Thursday, August 17 REBEL PILOTS were unsuccessful in their attempt to assassinate King Hassan II of Morocco by attacking his airliner, strafing the air terminal and after he landed, shooting up the Royal Palace. Loyalist F5 fighters repelled the rebels, and Loyalist troops took over key points and installations. Within three hours after the attack, an official communique reported the king unhurt, but that several persons were wounded or killed in the airport straffing. This was the second try on the King's life in 13 months.

Friday, August 18 THE HOUSE, by a vote of 282 to 102, passed a bill to bar the courts from ordering long distance busing of students to desegregate public schools. The bill will also permit the reopening of recent desegregation cases to determine whether the court rulings conform with the new legislation. The stiff curbs, applying to both the North and South, were approved by wide margins after nearly 12 hours of debate. Architects of earlier civil rights legis-lation protested that advances of the past were being wiped

Although the battlefield reports appear to worsen in the northern section of South Vietnam, improvements were disclosed in the southern half. Three major highways, closed since Friday by enemy attacks, were reopened to permit the flow of foodstuff from the Mecong Delta and the central highlands. A fourth highway remained cut north of Saigon.

Petersen said, regarding the SEMTA action, "We are concerned that the mass transportation package is not going to pass and the coach line cannot continue to op-erate without the purchase of six new buses." This, plus the city's share of the authority's deficit, could cost The Woods an estimated \$75,000 to \$85,000 by the end of the year, he added.

As for the transportation package, hearings have been conducted on it this week.

Along with the other Pointes and St. Clair Shores. The Woods pays a percentage of the \$5,000 per month operating subsidy to SEM-TA, if needed. And as noted in other NEWS stories, it has been needed.

The Woods pays the largest percentage, 27 percent, followed by St. Clair Shores' 25. The Park pays 20 percent; The Farms, 16; The City, eight, and The Shores, four.



Meanwhile, many of the South High students who initiated the controversy will be in college when and if a decision is reached.





The fees collected from this system will offset the costs of personnel needed to operate the reservation system and provide supervision and maintenance at the courts.

If the revenue from the fees exceeds operating ex-penses, it would be used for court maintenance and future improvements.

Other rules include that hours of play will be from daylight until 10 p.m. and reservations required from 8 a.m. until 10 p.m. On weekends, holidays and after 5 p.m. weekdays, court reservation preference will be given to persons 17 years of age and over.

Reservations will be taken on a first come first serve basis and will be taken beginning at 7:45 each morn-

Reservations must be made in person by a resident of the Grosse Pointe School District. Identification, in the form of a drivers license or park pass, must be provided at the time of making reservations. The person making the reservation must list all other participants by name and community.

Much of the opposition to "yes" vote on the September 7 school and library millage proposal is based on (1) the feeling that taxes are too high already and (2) vague suggestions that our schools could spend their money more efficiently if they really tried.

Grosse Pointers don't know how good we've got it here! Our family moved to The Farms last year from a wellto-do suburb of Philadelphia. Our property tax there was nearly 50 percent higher than it is here. And in return for those truly high taxes there, we had a second-rate school system, a three-man police force, and occasional road repair. Nothing else. (No sidewalks, no trash pickup, no municipal water or sewage systems, no public library, no Farms pier, and only volunteer fire department). Needless to say, we are de-lighted with all the services that our properly taxes provide in Grosse Pointe.

Sometimes 1 can't help but feel that Grosse Pointe civic pride is no deeper than its weed-free, edged, mowed. and watered green lawns. The additional revenue that our schools and libraries are asking from each property owner is probably not as much as that property owner spends on water to keep his lawn green during the summer months. In case you are still interested in Muskie, we suggest "Muskie of Maine" David Nevin (1972). Here the author portrays the man as having directness, homespun integrity and apolitical candor. He's just a plain, open, direct man!

An interesting book by James Barber is "The Presidential Character" (1972), which is a psycho-analytical study of modern presidents from Taft to Nixon. This should appeal to those interested in charting the presidential personality. Two approaches, which, I

believe, belong together, are 'The Presidency," by Dale Vinyard and "The Election Game, and How to Win It," by Joseph Napolitan. The first is a textbookish overview of the modern presidential process and authority. It is factually reliable, although written in a somewhat pedantic style. The second is "a fascinating informal memoir by a political consultant emeritus who comes across as a true craftsman and a potent ad-ministrator." It is not a handbook, but, the author says, it will be used as such candidates, managers, pollsters, and other pros. In researching this mater-

ial I ran across two new books which are being talked about and deal with high government processes. The first by Robert Winter-Berger entitled "The Washington Pay-Off: An Insider's View of Corruption in Government." The author has sensational disclosures concerning some of the most recognizable names on the American political grid such as Johnson, Nixon, Bobby Baker and others high in office.
