House Passes Gambling Law

Both the alcohol and teacher bills now go to the senate.

In other legislative action: The senate passed and sent to the governor a bill requiring milk sold after Jan. 1, to display on its container the last date on which it may be sold.

It also passed a bill allowing 300 voters in a town to petition for a referendum if the town's zoning board approved a race track. The bill must go back to the house for concurrence on an amendment that removes appeals from zoning board decisions.

Opponents of this section said it gave teachers a veto over standards they didn't like. However, an amendment that would have given complete power in setting standards to school boards was defeated by voice vote.

State Budget Net Increase Pegged At 6.68 Per Cent

HARTFORD (AP) — Connecticut's \$1.2 billion budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1 represents a net increase in appropriations of 6.68 per cent over the current year, next year's budget represents a 10.85 per cent spending increase because of \$9.9 million in unspent appropriations this year.

The largest single portion of the new budget, \$49 million or slightly more than 34 per cent, will go for education, libraries and museums.

The next largest portion, \$32 million or approximately 24 per cent, will go for health and welfare.

Debt service, including payment on Connecticut's more than \$200 million deficit, will take more than \$150 million or approximately 12 per cent of the budget.

The budget bill also changes the method of financing the deficit and the use of unappropriated surplus in the General Fund.

The first change allows the state treasurer to renew bonds issued to finance the deficit, if it requires the state to pay off the deficit over a 10-year period at a rate of more than \$4 million a year, as now.

It also establishes a sinking fund for deficit payments, the net earnings of which will be returned to the General Fund.

The other change alters the law which requires that any surplus be applied to debt service for the deficit. The new law allows surpluses to be carried over to finance General Fund operations in later years.

There is a one-year lag, which means that the surplus from the current budget can't be used until after July 1, 1974.

It is this change that has Democratic lawmakers particularly upset. They contend it will allow Republican Gov. Thomas J. Meskill to stockpile funds for use during an election year, allowing him to lower taxes or increase services at a time calculated to benefit him at the polls.

The rest of the bill goes into

effect July 1, but the final clause allows this change to take effect immediately upon passage.

Here are some of the budget's highlights. (The first figures indicate the amount total appropriations were increased over the current year. Figures in parentheses are the total 1973-74 appropriations for each agency.)

Department of Consumer Protection—\$117,000 including \$35,000 for 12 new staff positions (\$1,800,000).

Department of Environmental Protection—\$98,000 including \$55,000 for 43 new positions (\$8,000,000).

Office of Public Health—\$192,000 including \$50,000 to establish five new V.D. clinics (\$18,200,000).

Office of Mental Retardation—\$1,944,000 including \$1,096,364 for 69 new positions (\$1,428,000).

Petition Refiled Over Landfill

A second petition opposing the purchase of 20.4 acres for a landfill site on Rt. 6 has been turned over to the town clerk by Francis Sellers, James Carey and Albert Hadigian.
The petitioners have asked that a special town meeting be called to rescind the vote of a special town meeting April 10 to purchase the disposal area land for \$29,000.

Town counsel Robert Haggerty ruled the first petition invalid because there was no prior approval and it did not have circular or acknowledgment and, in general, did not comply with the general statutes nor the town charter.

Haggerty said the first petition did not clearly explain what the proposed action was to be taken.

The second petition contains 150 names, according to Hadigian. He added, "We now feel we have complied with all the necessary provisions in petitioning."
He said it is the hope of the petitioners that the town will rescind the vote.

"We hope the town will establish a moratorium until a complete study can be made or referendum to a land disposal system offered by the state and an investigation is made as to other possible sanitary or waste disposals," Hadigian said.

If any challenge is made by the town council, Hadigian said, the petitioners would like to have the opportunity to speak to that challenge.
The town clerk will submit the petition to Haggerty, and if

it is declared valid the next step will be to verify all signatures. In declaring the first petition invalid, Haggerty said it appeared that some persons signed more than one name, also making the petition invalid. This was denied by the three men.

If everything is proper, a town meeting must be held not less than 10 or more than 30 days from the date of filing, which was Monday.

The reason for the petition, the men said, was that on the night of the April 10 meeting, there were two other meetings in town and they felt more persons would have turned out if there had been no conflicting meetings.

Doctor Reports Break-In

NEW YORK (AP) — The Manhattan offices of two doctors who treated John F. Kennedy were hit by burglars shortly before the 1960 Democratic National Convention, one of the doctors said Thursday.

Dr. Eugene J. Cohen said his office was broken into, and medical charts were removed from a file cabinet and scattered about.
"It was obvious they were after a chart," Dr. Cohen said, because other valuable things in the office were not disturbed.
"When the detectives asked me who I was treating, I thought of Sen. Kennedy, because his name was in the news."

"I became convinced it was Kennedy's chart they were after the following day or so when Dr. Janet Travell's outer office was broken open."

The burglars did not get Kennedy's chart from Cohen's office. He had filed it under "another letter far from K."
Dr. Travell also was treating Kennedy. The burglars failed to get into her office because of a security inner door, Cohen said.
Cohen said he did not know who did it, and would not speculate on who it might have been.

He denied a published report that quoted him as having said it was done in a style similar to the burglary of the office of a psychiatrist who treated Dr. Daniel Ellsberg, the Pentagon Papers defendant.

Asked if he now thought it might have been Nixon agents who broke into his offices in 1960, Cohen said: "I don't know. It would all be speculation. I think they've got enough trouble."

Kennedy's health was an issue in 1960. His Democratic opponents circulated rumors that he suffered from Addison's disease, which affects the adrenal glands. Dr. Cohen and Dr. Travell signed a report stating that Kennedy was in good health.

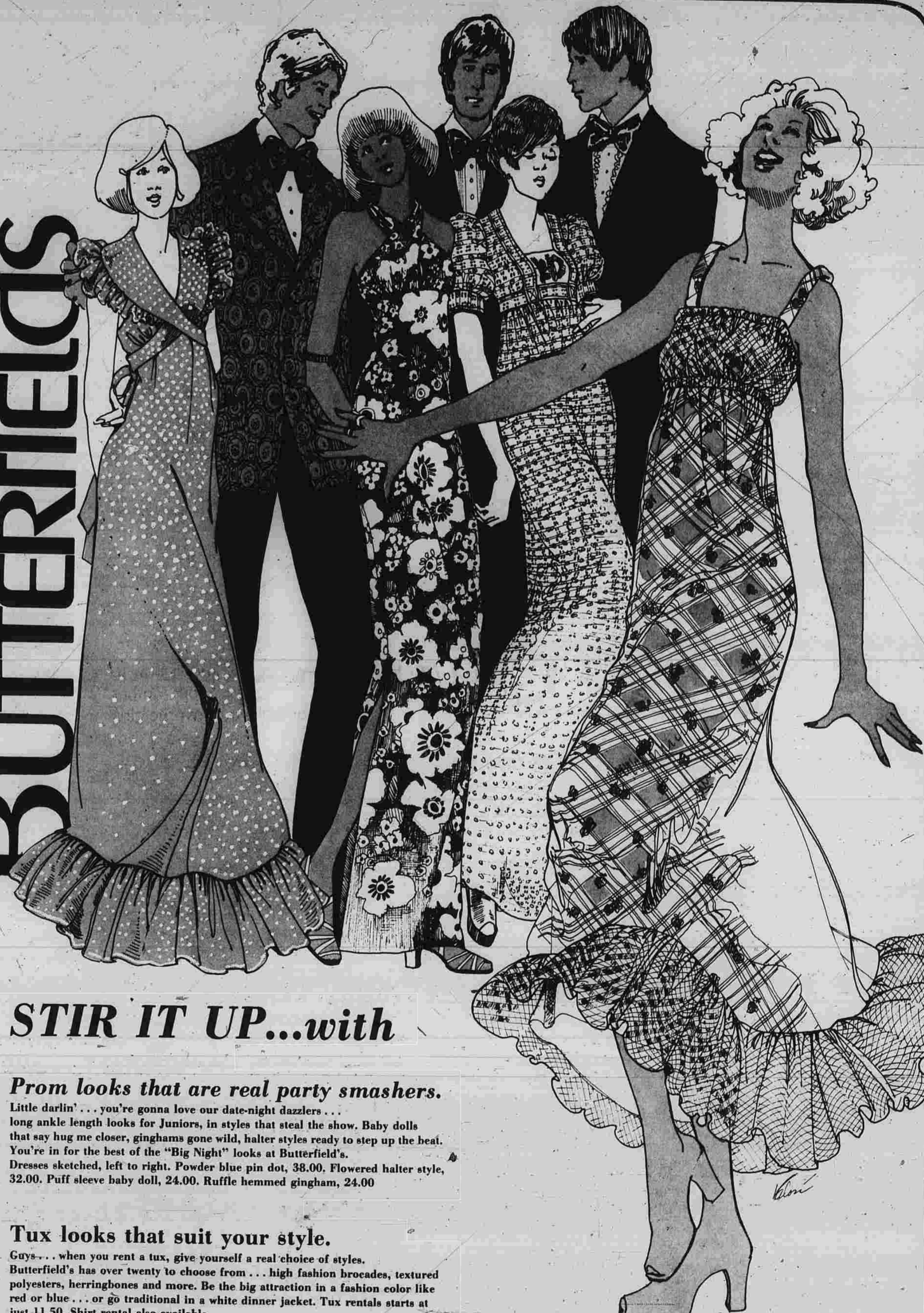
Medical Supplies Shipped

Competing in Men's World Is Lonely, Campus Minister Says

By CATHY YARBROUGH

ATLANTA (AP) — After receiving a Master of Divinity degree from Columbia Theological Seminary, Caroline Leach, 25, didn't particularly want to take charge of a church. "I had some thinking to do, so I decided a campus environment would be the ideal situation," said Miss Leach, a native of Chatham, Tenn. With an eye on the female population, she selected Georgia Tech because of her past experience as one of the few women swimming in a school of males. "It's very frustrating for a female to compete with men. A woman is socially isolated if she tries to be a leader in the incidents of measles in Connecticut and the nation. The Connecticut Department of Health has officially recommended that children have repeat vaccinations, and this clinic therefore will be available for other children who did receive immunization under 1 year or 2 year or with immune globulin. Rubella is also a major concern with the emphasis here on protecting the unborn child. When this infection is acquired by a woman early in pregnancy, particularly the first 3 months, fetal infection with subsequent abnormalities often develops. Vaccination for rubella is recommended for all children between 1 year and puberty, and in Manchester it is a prerequisite for school entrance (as is measles vaccine). With these facts in mind this clinic will have its effect to slightly increase the immunity.

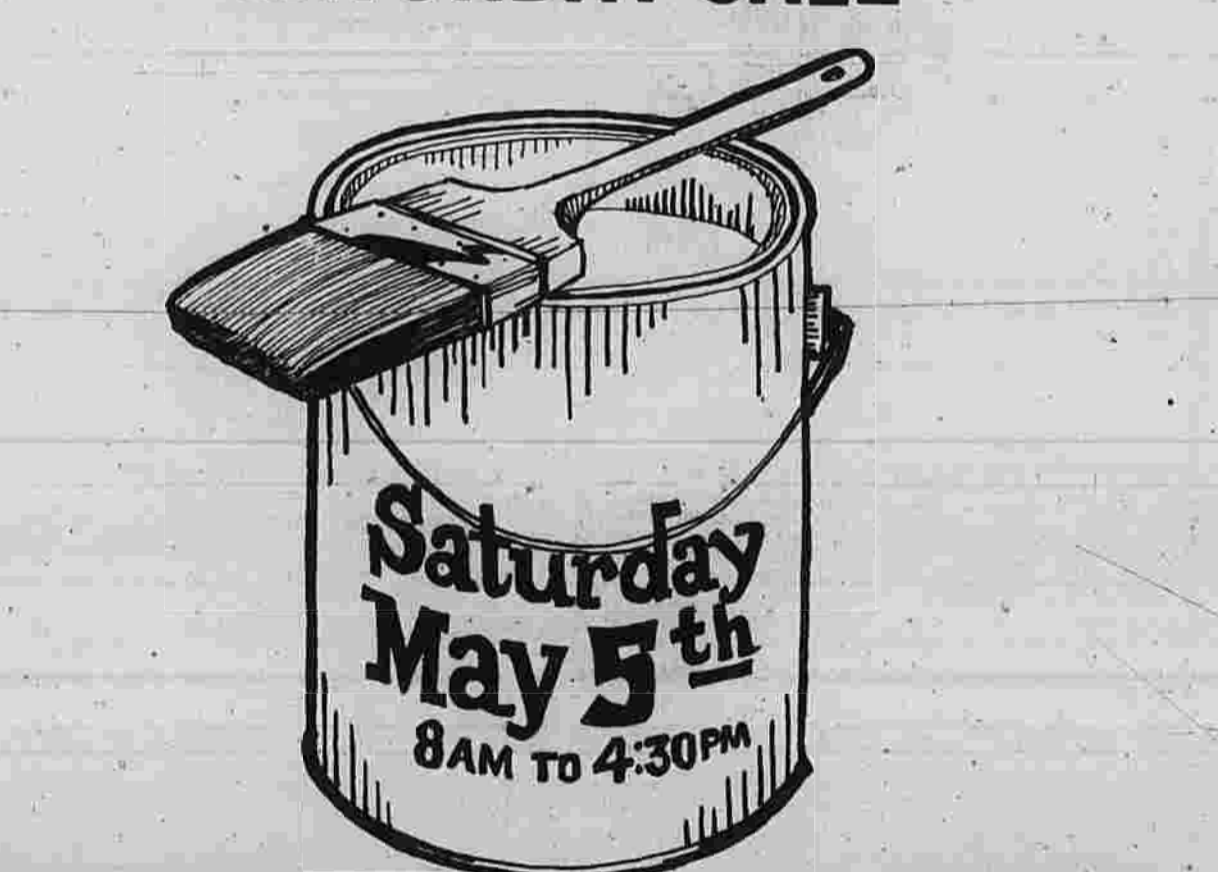
