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Salute to a Scholar . . .

Topping 2700 candidates for bachelor's degrees at the University of Illinois was Omicron's Dianne Baumann, who earned a perfect "A" scholastic record through four years of high school and four years of college. A Visit to the Campus

It was back in the years following the Battle of the Little Big Horn—and before North Dakota became a state—that Dakota pioneers, with foresight and faith in the future, paused amid breaking the prairie sod to plan for higher education. They founded the University of North Dakota on February 27, 1883 at Grand Forks.

Four faculty members met the 11 students who entered the University on the opening day September 8, 1884. Twenty-eight students had enrolled by the end of the first month and the total for the year was 79.

In its early years, the University survived two major crises. On June 16, 1887, a severe windstorm entirely demolished the west wing of Main, the only building on campus. To meet expenses for repairs, the trustees borrowed \$10,000 from local banks to keep the school operating. In 1895 the State Legislature appropriated only \$15,000 for the University for the biennium, despite a request for 10 times that sum. To maintain the University during the period, a fund was raised from donations by private citizens and members of the faculty.

The year 1958 was an important milestone for the University of North Dakota—it was the 75th anniversary of the University's founding, which was marked by a gift of one million dollars, by Chester Fritz, world financier, for a new library building.

In the span of 75 years, the University has developed from only one building into an institution with a physical plant including some 30 major buildings of Tudor Gothic Architecture.

Approximately 4,000 students now study at the University during the year and more than 49,000 students have studied at the University since it first opened its doors.

UND is noted for its outstanding Greek system. This year Inter-fraternity council won the National Interfraternity Council award. UND's panhellenic council was honored for its outstanding achievements by winning the *Fraternity Month* trophy for excellence in the 1957 national competition.

Alpha Beta chapter of Gamma Phi Beta had its origin in 1916 when a local sorority, Delta Kappa Tau, was organized. In 1920, the Fargo and Minneapolis alumnae chapters initiated the

first 20 actives of Alpha Beta in the Phi Delta Theta house.

Gamma Phi was the fifth national sorority to appear on the University of North Dakota campus.

The chapter house had four different locations prior to 1929, when the members moved into their present "pink castle" located on the scenic banks of the English Coulee.

The house was remodeled in 1956, when the basement was made into a beautiful large chapter room of knotty pine and two bedrooms and a bath were added.

In 1957 the alumnae chapter completely redecorated the living room and smoker and added new furniture to make our pink abode the loveliest of sorority houses. D D D

There are other qualities in Mary's personality which have not yet been presented but which have endeared her to all Gamma Phis in the area. She is an individual with an originality, a casualness, and a rare sense of humor that belong to her and her alone.))

She Teaches Small Fry to Fly High

From books to big top reads the biography of petite 23-year old Faye Moses, ace aerialist of the Florida State University circus, who founded St. Petersburg's Flying Circus. Now senior supervisor for the City Recreation Department, Faye directs playground activities, coordinates parades, and coaches her youthful charges in circus techniques in her leisure hours.

In her first year with the Recreation Department, Faye spearheaded the inauguration of the circus. She credits FSU Circus coach Jack Haskins with the excellent training that has enabled her to build a circus of performers from 6 to 21 years old. With his help she acquired the necessary ropes, nets, and trapeze for St. Petersburg's Circus, and built it from the ground up almost single handed.

St. Petersburg had its first glimpse of the circus in July 1958. Everywhere people of the community talked about the girl behind the big show. Its smashing success established the Flying Circus as another outstanding St. Petersburg attraction. The second big performance occurred during the city-wide Festival of States in March 1959. In daring feats and dashing costumes, this was an even greater success than the premier performance.

All the glitter and glamour of the big top is part of the youth circus. The costumes are made by parents of the performers, and Faye Moses works out the routines with her youthful charges.

Her flying act boasts of the only girl catcher in the entire world, and a show-topper is flirtatious 6-year-old Terry Caveratta who flies through the air without blinking her big brown eyes.

A pyramid bicycle act, ballerinas on trapeze, a rola board, and clowns com-

plete the circus program.

Meaningful physical training, a new interest, and a drop off in juvenile delinquency have been the outcomes of the circus movement.

Faye a member of Beta Mu chapter at Florida State University was an aerial star during her four years with "Flying High." When asked if she came from a circus family, she replied, "Goodness no! My mother gets dizzy when she stands up on a chair! Dad is a business man and my two sisters in grammar school and high school aren't circus-minded. At FSU, the show bug got hold of me. All the boys and girls tried out for the circus, so I did and I made it."

She had her doubts about teaching, but has found it a more rewarding experience than performing. Many of her pupils want to work for "good grades" so that they too may take part in FSU's circus when they are eligible for college.

Such a big job, means that everyday holds an exhausting schedule for Faye. She commutes from her home in Tampa and works from 8 A.M. 'til noon organizing games, music, arts and crafts on 19 playgrounds. At 2 P.M. she reports to one of the three local youth centers where she coaches her charges each afternoon and three nights per week.

Faye Moses and her "Flying Circus" have been a wholesome influence on the youth of St. Petersburg. D D D

"Rhode Island's representative in the 1959 National Cherry Blossom Festival is eighteen year old Naomi Harrison . . ." the announcer's voice crooned. As the band played the Rhode Island state song, Naomi started across the ballroom of the Sheraton-Park Hotel. The spotlight gleamed on her light brown hair and glowed softly on her full white gown with its enormous pink bow trailing to the floor. As she took her place on the stage with the fifty-one other Cherry Blossom Princesses she could hardly believe that only twenty-four hours ago she had been listening to the droning of the plane that had separated her from the Ohio Wesleyan University campus and her Monday afternoon chemistry lab.

Naomi is a Freshman at Alpha Eta Chapter of Gamma Phi Beta, a popular and energetic girl whose sparkling blue eyes give away her mischievous personality. She is interested in dramatics and dressmaking. Naomi's father, Gordon F. Harrison, holds the position of Chief Clerk and Counsel for the Senate Committee on Rules and Administration. Thus her family is living in Washington, while their home is in Cranston, Rhode Island.

On Wednesday, April 8, she was rushed off to a luncheon and sophisticated fashion show at the Mayflower Hotel. As one of its recent culture programs, Beta Mu and the Tallahassee alumnae presented Mrs. Meyer Nimkoff (Frances Lucas) to the members and their guests. Mrs. Nimkoff (shown left with part of her collection) has recently returned from a six-month trip to India where her husband, Meyer, had a Fulbright assignment to the University of Delhi. The following account of this fascinating talk was prepared by Mrs. George Wajdowicz (Betty Ann King, Florida State alumna).

A Treasured Collection from India

Handicrafts of India are of special interest to a person interested in the arts because they represent a highly sophisticated art and a primitive art.

India is noted especially for textiles. For centuries the art of weaving flourished in India and today, almost every known kind of looming of cotton, silk, or wool is to be found in India. Some of the major forms of textiles are the woven design, the block print designs, and the embroidered designs. All of these textiles are represented in Mrs. Nimkoff's collection. Of particular interest is the Naga Shawl of bright red and other vivid colors. This shawl is worn by the men in this primitive tribe. Mrs. Nimkoff plans on using this exquisite piece as a table cover.

Like the shawl, Mrs. Nimkoff planned a special use for each of the items she brought back with her. However, she could not use these items as she intended them to be used while she remained in India as this would have been insulting to the people of that country.

India claims to be the inventor of the art of silk weaving even though most people usually consider China to be. The Cashmere, and the Cotton of Kashmir are also world famous.

The metal work of India includes the world famous brass ware, copper, and beautiful silver and gold wrought jewelry. One of the examples of this work was represented in copper

plates and brass goblets. Each child in India has his own plate and goblet. If the child is Hindu, they will be made of brass, if Moslem, of copper. Glass bracelets, oxidized copper bracelets with silver inlays, and silver jewelry with enamel finish were beautiful and showed varied craftsmanship.

The walnut wood carving of Kashmir and the sandalwood of South India represent another craft. As a decorative feature, the lotus is often found, especially in the carvings. Ivory inlay in wall plaques was represented by an array of colorful parakeets in wood and ivory.

Other forms of folk art displayed were basketry, ceramic beads, bells which represent bullocks, horses, goats, and other domestic animals. Although the Indian would not use these beads for jewelry, Mrs. Nimkoff expects to use hers for personal adornment. Highly ornamented and designed leather sandals are yet another handicraft and one which especially delights the western visitor.

Mrs. Nimkoff visited in many out-of-the-way places in India. On some occasions she was the first white woman to enter some villages. It was in such places as these that she gathered many of the articles displayed. Each item was carefully selected and chosen with a special use in mind. She says that she could select with care because of the free time on her hands while her husband was busy studying and lecturing in India.

On recommendation of the 1958 Convention a new bill-form has been devised so that alumnae who cannot participate in alumnae chapter activities because no such chapter exists nearby may pay their dues and support the philanthropic projects of the sorority. In this issue, also, many of your questions regarding the Gamma Phi Beta Foundation are answered. You will find this a project most worthy of your interest and support.

To Grand Council and Province VIII the Fall of 'Fifty-Nine means a period of intensive planning for the 1960 Convention to be held at the Edgewater Gulf Hotel, Gulfport, Mississippi next June.

Initial preparations were made at the Province VIII Conference in Nashville in the spring. Further details will be decided at Fall Council Meeting. Our Southern alumnae with traditional hospitality extend a most cordial welcome to visit them in the land of magnolias and the Cherokee rose, of tropical breezes and summer sunshine. Plan now to come to Convention in 1960! We'll be so happy to see you.

What is it?

The Gamma Phi Beta Foundation is a trust fund for educational and charitable purposes, sponsored by Gamma Phi Beta Sorority Inc. but incorporated separately from it. Its funds are maintained entirely apart from the General Fund, Endowment-Crescent and Camp Funds.

How did it originate?

Through the years, a large group of members had requested such a trust fund to which tax deductible gifts and/or bequests might be made. It was formed on recommendation of the Financial Structure Committee. At the 48th Gamma Phi Beta Convention in June, 1958, the delegates authorized its incorporation.

How will it operate?

It will be operated by the Board of Trustees, a governing body separate from that of the sorority. The trustees are:

The primary objective is to recognize any student who is deserving of financial help, through a scholarship grant or other appropriate prize or award. The Articles of Incorporation appeared in their entirety in the May 1959 issue of the *Crescent*.

How can YOU help?

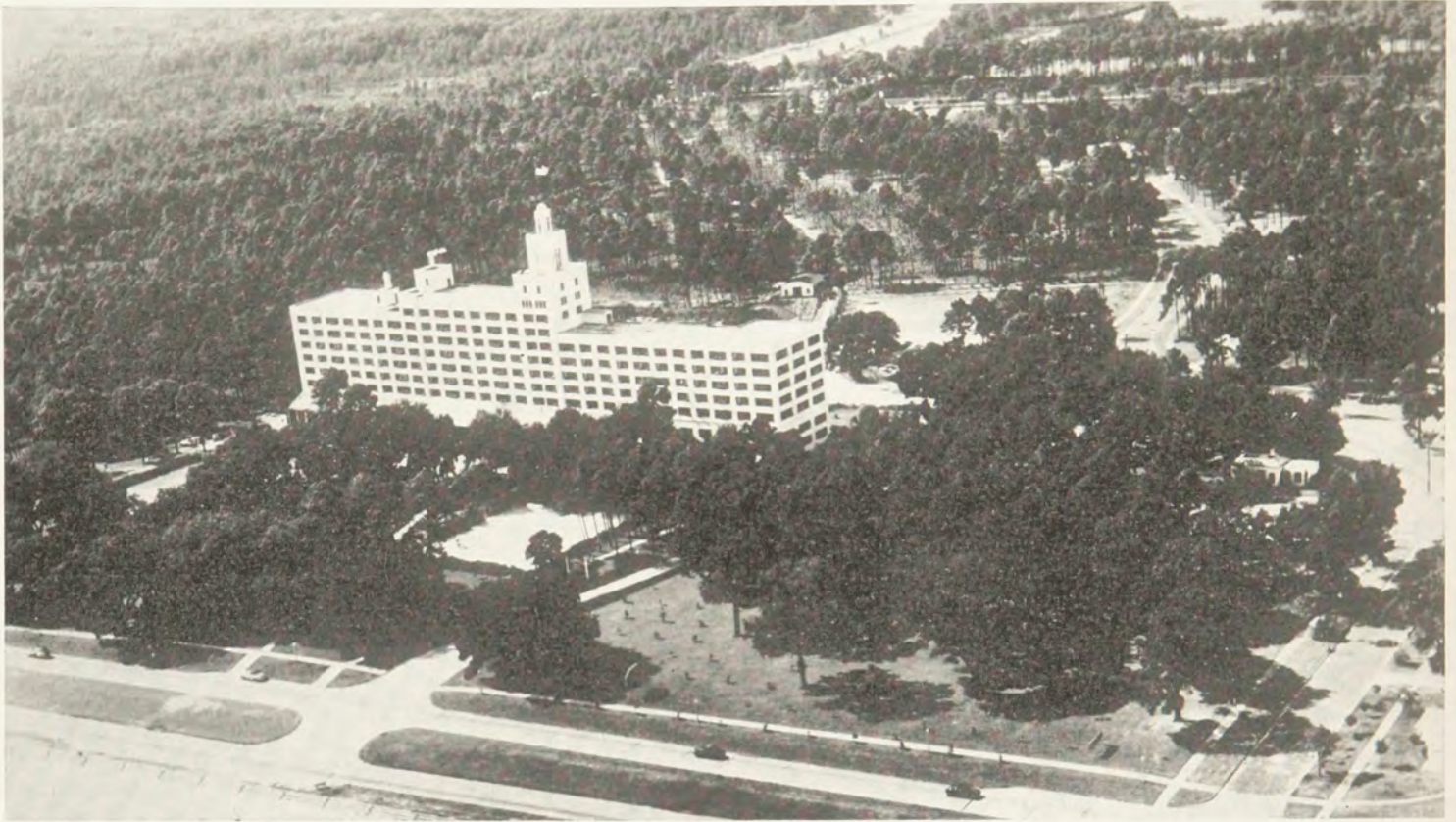

In Memoriam

LAURA LATTIMER GRAHAM

Laura Lattimer Graham's long service record in Gamma Phi Beta was one of distinction and devotion. It began as a member of Alpha Chapter and continued until her death April 1, 1959. Laura Lattimer graduated from Syracuse University in 1900. She was a Phi Beta Kappa and ranked first in her class. In 1906 she came to New York City where she taught history in Far Rockaway High School. In 1909 she married Dr. William Graham and they made their home in Brooklyn.

Mrs. Graham was elected Vice President of Gamma Phi Beta at the Convention in 1924, the year we celebrated our Golden Jubilee. She succeeded to the presidency when Grace Howard Smith, who was elected Grand President, had to resign on account of illness. She was elected president at the 1926 Convention. Her regime saw the establishment of Central Office, with its first full-time secretary. She also helped THE CRESCENT to gain financial status. During her term of office Gamma Phi Beta expanded across the border into Canada, where three chapters were installed (Alpha Alpha, Alpha Kappa, and Alpha Lambda).

Mrs. Graham was greatly interested in the sorority and wanted others to enjoy the benefits from the association as much as she had. She had a keen sense of loyalty and a lively humor. She set high standards and refused to sacrifice them. She was always eager to have Gamma Phi progress and be a leader. She was an active member of New York City alumnae chapter for over fifty years. After her husband's death she moved to Albany, but kept in touch with chapter affairs. She was an honored guest in 1951 when the chapter celebrated its fiftieth birthday. She leaves to all Gamma Phis a legacy of fidelity and accomplishments. May we ever be true to her ideals.

In February 1959, the Vancouver Camp Board members were extremely pleased to make the inaugural award of the Dosh Stafford Ring. The Board was aware of the intrinsic value of the ring and its noble history.

Dosh Shorney Stafford was to all intents and purposes, re-

sponsible for establishing the Canadian Camp of Gamma Phi Beta. She investigated the needs of such a camp in this area and the possibilities of its formation. She set up the framework and presented it to convention where approval was granted. After a great deal of hard work and worry, the local Gamma Phi Beta Children's Camp came into being, with Dosh as the first camp director. The camp opened in 1932 and was a complete success thanks to the perseverance and vitality of Dosh. A mere thank you to this wonderful girl seemed entirely inadequate so, as a token of appreciation, the Vancouver chapter presented Dosh with a sorority ring—a silver crescent on a black Onyx—after the first camp opened. This hard working gal has continued to slave for camp in ways too many to list and is admired and loved by all.

Dosh has worn this ring with a great deal of pleasure and pride, mingled with many, many fond memories. As befitting her generous character, she wishes to share her pleasure in the ring and have others who have made an outstanding contribution to camp, receive an award.

As you see, the Dosh Stafford Ring holds a very high standard and as such, it shall be awarded annually to an active or an alumna, in the Vancouver area. A committee has been set up to record the qualifications for the awarding of the ring.

This year, the ring was presented with unanimous approval to Beth Evans Robertson. There is neither time nor paper to list Beth's many contributions to the camp. But for the past few years, Beth's name and the camp have been synonymous. For example, Beth recently supervised the construction of two large buildings for camp. Which is no small chore when you

The holly should be kept in a cool place until ready for use. When out of the box it should be *treated like cut flowers*, clipping the stems and displaying in bowls filled with fresh water.

To assure fresh holly for the holiday season it is suggested that you specify your delivery date after *December 1, 1959*.

Beta Kappa Follies Provide Fun and Funds

Never underestimate the power of women is an old cliché, but we, of Beta Kappa, think it should be changed to never underestimate the power of a Gamma Phi Woman. Exactly ten years ago this year, Gamma Phi Beta colonized here at Arizona State (Tempe); and that same year, the Gamma Phis started their annual follies. It is still an annual affair, entirely produced and directed by us, with the girls themselves acting.

As past director of these follies, I felt obliged to write this article in hopes that one of our sixty-five sister chapters might be interested in the idea.

The follies were originally a carnival held in Moeur Activity Building, the women's physical education building. This carnival consisted of booths, games and various entertainment. But, as the girls discovered that it wasn't necessary for them to possess inborn talent to entertain people, so their little show grew. Now, it is a social highlight in the Valley of the Sun.

Although we don't know what the first Gamma Phis at Arizona State used their profits for, in recent years it has gone toward our "dream building," a house of our own. At present, we are living in Palo Verde Hall, the "sorority dorm," with each sorority having their own floor.

Let me elaborate further on the profit factor . . . we have netted as much as \$800 on our follies!

Let us start at the beginning and unravel our secret of success which has given many a Broadway producer an ulcer. A year previous, and soon after we have completed one follies, the executive officers of Beta Kappa appoint a director for the coming school year.

Immediately, this director decides and reserves the place for the big event. We have previously used the school union, Moeur Activity and Cosner Auditorium. The latter has proven the best due to their excellent stage and dressing room facilities. It is also located on campus and easily accessible to "walking" students. This building has to be reserved almost a year in advance and the rental charge is \$100.

This first step being completed, the director usually does research over the summer obtaining new and original ideas for the coming show. In the past, we have always had one main theme such as "Out of This World," "Big Top" and this year, "Dizzyland."

A co-director is responsible for any paper work that is in-

volved. For example, we have found that selling ads to local merchants provides us with considerable profit and a nice program.

The follies have always been held three nights: Thursday, Friday and Saturday. On Tuesday of this important week, the first dress rehearsal is held. No director is ever disillusioned when this goes badly. What with co-ordinating lights, curtains, music, tapes, acts and people, it is quite a feat. The next night, Wednesday, it usually goes much better. By Thursday night, we are a show and a good one at that. Sometimes due to things beyond our control, Thursday night might be referred to as our "dress rehearsal." But this is accepted with good cheer and grins follow goofs as we plod through our masterpiece.

As a rule Thursday night leaves something to be desired. Good friends and relatives get the inside tip to come Friday night, our "best night." Nobody can fathom this except perhaps Saturday is a let down where everybody cuts loose and lets go.

Alumnæ are posted at the door collecting tickets, giving out programs, and escorting the theatre-goers to their seats. These girls are in costume whenever possible. The only reserved space in the house is a section roped off for our Desert Valley Alumnæ who come in a body of about fifty each year.

When the house lights dim (this is the only time it is quiet in the dressing rooms), the curtains open and the MC or MCs step out. I must explain that we have tried local personalities and witty boy friends, but the best "femcees" are the ones from our own Beta Kappa.

After the curtain closes on the final act, the Gamma Phis gather en masse on stage for "spontaneous" singing of their favorite Gamma Phi songs. The final act we try to make fan-

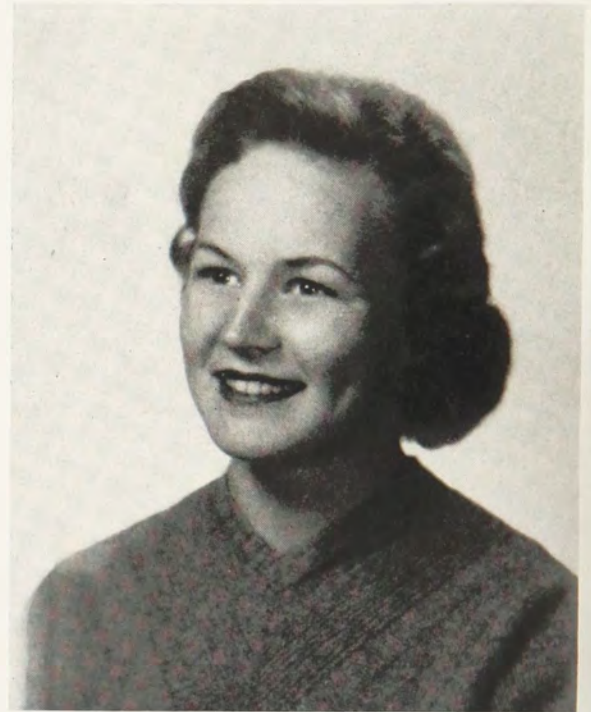

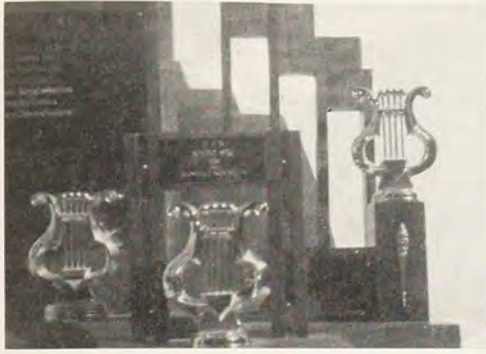

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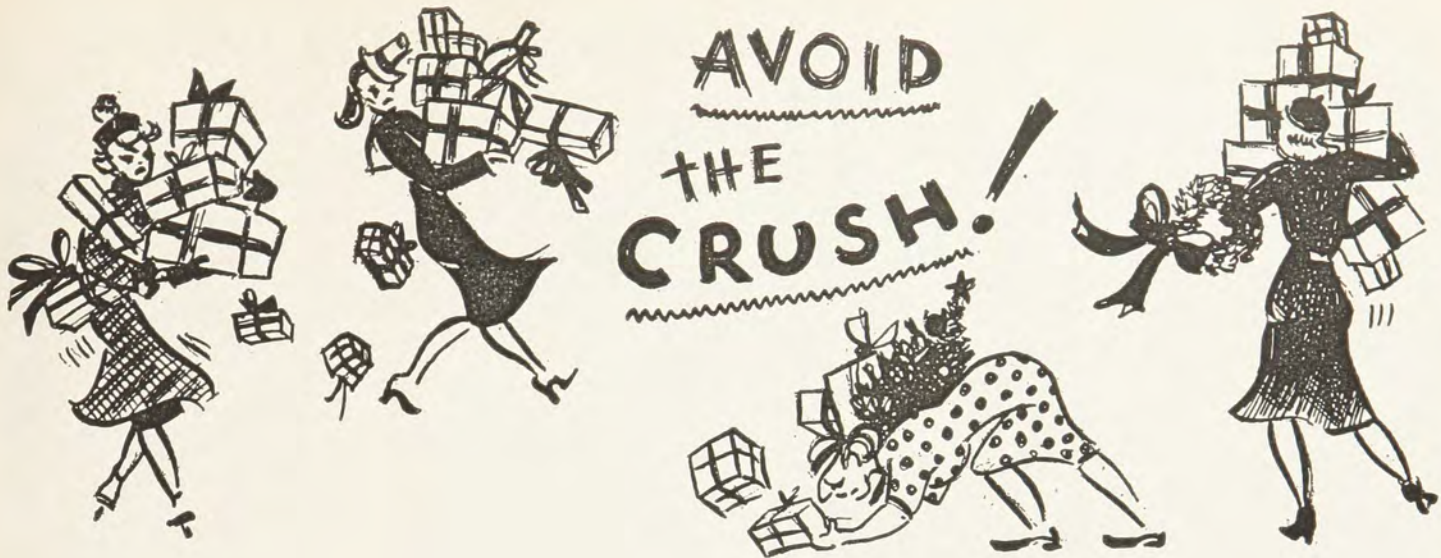
