BOE Adopts Tentative 2011/2012 Budget

Last Thursday evening the Board of Education adopted a tentative school budget for the fiscal year 2011/2012 with a proposed tax levy

of \$42,136,706, up \$2.7M from the 2010/2011 budget. If the levy amount remains constant, the tax rate based on an average property assessment of \$123,000 would be cost each household an estimated additional

Ashnault Makes History Three Tigers Wrestlers Win Medals

Sophomore Anthony Ashnault of South Plainfield raised his hands in victory after he defeated freshman Mike Magaldo of Watchung Hills, 7-1 in front of a crowd of 11,000 at Boardwalk Hall in Atlantic City on Sunday. With the win, Ashnault also made history as the first wrestler from South Plainfield High School to secure first place in the state championship two years in a row.

Last year Ashnault competed in the 103 lb. weight class; this year he wrestled in the 112 lb. weight class in the finals.

Ashnault finished his year with an impressive 42-0 record, and a 86-0 career total.

"Anthony has become the first two time state champion in South Plainfield history. He kept his focus and never got distracted from his ultimate goal. He wrestled tremendously,

and now will set his goal on a third title," said Coach Kevin McCann.

The previous day it was South Plainfield's Troy Heilmann who was victorious in his 119 lb. bout when he took down opponent Kevin Devoy of Burlington Township in 5:04 for the state's wrestling semi-final win. "On his game," McCann commented, "Troy did fantastic. He entered the tournament still [having] a fractured finger, but would not be denied becoming a two-time state place winner. He wrestled a great match to get into the finals. He pinned a wrestler who beat him last year in the state tournament."

Heilmann first celebrated with his coach, then with his family who had been cheering him on from the stands. As for his loss in the finals, McCann said, "Troy has nothing to be ashamed of, losing 7-4 to a two-time state champion, Rob Deutsch. He is only (Continued on page 16)

I have three children ages 13, 12, and six. Rosalind, my eldest daughter, is in eighth grade and attends South Plainfield Middle School. Stephanie, my 12 year-old, is in sixth grade; her last year at Grant Elementary School. My son attends kindergarten at Kennedy Elementary School.

Both of my children have received high-quality instruction during their time at Grant. The area to which I am highly critical is mathematics since I have a mathematics degree. For 10 years, I wrote articles on games of chance for national publications and I was a professional gambler specializing in the areas of poker and video poker. I was going to go into teaching, but I realized how hard it was going to be for a variety of reasons. Hence, I put my math degree to use in another area. I could not disagree more with the letter last week by Pat DeSantis. I realize DeSantis is a former Board of Education member who left the board and now has a job with it. I've seen her at very few council meetings, howeveronly one this year. As someone who regularly attends council meetings, I've seen the opposite of what De-Santis described. I've seen a refreshing change in the way they are conducted. But more importantly, I've seen vast improvements in how our town is

being managed. Our new mayor, Matt Anesh, has brought professionalism and civility to the role of mayor. People whose views are at odds with the mayor are no longer subjected to sarcasm and nastiness, which I believe is a welcome change.

Case in point: The ex-mayor Charles Butrico is now Democrat chairman. Butrico gets up to make comments as often as two or three times a meeting, and most of his comments are nothing more than partisan sniping. Yet Mayor Anesh does not respond in kind. In a departure from the past, even opposing views are treated respectfully.

But putting all that aside, let's look at what really matters, accomplishments for our residents. South Plainfield has the best record in the county controlling taxes, and was one of only four towns where taxes actually went down last year. The Republican administration negotiated a new contract with public works last year that actually reduced starting salaries, and the new PBA contract for the first time includes givebacks on longevity, overtime, starting salaries and healthcare (the type of benefits that increased when the Democrats were in power).

Things like this are not happening all over. Just look around. Other towns are talking about massive layoffs, cutting services to the bone and huge tax increases. The towns and the unions are at each other's throats. That's not happening in South Plainfield.

Despite all this, the Democrats, led by Butrico and Councilwoman Buteas, have opposed or criticized every positive change. This type of partisanship has to stop. It's one thing to express opinions. But when current and former elected officials do everything in their power to disrupt and derail progress for our residents, that's


For several council meetings I have questioned the wisdom of selling borough property at a time when real estate values are at their lowest in years. The Republican majority is seeking to authorize the sale of borough property for a price that would amount to a huge net loss on one of our most valuable assets. I am specifically referring to the two lots that make up the library property on Plainfield Avenue. These two lots were purchased over a span of 20 years for a total purchase price of almost \$700,000 and now the Republican Majority is going to auction that property off. In this very low market, the appraised value is only \$480,000, which is only 70% of the purchase price.

Even more disturbing is the fact that the Republicans refuse to disclose how this money will be spent. My fear is that they intend to use the proceeds to fill a budget gap despite their assurances on reorganization day that they had put our fiscal house in order.

I don't have to tell anyone that now is not the time to sell property unless absolutely necessary. I was happy to see that Councilwoman Buteas and Councilman Salerno voted against this sale and I ask that the other members of the council join them and rescind this action until property values improve.

I also ask the Republican Council Majority to manage taxpayer assets as they would manage their own personal property and do not take actions that will result in a loss for the residents

Don't Be Scammed by Fake IRS Communications

The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) receives thousands of reports each year from taxpayers who receive suspicious emails, phone calls, faxes or notices claiming to be from the IRS. Many of these scams fraudulently use the IRS name or logo as a lure to make the communication more authentic and enticing. The goal of these scams-known as phishing-is to trick you into revealing personal and financial information. The scammers can then use that information-like your Social Security number, bank account or credit card numbers-to commit identity theft or steal your

Here are five things the IRS wants you to know about phishing scams.

1. The IRS doesn't ask for detailed personal and financial information like PIN numbers, passwords or similar secret access information for credit card, bank or other financial accounts. 2. The IRS does not initiate taxpayer communications through email and won't send a message about your tax account. If you receive an email from someone claiming to be the IRS or directing you to an IRS site:

Do not reply to the message.

· Do not open any attachments. Attachments may contain malicious code that will infect your computer.

· Do not click on any links. If you clicked on links in a suspicious email or phishing website and entered confidential information, visit the IRS website and enter the search term 'identity theft' for more information and resources to help.

3. The address of the official IRS website is http://www.irs.gov. Do not be confused or misled by sites claiming to be the IRS but ending in .com, .net, .org or other designations instead of .gov. If you discover a website that claims to be the IRS but you suspect it is bogus, do not provide any personal information on the suspicious

site and report it to the IRS.

4. If you receive a phone call, fax or letter in the mail from an individual claiming to be from the IRS but you suspect they are not an IRS employee, contact the IRS at 1-800-829-1040 to determine if the IRS has a legitimate need to contact you.

Report any bogus correspondence.

5. You can help shut down these schemes and prevent others from being victimized. Details on how to report specific types of scams and what to do if you've been victimized are available at http://www.irs.gov, keyword "phishing."

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

Are You and Your Family Prepared for Emergencies?

Personal preparedness is crucial for you and your family to be able to manage through an emergency, especially at times when you lose power or will be stuck in your home for several days.

One of the major lessons learned during and after Hurricane Katrina was that the first responder community will be just as severely impacted as everyone else and may not be able to get to you. The police, fire and EMS resources that are still operational will need to deal with life threatening issues first.

If you are able to stay in your home it is possible that you may need to provide for your family for 72 hours and maybe even longer until some essential services can be restored. Some of the basic items you should have available are: drinking water (three gallons per day for each member of your family), non-perishable food that doesn't require a microwave or oven to heat (remember, you may not have power); medication; a portable, battery-operated radio and flashlights or lanterns. Do not use candles, as any open flame can be a significant fire hazard.

If you must evacuate your home quickly, you should have a "go kit" prepared. This kit should include items such as: food, clothing, toiletries, medications, spare eye glasses, important documents such as your Social Security card and identifications, and possibly even sleeping bags. If you have a pet, make sure you have food and any medications it may need as part of your "go kit."

If you have family or friends out of the affected area and travel is not restricted, it may be a good idea to travel there or meet up with other family members if you are separated. If your family is not all together, you will need to have a communications plan, especially if telephone and cell phone service is interrupted. Information and communication are critical during emergencies.

Middlesex County currently has an Emergency Notification System that sends voice messages to people in affected areas. The county also has a selfregistry for emergency messaging via email or text. Middlesex County Alert allows the Middlesex County Office of Emergency Management to send email and text messages instantaneously to anyone who has registered as a user. Simply log in to www.unitedalert. com/middlesex to create a user name and to sign up as a Middlesex County Alert client. The service is free, only text messaging charges will apply if your carrier charges you for those services.

These items are just the basics when it comes to being prepared. Much more information is available on emergency preparedness for all hazards by going online to www.fema.gov or www.nj.gov/njoem.

Please remember to be prepared and have a plan; the well-being of your family may depend on it.





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

Parents must come in with their children if they wish to put a photo on the child's library card. Children under 14 who wish to use the Internet must have a parent or guardian stay with them while they are on the computer. Non-residents now have to pay \$2/hr (or any part of an hour) to use the Internet. Everyone who wants to use a computer must come to the reference desk to make a reservation.

We have an ongoing book sale where books are \$1 a bag. We have a wide variety of kids and adult books to choose from. We also have VHS tapes, DVDs, CD, Books on CD and cassette tapes. Prices range from \$.50 to \$1. To make room for the 2011 issues, we removed a majority of our 2009 magazines and they are available free. This is an ongoing process, so not all of the magazines will be out right away.

For all those who love to listen to audio books in their car or on their iPod or MP3 player, or read e-books

on their new e-reader, we are a part of ListenNJ. Listen NJ provides free access to two kinds of downloadable books. Audio books, such as MP3 and way files, are recordings to listen to. Some downloads are available for iPods and Macintosh computers (when you access the title, it will indicate if it is iPod compatible). E-books are digital books that are read on either a computer screen or on a portable reader. Library patrons should connect via the link "Free Audio Book Downloads" on our home page www. southplainfield.lib.nj.us; then choose the ListenNJ link you want and either go to the home page or directly to your e-book collection. You then log in with your valid library card to download desired titles. Please note that your account must be in good standing for this service to work.

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
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






BOE Adopts **Tentative** Budget

Last year, the proposed 1010/2011 school budget of \$52,299,264 was defeated by voters last April and then cut by \$1.25M by the members of the borough council.

Reasons for the increase outlined by Puleio include healthcare costs which have risen over 20%, a higher cost of fuel and energy, contractual increases and an additional pension assessment passed on by the state in order to cover the massive underfunding.

Also that evening, the board passed a resolution in support of N.J. Senate Bill 2043 and N.J. Assembly Bill 2960 entitled Restoration of Last Best Offer in Public School District Collective Bargaining. The practice, which allowed public employers to impose terms from their "last, best offer policy" when negotiations reached an impasse, had been the law in New Jersey until 2003 when it was repealed. Since repealing the "last, best offer policy" more contract negotiations have not been resolved before mediation and salary settlements in teacher contracts have grown at a faster rate than the cost of living.

The South Plainfield Education Association has been without a contract since July of last year. Negotiations are still ongoing.
