Humane Society ends contract with county

The Suncoast Humane Society has ended its contract with Sarasota County, effective Sept.

This means that lost and stray animals found in North Port, Venice and northern parts of Englewood, will no longer be accepted. Instead, these animals will be transported to Sarasota County Animal Services on Bee Ridge Road in Sarasota.

Citizens in these areas finding lost or straying animals will continue to phone Sarasota Animal Services at 861-9500 to have them picked up.

Phil Snyder, Suncoast's executive director, said the decision to end the contract was made after more than a year of discussion.

"This wasn't something that

temperament or health problems and are ultimately euthanized.

"In Sarasota County I can tell you, so far, in all of 2007, the Sarasota Animal Control brought in 884 stray animals, and brought in 742 so far this year," Snyder said.

Benefits

Snyder said there aren't many who contract with animal control any more, and those that do lose money, including Suncoast Humane Society.

Ending the contract will provide several benefits to Suncoast, including euthanizing fewer animals.

"It will give us room to provide longer term care for some animals with a little extra effort can be made well or adopted into good homes," he said. "It also will allow us to create more aggressive spay/neuter and pet adoption programs, which brings us more in line with our mission of reducing the number of homeless animals and improving the quality of human and animal life."

Tacy won't seek third term

Two city council seats are up for grabs on the Nov. 4 ballot, but only one is attracting candidates.

Seat 2, held by Rick Tacy, has drawn more potential candidates than any other in recent memory.

That's a moot point for Tacy now that he's announced he won't seek a third term.

"I am not running for office," he said Tuesday. "I've accomplished what I wanted to get done."

Due to term limits, even if elected Tacy could have served only one additional year.

He withheld his announce-

ment until now, he said, with only three days left before the filing deadline, until after the council vote on plans for the beachfront Tramonto Vista Park.

"I didn't want to announce (my intentions) and become a lame duck in case it was a close vote," Tacy said. "I'm very happy it will be built."

His decision not to run will

also give the city a chance to align office terms so there are fewer staggered terms requiring fewer costly elections.

"I took over (Seat 2 during) the middle of the term," Tacy said. "To run now and to win would just be pushing everything down the road."

Planners urged to improve evacuation options

Now is the time to prepare for hurricanes, Edward McCrane Jr. has been telling Sarasotans.

The county's emergency management chief suggests that the most important question to answer in those preparations is, if you leave, where would you go?

"Whether you stay or go during a storm partially depends on which evacuation zone you live in," he said.

That has Manasota-88, a Nokomis-based environmental organization, concerned. It questions a state-mandated transportation master plan that must be completed by 2009 for this area by the Tampa Bay Regional Transportation Authority.

Glenn Compton of Manasota-88 wants TBARTA to make it a priority to develop options in its plan "that reduce hurricane evacuation times and have an overall positive impact on the environment."

Sarasota County is part of Florida's Region 6, which includes Charlotte, Manatee, Hendry, Collier and Lee counties. Their population is about 1.5 million, according to the Southwest Regional Planning Council. That will probably double by 2050, the council's Dan Trescott, project service manager, estimates.

"Those figures are based on an annual growth of about 3 percent in the number of households in the region and estimates going back to 1987," he said. "But 800,000 is a more important figure. That represents residents of mobile homes and recreational vehicles. They're being built more solidly these days. They are particularly vulnerable to storm surges and hurricane-force winds, particularly so if they're on the coast."

He estimates that evacuation time in the region is about 65

hours prior to hurricane landfall.

"But there are so many variables," he said. "Evacuees could find as much trouble where they are going as where they have been."

'Woefully inadequate'

Compton fears that the TBARTA plan is limited in scope already, even before a series of public workshops on the plan is completed. He expressed his concerns in July at one of the meetings, at the Venice Community Center.

"Whichever improvements TBARTA puts into its plan, they need to allow for urban sprawl," he said. "They cannot negatively impact the environment. Nor can they fail to reduce evacuation clearance times.

"A justification for building I-75 and extending it south of State Road 681 in Nokomis was

to use it as a hurricane evacuation route. Funding improvements for River Road are also being justified as a way to facilitate hurricane evacuation."

"But River Road was never intended to be a hurricane evacuation route,"

Compton said. "It's located on a floodplain of the Myakka River. Upgrading River Road for safe use as a hurricane evacuation route will be prohibitively expensive.

"One of the biggest mistakes made in Southwest Florida was to build entire communities along the Gulf in hurricane-prone areas without improving transportation needs for safe hurricane evacuations 40 years ago," Compton said. "We're still doing it."

Roads leading from such areas are "woefully inadequate to safely move residents out of harm's

way," he added.

Forecasters at the University of Colorado recently revised their predictions

of the number of hurricanes that will occur in 2008. Based on the numrecorded, they boosted the number of named storms to 17 from 15 and hurricanes to nine from eight. In only four other years

-2005 was the most recent - has a storm formed in the tropics as early as Bertha in July. Hurricane frequency and intensity were high in those years.

Accomplishments

According to Tacy, his biggest accomplishments included being one of the original council members to suggest passing the \$10 million bond four years ago that resulted in making funds available for Tramonto Vista Park, beach renourishment, the Venice Municipal Fishing Pier and reconstruction of the Venice Community Center; getting the comprehensive plan revised; and securing funds for the planned Myakka River Park.

Tacy will have served eight years. He was first elected in 2000 to serve two years remaining on Janice McDermott's term after she stepped down just prior to the election. Tacy won unopposed.

"It's been very productive. Some of my favorite accomplishments took place behind the scenes," he said, like the time a resident complained to him about a rusted fire hydrant at Venice Beach; with his encouragement it was replaced in one day.

Tacy recalled, he received a call from a woman who complained about a particular street median that didn't have cutouts for wheelchair access.

"It was rather dangerous traveling around medians instead of passing through them," he said. "We had it done by July. She said she didn't think it was ever going to be done. She was thankful. Those are the ones that have the most meaning."

What next for Tacy? He's undecided.

"For a couple of months I will probably totally step away unless there is an issue I need to speak on."

Moore unopposed

Vice Mayor John Moore, the swing vote on many controversial issues since the November council elections, is thus far running unopposed for Seat 1.

He was elected in 2002. He currently serves as ex officio on the Venice Historical Commission and represents the city on the following boards: Manasota On his second day in office, League of Cities, Sarasota County Tourist Development Council and Tourism and Economic Development Board. He is a former chairman of the Municipal Code Enforcement Board.

Moore holds a bachelor of science degree in civil engineering from Virginia Military Institute and a law degree from Georgetown University in Washington, D.C. He served in the U.S. Army. He, and his wife, Linda, moved to Venice in 2000 from Virginia Beach, Va., where he served as circuit court judge.

The final four?

Four candidates have announced campaigns for Seat 2, including longtime Planning Commission Chair John Osmulski, Bond/Tax Oversight Committee Member Gary Budway, recently appointed Planning Commission Member Kit McKeon, and political newcomer and Golden Beach resident Emilio Carlesimo.

Officially Osmulski and Mc-Keon have submitted their paperwork. The rest have until filing deadline on Friday at noon. The candidates are:

Gary Budway — a retired corrections officer and union representative, he was the first to announce his candidacy for Seat 2. He is a recent appointee by the mayor to the city Bond/Tax Oversight Committee.

Emilio Carlesimo — he considers himself the only moderate candidate. He is a longtime firefighter and union representative already endorsed by the Suncoast Professional Firefighters and paramedics Local 2546 and Florida Professional Firefighters Association. He was appointed in 2004 to the city Fire Fighter's Pension Board and is chairman of the Sarasota County Fire Fighters Health Trust Fund. He sits on the county Emergency Medical Services Advisory Board.

Kit McKeon — McKeon, a slow-growth advocate, first appeared on the scene a year ago during public hearings on proposed development at the municipal airport. He supports preserving Venice's small town charm, keeping the municipal

golf course, and "keeping our airport safe." He was an Army/ National Guard helicopter pilot and operations officer for 10 years, with 30 years in the defense aerospace business with General Electric and other companies. He was recently appointed the the Venice Planning Commission by Mayor Ed Martin.

John Osmulski — a volunteer in the community for 30 years, he has chaired the city planning commission since 1998. Generally considered a pro-growth candidate, Osmulski is a general contractor by trade. At one point he served on five city and county advisory boards - chairing all of them simultaneously. He chaired the city Parks and Recreation Advisory Board beginning in 1991, helping broker the deal between the county and city that resulted in Paw Park. He served from 1993-97 on the Code Enforcement Board, and from 1994 to the end of 1996 on the county Natural Resources & Recreation Advisory Board until the board sunsetted.


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

Are Sarasota County elections jinxed?

primary election in Sarasota County was that all the votes seemed to be recorded properly. And, just in case, there was a paper backup.

Given Florida's notorious exercise in the 2000 presidential election, the 2006 congressional election undercount in Sarasota County and the \$3 million spent on a new voting system, that is very good news.

The bad news is that another election-night glitch held up the vote total for hours, forced a day-after manual tally and provided more fuel to conspiracy theorists who consider our current elections systems suspect. It just looked bad, again.

It is an axiom of political science and public relations that perception is everything. So once again, the Supervisor of Elections Office in Sarasota

he good news about last Tuesday's County has to scramble to maintain credibility.

> The most recent election night problem was relatively minor. There is no evidence that any votes were missing, which is the important thing. Because the county's new election electronic machines have the paper backups, a recount was possible if there were any major questions.

> In fact, the new system — with all the pieces used together for the first time Tuesday — seemed to be working exceptionally well early in the evening. One-half hour after the polls closed, nearly all the votes were tabulated. There was only one problem transferring data from a polling station to the elections office, and that was handled easily. The tabulation was moving along far smoother than in past elections, Supervisor of Elections Kathy Dent said.

whole thing would be locked up cleanly within an hour, the process stopped cold.

Elections officials were unable to transfer two sets of absentee-voting results onto the computer server using a high-speed scanner.

This sort of thing happens with computer systems on occasion; the connection simply wouldn't work. Elections officials and employees of Premier Election Solutions, which manufactures the system, were baffled by the transferof-data problem.

Two hours into the process, Dent, hardly a computer expert herself, was asked what the problem was. "We don't know," she said, looking more frustrated as time went by.

Late in the evening, Dent insisted the glitch couldn't have been detected

Then, just when it appeared the beforehand; the equipment worked correctly in previous tests and a mock election. And the next day, Premier figured out that a software programming error was to blame.

Dent has since decided to use a different, and presumably more reliable, scanner system in November, when the turnout may reach a historic high.

In the end, we're confident the new voting system tabulated votes properly. We're also relieved that paper ballot backup existed in case there was a major tabulation problem.

Once again, though, a problem clouded an election here. With a historic turnout expected in November, we can only hope.

And, just in case, it would be wise to encourage as much sunshine and public inspection of the process as possible. It's one way to restore credibility.

Stop micro-managing

Recently there was a big discussion on Tramonto Vista Park that is to be next to Sharky's. Anything involving the area near Golden Beach (where several council members live) stirs enormous debate. The park discussion was about a lot of things, especially whether it should be passive or active, but also got into what kind of surface to have on the parking lot. Can we not ask staff to look at environmentally sensitive surfaces and have it make a recommendation rather than treating council as a committee? Council is getting into too much minutia. Meetings must be shorter for more efficient and effective government. ****



What is the 'tourist tax'?

As one of the original proponents of the tourist tax in the 1980s, it becomes very frustrating to me when people debate its use for the building of a new baseball stadium, arguing that the money is being misappropriated by locally elected officials and should be used for more pressing needs in the community. Even candidates for county commission do not know where the money can be spent.

It is difficult to dispel the belief that anything given the name "tax" is money that can be used for any purpose under the sun, but in truth the history of this "tax" is as important to understand as is the purpose as to how the funds might be used.

All state and local taxation in the state of Florida must be authorized by our state Legislature, which in turn sets the rules for how it is collected and how it can be used.

For the greatest part of our state history we have had two major industries: citrus and tourism. After World War II, Florida citrus growers recognized their economic importance to the state, but were faced with a marketing challenge from California growers who were advertising heavily to promote their products.

In order to compete growers, processors, and packers petitioned the governor and the state Legislature to impose a tax on every box of fruit picked in the state of Florida so they could collectively compete in advertising their products.

This advertising was financed not through gen-

eral tax revenues, but instead by a tax paid by citrus growers on all fruit that moves through commercial channels. This money was used to fund not only the administrative costs of running the Florida Department of Citrus, but to also pay for advertising and promotion. To this day 80 percent of its budget of \$58 million is spent on advertising and promotional activities for Florida citrus.

Many naysayers would point out that Floridians would be better off taking that money and spending it someplace else, while ignoring the fact that the growing, packing, processing and selling of citrus generates a \$9 billion per year impact on Florida's economy, employs 90,000 Floridians and generates close to \$1 billion in tax revenues.

Following the lead of the citrus growers, as tourism lodging matured as an industry, hoteliers found many communities outside of Florida promoting and advertising destinations by imposing a tax on short-term hotel stays. Just as citrus saw itself as a critical industry to the economy of Florida, tourism saw that in fact its collective revenues made it the No. 1 industry in Florida.

So in order to maintain and sustain a tourismdependent economy, in 1967 the Legislature authorized tourist taxes as a means to generate revenue for tourism promotion to bring in more overnight guests in order to keep hotel rooms full.

Like the citrus "tax," the "bed tax" has been amended more than 90 times, mostly to redefine

the authorized use of the revenue.

Again, state statutes authorize the use, and local officials, together with their appointed Tourist Development Council, decide among those authorized uses how they should spend the money.

As the law now stands, a maximum of 4 percent tax on transient rentals and a 2-percent tax on food and beverage is allowed. (Sarasota has not authorized the tax on food and beverage). The revenue collected may be used for "Tourism promotion activities, capital construction and maintenance of convention and cultural facilities, and for ad valorem tax relief for property tax dollars used for these purposes."

You ask why our elected officials would allow private industry to control the use of "tax" dollars for their benefit.

Stop to consider this. In 2007 Florida had 84.5 million visitors with an economic impact of \$57 billion on Florida's economy, making us the top travel destination in the world (www.stateofflorida.com). Research shows that 77.3 million Americans visited Florida last year, while total sales tax revenues from tourism totaled \$3.9 billion, not to mention that 991,300 of our friends and neighbors were directly employed because of the tourism industry (wwwvis itflorida.com).

that this "tax" in truth is a collective effort by Florida's No. 1 industry to promote its efforts now leads us to the second criticism of building the new stadium for the Red Sox, and that is that "Sarasota has plenty of tourists here in the spring, and we don't need any more." In defense of those in the community promoting this effort, Visit Florida research points out clearly why we should do this.

The perception is that the "tourist season" is in fact when the majority of people visit Florida. Wrong. The periods from January to March and April to June each only account for a little more than 27 percent of our total annual visitors.

Second, the three top origin markets for those traveling by air to visit Florida are New York, Boston, and Philadelphia. It would stand to reason why Boston is so important to Sarasota's touristbased industry, not just for spring training baseball, but year-round.

In the case of both the citrus and tourism industry you could make the case that "imposing" a "tax" on themselves was not the best business model for promoting their products.

Nor did it endear either of them to the majority of the taxpaying public. At best it has caused controversy over the years as to the "use of our tax dollars."

Our way of living together is made up of many threads, many of which we do not agree with or understand. Regardless of where you might fall on this issue, hopefully this has strengthened your understanding of what the tourist "tax" is, how it can be used and how it came about.

Agree with it or not, our local officials are obeying the letter of the law.



Former photo editor Schmidt dies at 58

Paul Schmidt, longtime photo editor of the Sun newspapers and

> the Venice Gondolier Sun, died unexpectedly at his North Port home Sunday mornafter ing suffering a

Schmidt heart attack. He was 58.

Schmidt joined the staff of the Gondolier Sun in 1979 as a part-time photographer and press repairman. By 1980, he was appointed the Gondolier Sun's only full-time photographer. This was a position he held until the Sun Coast Media Group, the parent corporation of the papers, purchased the Sun in the mid-1980s. After a stint with the Sarasota Herald-Tribune, Schmidt rejoined SCMG, working in Venice and eventually moving to the Charlotte daily.

"I wouldn't be doing what I was doing if not for him," said Schmidt's son, Harlan, chief photographer and reporter at local TV news station SNN. "He was a big influence on my life."

Harlan said he grew up at the Gondolier Sun and at the Sun with his dad.

"I went out on photo assignments with him as a toddler," he recalled. "My first job was pressman with the Venice Gondolier Sun."

Schmidt also has a grown daughter, Mallory. He retired from the Sun in March.

"When I joined the paper 20 years ago, Paul was the first guy to befriend me and make me feel welcome in the newsroom," said Chris Porter, editor of the Sun daily newspapers. "Over the years, we spent hours working side by side, through life's ups and downs. We did a lot of arguing, joking, discussing what it takes to make a good-looking newspaper. He had great talent and enthusiasm and he taught me a lot. I miss him." Jonathan Fredin, who

became one of Schmidt's most talented students, won many state and national awards for his photographs that began appearing in the Sun in the late 1990s. When he arrived at the Sun he was a good photographer, but when he left he was a great photographer, because of Schmidt's tutelage, he said.

"I wanted to become a professional photographer, but no one took me seriously until I went to work for Paul," Fredin said Monday. "For five years every day we went over images, and for five years he was my mentor.

'The thing about Paul was he was such a kind soul. He was more than a boss — he was very close to me and my family."

Fredin left the paper in 2005. He is now the chief photographer for S.A. Cherokee, a magazine and public relations firm based in Cary, N.C.

"Paul was one of the best teachers I've ever seen in the news business," said Jim Gouvellis, former Sun executive editor and now publisher of the Lake Wales News. 'Because of him, our newspaper wound up with some of the best photographers in the country.

"More important, he was one of the best friends I've ever had. I worked with Paul, I lived with Paul, and the one thing I learned about him was that for Paul, nobody was an enemy."

Schmidt was not only a fine teacher, he was a skilled photographer himself who won a number of state and national press association awards for his pictures, according to former co-workers.

Years ago he took a picture of a young boy in the arms of a SWAT rescuer clad in military fatigues with a submachine gun slung over his shoulder during a hostage crisis. It won first place for "Spot News Photograph" in the Florida Press Association's annual daily newspaper contest. It was just one of many photographic awards Schmidt received during his decades as a newspaper photographer and editor.

When asked what he told prospective photographers he was interviewing for a position with the paper, Schmidt once said, "I tell them I'm looking for creativity. I'm looking for someone who has an eye.'

A celebration of life gathering for Schmidt is scheduled for 4 p.m. Sunday, Sept. 7, at the Englewood Beach Pavilion. The rain date, if hurricanes force a cancellation, is Sunday, Sept. 14.

Artist tackles painting on water storage tank

A local artist has been commissioned to paint a water-themed mural on a mil-

In addition to acrylic paints and brushes, it's a job that requires a widebrimmed hat, scaffolding and a bucket for lifting her high enough to reach places only birds like to go. Henry, 56, began painting the mural in mid-June and hoped it would be completed within three months. The scene depicts the water cycle and is intended to raise awareness of responsible water use. Her colorful mural will include pond life such as turtles, frogs and lilies, and will splash dramatic thunderstorms and pelting rain across a canvas measuring 2,200 square feet.

Coleen Henry's massive renderings are recognizable on the Venice Print Center near Venetian Waterway Park and in the Jacaranda Library children's department In Venice.

Now she's turning her talent to her tallest project yet, a reclaimed water storage tank measuring 30-feet tall and 290 feet in diameter.

"They want me to put a pretty face on it," she said shortly after beginning work on the mural. She will earn \$18,500 from the Englewood Water District for the job.

Completed two months ago by the District at a cost of \$700,000, the new storage tank is located on hard-to-find



the road appeared little-used when Henry set out to work.

That will change once Winchester Road is extended from State Road 776 to County Road 775 near Bear Creek, according to Charlotte County Public Works.

A four-lane highway will replace Talman Road, completing a proposed hurricane evacuation route from County Road 775 to River Road. Construction is scheduled to begin in January, and be completed by May, 2011.

"When I first saw it, I thought: Why would they want a mural here?" Henry said. "Then I learned this is going to be a very busy road eventually."

Richard Rollo, administrator for the Englewood Water District, said the mural was planned in advance of construction because art and construction dust don't mix well.

"We wanted to be finished before construction began," Rollo said. "We didn't want the paint to get all the dust and dirt."

Henry sat high on a scaffold under an umbrella Wednesday, painting details on a turtle's eye.

She's trying, she said, to let go when it comes to the details.

"The challenge, with such an enormous canvas, is to pull back on the details because they'll never be seen," she said. "I love the details." have to move more quickly," she said.

A former North Port resident, Henry lives in Venice with her husband, Jim. She has been in the area since she was 18, except for three years when she traveled the country with her husband flying commercial hot air balloons.

Starting a mural of this scale is intimidating, much like an actress with stage fright, Henry admits. But once she starts painting and sees something up there she likes, "I'm on a roll," she said.

The amount of exposure that a mural artist gets can also be intimidating.

Artist Catherine Beausoleil, one of the founders of North Port Art Guild, is familiar with Henry's work and has watched her develop as a mural artist.

"It's like hanging one of your organs on a wall when everyone's watching you," said Beausoleil. "Where your subjects are often bigger than your arm span, it becomes a technical issue but she's managed to pull it off beautifully."

As the mural unfolds, Henry will face other challenges including the weather. The bucket brings on "lightning rod fears," she said.

Henry is vice president of Sarasota County Arts and Culture Alliance, a group that promotes art in the area.



Q 1 - Vulnerable, you hold:

▲ Q J 10 9 7 2 ♡ A 7 ◊ 9 ♣ K 10 6 3

Partner opens the bidding with two no trump (20-22 points). What do you bid now?

A - You are missing too many prime cards to commit to slam unilaterally. Start by asking for aces with a Gerber four clubs. Partner's answer might tell you enough for you to make an immediate decision.

Q 2 - Neither vulnerable, as South ou hold:

▲ A Q J 9 5 2 ♡ 9 ◊ K 10 9 5 ♣ A 7

The bidding has proceeded: SOUTH WEST NORTH EAST 40 Pass Pass

What action do you take?

A - It is close between four spades and pass! Since bridge is a bidder's game, we have a slight preference for our spades, but we would not criticize a pass. A double (it would be for takeout) is beyond the pale.

0 3 - Neither vulnerable, as South you hold:

▲ A 9 7 6 3 ♡ Q J 9 2 ◊ 9 ♣ Q 4 2

The bidding has proceeded: EAST SOUTH WEST NORTH 2: What action do you take?

A - If negative doubles are in your arsenal, by all means trot out that weapon now — it allows you show both majors in one fell swoop. If not, you are not strong enough to bid a new suit higher ranking than partner's, since it would be forcing. Pass, and hope partner can reopen.

Q 4 - Neither vulnerable, as South ou hold:

▲ 9 ♡ 4 ◊ A J 9 5 ♣ A K Q J 7 6 2

The bidding has proceeded: WEST NORTH SOUTH EAST 1. Pass 1. Pass

A - In terms of point count, your hand is not much better than a mini-mum, but its trick-taking potential is enormous. Start by reversing into diamonds, which is forcing, and see how partner reacts to that.

Q 5 - As South, vulnerable, you hold:

▲ A K 10 4 ♡ K J 4 ◊ A Q 8 ♣ K Q 5

The bidding has proceeded: NORTH EAST SOUTH WEST Pass 3+ What action do you take?

A - East's pre-empt has done its job. Ideally, you would like to double for penalties, but that action here is for takeout. But that is still your best course, since you intend to bid three no trump next to show a hand too strong for that bid at your first turn. An added benefit is that if partner has a highly distributional hand, you could find a superior contract in a suit.

Q 6 - Neither vulnerable, you hold:

▲ A Q J 5 ♡ A 984 ◊ A 7 53 ♣ 8

Your right-hand opponent opens the bidding with one diamond. What action do you take?

A - To overcall with one of a major here is a sure-fire method of ending in your second-best (or perhaps thirdbest) spot. The only viable action is to make a takeout double despite your singleton club. Your double of a minor suit stresses the majors, so partner will strain to avoid bidding clubs.


