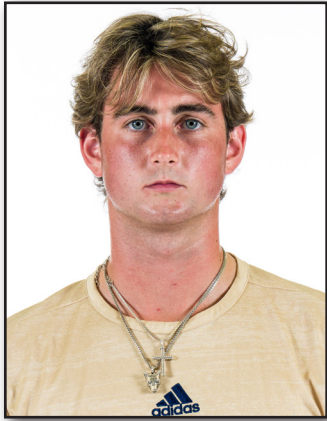




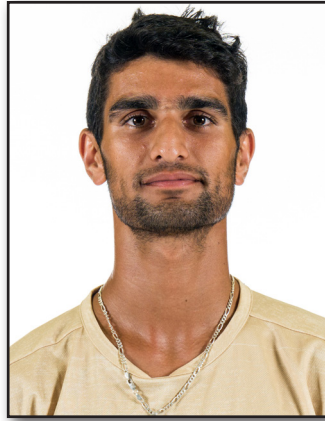

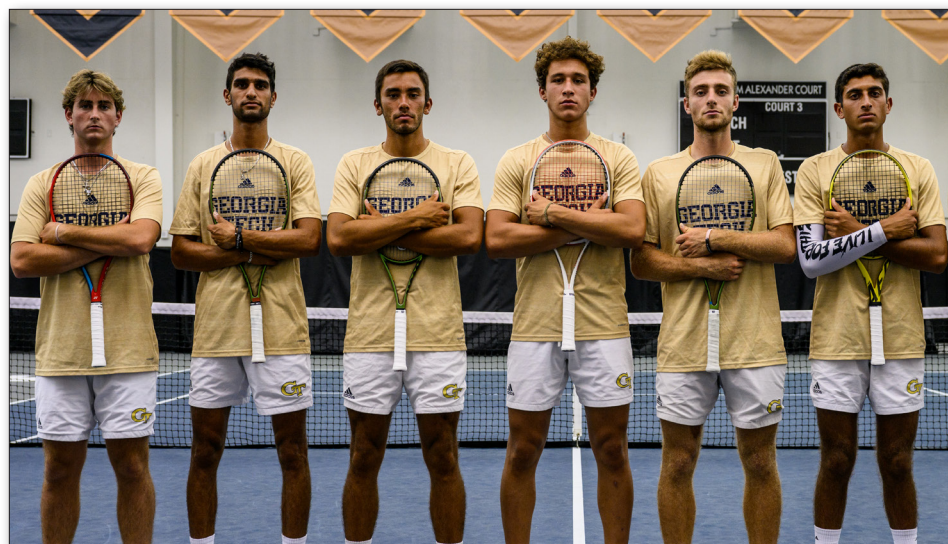

2021-22 MEN'S TENNIS NOTES

INFORMATION

Georgia Tech's men's tennis team concluded the 2021-22 season with a record of 10-14 (3-9 ACC). The season was highlighted by two Jackets qualifying for the NCAA Championships, Andres Martin competed in singles play and paired up with Marcus McDaniel for doubles competition. Tech earned conference victories over Virginia Tech (5-2), a ranked Clemson (5-2) and Boston College (6-1). The Jackets advanced to the ACC semifinals for the first time since 2017. They defeated Miami (4-1) in the second round, Wake Forest in the quarterfinals (4-2) but ultimately fell to North Carolina (4-1) in the semifinals. In the final ITA Division I National Rankings, the team ranked No. 43 while Martin finished at No. 37 in singles rankings and No. 38 in doubles rankings with McDaniel. Martin/McDaniel reached as high as No. 6 in the April 13 ITA Division I National Doubles Rankings.

Team Update

Georgia Tech (10-14, 3-9 ACC) started off the year with three straight victories with two being at home versus Georgia State (4-3) and the Citadel (5-2) and the third at the ITA Kickoff against Middle Tennessee State (4-2). The Jackets received their first loss of the season against No. 6 Virginia in their second matchup at the ITA Kickoff in January.

Tech earned their next two wins over the Citadel on Feb. 27. The Jackets dominated the Bulldogs in the doubleheader, claiming two 7-0 victories.

In March, Tech captured three straight ACC matches at home against Virginia Tech (5-2), No. 65 Clemson (5-2) and Boston College (6-1) before falling on the road to No. 19 Duke (5-2).

While the Jackets only claimed three conference wins during regular season play, they rallied back from a six-game losing streak with two ACC tournament wins. Tech took down No. 21 Miami (4-1) in the second round of play and defeated No. 7 Wake Forest (4-2). Tech concluded team competition with a 4-1 loss to No. 17 North Carolina in the conference semifinals.

Singles Update

Georgia Tech was 117-101 (.537) overall during singles play in 2021-22. The Jackets best singles players were returners, Andres Martin, Marcus McDaniel and Keshav Chopra.

Andres Martin enters the season after finishing with an overall singles record of 16-10 last spring. Martin consistently competed at the No. 1 singles spot and went 6-1 to open the spring season in singles play. He also reached as high as No. 12 in the ITA Division I National Singles Rankings. Martin's success led him back to the 2022 NCAA Singles Championships where he fell in the second round. Over the summer, Martin competed in the 2022 Atlanta Open after earning the College Night wild card and defeated a Top 75 ranked player in the first round. During the 2022 fall season, the junior ranked at No. 20 in the ITA Division I National Singles Poll and claimed the singles champion crown after going 3-0 at the GT Fall Invite.

Marcus McDaniel continues to provide depth for the Jackets in singles play. McDaniel went 14-7 overall and 10-7 while competing in the No. 2 position. He won eight of his first 10 singles matches, opened conference play 4-2 and went 2-0 in the ACC tournament. McDaniel's victories in the ACC tournament helped Tech to defeated Miami, Wake Forest and advance to the semifinals. Throughout the spring, McDaniel defeated Auburn's No. 59 Jan Galka and No. 62 Eduardo Nava from a top 10 ranked Wake Forest. In the preseason ITA Division I National Singles Poll, McDaniel ranked at No. 97. During the 2022 fall season, McDaniel made it to the second round of singles qualifiers at the ITA All-American Championships and advanced to the second round of the main draw at the ITA Southeast Regionals. At the GT Fall Invite, he concluded the weekend 2-1 in singles play.

In the 2022 spring season, Keshav Chopra produced a 17-7 overall singles record. While competing mainly at the No. 3 position, Chopra went 11-7 and even finished with a 3-0 record from the No. 2 position. He defeated nationally ranked players including Georgia's No. 23 Trent Bryde, No. 54 Ryan Goetz from a top 20 Virginia team and Columbia's No. 87 Hugo Hashimoto. Throughout the season, Chopra won five-straight ACC singles matches and propelled the Jackets into the ACC quarterfinals with a 6-0, 3-6, 6-4 win of Miami's Benjamin Hannestad. He also held a ranking of No. 105 in the ITA Division I National Singles Poll throughout three separate weeks. During the 2022 fall season, Chopra had the longest singles runs of all Tech players at the ITA Southeast Regionals. The junior claimed two main draw singles victories.

Doubles Update

The nationally ranked doubles pairings of Andres Martin and Marcus McDaniel has continued to perform well for the Jackets. At the end of the of the 2022 spring season, Martin/McDaniel ranked at No. 38 in the ITA Division I National Poll. In the fall 2022 preseason poll, the duo was ranked at No. 17.

Martin and McDaniel qualified for the 2022 NCAA Doubles Championships. The duo went 14-2 in the spring and defeated several ranked and ACC opponents. The two Jackets took down Virginia Tech's No. 9 Ryan Fishback and Jordan Chrysostom along with No. 21 NC State's No. 41 Martins Rocens and Fons Van Sambeek. Martin and McDaniel aided Tech to a semifinals berth in the ACC tournament with a second round win over a doubles team from Miami. The pair went on a six-match win streak during regular season ACC competition.

During the 2022 fall season, Martin and McDaniel were only doubles partners for one tournament, the ITA All-American Championships. Martin frequently partnered up with transfer, Rohan Sachdev, and the two finished the 4-2 with one of their losses resulting in a withdraw. McDaniel played most of his doubles matches in the fall with freshman, Elias Shokry. McDaniel and Shokry also recorded four wins throughout competition, including one at the ITA Southeast Regionals.

Another Tech duo that showed promise throughout the fall was the pairing of Keshav Chopra with freshman, Robert Bauer. The two Jackets partnered up for the ITA Southeast Regionals and made it to the third round of the main draw doubles. Chopra and Bauer also earned a win at the Georgia Tech Fall Invite.

Newcomers on the Flats

Byers Men's Tennis Head Coach Kenny Thorne and the team added three new Jackets to the roster for the 2022-23 season. The newcomers include freshmen Robert Bauer and Elias Shokry as well as Purdue transfer, Rohan Sachdev.

Bauer, a five-star recruit and brother of former Tech men's tennis play Zummy Bauer, arrived on the Flats as the No. 1 ranked player in Georgia and has reached as high as No. 51 nationally. Prior to Tech, he claimed two wins over blue-chip recruits and nine wins over five-star recruits. He also reached the quarterfinals at the 2021 ITF J4 Atlanta Tennis Tournament. Throughout the 2022 fall season, Bauer won two singles matches and four doubles matches for Tech.

Coach Kenny Thorne on Robert Bauer - "We are excited to continue to get some of the best players in Georgia. Robert is an exceptional young man who will represent Georgia Tech well. He has improved a lot over the last two years, we are excited about his contribution to our program's future."

The Jackets welcome another freshman player, Elias Shokry, who is a four-star recruit from Marietta, Ga.

Prior to Tech, Shokry had recorded four wins over blue-chip players and five-star recruits. He also held a 6-1 record over other four-star recruits. During the 2022 fall season, Shokry earned five wins in singles play and four in doubles play.

The final newcomer on the flats is former five-star recruit and transfer, Rohan Sachdev. Sachdev joins the Jackets after playing his freshman season at Purdue. The Cary, N.C. native appeared in all 24 dual matches during the 2021-22 season, earning a 13-9 record in singles 1-1 record in doubles play. During his first fall tournament season with Tech, the sophomore went 4-2 in doubles with partner, Andres Martin. The two only suffered one actual loss while the other was a result of a last minute withdrawal.

Coach Kenny Thorne on Rohan Sachdev - "We're excited to bring Rohan to Georgia Tech. He has grit and some college experience that will fit in well with our hard-working culture on and off the court. We are excited about the season and Rohan will definitely contribute to our success."

Tech's NCAA History

Georgia Tech reached the NCAA Championship three straight years from 2015-2017, falling in the opening round of the 2015 regional in Oxford, Miss., and falling in the second round in both 2016 and 2017. Tech revived their qualifying streak after missing the 2018 NCAA Championships, making appearances in 2019, 2021 and 2022. The 2020 championship was cancelled due to COVID19.

Those were Tech's first bids since 2011, when the Yellow Jackets hosted a regional and advanced to the round of 16 by defeating Middle Tennessee State and Mississippi State. Tech then lost to No. 2 seed Southern California in Stanford, Calif. That is the only time Tech has made it out of a regional in the current format of the championship. Tech has made the NCAA Championship field 12 times under head coach Kenny Thorne and 17 times in program history. The Jackets' deepest run in the NCAAs came in 1994, when Tech won three matches before being eliminated.

At the 2022 NCAA Championships, Andres Martin qualified for singles and doubles with partner Marcus McDaniel. Martin advanced to the second round of play and went 1-1 in the singles championships. Martin and McDaniel fell in the first round of the doubles championships. Tech is 11-18 all-time in NCAA Championship competition.

Tech's ACC Championship History

Georgia Tech has never won an Atlantic Coast Conference championship in men's tennis, though several Yellow Jackets have individual titles to their credit from an era when individual championships were crowned.

Tech has reached the finals four times, two of those under head coach Kenny Thorne in 1999 and 2002. The Jackets also reached the championship match in Thorne's senior year of 1988 and again in 1994. The Jackets made it to the ACC Tournament quarterfinals for the fourth-straight season in 2018, and reached the semifinals and earned the fourth seed in 2017. In 2021, the Jackets returned to the quarterfinals. After finishing the regular season with just three conference wins, Tech had a great run in the 2022 ACC tournament but ultimately fell in the semifinals.

KEN BYERS TENNIS COMPLEX

A lot of history was made in the Bill Moore Tennis Center. Some of the greatest players in Georgia Tech history took to those courts and improved their games to the point they could reach the pro tour.

Current Georgia Tech men's tennis head coach Kenny Thorne is one of those. He played and coached there in his four decorated years on the Flats (1985-89).

In January of 2013, Thorne witnessed the opening of the Ken Byers Tennis Complex, as the women's tennis team opened the facility with a match against Syracuse and men's team opened a day later against Old Dominion. In a way, it was *deja vu* for Thorne, who was a freshman the year the Moore Center opened.

"It's just a very unique thing. It's an honor to be coaching here at this time, and it's an honor for all of our student-athletes to have opened a new facility," said the 1989 graduate and 1995 Georgia Tech Sports Hall of Fame inductee. "That doesn't happen too often in any sport. It's very exciting."

Women's head coach Rodney Harmon, whose team played the first matches on the brand new six-court facility, who was beginning his first season on the Flats, has been around the sport long enough to know something special when he sees it. He's seen it with the Byers Complex.

Ground was broken for the facility on June 15, 2012 and was made possible by a generous gift from alumnus Ken Byers (class of '66) and his wife, Trish.

"It's going to help both our men's and women's programs stay a factor with the other schools, in our very, very tough conference," said Harmon, who has been in tennis player development for more than 25 years and, as a pro, reached the quarterfinals at the 1982 U.S. Open. "It has a great feeling, which I think will help us set up a home-court advantage because a lot of our fans tend to be very vocal and really support our team."

As advantageous to the team is the amount of space. Off the court, Byers has bigger locker rooms, a lounge, a training facility and more office space for the coaching staffs. The number of available courts for play inside doubled from three to six.

"It allows us to compete year-round, and when the weather gets inclement, both teams have a place to play," Harmon said. "We've always had to play outside, and it can get pretty cold sometimes. Now we're going to be able to play indoors and really get prepared for the indoor season, which starts in February."

The doubling of the court space was a key factor in building the new complex.

"You need space and you need quality space and if that means new or renovations then so be it," said former associate athletic director Paul Griffin. "Now, we have an efficient way of running our indoor matches, and because of the weather you wind up playing almost half of your matches indoors be it for wet or for cold."

Thorne and Harmon agree that the opening of the Byers Complex signaled the start of big things ahead. Thorne compared the anticipation of the facility's opening to the buzz surrounding the opening of McCamish Pavilion and expects Tech tennis fans to be as energized as basketball fans.

"It's such a big change and ours is a total change," said Thorne. "It's a whole brand-new complex. There are some really exciting things happening. So hopefully it's going to draw a lot more people out. They come see the facility as well as some great tennis."

Harmon expects the facility to also draw some big-name recruits.

"It's going to give us an opportunity to recruit top-level athletes because now a lot of the top schools have new facilities around the country, whether it's Alabama or Florida State or South Carolina, Texas is getting a new facility built," he said. "So now we have a new facility. It's something that to our recruits that makes us a lot stronger."

Both programs are seeing the benefits when it comes to recruiting top talent to Georgia Tech. The women's recruiting class was ranked sixth-best in the nation in 2018, as was the men's 2019 recruiting class, according to tennisrecruiting.net.

The Byers Complex, built on the same footprint where the



Moore Center stood, is light years ahead of its predecessor and was overdue as far as keeping Tech's programs current. The ingenuity in building a facility that could fit so much more into the same space as its predecessor made this project design uniquely Tech.

The former three-court indoor tennis facility was replaced with a state-of-the-art six-court indoor facility. The new steel indoor facility is located next to Tenth Street, just behind the magnolias. It features an entrance lobby, men's and women's coaches offices, men's and women's locker rooms and a team lounge. The indoor facility retains the Bill Moore name and provides seating a little more than 200 spectators.

Since the space opened, Georgia Tech has played host to a number of invitationals, as well as the 2018 ITA Southeast Regionals.

The outdoor part of the complex consists of six competition courts on the south end of the site and four practice courts located between the indoor facility and the competition courts. A landscaped courtyard area was added between the practice courts and Fowler Street. Outdoor seating, situated between the Griffin Track and the competition courts, provides a view of both competition on the track and action on the tennis courts and includes plenty of space for wheelchair seating. Additionally, an East-West Connector provides a lighted walkway for pedestrians along the track-side of the site to facilitate movement between the North Campus Parking Deck and the McCamish Pavilion.

"Thirty years is a long time," said Griffin. "It's not a matter of different inclusions. It's a matter of improved space. It's a tight footprint. The real estate didn't change, so we had to make some compromises on that and one of the other things was to relocate the indoor facility to the 10th street side of the real estate because it will serve as a buffer from the noise and street from 10th street for the outdoor courts that wasn't there before. So there are a lot of those kinds of features that are now a benefit for the program."

"It has a bunch of other features that are assets to the Institute and to athletics in other ways than just tennis," he added. "There's a seating area for track, a pathway from the parking lot to McCamish Pavilion (Tech's basketball arena across Fowler Street), a parking lot on Atlantic to McCamish, improved sidewalks and streetscapes. So it's a very comprehensive project."

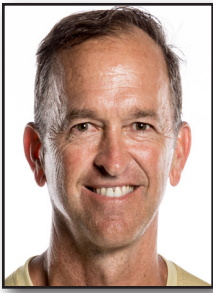
For the school, it's the latest improvement to the campus' Fowler Street entrance, which also includes Mewborn Softball

Field and the Brock Indoor Football Facility.

That exciting plan will continue to evolve in years to come. The tennis teams are thrilled to be part of it and are eager to do their part to stir up excitement around campus as they begin spring play.

"It is a tremendous commitment," said Harmon. "That whole side of campus, with the new basketball arena, with the tennis facility, with the track and the indoor football complex and baseball and softball, it's now a great corner of campus."

Kenny Thorne recorded one of the most successful tennis careers by a player from the state of Georgia, winning seven pro titles and defeating four of the world's top-10 players in the 1990's. Some of Thorne's notable victories include wins over Richard Krajicek, Wayne Ferreira, Mark Philippoussis and Todd Martin. As a pro, he achieved his highest singles ranking of No. 121 and a doubles ranking of No. 67. Thorne brings his love of tennis and impressive professional playing experience to his alma mater, Georgia Tech.

Charged with building the Georgia Tech tennis program back to the level it was when he was a player, Thorne was named to the newly-created position of Director of Tennis on June 30, 1998, becoming the ninth head coach in Tech men's tennis history.

Thorne took over the reins of the Tech program after spending one season as the team's assistant coach and wasted little time in taking steps toward his ultimate goal of turning the Yellow Jackets into contenders.

The Yellow Jackets have reached the NCAA Championship 13 times in his 19 years at the helm, and seven of those have advanced past the opening round. Tech made it back for the third straight year in 2017 with its best record since 2011 (18-8, 8-4 ACC). After a two-year absence, the 2010 and 2011 teams reached the second and third rounds of the tournament, respectively, finished fourth in the Atlantic Coast Conference each time (15-7 record), while posting a combined 39-14 dual match record.

During the 2016 season, Thorne surpassed the legendary Tech coach Earle Bortell (228-108-2) for most career coaching victories in the Yellow Jackets' program history. Thorne now has 235 victories over 18 seasons against 195 losses. In 2017 he was named the ACC Coach of the Year after coaching Tech to the fourth seed in the ACC Championships and bringing the team to a season-high ranking of No. 12.

Over the last eight years, Thorne has developed two of the best singles players in Tech history, Guillermo Gomez (2008-11) and current junior Christopher Eubanks, both of whom earned ACC Player of the Year honors. Eubanks advanced to the quarterfinals of the 2017 NCAA Singles Championship and took back-to-back ACC Player of the Year honors. He has also developed two of the best doubles players in Tech history, Juan Spir, who advanced to the NCAA Doubles Championship semifinals in 2012 and quarterfinals in 2013 with different partners. Spir and Kevin King, Spir's doubles partner for 75 of his Tech-record 103 victories, played in the NCAA Singles Championship in 2013.

Under Thorne's guidance, Tech had at least one ITA All-American every year from 2009-13, and has had at least one All-Atlantic Coast Conference honoree each year since 2008.

Tech's 2011 team finished the year ranked 13th in the nation and reached the round of 16 at the NCAA Championship, both high-water marks for Tech tennis under Thorne. Tech's 21 wins in 2011 were the most for the Jackets under Thorne and the second most in the history of the program.

As a result, the Tech alum was named the ITA National Coach of the Year, becoming only the fourth Georgia Tech head coach ever to receive such an honor.

Thorne built those Tech squads around four-time All-ACC honoree Gomez, who was named the ACC Player of the Year in 2011 and earned ITA All-American honors three times, and broke Thorne's record for career singles victories. He also recruited another pair of ITA All-Americans in King and Spir, who formed one of the top 10 doubles teams nationally and developed into top-of-the-lineup players in singles, both earning NCAA bids in 2012.

Tech's last three teams in 2015, 2016 and 2017 have been built around Eubanks, a five-star junior player from Atlanta who has helped the Jackets earn NCAA Championship appearances each year and a 49-29 overall record, while Eubanks himself rose to No. 4 in the ITA singles rankings.

Thirteen of Thorne's Tech teams have finished the spring ranked among the top 50 in the ITA team rankings, and eight of them have finished in the top half of the perennially powerful Atlantic Coast Conference.

He has coached 10 different players to All-ACC honors 21 times, and three of his players have been named ACC Player of the Year. Nine different players have earned ITA All-America honors.

Also under Thorne's watch, 13 players have earned bids to the NCAA Singles Championship and eight have made the NCAA Doubles Championship field.

Other highlights include:

- During the 2003 campaign, Georgia Tech earned a spot in the NCAA Tournament and climbed into the 14th spot in the national rankings midway through the year. The Jackets also boasted their first All-America honorees since 1988, as the doubles team of Roger Anderson and Scott Schnugg earned the honor after finishing the year as the country's 10th-ranked tandem. The duo also earned All-ACC honors after winning the league's Flight One Doubles title. Tech finished with a 12-10 record and notched seven wins over ranked opponents, including a 4-2 victory over ninth-ranked Texas on

- In 2002, Tech defeated eight ranked teams and reached the finals of the ACC Championship, en route to a 15-11 dual-match record, while also reaching the NCAA Tournament for the third time in four years under Thorne. In the ACC Tournament, the Jackets upset top-seeded and 14th-ranked Duke in the semifinals by a 4-0 score and ended the Blue Devils four-year reign as ACC Champions. On an individual level, Roger Anderson earned All-ACC honors for the second time and earned his first berth in the NCAA Individual Championship, becoming the first Tech player to do so since 1999.

- During the 2000-01 season, Thorne made great strides toward achieving his goal. When the Yellow Jackets climbed to No. 20 in the national rankings on April 11, they claimed their highest ranking since 1988, when Thorne was an All-American and team captain.

- Thorne led the 2001 Yellow Jackets to the second round of the NCAA Tournament. Roger Anderson earned All-Atlantic Coast Conference honors and three Tech players earned ACC Flight championships in singles or doubles.

- Under Thorne's guidance in 2000, Anderson became the first Tech player to earn ACC Rookie of the Year honors after leading the Yellow Jackets with a 24-8 singles record, including a 15-5 mark in dual matches.

- In his first year as head coach in 1999, Thorne earned ACC Coach of the Year honors after guiding the Yellow Jackets to a second-place tie in the regular-season conference standings, a runner-up finish at the ACC Tournament, an NCAA Regional berth and a final national ranking of 32 by the Intercollegiate Tennis Association (ITA). Senior Benjamin Cassaigne was named the ACC Player of the Year, earned all-conference honors and captured the ACC Flight Championship at No. 1 singles.

- With Tech's 1999 NCAA Regional berth, Thorne became the first person in ACC history and just the second nationally, joining LSU's Jeff Brown, to lead the same school to post-season competition as a player, assistant coach and head coach since the current NCAA team dual-match format was instituted in 1977. (Prior to 1977, team finishes were determined by an accumulation of points based on individual play.) Thorne helped Tech to NCAA play as a senior in 1988, as an assistant coach in 1998 and as head coach in 1999.

Thorne earned an Industrial Engineering degree from Tech in 1989 and during his four seasons as a player from 1985-88, the Jackets posted a 70-38 dual-match record and a 20-7 ACC mark, including wins over nationally-ranked foes such as Georgia and Clemson in 1988, his final season. Tech climbed as high as 10th in the ITA national rankings during Thorne's senior season before the Jackets ended the year ranked 12th nationally.

He qualified for the NCAA singles tournament in 1986 and 1988 and advanced to the second round on both occasions. Thorne also competed in the 1988 NCAA doubles tourney with partner Bryan Shelton. After turning professional in 1989, Thorne spent eight years on the tour, achieving his highest singles ranking of 121 and doubles ranking of 67 in the world. He was also a six-time participant at Wimbledon, the U.S. Open, French Open and Australian Open.

Thorne's best career wins were over 1996 Wimbledon champion Richard Krajicek, ATP No. 11 Wayne Ferreira, Australia's Mark Philippoussis and Todd Martin of the United States. He posted two career ATP doubles titles, one career Challenger singles title and four career Challenger doubles titles.

An All-American in 1988, Thorne finished his Georgia Tech playing career as a four-time All-ACC honoree and the career leader in singles victories with 112. He was also a two-time captain and an Academic All-ACC honoree. Thorne was inducted into the Georgia Tech Athletic Hall of Fame in 1995.

Thorne married former Yellow Jacket cross country standout and Tech Hall of Fame inductee, Bridget Koster, in 1990. The couple has two daughters, Rachel and Kennedy, and two sons, Zachary and Daniel. Rachel was a distance runner on the Tech track team.

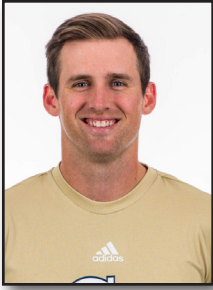

Kevin King starred for Tech from 2008-12 and graduated with highest honors in mechanical engineering in 2012. During his time on The Flats, King paired with doubles partner and current volunteer assistant coach Juan Spir reaching the preseason No. 1 ranking during the 2011-12 season. During his time as a professional he beat the former world No. 3 singles player Grigor Dimitrov at the Atlanta Open and he competed in all four grand slam tournaments during his career.

"We are very fortunate to be able to welcome Kevin back to our coaching staff. He brings extensive collegiate and professional playing experience. He has recently beaten some of the best players in the world and will bring valuable insight to our daily training," Thorne said of King. "He worked extremely hard on the court and in the classroom while at Georgia Tech, so he can relate well to the current team. He understands the high goals we have for this team and shares the vision of developing and mentoring our student athletes."

King is one of the most decorated players in Tech's men's tennis program. He is in the top 10 in singles career wins for all matches (84), career wins for dual matches (56), season wins in all matches (28, 2011-12), and season wins in dual matches (19, 2010-11). During King's senior year, he ranked as high as No. 7 in the nation in singles. King ranks second all-time in career wins for doubles trailing only Spir. King and Spir spent three years together as a doubles pairing at Tech. The duo won 66 matches together over three seasons.

King earned ITA All-American honors in doubles in 2011. During that season, he set the mark for season wins in all matches in doubles at 36. King also took home All-ACC honors in 2010, 2011, and 2012 in doubles. King was an ITA Academic All-American, 4-time member of the All-ACC academic team, and 4-time ITA Scholar Athlete.

King continued his doubles success with Spir after turning professional winning six challenger series events. King won six other events with four different partners during his doubles career. King also competed in the 2014 Wimbledon doubles tournament and the 2014 and 2018 US Open doubles tournaments. As a singles player, he reached as high as No. 162 (May 7, 2018) in the ATP singles rankings and No. 114 (July 28, 2014) in the doubles rankings. King accumulated six singles titles as a professional.

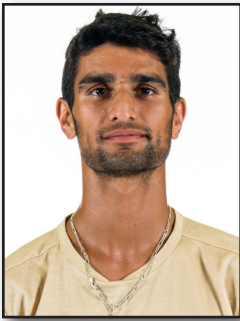

Georgia Tech named J Batt director of athletics on Oct. 14, 2022. Batt comes to The Flats after departing the role of executive deputy director of athletics, chief operating officer, and chief revenue officer at the University of Alabama. He officially joined Georgia Tech on Oct. 24, 2022.

"We're excited to welcome J to Georgia Tech. His leadership experience at one of the most competitive programs in the nation and his extraordinary track record in fundraising and revenue generation will bring great value to Georgia Tech," said Georgia Tech President Ángel Cabrera. "As a former ACC student-athlete, J has a keen appreciation for what it takes for students to compete at the highest level while pursuing a degree at a top academic institution. He values and shares our culture of excellence and integrity and our commitment to student well-being and success. I look forward to working with him to secure and invest the resources necessary for a successful athletics program."

As athletic director at Georgia Tech, Batt will report directly to Cabrera and serve as a member of his cabinet. He will be responsible for planning, developing, administering, and advancing Georgia Tech's intercollegiate athletic programs, with a focus on building an environment that inspires and empowers student-athletes to be champions in academics, competition, and life.

"My family and I truly appreciate President Cabrera and his team for this opportunity, and we are incredibly excited to join the Georgia Tech family," said Batt. "I look forward to working with our student-athletes, coaches, staff, supporters, and fans to reach new heights, on and off the field, and to build on the rich tradition and history of this storied athletics department. We can't wait to become a part of the Atlanta community. Go Jackets!"

Batt was named the top candidate by Cabrera following a national search led by Parker Executive Search. The selection process included interviews with a committee comprised of a coach, senior athletics administrator, student-athlete, student-athlete alum, and faculty member who recommended a set of finalists for consideration by the president. The board of trustees of the Georgia Tech Athletic Association voted unanimously to approve Cabrera's proposal to appoint Batt.

According to Nick Saban, University of Alabama's head football coach, "Since arriving at Alabama, J has positively affected our program through the success of the Crimson Standard Initiative while being a trusted advisor to our athletic director, Greg Byrne, and an essential part of our administrative team. We set a vision for the future of Alabama Athletics and Alabama football through the Crimson Standard and J as well as his team delivered with impressive results."

University of Alabama President Stuart R. Bell added, "Georgia Tech has made an outstanding hire in J Batt. He is a rising leader within intercollegiate athletics and has made a great impact during his time at the University of Alabama. He is a proven administrator and fundraiser and will be a great ambassador for the Institute and the community."

Batt joined the University of Alabama Athletics team as senior associate athletic director in 2017. He was responsible for guiding revenue generating, including charitable giving, ticketing, Tide Pride, and other revenue sources. He was promoted to COO and senior deputy athletic director in 2021 and to executive deputy director, COO, and chief revenue officer in 2022. Batt oversaw the successful development, implementation, and launch of the Crimson Standard, Alabama Athletics' 10-year, \$600 million capital initiative. He also provided day-to-day leadership of the department as a member of the Athletics executive team and served as the sport administrator for men's basketball.

"J has been such a strong leader as part of our executive team at Alabama. He has incredible vision and has done an outstanding job overseeing many areas of the department, beginning with development when he arrived in 2017," said Byrne. "He has done a masterful job with the operations of the department. J has been involved in all of our major decisions and has provided constructive insight and feedback to make us better. His experience working directly with our student-athletes, our coaches and Athletics staff, university leadership, and fan base has prepared him well for this moment. We are thrilled for J, his wife, Leah, and boys, Fitz and Graham. Georgia Tech made a home-run hire with J."

Nate Oats, Alabama's head basketball coach, said, "I am extremely happy for J, Leah, and their boys for this opportunity. His work ethic, character, wisdom, and vision for the University of Alabama have been great assets to our men's basketball program, and we are thankful for everything he has done to help our team and staff. I think he is a perfect fit at Georgia Tech, and I'm excited to see what the future holds under his leadership."

Previously, Batt was senior associate athletic director at East Carolina University and executive director of the Pirate Club, a position he held from 2013 to 2017. As a member of the ECU athletics executive leadership team, Batt oversaw a development operation that increased total fundraising in 2016 by more than 60% over ECU's previous best year. He also served as an associate AD and executive director of the Terrapin Club for the University of Maryland from 2011 to 2013. He joined the Terrapin Club staff in 2009 and served as executive director beginning in September 2011. Before his tenure at Maryland, Batt worked in athletics fundraising at James Madison University, the College of William & Mary, and his alma mater, the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

A member of the Tar Heels' 2001 NCAA champion men's soccer team, Batt graduated from UNC with a bachelor's degree in journalism and mass communications and a master's degree in sports administration.

Veteran athletics administrator Jon Palumbo, who has most recently served as athletics director at Texas A&M-Corpus Christi since 2018, will join Georgia Tech's athletics staff as executive deputy athletics director and chief operating officer, athletics director J Batt announced.

In his role, Palumbo will serve as Georgia Tech's primary football administrator and oversee other internal operations. He officially joined the Tech staff on Nov. 14.

"I'm excited that Jon is coming to The Flats as our executive deputy A.D. and C.O.O.," Batt said. "Jon has extensive experience at all levels of college athletics, from being a student-athlete himself to serving as an A.D. He will be a great addition to our staff and provide outstanding support to our student-athletes and coaches. We can't wait for Jon and Rachel to join us in Atlanta."

Palumbo comes to The Flats after leading Texas A&M-Corpus Christi to unprecedented achievements during his four years as A.D. (2018-22), including perhaps the most successful year in school history in 2021-22. The Islanders' 2021-22 highlights included:

- winning a school-record seven Southland Conference championships, including in men's basketball, where Texas A&M-Corpus Christi went from 5-19 in 2020-21 to 23-11 in 2021-22 under first-year head coach Steve Lutz, who led the Islanders to their first NCAA Tournament appearance since 2007;
- claiming the Southland Conference's women's all-sports championship for the first time in school history;
- earning the Southland Conference's Academic Performance Award for the first time in school history (recognizing the conference member with the highest four-year NCAA Academic Progress Rate score);
- student-athletes performing 2,778 hours of community service.

Other achievements during Palumbo's four years at Texas A&M-Corpus Christi include the first women's basketball conference championship in program history in 2019-20, a 17% increase in men's basketball attendance prior to the Covid-19 pandemic, the Islanders' student-athletes earning a 3.0-plus grade point average in every semester of his tenure as A.D. and the completion of an ambitious five-year strategic plan to serve as the blueprint for future success entitled "Making Waves."

Prior to his arrival at Texas A&M-Corpus Christi, Palumbo served as deputy A.D. at VCU from 2012-18. At VCU, he supervised the day-to-day operations of the athletics department and was the administrator for the Rams' flagship men's basketball program, which made five-straight NCAA Tournament appearances from 2013-17 and sold out every game during Palumbo's six-year stint in Richmond. He also implemented budget management procedures that resulted in five-straight years of surpluses, which were reinvested in capital projects, including the construction of a \$25 million basketball practice facility, a project that Palumbo was involved with during every stage of construction.

Palumbo also owns experience in the ACC, having served as associate A.D. for business at Maryland from 2008-12, where he worked alongside Batt. Palumbo's professional experience also includes stints at American (associate A.D. – 2006-08), William & Mary (business manager – 2003-06) and LaSalle (graduate assistant – 2001-03).

As a student-athlete, Palumbo played baseball at LaSalle, where he was a team captain, member of the Athletics Relations Council and graduated with honors in 2001 with a bachelor's degree in communication in 2001. He went on to earn an MBA from LaSalle in 2003.

"I'm incredibly excited about joining the team at Georgia Tech," Palumbo said. "I want to thank J Batt for the opportunity to join this world-class Institute. I am confident that his leadership will take this wonderful program to new heights. I look forward to working with J, the student-athletes, coaches and the entire Yellow Jacket team to make our fans and alumni proud."

The Georgia Institute of Technology welcomes a new president this September. After serving for almost seven years as president of George Mason University (GMU) in Fairfax, Virginia, Dr. Ángel Cabrera was named June 13, 2019, by the University System of Georgia Board of Regents as Georgia Tech's 12th president. He succeeds Dr. G.P. "Bud" Peterson, who has served since April 1, 2009. Peterson will continue in his role as Georgia Tech's president until Cabrera arrives in September. When Peterson announced his pending retirement in January 2019, he shared his plans to continue his research and return to teaching at Georgia Tech.

Under President Peterson's leadership, Georgia Tech exceeded the \$1.5 billion goal for Campaign Georgia Tech by 20%, grew innovative collaborations and strategic partnerships, expanded the campus infrastructure, and elevated its national and global visibility. In the past decade, total research expenditures and other sponsored activities increased by 78% to \$908 million. Enrollment increased by 69%. The number of women in the first-year class increased from 32 to 40%. Georgia Tech's first-to-second-year retention is 97%, a historic high.

Cabrera is a Georgia Tech alumnus, the second in the Institute's 134-year history to serve as president. Peterson's predecessor, Dr. G. Wayne Clough (1994 – 2008), earned bachelor's and master's degrees in civil engineering from Georgia Tech.

Cabrera holds an M.S. and Ph.D. in cognitive psychology from Georgia Tech, which he attended as a Fulbright Scholar. He also holds a telecommunications engineering degree from Universidad Politécnica de Madrid (B.S. and M.S. in computer and electrical engineering). For the past decade, he has served as a member of the Georgia Tech Advisory Board, including a stint as its chair. Cabrera met his wife, Beth, while both were graduate students at Georgia Tech. Dr. Beth Fraser Cabrera was a management professor at Carlos III University in Madrid and Arizona State University, and currently delivers leadership development programs for business executives. Their son Alex, who recently received his undergraduate degree from the Institute, is continuing his studies this fall at Carnegie Mellon University. Daughter Emilia is a rising junior at Harvard University.

George Mason is the largest, fastest growing, and most diverse public university in Virginia. Listed among the top 300 research universities in the world by the Academic Ranking of World Universities, GMU reached the top tier among research universities in the Carnegie Classification and accounted for more than half of all public university enrollment growth in Virginia under Cabrera's leadership. In 2018, it was named by Forbes as one of America's best midsize employers.

Before becoming GMU's president, Cabrera served as dean of IE Business School in Madrid and president of Thunderbird School of Global Management (now part of Arizona State University). As a business educator, Cabrera played a key role in advancing professional ethics, internationalization, and corporate social responsibility. As a senior advisor to the United Nations Global Compact, in 2007 he was the lead author of the "Principles for Responsible Management Education," now adopted by more than 700 schools around the world.

Cabrera's research has been published in leading academic journals. He has been quoted by leading global media, including The Economist, BBC, CNN, CNBC, El País, Forbes, the International Herald Tribune, and The New York Times. His op-eds have been published by The Washington Post and the international press, and he has appeared on NPR programs and PBS NewsHour. He's been named a "Young Global Leader" by the World Economic Forum, a "Star of Europe" by Businessweek, "Henry Crown Fellow" by the Aspen Institute, and "Great Immigrant" by the Carnegie Corporation of New York. He has received honorary degrees from Miami Dade College and Universidad Politécnica de Madrid. He is the first native of Spain to serve as president of an American university.

FACULTY ATHLETICS REPRESENTATIVE

President Ángel Cabrera named Jenna Jordan, associate professor and associate chair in the Sam Nunn School of International Affairs, as faculty athletics representative (FAR) to the Georgia Tech Athletic Association (GTAA) in May 2022.

The FAR serves as the liaison between the Institute and the Athletic Association on issues regarding rules compliance activities, new developments at the NCAA, and activities related to Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC) membership. This is a part-time administrative position appointed for a term of three years. Jordan will replace Mechanical Engineering Professor Baratunde Cola, who is taking a leave of absence from faculty and university responsibilities to lead Carbice, the Georgia Tech spin-off company he founded, through its next phase of growth.

"Professor Jordan is not just an accomplished scholar but an exemplary educator who cares deeply about the growth and well-being of our students," said Cabrera. "She has made a difference these past years as a faculty guide with the Stamps President's Scholars, and I have no doubt she will have a similar impact in supporting the academic experience of our student-athletes and serving as an effective liaison between our faculty and our athletic program."

Jordan has been a Georgia Tech faculty member since 2012. Her research focuses on terrorism and political violence, international security, cybersecurity, wargaming, organizational theory, and statecraft. Her work has been published by Stanford University Press and in International Security, Security Studies, Conflict Management and Peace Science, the Journal of Cybersecurity, and International Trends as well as The New York Times, The Atlantic, the Chicago Tribune, Foreign Policy, and The Washington Quarterly. She holds a Ph.D. in political science from the University of Chicago, an M.A. in political science from Stanford University, and a B.A. in international relations from Mills College.

"Serving as faculty athletics representative is a unique opportunity to address the challenges facing student-athletes, and I am excited to be able to help guide their experience at Georgia Tech," she said. "I recognize the importance of building bridges across the Institute, and I hope to create new opportunities to facilitate meaningful student-athlete interaction, continuing the efforts of my FAR predecessors who fiercely advocated for and mentored our student-athletes. And I will continue to foster a culture of mentorship and support among the faculty and our student-athletes." Jordan's three-year term as FAR began July 1, 2022.

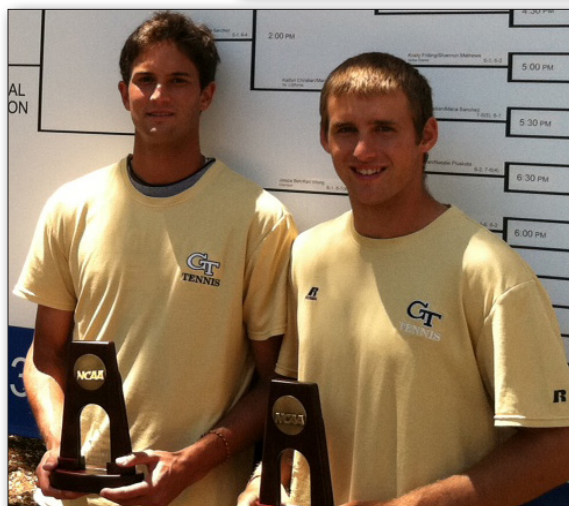
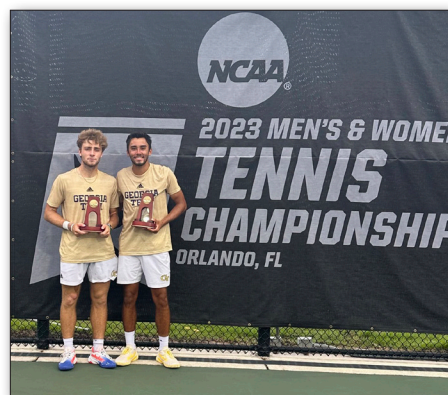

TECH TENNIS TIMELINE

1908—First Tech tennis team, with individuals competing in tournaments.

1915—Coached by J.R. Crenshaw, Tech tennis team competes in first dual matches, 2-0.

1918—Tech wins the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association championship.

1922—Tech wins the first of its two Southern Conference championships.

1926—Yellow Jackets win their second Southern Conference title in five years.

1929—Longtime coach J.R. Crenshaw coaches his final season, compiling an overall record of 32-12-2 in 13 seasons.

1934—Legendary Earle Bortell takes over as the Tech head coach, embarking on a career that would span 28 years and 215 victories.

1938—Russell Bobbitt, the conference champ at number one singles, led Georgia Tech to its first Southeastern Conference team title. The team was captained by GT Hall of Fame member Bill Moore and coached by Earle Bortell.

1945—Howard McCall reached the quarterfinals of the NCAA singles championship while Niles Millsap goes three rounds in singles and teams with Frank Willett who reach the semis in doubles.

1946—The team won its second Southeastern Conference team championship, led by T.W. Fowler, who won the conference title at two singles, and Howard McCall and Niles Millsap, who were co-champions at number one doubles.

May 12-14, 1960—Tech dominated the SEC Tennis Championships at Knoxville, Tenn., beating Tulane and Florida to win the team title. Ned Neely won the conference singles championship and teamed with Harry Thompson to win the number two singles championship. Thompson won the number two singles title, while Paul Metz was the number five singles champion and Dave Peake and Dave Pearsall won the number three doubles crown.

1960—Tech team posts a fourth-place finish at the NCAA championships, the best finish in school history, as Ned Neely and Harry Thompson reach the semifinals in doubles.

1966—All-American Walter Johnson advanced to the quarterfinals to lead Tech to a fifth-place NCAA finish.

1970—Led by All-American Larry Turville, who reached the fourth round, Tech ties for 10th place at the NAAs, as four players entered in singles and two in doubles teams.

March 11, 1982—First ACC win vs. Maryland, 6-3.

April 20, 1985—Freshman Bryan Shelton wins the ACC title at number one singles, the first individual ACC title in school history.

May 18, 1985—Bryan Shelton loses to Dan Goldie, 7-6, 4-6, 6-1, in first round of NCAA Singles Championships in the first NCAA appearance by a Tech player since 1971.

May 1987—Mark Avedikian and Richy Gilbert earn berths in NCAA doubles championship.

Jan. 23-24, 1988—Tech hosts nationally-ranked teams Stanford (No. 1), Tennessee (No. 10) and California (No. 13) to christen the Bill Moore Tennis Center; Jackets beat 13th-ranked Golden Bears but fall to top-ranked Cardinal. Jean Desdunes named head coach.

April 5, 1988—Defeated Georgia, 5-4, in Athens, for Tech's first win over the Bulldogs since 1966.

April 7, 1988—Defeated Clemson, 5-4, to finish first in the ACC regular season with a 7-0 record.

April 23, 1988—Lost to Clemson in finals of ACC Tournament, 5-4.

May 21, 1988—Lost to Michigan, 5-4, in first appearance in NCAA Team Championships.

May 26, 1988—Bryan Shelton reaches quarterfinals of NCAA Singles Championship before losing to eventual champion, Robbie Weiss of Pepperdine.

May 1988—Bryan Shelton and Kenny Thorne garner All-America honors, the first Yellow Jackets to earn the recognition since 1970.

May 19, 1993—Rob Givone competes in the NCAA singles tournament, becoming Tech's first NCAA entrant in five years.

April 22-24, 1994—Tech defeats Wake and Virginia to reach the finals of the ACC Tournament before falling to seventh-ranked Duke.

May 13-15, 1994—After defeating Florida State and VCU in the first two rounds, the third-seeded Tech score a heart-stopping 4-3 victory over NC to win the Region II title and advance to the NCAA Team Championships for the second time in school history. With Tech tied 3-3 against the Tar Heels, senior Scott Cotton was on the verge of defeat but rallied at number two singles to clinch the title.

May 21, 1994—Tech falls to third-ranked TCU in the first round of the NCAA Championships, to finish the season at 17-11 and ranked 28th in the final poll.

May 25, 1994—Rob Givone returns to the NCAA individual tourney, competing in singles and doubles with partner Scott Cotton.

March 29, 1995—Tech defeats Georgia Southern for head coach Jean Desdunes' 100th victory.

May 9, 1997—The team returns to NCAA Tournament play, falling to Duke in their NCAA Region II Championships opener.

May 15, 1998—Tech makes its second straight NCAA appearance, falling to Virginia Commonwealth at the NCAA Region II Championships in Richmond, Va.

June 30, 1998—Jean Desdunes resigns as head coach, stepping down with the second-highest win total in school history with 139. Assistant coach and former Tech All-American Kenny Thorne is named head coach at his alma mater.

April 30, 1999—Thorne is named ACC Coach of the Year after guiding the Jackets to a regular-season tie for second place in the ACC and the finals of the conference tournament. Thorne's No. 1 player, Benjamin Cassaigne, is named ACC Player of the Year.

May 14-15, 1999—The Yellow Jackets qualify for NCAA Regional play for the third-straight year, downing Boise State in their opening match before falling to defending national champion Stanford in round two at Palo Alto, Calif.

April 30, 2000—Roger Anderson is named ACC Rookie of the Year, the first Yellow Jacket to earn the honor.

March 7, 2001—Tech defeats 20th-ranked Miami. Tech's first win over a Top-20 opponent since 1998.

May 12-13, 2001—Tech competes in the NCAA Regional for the fourth time in the last five years. Tech tops Arizona, 4-2, in the first round before falling to eventual national champion Georgia in the second round in Athens, Ga.

October 28, 2001—Junior Roger Anderson becomes the first Yellow Jacket to win the Omni Hotels South Atlantic Region Championship when he defeats 43rd-ranked David Loewenthal of Wake Forest in straight sets, 6-1, 7-5.

May 2, 2003—Senior Roger Anderson and junior Scott Schnugg become the first Tech players to earn All-America honors since 1988 after finishing the year ranked 10th nationally in doubles.

May 28, 2005—Freshman David North and junior Marko Rajevac participate in the NCAA Doubles Championship as alternates and advance to the quarterfinals to earn All-American honors, before falling to eventual national champions John Isner and Antonio Ruiz from Georgia.

May, 2008—Freshman Guillermo Gomez became just the

second Yellow Jacket to be named ACC Freshman of the Year and ITA Mid-east Region Rookie of the Year.

Feb. 19, 2009—Sophomore Guillermo Gomez ranked No. 7 nationally in singles by ITA -- the highest-ever ranking in for a Tech player in history.

Feb. 19, 2010—Junior Guillermo Gomez ranked No. 3 nationally in singles by ITA, the highest-ever ranking in Tech history. Gomez had surpassed his previous high in the first spring rankings (No. 5).

October 24, 2010—Kevin King and Juan Spir win the doubles title at the USTA/ITA Southeast Regional in Gainesville, Fla., beating teammates Eliot Potvin and Ryan Smith in the finals.

May, 2011—Senior Guillermo Gomez captures All-ACC honors for the fourth time, All-America honors for the third time, and finishes his career with a school record 119 singles victories. Juan Spir and Kevin King are named All-Americans in doubles.

June 8, 2011—Kenny Thorne named Wilson/ITA Division I National Coach of the Year after leading Georgia Tech to a 21-6 record and the Yellow Jackets advanced to the NCAA Round of 16 for the first time since 1994. Tech's 8-3 ACC mark was a program high for conference wins, and its final ITA ranking of No. 13 also was a program best.

October 24, 2011—Kevin King captures singles title at USTA/ITA Southeast Regional in Athens, beating three players ranked ahead of him and losing only one set in the tournament.

June 7, 2012—Kevin King and Juan Spir are named ITA All-Americans in doubles for the second time. King finishes his career with a Tech record 87 victories in doubles.

October 22, 2012—Juan Spir and Vikram Hundal win the doubles title at the USTA/ITA Southeast Regional in Tallahassee, Fla. The title was Spir's second in the event, this time with a different partner.

January 3, 2013—Juan Spir and Vikram Hundal open the spring ranked No. 3 by the ITA in doubles, the highest ranking ever attained by a Tech duo. They would stay there through the end of February when Hundal was injured.

January 18, 2013—Georgia Tech opens the new Ken Byers Tennis Complex by winning two matches over Old Dominion (5-2) and Lipscomb (4-3).

April 19, 2015—Georgia Tech stuns 8th-ranked Duke, 4-3, at the Ken Byers Tennis Complex, the highest-ranked team the Yellow Jackets had defeated under head coach Kenny Thorne (1998-present).

May 8, 2015—Georgia Tech returns to the NCAA Tournament for the first time in three years, earning a bid by defeating No. 8 Duke to close the regular season, then No. 35 Notre Dame and No. 14 Virginia Tech in the ACC Tournament.

2016—Georgia Tech returns to the NCAA Tournament for the second straight year behind Christopher Eubanks, who became the third Tech player to be named ACC Player of the Year. Eubanks also is named an ITA All-American.

2017—Georgia Tech goes 18-9 with a 10-3 record at home as the Jackets defeated Minnesota in the first round of the 2021 NCAA Tournament prior to losing to Florida in the second round. Chris Eubanks is named an all-American again and ACC PotY.

2019—Season shortened due to COVID-19 Pandemic.

2021—A pair of redshirt freshmen in Andres Martin and Marcus McDaniel each earned All-ACC honors, leading Tech back to the NCAA Tournament. For the first time in program history the Jackets send two freshmen to NCAA Singles & Doubles Championships, with Martin reaching the second round in singles.

2022—Two Jackets returned to the NCAA Tournament. Andres Martin advanced to the second round of the singles championships and competed in the first round of doubles with partner Marcus McDaniel. Both players earned All-ACC honors after Tech made it to the semifinals of the ACC Tournament.
