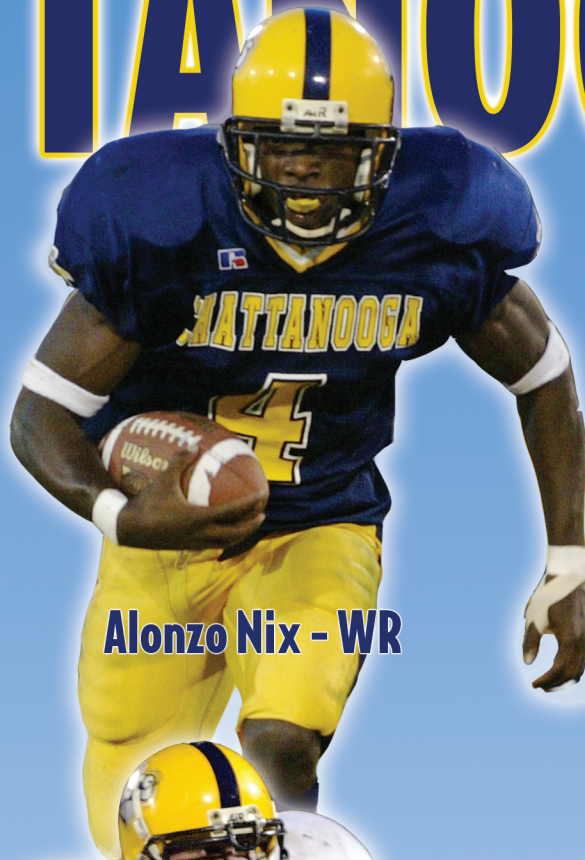

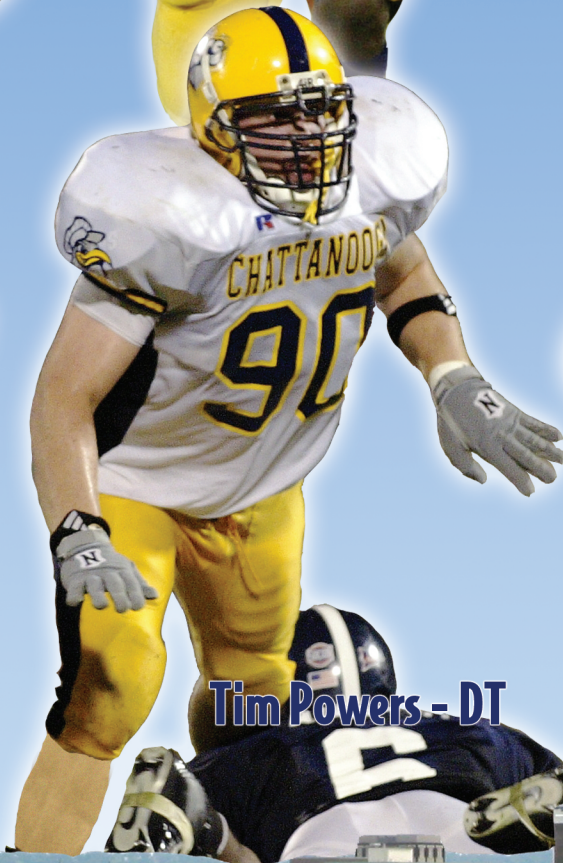

The University of Tennessee at Chattanooga appreciates your interest in Mocs football. The Sports Information Office exists to serve you, and it hopes that these stipulations are helpful to members of the media covering the Mocs this season. The Sports Information staff looks forward to working with you during the 2004 season. Please call our office with any questions, requests or needs.

CREDENTIALS

Please contact **UTC Sports Information Director Jeff Romero** for all Chattanooga home football game credentials. Requests should be made in writing on company letterhead, and credentials will be limited to working members of the media. Spouses, dates, children and other nonworkers are not permitted in the press box without prior approval. Credentials will be mailed in advance when possible. If not, credentials will be held and available for pickup on gameday at the Will Call window at Finley Stadium, located at the front of First Tennessee Pavilion to the west of the stadium. Credentials are nontransferable, and unauthorized use is prohibited.

VISITING RADIO

Visiting schools' radio broadcast teams should contact Jeff Romero for credentials. Requests should be made in writing on company letterhead. Two phone lines are available for use by visiting broadcast crews as is a private broadcast booth.

PHOTOGRAPHERS

Credentials for photographers will be issued on a game-by-game basis, and photographers should contact Jeff Romero with requests. Photographers are not permitted in either team bench area, locker area or other restricted areas within the stadium without prior approval from Jeff Romero. They are expected to honor all sideline regulations.

TELEPHONES

The Finley Stadium press box is equipped with an adequate number of courtesy telephones for general use by visiting media. Calls and transmissions are limited to local, toll free and credit card calls. The telephones are available to all media outlets and are not reserved for any single outlet. Any media representative requiring an additional phone line at his or her respective seat may order a line and should contact Jeff Romero for phone ordering instructions.

MEDIA PARKING

A limited number of media parking spaces are available, and passes should be requested at the same time as media and photography credentials are requested. The media parking area is located near the southwest corner of the stadium on the corner of 20th Street and Carter Street adjacent to the First Tennessee Pavilion.

GAMEDAY SERVICES

Members of the media will be provided with pregame notes and statistics of both teams and a flipcard with respective rosters and information. Food and beverages will also be available. Statistics and running play-by-play will be handed out after each quarter. Approximately 30 minutes following the game, a final statistical packet, including complete team and individual statistics and running play-by-play, will be available.

PRACTICES

All UTC practices are open to the media and public unless otherwise noted. Media members should contact Jeff Romero in advance if planning on attending practice. The Mocs practice at Scrappy Moore Field, Chamberlain Field and Finley Stadium. Contact the Sports Information Office for practice times and sites.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS

DURING GAME WEEK — All requests for player interviews during the week should be made at least one day in advance with the Sports Information Office. A time mutually convenient for the player and the member of the media will be set up by the Sports Information Office. Most interviews will be conducted following daily practice on the Scrappy Moore practice fields. Players will return telephone calls to members of the media as player telephone numbers will not be available. During game week, the player interview deadline is Wednesday evening. No player interviews will be conducted on Thursday or Friday prior to gameday. Also, players will not be asked to miss class time to do interviews. **Head Coach Rodney Allison** and his staff will be available Monday through Thursday each week. Please arrange staff interviews through the Sports Information Office also.

AFTER THE GAME — Following a 10-minute cooling off period, Coach Rodney Allison will hold a postgame news conference in the Finley Stadium media room located between the two locker rooms behind the west end zone. Requested UTC players and the visiting coach will also be brought into the media room. The UTC locker room is closed to the media following the game. Sports Information representatives will be available to assist with postgame interviews.

TO CONTACT COACH ALLISON

The best time to contact Coach Allison by telephone is between 11:00 a.m. and noon Monday through Thursday. Call the Sports Information Office to set up an interview with Allison, other football assistants or any UTC staff member.

MOCS FOOTBALL MEDIA LUNCHEON

All media are invited to join Coach Rodney Allison every Wednesday during the season for his weekly media luncheon. Lunch is served shortly after noon followed by comments from Allison about the week's upcoming opponent. Several players will also be available for interviews. The luncheon is scheduled to be in the Hall of Fame Room on the fourth floor of McKenzie Arena. Call the Sports Information Office for more information.

MOCS ON THE RADIO

Every UTC football game will be broadcast on **WGOW Radio 102.3 FM**. The radio broadcast team of **Jim Reynolds** and **Todd Agne** will bring fans all 11 regular-season games and any postseason contests. All broadcasts begin one hour prior to kick-off and are followed by a comprehensive postgame show, which features a game recap, statistics and interviews with head coach Rodney Allison and key players of the game. Live audio streaming of each game is also available on the Internet by visiting **www.GoMocs.com**, UTC's official athletics web site.

SOUTHERN CONFERENCE TELECONFERENCE

A coaches/media teleconference will be held weekly during the season. Each Southern Conference head coach will be available for eight-minute segments on a broadcast-quality, two-way feed. Check with the Southern Conference Office or the UTC Sports Information Office for day, schedule and phone number of teleconference.

Chattanooga Mocs Football returns to powerful WGOW this season. Each Mocs football game will be broadcast on **WGOW, Talk Radio 102.3 FM**. The station broadcasts at 6,000 watts of power.

The radio broadcast team of **Jim Reynolds** and **Todd Agne** will bring fans all 11 regular-season games and any postseason contests.

All broadcasts begin one hour before each kicks off and are followed by a comprehensive postgame show which features a game recap, statistics, and interviews with **Head Coach Rodney Allison** and Mocs players.

Jim Reynolds will handle the play-by-play and is returning for his 25th season behind the microphone at UTC football games.

The dean of Southern Conference radio broadcasters, Reynolds is one of the hosts of the city's popular radio talk shows, "The Morning Press," on WGOW. After receiving his B.S.

degree in Speech Communications in 1977 from Illinois State, he began his career at WACK-AM Radio in Bloomington, Ill., and at WMBD-TV in Peoria, Ill. He also worked with Bloomington's WRBA where he served as the play-by-play announcer for Illinois State football and basketball teams.

Reynolds also spent time as the play-by-play man for the University of Illinois basketball team while working with BRO-MAR Sports Network in Chicago.

The veteran broadcaster also serves as the play-by-play announcer for Mocs basketball games and will return this season as the host of UTC's football coach's radio call-in show.

Reynolds, owner and operator of JR Sports Productions, is married to the former Cindy Buckner. He has four daughters, Rocko, Julie, Amy and Holly.

Todd Agne joins Reynolds to add color analysis, interesting features and a national scoreboard update to the broadcast. Agne, a Marshall graduate, is in his eighth season with the football broadcast team.

Agne is a past winner of the West Virginia *Associated Press* Radio Play-by-Play Announcer of the Year. He has worked in Atlanta, Ga., for the *Atlanta Sports Magazine* covering the Atlanta Braves, the Atlanta Falcons, the Atlanta Hawks and Georgia Tech.

He is a recruiter and executive for the Waffle House Corporation in the region. In the offseason, Agne pairs with Reynolds on the Mocs' men's basketball broadcasts. He has also spent time on the broadcast team for the Chattanooga Lookouts, the minor league baseball Class AA affiliate of the Cincinnati Reds.

Agne is married to the former Kirsten Hultquist. They have two children, son, Will, 6, and daughter, Madelyn, 3.

"THE RODNEY ALLISON RADIO SHOW"

The weekly football radio call-in show returns to the airwaves for the 2004 season.

Head Coach Rodney Allison and Jim Reynolds will host "**The Rodney Allison Radio Show**." The show will air every Thursday night from 7-8 p.m. on WGOW, Talk Radio 102.3.

The show will allow callers to ask questions and offer comments to Coach Allison. It will also include entertaining features, interviews and in-depth information on the Mocs football team. The show promises to be different than other football call-in shows.

Plans for the show are still being finalized, but it will likely be broadcast live from a downtown Chattanooga restaurant. Everyone is invited to be a part of the live audience and participate in the show.

WHY MOCS?

UTC's logo history

Faced with politically sensitive issues and in need of a stronger core identity to help establish UTC as a growing intercollegiate athletics program, UTC asked SME Design, Inc. to create a comprehensive identity program. Through much exploration and working with a 17-member committee (students, alumni, donors, faculty, staff), SME Design determined the new direction of the athletics identity, moving away from the politically incorrect Native American Indian imagery.



Several identities have been used in the past. With the old nickname "Moccasins," a snake was used in the 1920's and an Indian was used until the year of major change in 1996. A moccasin shoe was even used in the 1980's.

Adopting the State Bird of Tennessee, the Mockingbird, as the core of the new identity, while incorporating the strong regional imagery of Chattanooga's vast railroad history and the "Chattanooga Choo-Choo," SME Design created a strong and very unique athletics identity for UTC.

The committee also recognized the need for the word "Chattanooga" to have a great emphasis in the logo. Thus, "The University of Tennessee at" is much smaller than the prominent place of "Chattanooga." The nickname "Moccasins" was shortened to simply "Mocs." Thus established, UTC could rebuild its athletics programs and initiatives around this new identity.



And rebuild we did. Quickly establishing the identity program in February 1997, combined with tremendous success in the

NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament, UTC had positioned itself to reach for the next level.

The primary logo is our mascot, Scrappy, riding a train. The secondary logo features the front of a train with the word Mocs built into the logo. This logo is affectionately called the "Cowcatcher logo," referring to the front lower grill of the train that helped push objects from the train tracks.

The identity program also utilizes several word marks and peelable logos, including the word "Chattanooga," Scrappy's head, and "UTC" and "Mocs" in distinctive styles.



In 1997, the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga football program said goodbye to historic Chamberlain Field and ushered in a new era for both the University and the city. On Oct. 18, 1997, the Mocs opened up their new home, Finley Stadium Davenport Field, as an overflow crowd of 22,646 watched UTC defeat Tennessee State 28-7.

The 20,668-seat state-of-the-art facility is the best of its kind among Division I-AA stadiums and is the crown jewel for the city's Southside revitalization project.

A stadium project for UTC and Chattanooga had been talked about by city leaders for quite some time before the dream came to fruition. Chamberlain Field on the UTC campus, which opened in 1908, had the distinction of being the second-oldest on-campus stadium in the nation. Officials agreed that something needed to be done. A facility was needed to take the UTC football program to a higher level and to elevate the city's status to a full-service, mid-sized city.

The \$28.5 million project needed financial support to become a reality and got plenty of it. Donations from the private sector ranged anywhere from a 10 dollar bill to \$1 million. In fact, nearly 40 percent, or \$10.2 million of the project, came from private donations. The City of Chattanooga and Hamilton County contributed \$13 million, the State of Tennessee gave \$3.5 million and the University donated \$2.9 million.

Ground breaking on the site that was once the Rock Tenn plant was held March 7, 1996. Seven months later, the Stadium Corporation named the facility Finley Stadium Davenport Field.

The late W. Max Finley, former Chairman of the Rock Tenn Corporation, dedicated his life to public service and was an active supporter of the University of Tennessee system. He received both the University of Chattanooga Distinguished Alumni Award and the Outstanding Service Award of the UTC Alumni Council. He was also inducted into the University's Hall of Fame.

The playing field is named in honor of the late Gordon Lee Davenport. The President and CEO of the Krystal Company from 1975-85 served as Chairman of the Stadium Corporation and Campaign and worked endlessly and tirelessly in the planning and actual development of the facility. Davenport, a longtime friend of UTC athletics and particularly Mocs football, received the UTC Alumni Council Outstanding Service Award and is a member of the University's Hall of Fame.

Davenport attended the stadium's grand opening, participated in the opening ceremonies and was presented a game ball from UTC Head Coach Buddy Green following the Mocs' victory over Tennessee State.

Bronze busts of both Finley and Davenport adorn the main entryway to the stadium.

The Stadium Corporation left nothing out of its masterpiece. The facility, designed by Derthick, Henley & Wilkerson and built by C&I Specialty, both of Chattanooga, contains 32 luxury sky boxes and 3,465 preferred seats with chairbacks. The \$350,000 scoreboard includes a giant matrix screen, and the Stadium Club can hold 250 for pregame or postgame functions. The natural grass playing surface cost \$600,000 to install. The press box can hold 60 media representatives, has three radio booths and a television broadcast booth. Identical home and visitors locker rooms contain a separate training area and coaches' locker room, as well as an extensive player locker area.

Adjacent to the stadium is the First Tennessee Pavilion. The old Ross-Meehan Foundry has been renovated into an open-air pavilion which has become a favorite for tailgaters, complete with food and beverage concessions and a children's area. The pavilion offers tailgaters a perfect atmosphere around the stadium while providing protection from the weather without being indoors.

Besides serving as the home of Mocs Football, Finley Stadium Davenport Field has served as the host of the NCAA Division I-AA National Football Championship since 1997 and will host the game for the eighth consecutive year in 2004. It is also host to UTC, international and high school soccer, high school football, national lacrosse tournaments, concerts and other community festivals.

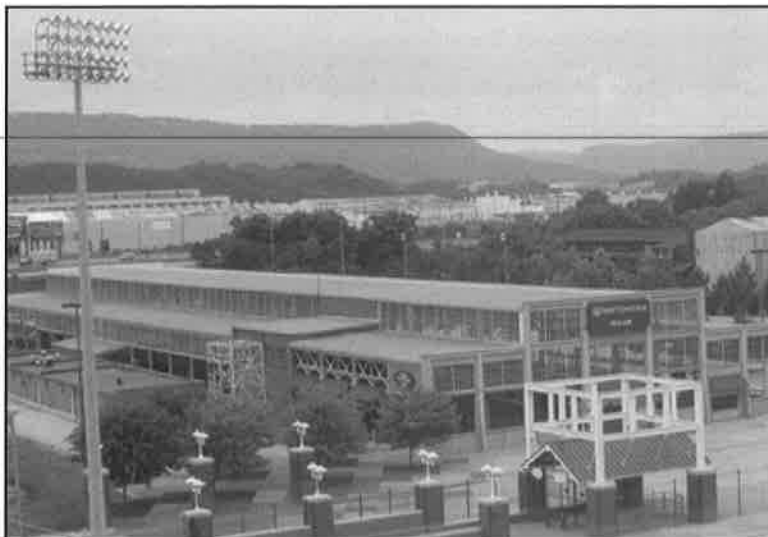

NCAA I-AA CHAMPIONSHIP



The National Collegiate Division I-AA Football Championship is under the control, direction and supervision of the eight-member NCAA Division I-AA Football Committee elected by the NCAA membership.

Committee members for each fiscal year consist of athletics directors from eight NCAA Division I-AA institutions. Dennis Poppe, NCAA Director of Championships, works

closely with the committee in the administration of the championship and related matters.

Selection of teams and conduct of championship competition are the responsibility of the committee. The Division I-AA Football Championship provides for a field of 16 teams with eight first-round games played on the campuses of competing institutions.

The champions of eight conferences — Atlantic 10, Big Sky, Gateway Collegiate Athletic, Mid-Eastern Athletic, Ohio Valley, Patriot, Southern, Southland — are granted automatic qualification. The committee selects the remaining teams at large with assistance from four regional advisory committees.

Teams are selected for the championship on the basis of the following criteria (not in preferential order): (1) eligibility of student-athletes for NCAA postseason competition, (2) won-lost record and (3) strength of schedule.

The committee is responsible for all pairings and seedings. The top half of the bracket has the Nos. 1- and 4-seeded teams and the lower half has the Nos. 2- and 3-seeded teams. Teams are placed in the appropriate region according to the seeding of the top four teams.

The 2004 NCAA Division I-AA Football Championship game will be played Friday, Dec. 17, at Finley Stadium Davenport Field, Chattanooga, Tenn. The University of Tennessee at Chattanooga will host the event for the eighth consecutive year.

Delaware defeated Colgate 40-0 in last year's title game in front of a crowd of 14,281 people.

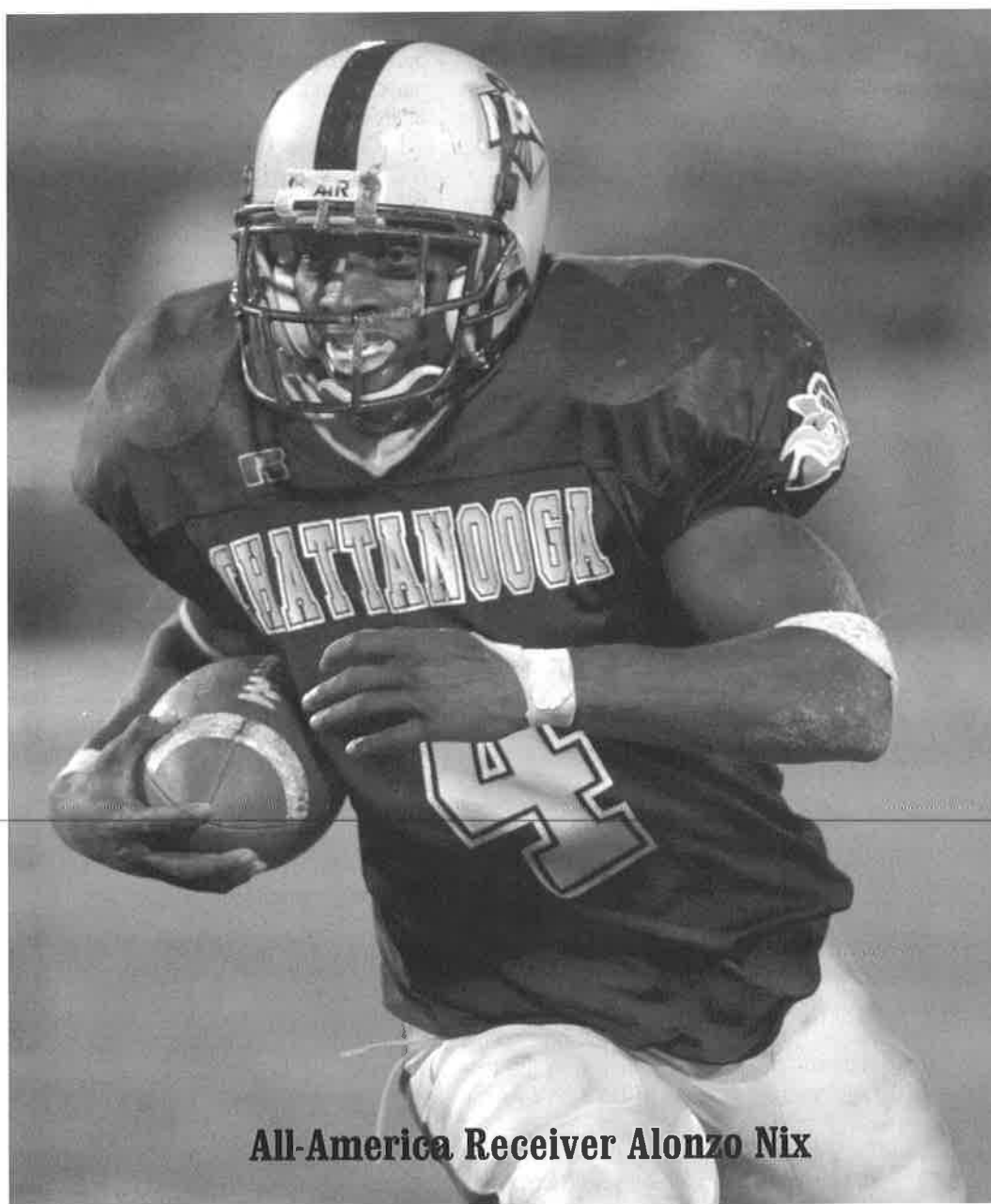

After a Year on the Job, Allison Has Mocs Ready to Compete

Several times, following a Mocs' loss during the 2003 season, Head Coach Rodney Allison would lean against the goal post near the UTC locker room, staring straight ahead as players and staff members filed past him.

He never shared what was crossing his mind, and maybe he is the only one who will ever know.

Chances are, however, that Allison was thinking ahead to the 2004 season. Give me a year, he might have said. Give me a year to get our system in place and bring some players into this program.

Sure, the Mocs weren't expected to do much in Allison's first year as a head coach. The season began with six consecutive

playoffs, were the highlights of the season. Three late lopsided losses by an average score of 60-12 left a sour taste as the season came to a close.

Allison was not ready to throw in the towel or wave a white flag after one season as a head coach.

"It was a learning experience for me and for the players," he says. "The important thing was we all got on the same page. We got better acclimated to each other. We got the grass roots in place. The wins and losses are important, but not as important as getting everything in place to build a championship program here.

"Our first win was a positive experience. A lot of people don't get the chance to be a head coach. I have the opportunity to do that. My best experience is getting my whole staff in here. We are all on the same page. There were so many things that needed to be done, things we accomplished that no one will notice. There were not too many disappointments to me. I wasn't sure we could win a game. As far as what we did and what we accomplished, it wasn't a disappointing year."

The expectations will be higher this season, and Allison wouldn't have it any other way. No, he doesn't expect his second squad to compete for the SoCon Championship, but he will guarantee that the 2004 edition of the Mocs will be more competitive, more balanced, and therefore, more successful.

The primary reason Allison is secure in this guarantee is the talent level of the incoming signing class. Allison and his

staff are credited with bringing in the top-rated recruiting class in Division I-AA by Rivals.com.

"We upped the bar as far as the type of kids we went after," Allison says. "Obviously we didn't get them all, but we ended up signing four or five IA-level players. We

raised the bar. Last year we were just getting settled. This year, we had one year to evaluate and a year going into the high schools and making contacts.

"We have a great recruiting staff. They will turn over every rock to find players. They have the attitude that we can beat some of the mid-level schools on the good players."

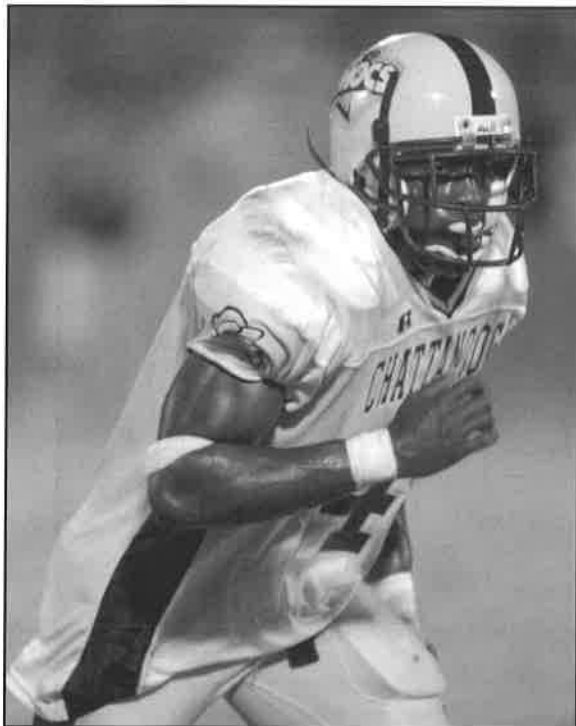
UTC signed eight linemen, four linebackers, five quarterbacks and three defensive backs. But the majority of the newcomers are listed as running backs and athletes.

Quarterback Antonio Miller, of Charlotte, N.C., and running back Levonte Barber, of Cleveland, Tenn., were singled out by Rivals.com as the top two signees in the class. Miller was rated the 16th-best dual threat quarterback in the nation. He threw for over 3,000 yards and 27 touchdown passes in 2003 while running for 987 yards and 15 touchdowns. Barber was listed as the 38th-best running back by Rivals. He compiled 1,683 rushing yards and 20 touchdowns as a senior.

Adding to the talent level of the class are four transfers, three from East Tennessee State and one from Toledo. The discontinuation of the ETSU program following the 2003 season brings kicker Jonathan Godfrey, offensive lineman Kent Jones and linebacker Nick Rivers to the Chattanooga program. Godfrey and Jones are seniors, Rivers, a sophomore. Quarterback Cedric Stevens has already graduated from Toledo, but with a year of eligibility remaining and the prospect of playing behind Rockets' starter Bruce Gratkowski, Stevens opted to transfer to UTC for a chance to play right away.

OFFENSE

And that is exactly the plan, Allison says. Although not in Chattanooga in time for spring practice, the 6-foot-4, 235-pound Stevens arrived this summer to work out with receivers and backs who remained on campus. Stevens, a Syracuse, N.Y., native, played in 10 career games for the Rockets after transferring from Butler County

losses. The skid was halted at the midpoint of the schedule with a 24-7 win on the road at Southern Conference newcomer Elon, and UTC won three of its last six games. A 38-0 shutout of Western Carolina and a 29-20 win over The Citadel, possibly keeping the Bulldogs from the NCAA Division I-AA



Community College in Kansas. He will get a challenge in the preseason from returning signal callers Vinnie Miroth and Chris Crumpton, as well as signees Brett Hyatt and Miller, but all indications are that the starting job is his. He will have the added responsibility during the season of tutoring Miller, the potential heir apparent at the position.

Miroth, a junior from Oak Ridge, Calif., started the 2003 season No. 3 on the depth chart. By the fourth game, he had taken advantage of a season-ending injury to starter Matthew Lopez and earned the start in the final seven games. On the year, he completed 63 percent of his passes for 2,011 yards and 10 touchdowns and ranked second in the SoCon in passing yardage. Crumpton, a junior from Hartselle, Ala., saw very limited action last year. He impressed the coaches in the spring and could work his way into some playing time. The injury to Lopez proved to be career-ending, and he has hung up his helmet to serve as a student assistant this season.

Quarterback signee Desmond Mosby might get a look at receiver or defensive back.

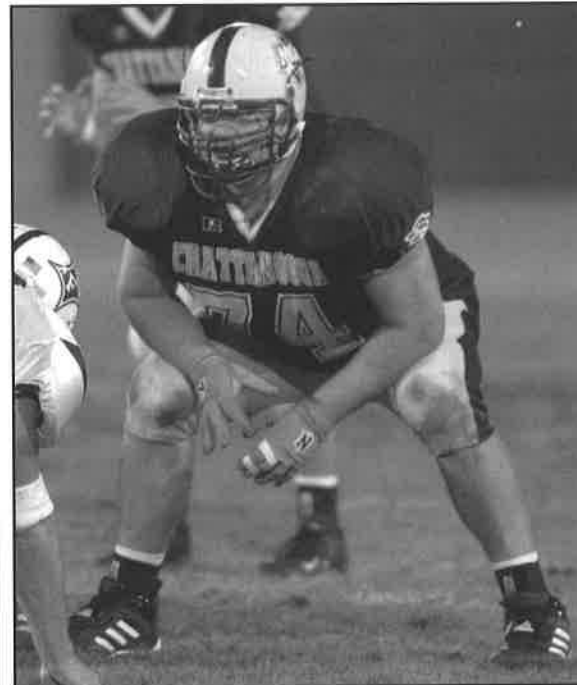
Allison's offensive philosophy is centered on a powerful running game keyed by a multi-faceted quarterback. The Mocs did not follow that philosophy in 2003, as the team had 444 pass plays and ran the ball 413 times. Allison says those figures point to the personnel in place when he arrived on campus.

"I made a mistake last year and got away from some of the things I believe in," he says. "A lot of that was because of personnel. We'll be different offensively. We'll do more of what I like to do and what I believe in. We will be more of a quarterback-centered offense where our quarterback is a multi-dimensional player. We will use him in different ways with sprint outs and draws. We didn't do that last year.

"As far as quarterback, we know what Vinnie can do. We are going to give the other two the chance to show us what they can do. Cedric Stephens will only be here one year. We will give him a look early. Antonio Miller will also get a shot."

The top two rushers from last season are gone. Jessie Chesterfield is out of eligibility, and Cortney McGlone elected not to return to the team. The coaching staff liked what they saw last year in Kyle Oden and Tyrone Baisden. Oden ran for 222 yards

and scored two times as a true freshman while also catching 13 balls for 53 yards. Baisden, who began the season in the

defensive secondary before moving to receiver and then to the backfield, picked up 194 yards on the ground and 66 through the air. Both sophomore speedsters will head into the fall on equal footing at tailback.

At times last year, running backs coach Jeff Nixon would only have three or four position players in his group. Those numbers will expand this fall as a junior college transfer and several true freshmen should also figure in the mix in the backfield. Eugene Cousart, a Memphis, Tenn., native, ran for 610 yards and scored six touchdowns at Highland Community College in Kansas as a sophomore. Joining Barber as true freshmen running backs are Muhammad Ahmad Abdus-Salaam, Lironnie Davis and Curtis Jeffries. Abdus-Salaam, of Atlanta, Ga., gained 915 yards on just 97 carries last year. Davis, of Macon, Ga., is a speedster with size at 6-2, and Columbia, S.C., native Jeffries is also big and talented at 6-1.

"The major areas where you will see recruits this season will be at quarterback and running back and maybe receiver," Allison says. "We started so many freshmen on defense last year, and now they are sophomores.

"We identified running back as the position we needed to focus on before recruiting. We signed five or six running backs and most of them are capable of playing other positions. There is a good chance these freshmen will play a lot. It will make us better on offense.

"The previous staff's philosophy was to put an emphasis on offense. We had more offensive players here than defensive. We have to grow up slowly on defense. We will have new players in some defensive positions but maybe not in starting roles."

The always-loaded receiving corps is thin and inexperienced with the departures of Jeremy Grier, Matt Hale and Ebrahim Tehrani. Grier, the third-leading receiver in school history with 144 catches for 1,670 yards, is academically ineligible for his senior season. Hale has transferred to Richmond, and Tehrani is out of eligibility.

But this area is not lean in talent. Senior Alonzo Nix, of Laurel, Miss., set a school and SoCon single-season record last year with 90 catches. He was a First-Team All-SoCon and Second-Team All-America honoree and will garner pro scouts' attentions this year. Nix will still hold down the starting job at the H receiver, but his receptions total will likely be down this year, if everything goes according to Allison's plans.

Kwento Ikwuezunma is the expected starter at the X receiver slot. The junior from Cartersville, Ga., made quite a comeback last year with 17 catches for 152 yards. Ikwuezunma missed the entire 2002 season after suffering a serious leg fracture in 2001.

The Mocs lined up three or more receivers a majority of the season last year, but a more concentrated effort to run the ball this year will keep two wideouts on the field most of the time and Nix's receptions total lower than 2003.

"If Alonzo Nix is catching 90 balls a game, then we are not going to win," Allison says. "If we get him the ball 50 to 60 times this season, that means we are running the ball effectively. Obviously he is a premiere player. He will get his share of passes.



There are not too many teams out there with a receiver catching 90 balls and winning games. He would sacrifice 20 to 30 catches for three or four more wins."

Jonathan Eversly, of Memphis, Tenn., Edward Jonathas, of Miami, Fla., and Johnnie Powell, of Greenville, S.C., are returning squad members who will battle for

spots in the receiver rotation. True freshmen Wilford Blowe, of Chattanooga, and Isaiah Gay, of Atlanta, will also get their shots in the preseason, as will several expected last-minute transfers. Blowe played quarterback as a senior and gained 803 all-purpose yards. Gay ran for 918 yards as a running back.

The offensive line has the chance to be the best it has been in Chattanooga in several years. A trio of Joshes make up the three returning starters on the line, center Josh Goodin, guard Josh Morris and tackle Josh Shinpaugh. A junior from Copper Hill, Tenn., Shinpaugh is considered one of the top linemen in the league. Goodin, a senior from Englewood, Tenn., should also contend for postseason honors, and Morris, a junior

from Winchester, Tenn., is equally as talented.

The Mocs signed several large linemen in the 2003 recruiting haul, many of whom saw action as true freshmen last year. Sophomores Justin Matherson and Sean Digby are projected to start at right tackle and right guard respectively. Sophomore Dustin Freeman and redshirt freshmen Sam Bentley, Marlon Gillis, Ricky Mathis and Tripp Ward will all figure in to important backup roles.

"I feel good about the offensive line," Allison says. "The right side will be young and inexperienced, however. We have a chance to be much improved on the offensive line. We won't expect much help from our signees this year. In that position, things don't happen too quickly. The right side is our concern."

Fullback and tight end become more essential positions with the running game taking center stage. Senior Chad Smith of Cleveland, Tenn., gained experience last year at the fullback spot and proved to be a valuable blocker and pass catcher. Senior Jonathon Leddy has moved over from linebacker and has proven to coaches that he can be counted on in the backfield.

Bryan Arnold and Barrett Brightwell form a solid one-two punch at tight end. Arnold, a junior from Chattanooga, caught eight balls last season, and Brightwell, a senior from Marietta, Ga., nine. Both are big pass-catching targets, but their run-blocking skills will be counted on heavily.

DEFENSE

Most SoCon defensive units begin with the linebacker corps. The Mocs lose three senior starters from last year's club, all three among the top four tacklers on the squad. But Allison feels that this year's group might be better. His preseason thoughts, however, may have changed slightly with the injury to ETSU transfer Nick Rivers. A backup for the Buccaneers who only recorded 10 total hits last year as a redshirt freshman, Rivers may have been the highlight for the defense in spring practice. His 6-2, 251-pound frame is ideal for a middle linebacker, his projected position, in this league. Rivers, however, tore knee ligaments this summer in an off-the-field incident and is lost for the season,

severely damaging the strength of the middle of UTC's defense.

Donnis Boochie, a junior college transfer last year, is expected to assume the middle backer position and should be flanked by redshirt freshman Steven Mills on the strong side. Boochie, a native of Laurel, Miss., was a solid backup last season, totaling 21 tackles and an interception in 10 games. Mills, from Spartanburg, S.C., impresses coaches with his 6-3 size and speed. True freshmen Chris Johnson, of Chattanooga, Jazz Johnson, from Gadsden, Ala., and Atlanta native Brandon Ridgeway, will likely have to play immediately to make up for the lack of depth and the injury to Rivers.

A big question mark is at outside linebacker. Redshirt freshman Denis Gordon of Norcross, Ga., has the inside track at the Knight position. Beyond him, coaches are searching for a veteran to shift over or a newcomer to step up this preseason to fill out depth at this position.

Nine newcomers saw action at some point in the Mocs' secondary last season, making it the greenest part of the defense. The good news is that those returnees who were freshmen and redshirt freshmen are now sophomores with experience.

The one constant is senior Quentin Harris. The Lancaster, S.C., native will start for the third straight year but this spring was moved from safety to cornerback. He is the top returning tackler from a year ago with 62 stops. Harris' switch prompted the move of Randy Craft from corner to strong safety. A junior college transfer last season, Craft, from Laurel, Miss., collected 45 stops with one interception.

Sophomore Quintez Smith was one of the true freshmen starters in the secondary in 2003. The Dublin, Ga., native was credited with 51 tackles and an interception playing at one of the corner spots. His experience should land him the starting spot opposite Harris. The fourth member of the starting secondary is projected to be North Alabama transfer Greg McConico. A junior from Greenville, Ala., McConico sat out last season after transferring. His ability and talent level were clear to coaches in fall and spring practices, and he should be a welcome addition to this area.

Others who will compete for a spot in the secondary rotation are junior Ryan Andrews and sophomores William High, Dumakas Snipes and Bryan Welch. Signees



Thomas Graham, Terry Lindley and Justin Merritt will also get opportunities to prove themselves.

"I think we could have one of the top secondaries in the league," Allison says. "It helped that we had to play so many young players last year. We have some quality players coming back, but we are not as deep back there. The first four should be a lot better."

The defensive line is also an area which benefited from lining up first-year players in 2003, and the staff is looking for much improvement at this position. Four veterans headline the front four, led by senior Tim Powers. The Melbourne, Fla., native should start for the fourth consecutive season, playing Anchor or strongside end. While small in stature and not overpowering, Powers simply gets the job done.

Junior Troy Blackwell has added weight and strength to his 6-7 frame every year. The tackle from McKeesport, Pa., seems poised to make an impact on the line. Junior Renaldo Jackson has a wide load placed on his shoulders this year as coaches are looking for him to play up to his potential. Jackson, of Charlotte, N.C., is the front runner at Eagle or weakside end. Sophomore Bryan Lomax could lock down the starting nose position early in the fall. The Lithonia, Ga., native registered 14 tackles as a true freshman in 2003.

Sophomores Ryan Coggins of Jonesboro, Ga., and David Edwards, from Atlanta, saw playing time last season, and redshirts Brandon Bellamy, of Lawrenceville, Ga., and Craig Gilbeaux, Washington, D.C., should add solid support up front. Signees Daryl Corley, Robbie Elliott, Donnie Henry, Charles Profitt and Garrett Williams could also have a say in playing time before the end of the season.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Both place kicker and punter will see a new foot this season, but one has SoCon experience. ETSU transfer Jonathan Godfrey will take over the kicking duties after spending the past two years kicking for the Buccaneers. The senior from Johnson City, Tenn., was 11-of-19 on field goal attempts for the Bucs during his career and made all but one extra point attempt. A scholarship signee in 2003, Jonathan Wright, from McDonough, Ga., suffered a foot injury prior

to last season and sat out with a redshirt. He seems poised to handle the punting chores this year.

"We will count on Jonathan Godfrey," Allison said. "We hope that as we go on and get better, three points will mean a lot more to us during a game. Last year, we were not good enough to settle for three points, and we didn't try many field goals. It will be good to replace Patrick Shutters with someone who has played in the Southern Conference.

"Jonathan Wright will be our punter. He has finished rehab and might have to wear a brace on his leg. We will bring in two or three guys to make sure that we have a punter. Jonathan needs to step up and be our punter."

SCHEDULE

The Mocs' always-difficult schedule begins with four Bowl or playoff teams. UTC opens on the road at Memphis. The Tigers went 9-4 last year and won the New Orleans Bowl with a 27-17 win over North Texas. The following three weeks, UTC hosts Jacksonville State, Georgia Southern and travels to Wofford. JSU won the Ohio Valley Conference in 2003, earning an automatic bid to the I-AA playoffs. Georgia Southern missed the playoffs last year for the first time since 1996, and Wofford went undefeated in SoCon play and advanced to the semifinals of the playoffs. UTC also hosts Elon, Appalachian State and Liberty and visits Tennessee Tech, Western Carolina, The Citadel and Furman.

All of the away non-conference games are within driving distance, and Athletics Director Steve Sloan has signed long-term deals with Jacksonville State, Tennessee Tech and Western Kentucky, all nearby rivals.

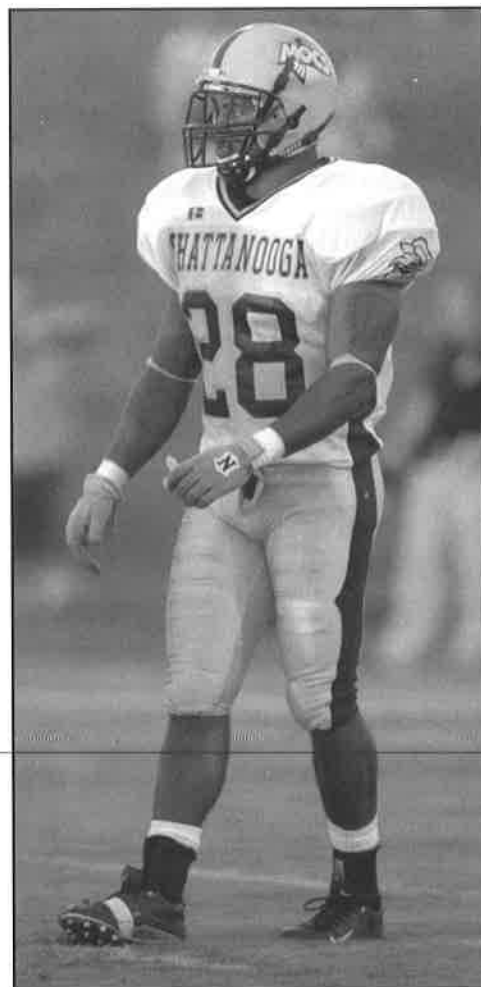
"It is good that we are developing these games," Allison says. "When we go to their place, we will bring a good crowd. And when they come to our place, they will bring a good crowd. It helps create rivalries, and in three or four years down the road, these will be big games.

"After one year in the Southern Conference, I don't see the league doing anything except getting better. There were a lot of young players last year. That's what makes this conference so fun. It's like

coaching in the SEC. You have to execute and play every time out to have a chance. It is fun."

Football observers and prognosticators will be inclined to forecast another worse-than-average season for Chattanooga this year. And rightly so, going by last season's results. But Allison now has a year of head coaching experience under his cap, and his staff has had a season's worth of recruiting to make inroads in Southern recruiting hotbeds.

While a championship may not be in the cards for the Mocs in 2004, Allison can confidently say that his squad will show dramatic improvements from one year ago.

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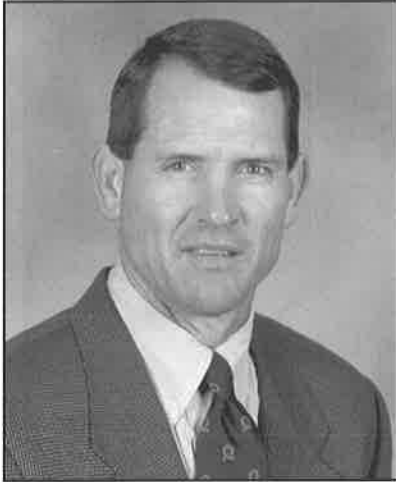

Coaching bloodlines run deep. When University of Tennessee at Chattanooga athletics director Steve Sloan sought a new head football coach for the Mocs following the 2002 season, the Rolodex in his mind stopped quickly on the name Rodney Allison.

Allison was a star quarterback for Sloan's Texas Tech football squad in the mid-1970s. Sloan once hired Allison to join his coaching staff at Duke, and the teaching and leadership attributes that attracted him back then were once again the drawing cards for this hire.



The mutual admiration is evident in the fact that Allison's first-born child is named Sloan.

Sloan lured Allison to Chattanooga from Clemson to take his first head-coaching job. In 2003 under Allison, the Mocs showed marked improvement in all phases of the game. He led UTC to Southern Conference victories over Elon, The Citadel and Western Carolina. The Mocs knocked The Citadel out of a certain NCAA Division I-AA playoff berth and shut out Western Carolina's high-powered offense in a 38-0 win.

With a year under his belt, Allison and his staff signed the nation's top-rated recruiting class in I-AA in February, according to the *Rivals.com* sports network.

Allison spent his last four seasons at Clemson as the defensive ends coach for head coach Tommy Bowden. The Tigers went 7-6 overall in 2002 including a berth in the Tangerine Bowl in Orlando, Fla.

Allison's impact on the Clemson defense was evident. His defensive ends helped the Tigers record nearly 100 sacks over the last three years. In 2002, the Tigers ranked 38th nationally in total defense and 50th in scoring defense. They ranked 18th in rushing defense in 2001.

Allison brings more than two decades of football coaching experience to the Mocs program. Other than his stints at Texas Tech, Duke and Clemson, he also enjoyed coaching success at Auburn and Southern Mississippi.

He worked on Terry Bowden's Auburn staff from 1993-98, serving as running backs coach, special teams coach and offensive coordinator in different years. Allison and the Tigers forged a perfect 11-0 record in 1993, and they were ranked No. 4 in the final *Associated Press* Top 25 poll. They went 20-1-1 in the first two years and earned three Bowl Game berths during his stay at Auburn.

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While coaching the running backs at Auburn, three of his pupils gained over 1,000 yards in a season. James Bostic led the Southeastern Conference in rushing in 1993, and Stephen Davis was tops in the SEC the following year. Bostic played for the Los Angeles Rams, and Davis is a Pro Bowl player with the Carolina Panthers.

Allison worked as an assistant at Southern Mississippi from 1988-92. His star player while working with the Golden Eagles' quarterbacks and running backs was quarterback Brett Favre. After an outstanding college career at USM, Favre has gone on to an extraordinary career in the National Football League. He won a Super Bowl title with the Green Bay Packers in 1996 and is the NFL's only three-time Most Valuable Player honoree.

During Allison's tenure at USM, the Golden Eagles participated in two Bowl Games. They completed a 10-2 season in 1988.

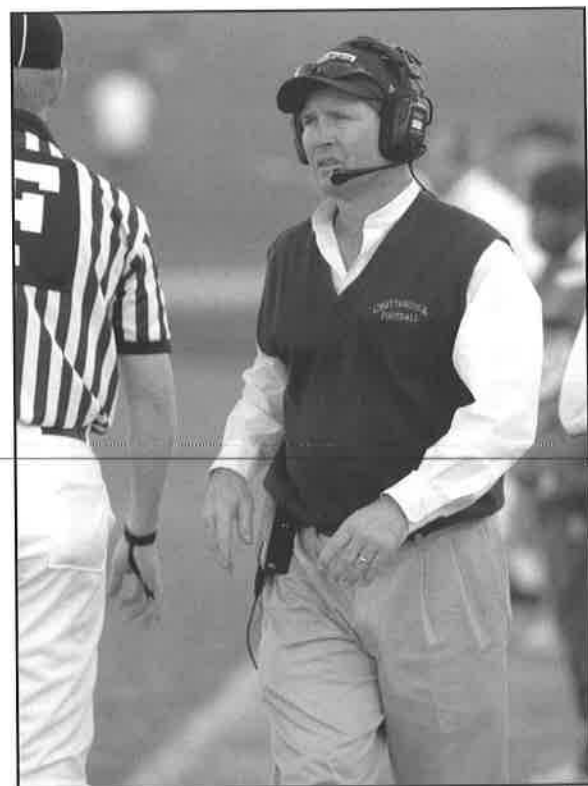
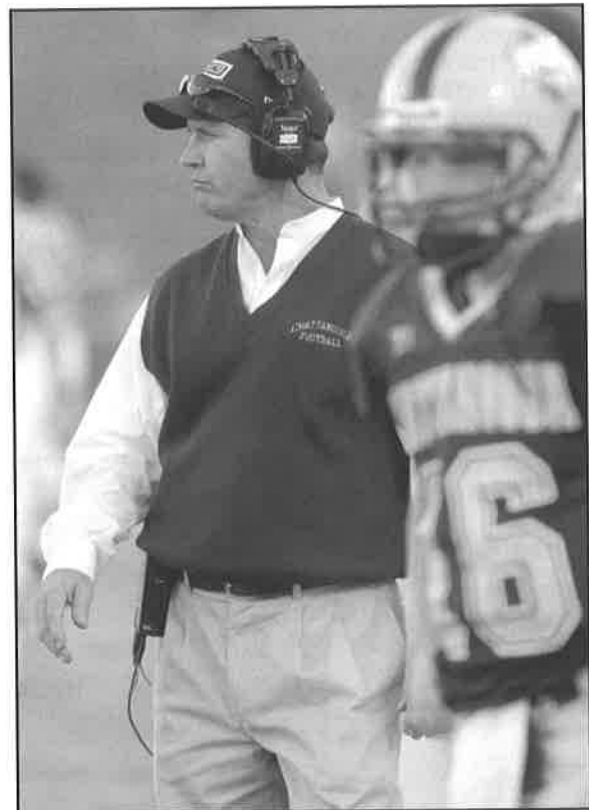
He served on Sloan's Duke staff from 1984-86 as the running backs coach.

As a college quarterback, Allison led Texas Tech to three Bowl Games - the 1974 Peach Bowl, the 1976 Bluebonnet Bowl and the 1977 Tangerine Bowl. In 1976, he passed for 1,458 yards, ran for 706 and was voted the Most Valuable Player in the Southwest Conference. In 1977, he was nominated for the Heisman Trophy. A team captain, he played in the Hula Bowl and the Japan Bowl Senior All-Star Games.

He was inducted into the Texas Tech Athletics Hall of Fame in October, 2003.

Allison played football professionally for one year for the Toronto Argonauts of the Canadian Football League in 1978. He returned to his alma mater in 1979 as a graduate assistant coach for head coach Rex Dockery. The following year, he was hired full-time as the running backs coach by Jerry Moore, currently the head coach at Appalachian State.

He worked as offensive coordinator at Lees McRae in 1984 and 1985. His first head coaching job came in 1983 at West Wilkes High School in Millers Creek, N.C.

He worked as a graduate assistant coach at Appalachian State from 1981-83 while working on his graduate degree. He earned his master's in Physical Education in 1983 and his bachelor's degree in P.E. in 1982 from ASU.

He was a member of the Mountaineers' football team from 1978-80, playing offensive tackle for head coaches Jim Brakefield and Mike Working.

DONALD DYKES **DEFENSIVE SECONDARY COACH** **FIRST YEAR** *SOUTHEASTERN LOUISIANA, 1986*



Donald Dykes joins Rodney Allison's staff as the defensive secondary coach. Along with the many years of experience he brings, Dykes has also been a coach on a National Championship program and has played in the National Football League.

Dykes coached the defensive backs at Delta State from 1993-2001. The Statesmen won the 2000 NCAA Division II National Championship, defeating Bloomsburg to claim the title and finish with a 14-1 overall record. Current UTC defensive coordinator Gwayne

Mathews was also a member of the Delta State staff.

Dykes competed in the NFL for four seasons. He was the fourth defensive back selected overall and a third-round Draft pick of the New York Jets in 1979. He played three seasons with the Jets for Head Coach Walt Michaels and spent the 1982 season as a member of the San Diego Chargers. He wrapped up his professional football career playing three years with the USFL's Jacksonville Bulls.

His coaching career began in 1989 in his hometown of Hammond, La., where he served as assistant coach at Hammond High School, his alma mater. From 1990-91, he worked as assistant football coach and head track coach at Istrouma High School in Baton Rouge, La., and coached in the same capacities at Baker High School in Baton Rouge from 1991-93.

Dykes moved to the college ranks in 1993, serving under Head Coach Todd Knight and Steve Campbell at Delta State in Cleveland, Miss.

Dykes earned four letters in football and four in track and field at Southeastern Louisiana University. He was a four-year starter at cornerback for Head Coach Billy Brewer and earned All-Conference honors as a senior.

Dykes was a two-time National Champion and an eight-time All-America in the long jump at Southeastern Louisiana. He won the 1975 NCAA Indoor Track and Field national title and the 1977 NCAA Outdoor Championship. In 1977, he was ranked 17th in the world in the long jump.

His personal best in the event was 26 feet, three inches, while his best in the triple jump was 53-5.

As a high school athlete, he was the No. 1-ranked long jumper in the nation his senior year. He won three state long jump titles, two state triple jump titles and led Hammond to back-to-back State Championships in 1972 and 1973.

Dykes was born Aug. 24, 1955. He earned a bachelor's degree in Criminology in 1986 from Southeastern Louisiana and a master's in Education in 1994 from Delta State. He is married to the former Yolanda Vaughn of Baton Rouge, and the couple has a daughter, 27, and a son, 24.

Nixon arrived in Chattanooga in 2003 after working for four years at Shippensburg University.

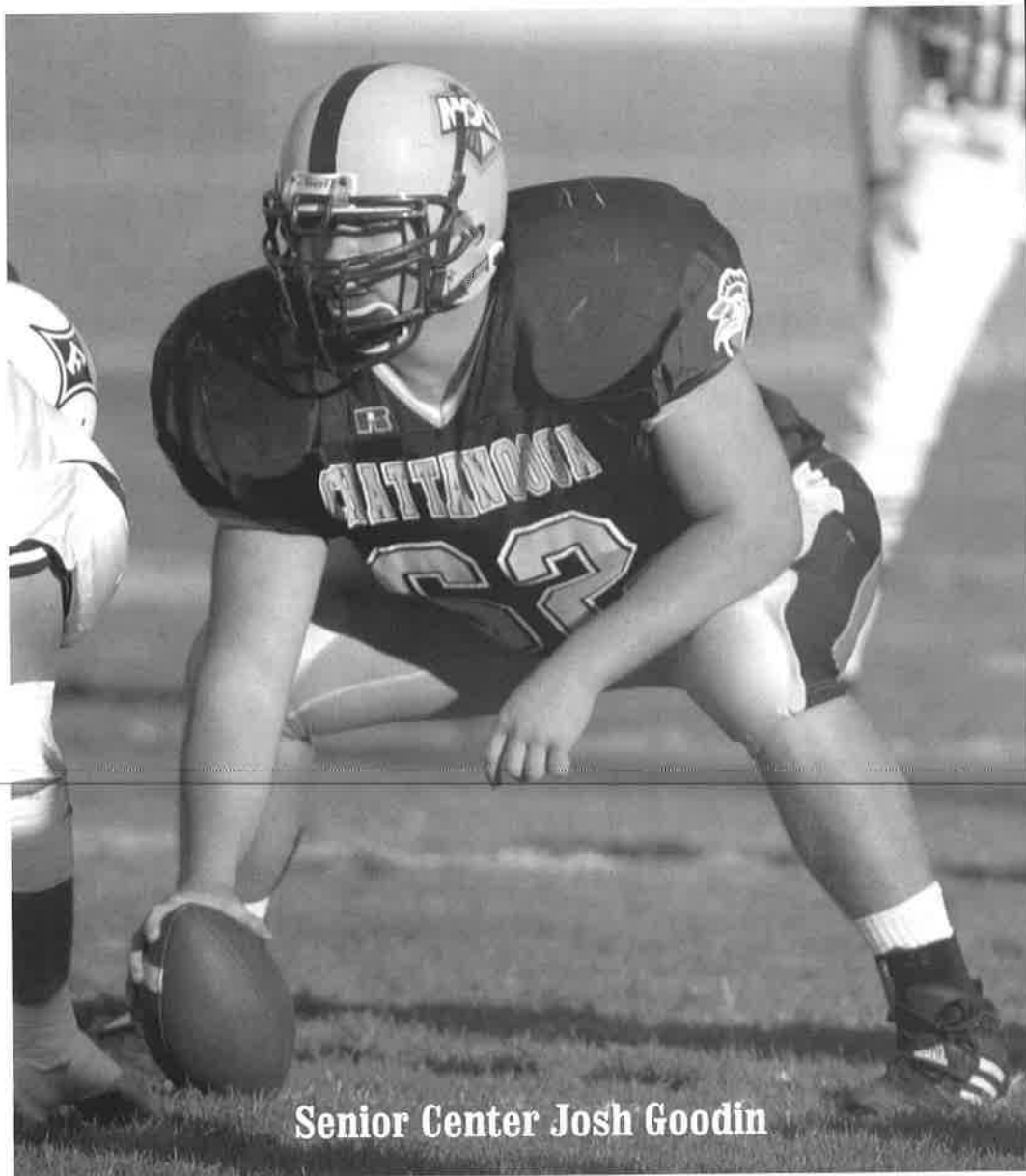

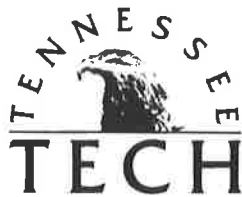

A very youthful UTC team played toe-to-toe with experienced Samford, and the season-opening game went down to the very last play before the Mocs succumbed to the Bulldogs. The outcome was not decided until UTC redshirt freshman quarterback Matt Lopez threw back-to-back hail-Mary passes in the game's waning seconds that were batted down in the end zone. UTC battled back from a 21-6 halftime deficit to pull within

21-16 early in the fourth quarter. Samford picked off a pair of Lopez passes on subsequent fourth-quarter possessions, which extended the Bulldogs' lead to 31-16. On third down and UTC at its own four-yard line, Russell Delk intercepted Lopez and returned it 13 yards for a TD with 11:04 left in the game. On UTC's next drive, another UTC turnover resulted in a Samford field goal. UTC came right back with a score, which was set up by Jeremy Grier's 49-yard kickoff return. Lopez hooked up with Alonzo Nix on a 27-yard pass to the Samford 11, and two plays later, Jason Jones scored from two yards out with 3:46 left in the game. UTC got the ball back with no time outs and 45 ticks on the clock and got to the Samford 45. Two desperation passes were incomplete. Lopez, who was starting his first collegiate game, was 15-for-24 for 205 yards. Jones rushed for 63 yards on 20 totes with a TD and caught six passes for 50 yards. Barrett Brightwell caught four passes for 51 yards. UTC kicker Patrick Shutters accounted for the Mocs' first nine points on three field goals, including a career-long 49-yarder in the first half that tied for the fourth-longest in school history. Kentrell Harris (11 carries, 19 yards) had a three-yard TD run early in the fourth quarter. Turnovers proved to be the difference as UTC lost two fumbles and had two interceptions, while Samford only committed one miscue. Samford finished with 292 total yards, while UTC piled up 280.

Vanderbilt turned two UTC fumbles into touchdowns and returned an interception 47 yards for a score before halftime. Dominique Morris raced into the end zone after picking off a Matt Lopez pass to give the Commodores a 41-6 cushion with 5:33 left in the half. The Commodores substituted liberally in the second half. Jason Ballard scored three rushing touchdowns Saturday to lead Tennessee Tech to a 35-10 victory over UTC. All three of Ballard's scores came in the second half and broke open a close 14-3 contest. He scored from nine yards out to give Tech a 21-3 lead at 11:34 of the third quarter and added a six-yard TD run at the end of the third period and a seven-yard score in the fourth. He finished with 116 yards on 14 carries. The Mocs trimmed a 7-0 deficit to 7-3 on a 37-yard field goal by Patrick Shutters with 3:04 left in the first half. Shutters missed a 47-yarder late in the first quarter. After Derek White's 32-yard touchdown catch from Robert Craft gave the Golden Eagles, 1-2, a 14-3 cushion, the Mocs reached the Tech 26-yard line on the strength of a 51-yard bomb from Matt Lopez to Jeremy Grier. On the next play, Lopez was intercepted by Brandon Shelby, ending the threat just before the half. UTC struck for its only touchdown after Ballard's first score. Kentrell Harris capped a 10-play, 72-yard drive with a one-yard scoring plunge at 7:56 of the third quarter to get the Mocs within 21-10. Following the touchdown, UTC had three punts and an interception. Craft got the Eagles on the scoreboard first with a 14-yard touchdown pass to Drew Hixon 3:05 into the game. Tech defeated the Mocs 13-3 last season and have won two straight in the intrastate series which will continue for two more years. Craft collected 277 yards completing 19-of-27 passes. Anton Thomison was his favorite target with five catches for 54 yards. Beau Fullerton had 79 yards on three catches. Lopez was 21-for-42 passing for 204 yards and two interceptions. Jeremy Grier recorded his second career 100-yard receiving game with 105 yards on seven catches. Grier also added 98 yards on five kickoff returns and has 231 return yards in the last two games. Alonzo Nix added six receptions for 46 yards. Jessie Chesterfield, subbing for the injured Jason Jones, picked up a career-best 61 yards on 13 carries. Jones had 35 yards on five carries and three catches for five yards before leaving the game in the second quarter with a sprained medial collateral ligament in his right knee.

Chattanooga spotted Gardner-Webb 20 points in the first half then held the Bulldogs to three second-half points but could not complete the comeback in the team's final non-conference game of the season. In the process, UTC likely lost its starting quarterback to injury. The Bulldogs had outgained UTC 332 yards to 57 at intermission and owned a 20-0 lead. Quarterback Nick Roberts put GWU on the scoreboard first with a one-yard run at 5:54 of the first quarter. Roberts connected with William Andrews on a 72-yard bomb down the left sideline, and after the team missed the kick, led 13-0 with 2:25 remaining in the first period. Roberts put the Bulldogs in the end zone for the third time at 6:56 of the second quarter on a 21-yard scoring toss to Dan Swartz. The second half proved to be a different story. In the second quarter, Vinnie Miroth took over the quarterback controls from Kurtis Koester, who had replaced starter Matt Lopez. Lopez left the game on the team's first series with a separated shoulder and a sprained knee. Miroth got the offense moving after halftime, and the defense responded by limiting GWU to just 99 yards. UTC trimmed the deficit to 20-7 on a Jessie Chesterfield three-yard run 4:40 into the second half. The Mocs reached inside the GWU three-yard line on two different series only to come away without any points. Miroth threw the team's first touchdown pass of the season when he hooked up with Alonzo Nix on an 11-yard corner route with 2:52 to play. Miroth threw for 269 yards, completing 25-of-36 passes. Nix was one catch shy of the school single-game record, finishing with 15 receptions for 168 yards. GWU's Chris Foster gained 108 yards on 19 carries, and Roberts was 16-of-22 passing for 216 yards. UTC linebacker Jason Jackson made a career-high 15 tackles, while Blake Kirkland, Renaldo Jackson and Tim Powers each recorded sacks.

Georgia Southern rolled up 525 yards and snapped a two-game losing streak in the Southern Conference opener for the Mocs. The 16th-ranked Eagles gained 378 rushing yards and held UTC to 76 on the ground. GSU extended a halftime lead to 24-3 on an 80-yard catch and run from backup quarterback Trey Hunter to T. J. Anderson at 11:28 of the third quarter. Kevin Davis added GSU's fourth TD of the night, hauling in an 18-yard Hunter pass to make it 31-3 with 7:59 left in the third quarter. A 35-yard Sean Holland field goal at 7:51 of the fourth quarter was the only scoring of the final period. GSU, who entered the game with its first two-game losing streak in several years, used a field goal and two TDs to own a 17-3 lead at halftime. Sean Holland booted a 27-yard field goal at 5:18 of the first quarter for the only points of the opening period. Hunter, subbing for injured starter Chaz Williams, scored on a one-yard plunge with 7:31 left in the second quarter. Brandon Andrews added a two-yard scoring run at 4:24 before the half. Patrick Shutters helped UTC capitalize on a GSU turnover right before halftime. Punt snapper Bryan Welch leveled GSU's punt returner Jesse McMillen, causing a fumble which was recovered by Jeremy Grier. After a penalty, UTC took over at the GSU 33-yard line. Shutters kicked a 30-yard field goal with six seconds on the clock to trim the deficit to 17-3. The Mocs knocked on the goal line early in the third quarter. A 50-yard Vinnie Miroth-to-Alonzo Nix reception took the ball into GSU territory. Courtney McGlone had a few tough runs to take the ball to the GSU two-yard line. On first and goal, Miroth fumbled the ball on the snap, and GSU held, falling on the ball. A late drive pushed UTC as close as the GSU eight, but a Miroth pass into the end zone was intercepted by Tariq Muhammad. GSU back Jermaine Austin picked up his fourth straight 100-yard game of the season with 158 yards on 15 carries. Hunter completed only four passes, but they covered 147 yards. Miroth, in his first career start, was 22-of-40 for a season-high 284 yards. He was intercepted twice. Grier had his second 100-yard receiving game with a game-high 127 yards on eight catches. Nix also went over 100 yards in receptions with 112 yards on eight catches. McGlone led UTC runners with 60 yards on 11 carries. Kyle Oden saw his first action of the season and collected 29 yards on six carries. Bernard Snowden led the team with a career-high 12 tackles.

Despite missing the previous two games because of an injury, Wofford back J.R. McNair set a school record with five touchdowns to lead the No. 12-ranked Terriers to the victory. McNair scored twice in the third quarter and once in the other three quarters. The SoCon record is six touchdowns in a single game. He scored on runs of one, two, nine, one and 13 yards. McNair was part of a Terrier offense which generated 375 yards on the ground. McNair's performance overshadowed a school-record effort by UTC junior receiver Alonzo Nix. Nix set a single-game school and SoCon record with 18 catches. He broke Richmond Flowers' school record of 16 set against Western Carolina in 2000. The old SoCon mark was 17 set by Mike Mikolayunas of Davidson in 1969. Nix finished with 135 yards, his third straight 100-yard receiving game. McNair put Wofford on the scoreboard first on the team's first possession, his one-yard score coming at 10:05 of the first quarter. UTC tied the score on the first play of the second quarter. True freshman back Courtney McGlone ran it in from four yards out three seconds into the period for his first career touchdown. Wofford took advantage of a Matt Nelson interception as McNair scored his second touchdown at 5:15 before halftime to give the Terriers a 14-7 lead. Wofford wasted little time in the third quarter. A 59-yard pass from Jeff Zolman to Shiel Wood set up McNair's third score, a nine-yard run at 13:28. Wofford increased its lead to 28-7 on a McNair one-yard burst at 8:24 of the third period. Nix and Vinnie Miroth hooked up for a 16-yard touchdown pass with 1:32 left in the third quarter to trim the deficit to 28-14. McNair's fifth TD of the day was a 13-yard run with 14:20 left in the game. UTC, who was inside Wofford's 10-yard line twice without scoring, reached the three-yard line late in the game. Miroth's pass into the end zone was picked off by Timmy Thrift who returned the interception 100 yards for the game's final score. McNair finished with 126 yards on 20 carries. Zolman completed 5-of-7 passes for 103 yards. Miroth set season highs with 36 completions in 50 attempts for 293 yards. McGlone set a season high with 71 yards on 13 carries. Jeremy Grier, who has caught at least one pass in 27 straight games, had seven receptions for 73 yards.

UTC scored on its first two possessions of the game and made the 14 points stand up as the Mocs earned their first victory of the season at Elon. Running back Cortney McGlone burst over the goal line from one yard out to give UTC a 7-0 lead at 11:20 of the first quarter, capping a 70-yard drive to open the game. On the Mocs' next series, receiver Jeremy Grier hauled in a 56-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Vinnie Miroth, giving UTC a 14-0 advantage with 8:29 left in the first quarter. Quarterback Vinnie Miroth threw for 382 yards and four touchdowns, and the defense posted its first Southern Conference shutout since 1999 with a 38-0 victory. After a scoreless first quarter, UTC struck for two touchdown pass plays over 60 yards each. Patrick Shutters booted a 36-yard field goal right before halftime and enjoyed a 17-0 lead at the break. Miroth's passing total was the sixth-best yardage mark in school history. He completed 27-for-40 pass attempts and was 17 yards away from his season high of 293 yards at halftime. He collected 124 yards on his first two touchdown passes. Each of the first two TDs were on similar plays. Miroth tossed the ball three or four yards in the flat and let the speedy wideouts use their abilities to complete the touchdown. Jeremy Grier raced 63 yards for the first score with 13:28 left in the second quarter. Grier extended his streak to 29 consecutive games with at least one reception. Tyrone Baisden caught a quick screen, his first career reception, and outran the Cats for a 61-yard TD and a 14-0 lead at 6:45 of the second period. A WCU facemask penalty on the final play of the first half gave UTC an opportunity to kick a field goal before heading for the locker room. Shutters drilled the 36-yarder for the 17-0 advantage. UTC wasted little time in the second half. Miroth, who completed passes to 10 different receivers, found fullback Chad Smith on a six-yard TD toss to extend the lead to 24-0 at 11:55 of the third quarter. UTC's defense got in on the celebration in the fourth quarter. Lineman Tim Powers deflected a Brian Gaither pass, intercepted it and returned it 29 yards with 13:27 remaining for a 31-0 lead. Alonzo Nix capped UTC's day with a 38-yard touchdown pass from Miroth with 11:42 left. WCU was forced to punt nine times. Gaither completed 19-of-39 passes for 176 yards. Michael Reeder led WCU with seven catches for 87 yards. Lamont Seward caught four balls for 45 yards, and Manny DeShauteurs led the Cats on the ground with 38 yards on seven carries. Jessie Chesterfield paced the Mocs' ground game with 46 yards on nine totes. Nix led all receivers with eight catches for 122 yards, his fourth 100-yard receiving game of the season. Ebrahim Tehrani caught six balls for 42 yards, and Grier had four for 91 yards.

Appalachian State generated 344 rushing yards, including a career-high 207 yards from freshman back Alan Atwater. The win snapped a two-game win streak for UTC. Atwater's total came on 25 carries. The 207 yards ties a SoCon season high, and he scored on a 28-yard run in the second quarter. His replacement, Michael Metcalf, ran for 101 yards on 14 carries. It took just one play for the Mountaineers to own the lead for good. UTC's Jeremy Grier fumbled the opening kickoff, and Daniel Traylor returned the ball 16 yards for a touchdown and a 7-0 lead. ASU (5-4, 4-2 SoCon) scored on four of its first five possessions. On its second series, quarterback Richie Williams hit Davon Fowlkes for a 21-yard touchdown pass at 3:12 of the first period. Atwater's score made it 21-0 with 6:47 remaining in the second quarter, and Andre Stamey hauled in a one-yard touchdown pass from Williams 26 seconds before halftime for a 28-0 lead. Following the opening fumble, the Mocs (2-7, 2-3) put together an impressive drive on the next possession. UTC used 13 plays to move to the ASU 30-yard line but failed to convert a first down on third and one and fourth and one, turning the ball back to ASU. The Mountaineers tacked on a 32-yard field goal and another short Stamey touchdown catch in the third quarter to extend the margin to 38-0. Metcalf scored from 10 yards out in the fourth quarter, and Zach Oller booted a 20-yard field goal to round out ASU's scoring. True freshman running back Kyle Oden provided UTC's only points of the game. Oden, who led the Mocs with 81 yards on nine carries, scored his first career touchdown with 1:22 remaining to avoid the shutout. Davon Fowlkes made three catches for 83 yards and had 38 yards on five punt returns. UTC safety Quentin Harris led all defenders with a career-high 14 tackles. Alonzo Nix caught three touchdown passes and UTC piled up more than 400 yards of offense. Quarterback Vinnie Miroth completed 28-of-38 passes for 287 yards and three scores. Nix entered the game with just three TDs on the season. He scored from 63, 23 and 30 yards out. Nix caught eight balls on the day for 147 yards, his fifth 100-yard receiving game of the year. The difference in the game came in the final 1:31 of the first half and the first 7:37 of the second half. In that span, UTC erased a 14-0 deficit and scored 24 points. Miroth hit Nix for a 63-yard TD strike with 1:31 left in the first half to trim a 14-0 deficit to 14-7. The Citadel fumbled the ensuing kickoff and UTC recovered, which set up a Patrick Shutters 20-yard field goal with :03 showing on the clock. UTC intercepted two passes early in the second half. The first by Randy Craft set up Nix's 23-yard TD catch which gave UTC the lead for good, 17-14 at 12:13 of the third quarter. William High picked off Bulldogs quarterback Willie Simmons on the next possession, setting up Nix's 30-yard scoring grab. His third touchdown at 7:33 of the third period increased UTC's margin to 24-14. The Citadel, which was ranked among the Top 25 as late as two weeks earlier, looked unstoppable early. The Bulldogs drove 70 yards in six plays on their first possession, capping the march with an 18-yard touchdown pass from Simmons to Nehemiah Broughton for a 7-0 lead just 4:50 into the game. In the second quarter, Anthony Roberts intercepted a Miroth pass. Four plays later, Simmons hooked up with Broughton for a 35-yard catch and run which pushed The Citadel's lead to 14-0 at 9:43. UTC put the game away in the fourth quarter with a 41-yard Shutters field goal with 13:24 remaining and a safety at 11:42. The Citadel's Bud Pough hauled in a 12-yard TD toss from Simmons with 2:26 left, but the two-point conversion try failed, leaving the score at 29-20. Miroth completed 73.7 percent of his passes, 28-of-38, for 287 yards. Jeremy Grier extended his streak of consecutive games with a catch to 31 with six catches for 44 yards. Kwento Ikwuezunma made four grabs for 33 yards. Running back Tyrone Baisden gained 84 yards on 15 carries. Broughton had 103 total yards with 50 on the ground and 53 through the air. He did not play in the second half after being injured on a special teams play. Simmons completed 11-of-22 passes for 152 yards.

East Tennessee State scored 10 unanswered touchdowns and a school record for points. After spotting UTC a touchdown on its first possession, the Buccaneers claimed their first SoCon win of the season with 10 straight touchdowns and kept UTC out of the end zone the rest of the game. UTC took advantage of an ETSU fumble on the game's first series. Leonard Mays recovered a Nick Spearman turnover to set up UTC at the Bucs' 41-yard line. Kyle Oden capped the six-play drive with a one-yard touchdown plunge at 10:30 of the first quarter. The Bucs, who will discontinue the football program following the season, scored only once in the first quarter but exploded for six TDs in the next period. Andre Brooks' one-yard TD run at 4:12 of the first quarter tied the score and got ETSU rolling. In the second quarter, the Bucs scored three rushing touchdowns, two passing TDs and blocked a punt for a touchdown. Gaven Varner, who gained 119 yards on 16 carries, scored on a seven-yard run and a three-yard run. Andrew Nuckolls caught a 32-yard scoring pass from Carl Meadows, and Justin Cruze hauled in a 13-yard toss. Montreal Harkley blocked a Patrick Shutters punt, and James Rainer fell on the ball in the end zone for a score. Meadows scored on a 10-yard run at 10:55 of the third period, and Allen Davis returned an intercepted Vinnie Miroth pass 90 yards for a score with 6:19 left in the quarter. Joseph Gosman capped the scoring with a nine-yard TD run with 12:41 left to play. The Mocs who had come out ahead in the turnover battle recently, had three interceptions and lost two fumbles. UTC's offense got inside the Bucs' 15-yard line three times in the game without scoring. The Mocs reached the 12 before throwing an interception with 6:19 left in the third quarter, and turned the ball over on downs from the one and the 14 late in the game. ETSU rushed for 271 yards. Meadows completed 7-of-10 passes for 97 yards and two scores. Nuckolls led ETSU with three catches for 63 yards. Miroth was 12-of-26 for 84 yards. Kurtis Koester replaced him in the fourth quarter and completed 8-of-11 attempts for 110 yards. Tyrone Baisden led the Mocs on the ground with 69 yards on 12 carries. Furman generated 635 total yards and converted four UTC turnovers into touchdowns in the final game of the season for both teams. Furman back Hindley Brigham ran for a career-high 145 yards on 11 carries, and quarterback Bo Moore completed 12-of-17 pass attempts for 199 yards and two touchdowns en route to the Paladins' second-highest offensive total in school history. The Mocs tied the score at 7-7 on a Cortney McGlone one-yard run just before the first quarter ended. Lamar Rembert gave Furman the lead for good with 4:37 left in the second quarter on a 44-yard catch and run from Moore. The Paladins scored two more touchdowns in the next 1:27 to break the game open at 28-7 at intermission. Furman didn't let up when the teams took the field in the third period. Brigham scored on a three-yard run one minute into the third quarter for a 35-7 advantage. UTC receiver Alonzo Nix weaved his way on a 48-yard touchdown pass from Kurtis Koester at 9:46 of the third quarter for UTC's second touchdown. Nix would claim the Southern Conference receiving title with 89 catches on the season, edging Western Carolina's Lamont Seward. Nix's total is a SoCon record, breaking the old mark of 87 set by Mike Mikolayunas of Davidson in 1970. The old UTC mark was 86 set by Richmond Flowers in 2000. Nix also set the school's single-season yardage record with 1,057. Koester capped a 70-play march with a one-yard scoring plunge to trim the deficit to 42-21 with 12:59 remaining. Furman would tack on three more touchdowns, two by tailback Daric Carter, including a 54-yard scamper, to close out the scoring. Koester's passing totals of 199 yards on 17-of-27 attempts were career highs. He threw one touchdown. Jeremy Grier added seven catches for 67 yards and extended his streak of consecutive games with a catch to 33. Carter added 94 yards on seven carries on the ground for Furman. Isaac West made five catches for 101 yards.

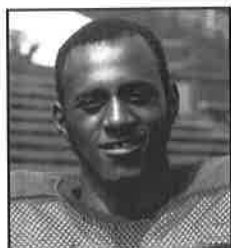

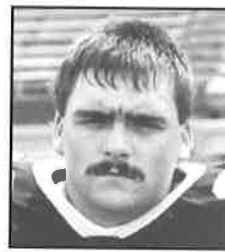

Chattanooga's Football Home from 1908 to 1997

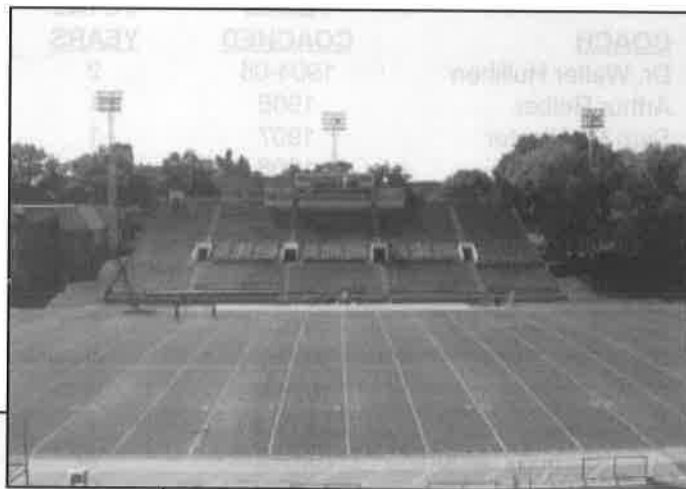
The University and the City of Chattanooga communities said a fond farewell to Historic Chamberlain Field on Oct. 4, 1997. On that day, the nation's second-oldest on-campus stadium closed its gates forever, and UTC helped send it off with a 20-17 victory over Wofford before a Homecoming crowd of 9,102.

Chamberlain Field served as UTC's home for 86 seasons. From 1908 through the final day at Chamberlain, the school's football program compiled an all-time record of 301-133-25, a winning percentage of .683.

Chamberlain Field's historic past is as storied as many of the great players that have displayed their talents at the scenic stadium. Prior to 1907, UTC was known as Grant University. However, in 1907, its name was changed to the University of Chattanooga. One of the men making up the 1907 team had some land surveyed on the campus north of Oak Street. At that time, the land was used as a pasture by the Chattanooga Transfer Company for its horses and mules. Student support rallied behind the athletes and secured the assistance of some influential trustees, and plans for a football field on campus were approved. A dressing room and showers were installed in the science building next to the field. The stadium was given the name Chamberlain Field in honor of Captain Hiram S. Chamberlain, president of the board of trustees.

The Stadium officially opened on Oct. 17, 1908 as Chattanooga shut out Athens School of the University 11-0. Over the years, the program posted 16 undefeated home seasons at Chamberlain.

In 1925, after the University of the South defeated the Moccasins 28-0, some of the wooden grandstands were damaged by fire. When the 1927 season opened, a brick structure seating 5,000 had been erected along Oak Street. The Moccasins lost their first game in their improved stadium 44-18 to Vanderbilt. In 1935, the first-ever night game at Chamberlain Field was played with the Moccasins defeating Oglethorpe, 44-0.

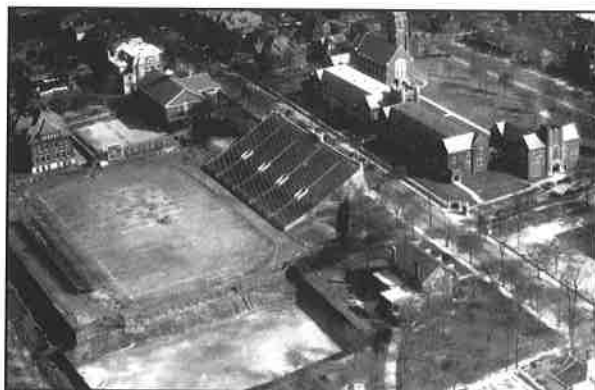

UTC and Chattanooga



On April 5, 2002, nearly five years after Sloan was first offered the job to be UTC's Director of Athletics, he took over the reins of Chattanooga's athletics program much to the delight of an overflow crowd in the McKenzie Arena's Hall of Fame Room. The announcement was in conjunction with the hiring of much-heralded Mocs basketball

coach Jeff Lebo (2002-04).

A native of nearby Cleveland, Tenn., Sloan owns 18 years of experience as a collegiate athletics director and some long-standing ties to the Chattanooga community and the surrounding area, which made him the schools top choice among an extremely qualified pool of candidates.

Prior to joining the Mocs' program, Sloan spent nine years as director of athletics at the University of Central Florida in Orlando, and he served in a similar capacity at the University of Alabama from 1987-89 and at the University of North Texas from 1990-92. The 2004-05 year will be his third at UTC.

While at UCF, he oversaw the Golden Knight football programs elevation to the NCAA Division I-A level, a task completed in 1996. UCF captured 36 Atlantic Sun Conference Championships during his tenure, and its teams boasted 26 NCAA Tournament berths.

Under Sloan, the Golden Knight sports programs pulled off an outstanding feat, as UCF became only the second school in Atlantic Sun history to win both the men's and women's all-sports titles in the same academic year, 1995-96. UCF duplicated that feat during the 1998-99 school year as well. Overall, he

led UCF to three mens all-sports trophies and four womens awards. Not losing sight of the academic side of the student-athlete equation, Sloan's leadership was instrumental in UCF capturing the 1998 A-Sun Academic Trophy.

Sloan, who also took the North Texas football program to Division I status, began his collegiate administrative career as an assistant football coach at his alma mater, the University of Alabama. He coached under Bryant from 1968-71 while also working as the Tides mens golf coach in 1969.

Sloan served one year each as an assistant football coach at Florida State in 1971 and Georgia Tech in 1972 before becoming Vanderbilts head coach in 1973. Sloan directed the Commodores football program for two seasons and was named the Southeastern Conference Coach of the Year in 1974.

The 59-year-old Sloan also had head football-coaching stints at Texas Tech University from 1974-77, at the University of Mississippi from 1978-82 and at Duke University from 1983-86. While at Ole Miss, he also served as assistant athletics director.

Sloan is a graduate of Alabama with a degree in Business and Education. He played quarterback for legendary football coach Paul Bear Bryant from 1963-65. In 1965, he earned All-America honors and guided the Tide to an Orange Bowl victory and the National Championship. The NFL's Atlanta Falcons drafted him in 1966 where he played for two seasons.

Born August 19, 1944, in Austin, Texas, Sloan had an outstanding high school athletic career at Bradley Central High School in Cleveland, Tenn. In 1961-62, he earned All-State honors in football and basketball and was named one of the top prep golfers in the state.

In the summer of 1995, Sloan competed in a major golf championship when he qualified for, and played in, the U.S. Senior Open at The Congressional Country Club in Bethesda, Md. He was inducted into the Tennessee Sports Hall of Fame on March 3, 2000, and the Alabama Sports Hall of Fame in March of 2003. Sloan is also a member of the Orange Bowl Hall of Fame and the Greater Chattanooga Sports Hall of Fame. He was selected as one of the top athletes of the 20th Century from the state of Tennessee by Sports Illustrated in a recent issue.

Sloan is also the author of two books, Calling Lifes Signals (1966) and A Whole New Ballgame (1975). He is married to his former high school sweetheart, Brenda, and they have two sons, Stephen Jr., 34, and Jonathan, 32.

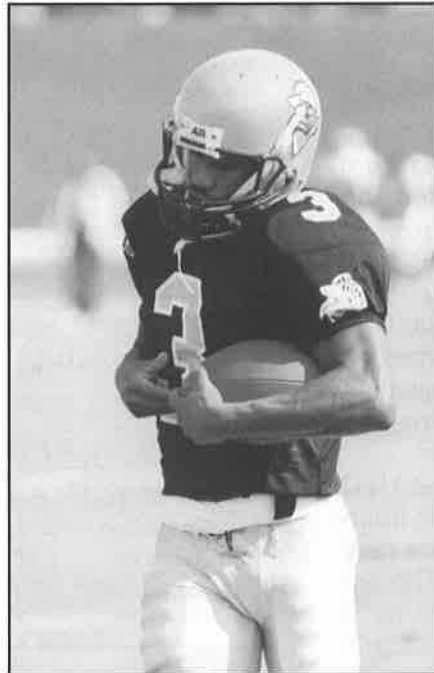
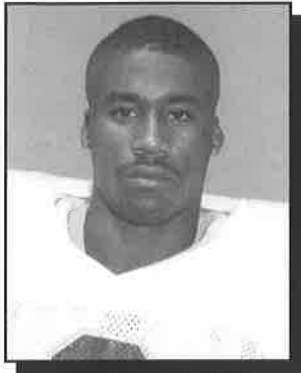

UTC offers a comprehensive health care program for all student-athletes. Thanks to the involvement of the Graduate Athletic Training Program in the department of Exercise, Health and Leisure Studies, student-athletes have access to quality health care.

UTC has three athletic training rooms that serve all athletic teams. Thanks to funding from Parkridge Medical Center, the athletic training rooms are equipped with the most up-to-date rehabilitation equipment including a Biodex isokinetic unit, a Neurocom for balance testing and training and a Trazer unit for functional rehabilitation. In addition, the Chattanooga Group, Inc., provides therapeutic modalities for use as both rehabilitation equipment and instructional devices for students enrolled in the graduate athletic training program.

The Graduate Athletic Training Program at UTC plays a major role in providing certified athletic trainers to insure that student-athletes are well take care of. The program offers two academic tracks. The entry-level masters program is one of few programs in the country that allows students to earn a master's degree while they gain eligibility to sit for the National Athletic Trainer's Association Certification Exam. The advanced master's program serves students who are already certified athletic trainers and have a desire to obtain an advanced degree.

Members of the athletic department and the graduate program staff the athletic training rooms. They work together to insure quality health care for the student-athletes and quality academic instruction for athletic training students in the graduate program.

Jeff Allen serves as the Director of Sports Medicine, and Casey Chambers is the Assistant Athletic Trainer. Dr. Gary Wilkerson is the Director of the Graduate Athletic Training Program.

UTC's academic support staff is committed to assisting the student-athlete achieve a positive environment for academic success. The department's academic support programs help ensure that student-athletes reach their full academic potential.

The goals of the Academic Support Office are to:

- Support student-athletes efforts to receive a quality education and to graduate from the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga with a degree.
- Encourage and facilitate the goals student-athletes have for their careers.
- Ensure that the academic integrity of the University is maintained.
- Help ensure the student-athlete's continuing athletic eligibility and academic progress during their years at the University.

The staff, led by Molly Kotarski, Director of Academic Support and Athletic Advising, seeks to provide a quality service which helps each student-athlete reach their full potential in the classroom and stay on course to graduate. The services offered are to supplement the academic efforts made by the student-athletes. The support staff works closely with coaches and student-athletes to assure academic success.

The Mocs Opportunity Center for Success (MOCS) is a study area for all athletes. Located on the fourth floor of The McKenzie Arena, the area features upgraded computer equipment and printers, Internet access and separate work stations. Newly admitted student-athletes and any athlete experiencing academic difficulty are required to spend a minimum of five hours per week in the study area.

THE SOUTHERN CONFERENCE

The Southern Conference has the most prolific history among Division I-AA football conferences. The league boasts the best winning percentage in the history of the I-AA Playoffs (.625). League players have garnered over 200 All-America selections and numerous national player- or coach-of-the-year awards. The conference has had at least one team in the Top 10 of the final I-AA poll for 20 consecutive years with at least two teams finishing in the Top 20 in every season since 1982.

The conference has placed multiple representatives in the I-AA Playoffs in 18 of 22 seasons, with 13 Championship Game appearances and five national titles. Georgia Southern won back-to-back national championships including a 27-25 win over Montana in the 2000 title game and a 59-24 win over Youngstown State in 1999. Furman advanced to the championship title game in 2001 before falling to Montana. The SoCon has had at least one team reach the semifinals in each of the last six years and in 11 of the last 12 seasons.

Before it was a league member, Georgia Southern made five championship appearances with four titles, giving SoCon members 17 title games and nine championships. The Eagles's six national titles mark the most in I-AA football. Georgia Southern won back-to-back national championships in 1985-86 and 1989-90.

In 1988, Furman won the I-AA national championship in its second trip to the title game. The Paladins defeated Georgia Southern 17-12, avenging a loss to the Eagles in the 1985 championship game.

Marshall ended its I-AA career with its second national title. The Thundering Herd advanced to the national championship game five times during the 1990s, winning the title over Youngstown State in 1992 and Montana in 1996.

Prior to the conference's reclassification, Southern Conference football teams appeared in a total of 34 bowl games, posting a record of 16-17-2. There are nearly 40 former Southern Conference players in the College Football Hall of Fame. One of the most recognizable of these names is former North Carolina running back Charlie "Choo Choo" Justice. During his four years as a Tar Heel, Justice helped guide North Carolina to three major bowl appearances. He was a first team All-America selection in 1948 and 1949. In 1949, Justice earned first team all-conference honors for the fourth consecutive season, becoming the first player in league history to achieve that feat. Only three other football players have earned all-conference honors four times since Justice.

Another of the league's football products that made it to the College Football Hall of Fame is Sam Huff of West Virginia. Huff was a three-year starter on both the offensive and defensive lines for the Mountaineers. In 1955, Huff earned first team All-America honors on the field and was a first team Academic All-America for his work in the classroom. He played 12 seasons in the National Football League for the New York Giants and the Washington Redskins. He was a five-time All-Pro defensive lineman and is also a member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

In recent years, the SoCon has continued to produce outstanding student-athletes. Two of the last five winners of the Walter Payton Award have come from the Southern Conference. Georgia Southern's Adrian Peterson captured the trophy given annually to Division I-AA's most outstanding offensive player in 1999. Furman's Louis Ivory was awarded the honor in 2000. Appalachian State's Dexter Coakley was a three-time all-conference selection and consensus All-America in 1994, '95 and '96 before going on to stardom with the Dallas Cowboys. Coakley won a pair of Buck Buchanan Awards, given to I-AA's top defensive player each year. Terrell Owens went from catching passes at Chattanooga to a stellar NFL career with the San Francisco 49ers. Western Carolina's David Patten and Appalachian State's Matt Stevens were both members of the New England Patriots Super Bowl Champion team in 2002.

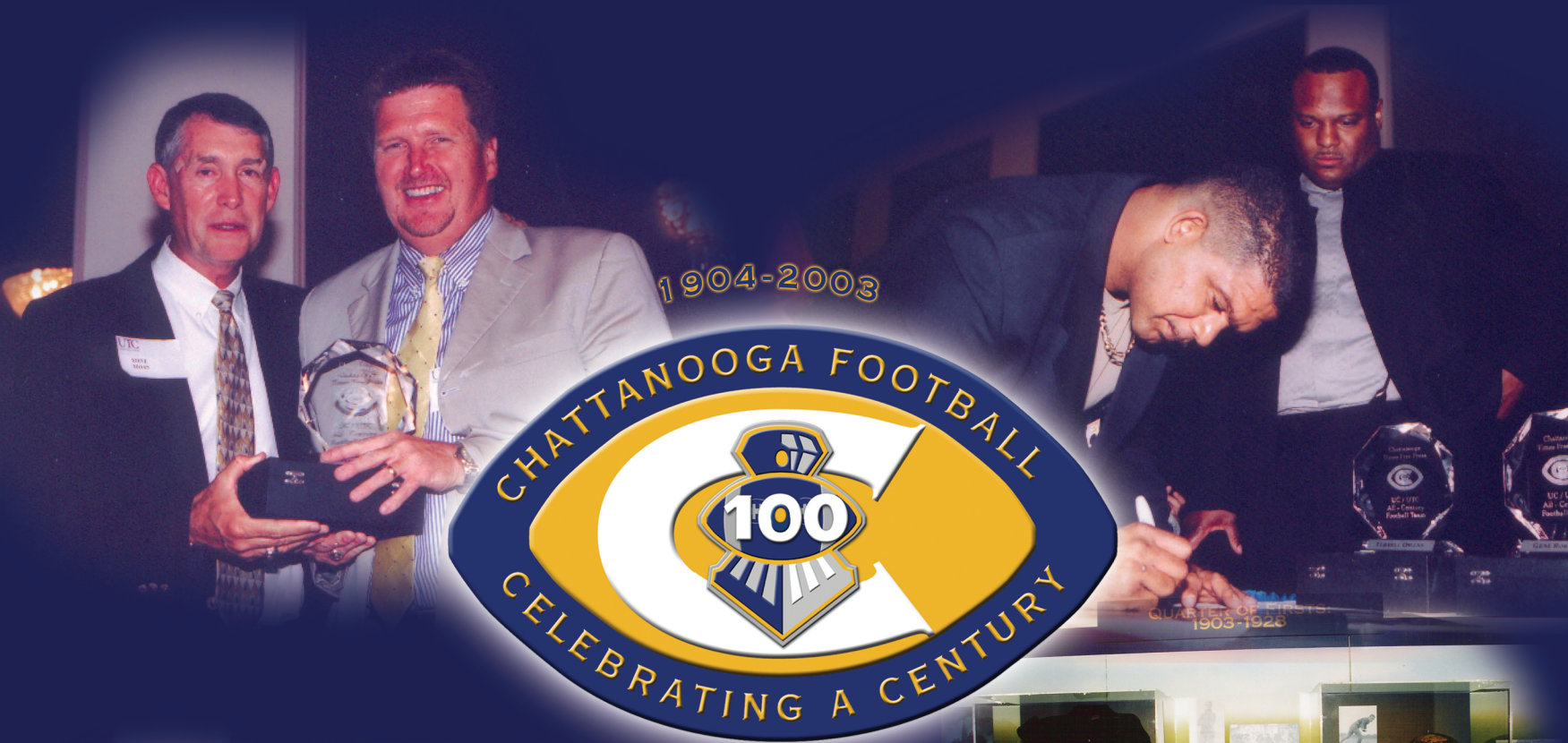
