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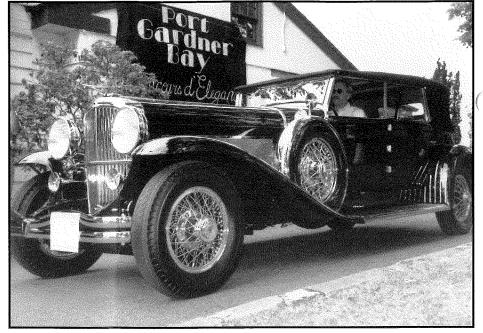

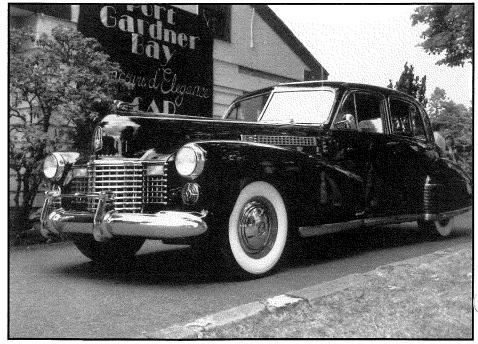

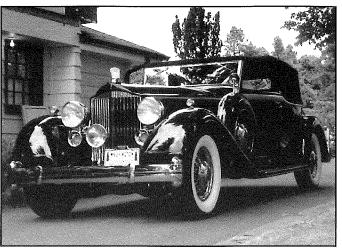

n Sunday, July 23, 1995 I attended the 4th Annual Port Gardner Bay Concours d'Elegance at the beautiful Legion Park at Everett, Washington. This is a wonderful event which takes place at an elegant setting that is very easily accessible - especially to those of us who live in the northwest.

I believe this event, which benefits Deaconess Children's Services, a nonprofit multi-service agency, could become a major event for the Classic Car Club - Pacific Northwest Region. The show has taken place for four years now, and each year I have seen tremendous improvement in both the quality of the event and the quantity of the participants. The Concours offers several levels of participation including judged and display only classes.

I can envision CCCA-PNR getting involved by providing qualified concours judges, volunteers to help with ticketing and promotion, and

cars for display. I see it as an opportunity to undertake a worthwhile project which benefits the community as well as giving the club an annual midsummer event to look forward to.

Deaconess Children's Services, now in its 97th year, serves as an important resource to hundreds of families each year through five different programs it administers. These programs provide community support for families in crisis who would not otherwise have anywhere to turn to for help.

I believe that the Pacific Northwest Region of The Classic Car Club of America would miss a marvelous opportunity if we fail to become a major sponsoring force behind this event.

So many Classic Car Club members were participating as Judges and showing cars we really must simply say the majority of our members were in attendance and participating.

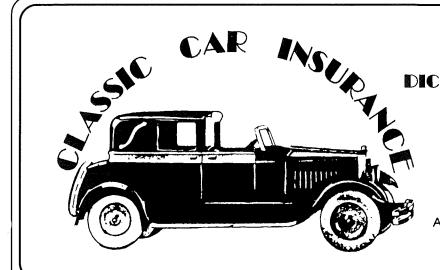

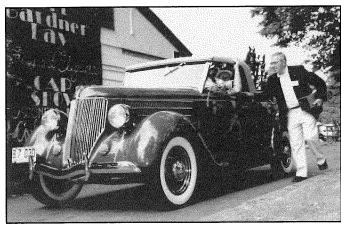

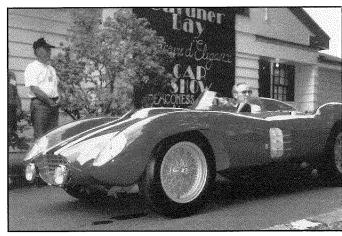

We proceeded on the freeway at full tilt with no problems after Sherri Via figured out a detour route around fresh oil at Spanaway. We arrived at 3:00 pm at the Century Plaza in Tualatin. Rick Turner drove his rare right-hand drive Cord Sportsman, Gayle and I drove the '38 yellow Victoria Packard, Carl and Chris Bomstead were in their newly acquired 1947 Cadillac convertible, Gary and Sherri Vig drove a 1936

Packard Super Eight convertible coupe and Bill and Karel Deibel were in a restored Corvair (nc).

At 6:00 pm John Milliken led Stafford, Oregon up to Pete's and the beautifully prepared estate of Ken and Carol Roberts. John's 1939 Cadillac convertible was great to watch on the road through the wonderful countryside. The Robert's huge garage is filled with cars and very large neon signs. In the center of it all he has constructed a complete Mobil gas station: roof, walls, island, display cases, doors, a register, phone, really complete!

One corner held a large soda fountain where dessert was served.

Kens emphasis is on 'fifties convertible GM cars. Classics among the collection were a 1930 Packard boattail speedster and a1927 Franklin convertible. More than seventy of us sat down to a catered

After dinner the guests toured the Roberts' home. It is filled with vintage dolls, posters, games and pinball machines. a Nash Metropolitan is hung on the living room wall. The game room kept lots of us busy for hours.

Saturday morning was bright and sunny and John showed up in his 1934 Packard convertible sedan. He led us to Newberg Airpark where the classics were parked under a Ford Tri-Motor airplane. We watched 30 vintage airplanes land and park along the runway. Twenty-one classes of cars were parked in front of the planes. Vintage motorcycles, trucks, bicycles and wooden boats were everywhere you

looked. Then the day was spent shopping the arts and crafts fair, wine tasting and sampling the large number of food concessions.

Around 4:30 our caravan of classics were joined by the Oregon Pakcard Club. We all set out for the Duck Pond Winery for a wonderful catered dinner. Entertainment was supplied by Julie Strandberg and her Cadillac V-12 towed in by a red 1953 Packard. Dave McCready and his son got the Cad running, unhooked it from their Pakcard, then Cliff Strandberg arrived to limp the V-12 home on 6 cylinders.

At near dusk the temperature was still very hot outside, so eight of

us decided after dinner it was "cruising time." Howard Freeman led us to Milwaukee, Oregon (40 miles) to join the annual "Cruise In" at Louie's Diner. This was the one summer night my memory will hang on to all winter long. Top down, over 80°, the big Packard performing flawlessly in the dark, in overdrive, with '50's oldies playing loud on the tape deck, smuggled into the glove box. Whoa! It was great!!

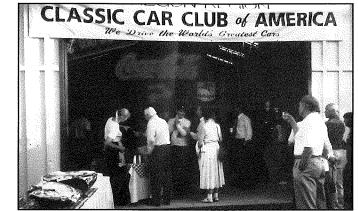
Louie's was hopping, over 350 cars, both vintage and street rods. People were very friendly and spanned all ages. Our classics drew large crowds and we fielded

The resort did themselves up proud with an outstanding dinner that was truly the "sumptuous meal of barbequed salmon" as advertised. The banquet and the preceding cocktail hour were held at the Port Ludlow Resort Recreation Center which is situated on high ground opening out onto an expansive lawn leading down to the shore across the bay from the marina. Car participants gladly provided transportation for the yacht people to and from this function.

Many of those attending the banquet wore classic period attire and participated in a fashion show contest. All the while the festivities were enhanced by a live group playing popular music from the past. Pebble Beach Concours D'Elegance

The members of the Pacific Northwest Region of the CCCA turned out in force for the 45th Annual Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance, and came prepared with nine very well prepared automobiles. And judges, too: Richard Adatto, Gordon Apker, John Carlson, Steve Frisbie, Alan McEwan, Glenn Mounger, and Brian Pollock all looked very official in their judging uniforms (blazer, slacks, and straw hat).

Jerry Greenfield had his immaculately prepared 1934 Packard Convertible Victoria ready to be judged with the restorers Al Murray and Paul Murray standing close by to observe the judging. When I asked Paul Murray if I could quote him regarding his feelings about the car soon to be judge he said, "I gotta go pee". As it turns out, the car was very highly regarded and won First in Class D-1, American Classics 1925 - 1941 Open. Before the judging, a gentleman approached Jerry and talked about the car and the fact that he really liked the Pacific Northwest. He had lived there for a while and only visited once a month now, as he was on the board of a company based there. He now lives in the Detroit area. Jerry didn't know him, but they had a nice conversation. (Later Jerry found out it was Don Peterson, ex Chairman of Ford Motor Company. The company he is on the board of is Boeing)

David and Jody Smith had their gleaming black and yellow 1938 Bugatti Type 57S on the field, which was competing against a spectacular 1938 Delage D8-120 DeVillars Cabriolet with fins on the fenders entered by Sam and Emily Mann. When the three top cars for the class were told to drive to the ramp, Sam and Emily were making gestures and pointing toward David who was with his wife and their son, Spencer. At the tender age of fourteen months, Spencer went up the ramp in a First in Class Bugatti Type 57S. When the car was in the winners circle, I spoke with David, and he said that he was very, very pleased and looked forward to bringing the car back home and just driving the car. He said that he was really looking forward to just hopping in and going to Safeway and getting some groceries in it.

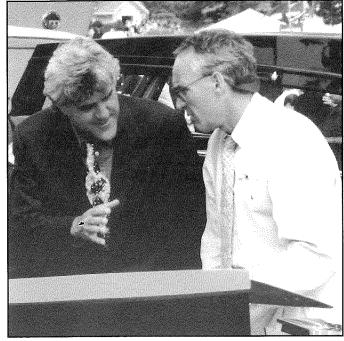
While he was waiting for the final Best of Show decision, Jay Leno spoke with David Smith for quite a while about the car, attracting all the paparazzi as he was showing the engine compartment and most of the finer details that David had assembled to make it the First in Class car. Later on the Bugatti won Most Elegant Closed Car, a very prestigious award, in addition to his First in Class award.

Richard Adatto won a special award for his most valuable contribution in volunteer effort in helping assemble the Concours event. Richard also had the opportunity to present some of the awards to the car owners after having judged a very difficult class. Gordon Apker won the Lucius Beebe Memorial Trophy for the unique 1930 Rolls Royce Phantom I Brewster Trouville he displayed.

Lee and Marlete Zuker unveiled their 1928 Rolls Royce Phantom I Brewster Ascot. With its yellow-creme paint and fresh restoration, it really stood out amongst the darker cars. I spoke with Lee for just a few minutes and he was very pleased to have the car there, complete and ready to go for the concours, so that he could trailer it back to Seattle and "finish the restoration". Personally, I could not find a single thing wrong with his car. And it won Second in Class H-2.

Steve Frisbie presented a fresh restoration of Wes Lemattas' 1948 Delahaye 135MS Franay Cabriolet, which won Best in Class for the European Custom Coachwork, Postwar. Al McEwan and Richard Hooper presented their nicely detailed 1930 Isotta Fraschini Tipo 8A SS Castagna Cabriolet, which won Second in Class, second only to the car that won Best in Show.

Bruce and Betty Armstrong displayed their 1934 Packard 1104 Coupe newly restored by Walt Johnson in the American Classic 1933

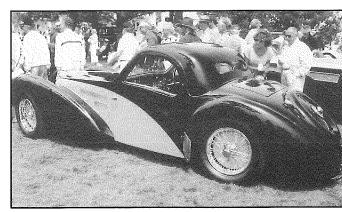

- 1941 Class. It looked like a new car, and won Best in Class.

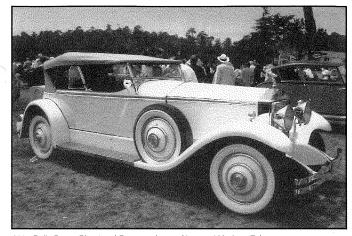

It looked articularly impressive being triple black and with a very low and racy rofile it really stood out. Evidently the judges thought so too, as it was warded Best in Class of American Classics 1925 - 1932 Open. With five Pacific Northwest cars in the winners circle, it was exciting to see the anxious faces while waiting for the Best of Show to be announced.
