





Demobilization Be Slow for Army

Hanging Around

Soldiers Apparently to Be Released on Individual Basis; Special Needs Not Considered.

By Sterling F. Green Washington, Sept. 1.—(P)—Debilization of the Army and Navy is an important aspect of reconverting the nation to peace, but it is the one on which probably the least information is available.

The joint chiefs of staff are mum. This much seems certain:

Army demobilization will be slow, and will be done on an individual basis rather than by military units or soldiers' occupations.

There is no evidence that special needs of the economy are being considered. The early release of loggers, for example, as a stimulus to post-war construction, apparently is not contemplated. Instead, a point-system is reportedly being drafted, with points representing number of dependents, length of service, combat duty, and so on. The soldier with the most points goes home first.





World War II goes into its 5th year with the once cocky Japs on the defensive everywhere except in China. Japan's advances in the Pacific, beginning with the Philippines after the Pearl Harbor attack, were rapid. The return, slow at first, began gathering speed with the landings in the Gilberts, Marshalls and Marianas within recent months. New Guinea has been retaken, so have the Solomons with the exception of enemy forces isolated at Bougainville. Raboul and New Ireland, by-passed in the rapid advance, are virtually useless as bases to the enemy and Jap troops there are doomed. Allied Pacific forces are now within striking distance of the homeland of Japan and the Philippines, while B-29 Super-Fortresses, from China bases, blast Japan itself with increasing frequency.




