'Hawaii Marine' captures top honors

"Our liberty depends on the freedom of the press, and that cannot be limited without being lost." This statement by Thomas Jefferson confirmed his strong confidence and faith in the American press. Therefore, it is indeed an honor for the *Hawaii Marine* to be selected to represent the Marine Corps during competition for one of the prestigious, Department of Defense, Thomas Jefferson Awards.

Awards recognize different categories of military media

products, such as radio, television, and newspapers.

"The awards are presented to media personnel for professional excellence," said Gunnery Sergeant Steve Merrill, Division of Public Affairs, Headquarters Marine Corps. "They also recognize outstanding achievement in promoting a fuller understanding of the missions of the United States Armed Forces; and in informing our military personnel on the events of the times, their heritage as American citizens, and the vital roles they play in the defense of the nation, and preservation of peace."

The *Hawaii Marine* belongs to the category of "civilian, commercial enterprise newspaper." There is no cost to the Marine Corps. The entire cost of the newspaper is covered by the civilian, commercial ads contained within.

"A committee of three journalistic professionals preferred the *Hawaii Marine* over all other authorized civilian, commercial enterprise newspapers throughout the Marine Corps," said Merrill. "Three other experts in the field of journalism will judge the Thomas Jefferson Awards from all the Department of Defense-affiliated nominations

they have received thus far."

The *Hawaii Marine* has already won a Division of Public Affairs Merit Award, as the Marine Corps nomination for the coveted "T.J." The Merit Award is presented, as the certificate reads, "for professionalism and excellence

through journalistic achievement."

"A newspaper entry must meet the highest standards of production, presentation, execution, and professional excellence," continued Merrill. "The newspaper is carefully

studied and evaluated on the quality of stories contained within, priority of those stories, headlines and photos, and layout and design."

Official Thomas Jefferson Award winners will be announced by Dec. 31.

Grenada welcomes Marines

GRENADA (DELAYED) — October 17 and 18, Marines and sailors from the 22nd Marine Amphibious Unit boarded their ships in Morehead City, N.C., and Norfolk, Va., to continue a peacekeeping mission in Beirut, Lebanon.

Trained, prepared and mentally ready for their mission, they had no way of knowing their role would change. On Oct. 20, the unit received a warning order to head for the tiny island of Grenada.

"We were instructed to sail to a certain point to the south. When we reached that point we were to head for the Middle East unless otherwise instructed," explained Lieutenant Colonel Ronald C. Rice, the MAU's executive officer.

Then the word came. The MAU commander, Colonel James P. Faulkner received his orders: to make an amphibious landing in Grenada. It

was to be the largest U.S. combat action since the Vietnam conflict.

"Our foremost duty was to assist in evacuating American citizens and other foreign diplomats," explained Faulkner, "and, to maintain the peace.

"We were also assigned to maintain stability so the government of Grenada would have sufficient time to take control of its country."

The 22nd MAU leaders had 48 hours before H-hour to plan their mission. With little intelligence on terrain and resistance forces, an operational plan was put together.

"I don't even know how long, but I've never gone without sleep so long," recalled the MAU's operational officer, Major Ernie Vanhuss, the Marine primarily responsible for putting the plan together. "I didn't know my body could take that punishment, and we're still doing it, but I enjoy every minute of it."

The Marine leaders were not the only ones with sleepless nights. Ground forces of 2d Battalion, 8th Marines packed their field gear

and cleaned their weapons. Mechanics turned their wrenches and crew members secured their machines guns, preparing Marine Medium Helicopter Squadron 261's helicopters for launch. Marine Amphibious Unit Service Support Group 22 inventoried its equipment in support of the logistics part of the operation.

Teamwork was not only visible among the Marines; the 4th Naval Amphibious Group provided extra firepower, transportation and shelter. Chaplains were right there with the Marines for moral support. Corpsmen packed their medical kits and were ready to cross the same roads as the Marines.

The long hours of preparation put the key in the door of success for the Marines. But what turned the key and opened that door was the mobility of the 1,800-man Marine task force. By the end of the operation, they had flown over, drove through and walked on four-fifths of the northern portion of the island.

Ships named for Marines

The 13 ships that will be chartered for the Maritime Prepositioning Ships program are going to be named after Marine Medal of Honor recipients.

The ships have been designated "TAKX" — "T" means civilian crewed, "A" means auxiliary, "K" means cargo, and "X" means the ships do not yet have a numerical designator.

The MPS program was initiated by the Secretary of Defense in August 1979, creating a new option for increasing the responsiveness of Marine Corps forces requiring immediate and rapid deployment.

The original concept called for the pre-positioning of the majority of the equipment of a heavily mechanized on board commercial ships deployed to forward areas and manned by Military Sealift Command crews. Then, for a specific contingency or crisis, the equipment would be administra-

tively off-loaded and "married up" with MAB personnel and their equipment which would be flown to the area.

The first ship will be ready for delivery in September 1984 and will be named after Corporal Louis J. Hauge Jr. The remaining ships will be completed by March 1986 and will ultimately support three MABs.

They will be named after the following Medal of Honor recipients: Sergeant Matej Kocak, Private First Class James Anderson, Private First Class Eugene A. Obregon, Private First Class William B. Baugh, Major Stephen W. Pless, First Lieutenant Alexander Bonnyman Jr., Private Harry Fisher, Sergeant William R. Button, First Lieutenant Jack Lammus, First Lieutenant Baldomero Lopez, Second Lieutenant John P. Bobo and Private First Class DeWayne F. Williams.

Courts-Martial Report



EDITOR'S NOTE: The information contained in *Courts-Martial Report* is submitted by the Joint Legal Service Center and is published as a source of information for all Marines.

Private James E. Councillor III, Marine Air Base Squadron 24, was convicted at trial by special court-martial of unlawfully striking a noncommissioned officer; willfully disobeying a lawful order from a superior NCO; wrongfully communicating threats to injure an NCO and a staff NCO.

He was sentenced to four months confinement at hard labor, forfeiture of \$350 pay per month for four months, and a bad-conduct discharge from the U.S. Marine Corps.

Private Clifford W. Hoover, MABS-24, was convicted at trial by special court-martial of disobeying a lawful command from his superior commissioned officer to provide a urine sample for testing; being disrespectful in language toward his superior NCO; and willfully disobeying the lawful order of his superior NCO to come back.

He was sentenced to four months confinement at hard labor and forfeiture of \$380 pay per month for four months.

Private Fred Perez, Station Operations and Maintenance Squadron, was convicted at trial by general court-martial of rape.

He was sentenced to five years confinement at hard labor, total forfeiture of all pay and

allowances, and a dishonorable discharge from the U.S. Marine Corps.

Religious Program Specialist-1 Gary M. Matson, Headquarters Company, 1st Marine Brigade, was convicted at trial by special court-martial of two specifications of taking improper liberties with a female under the age of 16.

He was sentenced to two months confinement at hard labor, reduction to E-1, and a bad-conduct discharge from the U.S. Navy.

Lance Corporal Kenneth O. Allen, Marine Air Control Squadron 2, was convicted at trial by special court-martial of violating a lawful general regulation by wrongfully having in his possession property of the U.S. government; larceny of U.S. government property; and wrongfully possessing 0.2 grams of marijuana.

He was sentenced to two months of confinement at hard labor, forfeiture of \$200 pay per month for two months, and reduction to private first class.

Voting officers should maintain FPCA stock

Although the 1984 presidential election is almost a year away, the primary elections begin early in the year with New Hampshire voting in February, and it is expected more absentee voters will participate. More than 90 percent of military voters use the absentee process. In the 1980 presidential election, more voters cast their ballots through the absentee process than ever before. The Federal Post Card Application, the key to the entire voting process for those eligible to use it, will be in greater demand.

The Federal Voting Assistance Program (FVAP) suggests each military voting officer ensure there are enough FPCAs on hand to meet the anticipated increase in absentee voter activity, by having on hand four FPCAs for each military person in the unit. This amount takes into consideration the requirements for registration and absentee ballot requests for the presidential primary, state primary, runoff election and for the general election in 1984.

Each military unit has either a voting officer or counselor to

provide information and assistance. American civilians overseas wishing to vote may visit an American embassy or consulate for assistance. Some corporations with U.S. citizens overseas also provide the FPCA to their eligible employees.

Voting officers and counselors should contact their publications, supply, or distribution officer to ensure an adequate supply of FPCAs. If there is difficulty in ordering the necessary number of FPCAs, contact the voting officer at your next higher command for

assistance. If you are unable to obtain the FPCA through proper channels, you may contact the Director, Federal Voting Assistance Program, Department of Defense, Room 1B457, The Pentagon, Washington, D.C. 20301 or telephone AC (202) 694-4928/4960, or Autovon 224-4928/4960.

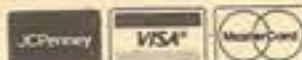

Local Marine Corps paper boasts varied forerunners

"Windy retires" today after over 19 1/2 years" was the headline announcing the marriage of the *Windward Marine* and the *Leeward View*, and the birth of the *Hawaii Marine* in June 1972.

The *Hawaii Marine* has the overall responsibility of serving all the Marine Corps commands on Oahu; a legacy left by its parents.

The *Windward Marine* covered the happenings on Marine Corps Air Station, Kaneohe Bay, Territory of Hawaii, and the *Leeward View* served Marines stationed on the other side of the island.

Windward Marine The first published issue of the *Windward Marine* came out on Friday, Oct. 30, 1953. (Few *Hawaii Marine* readers were even born then.) It was a four-page tabloid-size paper twice the size of its father, the (Naval Air Station) *Kaneohe Klipper*.

Windy was named, by contest, while still in the infant stage more than a year before it became a newspaper. Sergeant Joseph Remis and Master Sergeant Irwin F. Waldvogel, the then station sergeant major, were the joint

winners of the "Name the Mimeograph Newsletter" contest in May 1952.

By November 1952, the *Windward Marine Newsletter* had won a first-place award for service mimeograph newspapers.

As Windy grew, so did its format and content. From 1953 to 1972 its size ranged from 17 inches by 11 3/4 inches to 22 inches by 15 3/4 inches per page. Its flag boasted its uniqueness — "where air and ground meet," referring to the 1st Marine Brigade.

Over the years, it announced events such as: the arrival of women Marines to the air station; visits by Jane Russell, Tennessee Ernie Ford, William Powell, Henry Fonda and Sammy Davis Jr., and the original Random Urinalysis Screening Test in 1972.

As the *Windward Marine* waved its final aloha, it waved in a new squadron. The headline read, "SOMS commissioned today."

The Joint Public Affairs Office still receives mail addressed to the *Windward Marine*.

Leeward View Marines read the *Leeward View* for the first time in November 1959. It too began as a four-page at 10 inches by 14 inches per page. It remained that size.

Its smallness did not hinder its content. The Special Services-operated fact sheet provided information and entertainment to Camp Smith and barracks Marines for 13 years.

Page 1 handled national and local Marine Corps news, while Page 2 carried a feature layout. Sports took up Page 3 and normally included news about the swim, football, baseball and shooting teams. Page 4 generally displayed information from the chaplain, the theater schedule, letters to the editor, awards and decorations and an occasional "For Sale."

Hawaii Marine The merger between the *Windward* and *Leeward* papers June 30, 1972, consolidated Kaneohe Bay, Camp Smith and Marine Barracks Pearl Harbor, Barbers Point and Naval Ammunition Depot, Oahu into one readership — *The Hawaii Marine*.

The initial issue of the new eight-page paper was published Friday, July 7. The main newspaper staff at Kaneohe Bay maintained operational control of the paper with information sent in by correspondents from the other areas.

Ten correspondents were spread throughout Oahu, four at Kaneohe Bay, two at Camp Smith, two at Marine Barracks NAD, one at Marine Barracks Pearl and one at Marine Barracks, Barbers Point. Barracks correspondents submitted their material to the Camp Smith people, who in turn submitted it to the main newspaper staff.






Content of the *Hawaii Marine* during its formative years included service club news, dependent and other voluntary organization notices, special services and exchange tips, education notes, messhall menus, movie schedules, free classified advertisements and the chaplain's information, all of which were standing headlines. News briefs, in-depth news articles, feature material and personnel recognition coverage (written or photographic) took priority.

With the exception of size changes, the *Hawaii Marine* remained pretty much the same until 1980.

On Jan. 4, the paper lost its non-appropriated fund status and became a commercial enterprise publication. That meant two

VA advisory committee benefits military women

SAN FRANCISCO — Administrator of Veterans Affairs Harry N. Walters has appointed an 18-member advisory committee to counsel him on the special needs of woman veterans.

The committee was established to advise Walters on VA health care, rehabilitation, benefits, compensation and outreach programs needed by woman veterans.

According to the 1980 census, women make up 3.8 percent of the nation's veteran population. There are 1.1 million woman veterans in the United States; 149,505 women veterans live in California and 5,550 in Nevada. Their ages range from 20 to 85.

Walters named retired Army Colonel Lorraine Rossi as committee chairman. Most of the committee members are woman veterans from World War II and the Korean and Vietnam conflicts.

One member, Staff Sergeant Cheryll S. Galligan, is an active duty noncommissioned officer in the U.S. Army.

Walters said committee members were recommended by veterans' organizations, women's groups, professional associations and government agencies. The committee held its first meeting in Washington, D.C. Sept. 14-16.

"I look forward to working with this dynamic committee in planning for the increased number of woman veterans who will use the services of the Veterans Administration in the future," Walters said.

things; the Marine Corps no longer funded it, and ad space was no longer free.

The April 25 issue was the last to be published on Fridays. That issue also announced the upcoming "new look." On Wednesday, May 7, a new format and publishing date were introduced.

In the next two years, though its goals remained the same, its

appearance varied with each editor. Pages were added (12-32) and some weekly columns were dropped.

Today's *Hawaii Marine* is controlled solely by the the MCAS Kaneohe Bay Joint Public Affairs Office. The staff is smaller now, but the area of responsibility isn't. Input is still solicited and received from the Camp Smith office, but correspondents are no longer attached to Marine Barracks, Pearl Harbor.

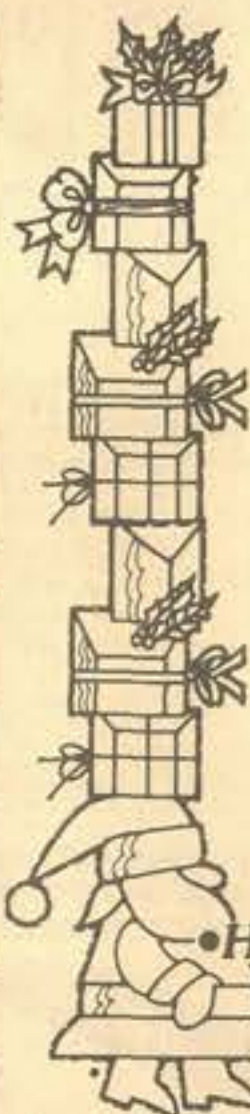

Chaplains mark 208 years of inspiration

EDITOR'S NOTE: Richard MacDonald was once a Marine journalist. This story, originally published several years ago, has been updated with new information.

Night brought sleep for me and a few other fortunate men who did not or could not stand a watch that night. The first rays of sunshine brought Palm Sunday to Korea. As I climbed Vegas Hill to see the men of Easy Company I thought, "What a different Sunday this was than the one that has been planned."

"No human choir was to sing for my men that day, only the chorus of enemy shells singing around them. No sermon telling of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem filled their hearts. But they were to feel eternal presence of God as they crouched in the trenches or hid in their rabbit holes for hours during the night and days ahead. No one had to ask them to pray. They did it naturally as a man would cry out for help if he were helpless."

So described Navy Chaplain Allen Newman in his vivid account of Marine actions during operation Vegas in the Korean War in 1953. The next entry was made three days later after the price had been paid and the hill secured.

"As I moved from tent to tent I could hear the retelling of a hero's deed, or softly, the mentioning of a buddy's name and then the deep silence that comes when death has passed that way. Empty cots and empty hearts were silent reminders of friends who had gone their way."

"Lives were changed in those past few days. God made His presence felt to men who never felt they needed Him before. A trench became for some the stepping stone to heaven while to others it was the beginning of a new life with God. None were ashamed to admit their need of God — None held back a word of praise about Him."

War has always been a terrible thing and even the strongest of soldiers knows what it is to be afraid. The uncertain position of a soldier's life, especially in war, tends to make him one of the most religious of men.

The Continental Congress was aware of the spiritual needs of Naval and Marine personnel back in 1778 when it first proposed that chaplains be provided to ships wherever possible. In fact, the first naval chaplain's death came as a result of the Confederate States Ship Merrimac ramming the United States Ship Cumberland in 1862.

Speaking on the history of the Navy Chaplain Corps, Chaplain Clifford Drury explained, "No corps of the Navy developed under such handicaps and difficulties as did the Chaplain Corps. For decades, Navy chaplains were the poorest paid officers in the Navy. For

about 20 years, their number was limited to nine; and then for 72 years the total on duty could not exceed 24. During most of the Navy's history, chaplains labored under discriminatory regulations regarding status, uniform and rank. It was not until World War I

that the Chaplain Corps came into its own." Since the Marine Corps has no Chaplain Corps, its personnel, from the beginning, have been included in the Naval chaplaincy. The earliest known reference to any extensive work by Navy chaplains for Marines dates back to

1862. It was not until the summer of 1912 however, when Navy Chaplain J.F. Flemming served the first exclusive duty with Marines sent to Nicaragua.

Thirteen Navy chaplains served with Marines on the battlefields of France in World War I. At Belleau Wood, 2nd Division Marines with their brigade suffered the heaviest losses experienced by any American brigade during a single operation in the war. One of five Navy chaplains participating in the Belleau Wood conflict was Chaplain J.J. Brady. Describing the experience of a chaplain, Brady wrote:

"Dead bodies, dying men, exploding shells, whining bullets, mustard gas . . . And he of all men had to be cheery, had to perk up and say pleasant words and . . . that, in spite of the horribly demoralizing influence of the bloody handling of the bodies of men with whom he had associated and chatted intimately only a few hours before."

Nineteen Navy chaplains have lost their lives in combat action. Sixteen of these casualties occurred in World War II (three died in Japanese prison camps). Two died in the Vietnam Conflict.

The history of the Navy chaplain's work with Marines in World War II paralleled that of the Fleet Marine Force in their island campaigns. Summarizing these operations, Drury said, "The heroic conduct of Navy chaplains in combat in WW II had added lustre to the whole Corps. In countless instances they have gone far beyond the calls of ordinary duty to minister not only to the spiritual but also the physical and other needs of Navy and Marine personnel."

The Chaplain Corps contribution to Navy and Marine efforts was no less great in Korea and Vietnam. Almost without exception the Marine Corps recognized this in the awards which they gave to the chaplains concerned.

Many chaplains likewise noted the extreme courage and fortitude displayed by their Marines. "With the 1st Marine Division in Korea," states Marine correspondent Technical Sergeant Bill Daum, describing a memorial service conducted by a chaplain, "greater love hath no man than this; that a man lay down his life for his friends . . . Anyone watching the hundreds of battle-hardened leathernecks would find it hard to believe that 10 days before, this silent, prayerful group had shattered one Red assault after another in a life and death struggle."

Tremendous changes have taken place in the life and organization of the Navy Chaplain Corps since 1778 when Benjamin Balch, the first known chaplain to serve in the Continental Navy, walked the decks of the small frigate Boston.

"Though new conditions," states a historical

text on the history of the chaplaincy, "frequently demanded unusual initiative and flexibility in the performance of duty, the mission of the Corps remained the same: to protect, encourage, and train personnel of the Navy in the realization and development of moral and spiritual values consistent with the religious beliefs of the individual concerned."

Today the chaplaincy has realized its authorized end strength of 1078 active duty chaplains representing 61 denominations. There are 261 chaplains assigned to the Marine Corps.

The Chief of Chaplains billet was not established until 1944. Here again, it was war which instigated the need and led to the change in the chaplaincy.

Eleven Navy chaplains make up the Kaneohe Chaplaincy. The eight assigned to the Brigade are: Captain David White, brigade chaplain; Lieutenant Commander Charles E. Eis,

regimental chaplain; Lt. Cmdr. Richard D. Erb, Brigade Service Support Group; Lieutenants Martin Stahl and James L. Danner, Marine Air Group-24; Lt. Sammy L. Schwab, 1st Battalion 3d Marines; Lt. Jack Cahill, 2d Battalion, 3d Marines; and Lt. Cmdr. Thomas Dansak, 31st Marine Amphibious unit. The three station chaplains are Cmdr. John S. Frill, (command chaplain) Lt. Gary R. Pollitt, station chaplain; and Lt. Cmdr. Steven L. Jensen, chaplain, Family Service Center.

As with any team, the key to mission success lies in the cooperation of the individuals. In his article entitled "Men of All Faiths," columnist

George Sokolsky refers to the harmonious interaction between Jewish, Protestant and Catholic chaplains: "That men of all faiths can pray together in love even in the midst of wars of hate is a great victory. It is a recognition that love and not hate will save our race from degradation — yes, and even from extinction."

Nov. 28 marked the 208th birthday of the Navy's Chaplain Corps. Our chaplains here, elsewhere and throughout history deserve a salute of gratitude for their unceasing support, sacrifice and guidance, which they have and will continue to provide Navy and Marine Corps personnel everywhere.

Close inspection of audit sheet improves promo chances

John Wright is a picture-perfect Marine, squared away and vitally interested in his career... that's the way his last commanding officer described the sandy-haired corporal.

His current CO is puzzled, though. Wright has been a corporal longer than anyone else in the unit, and lately his performance has been slipping.

But Wright is more puzzled than anyone. He's watched his peers sew on sergeant stripes, get choice duty stations and advanced schooling. And now he's staring at orders for an unaccompanied tour to "the Rock."

He left Okinawa two years ago, and he and his wife and son had grown apart during that separation. Depressed with his new orders, he confided to an old friend over a drink one night that if it weren't for bad luck...

"Sounds to me like you've got more than just bad luck," said Sergeant Chuck Powers. "What's your RTD (rotation tour date) listed as on your VAS (visual audit sheet)?"

"I don't know," Wright shrugged, "but I know it's correct

'cause I signed it a couple of months ago."

"Was everything correct?" Powers asked. He felt dubious at his friend's vague answer.

"Sure," Wright said. "They wouldn't have had me sign it if it weren't, right?"

Powers was one of Wright's buddies who had climbed the ladder ahead of him, and the husky sergeant suggested they both go to admin the next morning and scope out the reason for Wright's bad luck. Powers was sure the fault lay in Wright's service record book.

And he was right... Somewhere down the line, through Wright's neglect, vital information had been left out. The result was disastrous.

"This block lists your overseas control date, John," Powers explained. "This shows you became eligible for an overseas tour in 1980."

"But that's when I went to Oki last time," Wright said.

Powers just shook his head as he uncovered more errors. "Haven't you completed a couple of college courses?" he asked.

"Yea. Three with Chaminade." "They're not listed."

"Oh."

"John, have you ever really taken a look at your VAS?" Powers asked.

"No," Wright answered meekly. "I figured it would be correct, otherwise they wouldn't have had it ready for me to sign."

Does this story sound familiar? While the two leathernecks don't exist, the problems do. And the solution can be found in an annual audit using the visual audit sheet.

The VAS lists vital information on a Marine's career. Everything from pay and allowances to promotions and assignments are affected by the information, right or wrong, that's listed.

The automated Manpower Management System and Joint Uniformed Military Pay System list 150 items of information on every Marine. And with promotions, pay and assignments computerized, it's vital that

Marines keep that information correct.

The VAS gives Marines an opportunity to check their records for errors. But they have to personally check every item on the VAS for accuracy.

How does incomplete information affect a Marine? Off-duty education and Marine Corps Institute courses add points to a leatherneck's composite score. If the courses aren't listed, a Marine

runs the risk of not being promoted when he is eligible.

Annual audits are conducted during the month that corresponds with the last digit of a Marine's Social Security account number. Don't just glance at the VAS and sign it. Make sure the information is correct.

Marines may learn more about the JUMPS/MMS and the annual audit by contacting their administrative office.

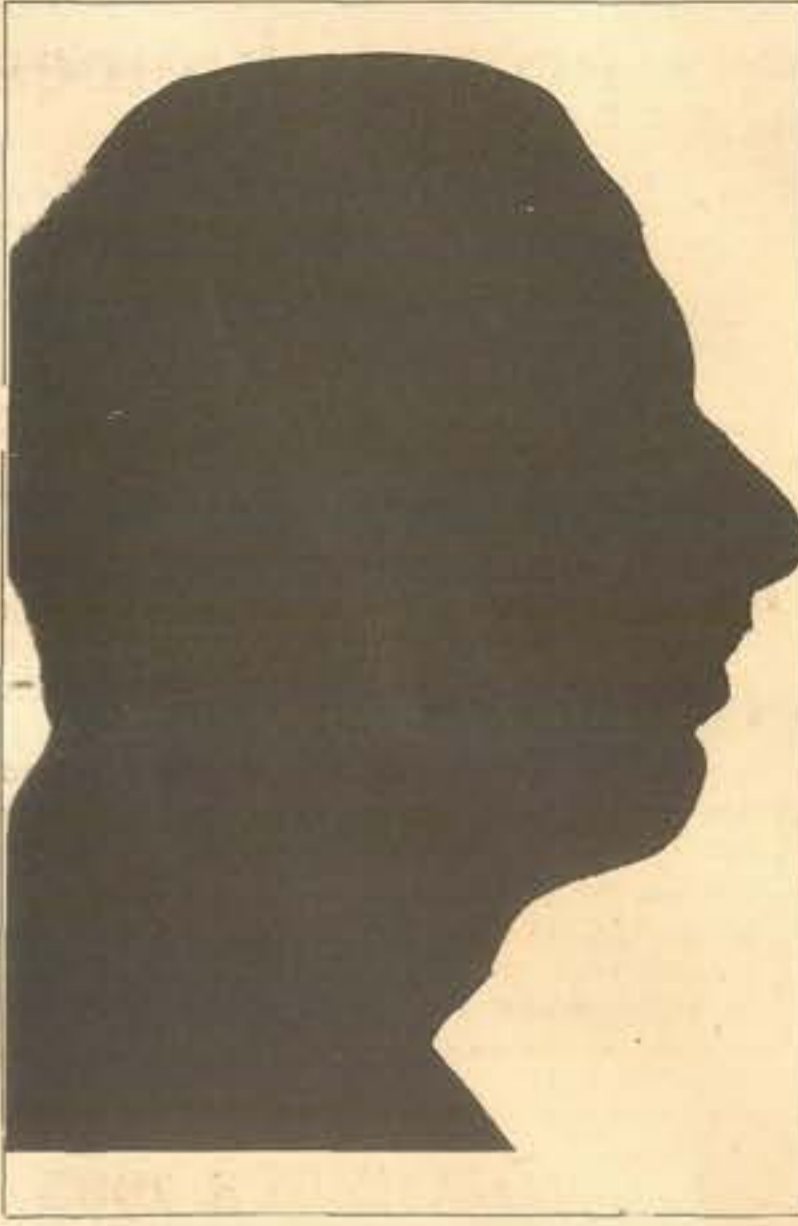

'Sergeant Yuk'

Beastly Marine puts the 'ugh' in 'ugly'

NEW RIVER, N.C. — Marines have earned the reputation for being good — no matter what they do. So it shouldn't surprise anyone that an ugly Marine becomes extraordinarily good at being ugly — so ugly, in fact, that his officer-in-charge entered his name in the National Ugly is Beautiful competition, conducted annually in Knoxville, Tenn.

Unfortunately, the 'Corps' Ugliest, Sergeant Rick L. Raynor, was deployed with Marine Medium Helicopter Squadron-264 in Beirut on May 11, the day the annual ugly pageant was scheduled. 'Round down' slated

The fiscal year 1984 Department of Defense authorization act repeals the "One Year Look-Back" provision, rounds retired pay down to the next lower dollar amount, and provides that active duty service will be rounded to the next lower whole month in computing retired pay.

"One Year Look-Back" has protected members who remain on active duty longer than 20 years from receiving less in retired pay than similar members retiring up to one year earlier. Over the years, its protective features have been replaced largely by the "Tower Amendment." Although repealed as of Sept. 24, the "One Year Look-Back" still has application until Sept. 24, 1986, for servicemembers eligible to retire/transfer to the fleet reserve before Sept. 24.

Rounding down of retired pay means that gross retired/retainer pay after Oct. 1 will be rounded down to the next lower dollar. As an example, a retired servicemember eligible for \$742.99 per month will be paid \$742 per month. The largest annual loss to any retiree, therefore, will be \$11.88 (12 x 0.99) with most losses lower than this figure. This change was made as part of a government-wide program to aid in reducing the federal budget deficit.

In computing retirement multiples, active duty service will now be rounded to the next lower whole month. For example: A servicemember with 24 years, 2 months, 29 days service will be credited with 24 years and 2 months; while a servicemember with 24 years, 7 months and one day of service will be credited with 24 years and 7 months. This is an improvement for many individuals.

In recent years, retirement eligible personnel with 20 or more years of service, had their retirement multiple rounded down to the next lower year if they had less than 6 months service to add to a whole year. For example: a servicemember with 24 years, 5 months, 29 days had service rounded down to 24 years.

Air fare discounted

During the past six months, Military Traffic Management Command has conducted extensive negotiations with several airlines in an attempt to obtain discounted travel for military family members.

As a result of these negotiations, USAir has agreed to allow dependents of active duty military personnel traveling with their sponsors who are on leave, pass, or within seven days of discharge, to purchase tickets for the same 50 percent discount USAir currently offers military members only.

The new program applies over all domestic USAir routes. Travel must be on a round-trip basis, and discount is off the normal round-trip coach fare. Particularly attractive features of the program are that reservations can be made anytime prior to departure and there are no blackout dates. This new military family furlough-fare program became effective Nov. 2.

The following requirements/conditions apply to the new fare: The member and accompanying dependents must travel together on all portions of the trip. Tickets must all be purchased at the same time. The member must present a green U.S. Armed Forces identification card (or discharge orders) and either a military dependent ID card (ATAN, DD Form 1173) for dependents 10 and older, or a birth certificate or facsimile for dependents 2 through 9 for each ticket purchased. (Children under age 2 travel free, no ID required). Other documentation accepted by the carrier as proof of dependent status includes adoption decree or statement of award, passport, or baptismal certificate.

When the dependent's surname is different than the military member's, evidence must be submitted to the satisfaction of the carrier concerning dependency status. Note: In addition to requiring the above documents at time of ticket purchase, the carrier may require documents to be presented for each member of the military family group when checking in at time of departure.

Maximum stay permitted for the round trip is one year. There is no minimum. Tickets may not be issued against a government transportation request or any other document issued by the U.S. Government as payment for transportation.

Additional information may be obtained and/or reservations and ticketing done by contacting the local scheduled airlines traffic office, a travel agent, or the nearest USAir ticket office or airport counter.

It wasn't without a price. The hot sun rays beamed down on their camouflaged combat gear, drenching them with their own body water. It would later take its effect in some Marine heat casualties. The extra water weight did not help the long marches up the steep hills and hazy brush terrain.

These natural elements did not stop the Marine offense. They were like walking armored humans, securing objective after objective, and sometimes encountering heavy resistance.

Hundreds of civilians (most American medical students) were evacuated by HMM-261 helicopters. The aviation crew themselves met with heavy resistance. During the first 48 hours of the operation, 261's pilots logged more than 300 flight hours.

The ground combat element, Battalion Landing Team 2/8 captured a large number of Cubans, Grenadians and other leftists. They found and retrieved hundreds of small-arm

weapons and ammunition to include two Cuban aircraft and several big guns.

"The morale is sky high," Faulkner said, proudly. "One reason is how well we were received by the Grenadians. We were not treated as conquerors, but as friends of the people."

The Grenadians were not only grateful in words, they handed out fresh fruit, ice water and cases of soft drinks to the Marines. "I'm going to have a huge bill; but I don't care. I want to show my appreciation to the Marines," said an elderly woman who gave her name only as Cleo. "We're just glad to see you guys."

The direct immediate feedback the Marines received from the Grenadians was "enough of a reward," according to the MAU Marines. They were looking forward, though, to continuing their initial mission.

"We're looking forward to sailing across the ocean peacefully and quietly," the commander said. "It's important for us to relieve the 24th MAU in Beirut, especially because of the October tragedy suffered there."

Officer promotions increased for two-year transition

HQMC, WASHINGTON, D.C. (MCNews) — Beginning with next year's selection boards, and continuing the following year, there will be more Marine Corps first lieutenants through lieutenant colonels selected for promotion than anticipated.

The change is the beginning of a two-year transitional period that will ultimately streamline the dates for promotion to captain through colonel, both unrestricted and limited duty. Two years from now, those promotions will be dated between Oct. 1 to Sept. 30 of a given year.

According to manpower plans and policy officials here, the

change will help facilitate manpower planning by pegging promotions within fiscal year cycles.

Currently, a staggered schedule is used for officer promotions: to colonel and lieutenant colonel, June 1-May 31 of any given year; to major, July 1-June 30; and captain, Aug. 1-July 31.

Additional selections have been added for the next two years simply because boards will have to pick for a larger promotion span. The colonel's board, for example, meeting in February, would normally have selected enough Marines to fill vacancies through May 31, 1985. With the switch in

policy, two months have been added to that date for each year, thus, the need for additional selections.

For all boards, the added selections will be divided between 1984 and 1985. By the beginning of fiscal year 1986, the transition will have been completed and the selection process will resume normally, filling vacancies for 12-month periods.

The preliminary selection

statistics for unrestricted officers during next year's board cycle are as follows:

- to colonel, 140 selections, including 39 more under the new policy. The projected date-of-rank for the junior Marine in the promotion zone is Nov. 1, 1979;
- to lieutenant colonel, 338 selections (an increase of 108). The promotion zone's junior eligible should have an Oct. 1, 1979 date-of-rank;
- to captain, 1,368 selections, including 223 under the new policy. Projected date-of-rank for the zone's junior Marine will be Nov. 1, 1982.

Next year's limited duty officer selections are as follows:

- to lieutenant colonel, eight selections, (an increase of two). The zone's junior Marine needs an Oct. 1, 1980 date-of-rank;
- to major, 59 selections, (an increase of 12). Junior Marine in

the zone should have a date-of-rank of Sept. 1, 1979;

- to captain, 142 expected selections (an increase of 20). The zone's junior Marine eligible needs a date-of-rank of Aug. 16, 1982.

punched their way through the HqCo, Bde defense for an additional six points. The extra point attempt failed again.

"It was at about that time, I started to hear the 'fat lady' sing," laughed Tate.

SECTION 1. Chapter 15 (1976 Traffic Code), City and County of Honolulu, as amended, is hereby further amended in the following particulars:

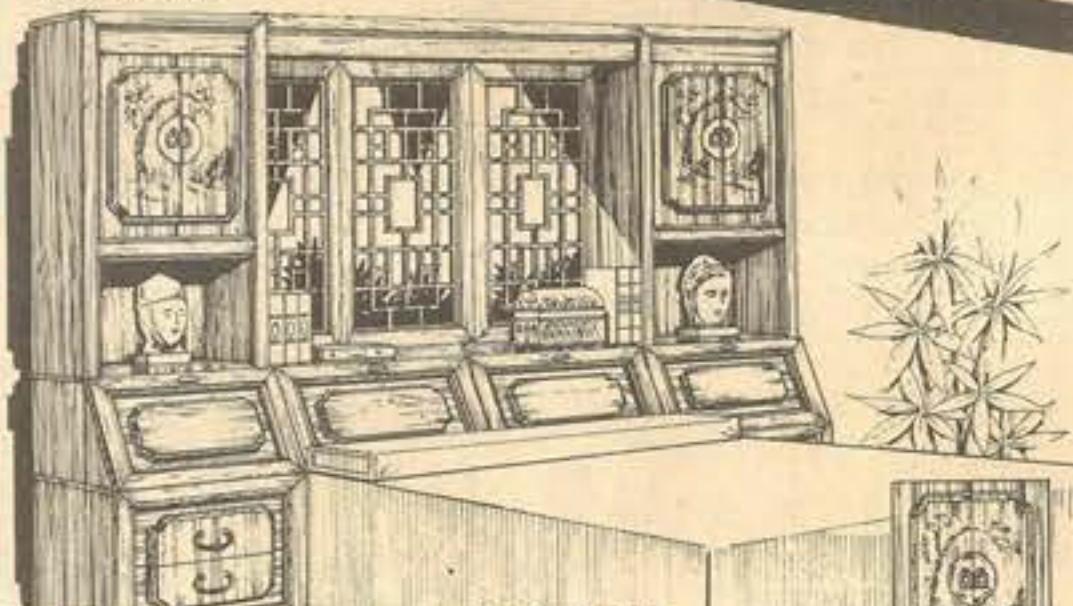
