball

history ended.

1984: Montreal's Pete Rose got his 4,000th hit, a double off Philadelphia pitcher Jerry Koosman. The hit came exactly 21 years after his first hit. Rose would score on Tim Raines one out single, sliding into home to give Montreal a 4-1 lead in their eventual 5-1 victory.

1987: The San Diego Padres set a major league record when the first three batters in the bottom of the first inning hit homers off San Francisco starter Roger Mason in their home opener. The Padres, trailing 2-0, got homers from Marvell Wynne, Tony Gwynn and John Kruk.

1993: Lee Smith became the all-time saves leader as the St. Louis Cardinals beat the Los Angeles Dodgers 9-7. Smith got his 358th save, surpassing

Jeff Reardon of the Cincinnati Reds. **1999:** Texas catcher Ivan Rodriguez drove in nine runs in the Rangers' 15-6 victory at Seattle.

2004: San Francisco's Barry Bonds hit his 661st homer, passing Willie Mays to take sole possession of third place on baseball's career list.

2009: Jody Gerut christened the Mets' new home, Citi Field, with a leadoff homer in San Diego's 6-5 win over New York. Gerut's shot off Mike Pelfrey marked the first time in history that the first batter homered in a regular-season opener at a major league ballpark.

2011: A federal jury convicted Barry Bonds of a single charge of obstruction of justice, but failed to reach a verdict on the three counts at the heart of allegations that he knowingly used steroids and human growth hormone and lied to a grand jury about it. 2018: Houston's Gerrit Cole struck out a career-high 14 batters in seven innings to lead the Astros to a 3-2 win over the Texas Rangers. Cole joined Nolan Ryan as the only pitchers in major league history to strike out at least 11 in three consecutive starts to start a season. Cole also set a major league record with 36 strikeouts in his first three starts with a new team, surpassing Randy Johnson in 1999 with Arizona (34).

CUBS 5, ANGELS 1: Willson Contreras homered twice on a blustery day at Wrigley Field as Cole Hamels and Chicago stopped Los Angeles' six-game win streak. Anthony Rizzo and David Bote also connected to help Chicago win for the third time in four games on its first homestand of the year. Hamels (2-0) pitched eight crisp innings in his second straight victory, improving to 5-2 with a 2.63 ERA in 12 career starts against Los Angeles. The Angels played without star center fielder Mike Trout, who missed his second straight game after he strained his right groin during the team's last homestand.6.

PHILLIES 9, MARLINS 1: Jake Arrieta allowed one run in seven innings to earn his 100th career victory and the Philadelphia Phillies sent the Miami Marlins to their fifth consecutive loss, 9-1 on Friday night. Arrieta (2-1) took a 6-0 lead into the seventh, when the Marlins ended a streak of 21 consecutive scoreless innings on Austin Dean's sacrifice fly. The Marlins have lost nine of their past 10 games, and they've been outscored 30-2 in the past four games.

Zack Wheeler (1-1) worked six solid innings after giving up a career-high seven runs in his last start. He allowed six hits, two runs and three walks, striking out eight.

RED SOX 6, ORIOLES 4: Gold Glove center fielder Jackie Bradley Jr. made two key catches and the Boston Red Sox beat the Baltimore Orioles 6-4 Friday night, giving the World Series champions their first two-game winning streak of the season. Baltimore's Chris Davis lined out as a pinch-hitter to end the game, extending his record hitless streak for a position player to 0 for 54. Andrew Benintendi homered and Xander Bogaerts had three hits, helping Eduardo Rodriguez (1-2) and the Red Sox improve to 5-9.

WHITE SOX 9, YANKEES 6: Eloy Jimenez hit his first two major league homers, including a tiebreaking shot in the fifth inning, and the Chicago White Sox ended a five-game skid by beating the banged-up New York Yankees 9-6 in a rain-shortened game Friday night. Jimenez's two-run drive off Jonathan Holder made it 7-5, and he added a 446-foot solo homer in the seventh. James McCann followed with his first homer of the season, and then umpires pulled the teams off the field with one out. The game was called about 40 minutes later.

PIRATES 6, NATIONALS 3, 10 INNINGS: Colin Moran had a pinch-hit, three-run homer in the 10th inning and the Pittsburgh Pirates scored five runs off Washington's struggling bullpen in a victory over the Nationals. Moran's homer to right center off Justin Miller was his second as a pinch hitter in 34 at-bats.

No. 1 MILWAUKEE BUCKS (60-22) vs. No. 8 DETROIT **PISTONS (41-41)**

Season series: Bucks, 4-0

Story line: After rolling to the NBA's best record, Giannis Antetokounmpo and the Bucks open against a team they toyed with on their way to Milwaukee's first 60-win season since 1980-81. The NBA's highest-scoring team swept Detroit for the first time, averaging 114.5 points and winning by 14.8 per game. The Pistons, who didn't clinch a playoff berth until the fight night of the season, are 4-0 against the Bucks in the postseason.

Key matchup: Brook Lopez vs. Andre Drummond. The 7-foot Lopez may spend much of his time on offense out on the perimeter shooting 3-pointers, but there's work to do around the basket defensively against the NBA's leading rebounder, who grabbed 15.6 boards per

No. 3 PHILADELPHIA 76ERS (51-31) vs. No. 6 **BROOKLYN NETS (42-40)**

Season series: Tied, 2-2

Story line: The 76ers loaded up for a postseason run, making trades during the regular season to acquire Jimmy Butler and Tobias Harris. With All-Stars Joel Embiid and Ben Simmons already in place along with JJ Redick, they built what may be not only the strongest starting five in the East but also one of the best in the NBA. Now they need that to pay off starting against a surprising Nets team that reached the postseason for the first time since 2015.

Key matchup: Simmons vs. D'Angelo Russell. The point guards were both first-time All-Stars this season, and after Simmons was rookie of the year in 2017-18, Russell hopes to pick up some hardware soon as a candidate for the Most Improved Player award.

Prediction: 76ers in 5

No. 4 BOSTON CELTICS (49-33) vs. No. 5 INDIANA **PACERS (48-34)**

Season series: Celtics, 3-1

Story line: Considered one of the East favorites before the season, the Celtics instead needed to beat the Pacers twice down the stretch just to ensure they'd finish fourth and have home-court advantage against a team that lost its best player when Victor Oladipo was injured. Now Boston hopes to begin showing it can still be the team it was expected to be.

Key matchup: Al Horford vs. Myles Turner. Neither team is particularly potent so needs to rely on being solid defensively. Horford quarterbacks the Celtics' defensive effort from the frontcourt, while Turner was the NBA's leading shot blocker during the season.

No. 2 DENVER NUGGETS (54-28) vs. No. 7 **SAN ANTONIO SPURS (48-34)**

Season series: Tied, 2-2



OKC swept the series — winning twice by nine points, once by two and the other in overtime.

Key matchup: Enes Kanter vs. Steven Adams. Assume the biggest stars on both sides will be stars. The series might be decided by which side can defend the rim better. Kanter has been great down the stretch for Portland, and Adams is a stabilizing force for the Thunder.

Prediction: Thunder in 6

No. 4 HOUSTON ROCKETS (53-29) vs. No. 5 UTAH **JAZZ (50-32)**





Season series: Tied. 2-2

Story line: Both teams started slowly, then found their best stride — Houston was 11-14 and went 42-15 from there, Utah was 18-20 and went 32-12 from there. Led by James Harden, the Rockets made more 3-pointers this season than any team in NBA history. The Jazz gave up the second-fewest 3s this season. The way these teams are playing, it's kind of a shame that they're meeting in the first round.

Key matchup: Harden vs. Donovan Mitchell. For the second straight season, Mitchell gets matched up against the reigning NBA MVP in Round 1. Last season, it was Russell Westbrook - and the Jazz won that series to get into the second round against Harden and these Rockets.

Prediction: Rockets in 7

Hopefully we can keep the momentum going and come up with collaborative strategies that help

attract more fans and keep us in step with the times."

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

Declaring three no-trump on the lead of the club jack to East's king, you elect to win for fear of a heart shift. If that came, you would be forced to duck, after which a reversion to clubs might prove very awkward. Having taken the club ace, how do you plan to maximize your chances in spades and diamonds?

If you lead diamonds from hand. West will play low without concern, and East will win and continue with clubs. At this point, you will need to guess well to come home with nine

A better line is to pass the spade jack at once. When East wins, a heart might be best, but if he returns a low club, you duck — since West cannot lead hearts effectively. If West next plays either a heart or a club, you win and overtake the spade king to run the diamond jack. The defenders can win, but will have at most one trick to cash, as the cards lie, before letting you back on lead. You can cross to the spade 10 and run the diamond 10, coming to two tricks in each black suit

and five winners in the red suits. Incidentally, if the spade jack holds, you are probably supposed to lead a spade to the ace and run the diamond jack. Then you can play for three diamond tricks to bring your total to nine. You will go down only when West has both diamond honors guarded and five clubs, in which case you are doomed no matter what you do.
