# **Tony's Tackle Box**

Sport Fishing in the Pacific Northwest

# "The chinook salmon are coming! The chinook salmon are coming!"

Before launching into a smorgasboard of salmon fishing options during the month of August, imagine Paul Revere, riding his horse in high gear overdrive, shouting "The chinook salmon are coming! The chinook salmon are coming!"

In this column, during the last two months, I have spent significant time and words revealing my excitement about the chinook salmon forecasts bound for the coast, Columbia River, coastal bays, the Strait of Juan de Fuca and practically Dick's Burger fast food stop in Seattle. To date, the forecasts have been accurate and frankly, salmon fishing from mid-June through July has been incredible. I know, as my personal summer chinook fishing jijad has been going 24/7.

As you may recall, the hatcheryonly chinook fishery ignited at coastal ports in mid-June. Thinking back further in time, to 1981, or maybe 1982, the king salmon were just outside the surf line from the north jetty at Westport, north to Ocean Shores in 30-50 feet of water. The technique was primitive in anticipation of a hook-up. Seventeen "pulls" (two feet to a pull) and put the rod in the rod holder. Crush! And more crush! One after another, the rod tip buried into the water as the king salmon attacked like piranha in the Amazon. It was absolutely amazing and I'll newer forget it. Mint bright, fat 15-20 pound footballs, bound for the Columbia River, gorg-

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ing on massive schools of anchovy.

June of 2012 was re-living that memory again as thousands of Sooty Shearwater birds covered the ocean surface, trying to get at zillions of anchovy. Underneath the birds, chinook salmon were feasting on the anchovy too. Indeed it was one of the best ocean openers in a long, long time.

King salmon were thick as fleas on a dog's back between Tatoosh and Waddah Islands, where the Strait of Juan de Fuca begins at Neah Bay. The game was on and the spectacular chinook salmon fishing continued through the end of the month.

On July 1\*, the Strait of Juan de Fuca opened for their annual hatchery, fin-clipped only chinook fishery. Ka-boom! Sekiu and Port Angeles were lights out. At Port Angeles on opening day, 49 boats were checked by the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife and those boats brought 73 king salmon to the launch ramp. Ediz Hook and "the Humps" were on fire.

To the west, at Sekiu, 95 boats returned to the docks with 126 king salmon. Big, fat footballs, stuffed with baitfish and putting it on like the greatest hot dog eating contest of all time. It's been an incredible salmon fishing summer already and there is more to come.

From a historical and contemporary perspective, August is shaping up to be the biggest salmon fishing enchilada of the entire year. King salmon will be peaking in many areas followed closely by this year's coho salmon return. The ocean, lower Columbia, Willapa Bay, Strait of Juan de Fuca and north Sound will compete for the summer highlight show. In other words, the options are incredible.

I have the gunpowder to send you north, west or south. East is not

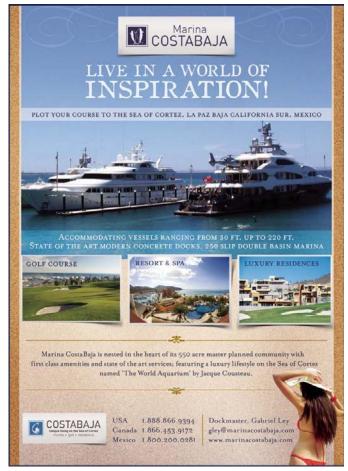
an option. To the north, along the Strait of Juan de Fuca from Sekiu east to Port Angeles, the march of king salmon will peak early in the month, until the king salmon season closes for retention on August 15th. Remember, the coho salmon will be right behind the chinook.

To the west, Neah Bay, La Push and Westport should be awesome. Ilwaco has the potential, especially during the first two weeks of Au-

gust, to melt the lighthouse right off not matter. I like the third week of the Cape Disappointment, at the mouth of the Columbia River. They'll be changing the name at the end of August to Cape Nirvana.

To the south, the last two weeks of August will be the big show in the lower Columbia. The king salmon run, which lit this summer on fire from Neah Bay to Ilwacoduring the last two months will manifest itself in the lower Columbia as two thirds of a million king salmon round the corner into the river. Mercy! Tides do month as it's paid huge dividends for this angler during the last few years. Fishing below and above the Megler-Astoria Bridge will be as good as king salmon fishing gets anywhere on the planet. I am so there.

Immediately following the Columbia River big show, I turn my focus onto Willapa Bay. As many anglers know, I have a hang up about Willapa Bay since I started fishing there every August dating back into the mid-80's. Big kings in

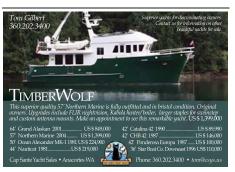


10-20 feet of water is my definition of excitement. I fish the marker line, from Marker #2 east as far as Marker #26 on the soft flood tides. Big tides tend to stir the variety of grasses in the Bay and can affect, in a negative way, the ability to hook king salmon. I like the tides and timing, during the last week of August.

To be successful at Willapa Bay, it is critical to keep your bait (herring, whole or plug cut) one feet off the deck, regardless of depth. Do not be discouraged when they aren't biting. There will always be a bite immediately before the high water and often during the approach to low slack. Shooting ducks in a barrel, baby. The salmon fishing jihad continues!

Finally, I would be remiss in not reporting on the first full month of Dungeness crab fishing in Hood Canal and Puget Sound. WDFW crab biologists predicted good crab fishing and I concur that it's been a very good July. August catches should continue to be healthy until the summer season concludes on Labor Day weekend. My observations here in south Puget Sound is that the crab population appears to be good and the size of the crab is impressive. I had two huge Dungeness pass me on the water riding a Harley this past weekend. I am talking here about big crab!

Isn't it great to be alive? We live in a wonderful place and the salmon fishing this summer has been as good as it's ever been. Excuse me while I put on my August salmon fishing jihad uniform. It's show time! See you on the water. NWY

# There's no App for that

"Once you have one, there's no going back."

"You'll wonder how you ever lived without one."

"It's my brain."

"It's the future."

"Who needs paper?"

"You can do anything from a pad or smart phone."

Theld out as long as I could.
Really, I did. As much as I coveted my neighbor's iPhone, I recoiled at the thought of giving my cell phone carrier ANOTHER monthly chunk of money. I finally succumbed when the relentless smart phone/tablet cabal wore me down. And, after a few weeks of use, I've decided that while I could happily live without my 'Droid, and

intend on doing so someday, for now it's a useful tool. As will be the iPad or tablet I'll get someday.

Then an email landed my inbox (on both on my smartphone and computer of course) singing the praises of the Go2Beach "App" to help meenjoy the coasts and beaches of Washington. I downloaded. Hey, it's free, right?

Sorry to my friends at the Department of Ecology, but even though there were loads of information "at the touch of a button," it just didn't do it for me as a smartphone app. Maybe I don't get it, but I'd rather read about it ahead of time on my computer (https://fortress.wa.gov/ecy/coastalatlas/tools/PublicAccess.aspx) and then go visit the actual places instead of

figuring things out on a screen en route. So far in my limited app-time I've missed as much looking at that little screen as I've seen. My plan for Go2Beach and other apps of that ilk is to check out the places on a screen that's bigger than a phone, then give the actual real place all my attention when I get there.

### The Apps have it

This all got me to thinking about all the cool things we boaters can do with smart phones, and all the things we can't. Despite my occasional curmudgeonly dig, it's all very exciting.

So far nobody's saying a smart phone can replace your boat's navigation system, and they probably never will, but there are some really useful and serious apps that may serve as good backups.

Navigation and charts. Mobile phone navigation apps are ubiquitous, and proper boating navigations apps are becoming front and center. The key here is that proper, updated marine charts must be the backbone of any system. Some systems allow downloading of charts onto your phone so that the navigation software works fine out of cell phone range.

Calling. Yes, the smart phone is a phone good for making emergency calls. For some time now, prudent mariners have cell phones on their short list of communications devices. And with your smart phone revealing your lat/long, it's even more relevant.

Weather. There are plenty of weather apps out there. Find some

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you like and cross-check what NOAA has to say.

**Tides.** Paper tide books are pretty nice, but if your phone is handy and the tide book is buried in the nav table somewhere, this will be one of your favorite apps.

Compass. There may now be more than 1.6 zillion ways to find out your course, but having it available on your phone is definitely a good backup. (I'll always like looking at bouncing compass card, it seems a lot more real than a digital output.)

**Inclinometer.** If you feel the need to know *exactly* how much you're heeling.

**Speed.** Knowing speed is vital, and why not have one more backup?

AIS. This is probably my favorite, so I'll go ahead and give up the brand name, "marinetraffic.com." It tells you what ships, yachts and others are showing up on AIS. This AIS isn't nearly as efficient and helpful as it is on your chart plotter, but it's fun to see who's on the water. Where's the ferry you ask as you wait in line? Ask the phone. Apps for iPhone and Android.

**Documents.** Storing or accessing documents, ship's papers and manuals can be a challenge. The smart phone saves a lot of space onboard!

There are some nifty administrative apps to keep a log, track maintenance, record fuel usage and the like. In my experience, the problem is getting in the habit of recording those things, not the technology of pen and paper.

There are some apps that may not be quite as "serious" as the ones listed above, but can be great fun or useful onboard.

Emails and messaging. Of course, how can we live without them? Sadly, it seems we can't.

Logging a course. Runners, bikers and hikers use smart phone trackers to record their adventures, and so can boaters. These are loads of fun to review afterward and show your friends.

#### Games, movies, music, books, photos and videos

Flashlight. If you haven't already discovered it, your smart phone has a great LEDflashlight for finding that lost screw in the drawer without having to go find the flashlight first

Friend mapper/finder. This is another fun one. If you can coordinate with your boating buddies, you can all see each other's position at any given time. For that yacht club rendezvous it would be great.

Boating ramps. If you have no plan in mind, and are driving around with your boat in tow, there's an app to find a ramp.

Whales. There's even an app for helping avoiding hitting one of the few remaining right whales. In addition to basic information, the app provides real-time updates on whale locations so the whales, and you, can avoid collisions.

And for my friends in the sailboat racing community, smart phones allow you to find the race results before you get in your car to go home and vicariously enjoy those ocean races that you didn't get to go on.

This all is just scratching the surface of what these amazing devices can do. I'm sure there's much more and I hope some alert readers will clue us all in. What's more, there will be lots more.

#### Worth Noting

The smart phone 3G/4G/ WhateverG claim to fame is really that you don't need any of those cumbersome wires or WiFi to get connected. Just data plan minutes. But what if you don't have a plan with a lot of data to burn?

Well, once you're in range of Wifi, hey, smart phones are generally smart enough to use it instead of a cell phone connection. Also, if you're in range of Wifi, those old fashioned things called laptops come in quite handy. If you think that, because your home WiFi seems to have trouble reaching the other end of the house, you'll never pull in WiFi at the end of the dock you'd be wrong. Set a hook, though there are fun fishing game apps.

Sting your face with spray.

And a smart phone can't do most of the cool things when it's out of range of cell towers and WiFi.

On balance, looking at a smart phone is time away from looking at the water, the sky, my boat and my companions.

We all know the man or woman who spends as much time engaging with their phone as with the people right in front of them. They're the ones missing out.

I plan on tucking mine away in the chart table and turning it off when I leave the dock. That way, I'll know right where that smart phone is, and have plenty of battery power, if I actually need any of those seri-

And when I get back to the dock I'll turn it on again and it will have all my emails and text messages and voice messages.

That's the plan. I'll hold out as long as I can.

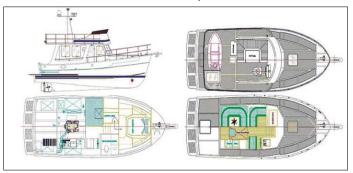

So he bought the 40-foot wooden ketch Windigob from a Portland Yacht Club (OR) buddy to scratch the itch that carried him around the world, then half way around again by the time he turned 80.

A home builder by occupation, Winters could build, fix or invent his way out of any situation, and there was no shortage of opportunities aboard 25-year-old Windjob, his beloved home on water that suffered dismasting, pirate attacks, groundings, gear failures too nu-

merous to mention, and perennial crew problems. Winters navigated by sextant and dead reckoning with a little help from instruments that would be considered rudimentary

by today's standards.
But this Old Salt was never discouraged, never thought of giving up, and always would rather be at

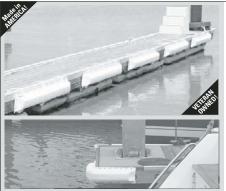

# New 140' motor trimaran is a real "Starship"

## by Peter Marsh

hile Russian oli garchs and Ara sheiks bian amuse selves by building "handy size" passenger ships and claiming they are yachts, there are the first signs of a new movement among the nouveau riche. The goal is to discourage such conspicuous consumption and strive for a greener approach to yachting. A new design that rejects excessive size in favor of a super-efficient hull shape has recently begun (not) making waves in a most unlikely port-Hong Kong

When I wrote about the 132-foot (40m) sailing trimaran Banque Populaire in the February issue, I had no idea that a motor trimaran of similar size was close to completion on the opposite side of the world. At McConaghy Boats' Zhuhai, China production center, the Adastra seems to be the motor-powered equivalent of the French boat that raced around the world in 45 days, since it is also designed for long-range ocean voyaging with up to 14 people on board. (The name "ad astra" is Latin and means to the stars.)

With a length of 140 feet (42.5m) and a remarkably slender main hull, it is as efficient under power as the French boat is under sail. Equipped with a single Caterpillar C18 in the main hull with a maximum output of 1150 hp @ 2300 rpm, it can attain a top speed of 22.5 knots. Throttling back a little, the fuel consumption figures reveal a luxury yacht that can truly claim to be breakthrough: at 17 knots it burns 32 gph, at 13 knots it consumes only 24 gph. Not bad for a 50-ton boat!

#### Breakthrough for British Designer

So I was not surprised to find the wower, Hong Kong shipping magnate Anto Marden had been sailing a trimaran in SE Asian waters for 30 years. He approached the designer of his 45-foot boat, Englishman John Shuttleworth, to turn his ideas for an ocean crusing power tri into reality. This was an amazing opportunity for him to apply the skills he has developed in drawing big fast

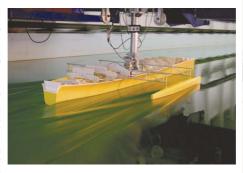

cruising catamarans in the last 20 years to the powerboat sector. In the early 1980's, Shuttleworth designed several successful

multihull racers that outpaced the best French boats. From the start his trimarans had high-volume, fulllength floats and were built using







record time of 1998 in 74 days, 21 hours—a distance of 22,600 nautical miles. (New Zealand architect Craig Loomes also deserves a mention for several wave-piercing motor tris, including the 78-foot 13-ton Earthrace that went across the Pacific then around the world twice before breaking that record in 2008 in 60 days—supposedly to publicize bio-fuels.

Loomes office, now known as LOMOcean Design, was responsible for the 31m solar powered, carbon fiber wave piercer catamaran Turanor Planet Solar. It was built in Germany and recently completed the first (low-speed) circumnavigation using electricity derived solely from photovoltaic cells.

However, the Adastra was to be a departure from these speed machines since Anto (now aged 62) and his wife Elaine wanted comfortable accommodation for 9-10 guests and 4-5 permanent crew. "Adastra is the result of careful design, planning and discussion with

the owners, to meet the needs of a very experienced ocean voyaging couple and their family, and to provide the level of comfort and style that would be expected in a yacht of this class and size," says Shuttleworth. "It takes the power trimaran concept further than has

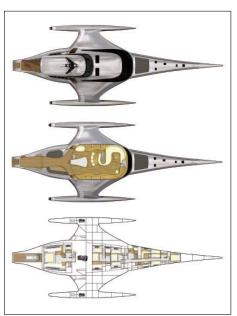

ever been attempted before. No effort has been spared to produce a beautiful yacht that will have low fuel consumption and yet provide excellent sea keeping qualities and luxurious accommodation."

#### Going Where No Man Has Gone Before

Research on the novel hull shape took far more time than expected, since it included tank testing and

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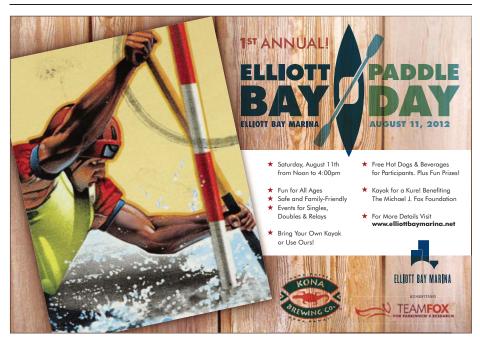
the building of a 6-foot long radiocontrolled model with outrigger that was be raised and lowered independently by radio control to test its performance in waves. By filming the boat in waves of varying height and wavelength he was been able to study the motion in detail and correlate this with the tank tests to find the optimum position of the outrigger, which has a very significant effect on roll damping in this type of vessel.

This was followed by an advanced structural analysis of all the major components in the yacht by Applied Structural Analysis Ltd. in order to achieve the light weight required for very low fuel consumption. The hull is glass/Kevlar foam sandwich, the futuristic superstruc-

ture is carbon fiber with Nomex honeycomb core, and the interior is lightweight oak veneers over honeycomb panels.

To help reduce weight, virtually every aspect of the boat is custom built, including the carbon fiber hatches, portlights, ladders and even hinges. Not surprisingly, this all took more time (5 years) and money (\$15 million) than expected. I think you will agree that it was worth the effort!

#### Design has Plenty of Flare

As in sailing trimarans, the center hull flares dramatically above the waterline to create more accommodation below the main deck. Adastra's 52.5-foot overall beam creates a spacious saloon on the main deck with a lounge area, dining table, and navigation stationall enjoying superb views through a panoramic forward window. However, there is clearly a price to pay for the phenomenal performance and the hull volume and deck area disappears rapidly towards the ends and as you descend into the hull.

So the central deck area is highly radiused and difficult to walk on. Access to the sunbathing area and foredeck is via a door in the window. The aft deck has a sofa and bar area to port and a dining area to starboard, further aft of this there is space for a 16-foot tender and di-

## Patrol One

The only example found of a wavepiercing motor yacht of a reasonable size is the Patrol One from LOMOcean Design, built by Diogene Marine of Mauritius. The 75' vessel operates as a private motor yacht in the Indian Ocean surrounding the island of Mauritius. Of significant importance is the ability of the boat to travel, at moderate to high speeds, the 250 nautical miles of open ocean between the islands of Mauritius and Saint Brandon and to return without refueling.

The shape of the hulls is intended to maximize passenger comfort at high speeds in rough water; the central hull is designed to wave pierce, rather than pitching, rising and falling over oncoming waves. This requirement has been verified by extensive model tests. The construction medium is E-glass, epoxy, foam cored sandwich composite, utilizing stitched E-glass reinforcement materials, epoxy resins and both linear and cross linked PVC foam

Power is by twin Caterpillar C18's rated to 1000hp. The pro-

Patrol One is used chiefly as a day boat, but with overnight capabilities. She is configured with a large external cockpit, an adjacent galley and dinette and a bridge area capable of seating

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rectly below is a garage which can tion method, which proved an imstore a smaller craft. The garage door has been designed to fold out and create a large dive platform.

Below the main deck, the interior of the hull contains a full-width master cabin aft with access from the deck saloon, and two further guest cabins, crew space, and the galley located forward of the engine compartment. The main helm station is in the pilot house above the saloon, where it forms part of the cross-beam structure.

A SiMON<sup>2</sup> integrated ships monitoring system monitors fuel, security, pump sensors, electrical, lights. etc. The vessel has a fully automated fuel-management system with an Alfa Laval fuel cleaner and two 800 gph water makers. A well-known Northwest product is found in the engine room-a 26 kw Northern Lights genset. Each float houses a 110hp Yanmar engine that generates a quiet 36 kw and provides thrust via a folding prop to aid in docking.

The anchoring system is unique with three anchors all driven by carbon fiber drum winches run by hydraulics. The primary anchor is a custom 130kg Bruce style anchor that deploys out of the starboard wing. The bow anchor is 80kg and deploys out of the bow with a carbon fiber arm. The third anchor is 60kg which deploys out of the port wing and will be used as a stern anchor.

Light displacement with stores and crew is 49 tonnes, plus 64.8 tonnes, 3,200 gallons litres of fuel. Additional long-range tanks are available to double the fuel capacity, but the vessel must be operated very cautiously with the added weight. The \$15 million cost may seem high to we working folk, but that much doesn't go very far in the mainstream world of super yachting these days, and the proud owner now has a yacht that will be remembered by everyone who sees it!

It is really amusing to read how the super-vacht journalists have tried to describe this stunning boat without offending their conventional but super-rich audience. They call it "very interesting" or explain that it is only "the fourth largest powered multihull in the world." One gushed that it was an "incredible insight into the future of the luxury yachting lifestyle" presumably in a brave new boating world without a hot tub and gym!

#### McConaghy boats-from Sydney to Zhuhai

McConaghy Boats was founded by John McConaghy in Australia in 1967, building 12, 16, and 18-foot skiffs, Tornado and A - class catamarans, Moths and other high performance dinghies. Early boats were built of plywood, but McConaghy began engineering and perfecting the vacuum-bagged foam sandwich, fibreglass/ Kevlar construcmediate success

As the company's reputation grew, so did McConaghy's research and development into pre-preg composite construction techniques. This earned them a reputation as the best in the business, and they were chosen to build the Farr 40 One Design class, Many maxis currently racing in US waters were built in Sydney. In 2006 the company expanded yet again and opened a 25,000 square foot facility in China.

It has since quadrupled in size and produces vachts ranging from foiling moths to Volvo 70's and America's Cup cats. One of the partners, Mark Evans, has been based principally in China. His direct involvement, along with other key

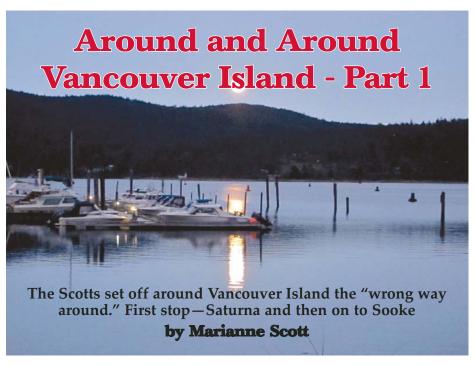

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e raised the sails on June 30 for our first Vancouver Island cir cumnavigation in 17 years. The last time we'd completed the trip was on a previous sailboatit had been our shakedown cruise before setting off for a year-long voyage to French Polynesia. That shakedown taught me a lot about the boat and about myself. The boat was strong and capable but lacked handholds to get below or to traverse to the bow. The aluminum-frame dodger wobbled precariously. I felt precarious as well. And I learned I wanted to be strapped onto the boat in big ocean swells.

This time, though, our plan was less ambitious. Because we 'd decided to take in the "Music by the Sea Festival" in Bamfield, a tiny village off Barkley Sound, we intended to circle the island the "wrong way around," sailing up the west coast first and returning via the Inside Passage.

My husband, David, had been busy preparing various aspects of our Hanse 411 sailboat, Beyond the Stars—changing the jib sheet, trying to get the water maker to work and checking various mechanical aspects, while I'd loaded our cabinets with clothes suitable for every

weather, our bilges with the requisite bottles of red and white, and the lockers with some of the food we'd be hard pressed to find on the west coast. One thing I noted was the amount of space powerblocks and cords for cell phones, computers, cameras, iPods and iPads take up. Photo above - Fishing boats in Sooke Harbour. #### Saturna's Lamb Roast

Although our trip was to go west and north, we started in the Gulf Islands-with Saturna Island our first destination. We'd opted to spend Canada Day-that's July 1, the Canadian equivalent of the July 4th celebration-at the Saturna Island Lamb Roast, It's a fun event with live music, crowds of kids festooned with wash-away maple-leaf tattoos, a beer garden and a happy spirit of patriotism.

Saturna's annual lamb roast has been held for the past 62 years. It's got strong traditions. Richard Blagborne, one of Saturna's most indefatigable volunteers, told me some of the background.

A Scot named Jim Cruickshank spent many years as a gaucho in Argentina before arriving in the Gulf Islands. He came to an early Saturna lamb roast and offered to teach the locals how it was done in Argentina. He explained that South American cowboys would spend days in the saddle and then roast a lamb on two metal staves. These were easy to carry on horseback and could be lashed together into a cruciform shape. (I couldn't help but think of the proverbial sacrificial lamb.) In addition, Cruickshank suggested that lambs be cooked around a circle of burning wood rather than over a fire. And this is the way Saturnians have roasted their lambs for decades and woe to anyone who might suggest a different way of doing things!

The lamb roast is not just a celebration-it's also central to the sparsely populated island's wellbeing. With just 350 people calling it home (and that's the summer population), many services are paid for through this annual event. Some medical services, the library and a host of civic needs are filled with the proceeds of the lamb roast and the booths that peddle local crafts, wine and beer, hot dogs, ice cream and surplus library books.

People come from all over. BC Ferries puts on extra runs to the island. Winter Cove is chock-a-

block with boats of all descriptions, with as many as six vessels rafted together. Dragging is a real danger as we found out to our dismay. We set our anchor securely and tugged it into the mud and weed. Friends from Vancouver rafted their newly acquired yacht, Hana Mari, to our starboard side. We were surrounded by other boats and believed that

any danger would originate from too many boats in too small a space. David kept an intermittent night watch to make sure the current wouldn't drift Beyond the Stars into a neighboring vessel.

All went well, so at noon the next day, we joined a huge fleet of dinghies at the dock and spent the next four hours enjoying the lamb roast festivities. As we dinghied back, someone yelled across the briny, "Hey, Beyond the Stars and that other boat have dragged onto the lee shore."

We were lucky. When we finally located our two masts among the

thickets of other sticks, our boats were still a good 100 feet from the rocky shore in 15 feet of water. Unhurt. When we pulled up the anchor we learned how, after being hooked for 24 hours, our Delta had worked itself loose.

On Winter Cove's southeast cor-



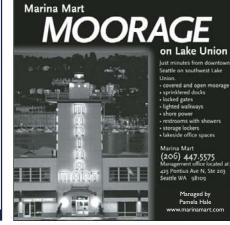


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ner, a slender Boat Passage opens into Georgia Strait funneling spectacularly high currents in-and-out of the Cove. Winds, currents and tides compete in the small bay and generate a tangled mass of chain as boats continue to circle. Our chain caught the hook's fluke like a swirling dervish and created a grotesque anchor-chain pretzel. The anchor and about 50-feet of snarled chain slowed the drag of Beyond the Stars and its rafted visitor. The joined boats drifted about onefifth of a nautical mile across the Cove, miraculously avoiding hitting other vessels in the crowded bay. Lucky us!

#### On to Sooke

A full moon led to strong tides so we left before 700h to catch a rapid ebb in our favor. Lacking even a breath of wind, we motored down Haro Strait, travelling at nearly 11 knots over the ground. By the time we hit Discovery Island, the tide had turned sharply and we were suddenly battling more than three knots of current. Should we carry on? We decided to hook down between Discovery and Chatham Islands-one of our favorite anchorages.

Amazingly, we spied two sailboats on shore, one a huge, wide trimaran resting on its keel; the other a ketch glommed onto the concrete pillars that once supported a supply dock for Discovery's lighthouse. It reminded us of old Nelson's Dockyard in Antigua where naval ships would be careened to apply new copper sheathing to their hulls to minimize an invasion of barnacles, seaweed and teredo worms. At Discovery, however, it looked like these two boats were launched onto the beach to avoid travelift and boatvard charges. Their beaching was not accidental-the boats' bottoms were covered by new, bright-blue antifouling paint.

We again left early from Discovery toward Sooke. It was unseasonably cold, rainy and the wind ran up to 37 knots. We hit a lot of square waves and submarined quite a bit. But eventually things settled down to a mere 22 knots and we enjoyed the ride down the coast, with sea birds diving and lots of small boats hovering near the coast hoping to catch their salmon limit for the day.

Race Rocks and the narrow channel that separates it from Vancouver Island, Race Passage, justly live up to their names and reputation for danger-currents can speed a boat normally running a maximum of seven knots to an exhilarating eleven knots over the ground. So before you go, check the tide and current tables. Whether you decide to go through Race Passage or sail around the islets, bucking the tide is tough. If tide is slack, however, and you keep a close eye on your charts and GPS, you can approach the islets off Race Rocks. They're a haven for sea lions and seals

and family groups can be seen lounging on their blubber and barking loudly at visiting boaters.

We didn't stay in Becher Bay this time, but we like the anchorages this wide inlet offers. Named after 19th century Royal Navy surveyor Commander Alexander Bridport Becher, the Bay has strong tidal currents. Locals say the Bay offers good ground fishing for lingcod. Our favorite spot is Murder Bay, a quiet and protected anchorage, just northeast of Wolfe Island.

#### Sooke

Sooke, located on the southwest corner of Vancouver Island. has one of Juan de Fuca Strait's best protected harbors. Whiffen Spit, a long sandy finger, protects the harbor and forms a natural breakwater. Entering the harbor takes careful navigation. To avoid a string of rocks lying off Company Point, we stayed away from shore at least 1/4 mile until we could line up the first set of range markers (leading marks) inside Sooke Inlet. We then made a hard turn to port, followed the numerous buovs and then lined up the second set of range markers. The harbor's deeper channels are marked and you must follow them unless you want to contribute to the local economy by requiring a tow off a mud bank.

You can anchor inside the protective arm of Whiffen Spit-a great place to relax. A short dinghy ride gets you to the sandy beaches of the Whiffen Spit Park for a pleasant stroll. Crabs are plentiful.

One word of caution. When we visited Sooke before, we grazed the edge of one of the ubiquitous eelgrass fields. Our engine's water intake sucked up a mass of the slim green leaves and plugged the filter. After cleaning the filter once and restarting the engine, the residual leaves in the water intake refilled the filter, necessitating another cleanout. In this shallow harbor filled with plant life, check your engine's water exhaust frequently.

This time we chose to moor at Sooke Harbour Resort and Marina, one of two potential tie-ups. This place emphasizes its resort,

renting out its townhouses and condos. Most of the marina, which is getting long in the tooth and could use a major clean-up job, offers permanent moorage to small sport-fishing boats, which do a good trade with visiting guests. Many inside slips contain only about two feet of water at low tide-with our 6.5-foot draft we moored on the outside dock. The marina charges \$1/ft, has 30-50 amp power, wifi in the office, but no VHF connection. Reservations can be made at 250-652-3634.

The old government dock, now the Sooke Harbour Authority, is lo-

cated a mere 0.4 miles (0.7 km) further into the Harbour, offers moorage on a first-come, firstserved basis. Linda Young, who's served as harbormaster for 27 years. always tries to fit boats in, "unless they're 70 feet," she said. "Rafting is sometimes necessary." The dock is filled with commercial fishing boats.

"The US laws changed this year and we can't fish for tuna down there any more," a helpful Ms. Young explained, "so most of our tuna boats are in. That leaves less room for recreational vessels." Fees are \$.60/ft, plus electricity. There are no amenities except water. Call 250-652-4431 in the morning, 250-642-6429 in the afternoon.

One advantage of the Harbour Authority location is that at its head. you can dine at Markus Wharfside Restaurant. We ate there our first evening in Sooke and had a delightful experience, Markus Wieland and his wife Tatum Claypool run this eatery in an old fisherman's house. They live next door and their garden-fenced off from the ubiquitous deer-provides the restaurant with a host of organic veggies and herbs.

Markus's chef training has been

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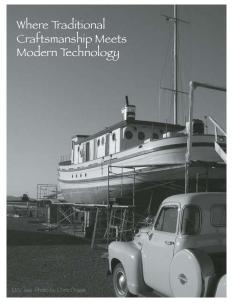
international. He's studied and cooked in Germany, Switzerland, Italy, France and Vancouver and been a private chef for a Mexican family. But what he sought was a simpler, settled-down place where he could use local produce and seafood. "We want everyone to have the best meal ever," said Tatum, who serves as sommelier. "We put our heart into every meal."

We liked the atmosphere, the art on the walls, the starched table-cloths. The view over Sooke Harbour was spectacular. The Sooke Hills formed the background, swirls of current stirred the water and a group of old pillings from a former cannery stood as dark sentinels near the shore. While enjoying the view, David had a delectable pork tenderloin dish while I enjoyed tender scallops.

Sooke uses several slogans to describe itself; "Wild by Nature," "Wildly West Coast," and the "Place where the Rainforest Meets the Sea." There are nature trails, walks on Whiffen Spit and a hike to the Sooke Potholes. Unless you like long walks, they require transportation to get there. But if you need to go to the commercial center of this town of 11,000 inhabitants, it's possible to go on foot.

Walking along the West Coast Road (HWY 14) roughly one-andone-third mile from the marina, you'll find two supermarkets, banks with ATMs, a hardware store, drugstore and a BC Liquor Store. The Little Vienna Bakery offers many types of delectable pastry and good bread. A block away, the Stick in the Mud Café is renowned for its coffee

I lunched at an old standby known for its comfort food—Mom's Café. My burger was tasty and the crispy yam fries more than I could



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finish. My server, Sue, who'd worked in the café for 29 years, told me the restaurant will celebrate its 50th anniversary next year and is one of Sooke's mainstays.

The same area is also home to the Edge restaurant, where we had a delicious tuna dinner. This restaurant lacks the white linen, and the silverware is well used, but the food is tasty and the prices reasonable.

Another mile west from "downtown" you can find the Sooke Region Museum. It's a charming place that provides a good overview of the area's history. Sooke, which can be reached from Victoria in a mere 35 minutes by car was once a distant settlement. But before colonizers moved in, Sooke's highly protected harbor made a habitat for thousands of years. At least two aboriginal villages were located on its shores, where clams were abundant and salmon swam upstream into the Sooke River.

The T'so-uke people - whose name was bestowed on Sooke, are

part of the Coast Salish groupwith relatives on the Olympic Peninsula—lived here in long houses and spent much of their time ensuring a food supply for the long winters. Besides drying fish for later consumption, these groups hunted seals, whale, elk, deer and bear. Blue cama lilies provided a form of carbohydrate, as did berries of all kinds. White cama lilies were known to be poisonous and were dug out to prevent them from spreading.

The Hudson's Bay Company had been getting footholds in this part of the world, establishing forts and trading posts. But when the US and the then British Empire set the 49<sup>th</sup> parallel as its North American border, the Vancouver (WA) fort moved north to Victoria and established a new post in 1843. Six years later, the HBC obtained a 10-year lease from the Crown to colonize Vancouver Island with the requirement to create settlements within five years. I

guess today we'd call it a "publicprivate partnership," or if I were to be more cynical, "government-corporate collusion."

In 1849, the first European to arrive in Sooke was Captain W. Colquhoun Grant of the Royal Scots Greys. True to the times, British military men had to supply their own income and when Grant lost his fortune, he engaged eight retainers to come with him to Vancouver Island as the law stipulated that for every 100 acres of land purchased, an owner had to import four men or three couples.

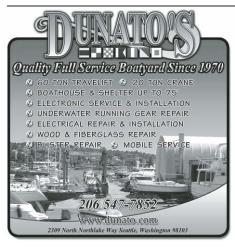
The HBC, along with its subsidiary, the Puget Sound Agricultural Co, had monopolized the land all around Victoria so that's why Grant ended up establishing his allotment in Sooke, paying one pound sterling per acre. A thriving farm with produce, cattle, pigs and poultry grew rapidly. A lumber mill was next.

But Grant grew bored with the

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isolation and absence of adventure and began traveling. Having become an "absentee landlord," his holdings fell into decline providing an opportunity for the ambitious, hard working Scottish miners, the Muir family, headed by the patriarch, John Muir.

These Scots were poor and owed the HBC three years of indentured labor-not much different from their virtual slavery in the mines of Scotland-to compensate for passage to the New World. But they persevered and eventually took over Grant's failing enterprise. So successful was this family and the people they hired that endless flows of agricultural products and produce would arrive in Victoria after a two-day voyage by canoe. They constructed a flour and threshing mill. They also built the first successful steam-powered sawmill on Vancouver Island and supplied pilings for San Francisco's harbor. Eventually they even took up ship building and produced the largest ship-115 tons-constructed in the colony heretofore.

But one of John Muir's deep satisfactions was to overcome the HBC's insistence on retaining the British class system, which rigidly relegated the Muirs to the secondclass status of workers and merchants. He sought new world values and fought the old world chains that denied him greater democratic participation. He eventually served in the newly established provincial Assembly—an early form of parliamentary government—a peon no longer.

I saw photos of Captain Grant and the Muirs and their enterprises in the Sooke Region Museum. I lingered at the artefacts, the ship models, the quilts, period infant clothing, information on regional

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wildlife, the history of logging, how fish traps operated, and the recreation of a vintage kitchen. An outside barnlike structure houses many traditional farm implements and a grass-green 1926 Model T Ford. The former Sheringham Point lighthouse, now replaced by a modern structure, graces the grounds.

But all this history is but a recent addition to our region's botanical longevity. On the Museum's terrain stands a slice of Douglas fir displaying its 1,227 rings. That tree, which may have reached a height of 300 feet, began its life in about 745 AD, when the Mayan culture flourished in Central America, Charlemagne was three years old and decades away from reigning

over his Holy Roman Empire, and Columbus' "discovery" of Caribbean islands was 747 years away. Compared to this tree's lifespan, those 19th century colonizers—like us—live but a blink of an eye. NWY

ship. "Communications and efficiency will vastly improve by having the entire company together," said PAE. President and owner Dan Streech. "And this will lead to a better customer experience for visiting clients."

# No sleeping while at the helm

fishermen on Wednesday, May 9, after their 37-foot vessel Karanna ran aground on the Chibahdehl Rocks, approximately four miles west of Neah Bay, Wash.

The operator of the vessel stated that he had fallen asleep while transiting, which resulted in the vessel grounding.

The Coast Guard launched a 47foot motor lifeboat crew from Station Neah Bay and an MH-65C Dolphin helicopter crew from Air Station Port Angeles, Wash., after receiving a report that the vessel was taking on water.

The motor lifeboat crew arrived on scene but was unable to pull

The Coast Guard rescued three alongside the Karanna due to the shallow waters. However, the three fishermen were able to swim to the motor lifeboat where they were safely brought onboard. The members were transferred to local EMS on shore and eventually released.

"I cannot emphasize enough the importance of standing a taut and vigilant watch when you are underway," said Capt. Scott Ferguson, Commander of Coast Guard Sector Puget Sound. "The alternative could result in loss of life and significant impacts to the environment. Please stay sharp out there."

A salvage operation will be conducted as soon as weather permits.

# **Great White devours the West Sound Sailing Series**

Brownsville, Wash. - The peasant princess conquers white death in the finale of the West Sound Sailing Associations 2012 series, the Brownsville Race held on June 27th. No fancy invitational in the name, "no catchy phrase," as Dan Wierman puts it, just Brownsville. This is it, bring it if you got it, come to Brownsville for the race and party.

The Brownsville race starts off at the marina and has a three lap course that brings racers through the start/ finish line on each lap. With the winds out of the south the first lap took racers from the starting area to

University Point then downwind to a mark off of Point Bolin then back to the starting area. The second lap takes racers back to University Point, then downwind to Battle Point and then back to the starting area. A third lap would be the same as the first if needed. A brilliant set up that allows the RC to easily shorten the course and make sure racers make it back to the dock with plenty of time for the series end party at the amazing Brownsville facilities.

By start time the winds had built to 10 to 12 knots and the two classes jockeyed off the line upwind towards

the first mark. Without the normal Division 3 no flying sails class, Division 2, the three digit flying sails raters, got off the line first and made quick work of the upwind leg while Division 1 prepared for their start. The Thunderbird 26 Swan led Division 2 off the line with Falcon chasing them down on the way to the weather mark, "Our nemesis Śwan once again cleared the start line with a small lead on us," said Brian Massey. "By the time we reached the windward mark we had closed in on them slightly." Spinnakers up, Division 2 began pulling away to leeward as the big boats in Division 1 worked to weather behind them

"At the start, we had gusts to 12 knots," said Dan Wierman sailing aboard the J-35 Great White. We got a good start on the boat (breakwater) end, on time in clear air. Karma, the Dash 34, started closer to the pin end and was ahead but to leeward of us. It was one port tack that took us to the

mark where we rounded, set the spinnaker and headed toward the Bainbridge Island shore." *Great White* had the lead but the J-105 *Dulcinea* was sailing hard to catch up and gain their time on the fast J-35.

Great White made it to the Point Bolin mark first with Dulcinea reaching in hard against the current behind them. While the long run towards Agate Pass had finally split the Division 2 birds up, Falcon rounded third followed by Kanna & Jabes then Swan. "On the next upwind leg," Massey said, "Bob and crew rom Starblazer, their new Beneteau 40.7, came along and rolled us nicely! Can't hold them off very long on our Cal 9.2."

The upwind leg didn't just benefit the 40.7 as Wierman and crew on Great White legged out on Dulcinea, crossing through the start/finish line 6 minutes in front of the J105 as they started the second leg of the race. Now these two J-boats aren't just

battling it out for the race, they are so close in points for the series that the final race, Brownsville, will decide the WSSA champion for the year.

The winds became shifty for the leaders near University point and as they tacked and adjusted on the shifts those following made huge gains with more pressure away from the point. The J-35 rounded first but had lost much of their lead on Dulcinea and Falcon's nemesis Swan and played the shifts perfectly and gained the lead once again at the University point mark

Everything but settled, the winds kept building from the SW, pushing the challengers closer and closer to the leaders with three or four boat on boat battles going on during the second to last leg. Dulcinea kept closing in on Great White, Flacon had once again passed Swan while Blackout & Shenanigans began their own contest for third in division 1. No end to the tight excitement on the course in Brownsville.

While Falcon was rounding the Battle Point mark, the horn could be heard as Great White and Dulcinea crossed the finish line close together. Falcon beat Swan around the final leeward mark with barely enough time between them to cover the handicap and headed back into the final beat to the finish. Next across the line was Starblazer, Karma, Tantalus, then Blackout and Sheunigans in an all out duel even though they are different divisions.

"About 100 feet from the line, the wind evaporated," said Gerry Austin. "Blackout coasted through the line, but Shenanigans stopped cold, working hard to get the last 50 feet as Swan and Falcon came flying in. Swan held the higher line giving up boat speed thinking it might get wild at the finish and it paid off as they coasted around the pin with Shenanigans finally working through the finish behind them. Falcon wound up about 50' north of the line, and had to play the puffs falling off the hill to get over just in front of Jabez."

"In all, it was a classic WSSA race," Austin said. "Variable winds, strong current, and complete unpredictability. The results simply don't show how close this race was throughout with *Great White* and *Dulcinea* battling for first overall and the series. Swan and Falcon match racing as always with Jabez in the mix, and Blackout and Tantalus battling for 3rd in div 1 for the series."

Massey goes on to say that "I think this was the most brutal finish we have ever had. We had consistent wind all day, although shifty at times. At the finish line it just shut off for us ... And of course it filled in just after we crossed ... "

Who won the series you ask? The imagined princess or the denison of the deep? Dulcinea won the day but for the series they tied, each with 13 points on the series and after the tiebreaker the overall series win went to Dan Wierman's J-35 Great Witte.

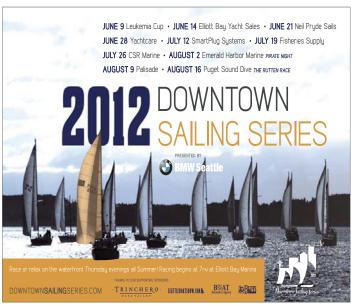
Congrats to Wierman and the crew of *Great White* for a great 2012 WSSA series!

# **Dave Padgett wins Liberty Bay Challenge**

# Bob and Sue Lindal take first place at Gig Harbor Invitational



Poulsbo, Wash. - On Saturday, May 12, Poulsbo Yacht Club hosted the Liberty Bay Challenge. Eighteen boats gathered near Keyport for the start of the 17-mile event. It was a beautiful day in May without significant wind and with minimal currents. The course took the competitors south in Port Orchard past Brownsville and along the Westbank.

Just south of Illahee State Park the course developers inserted an unusual feature. It required a 180° turn with 2/10 of a mile radius. A quick check of the overall results showed that most competitors handle it in fine fashion.

The course then proceeded up the east shore of Port Orchard, around Battle Point and north near the Agate Pass Bridge. Proceeding back to Poulsbo required a slowdown at Keyport before moving into Liberty Bay and the finish abeam of the Poulsbo Yacht Club breakwater.

The scores were quite good with 16 of the 18 boats scoring less than 2% error. In third place was Bruce Cullen in *Caroline* from Meydenbauer Bay Yacht Club with a 0.7452% error. Steve Hazlerig of

Seattle Yacht Club in Solara scored second with a very respectable 0.6793% error. Bringing the beautiful winners trophy back to Queen City Yacht Club was Dave Padgett in Slip Away with a 0.6628% error. Dave has a lock on the currents of Port Orchard and Agate Pass. This is the third time in the past five years that Dave has won this event.

Now, on to the June event. Gig Harbor Yacht Club and Arabella's Landing played host to the annual Gig Harbor Invitational on Saturday, June 9. With the pleasant June weather it's a lovely run from the Seattle area to Gig Harbor. Most of the boats arrived by mid-afternoon on Friday. Tacoma, Seattle, Port Orchard, Bremerton, Poulsbo, and Gig Harbor and Meydenbauer Bay were all represented. It gave everyone an opportunity to enjoy the night life in the old village of Gig Harbor.

Ebbing currents in the Narrows were predicted to exceed 4 1/2 kts on Saturday. So of course the race started off of Point Defiance directly into the teeth of the current. With the 19 boats fighting their way, south nearly to the Tacoma Nar-

hen planning the passage from Puerto Chiapas, southern most port along the Pacific Coast of Mexico, to San Carlos, on the mainland shore far up into the Sea of Cortez, we had conflicting goals. First and foremost, we wanted to reach San Carlos, some 1,500 miles farther north along the coast, before the end of our cruising season. But with the more than two months remaining to accomplish that goal, we also anticipated revisiting many of our favorite anchorages and marinas along the route between the two ports.

A third desire was to avoid being at sea in inclement weather, something of a challenge because we would be heading into the prevailing northwest winds and seas. We're neither racers nor masochists. After these many years of sailing and cruising, we find the very thought of bashing into head winds and seas for hours and hours slightly nauseating. So, with weeks to accomplish the first goal, we theorized we'd have ample time to accomplish the second and the third.

While we had thought our three priorities ranked in this order—first,

reaching San Carlos; second, revisiting favorite anchorages; and, third, avoiding rough passages—the last of the three turned out to be the one ultimately trumping the other two.

With our overwhelming aversion to big winds and seas, we continuously monitored the weather programs on our computer as well as the local nets for current conditions

and forecasts along our route. Whenever we had to choose among the three priorities, we invariably chose to avoid bashing into headwinds and seas. In so choosing, we some-

times stopped in convenient rather than favorite harbors; in fact, we passed by favorite harbors with scarcely a backward glance to take advantage of the rare calm or light head winds and seas.

In sailing northwest beyond Puerto Chiapas, we would be navigating first through the notorious Golfo de Tehuantepec, spanning the 300 miles between Chiapas and Puerto Angel. For boaters making the passage northward along the Pacific Coast of Mexico, this gulf generally proves to be the most challenging leg. Winds blowing across the Caribbean Sea intensify as they are funneled across the Plano de Tehuantepec, the narrow waist of southeastern Mexico, creating a tumult in the Golfo de Tehuantepec.

On the day that looked good for our departure from Puerto Chiapas, where, upon arriving from Nicaragua, we had officially checked into Mexico, we had forecasts for light winds and 3-foot seas for that day and the following two days. In anticipation of this good weather, we set a course for Acapulco, 500 miles to the northwest, planning to stay close to the coastline for the first three days as we crossed the dreaded Tehuantepec, in case the fair weather turned foul.

At 1000 hours (this late departure the result of the required boat inspection by the Mexican navy) we motored past the new Chiapas cruise ship dock off to port and, to starboard, the popular city beach that attracts residents from inland cities such as Tapachula. Then we rounded the end of the breakwater and entered relatively flat seas on a nearly windless day. For the first two days and nights, the sea conditions remained mild, as predicted, though during the second night the winds and seas did begin to escalate.

On the afternoon of the third day, nearing the western extreme of

Golfo de Tehuantepec, we passed the Bahías de Huatulco and Marina Chahué, one of our favorite ports from earlier years. Though the northwest winds were then registering consistently around 20 knots. we continued on toward Acapulco, 250 miles ahead. We had anticipated we'd have lighter winds once around Puerto Angel and Punta Ixtalahuite, less than 10 miles ahead. because Punta Ixtalahuite marks the northward extreme of the Golfo de Tehuantepec and the coastline makes about a 40-degree turn northward at that point.

In the meantime, we were tacking repeatedly in an attempt to make some progress against the headwinds directly on the bow. Though the long-range weather forecasts had shown we should have another day of light winds, after a







few hours and minimal progress in miserable sea conditions, we retreated to Marina Chahué, only 20 miles behind us.

With a smooth and speedy downwind sail back down the coast, we came to Punta el Bufadero, the point on the near end of Bahía de Santa Cruz, the bay immediately alongside Chahué.

All the paper and electronic charts we have aboard were woefully inadequate for entering Marina Chahué, these charts either too dated or too general, or both, to show either the marina or the bay of Chahué. The light on Punta el Bufadero and the large rocky islet Piedra Blanca and the surrounding smaller rocks and reefs in the middle of the bay do appear on the charts; otherwise, though, we had nothing to indicate the location of the marina other than a couple of sketches in cruising guides. Only because we'd been in this marina eight years earlier were we confident we would find a marina around the rocks and beyond the cliff face.

Piedra Blanca is only a tiny speck on the charts, but it loomed large on our approach because of the enormous volumes of white water breaking on the rocks and reefs in towering, spreading sprays. We needed no additional marker to encourage us to give this rock and its satellites a wide berth.

Not until we were past Blanca did we finally spot the first indication of a marina and an entrance channel. Directly ahead, about a mile north of Piedra Blanca, a light atop a rocky point identified the end of the breakwater. With more rocks and reefs off to starboard and the winds and seas building, we cautiously approached this breakwater, remembering the narrow, winding channel with short, abrupt winding channel with short, abrupt

turns that lies beyond. Once through the channel entrance between the end of the breakwater and the cliffs, at last we had buoys to follow into the marina

Marina Chahué, one of several marinas the Mexican government has developed along the coasts of the Pacific and the Sea of Cortez over the past 20 or so years, has changed little since our last visit years earlier. The exception is the large new marina office and future boat repair facility. This large warehouse-looking building has little charm and style beyond the impressive stone steps leading up the hill from the docks to the building and the roofs of dried palm fronds over the two decks, one atop the roof of the office, the other in front of the remainder of the building.

Beyond the office is the same dusty parking lot and empty field, seeming to belie the name of the bay and marina, "Chalué," the Zapotec word for "fertile or moist land." While the dry, infertile setting of the marina and the bay does not appear to have inspired the Zapotecs who came up with the name, the verdant jungle on the hillsides inland certainly illustrates both fertility and moisture.

Once we had Carricklee secure in the marina, our two friends Frank and Jack arranged for their return flights to the States and then left after a couple of days. We stayed on another five days, reacquainting ourselves with the many charms of Bahia de Chahué, one of the nine Bahías de Huatulco. These bays of Huatulco, in the Zapotec language "where they worship the trees," lie along a narrow strip of flat land tucked up against the jungle-clad foothills of the Sierra Madre del

Sur, this mountain chain in Southern Mexico rising to an impressive peak of 12,149 feet.

Most of our days began with an early morning walk, our favorite venue for these walks along the banks of a canal curving inland from Bahía de Chahué. Attractive new houses with private docks dot the banks at the lower end of the canal. but at the upper end, as yet undeveloped, the birds are still the major inhabitants. As we walked, we had a continuous feast for the eyes. Brown pelicans and cormorants fished and rested in the waters of the still canal, and oyster catchers pecked in the mud at the water's edge. From low branches overhanging the water belted kingfishers waited for small fish to swim by. Brown-throated parakeets and magpie javs flew in and out of the bushes and tree tops.

The marina is some distance from the two nearby villages, Santa Cruz Huatulco and La Crucecita. Though Santa Cruz Huatulco was the original fishing village for the bays of Huatulco, and is still the commercial port for this stretch of coast, including the site of a cruise ship dock, generally it is of less interest to visiting sailors.

However, historically, Santa Cruz was an important port along a pre-Hispanic trade route for Zapotec, Mixtec, and Aztec merchants. It served the same function for the Spanish conquerors, for whom it became a major port under the command of Hernán Cortez. This port was significant enough in the 16th century for the English captains Francis Drake and Thomas Cavendish (called piratas in this part of the world) to have attacked and pillaged it.

Today Santa Cruz has a few hotels, restaurants, and tourist shops, but its primary importance for visiting sailors is more practical. It is the site of the port captain's office, where we and all other ocean-going sailors check in and, on our departure, out of Huatulco. Santa Cruz is also the site of the closest diesel fuel for boats moored in Chahué. While we were there, we hired a taxi driver to take us on two trips to the fuel dock to fill our three 6-gallon jerry jugs to top off our fuel tanks.

The contemporary development of both Santa Cruz and La Crucecita coincides with that of the tourism facilities the Mexican government initiated around the Bahías de Huatulco in the 1980s. While neither of the small towns retains any physical evidence of its importance in pre-Hispanic or Spanish Colonial history, La Crucecita, 2 miles inland of Marina Chahué, has much more of the feel of a traditional Mexican village, probably because it is home to most of the workers in the resort facilities around the bays of Tangolunda, Chahué, and Santa

The tree-shaded zócolo, or principal plaza, is clearly the heart of the town's activities. The Spanish Co-Ionial-style Catholic church spreads along one side of the tree-shaded central plaza; busy restaurants and small hotels and shops squeeze together along the other three sides. At one of those restaurants, Los Portales, we savored our first tlayuda, a traditional dish of the state of Oaxaca, the location of these villages. This dish consists of a large crisp tortilla topped with salsa and chiles, nowadays including addition of any of various meats, cheeses, and vegetables, giving it the versatility similar to that of our contemporary pizzas.

On the Saturday we were there, artisans from the nearby hills had spread their wares in front of the church along one side of the plaza. Most striking to us were the pieces of brightly colored woven wool—pillow-covers, table runners, shawls—with embroidered stalks of Ililes and sunflowers in even brighter threads of wool. These women from the nearby mountains, in their colorful native dress, many of whom spoke only halting Spanish, did not want their pictures taken.

Perhaps the height of excitement in Marina Chahué came early on a Friday morning. As we were having breakfast in the cockpit, we observed with some puzzlement a steady stream of small commercial tour boats moving into the marina from the more exposed commercial dock in Santa Cruz. Once the helmsmen had tied their boats securely along any empty docks, they immediately left them. Shortly after the arrival of these outside boats had begun, we heard the news: A tsunami originating from a monster earthquake in Japan was ripping across the Pacific, predicted to bring six foot waves and the potential for massive destruction along this coast.

The marina office sent out instructions that all the boats in the marina should be secured to the docks and the pilings with multiple lines. All of us already had extra lines securing our boats to the docks because of the high surges that constantly plague this otherwise delightful marina. Nevertheless, evervone on our dock scurried around nervously to get the boats even more secured, including tying boats to one another and putting out all the fenders we owned. With the approach of the tsunami reported to be imminent, we all worked as speedily as we could.

One cautious couple on a boat near Carricklee secured their boat and then hurried away from the marina to watch and wait from higher, safer ground. Others sat in their cockpits, as did we, anxiously following the reports as they came in from coastal areas to the northwest and looking out the entrance channel for any unusual surges and

crashes above the breakwater.

After an hour or so, though, the two of us went below and continued with our daily chores, a part of our consciousness alert to any unusual noises or movements of the water beneath the keel. And thus, after all the tensions of the first few hours, our day continued in its ordinary way. At some time during the day, we must have reached a point where we were no longer on alert. When someone from the marina knocked on the hull of our boat at about 1500h to tell us the tsunami had passed, our response was not so much one of relief but closer to one of surprise-an anti-climactic moment with which we'd wish to conclude all potential disasters.

One week after we'd come into Marina Chahué, having been driven back by the contrary winds and seas during our first attempted passage from Puerto Chiapas to Acapulco, we downloaded a forecast favorable for resuming our course northwest along the coast to San Carlos. The following morning we backed Carricklee out of the slip, working quickly but carefully to avoid the boat's being caught in the tremendous surge in the marina and swept into pilings or nearby boats. Once clear of the slip, we focused on getting out the narrow entrance channel without being swept into the buoys, the breakwater, or the rocky cliff faces.

Outside the breakwater, we began watching for the rocks, islands, and reefs we had avoided when we entered the bay. As soon we were outside the bay, and clear of all the obstacles, we could relax as we once again pointed the bow toward

Acapulco.

That first day was another day of motoring, with northwest winds of eight knots or less, but with a south swell of approximately two feet creating somewhat confused seas. We saw little traffic on the water that night, only two ships and two fishing boats, neither of which posed any threat.

This light traffic as well as the mild wind and sea conditions continued throughout the next day, though we did encounter an adverse current of 1.5 knots to slow us down.

When we downloaded an updated weather forecast that evening, we learned these good wind and sea conditions should continue for at least another three to four days. We briefly debated whether to stop in Acapulco or to continue on toward San Carlos, still almost 1,000 miles and who knew how many foul weather days away. Though we retain many pleasurable memories of past stops in Acapulco—visiting the Spanish colonial fort, watching the cliff divers, dining at a cliff-side restaurant overlooking the entire bay, being endlessly entertained by the chattering Amazon parrots in the palms alongside the anchorage at Puerto Marqués—we decided we could ill afford to spend these good-weather days in port.

On day three of our voyage, we passed Bahia de Acapulco, sparkling and alluring on this day of lightbreezes under brilliant blue skies. Though we were much aware of what we'd be missing, we knew that, in the final analysis, the wind and sea conditions once more took priority. For, when there's a change in the weather and a change in the sea, There'll be some changes made. ww

# **Tribute to Simplicity**

# "It is not that I belong to the past, but the past that belongs to me." - Mary Antin

grew up when boating was, shall we say - basic. It was simple. This especially applied to the galley and my philosophy for cooking aboard truly stems from this simpler time.

Many believe that simplicity implies doing without. True simplicity as a conscious life choice can elevate ordinary moments from the mundane to the transcendent. Simplicity is both buoyant and bountiful.

Boating for me, and cooking aboard for that matter, started in Tacoma. As a child, August was the month we headed north. Cracked crab, a tossed green salad, and crusty French bread was always our first dinner aboard. I remember my Dad would work half a day, stopping at Johnny's Seafoods on the way to the boat for fresh crab. He would show up in his blue blazer with loosened tie, and that white paper wrapped parcel tucked under his arm. Off we would go! Cruising up Colvos Passage on a delightful August evening enjoying a meal such as this was, quite simply, the best.

The very way we ate in the Summer was so uncomplicated and satisfying. The carefree spirit and ease of Summer extended into the galley in a unique way. Somehow the season's menus seemed to fall into place naturally, with more spontaneity and little advance preparation.

Remember, simplicity is key. Appreciate the aesthetics of food - the fresh, the simple, the homemade. Make the most of what is seasonal and readily available - the catch of the day, an unexpected berry patch, the intense flavor of August vegetables. Mix and match. Part of the knack of concocting a satisfying meal is creating a balanced menu in which there is a certain play between the substantial and the whimsical. Preparing food this way, with care and attention to detail, developing new ideas for old recipes with



innovative combinations and variations borders on art!

Many of the meals I knew as a child are still in my repertoire. Some of these recipes remain unchanged however, others I have tweaked and fine-tuned to better suit my needs as well as the increasing availability of ingredients these days. Additionally, the manner in which I serve a meal is a bit different now. I learned many things as a professional cook aboard some of the finest yachts on this coast with the primary lesson being presentation includes not only garnish but the manner in which a meal is put to the table with dishes and cloth napkins. Simple can be pretty!

August in the Pacific Northwest is definitely Summer. When fresh air and sunshine are as natural as breathing, cooks rarely want to spend hours in the galley; therefore simplicity, speed, and lightness are evident, in an approach that translates effortlessly to any boat - be it power or sail.

#### Green Chile Soufflé

1 c. chopped green chilies 1 lb. grated Cheddar cheese

- 1 lb. grated Jack cheese
- 4 eggs
- 2 T. flour 1 tsp. salt
- 1 can mild chili salsa

Wash chilies and drain. Line greased 9x13" pan with chilies, then grated cheeses. Mix together eggs, flour, and salt; pour over chilies and cheeses. Spread salsa over top and bake for 35 minutes. Cut into squares when cool.

#### Ovens' Island Sautéed Oysters

- 1 qt. oysters
- 2 eggs 2 T. milk
- 1 c. flour
- salt and pepper
- 1 c. plain bread crumbs 2 T. olive oil
- 2 T. butter

Drain oysters; dry with paper towels. In one bowl, beat eggs and milk. In second bowl, combine flour, salt, and pepper. In third bowl, place bread crumbs. Dredge oysters, one by one, in flour, then dip in egg, then in crumbs. Place oysters on waxed paper lined tray; refrigerate 1 hour. Heat oil and butter in skillet over medium heat; when butter foam subsides, add oysters, a few at a time. Do not crowd; you may have to cook in batches using more oil/butter. Cook, turning once, until browned about 3 minutes on each side.

#### Classic Steamed Clams

Cover clams with sea water to clean themselves for 24+ hours changing water 2-3 times if possible. For cleaner, clearer nectar, scrub clams with a brush. Place clams in any size pan not crowding in order that they have ample space to open; cover with water, cover pan, and bring to a boil, then lower heat. Clams are done when fully open. Serve with melted butter and any other desired seasonings.

#### Flank Steak Teriyaki

1/4 c. sov sauce

½ c. +/- water

2 garlic cloves, minced

1/8+ tsp. ginger 1-2 tsp. sugar

Marinate flank steak as long as possible in this mixture; turn in sauce and refrigerate for several hours. Barbeque 3-4 minutes per side for rare.

#### Now-Famous Salmon Marinade

1/2 c. white wine

½ c. butter

½ c. lemon juice brown sugar to taste

Place all ingredients in saucepan and simmer for 10-15 minutes. Baste fish while cooking.

#### Ernie Fors' Chicken Barbeque Sauce

Place 1/4 cup water, 1 cup vinegar, 1/4 pound butter, and 1 tablespoon salt in saucepan; heat to boiling. Brush on chicken pieces while cooking on barbeque.

#### Baked Walla Walla Sweets

Walla Walla sweet onions olive oil red wine vinegar

salt

Remove thin slice from both ends of onions and quarter lengthwise. Do not peel. Place onions in oiled baking pan, brush with oil, and sprinkle lightly with salt. Cover with foil and bake 30 minutes at 350° until tender. Remove foil, brush again with oil, sprinkle with vinegar and bake 50-60 minutes more, turning and basting with pan oil. Superb accompaniment as a side dish, but also tasty cold.

#### Champagne Tomato Salad

Macerate finely diced shallots in champagne. Slice tomato and arrange slices on a platter; sprinkle with shallot and season with salt and pepper. Pour champagne over all and serve immediately.

#### Raft Island Fruit Salad

- 1 c. sugar
- 1 T. salt
- 1 tsp. dry mustard
- 1 c. wine vinegar
- 1 c oil
- 1 sm. onion, chopped
- 3 T. papaya seeds

Mix together and toss with 1" cubes of cantaloupe, watermelon, papaya, mango, banana, pear, apple or whatever you desire. Serve in a watermelon shell!

#### Laguna Beach Special

Toss together sliced mushrooms, sliced avocado, Belgium endive, crab legs, and honey mustard to taste. Serve on a bed of Romaine.

#### Outrageous French Bread

1 loaf French bread, cut lengthwise

soft butter

1 c. mayonnaise

½ c. grated Parmesan

½ c. chopped onion ½ tsp. Worcestershire sauce

Paprika

Spread bread with butter, wrap in foil, and heat through. Mix together mayonnaise, Parmesan, onion, and Worcestershire; spread on each bread half, sprinkle with Paprika, and place under broiler until bubbly and golden brown. Cut across in chunks to serve.

#### Offwatch Cheesecake

1/3 c butter

1 1/4 c. graham cracker crumbs

2 T. sugar 1/2 lb. cream cheese

1 can condensed milk

1/3 c. lemon juice

1 1/2 tsp. vanilla

Mix together butter, graham cracker crumbs, and sugar; press into 8" pie pan. Beat cream cheese well; add condensed milk, lemon juice, and vanilla. Blend well and pour into pie pan to refrigerate until

serving. May garnish with fresh fruit. So easy and even easier if you use a store-bought graham cracker

1/4 c. vegetable oil 1 c. brown sugar

1 egg

¾ c. flour

1 tsp. b.p, ½ tsp. salt ½ tsp. vanilla

Mix brown sugar into oil, add egg, and blend; add dry ingredients, beating well, then vanilla. Bake in greased square pan at 350° for 25 minutes. Do not overbake.

1 can Cream of Mushroom soup 1 can Cream of Asparagus soup 1/4 c. sherry

1 c. cream

7 1/2 oz. crab meat

1 1/2 can milk (use soup can)

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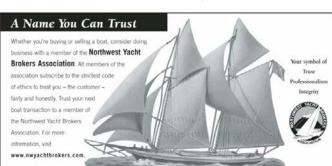

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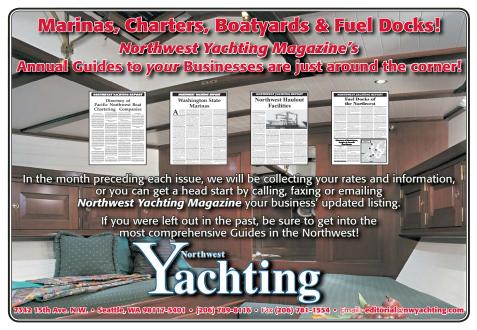
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
