BHS Future Farmers of America Business Management team wins 1st place in the nation; communications team is 6th

The Blountstown High School Future Farmers of America Chapter has done it again! For the third straight year, they've won a national championship!

The national convention was held in Indianapolis, Indiana, where winners of the National FFA Farm Business Management Career Development Event were announced Friday at the annual awards banquet. Florida's team of Travis Pittman, Stewart Herndon, Blake McGraw, and Harlea

Perdue of BHS captured first place in this category. In addition, Harlea Perdue of BHS won first place in the individual awards for this event, while Travis Pittman came in second and Stewart Herndon placed 10th.

The top six individuals and the national winning team received scholarships to further their education at a post-secondary institution of their choice. The coaches of the top two teams were named Farm Business Fellows. The scholarships and the farm business manage-

ment event are sponsored by John Deere of Moline, Illinois as a special project of the National FFA Foundation.

The National FFA Farm Business Management CDE is designed to test the ability of students to apply economic principles and concepts in analyzing farm and ranch business management decisions. Participants respond to questions concerning economic principles in farm business management as well as a problem-solving analysis section. Each team in the

event has competed with other chapters in their state for the privilege of participating in the national event.

In the National FFA Agricultural Communications Career Development Event, the Florida team of Caitlyn Stewart, Kara Bremer, Kate McFarland, Trent Smith, and Hayden Jeppson, all of Blountstown FFA, came in 6th place in the nation. Stewart won 4th place in the individual category for this event.

Patriot leader files case against county

Jim Pruette, who leads the Calhoun-Liberty Patriots, filed a case in federal court Monday against the Calhoun County Board of Commissioners.

At last Tuesday night's board meeting, Pruette addressed the board, asking them to bring back at-large voting in Calhoun County. At-large voting ended in 1986 after a federal lawsuit was filed by Carlton Smith. The county never put it on the ballot for voters to decide, as provided in the Florida Constitution. Voting has been by single member districts ever since. In 1996, a

Man jailed after child porn found

A Blountstown man is behind bars, charged with 13 counts of possessing child pornography and promoting the sexual performance of a child.

David Lyle Danley, Jr., 25, remains in custody at the Calhoun County Jail on \$50,000 bond.

According to Sheriff David Tatum, a search warrant was served in May on Danley's Seaborn Hand Road residence and his computer was seized. A forensic lab discovered multiple items of child porn. Sheriff Tatum said none of the children are local.

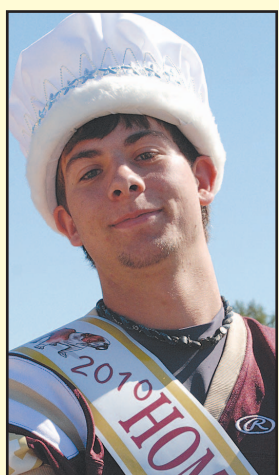

Man charged with DUI after crashing Saturday

A traffic crash ended in a drunk driving arrest Saturday afternoon.

Candido Hurtado-Solano, 24, was charged with DUI, unassigned tag, and no valid drivers license.

According to the Calhoun County Sheriff's Office, Hurtado-Solano crashed a 2000 Ford on

Hwy. 71 South near S.A. Bryant Road just after 1:30 p.m. Dep. John Scheetz arrived to find him sitting in a wooded area with blood on his face.

Sources tell *The County Record* they were nearly hit head on by Hurtado-Solano before he crashed.

After being treated at Calhoun-Liberty Hospital, he was booked into the Calhoun County Jail and remained in custody at press time. The Florida Highway Patrol handled the investigation.

Local man busted with cocaine and marijuana

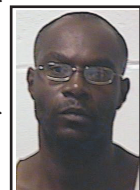
Thomas Lee Jenkins, Jr., 39, of Blountstown, has been charged with possession of cocaine and less than 20 grams of marijuana.

According to the Calhoun County Sheriff's Office, Dep. Eddie Dalton was conducting foot patrol around 8 p.m. Oct. 19 in the Ward Road and Canal Lane area known for drug activity. He approached Jenkins, who was walking down the street, and observed him spitting two plastic bags out of his mouth. Dep. Dalton

recovered the bags which turned out to be an estimated half gram of marijuana in one and about a half gram of powder cocaine in the other.

Jenkins was taken into custody and, during a search at the jail, was found to have marijuana hidden in the inside band of his hat.

Jenkins, who is on state probation, was booked into the Calhoun County Jail and remained in custody at press time.

Reader says Amendment 4 gives rights back to people

To the editor and the citizens of Calhoun and Liberty Counties:

In reference to the Comprehensive Plan of Liberty and Calhoun County and each county in the state of Florida. There is an amendment known as amendment 4 on the November 2nd ballot to remove the authority of local and statewide elected officials from dictating change in your private property.

Amendment 4 simply says, if passed, that that authority will return to the people, which is the way it should have been all along. Anytime you reduce government and its authority over your private property you are doing what our founding fathers incorporated into the constitution. Elected officials are telling you that they know better than you what you should do with your property. That should within itself tell the voting peo-

ple that something was wrong with the existing laws. Obviously, the Supreme Court wished to give the ordinary person a voice in their lives. The amendment is very clear and very simple. It takes the authority of elected officials away from them and gives it back to the people. That has got to be a good thing.

There are many little white crosses across this world that memorialize people who died to insure that the people are the government. Counting the ten Commissioners of Calhoun and Liberty County, there are 595 people including Congress, the Senate and the Supreme Court telling 300,000,000 people what to do with their property and their money. The government has added approximately 40 new taxes for you to pay in the last 75 years.

My American friends, do your research, ask questions, talk to people. I am writing this letter to alert you. In my opinion, if we don't take our government back, we are a lost nation. Ronald Reagan said, "If you take this nation from under God you won't have a nation to be under." Simply said, think and pray about what you are doing.

P.S. If you read Florida Statute 125.66(4)(a) you will find that you should have received a letter from the Clerk of Court for all property owners with less than 10 acres explaining to you in detail what the attempt was to restrict the use of your property. I can find no one who received such a letter.

Jerry Sellers monument to be dedicated Nov. 11, Altha

The Altha Town Council voted unanimously over the summer to approve a monument in honor of Jerry Sellers. That monument will be dedicated on Veterans Day, Nov. 11.

A member of the Altha Class of 1952, Sellers went on to become a major in the Air Force and lost his life in Vietnam on Christmas Day of 1967. He was later honored with the second highest award for valor - the Air Force Cross.

Sellers' former classmate, Jim Brock, who is a veteran of both Vietnam and the Korean Conflict, spoke to the Altha Town Council, sharing Sellers' story of bravery and sacrifice, and proposing a monument be created in his honor.

In addition, American Legion Post 272 is sponsoring a Jerry Sellers Memorial Scholarship for graduates of Altha High School.

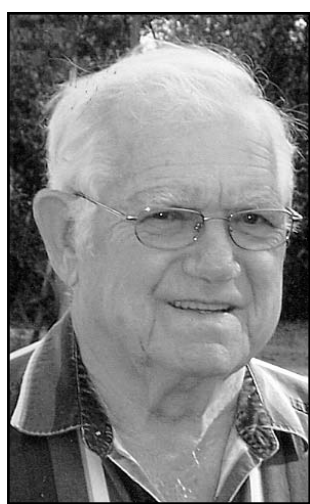

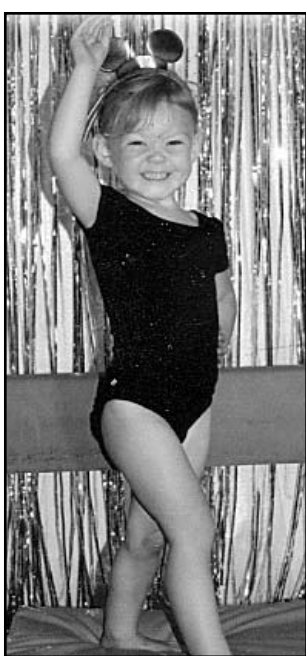

The National FFA Agricultural Communications CDE is a competitive activity that tests students' skills in all areas of the agricultural communications field and

Participants attend a simulated news conference and use the information gathered to complete individual practicums in news story writing, press release writing, radio broadcasting, web design, and graphic design. Prior to the event, students compile communication project proposals related to innovative agricultural practices, management techniques and mar-

keting tools. Each team then creates a 15-minute presentation based on their proposal. Members also compete in an editing exercise and a general communications quiz.

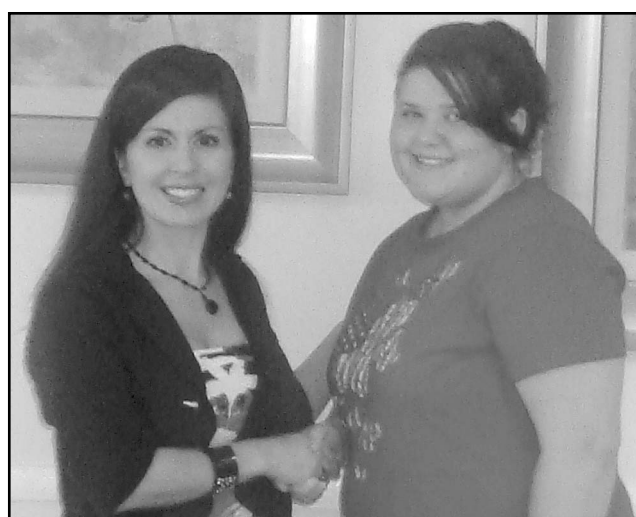

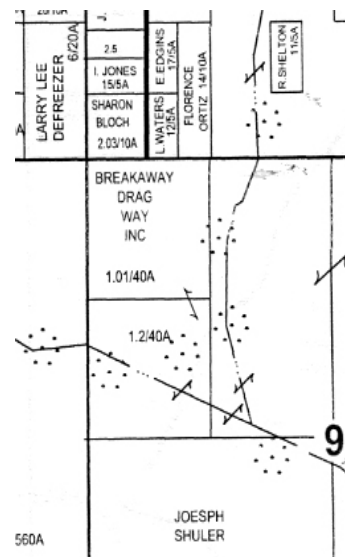

Small game hunts now open at L. Kirk Edwards in Leon County

Hunters who like to pursue gray squirrels, other small game or wild hogs may want to try the L. Kirk Edwards Small Game Area in Leon County, which will be open for 10 weekend hunts that began Saturday.

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) manages the 1,712-acre area, located approximately four miles east of Tallahassee and north of U.S. 27 (Apalachee Parkway). Chaires Cross Road bisects the area.

"This is an excellent public area that's close to Tallahassee and Monticello for someone looking for a place to squirrel hunt," said Roger Shields, FWC public hunting areas biologist. "Not only that, there are quite a few wild hogs on the

area, and they are legal to take."

On the portion east of Chaires Cross Road, the remaining small-game season hunt dates are: Oct. 29-31; Nov. 12-14; Nov. 26-28; Dec. 10-12; Dec. 24-26; Jan. 7-9; Jan. 21-23; Feb. 4-6; and Feb. 18-20.

On the west side, hunting is allowed on consecutive weekends from Nov. 13 to March 6.

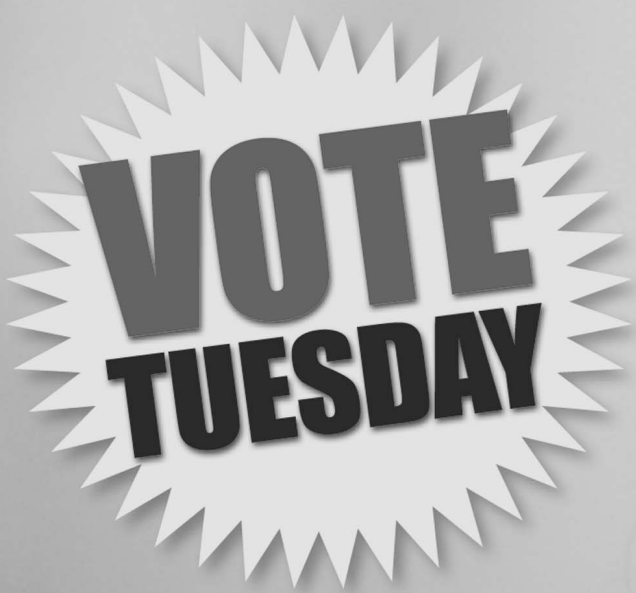
Wildlife legal to hunt include wild hog, gray squirrel, quail, rabbit, migratory game birds in season, fish and frogs.

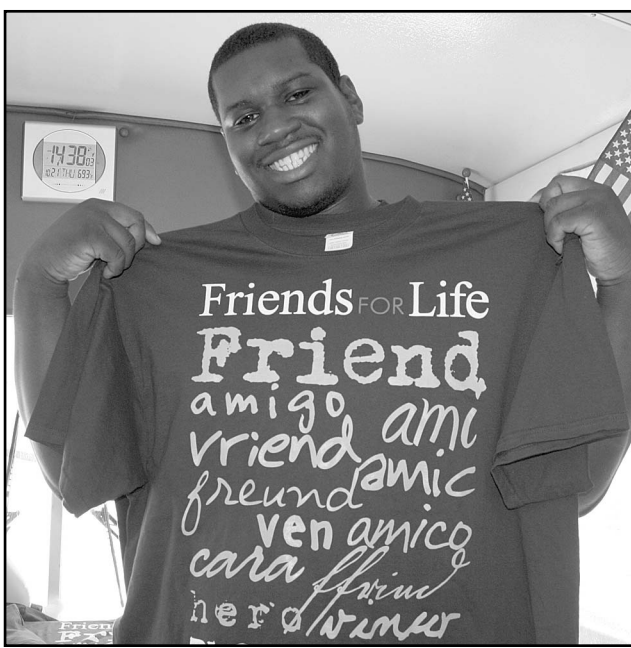

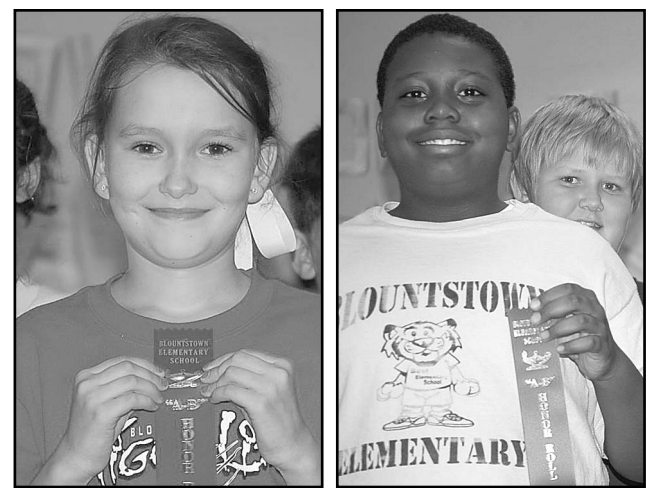

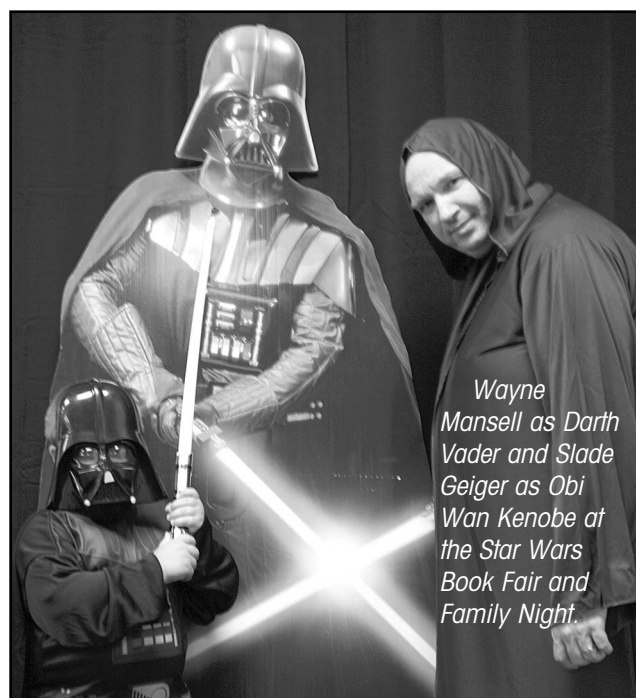

Facts About Amendment 8

The Florida Supreme Court has ruled that Amendment 8, which would revise class size limits, can go on the November ballot. The state's teachers union has tried to get the measure removed, saying the ballot question was misleading. The Supreme Court unanimously disagreed, saying voters will get the question.

The Florida Constitution currently limits the maximum number of students assigned to each teacher in public school classrooms. The current limits on the maximum number of students assigned to each classroom is limited to 18 students in grade prekindergarten through third grade, 22 students in fourth through eighth grade, and 25 students in ninth through twelfth grade. A YES vote, would raise those limits to 21 students in prekindergarten through third grade, 27 students in fourth through eighth grade, and 30 students in ninth through twelfth grade. A NO vote, would leave the limits as they are now. Each school district will have a hefty fine for each student over the limit and take operating money from the district was the reason for re-evaluating the original class size amendment. Before this year the numbers was based on district averages, and then school averages. Now is goes strictly by each class involved. The amendment clearly specifies that class size limits DO NOT APPLY TO VIRTUAL CLASSES, REQUIRES THE LEGISLATURE TO PROVIDE SUFFICIENT FUNDS TO MAINTAIN THE AVERAGE NUMBER OF STUDENTS REQUIRED BY THIS AMENDMENT, AND SCHEDULES THOSE REVISIONS TO TAKE EFFECT UPON APPROVAL BY THE ELECTORS OF THIS STATE AND TO OPERATE RETROACTIVELY TO THE BEGINNING OF THE 2010-2011 SCHOOL YEAR.

CRITICAL OPERATING NEEDS MILLAGE FOR CALHOUN COUNTY

The critical operating needs millage was authorized by the state legislature effective beginning with the 2009-2010 fiscal year.

The Calhoun County School Board voted to levy the critical operating needs millage for the 2009-2010 and the 2010-2011 fiscal years.

The critical operating millage is authorized for 0.25 of a mill per \$1000 of taxable property (25 cents per \$1000.00)

The critical operating millage raised \$94,026.00 for the 2009-2010 year and is projected to raise \$97,805.00 for the 2010-2011 year.

Being Calhoun County's levy raised less than the state average, the state gives us dollars (compression) up to the state average. In 2009-2010, the states portion was \$229,008.00 and in 2010-2011 their portion will be \$192, 426.

The total (local and state compression) raised by the critical needs millage for 2009-2010 was \$323,034.00 and is projected to be \$290,231.00 for 2010-2011.

The critical needs millage funds approximately seven teachers for the Calhoun County School District.

The critical needs millage has been essential as the state funding has been cut 14.5% or 2,088,869.00 since the beginning of 2007-2008 fiscal year.

The Legislature changed the statutes effective for the 2011-2012 years. In order for the School Board to have the AUTHORITY TO CONTINUE TO LEVY THE CRITICAL NEEDS MILLAGE, THE VOTERS MUST PASS THE REFERENDUM ON THE NOVEMBER 2010 BALLOT.

At-large continued

citizen group petitioned and a referendum to return to at-large voting was on the ballot, passing with a 70% majority in favor. However, the threat of another lawsuit prompted the County Commission to remain with the single member method.

Pruette urged board members to abide by the 1996 referendum to return to at-large voting. He acknowledged that many minorities had expressed concern in the past about at-large voting preventing a minority from being elected to the board, but he explained that the days when that was an issue have since passed, noting that we have a minority in the White House and our state senator is also a minority. Pruette quoted Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. who stated, "I have a dream that my four little children will one day live in a nation where they will not be judged by the color of their skin, but by the content of their character."

After discussion, Commissioner Danny Ray Wise (district 1) made a motion for both the County Commission and School Board to return to at-large voting. Attorney Matt Fuqua noted that the Commission could not tell the School Board what to do, but Wise stated he was following how the referendum read in 1996. The motion died for lack of a second.

Pruette filed a motion for order to show cause and a petition for writ of mandamus in federal court Monday. The court records read:

1. The petitioner seeks an order to show cause as to what authority the Calhoun County Board of Commissioners used to

legally ignore a legal and binding referendum duly voted on by the electors of Calhoun County on 5 November, 1996 and why no action whatsoever was taken by the then sitting board nor by the present sitting board when so asked.

2. The petitioner seeks a writ of mandamus directed at the Calhoun County

Board of Commissioners, respondent, to comply with the legally binding referendum approved by the legal electors of Calhoun County on 5 November 1996 and seek all necessary avenues to implement said referendum.

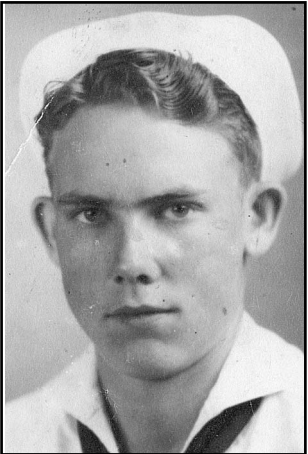



The southern portion of NW Church Road is located in a 100 year floodplain and a wetland. 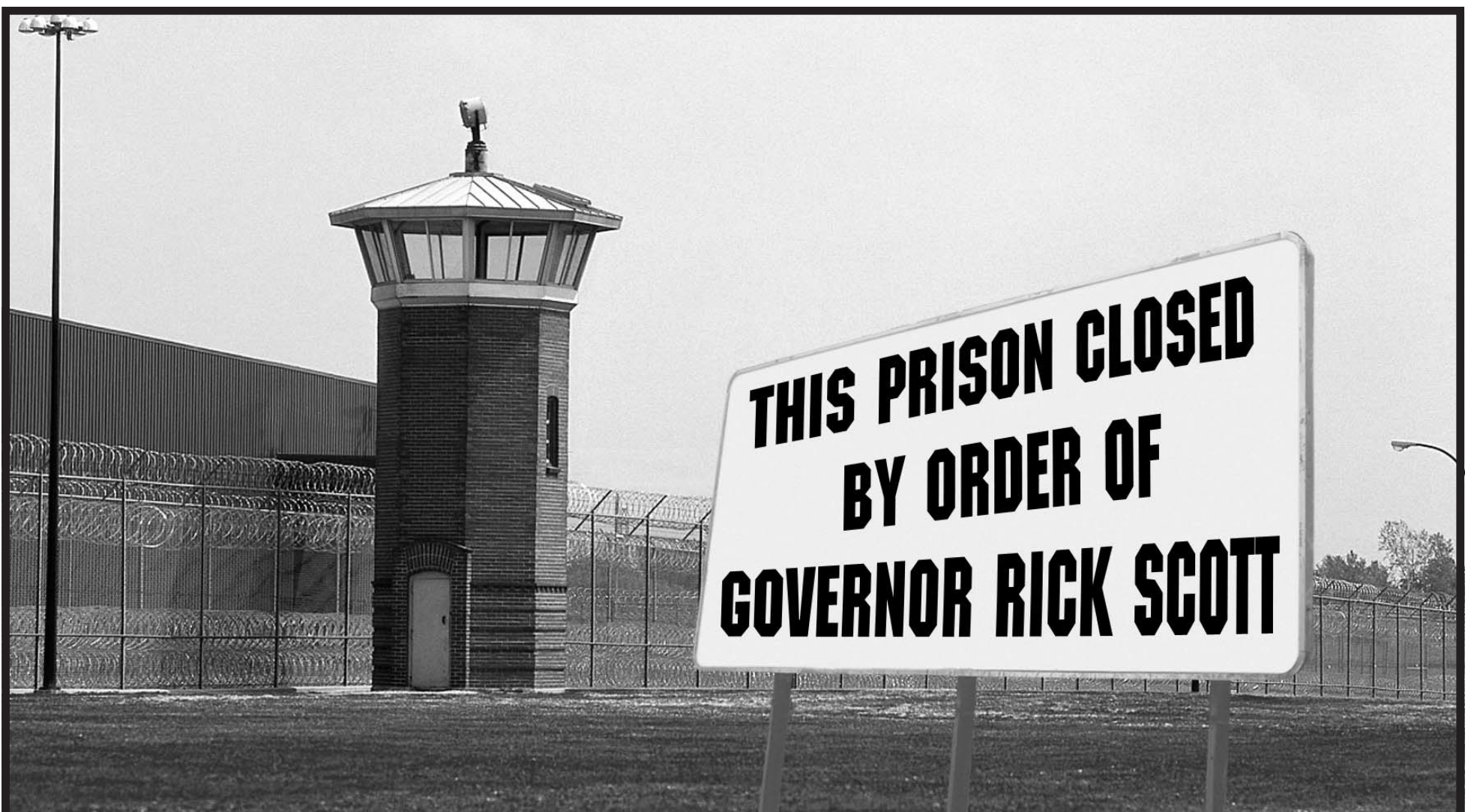

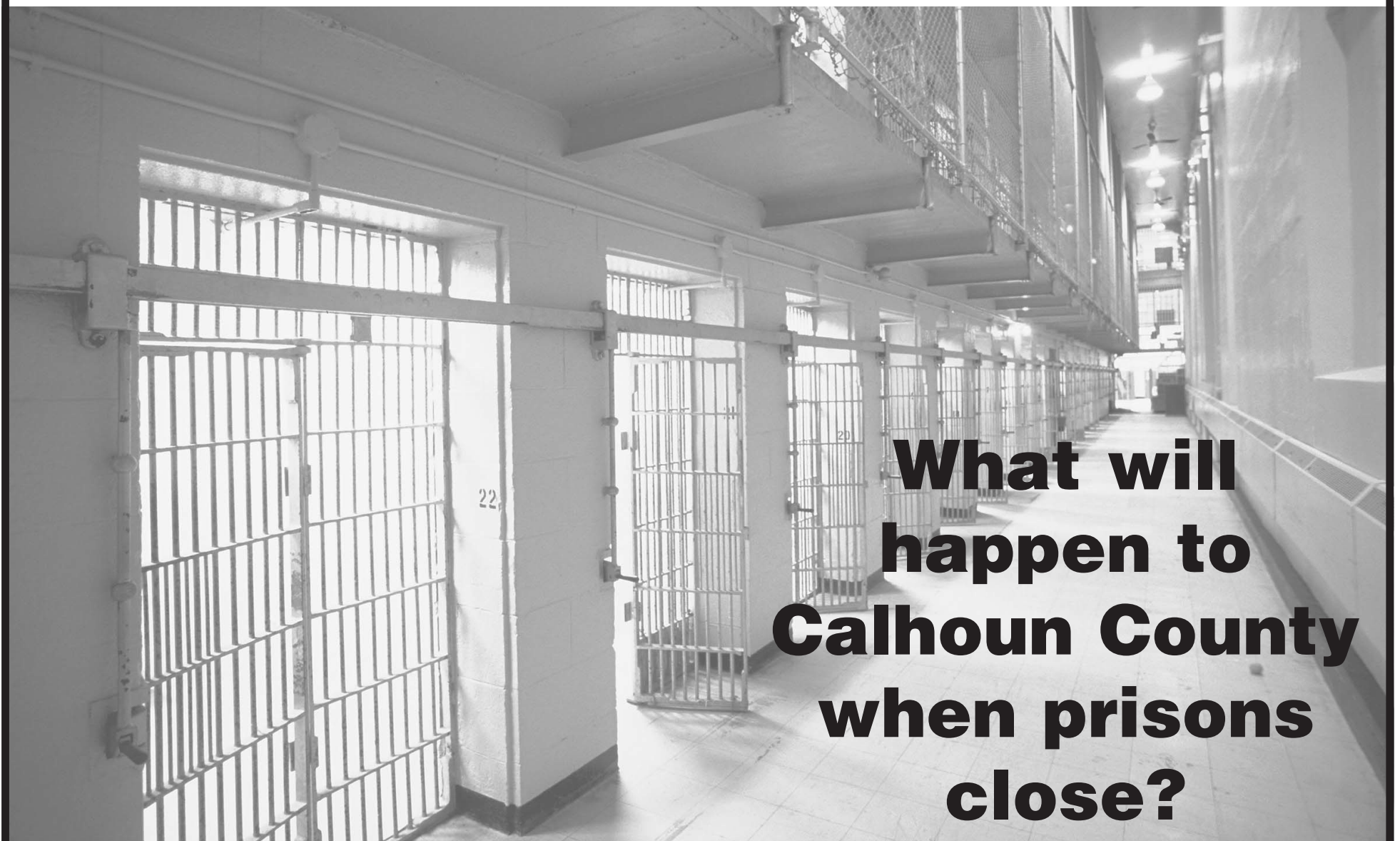

Tigers outscore Sharks, 41-21

The Blountstown Tigers scored on their first offensive play and added another quick touchdown to lead Port St. Joe 15-0 early in the first quarter Friday night. The Sharks came back with two scores in the second quarter but could not stop the Tiger offense. When the final seconds ticked off the clock, Blountstown had claimed their sixth victory, 41-21. The Tigers moved to 6-1 overall and 3-0 in district play. This week the Tigers will host Franklin County in another key district game.

"We've got to beat Franklin Co. to guarantee a playoff spot. If we beat Franklin Co. then the Liberty Co. game will be for the district title the following Friday. If we lose to Franklin Co. then we have to beat Liberty Co. for a chance at the playoffs," coach Greg Jordan said Monday.

"Our offense played well again Friday night in St. Joe. We had 209 yards of rushing but we only ran the ball 31 times. We were 4 for 4 passing for 138 yards so we still had 347 yards of offense," Jordan stated.

The Tiger defense held the Sharks to 130 yards on the ground and only 32 yards passing. Paul Mosley had three interceptions to push his season total to 9. Hard hitting Dowling Lee got poked in the eye on the first defensive play and didn't return. Coach Jordan said Lee should be ready for Franklin Co.

After forcing the Sharks to punt following the opening kickoff, quarterback Charles Buggs, Jr. found Hunter Jordan open down the sideline for 62 yards and a touchdown. Marquel Comer kicked the PAT for a 7-0 lead.

The Tiger defense stopped the Sharks at the Tiger 36 on fourth down and put together an 8 play 64 yard drive. Marquel Thomas and Alexander Garrett had key runs in the drive capped off by a 2 yard blast by Bobby Andrews. Buggs scored on the two-point try and the Tigers

were ahead 15-0.

St. Joe responded with a 60 yard 12 play drive and scored on a 7 yard run. The PAT failed and left the score at 15-6.

On the Tigers' first play after the kickoff, a costly fumble set the Sharks up for an easy touchdown from the 10. A successful two-point play reduced the Tigers' lead to 15-14.

The Tigers answered with another strong scoring drive. Buggs connected with Jawon Mosley for 17 yards and later in the drive passed to Paul Mosley who raced 35 yards for a TD. A two-point pass play failed, but the Tigers were up 21-14.

Paul Mosley came up with his first interception on the Sharks next series but the half ended with the Tigers near midfield.

Jawon Mosley returned the kickoff 34 yards to the 47. On third down from the Shark 37, Buggs went the distance for the touchdown. The two-point play failed but the Tigers extended their lead to 27-14.

The Tiger defense forced another punt and Paul Mosley took it in at the Tiger 34 and followed some good blocks for 66 yards and a touchdown. Comer's PAT pushed the score to 34-14.

Paul Mosley grabbed his second interception and returned it 25 yards to the Shark 20. Ryan McIntyre found an opening for 18 yards then blasted in from the two. Comer's PAT quickly made the score 41-14.

Following an exchange of punts Paul Mosley came up with his third interception. The Tigers drove to the Shark 18 but lost a fumble and St. Joe scooped it up and returned it 88 yards for a touchdown. The PAT made the score 41-21 late in the game.

After a 60 yard kickoff return by Jawon Mosley the Tigers moved to the Shark 5 before losing another fumble.

Hunter Jordan led the defense with 11 tackles followed by Byron Hall with 10. Anthony Williams and

Frankie Murrell had active nights on defense with 8 tackle each. Alexander Garrett had 6 tackles and Thomas Tierney added 5.

Buggs led the Tiger ground attack with 45 yards followed by McIntyre with 28 and Brandon Smith with 25. Bobby Andrews and Jawon Mosley had 23 yards each. Marquel Thomas had 10 yards, Chaz Fain 16, Chris Byrne 14, Alexander Garrett 15 and Bryan Middlebrooks added 3.
