## Kathy Paroff recognized for her lifesaving CPR application on husband

Friend's of Kathy Paroff from the ambulance and rescue units of the Lowell Area Fire Departmentrefer lovingly to her husband, John, as the heavenly reject.

As many have read and heard, John Paroff suffered a heart attack on June 3 in his home at 591 Alden Nash. There were a few times after the heart attack where John did not have a heart beat.
John was able to attend a special recognition meeting in honor of Kathy and the Rescue and Ambulance personel because Kathy remained alert enough to contact the Emergency Medical Service (911) and then calm enough to start and continue C.P.R. on John until members of Lowell Ambulance and Rescue Units from the Lowell Area Fire Department arrived to start defibrilation.
"I will admit I called 911 before John passed out, I wasn't that calm after he passed out," Kath said.

John Krohmer, Medical Director of the Kent County EMS said, "Not often do we find that it is a EMS provider involved in the saving of a spouse's life," he said. "Often
times it's a citizen. This is a stressful time for folks and even more stressful when it involves a family member." Krohmer added that "Paroff's rescue was a wonderful example of a system working the way it should."
Krohmerwas in attendance at the Look Memorial Fire Station on Saturday to present certificates of recognition to Lowell's ambulance and rescue personel and to Kathy Paroff for their work in such a traumatic situation.
"Often times we don't recognize exceptional patuient care because we either don't know, don't take time," Krohmer said. "It's nice to be able to recognize the exceptional care. I think people have a tendancy to take for granted that ambulance and rescue personnel are going to be there."

John Paroff, who was also in attendance, continues to go to cardiac rehabilitation three times a week. "I'm feeling good. They really push you at the center. Itdoesn'tscareme. If something is going to happen that's the place where you want to be."

The approach is designed to help all students reach a higher level of understanding. "This approach is to ensure that all students don't fail to reach acertain level," said Jim White, Director of Special Education and Instruction.
The concept was derived from the school improvement program initiated in the Lowell Schools two years ago. The University of Chicago School Mathematics Program bestanswered the charge that students need toknow more math in any job these days. The National Council of Teachers of Mathematics states that students need to be taught more usable mathematic skills (e.g. statistics, geometry reading data, and probabilty).
Mike Michaud, spokeman of the LHS Math Department, said it will provide the groundwork for both teachers and students to promintc a better understanding of mathematics.
While Lowell students have scored well above average on the MEAP test (85-95 percentile), there are still a portion of high school Algebra II students placing in college Algebra I courses. Chairman of the Lowell Math Curriculum Council, Sue Beute, said making a good math program better is what prompted the new expectations.

Lowell's math department will work to this end by guaranteeing students will be offered the same material and will be tested on the material the same day.

The staff will also be accessiible at the beginning and end of the school day.

We're also hopeful the new concept will helpencourage students to be more responsible for their own education," Michaud said.

The failing grade cutoff in mathematics' courses will no longer be 60 percent. Instead students will have to attain a 70 percent or better.
