THE TOWN OF FREJUS on the French Riviera was hit Wednesday night by flood waters that burst a 185-foot high dam above the town. The AAA spokesman presented-the following tips to motorists who are not familiar with expressway driving, 1. Learn to stay in one lane

sudden stops. 3. Watch for exit signs, usually located about a quarter to half a mile ahead of a ramp. Signs are easy to miss when

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

The 1959 report, to date showed that two cases were reported in the Park; three in the Woods; and two in Harper Woods.

In June, in the Park, nonparalytic polio attacked a threefour vaccine injections; and in September, a 40-year-old man. who had received two shots, this year, on December 5. fell victim to paralytic bulbar

In the Woods, two brothers, recipients of three vaccine shots, contacted the disease, the oldest. 15 years, in July; and the youngest, 11, in August. And in September, a 23-yearold resident who received two shots, came down with polio. All were non-paralytic.

Two Brothers Stricken Two Harper . Woods brothers, one 10 years old, and the other seven years old, caught the disease, the former, non-paralytic and the latter, paralytic. Both had received three Salk

"Since the Salk Vaccine program was started in 1955," Dr. Davies said, "polio cases in the Health District almost came to a standstill. This is obviously due to the vaccine."

Dr. Davies disclosed figures which showed the decline in the number of cases since 1952.

32 Cases in 1952 In 1952 a total of 32 cases were reported, 17 were nonparalytic, and 15 paralytic; 1953 -cases reported were 28, eight of them non-paralytic and 16 the College Board Aptitude paralytic; and one person died; test. 1954 - 43 cases, 24 non-paralytic, 19, paralytic; and one person dead.

In 1955-start of the vaccine program, 20 cases were revealed, with 19 non-paralytic; and only one paralytic; 1956three cases known, two nonparalytic and one paralytic; 1957-seven cases, five nonparalytic and two, paralytic; and 1958-11 cases, eight nonparalytic and three, paralytic.

There have been no deaths. as a result of the disease, since 1954, the doctor stated.

This week marks the fiftieth anniversary of the Pointe's oldest business and oldest store building, the Verbrugge Market at 898 St. Clair avenue. Founded by Edmund Verbrugge in 1909, the store was first located on the corner of Mack avenue and Notre Dame, but since 1917 it has occupied

avenue. The Pointe has changed considerably since then and the present owner and son of the founder, 'Cyril Verbrugge, can chat at length about the "good old days" as well as the present ones. 

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Conviction and Courage

We detect signs of political anguish in the happily sparse criticisms created by the monumental goodwill tour undertaken by our President. Such immature mouthings as the one, "We need a formulator of sound foreign policy, not a traveling salesman" are akin to the many "sick" stories we have heard. Thank goodness, it is the story-tellers who are sick, and not our Chief Executive.

There were those of us who felt sorry for Queen Elizabeth when she made such a rigorous visit to Canada and to this country last summer. The demands upon the human system made by such a tour are almost unbelievable. When we learned that the queen was expecting enother child during those trying days, we were doubly sympathetic.

But here we have a man who has been through two serious illnesses, including a cardiac attack, who has undertaken one of the most physically taxing assignments imaginable. The task was self-assigned. The schedule to which he has subjected himself makes the queen's tour look like a casual after-dinner stroll across a few rods of pastoral landscape.

Ike's critics sound as though they are bitterly disappointed that he has sufficiently recovered his health to go on giving this country real leadership. It is a sorry thought, but they plant the seed that gives it birth. Our "traveling salesman" looks marvelously fit in the television pictures that have come back during these first days of his trip. The incredible enthusiasm of the welcomes extended him in every country he visits give evidence that he is doing a good "selling" job. We hope his critics are strong enough to swallow the disappointments they must feel.

Here is a completely dedicated man, who feels so strongly about peace and the aims of his government in relation to bettering as much of the world as is possible, that he wants to carry the message personally, no matter what physical impairment he might suffer. It seems to us the puerile mutterings of the critics should be lost under an avalanche of prayers for the continued success and the safe return of a man of great conviction and courage.

Dexter Masno Ferry, Jr.

With the passing of Mr. Ferry, Grosse Pointe lost one of its leading residents. Having had the privilege of working with him on his last and largest contribution to this community, the writer had an unusual opportunity to get to know this truly outstanding man.

Shy and modest, Mr. Ferry looked upon wealth as an obligation and responsibility. He wanted no credit for his benefactions, and made every effort to avoid publicity. During his lifetime, few of his philanthropies were publicized, and only with his grudging approval. Announcement of his magnificent gift of the Central Library building in its entirety was permitted only after six months of effort by the Public Library staff, and the Friends of the Grosse Pointe Public Library. And then only because he became convinced that it would benefit the Public Library.

Here was a man who exemplified citizenship and service as few men have. At the same time, he was a highly successful businessman. He served his Country as a World War I soldier, made a lasting contribution as a member of the State Legislature, contributed to almost every important factor in Detroit's business and cultural life, served the City of Grosse Pointe as Mayor and Councilman almost continuously from 1920 to 1951, and probably the major share of his philanthropies in Grosse Pointe, Detroit and elsewhere remain untold, because that was his wish.

His gift of \$500,000 to build the Central Library was almost twice the amount he had committed himself to make, but it was his expressed wish that not one item be changed, because he had great confidence in the architect, Marcel Breuer, and because he wanted it to be a gem, and a model for other libraries. He stated that he wanted to build the library because it would serve all Grosse Pointers, and he told members of the staff on several occasions of his great satisfaction in the tremendous use made of the building. He received much pleasure from dropping in of a busy evening and watching adults, students and children crowding its interior.

And yet, he refused to have the library named in his honor, as all of us wished. After much consideration, he asked "that a sign be placed on the front, Grosse Pointe Public Library, because that's what it is. If you wish to honor me in some way, place a plaque inside, and I'll write it myself." And he did, giving a major share of the credit to his friend Murray Sales, who was also an important benefactor. This plaque stands just inside the main entrance.

Those who read library reports know that the Central Library has far exceeded all expectations as to use. The building has been visited by architects and librarians from around the world. Almost every major library erected in America in recent years has been influenced by its architecture. As long as the Central Library stands, it will be an enduring memorial to him.

Today we live in a model community, largely because Grosse Pointe has been blessed with families who were proud to be residents, and have felt an obligation to contribute to it. Year by year, our pioneer residents are passing, and our beautiful lake shore mansions are being destroyed, but the spirit of these great men and women will always remain in the Grosse Pointe organizations and institutions which they made possible. And a prominent place on this honor roll must be given to Mr. D. M. Ferry, Jr., a man who loved his community.

Farms Submits **Building Report**

Eleven miscellaneous construction permits issued by the Farms during the month of November, boosted the number of all types of building permits granted since the beginning of the year to 135, according to a monthly report from City Engineer Murray M. Smith.

Last month's permits were valued at a total of \$125,600, making the over-all value of the 135, just \$1,421,750.

For the first time in months, no permits were granted for residential construction, and since January 1, one business building permit was granted.

Up to and including November 30, Mr. Smith revealed, 19 residential permits, valued at \$688,000 had been approved and 115 miscellaneous, worth \$710,-250. The single business permit

The November permits granted included one for fire repair at 123 Kercheval; and for a seawall and fill at 16 Lake Shore road and 32 Lake Shore. The former is worth \$7,000, and the latter, \$98,000.

His topic, illustrated with color slides, will be "American Glass at the Henry Ford Museum.



A traitor to his class, but the saviour of the common people; this was Governor Hazen Pingree's reputation. Re-elected three times as the Republican standard bearer, he was rejected by the big party wheels, Mc-Millan and Newberry, who refused him their support, even snubbed him socially.

Pingree's accomplishments were many. He persuaded the utility companies to lower their rates. (In 1894 municipal lighting had cost \$140; the following year it was down to \$36). He fought the street railways which were corrupt; stood for direct primary elections for cities, and attacked the railroads, which paid no taxes on the real estate, equipment and buildings owned but only on earnings.

Hazen Pingree's grandson, Gilbert Pingree, lives in Voltaire place, his daughter, Mrs. Wilson Mills, makes her home in Woodland place. Sons and daughters of the magnates who opposed Pingree live in the Pointe, too.

The governor began life in Maine, worked in a Massachusetts shoe factory as a lad. He enlisted in the Union Army and was captured by the Confederate cavalry under John Mosby and sent to Andersonville prison. While he was incarcerated in the most miserable of Southern prisons he met a few Detroiters, who told him there were great opportunities in the expanding Michigan city. After five months in Andersonville he was released and rejoined his regiment around Petersburg to watch the dying months of Lee's Army of Virginia. He was a private in Company 7 of the First Massachusetts Regiment of Artillery.

After demobilization he came to Detroit and began to manufacture shoes with Charles H. Smith in 1866. By 1890 the company was doing one million dollars worth of

The GOP was looking for a winning candidate that year to break the Democrats' strangle hold on the state. They chose Pingree and he was a winner. For that first election he had the party support, and the aid of Senator James McMillan. His methods in office scon lost him prominent Republicans' support but the party could not fail to let him run, he was such a tremendous vote getter.

Many of the reforms Pingree initiated did not become legislation until many years after his terms as governor, but it was his forceful leadership which set the scene for action. The governor died in the summer of 1901 in London from a fever caught on a tour of South America. His statue stands in Grand Circus Park, as a reminder to today's citizens of what they owe this guardian of the people's rights.


