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


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Mission Statement




Directions to Floyd Stadium

From Nashville International Airport: Enter Briley Parkway continuing south to the Interstate 24 junction. Take I-24 East to Exit 78B; follow State Highway 96 North to Clark Boulevard. Turn right on Clark Boulevard (at BP station). Follow Clark Blvd. (which becomes Middle Tennessee Boulevard) to intersection at Greenland Drive. Turn left on Greenland Drive. Murphy Center and Floyd Stadium are located just to the right.

From Nashville: From I-24 East, take Exit 78B; follow State Highway 96 North to Clark Boulevard. Turn right on Clark Boulevard (at BP station). Follow Clark Blvd. (which becomes Middle Tennessee Boulevard) to intersection at Greenland Drive. Turn left on Greenland Drive. Murphy Center and Floyd Stadium are located just to the right.

From Chattanooga: Take I-24 West to Exit 81; follow U.S. Highway 231 North to Middle Tennessee Boulevard to intersection at Greenland Drive. Turn right onto Greenland Drive. The

Greenland Drive parking lot is located to the right.



From Birmingham, AL: Take I-65 North to Highway 96 East Franklin (TN) exit. Follow Highway 96 East to Murfreesboro. Continue east on 96 until Clark Boulevard intersection; turn right on Clark Blvd. (which becomes Middle Tennessee Boulevard) to intersection

at Greenland Drive. Turn left on Greenland Drive. Murphy Center and Floyd Stadium are located just to the right.

Credentials

Arrangements for media credentials for the 2007 football season should be directed to the Athletic Media Relations Office. Requests by accredited media members should be made in writing and submitted on company letterhead to Mark Owens. Priority issuance of credentials will be given to daily newspapers and television stations that cover Middle Tennessee football on a regular basis. Student publications will be limited to one working credential and one sideline photo pass, if needed. Other credential requests will be fulfilled on a space-available basis.

by Middle Tennessee's Media Relations Office at least one working day prior to the game. The media relations office will send out parking directions in advance of the game. Satellite trucks will park on the north side of the pressbox and will enter off Middle Tennessee Boulevard just before the Faulkinberry Road entrance.

Postgame Interviews

After a 10-minute cooling off period, requested players and Coach Stockstill will be made available to members of the media. The Blue Raider locker room is CLOSED both at home and on the road. At home, interviews will be conducted in the gameday locker room located under the stands in the north endzone. On the road, requested players and Coach Stockstill will be brought to a designated area outside the locker room.

Press Box

The press box is located on the west side of Floyd Stadium in the tower. Access to Level 4 (print, radio, television) and Level 5 (camera deck) is by elevator.

A pregame meal is served in the dining area of the press box 90 minutes before kickoff.

Telephones

There are a limited number of telephones available along press row. They are for first-come, first-serve use only. It is suggested that media members wishing to have a private line contact Steve Prichard, director of telecommunications, at 615-898-2991. For specific line location, please list Mark Owens as the contact from the Athletic Department. Telephone lines for visiting radio networks have been installed by Middle Tennessee. Reciprocating trade agreements for these lines can be made by contacting Mark Owens at 615-898-5057.

Media Will-Call

A media will-call window will be operated on game days at Floyd Stadium for the distribution of credentials that have not yet been picked up or mailed out. The designated pickup area is located at the foot of the elevator on the west side of Floyd Stadium.

Stockstill Interviews

All interviews with Coach Stockstill should be directed through the Middle Tennessee Media Relations Office. Contact Mark Owens.

Internet Guidelines

The acceptance of media credentials is an acknowledgement of Middle Tennessee's rights to the game and play-by-play coverage and an outlet's agreement to abide by any restrictions Middle Tennessee may place on real-time play-by-play coverage and use of comprehensive game statistics. Failure to abide by these restrictions implemented by MT may result in revocation of press credentials.

Middle Tennessee reserves the right to grant approval for distribution of real-time play-by-play, game-related statistics and information through the Internet. ("real time" is defined as any online media providing live, continual play-by-play coverage; in-game statistics; digital photographs; or audio or video of an event.)

During the week of games, all player interviews must be conducted by the end of practice on Wednesday. Please request interviews at least 24 hours in advance.


Practice Coverage

Practices are open to the media with few exceptions. Media wishing to attend practice are encouraged to contact the Media Relations Office in advance. All members of the media are asked to view practice on the outer edges of the two fields. Once the team goes into full

Floyd Stadium

Johnny "Red" Floyd Stadium provides Middle Tennessee with one of the finest football facilities in the region and in the Sun Belt Conference, and it has become the ideal place to spend a Thursday night or Saturday afternoon.

The 30,788-seat stadium has undergone numerous renovations through the years, the greatest of which was its expansion to the current seating capacity prior to the program's move into Division I-A in 1998. Fans certainly have enjoyed coming through the turnstiles and watching their Blue Raiders play at college football's highest level as evidenced by attendance increases in four straight seasons and five of the last six.

During this time, Middle Tennessee players have done their part to make sure fans enjoy a wholesome brand of football - and leave the stadium happy - as the Blue Raiders have won 24 of their last 34 games at home. The plush facility also has enabled Middle Tennessee to lure Maryland, Memphis, Virginia, and Georgia Tech to Murfreesboro for future home dates.

The most recent upgrade came during the summer of 2007 when a new state-of-the-art video board was installed. The 18'x32' Daktronics display board will enhance the overall atmosphere and bring fans even closer to the action.

During the summer of 2006, a new synthetic surface was installed to replace the outdated artificial turf. The surface is by Sportexe and the brand used is Power-Blade, which is a special monofilament polyethylene infilled system designed to maximize player speed and performance and provide superior shock absorbency. Middle Tennessee is the first school in the country to use

this top-of-the-line surface.

Floyd Stadium has become synonymous with the success of Blue Raider football, but the stadium in place today has come a long way since its humble beginnings. Several renovation projects have shaped the stadium from a mediocre field to the

top-quality football facility it is today.

The story of Floyd Stadium begins in 1933 with the birth of Horace Jones Field. The site of Middle Tennessee's home turf consisted of a playing field and a few portable bleachers. This was the layout until a major renovation took place in the late 1940s that gave Horace Jones Field a concrete grandstand structure. The stadium remained the same until the first of a series of major renovations took place in 1960. The capacity of Floyd Stadium grew from 6,200 to 10,000 with new seating locations and the addition of a press area. In 1968, the facility saw



another major renovation. Construction more than doubled the seating capacity of the east grandstands, increasing capacity to approximately 14,000. In addition, a new, larger press box was added to the west side of the stadium. The face of Floyd Stadium changed again prior to the 1971 season. However, this change was not related to the grandstand infrastructure. The opening of Riverdale and Oakland high schools in Murfreesboro and the subsequent use of Floyd Stadium by these

schools prompted Middle Tennessee to install artificial turf on Horace Jones Field. The first MT game played on the turf took place Oct. 2, 1971, against Chattanooga. The Raiders did not disappoint, defeating the Mocs 23-13.

Success at the I-AA level and a desire

to put the University into the national spotlight led to discussion of a move to NCAA Division I-A football. The qualifications for the move included an attendance average of 17,000 per game and a stadium seating at least 30,000.

The move to NCAA Division I-A football was the catalyst for the most recent renovation to Floyd Stadium. On August 24, 1995, the University announced plans for a \$25 million renovation, which was approved by the State Building Commission. After a lengthy bid process, ground was officially broken for the stadium in January

of 1997 with Turner Construction handling the project.

Upon completion, the stadium featured 30,788 seats with only the east side grandstands remaining from the original structure. The old press box gave way to a fivestory tower including luxury suites on the third level, a large press area and a few suites on the fourth level, and a camera deck on the fifth level. The renovation also included the addition of more chair-back seats as well as a club level.

In addition to the spectator facilities, the stadium complex includes a team meeting room, position meeting rooms, a 10,000 square foot weight room for all Middle Tennessee teams, an academic center for Blue Raider student-athletes, and access to Murphy Athletic Center from the stadium via a walkway. The stadium also allows for further expansion that would provide an increase of approximately 40,000 seats, putting capacity over the 70,000 mark.

The first game in the renovated stadium took place on Sept. 5, 1998. The game, in which Middle Tennessee hosted local rival Tennessee State, drew a school and OVC record 27,568 fans. The attendance helped push Middle Tennessee over the top for its I-A qualifying attendance of 17,000 per game.

Floyd Stadium is not only the home of Blue Raider football: the TSSAA uses the facility as well. The high school state championship games, collectively called the Blue Cross Bowl, have been played at Floyd Stadium five years in a row.

During its existence, Floyd Stadium has been the site of many thrilling victories and a few heartbreaking defeats. It has taken many forms and is now poised to become one of the nation's most recognized college football venues.

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

Middle Tennessee fans throughout the southeast region also can follow their favorite teams on WMOT FM 89.5, which reaches a three-state coverage area.

The combination of the three stations provides coverage to Middle Tennessee sports fans in a 100mile radius of Murfreesboro.

WGNS and WNFN 106.7 The Fan carry all Blue Raider football and men's basketball games along with the Rick Stockstill and Kermit Davis radio shows.

Looking to build on momentum



Coming off its best season in the I-A era, Middle Tennessee will try to build on its momentum in 2007. The Blue Raiders, one of just 10 schools nationally to win four conference road games in 2006, were Sun Belt Conference champions and earned an at-large berth to the Motor City Bowl in Rick Stockstill's first year at the helm.

The Blue Raiders welcome back 13 starters, 34 lettermen, the first All-American since 1995, and five all-conference players in 2007.

"We are coming off an exciting season for our players and fans and I believe our players are buying into how to be a first-class program," said Stockstill. "We were successful because we did a solid job of protecting the football and did not give up big plays on defense, and we were solid on special teams; but I believe the biggest reason for our success was we played as a TEAM and cared about each other. We were not the most talented team but we were

extremely close. We have to continue to play smart, limit our penalties and turnovers, and we need to become a tougher football team as a whole. If we can do these things and develop depth as we go we can be a competitive football team in 2007."

Offensively, Middle Tennessee will have a new quarterback leading the Sun Belt's top scoring unit from 2006 following the graduation of three-year starter Clint Marks. The new signal-caller should have some capable weapons as all three starters at receiver return, along with the top three tight ends and a potentially very talented group of running backs.

A defense that set school records in sacks and tackles for loss returns the entire front line, including the all-time sack leader. The biggest question marks will be at linebacker, where the Blue Raiders lost all three starters, and in the secondary, where the team needs to build depth because there are only six scholarship players.

The area of special teams creates the most concern for Stockstill. Colby Smith, who handled placekicking and punting, was lost to graduation following a productive career. A host of walk-ons will battle for the two positions and it could take the coaches deep into August before they can make a decision.

OFFENSE

One of the most efficient and disciplined offenses in the Sun Belt Conference last year, the Blue Raiders return six starters and 14 lettermen from that unit in

In 2006, Middle Tennessee had the top scoring offense in the league with Troy at 22.8 points per game while leading the SBC in fewest penalty yards and red zone scoring and registering a turnover margin of plus

Offensive coordinator G. A. Mangus will have plenty of experience to work with, however, as the top five

leading receivers and two of the top three rushers will return.

The biggest question marks for Stockstill and Mangus will be finding a replacement for quarterback Clint Marks, two new starters on the offensive line, and all-conference running back Eugene Gross, who ended his career as one of the top scorers in school history.

"I think our offense improved throughout the season last year, but several reasons for those gradual improvements are no longer with our program as their eligibility expired," said Stockstill. "When you lose as many people up front as we did and then throw in your starting tailback and quarterback you have a lot of experience and holes to fill. We have some key players returning at significant positions but we will have a lot of new faces in some very important areas of our team in 2007. It is important that these new or returning players who simply lack experience exemplify the type of work ethic that made our offense more productive as the season progressed a year ago."

Following is a position-by-position look at the 2007 Blue Raiders:

QUARTERBACK

The most often asked question in Murfreesboro has been "who will be the starter at quarterback on September 1?" After three years as the starter and 34 straight starts, Clint Marks has left the position wide open for 2007. Marks, an all-conference pick as a senior, ended his career ranked second all-time in passing yards, completions, and attempts at Middle Tennessee.

The question was answered quicker than most thought when Joe Craddock earned the job with a solid spring. Others fighting for playing time behind Craddock are Patrick Jackson, Salin Simpson, and Gene Delle Donne.

Craddock, a junior, completed 8 of 11 passes for 113 yards in the spring game to further solidify his starting spot. The Birmingham, Ala., native possesses a strong right arm and is capable of making plays with his feet. He has the most game experience of any quarterback on the roster after seeing action in nine games as a backup to Marks last year. Craddock completed 9 of 24 passes for 75 yards in limited snaps.

Jackson, a fifth-year senior, played in his first two career games in 2006 after turning in a 200-yard passing game in the spring. Jackson hopes to make a push for more playing time in his final year.

The future may include a lot of Simpson, a redshirt freshman from Lexington, Ky. The talented Simpson, who was rated one of the top 50 players in Kentucky coming out of high school, was the first quarterback recruited by Stockstill.

Also, heavily in the mix will be Delle Donne, a transfer from Duke who sat out last season. The former Prep Star All-American is a presence in the pocket at 6-5.

RUNNING BACK

The Blue Raider running game showed vast improvement in 2006 and despite the loss of all-conference back Eugene Gross, the 2007 ball carriers possess tremendous potential, talent, and athleticism.


A four-year starter, Gross was the total package during his career. He finished seventh on the all-time rushing list, fourth in touchdowns scored, and became the leading receiver among backs all-time at Middle Tennessee.

Senior DeMarco McNair has been patiently waiting for his opportunity, and 2007 will be his time to shine. Known for his tough running, McNair rushed

for a career-best 586 yards last year to go with seven touchdowns and 16 receptions. The Thomson, Ga., native turned in a personal-best 98 yards rushing on only nine attempts in the win over Arkansas State on the road.

Sharing time with McNair will be sophomore Phillip Tanner, who spent 2006 as a safety on defense to help shore up depth problems. Tanner, who played in all 13 games last year, rushed for over 4,200 yards and 76 touchdowns at Justin Kimball High School in Texas. Tanner showed a flash of the future in the spring game by rushing for 104 yards and two touchdowns.

The electrifying Desmond Gee will also play a big role for the Blue Raiders in the running game. Gee, a first team all-conference selection as an all-purpose player, was the Blue Raiders' best playmaker a year ago. A running back and wide receiver, Gee accounted





for 27 receptions and three touchdowns while adding 277 yards on the ground and five scores. Gee led the team with a 4.5-yard per carry average.

The fullback position will be a battle between Hunter Birtsch and walk-ons Brodey Mann and Joseph Baydoun.

Birtsch, a senior from Knoxville, competed in 10 games and started a career-best four contests in 2006. Prior to his injury, Birtsch hauled in a personal-high four receptions for 27 yards. Birtsch will not compete in spring drills but hopes to be ready when fall camp opens in August.

Mann, a junior from Heath, Ohio, will also compete for playing time along with Baydoun.

WIDE RECEIVER

A position that was young and inexperienced in 2006 should be much improved in 2007 as all three starters return along with the starting tight end.

The top-five leading receivers from last year all return including Bobby Williams, Taron Henry, Jonathan Grigsby, and Desmond Gee. Williams led the Blue Raiders with 36 receptions as a sophomore but suffered with inconsistency all season. The junior will be looked to for leadership and more consistency in 2007.

Henry, a local product from Murfreesboro, is ready for a breakout year in his final season in the blue and white. A 12-game starter during Middle Tennessee's championship season, Henry registered 16 receptions for 247 yards and a touchdown.

The most consistent receiver for the Blue Raiders in 2006 was Grigsby. The former walk-on enjoyed a career year with 24 catches for 319 yards to rank third on the team. The senior collected seven receptions at Maryland and ended the season with five grabs for a career-best 86 yards in the Motor City Bowl.

Gee, who will also see time at running back, was the playmaker of the group in 2006 with 27 receptions and three touchdowns. Over the final seven games of the season, Gee hauled in 25 catches, including a personal-best nine at the Motor City Bowl.

Also in the mix for playing time will be Michael Cannon, Patrick Honeycutt, and Dale Galvin. Cannon played in seven games last year and had two receptions, but struggled with an injury in the middle of the season which cost him three games.

The biggest addition to the receiving corps could be Honeycutt. The sophomore missed the entire 2006 season with a knee injury after working his way into a starting job with a solid fall camp. The Pelham, Ala., native is a sure-handed receiver who runs great routes and will be a key ingredient in 2007.

Another player who could get playing time after



missing 2006 is Galvin. The sophomore has yet to play in a college game after being redshirted in 2005 and sitting out for academics last season. He has to become a lot more dependable before he sees any playing time.

All four tight ends return to the fold in 2006 to make it one of the most experienced positions on the team. The tight end spot accounted for 18 receptions and two touchdowns in 2006.

Clinton Corder, a senior from nearby Brentwood, is the returning starter. In 2006, Corder registered a personal-best eight receptions after playing in all 13 games and earning nine starts.

Corder's backup and sometime starter is Stephen Chicola who has 52 career receptions in his three seasons. The Jacksonville, Fla., product led all tight ends last year with nine catches and two touchdowns. Chicola has good hands but needs to continue improvement as a blocker.

Redshirt freshman Alvin Ingle will push Corder and Chicola for playing time. Ingle played in two games last year before suffering a season-ending injury. The Madison, Tenn., native had worked himself into a starting job in fall camp before another injury cost him valuable practice time. Unfortunately, Ingle did not participate in spring drills, but he should be a factor at the position before the season ends.

Junior John Marc Stephens, a former offensive lineman and fullback, will also vie for playing time. Stephens had one reception in 11 games played.



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OFFENSIVE LINE

The Blue Raiders return three starters from last year's unit, which helped produce the Sun Belt's highest-scoring offense. Replacements for all-conference performer Germayle Franklin and the steady Marcus Gates and Paul Cantrell must be found.

Leading the way up front will be returning starters Franklin Dunbar, Brandon Nix, and Mark Thompson. Dunbar, a second team all-conference pick in 2006, was the only lineman to play and start all 13 games a year ago. An aggressive and physical player, Dunbar enjoyed a productive offseason and looks to become one of the elite linemen in the Sun Belt.

Nix also brings a level of toughness to the offensive line, where he started at guard in nine of 13 games last season. The senior had a cumulative grade of 72.2

percent a year ago to go along with 34 knockdowns.

Thompson, a sophomore out of Hickory, Tenn., played in all 13 games and had seven starts with six at guard and one at tackle. Thompson, who did not participate in spring drills due to an injury, recorded 31 knockdowns in 2006 and will be the starter at right tackle.

Also vying for a spot in the starting rotation will be Jamal Lewis, Richard Bortner, David Price, and Chris Hawkins. Lewis is a promising redshirt freshman who spent most of 2006 listed number two at left tackle behind Dunbar. The coaches feel he has a bright future, and he is penciled in as the starting left guard entering fall camp.

Bortner, a six-game starter in 2005, saw most of his snaps last year on special teams. The Blue Raiders

need the Crestview, Fla., product to step up his play and solidify his spot at right guard. At 6-6, 330, Bortner gives the Blue Raiders good size up front.

Junior David Price out of Jacksonville, Fla., will backup at both tackle positions. Price played in nine games last year including three as a starter at guard.

Another promising player up front will be redshirt freshman Hawkins. After sitting out last year, the coaches feel the Lexington, Ky., native has a bright future in Murfreesboro.

Freshman Jake Padrick and redshirt freshman Evon Lettsome will provide depth and push for playing time in 2007. Padrick is a promising newcomer who enrolled in January and Lettsome sat out last year in order to get more acclimated to the college game.

Junior Chris Ritter and redshirt freshman J. C. Moore will also be in the mix.



Middle Tennessee's defense, under the direction of Manny Diaz, lost four starters from last year's surprising group but will still welcome back a wealth of talent. The Blue Raiders return seven starters and 18 lettermen, along with the leader in quarterback sacks, tackles for loss, and interceptions.

Keying Middle Tennessee's first bowl berth in the I-A era was a defense that set school records in sacks and tackles for loss while allowing just 38 points combined in the second half of SBC action. The unit was also opportunistic, scoring four touchdowns and forcing 27 turnovers.


The Blue Raiders should be solid up front with all four starters returning including two all-conference performers. The defense will not be as fortunate at linebacker, where all three starters departed to create a wide-open battle for playing time during the spring and fall camp.

The secondary lost just one starter and returns All-American Damon Nickson and the steady Bradley Robinson. The Milton, Fla., native had five interceptions and proved to be quite a weapon with the ball in his hands.

"I was probably more pleased with the play of our defense from start to finish than any area of our team last year," said Stockstill. "We did the types of things on defense that can make it difficult on opposing offenses; we forced turnovers; we got pressure on the quarterback; and we had several tackles for loss. All of these things make your football team better in every area because if you are forcing turnovers then your offense is usually put into a good situation, and the lost yardage plays generally put offenses in a down and distance







where it is difficult to convert and make first downs.

"We need to build on the success of last season and continue to have an exciting, aggressive, defensive football team. We do have a lot of quality returning on the defensive front, but a big key for us is going to be what shakes out at the linebacker positions and whether we are able to develop quality depth there as well as in our secondary."

Following is a closer look at the 2007 defense:

DEFENSIVE LINE

The anchor of any defense is the players up front and Middle Tennessee is blessed to have all four starters and all four backups returning in 2007. Last year's

unit accounted for 22 sacks, 54 tackles for loss, and eight forced fumbles while leading the SBC in rushing defense.

Headlining the group are all-conference ends Erik Walden and Tavares Jones. Walden is coming off a career year in which he totaled 48 tackles, a school-record 11.5 sacks to rank 10th nationally, and 14.5 tackles for loss. Along the way, the senior also became Middle Tennessee's all-time leader in sacks by running his mark to 20.5.

The other half of this dynamic duo is Jones, who coaches say has an unbelievable motor. In his first year as a defensive end, Jones turned in a career season with 38 stops, 9.5 tackles for loss, and 5.5 sacks.

Also at end is senior Sean Mosley, who started all 13 games in 2006 and produced a career season. The Sylvania, Ga., native collected 40 tackles, 9.5 tackles for loss, and two sacks and forced a team-high four fumbles in helping lead one of the top defenses in the SBC.

The inside of the defensive line returns Trevor Jenkins and Wes Hofacker, who combined for 24 of a possible 26 starts in 2006. Jenkins started all 13 games and collected 35 tackles and 10.5 tackles for loss, while Hofacker added 19 tackles in his first season on the line.

Backups Jonathan Presley, Derek Mason, and Chris McCoy combined to play in 34 total games in 2006, and all three look to be improved in 2007. Presley, a junior from Jacksonville, Fla., competed in all 13 games and had one start at tackle on his way to recording 13 tackles and a sack.

Mason, who has impressed coaches with his effort in the offseason, looks to be a major contributor in his senior season. The former offensive lineman played in 10 total games and tallied four tackles. McCoy, who played defensive end in 2006 but could see more time at tackle in 2007, had six tackles, a sack, and a forced fumble in 11 games last year. The sophomore has good size and athleticism and should provide valuable depth.

Also figuring in for playing time will be senior Chris Anderson, junior Brandon Perry, and freshman Andre Wicker.

LINEBACKER

Middle Tennessee is blessed with experience on the defensive line but is not as fortunate at linebacker. All three starters from 2006 including all-conference picks J. K. Sabb and Justin Rainey, will not return. Sabb and Rainey were the team's top two tacklers a year ago.

The most experience at linebacker belongs to Chance Dunleavy, Lonnie Clemons, and Danny Carmichael.

Dunleavy started at linebacker in the opener last year before suffering an injury and missing the remainder of the season. The senior redshirted and will return in 2007. As a junior, the West Covina, Calif., native played in 11 games and collected 31 tackles and two sacks.

Clemons is coming off his best season as a Blue Raider after recording 22 tackles and his first interception in 2006. A junior from Milledgeville, Ga., Clemons played in 12 games last year and earned five starts while also registering a 40-yard fumble return for a touchdown and a six-tackle game at Arkansas State.

Sophomore Danny Carmichael will also be a heavy contributor and compete for starting duties in 2007.



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As a true freshman last year, Carmichael collected 26 tackles, 3.5 tackles for loss, and a sack. In a win at Arkansas State, Carmichael turned in a 10-tackle effort safety positions. to lead the defense.

Also in the hunt for playing time will be senior Derek Shropshire and sophomore Cam Robinson. Shropshire, out of Oak Ridge, Tenn., competed in all 13 games in his first year with the Blue Raiders with

the majority of his snaps coming on special teams. Robinson played in 12 games in 2006 and was a regular on special teams.

The biggest impact at linebacker could come from newcomers Andrew Harrington and Ivon Hickmon, Both enrolled in January after playing the previous two seasons together at East Central Mississippi Community College. Harrington earned the starting job at the "sam" position with a productive spring, but Hickmon missed the second half of drills with an injury, which



slowed his progress.

CORNERS

Depth at cornerback is a major concern for the Blue Raiders in 2007 as both starters return but only one experienced backup.

Bradley Robinson, a three-year starter with nine career interceptions, rates as one of the best at his position in the Sun Belt Conference. The Duncan, S.C., product had 37 tackles and two interceptions in 11 games last year and should man the left side in 2007.

The favorite at right cornerback will be junior Alex Suber, who made the move from running back to cornerback following the second game last season. Suber did a solid job in his first season in the secondary by collecting 17 tackles and earning four starts, including a start and three tackles in the Motor City Bowl.

Roy Polite, who started six games at right corner and three at left last year, missed spring drills while sitting out for disciplinary reasons. The senior rejoined the team in May and could be a contributor in 2007 after collecting 34 tackles, eight pass breakups, and an interception in 2006.

SAFETIES

Middle Tennessee returns one of two starters at the

Senior Damon Nickson is back to man the free safety spot after registering the best season of his career in 2006. Nickson had a memorable junior year, becoming the first All-American in the I-A era at Middle Tennessee, being voted first team all-conference at

> two different positions, and gaining National Defensive Player of the Week honors. Nickson finished 2006 with 61 tackles, three tackles for loss, a sack, and five interceptions.

The strong safety spot will be a battle between Anthony Glover and Dana Stewart to replace the graduated Jonathan Harris, Glover, who was moved from linebacker to safety last spring, sat out the 2006 season due to academic restrictions. A redshirt junior, Glover played in 2004 and 2005 but most of his action came on special teams.

Competing with Glover will be Stewart who is coming off his best year as a Blue Raider. The senior from Springfield, Tenn., collected a career best 35 tackles last season while playing in all 13 games and picking up one start.

Also competing for playing time at safety will be walk-on Josh Gregory, who transferred from Auburn.

SPECIAL TEAMS

The most unknown area on the team has to find a replacement for do-everything, all-conference player Colby Smith. Smith handled punting and placekicking the previous three years while also taking care of a lot of kickoffs for the Blue Raiders.

Placekicking duties will be a battle between junior Matt King and Marshall transfer David DeFatta. King, a junior, has never attempted a field goal in a collegiate game but does possess a strong leg. DeFatta attempted just three field goals at Marshall.

The punting job will likely come down to Richard Billings and DeFatta. Billings, a transfer from Alabama State, averaged 44.5 yards a punt during the spring game. DeFatta, from nearby Franklin, averaged 42.3 yards a punt during his prep career.

LEGEND OF LIGHTNING

In Greek mythology, the winged horse possessed superior cunning and speed. The thundering horse of the gods was entrusted to carry awesome lightning bolts and could only be harnessed by a noble being with a pure heart. Character, talent, and strength were required to mount and ride the fabled winged horse.

Today, this winged horse is a fitting symbol of a university that has earned its wings and excels in many academic arenas, including historic preservation, teacher training, aerospace, political science, horse science, and recording industry. But the winged horse is more than a symbol of physical accomplishment; it's also a symbol of character and the responsible wielding of power.

The challenge of all great universities and university athletic departments is to help student-athletes build character as well as strength. This winged horse, Lightning, is a symbol to Middle Tennessee students, athletes, and alumni of the soaring school spirit they experience at sporting events.

For its nobility and character, the winged horse was immortalized in the stars. Now, with breathtaking speed and thundering, unbridled power, Lightning strikes, forevermore, fear in the hearts of Blue Raider opponents and leads Middle Tennessee to victory!



BLUE RAIDER NICKNAME

In the early days of athletics at Middle Tennessee State University, the teams were known by several nicknames. Among these were Teachers, Normalites, and Pedagogues.

In 1934, it was decided that the school needed a specific nickname. During football season that year, the Murfreesboro Daily News Journal held a contest to name the team.

The late Charles Sarver, then a Middle Tennessee football player and later principal at White County High School in Sparta, Tenn., won the \$5 prize for his entry of "Blue Raiders." Sarver later indicated he had "borrowed" the nickname of the Colgate Red Raiders but substituted MTSU Blue for Colgate Red. Ever since then, Middle Tennessee athletic teams have been known as the Blue Raiders.

For a time, the "unofficial" mascot for the Blue Raiders was a costumed, cartoon-like dog. A reasonable facsimile of a bluetick hound, the affable character was dubbed "Ole Blue."

Strength and Conditioning

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One of the biggest changes in college athletics over the past few years has been the attitude toward strength and conditioning. Performing in the weight room has become just as important as on-the-field competition, and Middle Tennessee has one of the very best staffs in the nation committed to making student-athletes the best they can be.

It all happens in the Blue Raiders' 10,000-plus square foot weight room facility located adjacent to the north end zone of Floyd Stadium and designed for use by all Middle Tennessee student-athletes. It is a strength training area that rivals any in the country. The weight room has been described by many people as better than any in the immediate area, including those at SEC and Conference USA schools.

The facility, which opened in January of 1999, greets student-athletes with over 20,000 pounds of plates and dumbbells, but the sheer volume of weights is not the most impressive aspect of the room. It is equipped with nine full power racks, nine elevated platforms, and nine half-racks. Hammer strength equipment rounds out the room with five ground-base jammers, a dead lift, a leg press, a leg curl, and a leg extension. Other Hammer strength equipment in the facility includes a bench press, a military press, a rowing machine, neck machine, pull-up, and pull-over.

An impressive array of dumbbells is also provided for the student-athletes' use. Two sets each of dumbbells ranging from five to 150 pounds are kept on racks around the room. Mirrors ring the walls of the room to help student-athletes





ensure that they are using proper form throughout their workouts. Cardiovascular equipment, such as treadmills and stationary bikes, is also available in the facility.

Other state-of-the-art amenities may also be found in the weight room. A television with cable and a state-of-the-art sound system has been installed for the enjoyment of the student-athletes. Three offices for the strength coaches are located in the facility, along with restrooms and a hospitality area. The weight room also provides direct access to the football stadium, gameday room, and individual meeting rooms and is in close proximity to the Blue Raider Practice Complex. The gameday room is used not only by the Blue Raider football team on game days and for film breakdown but also for press conferences, classes, and other functions. The meeting room is fully equipped with high-tech audio/visual equipment to enhance learning.

Middle Tennessee's Athletic Department entered into a partnership agreement with the Murfreesboro City Schools in May 2006 to provide each school with athletic teams to mentor, coach, and tutor students in assigned schools during the school year.

The partnership is a continuation of the relationship formed by the City School Board and Middle Tennessee President Sidney McPhee. One of the basic goals for the partnership will be to provide creative mentoring for the student-athlete and the Murfreesboro City School student. Following is a list showing where each athletic program will mentor in 2007-08:

Academic Center

The Student-Athlete Enhancement Center at Middle Tennessee houses the academic support system and the Blue Raider Athlete Skills for Success (B.R.A.S.S.) Life Skills Program for all 17 Division I-A sports. The center is housed at Johnny "Red" Floyd Football Stadium on Raider Drive.

The facility opened its doors on January 4, 1999, to the delight of student-athletes, coaches, and administrators.

Blue Raider student-athletes can take advantage of the library-like atmosphere as they report for their required study hall hours under the watchful eyes of director, Jim Rost; assistant director and coordinator of B.R.A.S.S., Wynnifred Counts and assistants Debbie Carroll and Angel Nathan.

Rost, in his second year at the helm, makes his way to Middle Tennessee after four years as associate director/academic advisor for football at LSU.

The center consists of administrative offices, fully equipped individual and group tutoring rooms, a computer center, and spacious study carrels equipped with task lighting. Services provided by the center include help with registration and preregistration, help with study skills, and updates on NCAA legislation.

The center uses an innovative objective study table program, which includes daily mentoring and constant tutoring. Tutors in various subjects are scheduled in the tutoring rooms throughout all hours of operation, and all tutoring takes place at the center. The SAEC staff is responsible for daily monitoring of the student-athletes progress providing daily reports to coaches and meeting with the entire coaching staff weekly.

The mission of the center is to help student-athletes take skills learned on the field and turn them into positive preparation for life after college. The center is also committed to meeting the changing needs of student-athletes. It continues to promote partnerships

Middle Tennessee has inducted 51 studentathletes into the Chi Alpha Sigma National College Athlete Honor Society after just three years of being eligible. In 2005, the first year Blue Raider student-athletes could be inducted, a total of 26 were recognized. Middle Tennessee placed 10 student-athletes into the society in 2006 and 15 in 2007.

Chi Alpha Sigma is a nonprofit organization established to recognize college students who earn a varsity letter in at least one sport while maintaining a 3.4 or higher cumulative GPA throughout their junior and senior years. The goal of the organization is to recognize outstanding academic achievement by intercollegiate athletes.

In the spring of each year, Special Olympics at Middle Tennessee uses Blue Raider student-athletes to run each event. Career night and substance and alcohol abuse seminars are yearly, well-attended events. Social events such as the Spring Student-Athlete Ball are eagerly anticipated as the only time during the year when all student-athletes can be together.

The Student-Athlete Enhancement Center is just one way that Middle Tennessee is helping to prepare student-athletes for life after college.







Scarlett Commons, named for former Middle Tennessee president M. G. Scarlett, is one of the premier living arrangements at any university in the region. Opened to students in the fall of 1999, the facility provides apartment-style living with the convenience of staying on campus.

Nine three-story buildings with 12 apartments each and a useful clubhouse make up the Scarlett complex. Each apartment contains four private bedrooms connected by two private bathrooms, a full kitchen, and



a comfortable living room. Each apartment is fully furnished, and window miniblinds are provided. The kitchen includes a table and four chairs, microwave, refrigerator, stove, and oven. The living area includes a sofa, lounge chair, and television stand. Each bedroom has a closet and is furnished with a bed, dresser, nightstand, and desk with a hutch. Each apartment also includes cable and phone lines in

> the living room and data lines with access to the Internet for personal computers in each bedroom.

The Scarlett Commons clubhouse creates a real sense of community with its recreation/meeting rooms, fireplace, big screen TV, and laundry room. Any maintenance issues are a mere phone call away to the 24-hour reception and service desk located in the clubhouse.



Residents also enjoy the ease of using Raider Xpress, the University's shuttle buses, to make every class on time. The Red shuttle makes stops in front of the clubhouse every 15 to 20 minutes and is a comfortable way to ride to the door of major buildings on campus.

Students living in Scarlett Commons have their own restricted parking lot, so it's easy to find parking in front of their buildings 24 hours a day.

Each building has an assigned resident assistant on the first floor. These are student staff members who have the responsibility of helping residents with any difficulties they might have as well as helping to get all the residents involved in activities across campus.

Dining Facilities

Middle Tennessee offers five different on-campus dining areas, with the most popular being Keathley University Center (KUC) Grill and Cyber Café.

The KUC is located in the center of campus and is a major intersection for student activities. The Grill is located on the second floor and features Pizza Hut, Quizno's Subs, Grille Works, Salad Garden, Chick-Fil-A, and Freshens (desserts and smoothies). The KUC Grill is open from 6:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. Monday—Thursday and is open until 5 p.m. on Fridays.

The Cyber Café is the first of its kind in the Tennessee Board of Regents system, offering a futuristic and efficient way for students to dine. Students are able to eat while e-mailing or searching the Web at the same time on eight computers with access to the World Wide Web.

Burger King and Subway serve students until 2:00 a.m. Monday-Thursday and 7 p.m. on Fridays. Six 32-inch televisions suspended from the ceiling also catch students up on events around the world. Sofas and armchairs make Cyber Café a great place to relax between classes with coffee or Ben and Jerry's

ice cream. A popular event for students is open mic night when live music is performed during the dinner hour. This weekly event fills the cafe to capacity. The café also features a wide array of items traditionally found in convenience

Student-athletes can start the day with biscuits and gravy and an omelet from McCallie Dining

in Corlew Hall. This is a favorite spot because of the fun atmosphere and all-you-can-eat dining selections. Student-athletes get a chance to relax and socialize with each other while feasting on subs, pizza, grill works, carved meats, fresh deli food, fresh-made pasta, and a salad bar. Thursday nights in McCallie are theme nights featuring, for example, tastes of the bayou on Cajun night or a feast of egg rolls and fried rice on Far East night. No matter what is served, the fellowship among athletes and students is always enjoyable.

A great spot for lunch is the RaiderZone at James



Union Building, a new sports theme restaurant. Students can enjoy all you care to eat buffet-style foods, pizza and pasta, carved meats, fresh deli food, and freshly made salads.

Snack favorites can be found in the Mass Communication and Business and Aerospace buildings and at Lightning's Limo in the stadium breezeway. A new dining area in James E. Walker Library offers Starbucks coffee, sandwiches and wraps, fresh fruit, and freshbaked pastries.

The Sports Medicine facility underwent a \$1 million renovation in 2001, giving Middle Tennessee student-athletes one of the finest athletic training facilities in the nation.

Head Athletic Trainer Joe-Joe Petrone and the Sports Medicine staff

have set liberal hours to make sure each studentathlete has his or her needs met. The Sports Medicine facility opens at 6 a.m. each morning and doesn't

There is no waiting in the Sports Medicine facility since there are nine taping stations, eight state-of-the-art modalities, and a brand-new rehabilitation

area. All of the equipment in the facility is top of the line. Athletes The latest piece of equipment that aids the Sports Medicine staff is a new state-of-the-art computer system that tracks injuries, rehab protocols, medications, and surgeries. The new computer system allows each athletic trainer to keep student-athlete rehabilitation programs moving forward at as rapid a pace as possible.

The facility also contains a fully stocked physician's examination room

for the resolution of any minor issues that a studentathlete may encounter without having to take more time-consuming measures. There is also a C-Arm portable X-Ray machine on site.

Petrone and his assistants each have an office in the Sports Medicine facility, and there is work space for the nine graduate assistants. Each office is selfcontained, allowing private consultations with injured student-athletes.

With the 2001 renovation, Sports Medicine tripled in size and vastly improved health care for each Blue Raider program. The Sports Medicine facility contains a complete injury rehabilitation center, new rehab equipment, two full-size whirlpools, a dressing area for athletes, and a private office for the team physicians.



can use a fullstride treadmill, a stairmaster, and an exercise bike during their rehabilitation. One of the most recent additions to the equipment in the Sports Medicine facility is a \$15,000 K-Laser which helps speed up the

healing process enabling student-athletes to return to competition at a faster rate.

The Sports Medicine facility represents the University's commitment to quality health care for its student-athletes, and the Sports Medicine staff is dedicated to providing the best care possible at the Division I-A level.



Jazz Fest, Uncle Dave Macon Days Festival, and the International Grand Championship Tennessee Walking Horse Show are among the annual events that attract thousands of visitors to the area. The Nashville Superspeedway is located close to the Rutherford County line and is the host of several races, including a NASCAR Busch Series race.

Expanding population and increasing growth have made Murfreesboro a vibrant

community. However, growth has not left behind the core values that have made Murfreesboro one of the area's most preferred cities in which to live. With all indications pointing toward a continuation of the area's growth, Murfreesboro will maintain its place among the state's most outstanding and livable cities.

In the heart of Tennessee lies
Murfreesboro, one of the fastest growing cities in the state and the country.
Murfreesboro is the home of Middle Tennessee State University and is located at the exact geographic center of the state of Tennessee. Murfreesboro has a storied past and an extremely bright future.

Founded in 1811, Murfreesboro was formerly known as Cannonsburgh. The name was changed to Murfreesboro after only 33 days in honor of Revolution-

ary War Colonel Hardy Murfree. Today, Cannonsburgh historical site, which includes a gristmill, one-room schoolhouse, town hall, log home, and church, is one of the most visited historical sites in the midstate.

From 1817 to 1822, Murfreesboro served as the state's capital. The capital was moved to Nashville because of its larger economic base and easy access to the Cumberland River. Murfreesboro has remained a major economic center since the city's founding because of its geographic location: just 30 miles southeast of Nashville and about 90 miles from Chattanooga. Murfreesboro has also seen tremendous growth because of its proximity to interstate highways.

Murfreesboro's population of more than 81,000 allows citizens to live in a relatively large city with a small-town atmosphere. Rutherford County has more than 218,000 residents. According to many sources, the county is the fastest growing in the state and one

For the history buff, there are several sites to visit in and around the Murfreesboro area. The 600-acre Stones River National Battlefield was the site of one of the bloodiest battles of the Civil War and can be visited year-round. Oaklands historic site, the Sam Davis home, Fortress Rosecrans, and Cannonsburgh Village recreate the rich history of the area and welcome visitors.

Parks and recreation are top-notch in the area. Murfreesboro alone boasts four golf courses: Old Fort, Indian Hills, the VA golf course, and Stones River Country Club. The area also has several other courses, including Smyrna Municipal, Cedar Crest, Champions Run, and Blackberry Ridge. McKnight Park is the home of SportsCom, softball fields, baseball fields, and soccer fields. Oaklands Park includes a 25-acre historical site, picnic areas, and baseball fields. Old Fort Park includes picnic areas for relaxation, baseball fields, tennis courts, and a golf course. In addition to



The Tennessean, Nashville Business Journal, and the City Paper each provide superior coverage, and eight local television stations and 29 radio stations never miss a moment of news, weather, and sports action in and around Davidson County.

The Sun Belt Conference and its members have access to and are able

to draw from the seemingly limitless resources offered by Middle Tennessee's proximity to Nashville.

Middle Tennessee defeated Vanderbilt at Dudley Field in 2001, 2002, and 2005, and the Blue Raiders played host to Big East foe Louisville at LP Field in 2006, marking the first time the football program has played a home football game in Nashville as a

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

Leads Blue Raiders to bowl game, league title in first season

Earns 2006 Sun Belt Conference Coach of the Year Award

In his first year as a head coach, Rick Stockstill seized the moment and guided the Middle Tennessee program to a place many thought impossible.

After 24 years as an assistant, Stockstill was given the chance to run his own program and all he did was lead the Blue Raiders to a Sun Belt Conference championship, help set a new single-season attendance record, and take the program to its first postseason bowl game in the I-A era. In taking a Middle Tennessee team predicted to finish sixth in the Sun Belt during the preseason to a

league title, Stockstill was also crowned the 2006 Sun Belt Conference Coach of the Year and the Tennessee Sports Writers Association Coach of the Year while also garnering that honor from ESPN.com.

During the 2006 championship run, Stockstill and his staff developed an All-American, 11 all-conference players, 11 SBC Player of the Week winners, a consensus National Defensive Player of the Week (Damon Nickson won the Walter Camp and the Bronco Nagurski awards), and the school's all-time sacks leader (Erik Walden). Not

bad considering only three Blue Raiders were named to the All-SBC Preseason team as voted on by league coaches and media.

Off the field, Stockstill made an immediate impact as well by dramatically improving the team's APR to 949 from 892.

A benchmark of all championship teams is the ability to win away from home, and Stockstill's Blue Raiders demonstrated their mental toughness by winning a league-best four Sun Belt Conference road games on the way to a school record six conference wins in all. In fact, Middle Tennessee's road success was among the best in college football in 2006—only 10 other teams won as many conference road games (Arkansas, Auburn, Boise State, BYU, Ohio, Ohio State, Oklahoma, Texas A&M, USC, Wake Forest).

It is said you are only as good as the people you surround yourself with, and Stockstill assembled a championship staff well before he coached his first game. Stockstill's staff sports two Super Bowl rings, three National Championships, 58 bowl rings, and 125 years of coaching experience.

Along with his extensive background in collegiate coaching circles, the driven and determined Stockstill also has had the advantage of working alongside some of the greatest minds in college football history. These experiences were evident in his highly successful first season at the helm.

Stockstill, who made his way to Murfreesboro after spending the previous two years at South Carolina, has worked with legendary coaches Lou Holtz, Steve Spurrier, Danny Ford, Tommy Bowden, Ken Hatfield, and Tommy West.

Stockstill demonstrated the ability to develop and coach big-time players throughout his 24-year college coaching career. He joined the Gamecock staff in December 2003 and immediately made an impact in recruiting. Stockstill coached the Gamecock tight ends and served as recruiting coordinator in 2005 and was the wide receiver coach in 2004.

Before joining Holtz' staff at South Carolina, Stockstill was the offensive coordinator at East Carolina in 2003.

In his first year at South Carolina, Stockstill coached Troy Williamson to one of the best seasons ever for a Gamecock receiver. Williamson made 43 receptions for 835 yards (75.9 per game average) and seven touchdowns. Williamson's 835 receiving yards put him among the single-season leaders at USC, along with his seven touchdowns. Williamson was taken as the seventh pick in the 2005 NFL Draft by the Minnesota Vikings.

In addition to his on-field coaching at Carolina, Stockstill coordinated the signing of a top-20 recruit-






ing class for the Gamecocks in his first season and was recognized as one of the top 25 recruiters in the nation by Rivals.com.

From 1989 to 2002, Stockstill was on the coaching staff at Clemson where he helped lead the Tigers to some of their most proficient offensive performances in school history. He served in a variety of capacities during his tenure with Clemson, working as recruiting coordinator, wide receivers coach, co-offensive coordinator, passing game coordinator, and quarterbacks coach. One of his prize pupils was All-America wide receiver Rod Gardner, who now stars with the Kansas City Chiefs and was the number 15 pick of the 2001 NFL Draft. Stockstill played an integral role in Clemson's offense, which set more than 100 school records from 1998 to 2002.

Also recognized as a top-notch recruiter, Stockstill is credited with recruiting Clemson's all-time leading rusher (Raymond Priester), second all-time leading passer (Woodrow Dantzler), and all-time leading receivers (Derrick Hamilton and Rod Gardner). Stockstill has coached in 12 bowl games during his career with the Motor City Bowl being the 13th.

Stockstill also has coaching experience at the University of Central Florida (1985-88), where he tutored wide receiver Shawn Jefferson (who went on to a 13-year career in the NFL) and at Bethune-Cookman College (1983-84).

Born Dec. 23 in Sidney, Ohio, Stockstill grew up in Georgetown, Ky., and then moved to Fernandina

A head coach in the high school ranks of Georgia for 14 years and a former teammate of Head Coach Rick Stockstill, Brent Brock is completing his first season as tight ends coach for Middle Tennessee. Brock also has 14 years of experience as an athletic director on the high school level.

Under Brock's leadership in 2006, the tight ends were a key ingredient for the Sun Belt Conference's top scoring offense and the league's number two-rated

team in passing efficiency. The group came up with 18 receptions on the season and two of the team's nine touchdown receptions.

Brock came to Middle Tennessee after serving the previous four years as head coach and athletic director at Jackson County High School in Jefferson, Ga. Brock had the privilege of coaching in the GHSA North/South All-Star game (1995) and the Georgia/Florida High School All-Star game (1997).

Brock got his start in coaching as a volunteer assistant at Godby High School in Tallahassee in 1981 and then left the following season to join Jim Hughes' staff at Thomasville High School in 1982.

Brock followed Hughes to Colquitt High School in 1983, where he helped coach the Packers in the 1991 1-AAAA state championship game. During his nine seasons at Colquitt, the Packers made the region playoffs eight times, were region runner-up three times, and received the region's all-sports trophy on three occasions.

Brock served as assistant head coach, offensive coordinator, offensive line coach, and strength coordinator during his time at Colquitt.

He earned his first head coaching job in 1992 when he took over the Worth County High School program in Sylvester, Ga. He took a struggling program that went 1-9 his first year to an 8-3 mark and back-to-back playoff appearances in his third and fourth seasons.

In 1996, Brock took over head coaching and athletic director duties at Fitzgerald High School in Fitzgerald, Ga., where he had the challenge of rebuilding a program that had just 40 players his first season. With hard work and determination, Brock fielded 70 players and helped turn the program around during his short tenure. Under his reign, FHS took home the sportsmanship trophy for 2-AAA

in 1996 and 1997.

Before taking over at Jackson County, Brock spent two years as offensive coordinator/strength coach at Westside High School under Robert Davis. Westside, only four years old at the time, made it to the semifinals of the state at the Georgia Dome in 2002 and finished with a No. 4 state ranking. In 2001, Westside advanced to the guarterfinals of the state playoffs.

The Albany, Ga., native received his B.S. degree in health/physical education at Florida State in 1982, his degree at Albany State, and his Ed.S. degree from FSU.

As a player, Brock played four years for Coach Bobby Bowden at Florida State as an offensive lineman. He was a member of the 1977 Tangerine Bowl team and the 1980 and 1981 Orange Bowl teams.

Brock is married to his high school sweetheart the former Missie Milton of Albany, Ga.

Manny Diaz begins his second year as defensive coordinator on Rick Stockstill's staff at Middle Tennessee. Diaz, who also coaches the safeties, joined the Blue Raiders after spending six years at N.C. State.

If his first stint as a coordinator is a glimpse into the future, then the Blue Raider defense will have to be reckoned with for years to come. Diaz' defense broke the school record for quarterback sacks with 36 and set a new school mark in tackles for loss with 105 while leading the Sun Belt Conference in rushing

defense and sacks. The 2006 unit, which allowed just 38 total points in the

second half of SBC action, scored four touchdowns and produced four first team all-conference performers along with the National Defensive Player of the Week on October 30.

Diaz also aided in the development of all-conference performers Erik Walden, Damon Nickson, Tavares Jones, J. K. Sabb, and Justin Rainey in 2006. Walden set the single-season sack record and became Middle Tennessee's all-time leader in the category, and Nickson led the SBC in interceptions.

Diaz has been involved in eight bowl games during his nine years on the collegiate level and played a major role for one of the country's top-ranked defenses by coaching safeties in 2004 and 2005 and handling the linebackers in 2002 and 2003 for the Wolfpack.

In 2005, the Wolfpack finished eighth nationally in total defense, sixth in third down percentage, and 12th in scoring defense en route to a 7-5 record and a shutout win over South Florida in the Meineke Car Care Bowl. Diaz, who also served as special teams coordinator, saw his kickoff return unit finish fifth nationally, and his punt return team recorded four blocked kicks.

In his first year as safeties coach and special team's coordinator in 2004, N.C. State's defense finished the year as the top-ranked unit in the country in total

defense by allowing just over 220 yards per game. The Wolfpack defense also held national powers Ohio State and Florida State to under 130 yards of total offense during the 2004 campaign. Diaz, who coached All-ACC performer and current New York Jet Andre Maddox, also had his punt return team block three kicks and take two returns for touchdowns.

The Miami, Fla., native handled the linebackers for N.C. State in 2002 and 2003. In 2003, the Wolfpack won the Tangerine Bowl and finished 7-5 with Diaz sharing play-calling duties for all 11 games. Diaz also made all the defensive calls during the bowl win over Kansas.

In his first year as a full-time coach, Diaz helped the Wolfpack to one of their best seasons ever: they finished 11-3 and defeated Notre Dame in the Gator Bowl.

> Diaz, who coached All-ACC performer Dantonio Burnette, shared in the playcalling duties, and N.C. State ended the year ranked 14th nationally in total defense and 10th in scoring defense. In back-to-back games against Florida State and Notre Dame, N.C. State did not allow an offensive touchdown.

Diaz, one of the voungest coordinators in college football, spent the 2000 and 2001 seasons at N.C. State as a graduate assistant working primarily with the linebacking corps. During this time, the Wolfpack went to two bowl games and became the first ACC team to beat FSU in Tallahassee.

Diaz, whose father is serving his second term as mayor of the City of Miami, began his coaching career at Florida State in 1998, working alongside defensive coordinator Mickey Andrews for two seasons. During his stint, the Seminoles won a national championship in 1999 and were runners-up in 1998.

The 1995 Florida State graduate (B.S. in communications) is married to the former Stephanie Cerow and they have three sons, Colin, Gavin, and Manny. Diaz, who worked at ESPN from

1995 to 1997, was a Miami Herald Honorable Mention All-Dade County Scholar-Athlete for football, basketball, and baseball in 1991.

Antonio Goss

Cornerbacks/Special Teams ■ 2nd Year ■ North Carolina, 1989



Antonio Goss, a seven-year veteran of the National Football League with the San Francisco 49ers and the St. Louis Rams, is beginning his second season at Middle Tennessee as cornerbacks coach. Goss, who also serves as special teams coordinator, made his way to the Blue Raiders after five years at the University of Buffalo, where he served as linebackers coach for three years before taking over the cornerbacks his final two seasons.

Under Goss, the cornerbacks came up with six of the team's 14 interceptions, including one by Bradley Robinson that was returned 88 yards for a touchdown

against Arkansas State. The return went down as the fourth longest in school history and was a turning point in the game. Goss also had two players ranked among the top ten in the Sun Belt in passes defended.

The Blue Raiders also enjoyed one of their best years in the special teams department under Goss' leadership. Middle Tennessee set a school record in kickoff return yards and touchdowns; Colby Smith led the Sun Belt in punting average; and Damon Nickson paced the league in kickoff return average. Both players earned first team all-conference honors, and Nickson was tabbed a second-team All-American by Sl.com and Scout. com.

Goss is a two-time Super Bowl Champ with the 49ers (XXIV and XXIX). In Super Bowl XXIX, Goss was chosen by his teammates to represent them as special teams captain along with defensive captain Tim McDonald and future Hall of Famer Jerry Rice.

During Goss' time as the cornerbacks coach at Buffalo, he tutored

freshman All-MAC performer James Evans and Buffalo standout Gemara Williams, who finished the 2005 season with a school record 13 pass breakups. Buffalo went

on to lead the MAC in passing defense and rank eighth nationally in 2005.

Before making the move to cornerbacks, Goss coached linebackers and tutored Bobby Johnson, who had 112 tackles in 2003.

Before joining the staff at Buffalo, Goss coached one year at North Carolina Central, where he was the linebackers and special teams coach.

Goss spent three years coaching in and around the Durham/Chapel Hill area after earning his degree in sociology at the University of North Carolina in 1989, where he starred on the football team as a linebacker and safety. Goss was coached by Dick Crum and current Texas Head Coach Mack Brown.

Goss went on to spend six years with the San Francisco 49ers, playing with future Hall of Famers Jerry Rice, Ronnie Lott, and Joe Montana and playing a part



in two Super Bowl wins. Goss was a backup linebacker and also served as captain of special teams during his tenure with the 49ers. After leaving San Francisco, he played one season with the St. Louis Rams, in 1996, where he started five games and again led the special teams unit.

Goss was tutored by defensive coordinator Jerry Gray and linebacker coach Don Blackmon, while helping out special teams coach Bobby April. In 2004, Goss spent time with the Detroit Lions staff.

His hobbies and interests include playing with his kids and date night with





Les Herrin

Asst. Head Coach/Defensive Line ■ 2nd Year ■ Western Carolina, 1971



A veteran of 25 years in collegiate coaching, Les Herrin is beginning his second year as the defensive line coach at Middle Tennessee. Herrin, who added the title of assistant head coach in March 2007, had been out of coaching the previous two seasons before joining Rick Stockstill's staff in 2006.

In 2006, Herrin inherited a defensive front that lost three starters who spent time in NFL training camps, and it appeared the unit would be a work in

progress. As it turned out, Herrin proved to be the perfect fit for a young group of linemen eager to be coached. Herrin developed a group that recorded 22 of the team's school-record 36 sacks and 54 tackles for loss in helping form the top rushing defense in the Sun Belt. The top five players along the defensive line all had career years in 2006, including a school record 11.5 sacks by Erik Walden; a

team-best four forced fumbles by Sean Mosley; and personal-bests in tackles, tackles for loss, and sacks by Tavares Jones. Walden and Jones both earned first team all-conference honors.

Once referred to as the "dean of football coaches at Clemson," Herrin spent 14 seasons on the Tigers' staff and coached defenses for Danny Ford, Ken Hatfield, and Tommy West. He was linebackers coach on Clemson's 1981 national championship

Before joining Stockstill's staff, Herrin was defensive coordinator at The Citadel from 2001 to 2003. During Herrin's tenure at The Citadel, he saw vast improvement on the defensive side of the football and coached three All-Southern Conference performers in three seasons. Herrin was also instrumental in the play of two-time All-American linebacker and Buck Buchanan Award Finalist Travis Stephens, Herrin teamed with Head Coach Ellis Johnson to form two of the best defensive minds in the Southern Conference.

Herrin's leadership ability was evident at a young age when he was named captain of the football team in his playing days at Western Carolina. He was also the team MVP as a senior and defensive

MVP as a junior. Herrin earned his B.S. degree in education from Western Carolina in 1971 and his master's degree in health and physical education in 1972.

After serving as defensive coordinator at Appalachian State in 1980, Herrin joined the Clemson staff in 1981 and guided the inside linebackers. At Clemson, he coached ACC MVP Jeff Davis, later a Tampa Bay Buccaneers captain, and eventual 1989 All-Pro linebacker Johnny Rembert of the New England Patriots.

Herrin, who was inducted into the Ware County Hall of Fame in 1998, had brief stints as defensive coordinator/outside linebackers coach at East Carolina (1985-87) working for Art Baker, a former Citadel head coach. He also spent one season (1988) with Mack Brown as outside linebackers coach at North Carolina before returning to Clemson as defensive line coach, where he continued to produce nationally renowned defenses. In 1989, Clemson ranked fifth in the nation in rushing, scoring, and total defense. In 1990, the Tigers led the nation in total defense and were second in rushing and scoring defense.

> In 1991, Herrin's defensive group led the nation in rushing defense and was instrumental in the Tigers' ACC championship. His players included the likes of Chester McGlockton, Brenston Buckner, and Rob Bodine, all of whom were either All-Americans or All-Pros (or both). In 1996, he coached Trevor Pryce, who later won a Super Bowl ring with the Denver Broncos. As a coach, Herrin participated in the 1982 Orange Bowl, 1989 Gator Bowl, 1991 Hall of Fame Bowl, 1992 Citrus Bowl, 1993 Peach Bowl, 1996 Gator Bowl, the 1997 and 1998 Peach Bowls, and the 2006 Motor City Bowl. Overall, Herrin has coached 12 players who went on to enjoy professional careers including three who earned Pro Bowl honors.

He began his high school coaching career, which spanned eight seasons, as an assistant at R/S Central High in Rutherfordton, NC (1972-74). He then became an assistant at Lexington Senior High in Lexington, NC (1975-76), and athletic director and head coach at Central Davidson High in Lexington, NC (1977-79), where his teams went 29-6.

Born February 18, 1948, in Waycross, Ga., Herrin has a son, Deke, who is an assistant coach at Presbyterian College.

Art Kaufman

Linebackers ■ 3rd Year ■ Arkansas-Monticello, 1980



Art Kaufman, a veteran of 24 years of coaching at the collegiate level, is in his third season at Middle Tennessee and his second under Rick Stockstill. Kaufman is in his third full season coaching the Blue Raider linebackers.

In 2006, Kaufman molded a group that produced three of the top four tacklers on the team, and five of his players turned in career performances. Justin Rainey and J. K. Sabb both earned Sun Belt All-

Conference honors, and Rainey and Lonnie Clemons both recorded touchdowns

on fumble returns. The unit ended up being a strength of the surprising Blue Raider defense in 2006 and played a key role in the program's first bowl game in the I-A era (Motor City Bowl).

In his first year at Middle Tennessee, Kaufman made a huge impact on the defense: the Blue Raiders finished 17th nationally in scoring defense and 28th in total defense. Both rankings went down as the best since the Blue Raiders joined the I-A ranks in 1999. Kaufman guided newcomer J. K. Sabb, who led the team in tackles, to second team all-conference honors.

Kaufman, who has coached in seven bowl games during his career, made his way to Murfreesboro after two seasons as defensive line coach at East Carolina.

Before joining the staff at ECU, Kaufman spent two seasons as the defensive coordinator and linebackers coach at Arkansas Tech.

A 1980 graduate of the University of Arkansas at Monticello, Kaufman spent 10 years as an assistant coach at the University of Mississippi

including six years as defensive coordinator and linebackers coach.

Kaufman, a two-time All-American linebacker during his playing days at Arkansas-Monticello, followed his four-year career with the Boll Weevils by taking a graduate assistant position at Delta State University.

Kaufman earned his first full-time coaching job in 1983 when he became the outside linebackers coach at Northwestern State University (La.). In 1987, he was named defensive coordinator/linebackers coach at Northwestern State. He left there the following year for Ole Miss to coach the Rebels' outside linebackers and defensive ends. While at Ole Miss, Kaufman helped guide the Rebels to backto-back bowl appearances (1989 Liberty Bowl and 1991 Gator Bowl) for the first time since the 1970s.

> Four years later, Kaufman was named the defensive coordinator/ linebackers coach at Louisiana Tech University, where he remained until returning to Ole Miss in 1995. In 1992, his defensive unit ranked in the top five nationally.

> He served again as the Rebels' defensive coordinator/linebacker coach for the next six years. During his second stint at Ole Miss, Kaufman helped the Rebels to four straight bowl berths (1997-2000), and his 1999 defense ranked fourth nationally in rushing defense.

Kaufman, a native of Dermott, Ark., has three daughters: Tara, Taylor, and Madison.



Offensive Coordinator/Quarterbacks ■ 2nd Year ■ Florida, 1992



Former Delaware Valley Head Coach G. A. Mangus is in his second season as offensive coordinator on Rick Stockstill's staff. Mangus, a two-time Coach of the Year who was a guarterback at Florida under Steve Spurrier, also oversees the quarterbacks for the Blue Raiders.

In Mangus' first year calling the plays, Middle Tennessee produced the Sun Belt Conference's top scoring offense that had 200 or more yards rushing on four different occasions. Mangus' offense also scored in the

red zone 91.7 percent of the time to lead the league, while producing the SBC's top touchdown maker in Eugene Gross. Under his leadership, Gross, Desmond Gee,

and linemen Germayle Franklin and Franklin Dunbar all earned all-conference honors in 2006.

Before his arrival at MT, Mangus took the Delaware Valley program over in May of 2002, went 2-8 in his rookie campaign, and turned the team into an NCAA Division III championship contender during his four seasons. Since 2002, Delaware Valley notched a 33-4 record, won three conference championships (ECAC in 2003, MAC in 2004 and 2005), reached the 2004 NCAA quarterfinals in the school's firstever trip to the national playoffs in a team-qualifying sport, and followed that up with another quarterfinal appearance in 2005.

In 2004 and 2005, Mangus led the Aggies to perfect back-to-back regular season records and the team's first overall Middle Atlantic Conference championship for an automatic bid to the NCAA postseason in 2004. The 2005 squad also earned a MAC title and advanced to the NCAA playoffs. Delaware Valley hosted and won their first two playoff games in 2004 and 2005 before falling in the quarterfinals and finishing with a 12-1 record each

was then voted as the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Division III Region 2 Coach of the Year and was a candidate for the national honor as well. Mangus' off-season was capped when he was named the Tri-State Coach of the Year by the prestigious Maxwell Football Club.

The 2004 success followed a 2003 campaign that saw Mangus direct the Aggies to the fifth-greatest one-year turnaround in Division III history. They finished with a 9-2 record and captured the Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) Southeast Championship with a 54-37 victory over he College of New Jersey. Mangus was named MAC Coach of the Year for his efforts.

Mangus was a guarterback at the University of Florida from 1988 to 1991, including two years under former Washington Redskins and current South Carolina Head Coach Steve Spurrier. During that time, he was a member of the school's

> first-ever SEC championship team in 1991 and was on the sidelines for the 1992 Sugar Bowl.

Following his 1992 graduation, Mangus remained at Florida for three years and served in the roles of graduate assistant and assistant offensive line coach. The Gators won two SEC titles (1993, 1994), reached the championship game in 1992, and made three bowl appearances during that time.

Mangus moved on to Widener in February of 1995 and was part of the powerhouse program for four seasons. He first began as the running backs and quarterbacks coach and was eventually elevated to offensive coordinator. The Pioneers had two eight-win seasons and made two postseason appearances including an NCAA Division III playoff berth in 1995.

Mangus became the assistant head coach and offensive coordinator for Ursinus College in June of 1999 and joined a program that had gone 3-7 the previous year. The 1999 squad posted a school-record 10 wins (10-2), including the school's first-ever NCAA Division III playoff win in the first round. The Bears came back the next

The accolades poured in for Mangus following the 2004 season. He was named MAC Coach of the Year for the second year in a row and also earned the East Region Coach of the Year Award from *Don Hansen's Football Gazette*. Mangus year and went 8-2 for the first back-to-back winning seasons since 1954. Mangus and his wife, Lauren, have a daughter, Grace.

Simmons makes his way to Murfreesboro after one season on Tommy Bowden's staff at Clemson, where he was a graduate assistant. Simmons worked with the offense while handling various other duties.

Before joining Bowden's staff, Simmons served as quarterbacks coach and passing game coordinator at

Lincoln (FL) High School in 2005. Simmons also coached the receivers for the No. 6 ranked team in Class 4A.

Before his stint at Lincoln, Simmons was the offensive coordinator for Shanks High School in 2004, where he helped them to a 7-0 record and an average of 33.0 points per game.


As a freshman, Simmons came off the bench for a hurt Woodrow Dantzler and threw for 228 yards

Simmons played quarterback, wide receiver, and kick returner for the Bandits that season and was one of just three players in the league to score a touchdown passing, rushing, receiving, and returning.

Jimmy Ray Stephens

A former NFL player and national championship winner, Jimmy Ray Stephens is in his second year as the offensive line coach on Rick Stockstill's staff at Middle Tennessee. Stephens made his way to the Blue Raiders after four years with the University of Tennessee program.

Stephens did one of his better coaching jobs in 2006 even though he went into the season with only five players who had seen meaningful snaps the year

before. The unit went on to produce two all-conference players and the league's top scoring offense making Middle Tennessee the only school in the SBC with two players ranked in the top ten in rushing.

As offensive line coach of the Vols, Stephens helped develop one of the

top lines in the SEC. During his tenure, Stephens tutored Michael Munoz to consensus All-America status in 2004 after placing Scott Wells into a starting position with the Green Bay Packers in 2003. Stephens went to three bowls with the Vols and was part of the 2004 SEC Eastern Division Championship squad.

Prior to arriving at UT, Stephens spent nine seasons coaching the Florida offensive line -- part of a high-powered offense that led to five SEC championships for the Gators. At Florida, Stephens coached four Jacob's Blocking Trophy winners (Best Offensive Lineman in SEC) and eight players who were drafted in the NFL.

Stephens himself

sparkled both on the offensive line and at tight end during his playing career at Florida. He was a second-team All-SEC performer at center under Gators head coach Doug Dickey before making the move to tight end and earning secondteam all-league honors there as well. Stephens went on to be drafted in the 12th round of the NFL Draft by the Pittsburgh Steelers.

His most recent responsibility at Florida was as offensive line coach and rungame coordinator during the 2001 season. Before that, Stephens also coordinated the unit's pass protection.


The Eustis, Fla., native coached on the Gators' 1996 national championship team and helped Florida to nine January bowl games. During that span, Florida's offense was ranked among the nation's top 15 six times and its passing offense among the top 10 seven times.

Stephens rejoined the Gators in 1993 after a stellar high school coaching

career that saw him compile a 63-7 head coaching mark. That record came during a pair of three-year coaching and athletics director stints from 1987 to 1992 at Williston and Fort Walton Beach.

All told, Stephens spent 13 years in the Florida high school coaching ranks as either a head or assistant coach. His recruiting ties to the Sunshine State are strong and serve as a huge asset for the Blue Raiders.

Justin Watts

Wide Receivers ■ 2nd Year ■ Clemson, 2000



A former player under Head Coach Rick Stockstill, Justin Watts is beginning his second year at Middle Tennessee as the program's wide receivers coach and recruiting coordinator. Watts came to Murfreesboro after spending the previous three years at Chattanooga.

Watts inherited the youngest group of receivers in MT's I-A history in 2006, and for the first time since MT joined the Sun Belt Conference the pass-catching corps did not include an all-SBC player. Although

Watts had his work cut out for him, the young coach proved his ability to develop

talent by producing six receivers who turned in career years, led by sophomore Bobby Williams' 36 receptions for 378 yards and a touchdown. Under Watts' guidance, the Blue Raiders had five different receivers with double-digit receptions.

Perhaps the best indicator of Watts' ability to harness talent and develop players was the emergence of heralded freshman Desmond Gee during the 2006 season. One of the top impact players in the Sun Belt Conference, Gee turned in a 13.0 per catch average and three touchdowns, including a 73-yarder against South Carolina.

In 2005, Watts helped lead Chattanooga to its first winning season since 1997 by coaching the Southern Conference's leading receiver. Watts tutored Emanuel Hassell to first team All-Southern Conference honors after he paced the league with 52 receptions.

In his first two seasons at UTC, Watts coached All-America and All-Southern Conference receiver Alonzo

Nix. Nix set the school and Southern Conference single-season receptions record in 2003 with 90 catches and the single-game record of 18 receptions. He signed a

free agent contract with the NFL's Tennessee Titans in 2005.

Before joining the staff at Chattanooga, Watts served two years as a graduate assistant at Clemson. During that time he was a part of Clemson's 2001 Humanitarian Bowl team and the 2002 Tangerine Bowl squad.

Watts, a former receiver at Clemson, has the rare distinction (one of only two players) of winning five football letters at the South Carolina school. He began his career in 1996, and saw action in three games as a sophomore before suffering a season-ending injury against Florida State. He was able to use a medical redshirt for that season.

He finished his career with 51 catches for 561 yards. He was a member of

the 1999 Peach Bowl team that played Mississippi State and the 2000 Gator Bowl squad that faced Virginia Tech. He was also a member of the team when Clemson competed in the 1996 and 1997 Peach Bowls.

The Florence, S.C., native was honored as one of Clemson's scholarathletes at the 1999 Peach Bowl Awards Luncheon and was selected as a BB&T Student-Athlete of the Week by the Clemson Sports Network.

An outstanding quarterback at South Florence High School, he was ranked as the 17th best quarterback in the nation by SuperPrep and the sixth-ranked player in the state. Watts completed 132 of 238 pass attempts for 1,746 yards his senior season. That year, he played in the North Carolina-South Carolina Shrine Bowl and was nominated for the state's Mr. Football Award. He finished his career with 7,979 total yards and 74 touchdowns.

Watts was born Oct. 1, 1977, in Florence, S.C. He earned a degree in sports management from Clemson in

2000.



Danny Lewis, a former assistant coach and administrator in the collegiate ranks, serves as the director of football operations for Rick Stockstill's staff. Lewis made his way to Murfreesboro after spending the previous five years at The Citadel.

Along with overseeing the day-to-day logistics of the football program, Lewis works closely with the head coach on virtually every aspect involving the Blue Raider football program.

Lewis, who spent 2005 as an assistant athletic director for compliance and

academic services, was an assistant coach for the Bulldogs his first four years. From 2001 through the 2004 season, Lewis served as the running backs coach and recruiting coordinator. In 2003 and 2004, he was elevated to assistant head coach.

Much of the Bulldogs' successes with recruiting from 2001 to 2004 were a direct result of Lewis' work. Lewis had strong recruiting ties in the state of South Carolina and was a driving force behind two of the largest recruiting classes in school history. He came to The Citadel from the University of South Carolina, where he assisted with recruiting for Coach Lou Holtz's Gamecocks.

During Lewis' tenure at The Citadel, he coached back-to-back-toback-to-back All-Southern Conference performers at running back with Maurice Murphy taking home the hardware in 2001 and junior Nehemiah Broughton earning all-league accolades in 2002 and 2003. Under Lewis' guidance, Broughton excelled and became only the 11th Bulldog in history to rush for over 1,000 yards in a season in 2002. Broughton was taken in the seventh round of the 2005 NFL Draft by the Washington Redskins.

A native of Lexington, S.C., where he played wide receiver at Lexington High, Lewis played tight end and lettered at Charleston Southern before graduating in 1995 from the University of South Carolina. He began his coaching career at Newberry College under Mike Taylor from 1998 to 1999 and guided the offensive line and acted as the Indians' recruiting coordinator. While at Newberry, which broke various school records during his stop there, Lewis coached four all-South

> Athletic Conference performers, including left tackle Van Williams, who participated in the Division II All-Star Game.

He spent the spring of 2000 on Coach Tony Felder's staff at Benedict College as the offensive line coach and recruiting coordinator before accepting a graduate assistant's position under Holtz at USC, working primarily with recruiting. He was a member of the USC coaching staff that led the Gamecocks to one of the most memorable seasons in their history, including a victory over Ohio State in the 2000 Outback Bowl in Tampa.

Chris Matusek, a four-year lettermen in football at Middle Tennessee, is in his fifth year as a full-time employee with the program. Matusek spent the first two years as the program's equipment manager before being elevated to director of football relations in June 2005.

Matusek oversees the equipment operation and the team's practice facility while assisting with the football program's day-to-day operations. These

duties also include ordering equipment and apparel for players and stafff, and

overseeing the operation of Middle Tennessee's student equipment managers. He also assists the director of football operations with team travel and various day-to-day responsibilities.

Matusek will also act as the program's former player contact, a responsibility Head Coach Rick Stockstill says carries great significance because of the importance of developing and maintaining relationships with former players and making sure they are informed of upcoming football-related events and feel welcomed back to campus.



Russell Patterson

Russell Patterson, the American Football Monthly 2005 NCAA Division I-AA National Strength and Conditioning Coach of the Year, begins his second year as the director of strength, speed, and conditioning for the Middle Tennessee football program.

Patterson, who spent the previous two years at Appalachian State, played a key role in the Mountaineers' run to the 2005 national championship. In addition to his efforts with the ASU football squad,

Patterson worked directly with the men's and women's basketball and volleyball

teams while overseeing the strength and conditioning program for all 20 of ASU's varsity sports.

A native of Easley, S.C., Patterson developed a five-year plan for an improved training facility at ASU, increased his staff from two to six through a graduate assistant program, and counseled student-athletes on the importance of nutrition.

Before his stint at ASU, Patterson spent four years as an assistant strength and conditioning coach at Clemson, where he had the opportunity to work with Rick Stockstill. At Clemson, Patterson served as the top assistant in the Tigers' football strength, speed, and conditioning program and director of performance nutrition. Before being promoted to a full-time capacity, he spent three years as a graduate assistant in the strength and conditioning department at CU.

During his time at Clemson, Patterson was an integral part of seven bowl teams while working closely with Head Coach Tommy Bowden on a daily basis. Patterson was responsible for the speed, strength, and conditioning of the Tiger linebackers, defensive linemen, and safeties while coordinating scout days and organizing the winter conditioning program.

A two-year letterwinner in football at Presbyterian College, Patterson earned a bachelor's degree from the school in 1992. Upon graduation, he spent five years as an assistant football coach and strength coach at North Augusta (S.C.) High School before joining the Clemson staff.



Dr. Sidney A. McPhee

Dr. Sidney A. McPhee is the tenth president of Middle Tennessee State University. Prior to his appointment at MTSU in 2001, he was executive vice chancellor at the Tennessee Board of Regents (TBR) in Nashville. In addition, he served as chief academic officer and interim chancellor for the Board of Regents System. Before his appointment at TBR, McPhee served in various administrative capacities at several major universities including Oklahoma State University, University of Louisville, and University of Memphis. In May 2007, President McPhee

was conferred the Honorary Professor title at China Agricultural University in

Beijing, China. The Honorary Professor title is the highest academic award given at the institution. McPhee was named the 2002 Outstanding American University President by the American Football Foundation. In 2003, he was listed by The Nashville Post Business Magazine as one of Tennessee's 100 Most Powerful Individuals, and in 2004 he was ranked by Tennessee Business Magazine as one of the Top 50 Most Powerful African Americans in the State of Tennessee. Most recently, Dr. McPhee was listed in 2006 by the Chronicle of Higher Education as one of seven university presidents in the U.S. who is shaping athletics on a national scale.

McPhee earned his B.A. degree (with highest honors, summa cum laude) from Prairie View A&M University; a master's degree from the University of Miami, Coral Gables, Florida; and a doctorate in Applied Behavioral Studies in Education from Oklahoma State University. He is also a graduate of the Harvard University Management Development Program and has completed professional development programs at St. Mary's University of San Antonio, Texas, and Colorado College in Colorado Springs, Colorado.

As an academician, President McPhee's scholarly publications and presentations are extensive. His publications have appeared in local, national, and international professional journals. In addition, he is the senior author of a book, Understanding the Campus Culture: An Introduction to College, and has co-authored a chapter for a major college textbook on academic advising. McPhee's scholarly pursuits include several international visits and presentations in locations such as Beijing, Shanghai, Hangzhou, and Lanzhou, China; Mekelle, Ethiopia; Penang, Malaysia; Hong Kong; Moscow and St. Petersburg, Russia; Tokyo and Osaka, Japan; Seoul, Korea; Jerusalem and Tel Aviv, Israel; Antwerp, Belgium; Montreal, Canada; Oxford, England; Rio de Janeiro, Brazil; and Nassau, Bahamas.

McPhee recently completed a five-year term on the NCAA Division I Board of Directors and a three-year term on the NCAA Executive Committee. In May 2005, he was appointed to the NCAA Presidential Commission on the Future of Intercollegiate Athletics. He is president of the Sun Belt Conference athletic league and chairman of the league's CEO executive committee. In 2002, President George W. Bush appointed him to serve on the National Council for the Humanities, and the U.S. Senate confirmed him. A member of the Rutherford County Chamber of

Commerce, McPhee chaired its Membership Council; he is a member of the Murfreesboro Noon Rotary Club. He serves as a member of the SunTrust Bank Board of Directors (Nashville) and SunTrust Regional Bank Advisory Board (Murfreesboro). He also served on the Nashville Adventure Science Center Board, the Middle Tennessee Medical Center Board, and the Middle Tennessee Council Boy Scouts of America Executive Board. He is co-chair of the Tennessee Legislative Retreat Task Force on Higher Education. McPhee was recently elected to a three-year term as a Commission member of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

During McPhee's tenure at MTSU, the University has experienced significant growth in many areas. Student enrollment has increased significantly, making MTSU undergraduate enrollment the largest in the state. During the past five

years, the University added twelve new degree programs at the graduate and undergraduate levels, including Ph.D. programs in Economics, English, Human Performance, Public History, and Literacy Studies. In extramural funding, the University has increased external grants from \$6 million in 2001 to approximately \$40 million in 2007.

In addition to new academic programs, MTSU has been successful in raising admission standards, resulting in an increase in high-ability students. MTSU has been the institution of choice for midstate valedictorians and salutatorians in recent years. During the past four years, MTSU has enrolled a significant number of National Merit and Achievement scholars.

McPhee's tenure has brought about major improvements in University facilities. A ten-year, \$70 million student residential housing renovation project is in its fifth year and includes the refurbishing of all residential facilities on the campus. In addition, the University acquired the 500-acre Guy James property to consolidate its highly regarded programs in the School

of Agribusiness and Agriscience. This acquisition doubled the size of the campus acreage from 500 to 1,000. Over \$9 million was spent to renovate Andrew L. Todd Hall, which now houses the Art Department and has state-of-the-art equipment for its students and faculty. The Paul W. Martin Sr. Honors Building was constructed from private funding. In January 2007, an addition to the Cason-Kennedy Nursing Building was opened and dedicated, bringing the facility to 28,000 square feet. The University has secured private gifts in support of a \$5 million baseball stadium to be constructed in 2008. In 2006, the University received \$15 million in state support for the planning and infrastructure development for a proposed \$120 million science building, and in April 2007, a new \$3 million track and soccer complex was opened. In June 2007, the Tennessee General Assembly approved the construction of a \$31.7 million building for the University's College of Education and Behavioral Science. Currently, a \$17 million expansion of the Student Health, Wellness, and Recreation Center is underway and scheduled to be completed by May 2008. Presently, the University is involved in proposed or active capital projects totaling nearly \$400 million.

President McPhee is married to Elizabeth McPhee and they have two children, Seneca and Sidney-Anthony.

Chris Massaro, who spent 20 years at the University of South Carolina, was named the sixth director of athletics in school history on April 8, 2005. In a short time, Massaro has made a huge impact by hiring a new head football coach, completing a \$5 million capital campaign for new baseball stadium, drastically improving the departments APR, and initiating a series of major renovations to existing athletic facilities.

On December 12, 2005, Massaro made his

highest profile hire when he selected Rick Stockstill to take over the football

program. Stockstill became just the second head coach in the I-A era at Middle Tennessee and in his first season led the Blue Raiders to a league championship and their first bowl appearance in the I-A era.

There was little time for Massaro to take a break from the rigors of the previous hectic months because in February 2006, still less than a year from his hiring date, the ambitious administrator unveiled the first capital campaign for Blue Raider athletics. This vigorous campaign is leading to a multimillion dollar renovation to Reese Smith Field, home of the Blue Raider baseball team, which began in the summer of 2007 and will provide an opportunity for economic impact and national exposure, giving Middle Tennessee the possibility of hosting national tournaments.

Another lucrative agreement to benefit the Blue Raider athletics department was reached when Massaro and President Sidney McPhee worked extensively with the city of Murfreesboro to secure a \$5.5 million gift to improve the soccer and track

complex and assist with the renovation of the baseball stadium.

Shortly after unveiling the capital campaign, Massaro made another major announcement involving the future of Blue Raider football at the 2006 Blue-White Spring Game. Massaro announced that generous contributions had made it possible to install a new synthetic surface in Floyd Stadium for the 2006 season. Massaro came back at the 2007 Spring Game to announce that new videoboards would be in place for the 2007 season, one in Floyd Stadium and two in Murphy Center.

Hitting the ground running was the trademark of Massaro's first year at Middle Tennessee.

Two days following his hiring, Massaro was pressed into action to find a replacement to lead the nationally recognized women's basketball program. Massaro made his first hire when he brought on board legendary high school coach Rick Insell to take over the program. Both Insell and Stockstill, won championships in their first season on the job.

If the business of hiring coaches, fundraising, and running the day-to-day operation of the athletic department wasn't enough to keep him busy, Massaro also has made a significant upgrade in the Blue Raider football schedule. During the summer of 2005, he announced a home game in 2007 that will make Virginia the first team from the highly regarded ACC to visit Floyd Stadium. On his 100th day on the job, Massaro made one of his biggest announcements: a five-year contract with the University of Memphis to play football. The series will get underway in 2007. Part of this contract includes Memphis playing in Floyd Stadium, which will make the Tigers the first in-state Division I-A football team to play the Blue Raiders in Murfreesboro. Massaro has also worked out a series with nearby Georgia

Tech that will see the Yellow Jackets come to Murfreesboro in 2011.

Massaro, who has stepped up Middle Tennessee's fundraising since his arrival, helped the BRAA set a fundraising record for annual giving in 2005-06 and again in 2006-07.

His media blitz continued with a major move of the Blue Raider Network in 2006 to Nashville flagship radio station 106.7 FM — The Fan. The ESPN station carried football, men's basketball, and select women's basketball games. Massaro also inked a deal with Nelligan Sports Marketing in January of 2007 to handle all the department's corporate sales, radio, and television opportunities.

As senior associate athletic director at South Carolina, Massaro provided significant leadership to the department.

The Glenwood Springs, Colo., native joined the Gamecock staff under the Ohio University sport administration program in 1985. Massaro helped usher the Gamecocks into the Southeastern Conference and

learned under legendary athletic director Dr. Mike McGee.

Massaro, who is a member of the Rutherford County Sports Council, earned his bachelor's degree in business administration from the University of Northern Colorado in 1983 and his master's degree in sport administration from Ohio University in 1986. At UNC, Massaro was a five-year football team member.

A 1994 graduate of the Sports Management Institute, Massaro has had experience in developing SMI's class programming on different occasions while also serving on the Executive Committee. The SMI is a cooperative educational effort between the schools of business and the athletic departments from Notre Dame, Texas, Michigan, Southern California, North Carolina, and South Carolina.

Massaro and his wife, Cindy, have four children: Hank, Lainey, Rachel, and Ben.





Alan Farley Associate AD/Fundraising 4th Year/Middle Tennessee, 1992



Alan Farley, who has been with the athletic department for four years, was elevated to associate athletic director for fundraising in June of 2005. Farley, who spent his first year as an assistant athletic director in the Blue Raider Athletic Association, heads up all of the athletic department's external affairs. Farley is a 1992 Middle Tennessee graduate.

Farley is responsible for all major gifts and annual fundraising for the Middle Tennessee athletic

department. He has been instrumental in overseeing the development and fundraising for the synthetic turf that was installed on Horace Jones Field and the new baseball stadium and track and soccer stadium. Farley worked in conjunction with Middle Tennessee President Sidney McPhee and Director of Athletics Chris Massaro on securing a \$ 5.5 million dollar investment into facilities by the City of Murfreesboro.

During Farley's short tenure as associate athletic director, the Middle Tennessee athletic department has completed phase one of its baseball stadium expansion and reached its goal of \$5 million within one year, phase 1 and 2 of the track and soccer stadium, secured the first athletic scholarship endowment for women's basketball, implemented courtside seating in Murphy Center, established a business directory of companies that support Blue Raider athletics, and established BRAA clubs in surrounding counties in middle Tennessee. In 2006, the BRAA expanded its membership benefits and constructed a new donor wall in Murphy Center.

Under Farley's leadership, the BRAA set a new fundraising record for the 2005-06 academic year then established another record for 2006-07.

Before arriving at Middle Tennessee, Farley spent six years running his own consulting firm in Nashville. The firm deals with fundraising, government relations, public relations, and political campaign strategies. During that time, he wrote and managed fundraising plans that raised more than \$3.2 million. In 2000, Farley served as the Tennessee political director for President George W. Bush's presidential campaign. Farley also has served as campaign manager and political advisor to U.S. Congressman Ed Bryant and served as a political advisor to U. S. Senator Fred Thompson.

Before running his consulting firm, Farley spent 12 years in management with the United Parcel Service.

A lifelong resident of Murfreesboro, Tenn., Farley is vice chairman for the Rutherford County Industrial Bond Development Board and the Rutherford County Health and Education Facilities Board. Farley also serves on the board of directors for Cookeville-based LINC Preferred Group, Inc. Farley is actively involved in promoting economic and job growth in Rutherford County through his involvement on the Industrial Development board.

Farley and his wife, Kelly, who is also a graduate of Middle Tennessee, have two children, Dalton and Ally.

Myra Fishback is beginning her third year at Middle Tennessee and her first as an assistant athletic director in the compliance office. Fishback has served the last two seasons as an assistant coach for the women's basketball program at Middle Tennessee, helping the Blue Raiders to a 50-15 mark, one Sun Belt regular season title and two SBC Tournament championships.

The Shelbyville, Tenn., native has 17 years of coaching experience and previously served as assistant

director of membership services with the NCAA and also as assistant director of compliance and championships with Conference USA.

Fishback played for women's basketball coach Rick Insell while in high school at Shelbyville Central before moving on to Tennessee Tech, where she lettered in softball for the Golden Eagles.

After graduation, she was a coach at Stone Mountain (GA) High School for two years (1986-87) before returning to Tennessee Tech as a graduate assistant (1988-89). Fishback then landed her first full-time coaching position at Southern Illinois (1990-91).

She was then an assistant at Kentucky for one season (1992) before returning to Tennessee Tech as an assistant from 1993 to 1999. From there, she took a position as an assistant coach and assistant director of compliance at Stony Brook University in New York for two seasons (2000–02).

Fishback then took a position with Conference USA in Chicago from February 2002 to September 2003 as assistant director of compliance and championships. She worked at the NCAA offices in Indianapolis from October 2003 to May 2005 as assistant director of membership services before returning to the midstate as an assistant coach for Insell.

During her two seasons at Middle Tennessee, the Blue Raiders set a school record for wins with a 30-4 mark in 2006-07; posted 27 consecutive victories in 2006-07, the nation's longest winning streak; set a single-game attendance mark with 10,010 in the season-opener against Maryland; and posted undefeated marks of 18-0 in the regular season and 21-0 against all Sun Belt competition.

Fishback earned her bachelor's in secondary education from Tennessee Tech in 1985 and her master's in education from Tech in 1989.

Matt Riley is an assistant athletic director who oversees the strength and conditioning program for more than 300 student-athletes at Middle Tennessee. Riley, who is in his 15th year, was also instrumental in the design of the current weight room located adjacent to the football stadium.

A former offensive lineman under former athletics director and football coach Boots Donnelly, Riley returned to his alma mater to head up the weight and

conditioning program and serve as strength coach in 1993 after heading two other programs following his graduation from Middle Tennessee.

Riley, a master strength and conditioning coach, is certified by the International Sports Science Association (ISSA) and CSCCA and is a member of each association as well as the NSCA and MSCC. As a player at Middle Tennessee in the mid-1980s, Riley started on the offensive line of two of the most successful teams in program history. The Blue Raiders advanced into the Division I-AA national semifinals in 1984 and were undefeated and the No. 1-ranked team nationally in 1985.



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Blue Raiders win opener under Stockstill

Middle Tennessee 7, Florida International 6

Aug. 31, 2006 ☐ Floyd Stadium ☐ Murfreesboro, TN

MURFREESBORO, Tenn. - Rick Stockstill's head Patullo missed the extra-point kick, and FIU led 6-0 coaching debut wasn't the only first for MTSU Thursday

With a 7-6 win over Sun Belt foe Florida International, the Blue Raiders (1-0) snapped a four-game losing streak in home openers — a fact that, in part, got Stockstill's predecessor, Andy McCollum, fired last December.

"We've played that game before. Last year, we don't win that game," MTSU senior guarterback Clint Marks said. "But something was different here. Our defense saved us, and we finished a big game at home like you're supposed to."

In front of a Floyd Stadium crowd of 20,058, the seventh largest in school history, the Blue Raiders were slow on offense and stingy on defense.

MTSU managed only 175 total yards and converted just 2-of-14 third-down attempts.

However, its lone scoring drive held up for the victory.

After MTSU's offense sat stagnant through most of the first half, it took advantage of an FIU miscue to take

Marks was sacked on third down late in the second quarter, but FIU defensive lineman Jonathan Betancourt was called for a 15-yard unsportsmanlike conduct penalty after the play to extend the Blue Raiders' possession.

MTSU responded four plays later when Eugene Gross galloped 33 yards to paydirt. Colby Smith made the extra-point kick to put MTSU ahead at the half.

"I saw daylight and I went to it. But really that touchdown was set up by (three) plays before that when I got about 12, 13 yards on a run," Gross said. "The 0-line got some confidence, and they got me a big hole to run through.

"I was just starting to get comfortable running the ball, and then that crease opened up."

Before MTSU's lone score, FIU took the opening kickoff and marched 80 yards to paydirt in 17 plays.

Sophomore tailback Julian Reams had a 12-yard touchdown run to cap the drive, which featured two fourth-down conversions by the Panthers. But Chris

with 7:12 remaining in the first quarter.

"Since I got here, we've talked about finishing ... and we did that (Thursday) night," Stockstill said. "We kept fighting to the end, and that's how you want to finish a game.

"I hope our fans saw a team that never gave up."

FIU pinned the Blue Raiders at their own 2-yard line early in the fourth quarter, but Smith's 79-yard punt flipped the field position advantage.

The Panthers' offense stalled late in the fourth guarter, and Gross had a 12yard run to extend MTSU's final possession and milk valuable clock time en route to the victory.

Gross finished with 76 rushing vards on 18 carries. Marks was 10-of-17 passing for 79 yards and one intercep-

FIU's Keyonvis Bouie, the preseason Sun Belt Defensive Player of the Year, had a game-high 13 tackles, and defensive end Antwan Barnes had four sacks.

Gross had 74 rushing yards on 13 carries, surpassing the 2,000-yard mark for this career.

His score in third quarter on a third-and-goal play came on a misdirection pitch.

"We game-planned for that all week. Maryland is a team that bites down hard on the goal line, so it's kind

MTSU outgained Maryland in the first half and touted drives of 61, 44 and 32 yards, but only three points by the break.

Despite a plethora of injuries, MTSU's defense was superb, earning its first shutout since 2004 and third in the Division I-A era.

Tennessee Tech (0-3) had only been shutout once mond Gee added a final score on a 15-yard gallop for since being blanked by MTSU in 1992.

"This is the difference between a Division I and (Division I-AA) team. They wear you down," Tennessee Tech coach Doug Malone said.

Facing an MTSU pressure defense, the Golden Eagles had only 10 rushing yards, 135 total yards and fumbled six times (lost two).

The Blue Raiders forced five turnovers, including three interceptions.

"Our defense saved us. They gave us good field position and they got turnovers. We had to step it up to keep pace with them," MTSU senior quarterback Clint Marks said.

The MTSU offense finally caught up early in the third quarter, but it did so with plenty of help from its defense and special teams.

True freshman Phillip Tanner returned the opening kickoff of the second half 61 yards on his first career touch of the football, setting up MTSU's first touch-

Instead, the Blue Raiders handicapped any chance of an upset, falling 59-0 under the weight of their own errors.

"I can't narrow it down to one point, but I know it got away from us fast," MTSU senior quarterback Clint yards for a touchdown late in the first quarter.

Seething from a 34-33 loss to Oregon one week earlier where questionable officiating was found to have stolen a Sooners' win, No. 17 Oklahoma did not need the men in stripes to determine its non-conference clash with MTSU.

The Blue Raiders gained a season-low 95 yards and committed a season-high five turnovers, four of which led to Oklahoma's 45-0 halftime lead.

Perhaps the storied atmosphere of the Oklahoma's Memorial Stadium and its crowd of 82,346 produced some early butterflies in the Blue Raiders' bellies.

Maybe MTSU (2-2) was just drastically overmatched.

Either way, the Blue Raiders balked on any opportunity to delay the inevitable rout, committing a handful of costly errors in the game's opening minutes.

True freshman Phillip Tanner muffed the opening kickoff, and MTSU started its first possession at its own 5yard line. The Blue Raiders then called two timeouts in the first 40 seconds of the game.

On the Blue Raiders' next possession, Bobby Williams made back-to-back catches for a combined 37 yards to carry MTSU to the Oklahoma 43-yard line. But Eugene Gross fumbled to squander a possible early scoring opportunity.

The Sooners (3-1) started five of their eight first-half drives in MTSU territory, and additional Blue Raider turnovers made scoring even easier.

In between the offense's miscues, the Sooners took advantage of prime field position and mismatches in the passing game.

MTSU's defense limited Heisman Trophy candidate Adrian Peterson to a season-low 128 rushing vards, including a mere 3.3-yard average in the first half. But Peterson also had three touchdowns, finishing off drives sparked by deep passes.

Oklahoma quarterback Paul Thompson was 10of-14 passing for 219 yards

and two touchdowns in the first half alone. Wideout Malcolm Kelly had a single-quarter school-record 134 yards in the first period, including a 73-yard catch. He finished with 164 receiving vards.

Reggie Smith's 61-yard punt return for a touchdown early in the fourth quarter capped the Sooners' dominance of all three phases of the game.

"We understand that we are going to see stiffer and tougher competition as we go, but it is pleasing to go out in those areas and not have penalties and to take care of the football until the end," Oklahoma coach Bob Stoops said.

"That's what we are shooting for, to keep building as a team, to play as well as we're capable of and not worry about who we're playing so much."

Marks and backup quarterback Joe Craddock finished a combined 6-of-20 passing for 73 yards and two interceptions for MTSU. DeMarco McNair had 37 yards on nine rushing attempts.

MTSU senior linebacker J.K. Sabb had a game-high eight tackles, including three tackles for loss.

DENTON, Tex. - Reversing a five-year curse was supposed to require a magic potion or at least a superhuman effort.

Instead, MTSU breezed to a 35-0 win over North Texas Saturday, the Blue Raiders' first victory over the pesky Mean Green in six tries.

"There's a history to this rivalry, and we didn't like any of it until this one. This has been a long time com-

ing, and we knew from experience that North Texas would never quit fighting," MTSU senior safety Jonathan Harris said. "So we just fought harder than they did until it was over, and it feels so good to do it."

In a series that had featured only tight games, MTSU dominated every facet of the contest.

The Blue Raider offense set season highs in total yards (366), rushing yards (212), first downs (24) and time of possession (40:41). On defense, MTSU limited North Texas to only eight first downs and 103 total

yards, both season lows for Blue Raider opponents. MTSU also won the turnover battle 3-0 and commit-

ted just three penalties for 15 yards.

"It probably was our most complete game. It was the first time we had no turnovers, but we also created three turnovers. We ran the ball well and were able to throw it, too," MTSU coach Rick Stockstill said. "We also converted (10-of-15) times on third down, so our guys are excited. We're 2-0 in the conference, and that's all we were trying to get to."

North Texas (1-4, 0-1) had been the only Sun Belt team MTSU (3-2, 2-0) had never beaten. But on Saturday, the Mean Green became the first shutout victim for the Blue Raiders in a road Sun Belt game.

It was also the worst home conference loss in North Texas school history.

"Tonight was total domination by Middle Tennesa lot more from our guys, but just didn't get it. It was a game where things could not have gone any worse."

The crowd of 16,986 at Fouts Field was mostly silenced in the early moments of the game.

The Blue Raiders notched two touchdowns on Eugene Gross runs in the first eight minutes and added another score late in the second guarter.

Before the early 21-point burst, MTSU had only scored 13 first-half points the entire season.

On the game's opening series, MTSU linebacker J.K. Sabb jarred the ball loose from North Texas guarterback Woody Wilson, and safety Jonathan Harris recovered for the Blue Raiders.

Four plays later, Gross rumbled 15 yards over the left side to paydirt.

North Texas gained one yard on its next possession, and MTSU answered with an eight-play, 63-yard scor-

ing drive that took only 2:52.

Gross' one-yard touchdown dive put MTSU ahead 14-0 with 7:02 remaining in the first quarter.

MTSU piled on late in the second quarter with a 12-play, 61-yard scoring drive, capped by Clint Marks' four-yard strike to sophomore Bobby Williams.

Gross had eight rushes for 23 yards on the drive, and Marks hit Taron Henry for a 28-yard pass.

Sticking to a punishing ground game, MTSU junior DeMarco McNair ran

seven times for 24 yards on the Blue Raiders' fourth scoring drive.

Jonathan Grigsby's career-long 53-yard reception sparked the drive, and McNair dove in for a one-yard touchdown to put MTSU ahead 28-0 in the third quar-

True freshman Desmond Gee capped off the rout with a two-yard touchdown run with 26 seconds remaining, finishing a final 15-play, 80-yard march to the end zone.

MTSU scored a touchdown on all five trips inside the 20-yard line.

"We had to run the ball well to win this one, and I thought all three of our running backs played a great game for us," Stockstill said.

Gross finished with 88 yards and two touchdowns on 20 rushes. McNair had 62 vards and one score on 17 see," North Texas coach Darrell Dickey said. "We expect carries, and Gee added 59 yards and one touchdown on 16 attempts.

Marks was 13-of-18 passing for 154 yards, one score and no interceptions.

NASHVILLE, Tenn. - MTSU's opening burst wasn't scoring one touchdown and setting up a field goal. guite enough to pull off college football's largest upset of the season.

The Blue Raiders fell 44-17 to No. 8 Louisville in front of a school record home crowd of 32,797 at LP Field.

"I wasn't disappointed," MTSU coach Rick Stockstill said. "What are we, the 100th team in the country and they're the No. 8 team? So I thought our guys fought

their tails off."

Junior Damon Nickson scored from 88 yards on MTSU's opening kick return of the game, but Louisville's No. 1 ranked scoring offense caught fire in the second quarter to fight off a stunning defeat.

Leading 10-3, the Blue Raiders' luck turned late in the first period.

MTSU (3-3) kicker Colby Smith's 47-yard field goal attempt missed by hitting the left upright.

Twenty-one seconds later, Louisville (5-0) tied the game at 10 on Mario Urrutia's 68-yard

touchdown catch, the longest scoring pass of quarter- run even harder until I get to the end zone." back Hunter Cantwell's career.

"We played hard and we showed the nation what we were about," MTSU junior cornerback Bradley Robinson said. "We played well, but they made plays when we gave them a couple of chances."

The Blue Raiders' hold on the game continued to slide in the second quarter, but the MTSU defense kept

Louisville had back-to-back offensive drives of 84 and 52 yards, but only managed two field goals until its last-minute possession of the first half.

The Cardinals went 80 yards in six plays in 1:12, capped by Mario Urrutia's 25-yard high-wire touchdown grab between two MTSU defenders on the first half's final offensive play. That gave Louisville a more comfortable 23-10 advantage at the break.

"That one hurt because we hung in there and fought," Stockstill said. "I thought we were going to intercept it, but they made a great throw and a great rushing yards on 13 carries. catch.

"If we could've held them, it would've been 16-10 at the half and then it's still a pretty close game."

Louisville took its first lead at 13-10 on a 24-yard field goal by Art Carmody. It capped an 11-play, 84yard drive that featured three gains of 20-plus yards.

MTSU's special teams took control of the game early,

After the Blue Raiders stopped Louisville's first drive and forced Carmody's 31-yard field goal, Nickson went to paydirt on the first kick return of his career.

Nickson cut across the field, burst through the Louisville coverage and broke a tackle from behind to record MTSU's first return for a touchdown of an opening kickoff since 1985.

> "From watching film through the week, we knew that they weren't staying in their lanes coming down to cover kicks, so I saw that as a chance for me to explode through there and score," said Nickson, who set an MTSU single-game record with 187 kick return yards in his debut at the position and added his first interception of the season in the third quarter and a team-leading seven tackles.

Nickson gets record four interceptions in key victory

LAFAYETTE, La. - If there were any doubts MTSU belonged atop the Sun Belt Conference, they were squelched at Louisiana-Lafayette.

The Blue Raiders upended league favorite Louisiana-Lafayette 34-20 in front of 21,485 mostly frustrated fans at Cajun Field in a clash of first-place teams.

Spoiling the Ragin' Cajuns' homecoming, the Blue Raiders (5-3, 4-0) started conference play at 4-0 for the

first time in the Division I-A era. They are tied with Troy (2-0) atop the Sun Belt standings.

They also claimed a third consecutive conference road win for the first time since the Sun Belt's inception in 2001.

"To be honest, this was a tremendous accomplishment for our guys," MTSU coach Rick Stockstill said. "We beat a team that was the first-place (conference) preseason pick. They had won nine of 11 games, and they had beaten a Conference USA team. We came on the road in a great environment and won, but I'm not going to call that a statement game.

"I just think we're playing smart football, and we're making some plays."

No one made more plays than MTSU junior safety Damon Nickson, who had a school record four interceptions — including one he returned 28 yards for a carries, but no touchdowns. touchdown in the second quarter.

Two more of Nickson's picks came in the fourth guarter when the Cajuns were trying a last attempt to salvage their six-game conference winning streak.

"This isn't rocket science," ULL coach Rickey Bustle said. "You can't turn the ball over against a good football team and expect to win. ... We just didn't play well and didn't take care of the ball."

Ranking third nationally in fewest turnovers before Saturday's game, ULL (4-3, 1-1) had six giveaways which led to 17 first-half points for MTSU.

The game's first three scores resulted from turn-

MTSU quarterback Clint Marks was picked off by ULL's Michael Adams, who jumped in front of Taron yard touchdown return.

But the Blue Raiders and Marks both regained their composure.

Nickson's first interception five minutes later led to MTSU's 10-play, 65-yard scoring drive, capped by Marks' 22-yard pass to true freshman Desmond Gee. Two plays later, MTSU's Tavares Jones recovered a ULL fumble, and Colby Smith nailed a 31-yard field goal to put the Blue Raiders ahead 10-7.

"That was important because I thought early when we created some turnovers, it gave us some momentum and it kept us in the game," Stockstill said.

MTSU took a 14-point lead with a 61-yard scoring

drive and Nickson's interception return, with the two touchdowns separated by only 37 seconds late in the second quarter.

Marks hit Henry twice for 51 yards, and Marks dove over center for the touchdown on a fourth-andgoal play from the 1-foot line.

"We prepared well for this one," said Marks, who was 19-of-26 passing for 244 yards, one touchdown and one interception.

"Our coaches made sure we didn't get too up or

too down, and we made more plays to win the game."

The Blue Raiders maintained their 14-point lead in the second half, while the Cajuns tried to solve MTSU's attacking defense.

ULL tailback Tyrell Fenroy rushed for 90 yards on 16

Quarterback Jerry Babb, the Preseason Sun Belt Player of the Year, was mostly held in check. The senior was sacked twice and tossed a career-high four interceptions.

Babb finished 12-of-24 passing for 182 yards. He also rushed for a mere 45 yards on 11 carries.

"It seemed like if I threw it in a hole, (the receivers) weren't there or I threw it late," Babb said, "But I don't care who you are, even the New England Patriots, you're not going to win with six turnovers."

In the second half, MTSU added Smith's 23-vard field goal and Eugene Gross' 6-yard run, one of three straight Gross runs on the Blue Raiders' dagger of a scoring drive with 5:53 remaining.

Gross finished with 94 yards on 23 carries, as MTSU Henry's short route and scampered untouched to a 79- rushed for 82 of its 101 rushing yards in the second

"That's right. I've never seen 5-0 before, and none of

us have," MTSU senior running back Eugene Gross said. "... This was a real homecoming. We've been on the road forever, and we really came to play. It was another big crowd, and we played some good ball back at our house on our new turf."

And there was more newness than that.

MTSU earned bowl eligibility for the first time since 2001 and extended its best conference start in the Division I-A era in front of 18,712 at Floyd Stadium.

MTSU (6-3, 5-0) remains in first place in the Sun Belt, tied with Troy (4-4, 3-0).

"That was a tough win and probably as satisfying of a win as we've had this year because we didn't play our best football," MTSU coach Rick Stockstill said. "We made some big plays, but it was a hard game.

"We just never really felt comfortable in the game, and so it feels great to be 5-0. We're so close to reaching our goals, and it's a wonderful feeling right now."

Sandwiched between lulls on both sides of the ball, a handful of game-changing plays determined the outcome.

With MTSU leading 14-7, junior Damon Nickson returned the opening kickoff of the second half 94 yards for a touchdown. Senior linebacker Justin Rainey then scooped a botched FAU (3-6, 2-2) shotgun snap and scampered 50 yards for a score early in the fourth quarter.

"I was on my blitz, and I just picked it up and got a great block from (linebacker J.K. Sabb)," said Rainey, who had a career-high 11 tackles. "From there, I knew I could take it back. I was a quarterback and running back in high school, and I didn't play defense until I got to (MTSU). So I knew how to run with the ball. I just let that 4.5 speed take over."

MTSU was outgained 370 yards to 342, but forced five FAU turnovers. The Blue Raiders also had a key goal line stand late in the third quarter when FAU could not score on four downs inside the 3-yard line, including two dives just inches from the goal line.

"Whatever it takes, we just have the mindset that Casey McGahee.

MURFREESBORO, Tenn. - MTSU returned to Floyd we just can't afford to lose," Sabb said. "You've got to have that mentality. We're not thinking about down the road. We're only playing to win today, and we did what we needed to do to make sure that happened.

Gross finished with a career-high 208 rushing yards

on 21 carries. But most of that came on a 76-yard gallop that started on MTSU's 1-yard line and a 56-yard nail-in-thecoffin scoring run with 44 seconds remaining.

"On the last run I kind of knew it," Gross said. "I said, 'Oh ves, that's 200.' That's a great stat, but it was big in winning another big game and that's what is important."

MTSU recovered from a lackluster offensive start.

A potential long pass on the Blue Raiders' first snap of the day went through a wide-open Bobby Williams'

hands and was picked off by FAU's Corey Small.

MTSU junior Bradley Robinson returned the favor with his first interception of the season, but the offense stalled after only one first down and Colby Smith missed a 40-yard field goal.

The offense got on track early in the second guarter with a 13-play, 85-yard drive. Clint Marks connected on passes of 23 and 18 yards, and Gross rushed seven times for 37 yards on the drive — including a 2-yard touchdown on a sweep at the pylon.

The MTSU defense helped the offense maintain momentum.

FAU fullback Aaron Sanchez fumbled with 3:46 remaining in the second quarter, and defensive end Sean Mosley made the recovery. MTSU exploited the miscue with a 28-yard scoring drive.

Freshman Desmond Gee had gains of 16 and 10 yards, the latter taking him for a tip-toeing touchdown along the sideline.

"We ran into a very good and well-coached football team," FAU coach Howard Schnellenberger said. "They took advantage of each bad play and turnover we made. They are clearly the best team in the conference right now."

"We've said all year that it's one game at a time, and now we're only one game away," MTSU senior running back Eugene Gross said.

MTSU (7-3, 6-0 in Sun Belt) also improved to 4-0

in road conference games with an average winning margin of 23 points. The Blue Raiders can complete their first perfect conference slate since 1992 with a home victory over Troy Nov. 25.

The Sun Belt's only other unbeaten team, Troy improved to 4-0 in league play Saturday with a 24-17 win over Florida Atlantic.

"Before the game started, it was a two-game (conference) season, and now it's a one-game season," MTSU coach Rick Stockstill said. "We're close and we know what we've got in front of us. If we win one more,

we win the conference. You can't get much closer than

Stockstill's seventh win marks the most by a firstyear Blue Raider coach since a 9-1 season in 1947 by Charles "Bubber" Murphy, MTSU's all-time winningest

MTSU's fate and momentum turned on Bradlev Robinson's 88-vard interception return for a touchdown to put the Blue Raiders ahead 17-3 midway through the third quarter.

The fourth longest interception return in school history, Robinson's score turned away an ASU drive seemingly bound for the end zone. Trailing 10-3 and quickly away more than six minutes and 55 yards on 13 plays and also stalled. to drive to the MTSU 15-yard line.

runs on the drive to start the second half, but Robinson's game-changing play sucked the air out of the already subdued crowd of 10,176 in Indian Stadium.

"When I made the play, I didn't think about it being that big of a play," Robinson said. "But then when we got late into the third quarter, I could see all the momentum swing, and our offense starting putting up a bunch of points."

Following Robinson's pick, ASU's offensive tide settled and the Blue Raiders outscored the Indians 21-7 in the remainder of the game.

MTSU rushed for 126 yards in the second half, scor-

Freshman Desmond Gee scored untouched on a 7yard run. Junior DeMarco McNair added scoring bursts of five and 48 yards.

McNair had 98 yards on nine rushes, and Gross added 79 yards on 15 carries.

MTSU quarterback Clint Marks was 11-of-14 pass-

ing for 134 yards and guided an offense that committed no turnovers.

"That W feels good, and we did what we had to do to get it," Marks said.

MTSU squandered prime field position in the first half, scoring only 10 points in five possessions that began in favorable spots.

The Blue Raiders returned a squib kick to the 50-yard line to start the game, but only gained two yards on three plays before punting.

Gamecocks strong passing attack dooms Blue Raiders

South Carolina 52, Middle Tennessee 7

COLUMBIA, S.C. - As soon as MTSU coach Rick Stockstill crashed his homecoming party, his Blue Raiders were shown the door.

In a 52-7 loss to South Carolina, MTSU (7-4) scored on the game's first play, but the Gamecocks (6-5) scored 52 answered points after that.

"It couldn't have started any better," said Stockstill, a South Carolina assistant coach for the previous two

seasons, "... It was one of those games where it got out of hand in the second half, but we sure started out real good."

MTSU quarterback Clint Marks hit Desmond Gee for a 73-yard touchdown pass on the first snap to earn a 7-0 lead just 30 seconds into the game and guiet the crowd of 70,442 at Brice-Williams Stadium.

Gee came in motion into the right slot and ran past South Carolina safety Stoney Woodson. Marks hit him in stride, and Gee outran the pursuit to catch the longest passing play for MTSU since 2004.

"I read the defender and cut outside, and then (Marks) threw a pretty ball," Gee said. "I saw (Woodson) stumbling out of the corner of my eye, and I knew I could take it all the way.

when I took it in."

MTSU then recovered a fumble on the Gamecocks' ensuing drive, but could not convert the turnover into

The Blue Raiders punted, and South Carolina answered with touchdowns on four straight possessions to race to a 28-7 halftime lead via the streaky trigger of junior guarterback Blake Mitchell — who was 13-of-18 passing for 250 yards and three touchdowns in the first half.

He finished 21-of-28 for a career-high 388 yards and four scores.



MTSU can capture the outright Sun Belt championship and New Orleans Bowl bid only if Trov loses at Florida International this week.

If the Blue Raiders do not get help from FIU or land another bowl, they finished Stockstill's debut season at 7-5, 6-1 in Sun Belt play with a co-conference title.

Other possibilities still exist in at-large bowls - most likely San Diego's Poinsettia Bowl, Detroit's Motor City Bowl, or Toronto's International Bowl.

"I've been in contact with the conference office, ESPN, and a few different bowls, and there's a lot of interest in Middle Tennessee," MTSU Athletics Director Chris Massaro said. "We're a seven-win team, and that puts us in a good position to secure an at-large bowl."

First MTSU must evaluate its outside shot at the New Orleans Bowl, which became quite improbable after the late freefall in Saturday's loss.

"I didn't have a sick feeling when it was happening, but I've got a sick feeling now that it's over," senior quarterback Clint Marks said after the loss.

Troy quarterback Omar Haugabook hit Gary Banks for the 3-yard, game-winning touchdown pass with 14 seconds remaining.

It followed both a successful on-side kick and Smokey Hampton's 19-yard catch on fourth-and-17 to the 3-yard line that kept the Trojans' comeback hopes

Hampton also hauled in a 19-yard touchdown reception with 2:19 remaining that started Troy's rally.

"We never thought it was over, but we just had some letdowns at the end," MTSU defensive end Erik Walden said. "Nothing was real different at the end. (Troy) just got it going and made plays at the end when we usually are the ones making them."

Troy's comeback handed MTSU its only blown halftime lead this season.

MTSU scored both of its touchdowns on trick plays involving true freshman Desmond Gee.

On a third-and-1

play from the Troy 15 early in the third quarter, Gee took a reverse handoff and tossed a 15-yard touchdown pass to Stephen Chicola.

Gee also ran for a score on a gimmick play, a 4-yard second-quarter run, when he ducked behind the right guard and took a concealed handoff between his legs from Marks.

Senior receiver Luke Paschall made catches of 30 and 8 yards in the 12-play, 66-yard drive to set up Gee's first score, the freshman's sixth straight game with a touchdown.

Colby Smith made two field goals to give MTSU a 13-7 halftime lead.

Smith's first field goal, a 26-yarder, was set up by senior Justin Rainey's first career interception late in the first quarter.

Haugabook then scored on an 8-yard run to cut MTSU's lead to 10-7.

Smith answered with a career-long 48-yard field goal on the first-half's last play after Bobby Williams made clutch catches of 14 and 18 yards to set up the score

"One thing you always have to remember is that the game is never over until it's all zeros on the clock," said senior linebacker J.K. Sabb, who led MTSU with nine tackles. "You always have chances to make plays, and we didn't do it. It's football, but it hurts."

Penalties, turnovers doom MT in first I-A bowl game

The Blue Raiders' first Division I-A bowl trip was spoiled in a 31-14 loss to Central Michigan in the 10th Annual Motor City Bowl.

A Motor City Bowl record crowd of 54,113 saw MTSU (7-6) stage a late rally, but it couldn't compensate for the early wounds inflicted by the fast-paced CMU (10-4) offense.

"I thought (a comeback) was realistic with five minutes left, and I thought it was realistic with three minutes left," firstyear MTSU coach Rick Stockstill said. "They fought to the end, and that's all a coach can ask of his players. There's not a player in that locker room that thought we didn't have a chance."

MTSU recovered from an early 14-point deficit and a CMU offensive burst, but a second wave kept the Blue Raiders at bay.

The Chippewas used only 13 offensive snaps to score two

guick touchdowns and three more plays to jump ahead 21-7 in the second quarter. Leading the charge was CMU quarterback Dan LeFevour, the Motor City Bowl most valuable player, who had 218 of his 231 total 69 yards on nine plays to paydirt. yards in the first half.

After CMU's starting surge, MTSU struggled to keep pace, as CMU won its first I-A bowl game in the program's third attempt.

Meanwhile, MTSU played its first overall I-A bowl in Stockstill's debut season.

"Our players walk out of here with their heads held high," Stockstill said. "What Middle Tennessee did (Tuesday), you can't put a price tag on. It will help short-term, and it will help this program long-term.

"For what these guys did this season, I will forever be indebted."

MTSU never caught up with CMU, and it took a large leap backward early in the third quarter when Clint Marks was picked off by CMU linebacker Doug Kress, who returned the interception 56 yards for a touch-

"Your defense scores in the second half — that really helped," CMU interim coach Jeff Quinn said. "Anytime your kids can step up in that role, you know you're going to have the outcome which we felt and did."

touchdown cut the Chippewas' advantage to 28-14,

DETROIT, Mich. - MTSU's season-long spell wore but the rest of the Blue Raiders' fourth-quarter possessions finished short of paydirt.

MTSU senior running back Eugene Gross scored on a 3yard run in the second guarter to cut the CMU lead to 14-7. However, MTSU's ensuing onside kick failed, and CMU answered with a four-play, 51-yard drive capped by LeFevour's 9-yard touchdown run to stretch the Chippewas' lead to 21-7 at halftime.

Any other MTSU

scoring threats were countered by a costly penalty, turnover, or loss of possession on downs.

CMU was methodic on its opening possession, driving

Running back Ontario Sneed scored on a 1-yard dive over right guard, but the Chippewas' march was highlighted by two key third-down conversions.

On third-and-seven, LeFevour tossed a 26-yard pass to Justin Gardner, who slipped behind the MTSU secondary. Then following an MTSU tackle for loss by Jonathan Harris, LeFevour scrambled for 12 yards to the 1-yard line. The Chippewas went ahead 7-0 on the next snap.

MTSU was equally impressive on its first drive, but back-to-back sacks by defensive ends Mike Ogle and Daniel Bazuin stalled the Blue Raiders' progress.

Marks connected on all four passes for 60 yards during the first drive. His 17-yard pass to Jonathan Grigsby on third-and-23 set up a 39-yard field goal attempt, but Colby Smith hooked the kick wide left.

It only took CMU 51 seconds to go ahead 14-0, as Sneed pulled down a 29-yard swing pass for a touchdown. It capped a four-play, 78-yard scoring drive to the 5:53 mark of the first quarter.

CMU's 14 points tied for the second-most scored in a MTSU junior running back DeMarco McNair's 6-yard first quarter in the Motor City Bowl's 10-year history.

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Sun Belt Conference

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While there are 31 NCAA conferences that sponsor multiple sports, the Sun Belt is one of only eleven to participate in the Bowl Championship Series (BCS) and Division 1-A football, now known as the Football Bowl Subdivision. The Sun Belt was formed in 1976 with six members competing in four men's sports, and today comprises 13 institutions of higher learning while sponsoring 19 championship sports for men and women. The conference has influence in a region that covers eight states, representing 113 total electoral votes. Thus, if you carry the Sun Belt, you are almost halfway to the White House!

The Sun Belt Conference enters its 32nd season in 2007-2008 with a proud history of athletic and academic success. The conference sponsors 10 women's sports - basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, softball, swimming and diving, tennis, indoor and outdoor track and field, and volleyball; and nine men's sports - baseball, basketball, cross country, football, golf, swimming and diving, tennis, and indoor and outdoor track and field.

Each of the 19 sports has seen numerous team and individual accomplishments, and 12 Sun Belt Conference schools are currently graduating their student-athletes at rates higher than the student body. All Sun Belt schools are committed to excellence, and facility upgrades and expansion are occurring on virtually every campus.

Because of its status as a member of the Division 1-A football coalition, the Sun Belt Conference has a permanent seat on the NCAA's 16-member board of directors. As a result, the conference has a crucial voice on some of the most pressing issues in college athletics and will always have a role in the implementation of any future NCAA legislation and guidelines.

The conference continues to use television to grow and promote the league. Adding volleyball, baseball, and softball to the conference's television package has resulted in more national and regional exposure for the league than at any time in its history. The conference's regional television package reaches over 20 million households with live events. Additionally, ESPN televised the conference's men's basketball championship game for the 27th straight season in 2007, marking the network's longest affiliation with any conference in the country.

The Sun Belt Conference has partnered with XOS Technologies to deliver a full-service, customized, public and premium Web site to provide fans with a broad range of real-time information and content about the conference's athletic teams. The Sun Belt is one of the few conferences in the nation to provide video highlights and features on its Web site from each of the league's respective championships. This technology serves as a great recruiting tool for schools because anyone in the world with Internet access may view the conference's championship events. Fans in five different countries viewed the conference's most recent soccer championship.

Prominent Sun Belt alumni include United States Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice (Denver), NFL Hall of Fame football player "Mean" Joe Greene (North Texas), Arizona Diamondbacks All-Star baseball player Luis Gonzalez (South Alabama), former member of the United States Senate and House of Representatives John Breaux (Louisiana-Lafayette), country music superstar Tim McGraw (Louisiana-Monroe), and actor Andy Garcia (FIU).

The conference's first 30 years have produced numerous individual national champions along with Olympic track medalists. Sun Belt teams have also participated in the men's NCAA Final 4 (UNC-Charlotte in 1977), the College World Series (Louisiana-Lafayette in 2000), and the women's College World Series (Louisiana-Lafayette in 1993, 1995, 1996, 2003) and the conference has had 10 players selected in the first round of the NBA Draft.



Johnny "Red" Floyd Stadium was constructed in 1933 as Horace Jones Field. The facility had portable bleachers for about the first 15 years until a major renovation put concrete grandstands in place in the 1940s.

1910s

- In 1912, the Middle Tennessee Normal School strapped up and donned the pads for the first time as L. E. (Mutt) Weber, a student no less, coached the Normals or Pedagogues depending on who you ask. Although it is unlikely that this group of men actually played an organized game against another institution (since no records exist), the foundation for football had been laid at the Normal School in Murfreesboro.
- By 1913, a buzz had been created by a group of young men forming a football team the previous year, which prompted the administration to appoint an official coach for the team. Alfred B. Miles, a biology and physiology professor, took the reins of the football team. In 1913, the Normal School played its first official game, a 47-0 win against MBA. Although it's unknown what level of talent the team played against, they went on to a 5-1-1 record including a tie against Vanderbilt's "B" squad.
- The following season, the Normal School rolled to an undefeated season, winning five straight games after a tie against Cumberland in the opener.
- In 1917, Miles left the school due

- to World War I. Although he returned in 1919, a young man by the name of Johnny "Red" Floyd took over for him that season. Interestingly enough, Floyd was a football player at Vanderbilt at the time. However, no football was played at Vanderbilt that year.
- In his first season as a football coach, Floyd led the Normal school to an undefeated 7-0 season.
- No football was played in 1918 due to the war, and Floyd returned to Vanderbilt the following season. Miles also returned in 1919 to coach the team once again and led the Normals to their second straight undefeated season and third in the program's six years of play.

1920s

- Miles continued to coach the team through the early part of the decade, but his final year came in 1923. Miles was credited with a 34-15-4 record as the Normal School's first officially recognized coach.
- Guy Stephenson coached the team in 1924 and 1925. Although Stephenson produced only a 4-9-2 record, he did give the school its first win over an opponent which we would refer to as

Division I in today's terms with a 57-7 win over Memphis State.

- In the final game of the 1925 season, the Middle Tennessee Teachers College (as it was known from 1925 to 1942) took its longest road trip of the team's existence. The Normals made their way to central Florida to take on Stetson. The Hatters won the game 10-0 in a contest played on a natural surface of sand.
- In 1926, Frank Faulkinberry began his first season at the helm. Not only did Faulkinberry serve as football coach, he was also the school's basketball and baseball coach as well as a professor. He produced an overall 32-24-4 record during his seven years as head coach.
- In a game against North Alabama in 1927, 76 points were put up by MTSTC, which still stands as the most points scored in one game.
- In 1929, the football team played its first ten-game schedule, going 6-3-1 on the season.

1930s


- The 1930s brought definitive change within the football program. In 1933, the team had a new place to play their home games, Horace Jones Field. E.M. Waller coached the team for the next two years.
- After witnessing a 70-7 loss to Murray State, Horace Jones although he never played or coached football helped initiate the recruiting of football players. His first recruit...Charles Murphy.
- In 1934, the *Daily News Journal* held a contest to give the school's athletic team's a specific nickname. The Pedagogues, Normals, and Teachers had all been used. Charles Sarver, a member of the football team, won the \$5 contest with the name Blue Raiders. Sarver had been a fan of the Colgate Red Raiders and substituted the school's blue for Colgate's red.
- In 1935, the season saw the return of Johnny "Red" Floyd. As in his first stint in 1917, Floyd led the Blue Raiders to another undefeated season including revenge over Murray and a win over Tennessee Tech for the first time in seven years.



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Blue Raider History





Along with Max Arnold and Charlie Lyons, Maxie Runion (64) was named an All-American in 1950.

- Floyd's first loss as a head coach did not come until the following year in the opener against Vanderbilt.
- The 1937 season saw the Blue Raiders play a 13-13 tie against rival Tennessee Tech. At the end of the season, unsatisfied by the tie, the two teams decided to play a second game. The Blue Raiders won 29-0. Middle Tennessee also reached the 100-win plateau that season with a 19-0 victory over Austin Peay.
- Floyd retired following his only losing season in 1938.

1940s


- Horace Jones Field was given a facelift in 1940 when expansion added permanent concrete grandstands.
- The school's name was changed in 1943 to Middle Tennessee State College; however, no football was played from 1943 to 1945 due to World War II.
- In 1947, the winningest coach to ever walk the sidelines of Horace Jones Field began the first of his 22 years leading the Blue Raiders. Charles "Bubber" Murphy led his team to a 9-1 record that first year.
- Although he had to weather the critics after switching the offensive system to the wing-T the following year, which produced a mediocre 4-4 mark, Murphy led the team to the first of his four undefeated seasons the next year.

1950s

- The 1950 season produced the first all-American selections in the school's history: fullback Max Arnold, halfback Maxie Runion, and guard Charles Lyons.
- On November 18, 1950, Middle Tennessee traveled by plane for the first time in school history when the team flew to Beaumont, Texas., to face Lamar Tech. The Blue Raiders won the game 27-0. Maxie Runion, the All-American halfback, took a one-week train ride because he was afraid to fly. He returned a punt for a TD in the win.
- In 1952, Middle Tennessee joined the Ohio Valley Conference. Bobby Young, Howard Alsup, and Garnett Rather became the first Blue Raiders to be selected to the All-Conference team.
- The Blue Raiders won their first conference title with a 5-0 OVC record in 1956. Fullback Terry Sweeney earned All-American honors and the team made their first bowl appearance (a 27-13 loss to Sam Houston State) in the Refrigerator Bowl.
- Charles Murphy's 1957 team won their second straight OVC Championship and capped a perfect 10-0 season by shutting out Tennessee Tech 22-0. In the process, MT recorded win number 200 against Chattanooga 20-6. Ends Jerry Hurst and G. E. McCormack and tackle Ralph Massey earned All-American honors.
- The Blue Raiders made it three years in a row when they shared the OVC title with Tennessee Tech in 1958.
- In 1959, with Middle Tennessee and Tennessee Tech tied at 5-0 in conference play, the two rivals battled to a 21-21 tie, and the teams shared the OVC crown for a second consecutive season. It was also the fourth straight conference title for the Blue Raiders.
- Middle Tennessee picked up its first bowl victory in the Tangerine Bowl (now called the Citrus Bowl) with a 21-12 win over Presbyterian capping an 11-0-1 season.

1960s


- The decade was Middle Tennessee's most prolific for wins. The Blue Raiders won 75 of their 105 games (winning percentage of .714). Prior to the 1960 season, Horace Jones Field was expanded to seat 10,000.
- For the second time in three seasons, Middle Tennessee played in the Tangerine Bowl in 1961 but was defeated by Lamar Tech.
- In 1962, the Blue Raiders shared the OVC title with Morehead State, Eastern Kentucky, and East Tennessee State.
- End George Dykes (1963), halfback Jimbo Pearson (1964), and Keith Atchley (1965) earned All-American honors.
- The 1964 squad won the OVC title and played in their final bowl game to date, a 20-0 win in the Grantland Rice Bowl over Muskingum.
- In 1965, MTSC acquired university status.
- Charles Murphy led the 1965 team to his fourth and final undefeated season as well as his seventh OVC Championship. Teddy Morris and Keith Atchley became co-OVC Players of the Year, the first Blue Raiders to win this honor.
- At the end of the 1965 season, Teddy Morris left the University as the most prolific passer in school history. Following the season, Morris' number 14

became the first and only number to be retired at Middle Tennessee.

- The opening game of the 1967 season saw the Blue Raiders play Navy Pensacola, a team of former college allstars. The Navy team was led by 1963 Heisman Trophy winner Roger Staubach. In the 28-7 victory, the Blue Raiders held Staubach to 16 of 45 passing for 137 yards and three interceptions, all by Mike Matheny.
- In 1968, Charles Murphy endured his only losing season in 22 years as head coach and resigned with 16 conference titles as the winningest coach in Blue Raider history at 155-63-8, a winning percentage of .704.

cade for the 1960s.

- On September 8, 1973, the Blue Raiders played their first-ever game against in-state rival Tennessee State at Vanderbilt's Dudley Field.
- Due to the use of Horace Jones Field by Riverdale and Oakland High Schools, Middle Tennessee installed artificial turf. The first game on the new surface was a 23-13 win over Tennessee-Chattanooga on Oct. 2, 1971.
- Following a stellar career, Ray Oldham became the first Blue Raider to be selected in the NFL draft in 1973 going in the eighth round to the Baltimore Colts.
- Mike Moore was named OVC Player of the Year in 1975 and earned All-American status in 1976.
- Charles Murphy, Teddy Morris, and Horace Jones became the first inductees to the Blue Raider Hall of Fame in 1976
- After reclassification of the football structure by the NCAA in 1978, Middle Tennessee played its first game against a Division I-A team Tennessee State, which was classified I-A from 1978 to 1981. The game was a 13-6 loss on September 2, 1978.
- Prior to the 1979 season, James "Boots" Donnelly became the twelfth man to coach the Blue Raiders.


1980s

 During the 1980s, the football program produced more talent than in any

- other decade. Five All-Americans and seven OVC Players of the Year played on the Horace Jones carpet.
- Roger Carroll (1983), Kelly Potter (1984), Don Griffin (1984), and Don Thomas (1988) earned All-American honors.
- OVC Player of the Year honors went to Dennis Mix (1982), Vince Hall and Randy Carr (1984), Marvin Collier and Don Griffin (1985), Don Thomas (1988), and Anthony Coleman (1989).
- James Griffin was selected in the seventh round of the 1983 NFL Draft by the Cincinnati Bengals.
- In 1984, Boots Donnelly led the Blue Raiders to their first ever I-AA playoff appearance. Middle Tennessee reached the semifinals after defeating Eastern Kentucky (27-19) and Indiana State (42-41, 3 OT) before losing to Louisiana Tech (21-13). The team set a school record of 11 wins with a victory over Indiana State.
- The 1985 team posted 11 wins again on their way to the OVC Championship, a second straight playoff appearance, and the number one ranking in the nation. However, Georgia Southern knocked the Blue Raiders out of the playoffs in the first round.
- Don Griffin (1986) and Tony Burse (1987) were selected in the sixth and seventh rounds, respectively, by San Francisco and Seattle.
- On September 21, 1989, Middle Tennessee played one of the most infamous games in school history. The

1970s

- Three different coaches led the Blue Raiders from 1969 to 1978. Bill Peck had the best tenure with a 25-23 record in five seasons.
- Middle Tennessee reached the 300-win mark with a 24-6 victory over Austin Peay on October 21, 1972.
- The *Nashville Banner* named Teddy Morris as the Offensive Player of the De-




The 1985 team went 11-0 in the regular season and was ranked No. 1 in the nation while grabbing an OVC championship.

game, scheduled in Statesboro, Georgia against Georgia Southern, went on as planned despite the effects of approaching Hurricane Hugo. Coined the Hurricane Bowl, the Blue Raiders fell to the Eagles 26-0 in a driving rain with wind gusts up to 50 mph.

• Middle Tennessee won the OVC in 1989 and returned to the playoffs, where they defeated Appalachian State 24-21 in the first round to set up a rematch with Georgia Southern. The Eagles ended the Blue Raiders' season for the second time in five years on their way to the national championship.


1990s

- The 1990 Blue Raiders won their second straight OVC title and collected 11 wins for the third time in school history. The eleventh was a first-round playoff win over Jackson State. Boise State ended the Blue Raiders' season with a 20-13 win in the quarterfinals.
- The 1990 team also helped the program reach another milestone: 400 wins. Number 400 came on September 22, 1990, against Western Kentucky 20-7
- In 1991, Middle Tennessee had to endure an unusual schedule that gave the team only three home games. The team got an additional home game when the University was granted a first-

round playoff game by the NCAA.

- One of the road games that season included a trip to Tallahassee, Florida, to face the number one team in the nation, the Florida State Seminoles. Although MT kept the game interesting for 30 minutes, the Seminoles pulled away from their slim 20-10 halftime lead to win the game by a final score of 39-10.
- The first-round playoff game at Horace Jones Field in 1991 marked the third straight year Middle Tennessee had advanced to the playoffs. In overtime, Middle Tennessee edged into the second round with a 20-19 victory over Sam Houston State. The season ended in the second round with a loss to conference nemesis Eastern Kentucky.
- Tailback Joe Campbell became the first two-time All-American at Middle Tennessee, earning the honors in 1990 and 1991. Campbell also shared OVC Player of the Year with defensive back Marty Carter.
- Carter became the fifth Blue Raider to be selected in the NFL Draft when he was taken in the eighth round by Tampa Bay in 1991.
- Middle Tennessee's first road game of the 1992 season led the team to Lincoln, Nebraska, to face the nation's number one team for a second consecutive year. MT held the potent Nebraska option offense to only two first half touchdowns and a slim 14-7 lead at halftime. Nebraska's superior depth and size advantage proved to be too much, and the Cornhuskers rolled to a 48-7 win.
- The 76,194 in attendance in Nebraska's Memorial Stadium was the largest crowd to witness a Middle Tennessee game to that date.
- On October 3, 1992, the Blue Raiders played their second Division I-A team of the season. MT upset Northern Illinois by a score of 21-13. The win marked the first time a Blue Raider team had defeated a I-A team since reclassification by the NCAA in 1978.
- On November 14, 1992, Middle Tennessee recorded its largest margin of victory with a 70-0 win over Morehead State.

- Steve McAdoo became Middle Tennessee's second two-time All-American in 1992.
- For the fourth consecutive year, Middle Tennessee advanced to the I-AA playoffs and lost in the second round. The Blue Raiders advanced to round two after a 35-10 victory over Appalachian State but lost to the eventual national champs, Marshall, by a score of 35-21.
- Mike Caldwell was named 1992 OVC Player of the Year and was selected in the third round by the Cleveland Browns. As the 83rd overall selection, Caldwell was the highest Blue Raider to be selected in the NFL Draft to date.
- Walter Dunson was also drafted in '92 in the fifth round by the San Diego Chargers, marking the first time in Middle Tennessee history two players were selected in the NFL Draft in the same year.
- On September 4, 1993, MT played outside of the continental United States for the first time, at the University of Hawaii. The Rainbows defeated Middle Tennessee 35-14.
- The 1994 Blue Raiders returned to the playoffs but were eliminated by Marshall for the second time in three years.
- Kippy Bayless became Middle Ten-







nessee's first two-time OVC Player of the Year, winning the honor in back-toback seasons in 1993 and 1994.

- During March of 1993, the Steering Committee submitted a plan for intercollegiate athletics titled "Moving to the Highest Level," a plan to move up to Division I-A in football.
- On August 24, 1995, a \$25 million stadium expansion was announced. Five days later, the university announced that the football program would move to Division I-A.
- On May 31, 1996, the OVC, by a 9-0 vote, allows MT to leave the conference in football to compete as a Division I-A Independent. In December, Athletic Director Lee Fowler announced that the move to I-A would be delayed until 1999.
- Following the 1997 season, Jonathan Quinn became a third-round draft pick of the Jacksonville Jaguars as the 86th overall selection.
- On September 5, 1998, MT opened the newly renovated Floyd Stadium against Tennessee State. A Middle Tennessee and OVC record crowd of 27,568 witnessed a thrilling 28-27 win by the Blue Raiders.
- After 20 seasons at the helm of the Blue Raiders, Boots Donnelly announced on September 30, 1998, that



- On December 8, 1999, Andy McCollum was named Middle Tennessee's head coach to lead the Blue Raiders into Division I-A.
- On September 1, 1998, Middle Tennessee was officially recognized as a Division I-A member by the NCAA in a ceremony held at Floyd Stadium. MT became one of only 114 schools in America competing at the highest level.
- The Blue Raiders traveled to Starkville, Mississippi, on September 4, 1999, to play their first-ever game as a Division I-A member against SEC power Mississippi State. The Bulldogs won the contest 40-7.





- On November 13, 1999, Central Florida became the first Division I-A opponent to travel to Middle Tennessee for a game at Floyd Stadium. MT fell to the Golden Knights 39-10.
- Middle Tennessee completed its first year at the Division I-A level with a win over East Tennessee State, which gave the Blue Raiders a 3-8 record in its first I-A season.


2000s

• On October 7, 2000, sophomore running back Dwone Hicks shattered the school's single-game rushing mark with 311 yards and six touchdowns in a home win against Louisiana Tech. The effort was recognized on ESPN and earned him Independent Player of the Week honors by *College Football News*.

- Middle Tennessee, in just its second year of I-A football, recorded a winning season with a 41-38 (2OT) victory against Louisiana-Lafayette at home on Nov. 18, 2000.
- For his team's efforts in 2000, Andy McCollum was named the Tennessee Sports Writers Association Coach of the Year.
- Middle Tennessee made history on Aug. 30, 2001, by traveling up the road to Nashville and upsetting rival Vanderbilt 37-28. The win marked the Blue Raiders' first-ever victory over the Commodores and the first over a team from the SEC.
- The Sept. 24 issue of *Sports Illustrated* listed Dwone Hicks as a Dark Horse Heisman Trophy candidate.
- Middle Tennessee entered the NCAA record books on Oct. 6, 2001, for the most combined points by two teams in a single game. The Blue Raiders defeated Idaho at Floyd Stadium 70-58 after leading 42-10 at the half. In all, the two teams combined for 128 points, 1,445 total yards of offense, 18 touchdowns, 67 first downs, and 166 offensive plays.
- The greatest comeback victory in

school history occured on Oct. 27, 2001, against New Mexico State. The Blue Raiders entered the fourth quarter down 24 points but managed to score on every offensive possession the rest of the way to eke out a 39-35 victory. In the fourth quarter alone, quarterback Wes Counts completed 13 of 16 passes for 218 yards, and receiver Kendall Newson hauled in seven passes for 119 yards.


- On Nov. 3, 2001, Middle Tennessee clinched a Sun Belt Conference cochampionship by defeating Arkansas State 54-6 at Floyd Stadium.
- On January 15, 2002, former Blue Raider Hall of Fame football coach James "Boots" Donnelly was named the school's fifth full-time athletic director.
- For the second time in three I-A seasons, Head Coach Andy McCollum was tabbed the 2001 Tennessee Sports Writers Association Coach of the Year. McCollum guided the Blue Raiders to an impressive 8-3 mark and a league championship.
- Middle Tennessee kicked off its firstever Heisman Trophy promotional campaign in April of 2002 for Dwone Hicks.
- On April 21, wide receiver Kendall Newson became the first drafted player since Sulecio Sanford was taken in the seventh round by the Chicago Bears in 1999. Newson was picked in the seventh round by the Jacksonville Jaguars as the 222nd selection overall.
- In 2002, the Blue Raiders played in a school record seven televised games.
- In August of 2002, Middle Tennessee received a vote in the Preseason Associated Press College Football Top 25 Poll for the first time in school history. The Blue Raiders earned a total of one vote, which ranked them No. 50 overall in the preseason poll, then jumped to No. 49 in the first regular season poll.
- On September 7, 2002, the Blue Raiders traveled to Knoxville, Tennessee, to take on the Tennessee Vols for the first time in school history. MT played in front of 107,672 fans, the biggest crowd to ever see a Blue Raider team play.
- Wide receiver Tyrone Calico became the highest drafted player in school history when the Tennessee Titans select-

ed him in the second round on April 26 at the NFL Draft as the 60th pick overall.

- On Nov. 15, 2003, the Blue Raiders played a record four overtimes in their home loss to Louisiana-Lafayette (57-51). In all, MT played three overtime games during the season.
- On January 12, 2005, Boots Donnelly stepped down as athletic director.
- On April 8, 2005, Chris Massaro was named the sixth athletic director in school history.
- On May 19, 2005, Middle Tennessee announced a home football game with ACC member Virginia. The Wahoos will be the first ACC team to ever play in Floyd Stadium.
- On November 21, 2005, the school announced that Andy McCollum would be relieved of his duties as head coach

effective at the end of the season. Mc-Collum elected to coach the remaining two games on the schedule.

- On December 6, 2005, the Sun Belt Conference announced that Blue Raider defensive tackle Jeff Littlejohn was the 2005 SBC Defensive Player of the Year. Littejohn became the first Defensive Player of the Year at MT since Mike Caldwell in 1992.
- On December 12, 2005, a new era of Middle Tennessee football began with the hiring of Rick Stockstill as the school's 14th head coach.
- On April 8 before the Blue-White Spring Game, Athletic Director Chris Massaro announced that a new synthetic turf would be installed for the 2006 season.
- In Head Coach Rick Stockstill's first season (2006) at the helm, the Blue Raiders won a Sun Belt Conference championship and were selected for their first bowl game in the I-A era. Middle Tennessee faced Central Michigan in the Motor City Bowl at Ford Field in Detroit on ESPN December 26.
- Junior safety/kick returner Damon Nickson became the program's first All-American in the I-A era. Nickson was

picked as a second team All-American by *Sports Illustrated*.

- Middle Tennessee set a single-season attendance record in 2006 with an average of 22,037 per game. The program also set a new single-game home attendance mark when 32,797 watched the Blue Raiders take on no. 8 Louisville at LP Field in Nashville.
- At the 2007 Spring Game, Athletic Director Chris Massaro announced that new video boards would be installed in Floyd Stadium and Murphy Center for the 2007-2008 school year.


University retires Teddy Morris' number in 1965

Teddy Morris was something special from the moment he came to Middle Tennessee as a young freshman in the fall of 1962.

By the time he graduated, his stellar play had helped bring the Blue Raiders 32 wins (against only eight losses and a tie), a record which yielded three Ohio Valley Conference championships.

When his playing days were complete, Morris held a number of Middle Tennessee career records: touchdown passes (41), yards per completion (14.7), and points scored by passing (252). Morris still ranks fifth in passing yards with 4,799 while also stand-

ing fifth in pass completions with 326.



He was the OVC's Offensive Player of the Year in 1965 after leading the Blue Raiders to an unblemished 10-0 season. In 1970, he was named the OVC Offensive Player of the Decade by the Nashville Banner.

No player has worn number 14 since Morris finished his career in 1965. No player will ever wear that number again. It's a significant tribute to one of the finest athletes in Middle Tennessee football history.

Morris, who was later an assistant coach for Middle

Tennessee from 1970 to 1973, joined Horace Jones and Charles Murphy as the first three to be inducted into the Blue Raider Hall of Fame in 1976.

Morris is currently residing in Murfreesboro and working in private business.


DETROIT, Mich. - MTSU's season-long spell wore off at Ford Field.

The Blue Raiders' first Division I-A bowl trip was spoiled in a 31-14 loss to Central Michigan in the 10th Annual Motor City Bowl.

A Motor City Bowl record crowd of 54,113 saw MTSU (7-6)

stage a late rally, but it couldn't compensate for the early wounds inflicted by the fast-paced CMU (10-4) offense.

"I thought (a comeback) was realistic with five minutes left, and I thought it was realistic with three minutes left," first-year MTSU coach Rick Stockstill said. "They fought to the end, and that's all a coach can ask of his players. There's not a player in that locker room that thought we didn't have a chance."



The Chippewas used only 13 offensive snaps to score two quick touchdowns and three more plays to jump ahead 21-7 in the second quarter. Leading the charge was CMU quarterback Dan LeFevour, the Motor City Bowl most valuable player, who had 218 of his 231 total yards in the first half.

After CMU's starting surge, MTSU struggled to keep pace, as CMU won its first I-A bowl game in the program's third attempt.

Meanwhile, MTSU played its first overall I-A bowl in Stockstill's debut season.

"Our players walk out of here with their heads held high," Stockstill said. "What Middle Tennessee did (Tuesday), you can't put a price tag on. It will help short-term, and it will help this program long-term.

"For what these guys did this season, I will forever be indebted."

MTSU never caught up with CMU, and it took a large leap backward early in the third quarter when Clint Marks was picked off by CMU linebacker Doug Kress, who returned the interception 56 yards for a touchdown.

"Your defense scores in the second half — that really helped," CMU interim coach Jeff Quinn said. "Anytime your kids can step up in that role, you know you're going to have the outcome which we felt and did."

MTSU junior running back DeMarco McNair's 6-yard touchdown cut the Chippewas' advantage to 28-14, but the rest of the Blue Raiders' fourth-quarter possessions finished short of paydirt.

MTSU outgained CMU 320 yards to 311, but the Blue Raiders were stifled by 103 penalty yards.

Marks finished 25-of-37 for 251 yards and two interceptions. MTSU true freshman Desmond Gee had a career-high nine receptions for 63 yards and a key 39-yard punt return.

However, CMU made its mark early on. Each positive for MTSU was met two-fold by the Mid-American Conference champion Chippewas.

MTSU senior running back Eugene Gross scored on a 3-yard run in the second quarter to cut the CMU lead to 14-7. However, MTSU's ensuing onside kick failed, and CMU answered

with a four-play, 51-yard drive capped by LeFevour's 9-yard touchdown run to stretch the Chippewas' lead to 21-7 at halftime.

Any other MTSU scoring threats were countered by a costly penalty, turnover, or loss of possession on downs.

CMU was methodic on its opening possession, driving 69 yards on nine plays to paydirt.

Running back Ontario Sneed scored on a 1-yard dive over right guard, but the Chippewas' march was highlighted by two key third-down conversions.

On third-and-seven, LeFevour tossed a 26yard pass to Justin Gardner, who slipped behind the MTSU secondary. Then following an MTSU tackle for loss by Jonathan Harris, LeFevour scrambled for 12 yards to the 1-yard line. The

Chippewas went ahead 7-0 on the next snap.

MTSU was equally impressive on its first drive, but backto-back sacks by defensive ends Mike Ogle and Daniel Bazuin stalled the Blue Raiders' progress.

Marks connected on all four passes for 60 yards during the first drive. His 17-yard pass to Jonathan Grigsby on thirdand-23 set up a 39-yard field goal attempt, but Colby Smith hooked the kick wide left.

It only took CMU 51 seconds to go ahead 14-0, as Sneed pulled down a 29-yard swing pass for a touchdown. It capped a four-play, 78-yard scoring drive to the 5:53 mark of the first quarter

1956 Refrigerator Bowl

Sam Houston 27, MT 13

Evansville, IN - The Raiders carried an OVC championship and a 7-2 record into the first bowl game in the school's history, but the occasion was ruined by a powerful Sam Houston team. Led by Little All-American fullback Terry Sweeney, the Blue Raiders amassed 290 yards of total offense but mistakes killed their hopes for a win. The Blue Raiders lost a total of four fumbles while Sam Houston had just one miscue in the hard-fought contest.

1960 Tangerine Bowl

MT 21, Presbyterian 12

Orlando, FL - Bucky Pitts scored two touchdowns, one on a beautiful punt return, to pace the Blue Raiders to their first bowl win in school history. Pitts, the little speedster from Fayetteville, had 59 yards in nine rushes to lead a Raider infantry attack that ground out 240 yards. MT built a 14-6 halftime lead then had to stave off a tremendous rally led by Presbyterian quarterback Bob Waters, later of the San Francisco 49ers.

1961 Tangerine Bowl

Lamar Tech 21, MT 14

Orlando, FL - Making their second Tangerine Bowl appearance in three seasons, the Blue Raiders fell to another bunch of tough Texans. It was an even battle for nearly the entire game then a freak play decided the issue. A Lamar field goal attempt fell short of the mark but was inadvertently touched by a Blue Raider and a Tech player fell on it in the end zone for a touchdown.



1964 Grantland Rice Bowl

MT 20, Muskingum 0

Murfreesboro, TN - A rugged defense paced the OVC champion Blue Raiders to a 20-0 win in the first Grantland Rice Bowl ever played. The site was MT's own Horace Jones Field. The Blue Raider defense held Muskingum to only 72 yards in total offense and scored a touchdown on a 99-yard fumble return by end Ray Neal with only 44 seconds left in the game. It also marked the final collegiate game as a player for longtime Blue Raider coach Boots Donnelly. Middle Tennessee opened the scoring in the first quarter when David Petty scored on a 1-yard run to make it 7-0. The teams both went scoreless in the second and third quarter before the Blue Raiders broke it open in the fourth. Teddy Morris ran five yards for a touchdown to make it 14-0 before Neal put up the final points with his intercepted fumble return. Morris finished 10-for-18 in the passing department
