Rescues require joint effort

The air station's Search and Rescue here can be compared to the volunteer fire department in a small, country town. The volunteers of both are always on call and ready to drop everything at a moment's notice in their mission of savings lives.

The main mission of SAR does not. however, encompass the majority of its time. Nor are the individuals involved made-up soley by Station Operations and Maintenance Squadron personnel.

The primary mission of the SAR program is to provide support for the aircraft attached to Marine Aircraft Group-24," said Major Glenn Cox, SAR pilot, SOMS, "Additional duties have come to include assisting the Coast Guard in any coastal emergencies that might occur on the Windward side of the island. The Coast Guard or the Joint Rescue Center may call us to assist in the search for missing boats or the rescue of possible drowning victims."

The SAR team requires participation by many organizations on station. The Provost Marshal's Office, Station Safety, and station lifeguards all play an important part in the SAR

program. The team on the SAR bird, a specially equipped helicopter, is also made-up of representatives from various groups at SOMS.

The crew on the SAR aircraft consists of a pilot, copilot, crew chief, and SAR swimmer. Each has specific SAR duties that are in addition to their regular work day routines

"First of all, to be a SAR pilot you have to be trained to fly an HH46A helicopter," said Cox. "The SAR qualification training program is three months long. It entails classroom lectures and syllabus

"Our missions seem like basic training exercises. There is an individual in trouble: we go out to the scene; and everything comes off very easily. It may seem like life and death to the victim, but it's what we've been trained for. To us, it's routine," concluded Cox.

"The mission that stands out in my mind," said SAR pilot, Captain Randy Clark, SOMS, "is the time a helicopter from Marine Medium Helicopter Squadron-165 went into the water somewhere between Maui and Lanai.

"We were flying a regular training hop when we received the emergency call that there was an aircraft down

with possible survivors.

"We came back here for refueling and to collect as many details on the crash as possible.

"It was dark by the time we arrived at the scene of the accident. There was another 165 helicopter already present, shining lights to mark the survivor's position.

"Our swimmer went into the water and hooked the victim up to the cable. We hoisted him and our swimmer to safety. The victim was treated for shock and a head injury while we transported him to a waiting ambulance on Maui.

"We went back to search for two other crew members, who we understood to be the pilots. Our search continued for 30 to 40 minutes longer before we broke-off and went home. The Coast Guard and numerous other boats continued searching throughout the night.

"Two of our aircraft were sent back in the morning, but the two downed pilots could not be found," said Clark.

"It's a challenge to fly close to the water without any mishaps," said

Truck-bomb kills Marines in Beirut

More than 200 U.S. Marines and sailors and more than 40 French paratroopers are reported dead following a terrorist suicide bomb attack Sunday in Beirut, according to the latest Cable News Network reports.

Monday's CNN reports said 32 were missing and 75 wounded. Some of the injured were taken to hospitals in West Germany, Italy and Cyprus; while more serious cases were taken to Lebanese hospitals, a CNN reporter said.

A Los Angeles Times Service article published in Monday's Honolulu Advertiser reported that the terrorists had crashed trucks into buildings housing the Americans and French and detonated huge cargos of explosives that crumpled the buildings.

The devastating attacks were carried out with the precision of a well-planned operation, occurring within a few seconds of each other against buildings about three miles apart, the article stated, with the Marines being hit first at about 6:20 a.m.

According to reports, the force of the blast destroyed the four-story building housing the ground companies of the 24th Marine Amphibious Unit.

Major Robert Jordan, Marine Corps spokesman, said that as many as 300 troops may have been sleeping in the building at the time of the explosion, the article stated. He said that it was difficult to know exactly how many were inside because some Marines were on leave in Egypt and also because of transient flow of troops and sailors using the building, the story stated.

Jordan added that accounting for the Marines would be difficult because the building served as the administrative center for the four major ground companies stationed around the Marine compound periphery and housed the personal and professional records of Marines serving in the companies, the story stated.

The article also stated that Jordan estimated that the truckbomb contained at least 2,000 pounds of explosives. So great was the force of the blast that no part of the structure remained, just a huge mass of concrete and steel beside the crater, left by the explosion, which was reported to be 30 feet deep by 40 feet across.

Compiled from reports on the scene, the article stated, the Pentagon issued the following reconstruction of the attack:

A truck carrying explosives traveled down the main airport access road, which is usually heavily traveled by civilian truck traffic. The truck passed a Lebanese Army checkpoint where identity papers of the driver presumably were checked but no vehicle inspection was carried out. The truck then turned through a gate normally manned by Lebanese civilian security forces into a large public parking area used by air freight trucks.

Last of 'old Corps' Marines retires

CAMP H.M. SMITH, Hawaii -"Tve done what every other Marine would have done. I served my time and done my best. For the past 38 years, I've been extremely proud of being a Marine," said the rugged veteran of Marine Corps aviation. "I wouldn't change a

Master Gunnery Sergeant Donald E. Armstrong will retire Oct. 31. He leaves the Corps' ranks at the age of 62 with 38 years of Marine Corps memories that began in 1942 and span three

Considered by some fellow comrades to be the last of the "old Corps" lenthernecks., Armstrong's career in the Marine Corps aviation side of the house has taken him from the propellerdriven F4V Corsairs in World War II and Korea through the A-4 Skyhawk and F-4 Phantom jet age in Vietnam into the present-day age of the micro-computer and avionics.

In July 1942, one month after marrying his wife Margaret, he enlisted in the Marine Corps. The United States' involvement in World War II was well into its seventh month, and Armstrong's position as a maintenance man in a Minneapolis steel foundry didn't quite seem to be the important thing to do.

"Everyone was joining the service," said Armstrong. "It was the thing to do if you were young, strong and American. Even though I'd only been married one month. I decided to support the war effort and ship-over with the thousands of other young men from all over the country.'

The strong, 21-year-old Minnesota native chose to enlist in the Marine Corps because they were the "first to fight." After boot camp, Armstrong was sent to the Navy Pier in Chicago for training in the field he'd always been interested in.

"They sent me to Aircraft Mechanic's School in Chicago." continued the father of six children. "I had always loved working on engines, so the idea that I could be an aircraft mechanic really got me motivated. In those days all the aircraft were propellor-driven fighters or the long-range bombers. I felt very comfortable with my job as a mechanic and was very proud to be a Marine."

After schooling in Chicago, there was one more stop for Armstrong before heading into the Pacific theater. He flew south to Jacksonville, Fla. and attended the Aerial Gunner's School. By this time, he was a maintenance chief with the rapidly growing Marine Corps aviation squadrons. The comfortable setting of a stateside classroom soon changed into the steamy, threatening jungles of the South Pacific for the confident Marine private. Following a brief staging area in California. Armstrong found himself aboard Navy Ships headed for the Solomon Island chain and some of the fiercist fighting of the war.

"I didn't really know what to expect," he said. "But, then again neither did anyone else. One thing we did know was that we were all ready to fight. Even in the darkest moments of the war, we found comfort in each other. Each of us knew why we were there and we were tight - tight like brothers.

During the Solomon Island campaign, Armstrong was the maintenance chief for Marine Corps F-4V Corsairs, SBD-4 Dauntless fighters and TBF-1 Avenger torpedo-bomber attack

For 20 long, hot months in that bloody tropical arena, he saw action in such infamous battlefields as Bougainville, New Caledonia, Vella laVella, Treasure island and others before finally coming home in February

"The Marine Corps was what I expected. We were an organized group of men all pulling together for a common goal. You could have bet your bottom dollar that if you got into a jam, on or off the

battlefield, you could count on your fellow Marine to come to your aid. I really doubt that there is another branch of service that would go to such extremes to help a comrade in trouble. In the Corps, it's fairly easy to do because we are small compared to the others, but that's what made us strong during those tough years," continued the salty veteran.

Following the war, Armstrong did what most other servicemen did; he got out. But, the engine mechanic didn't fly far from "Mother Corps."

"I really liked the Marine Corps back then," he said. "I didn't want to get out of the Corps totally, so I decided to stay in the active reserves. I went back to Minnesota and joined the reserve unit that was just starting. At the same time I joined the police force."

Walking a beat and patrolling the streets in squad cars suited the World War II vet just fine. He contends that he liked the regimentation and organization that being a part of the police force provided. This stint lasted for five years until hellish fighting in bitter Korea erupted.

"In August 1950, they called our reserve squadron, Marine Air Group-33, back into active duty." reflected the then master sergeant, "We got our orders and

Naval satellites provide position 'fixes

POINT MUGU, Calif. (NES) .. Ever hear of the Navy Astronautics Group? They are the Navy's navigation satellite specialists with headquarters at Point Mugu, Calif.

NAG was commissioned in 1962, with a mission of operating and maintaining satellites of the Navy Navigation Satellite System. The command has provided accurate worldwide position fixes without interruption since 1964.

Currently, five operational satellites circle the earth every 107 minutes in 600-mile-high polar orbits. This constellation of satellites forms a "birdcage" around the earth. Whenever a satellite passes above the horizon, a position fix may be made. The average interval between fixes varies from approximately 35 to 100 minutes, depending on latitude. Two of the satellites are more than 15 years old with a reliability of nearly 100 percent.

The satellites have more than 40,000 users, but the system operates primarily for submarines and surface ships of the fleet.

Originally, the satellites were intended only to provide accurate position fixes for Polaris submarines. Since 1967, when released for public use under

presidential direction, the satellites also have been used in precise surveying applications, a worldwide time dissemination system, and to obtain information about the earth's gravitational

In addition to the headquarters, NAG has tracking and injection stations atop nearby Laguna Peak; at Prospect Harbor, Maine; Rosemount, Minn., and Wahiawa,



Halloween-no bad apples

The sun goes down, the shadow fades, and the darkness of night arrives. It is an unsual night: It is the night when ghosts, gohlins and witches come out to haunt and horrify us all. It's Halloween.

Even though most of us don't believe in the weird creatures associated with this occasion, we find ourselves thinking about scary things - witches, bone-rattling skeletons and evil. unnatural happenings.

Through thousands of centuries, witches and warlocks were believed to posess "supernatural" powers. These powers, now known as the power of suggestion, are still widely used. The observance of Halloween, the eye of all Hallows or Saints, on Oct. 31, is a continuation of this paganistic and esoteric idea.

Halloween stems from an Irish Jegend - the Celtic Druid belief,

that Nov. 1 was the beginning of goblins?" or "Trick or Treat." the new year. On this day, a festival in bonor of the "sun god" was celebrated with large bonfires. The Druids belived that at the end of the old year, Oct. 31, the lord of death gathered all souls of the dead who had been condemned to enter the bodies of animals and decided what form they would take for the next year.

The celebration of Halloween was started in America by the early settlers. It was not until the Great Irish immigration period in the 1840's, however, that Halloween became a nationally observed holiday.

In lusty pioneer communities, practical jokes were one of the favorite pastmes, and Halloween presented an opportunity for this kind of amusement. Hence, Halloween practice today is for children to dress in outlandish costumes and go from house to house shouting "Anything for the

In the past, Halloween was often used as a fund raising event. In 1967, a Presidential Proclamation established the observance of National United Nations Children Fund Day in conjunction with Halloween. In many communities, people show their concern for the populace in developing countries through various fund-raising activities for UNICEF

Over the years, the idea of Halloween has changed from witchery into a time set aside for children to have fun with friends. However, the idea of devilish intentions has not been completely obliterated from Halloween practices.

Yearly, innocent children become victims at the hands of cynical cranks who give children booby-trapped apples and candy, coated with dangerous sub-

Parents are cautioned by law enforcement officials to accompany children on their trick or treat rounds. Additionally, children should be instructed not to cat their collected treats until examined carefully after returning home.

Aboard the air station, the traditional festivities will be authorized between the hours of 6 and 9 p.m. Monday.

In the interest of safety, children are advised to wear flameproof costumes, light in color and masks with unrestricted vision. Parents are asked to ensure that children stay out of the street and to report any unusual activity to the Provost Marshal at 257-2123.

Motorists are asked to be especially observant for children entering streets from sidewalks and between homes.

America loves pumpkins as long as they're cooked

Military exchanges are stocked right now with shelves of plastic orange Jack-o-lanterns For the trick or treat crowd. Few people take the Time these days to pick a plump pumpkin and reate their own frightening pumpkin face with a sharp knife. It it fails, Mom can always use the scrap for pie.

Americans aren't really forsaking the pumpkins. They're just skipping the lampleasant part of the fan. The pumpkin has meant a great deal to this country since earliest lime.

Pumpkins originated in Mexico and Central

America. Centuries before Columbus reached The New World, Indian tribes were cultivating pumpkins and squash almost everywhere in North America.

Captain John Smith wrote that Virginia Indians grew a "fruit like unto a Muske Millon, but lesse and worst." The intrepid leader eapparently made the mistake of sampling a raw -bumpkin.

American colonists soon found that cooked pumpkin was tasty, nourishing food. As early as 1630 a versifier wrote: "If fresh meat be wanting to fill up your dish, we have carrots and pumpkins and turnips and fish. We have pumpkins at morning and pumpkins at noon, if it were not for pumpkins we should be undone."

The early settlers make pumpkin soup, stew, pudding, bread and griddle cakes, as well as pie. The pulp was dried for use in winter and spring or beiled down into a thick sauce. "Pumpkin sass and roast opossum" was a delicacy. Pumpkin seeds were dried, fried and salted as a

A colonial drinking son proclaimed: "Oh, we can make liquor to sweeten our lips, of pumpkins, or parsnips, of walnut-tree chips."

Even the shell was used. Early New England blue laws required every man to have his excess hair trimmed around a cap. Sometimes a dried half shell was substituted and New Englanders were called pumpkin heads. The epithet later came to mean a dolt or stupid fellow.

The term "some pumpkins," for a person or

thing of consequence, apparently was coined by New Yorkers in the 1850s when their fancy was taken by enormous pumpkins displayed at the Crystal Palace.

Henry Ward Beecher, the preacher and lecturer, introduced the phrase to starled Englishmen when he declared that London was some pumpkins, I tell you."

All the varieties of pumpkins belong to the same species, Cucurbita pepo, according to the National Geographic Society. Though the family resemblance is slight, close relatives are slender green zucchini, cauliflower-shaped white blush scallop, golden summer crook neck, and other summer squash.

These days, pumpkins can be purchased in cans, already cooked, processed, spiced and ready to pour into pie shells. While a few hearty pioneer spirits insist on preparing the pumpkins "from scratch" there are thousands who applaud the progressive shortcut. Without the frozen, canned pumpkins, many would have to do without the traditional dishes of holiday



Ceramics Clay takes ghoulish forms

Ghosts, gohlins, witches... they all come out on Halloween, and some of their likenesses have been captured in ceramics.

Several molds are available with a Halloween theme at the Ceramics Shop here. Dozens more. including a Christmas tree, carry a yuletide message.

"You can make gifts inexpensively and with a personal touch since you're making them yourself." said Jean Graham, head of volunteers at the shop,

The shop is only open to members of the Hobbist Guild here because it is a private organization, but military members and their families are encouraged to join

Prospective members attend a removed from the mold, it is in the ceramics class first to acquaint them with the club rules. operation, and the basic skills needed to make ceramic pieces. The cost is normally \$3 per class and beginners usually have three

The club has approximately 130

classes. Initial membership fees are \$3 initiation plus \$3 a month per person. Families pay \$3 for the first family member and \$1 for each additional person. The basic tools and material needed to start can be purchased at the club's store for about \$8.

.Ceramic-ware goes through several stages before it's finished. Starting as a dry pottery mixture the club mixes and bottles slip. (a pottery mixture), which is then sold through the guild's store

The slip is poured into molds, members now, and a choice of which are used to cast the pieces to several hundred molds to cast, be made. When the piece is greenware stage and is very

> Greenware is cleaned and sometimes painted with cover coats, dustaways or other colors, then fired in a kiln at temperatures exceeding 2,000 degrees Fahrenheit Firing transforms the brittle greenware into bisque, which is sturdy and unlikely to break when handled.

The final stage comes with the use of glazes that form a glass-like finish when fired. Glazes are available in various colors and textures for different effects. One alternative to glazing and firing bisque is to use stains and a spray. sealer which doesn't require a second firing However, hisque

stains are not food safe and can't be used for dishes, bowls, or other pieces used for food.

The club operates four kilns, to keep pace with the more than 130 members who use the facilities. All firing is done at the owner's

The last three months of the year are the busiest for the club as members ready presents and gifts for Christmas, and this year should be the busiest ever. according to Graham.

The shop is run on a volunteer basis so the hours vary with the number of volunteers, but there is normally semeone there between 8 a.m. and noon Mondays Wednesays and Fridays, and between 6 and 8 p.m. Tuesdays and Thursdays. For more information about ceramics, call the shop at 254-1630





CAAC intern shares knowledge

The Counseling and Assistance Center has a new face on its staff. Although temporary, he expects to learn about substance abuse treatment and submit fresh ideas to the rehabilitation program.

Michael Anton, serving his doctoral internship from the Hawaii School of Professional Psychology, has been at CAAC since late June and will remain through December.

"One of my areas of interest is substance abuse treatment," said Anton, "I'm surprised and pleased to find that the Marine Corps has such an enlightened and progressive alcohol and drug rehabilitation facility here. I'm glad to know that the Marine Corps is concerned enough about its people to try and help them with their substance abuse," he said.

"The rehabilitation process benefits each individual Marine anytime you add a professional like Anton to your staff. This gives him the opportunity to use his ideas for the betterment of the organization," said Master Ser-

And in the contraction of the co

geant Don Doherty, noncommissioned officer-in-charge, CAAC.

"We don't want a static program." emphasized Dr. Tom Ditzler, director of CAAC. "We're trying to keep the program current with the needs of the Marine Corps. To do that, we always need fresh ideas . . . informed ideas that are consistent with current military problems and capabilities.

"Anton will be evaluated on his ability to provide meaningful input to the program design," Ditzler continued. "We're extremely pleased to have him as a member of the staff, and we're very satisfied with the quality of work he's doing."

Anton attended Ohio State University and received a bachelor's degree in psychology. He received his master's degree in psychology at Middle Tennessee State University. At present, he is in his final year at the Hawaii School of Professional Psychology. Anton expects to receive his doctorate in clinical psychology by June 1984.

As an intern, Anton is involved in group therapy five days a week. He also participates in a number of psychological tests that measure personality changes, behavioral changes, and the relationship between substance abuse and organic damage.

The Counseling and Assistance Center has the capabilities of effectively treating substance abuse, but not substance addiction.

"Abusers are people who wrongfully use a substance to cope with stress," said Anton. "An addiction implies physical dependence. An addict will show physical withdrawal symptoms if the substance is withheld. It's a very serious medical problem that should be handled by a hospital. An addiction is a much more overlearned response to stress than is abuse."

The reason individuals start abusing drugs are diverse and complex.

"People start using alcohol and drugs for a number of reasons," said Anton, "However, after the substance abuse begins, the reasons for use change over time. Individuals start relying on that substance to solve their problems and to avoid stress. Their initial reasons for beginning the abuse, and the reasons for continuing, don't usually have that much to do with each other.

"Successful substance abuse rehabilitation depends on individuals' acceptance of their problems an willingness to work toward their rehabilitation.

"We can't cure people," said Anton, "and fix them so they no longer have substance abuse problems. The rehabilitation process is an ongoing process and, in most cases, will continue for the individual's entire life. However, the six week CAAC program is a very good start. It begins the intervention process and gets the individual back on track."

One form of immediate substance intervention, which is more popular with staff members than clients, is Antabuse. It is a harmless drug if taken by itself. However, when alcohol mixes with Antabuse in the stomach, some very violent nauseous effects are felt.

"Antabuse is certainly not the entire answer to substance abuse," said Anton. "An individual who does not have the







chance to drink has a new

opportunity to discover alternate means of problem solving. "Antabuse is not a major fucus

of the CAAC program. In the initial stages of treatment. Antabuse can be very effective and helpful as an insurance policy against impulsive, over-learned behavior. The majority of rehabilitation lies in group therapy and Alcoholics Anonymous.

Although a 100 percent rehabilitation rate is desired, some individuals refuse to work while in the program.

"I feel badly if anyone fails," said Anton. "I would like everyone who comes here to successfully complete the program and, subsequently, their enlistments. However, certain individuals refuse to work toward rehabilitation. If they can't do the job they were hired for, they shouldn't be kept in the service.'








Cox. "We come down to about 10 feet from the water's surface on a day with a calm seascape. The SAR swimmer

jumps from that distance and then we perform our rescue work from a hover. "My primary mission as a SAR

swimmer is to get into the water and pull the victim out," said Staff Sergeant C.J. Brooker, SOMS, "We're also trained in fundamental first aid to be save the victim is all right while we transport him to a medical facility. The SAR swimmer program is

operated on a voluntary basis. The individual must be either a 1st class swimmer or classified a Water Survival Safety Instructor to be considered," he continued.

"Each individual chosen attends a four-week school at San Diego, Calif. The program is devoted to heavy physical training and water rescue procedures

"My main duty is as an Aviation Supply Man when I'm not on a SAR call. I like flying, and SAR is the only way I can, in my present military occupational speciality.

"The training enables us to care for a person who is frantic. We are also taught to calm a victim and establish communication. Hopefully, all the training will result in a successful rescue.

"I'm always anxious when I have to go into the water. It's like a controlled fear. I'm sure all the swimmers will tell you that they get pretty fired-up when they yank someone out of the water.

"We're trained extensively to know how to handle a downed aircraft and pilot in trouble. However, most of our rescues are due to overturned boats and swimmers in distress.

"All SAR swimmers will admit," added Brooker, "that the SAR missions are team efforts. We can't get out to the scene of the emergency

without the pilots, and we can't get up or down without the SAR crew chief,' concluded Brooker.

"A crew chief has to be nominated by the squadron," said Sergeant Mike Gerke, SAR crew chief, SOMS, "He usually comes from flight-line mechanics and must be knowledgeable in all systems aboard the helicopter.

"An extensive 90-day training program begins for the crew chief after he has been nominated and is accepted.

"Pilots fly the aircraft, It's the crew chief's responsibility to fix anything that goes wrong during flight.

"A crew chief performs many water pickups, to become qualified. The crew chief must also familarize himself with the control box in the rear of the helicopter. It's used for maneuvering the helicopter over the victim without the pilot's aid," Gerke explained.

"Practice at night is also essential. The pilots can't see the horizon in the dark. The crew chief has to practice dropping flares to create an artificial horizon. Flares also help mark a survivor's position," added Gerke.

"A knowledge of hand-signals is also important for communication between the crew chief and swimmer.

"The crew chief is responsible for the aircraft preflight. It's about a two-hour long inspection of the aircraft to determine whether or not the helicopter is safe for flight. The preflight must be done correctly while still on the ground. It's not like a car. Once you're in the air, you just can't pull over to the side of the road and fix it," said Gerke.

The SAR crew also receives help from the station lifeguards. They assist in the wave zone, between shore and beginning wave.

"Our lifeguards work in two capacities during a joint SAR rescue," said SSgt Chuck Miller, noncommis-

sioned officer-in-charge, Water Safety Department, "A lifeguard could go up in the SAR helicopter and be deployed over the target area, or a lifeguard could swim through the waves to reach. the victim. The SAR bird could then hoist the victim and lifeguard to safety. Our lifeguards train with SAR swimmers to prepare for their joint rescue operations.

"We once had a double rescue off Pyramid Rock Beach," said Miller. There were two distressed swimmers unable to make it to shore. One lifeguard went into the water after a victim. Another lifeguard called PMO for assistance and went in after the other victim.

"The SAR helicopter arrived soon after, and hoisted all four to safety, The lifeguards couldn't bring their victims back to shore because of strong breakers.

"Generally, most people who come to Hawaii are very unfamiliar with ocean swimming," added Miller, "They think the oceans are very beautiful, but they don't take time to understand tieds, currents, or waves.

"Individuals should read all beach signs carefully and consult with the lifeguards before using a particular beach," warned Miller.

"There are also emergency telephones on every beach with lifeguards. These phones run directly to PMO and should be used upon sighting an emergency situation," he added.

"We contact SAR when the call comes into PMO," said Captain H.E. Tobey, Deputy Provost Marshal for Military Police Operations. "We go out to the scene of the emergency whenever SAR is activated.


"Our representative meets with a SAR representative to discuss coordination and crowd control if necessary.


"PMO also supervises the body recovery in cases of drowning and notifies the member's command," concluded Tobey.

"We research the incident and determine possible ways in which to avoid future problems," said Master Sergeant Wayne Baxter, Station Safety Office, "All aspects of individual incidents are taken into consideration and corrective measures are formulated."

All are components of the SAR operation, from the SAR pilots to Station Safety. Each has a specific part to play in their mission - to save







Family personifies Navy/Marine Corps team

When the term "Navy/Marine Corps team" comes to mind, one considers how each works handin-hand to accomplish its mission.

But, for a captain in 1st Radio Battalion here, having had a dad in the Marine Corps and two brothers and a sister-in-law in the Navy, Navy/Marine Corps team is a household term.

Captain Bob Destafney, supply

officer for 1stRadBn was promoted to his present rank by his brother. Navy Lieutenant tom Destafney, nide-de-camp for Rear Admiral H.H. Haynes, Commander, Pacific Division, Naval Facilities Engineer

Command at Pearl Harbor, Oct. 5: "I guess you can say that it all started with my dad, who is a retired master gunnery sergeant," said Destafney. "He served in the Corps for 25 years and now resides in Pensacolo, Fla."

When asked if there was any pressure to join the military, being the sons of a Marine, the captain replied, "I can honestly say that there was never any pressure to joint the Marine Corps or the Navy.

"I think, though, that having a father in the Corps when we were younger provided us with something to look at as an alternative, when we decided what we wanted to do with our lives," said Destafney.

"It was something to consider because it was a part of our background," said Destafney. "In fact, my brother Tommy, who promoted me, and I ended up in the service by accident. It was something that just happened."

Of the three sons, only one had a real desire to go into the military.

"My oldest brother Jim, a Lieutenant Commander in the Navy, is an F-14 pilot stationed in Miramar, Calif. As long as I can remember he has always wanted to be a pilot," said Destafney. "By hook or crook he was going to be a pilot in the Navy or Air Force," he

Capt. Destafney graduated from J. W. Woodham High School in Pensacola in 1974. He was awarded a scholarship to play

football at Tulane University. New Orleans, "I was very happy about that because I was going to play major college football close to

Destafney's desire for a military career came shortly thereafter. "After I signed the scholarship, I got a call from George Walsh, the head football coach at the Naval Academy who is now the head coach at the University of Virginia. They flew me up to the Academy for a weekend and I liked what I saw. There was a lot. of camraderie and a very disciplined environment. It presented a challenge I couldn't walk away from."

"Although I signed to play football at Tulane, I knew that, after that weekend at the Academy, that's where I was going to school," said Destafney.

"I knew I would come out a Marine or Naval officer," said Destafney, "I think my father was happy that I was doing something I wanted to do.

It was not until his last year at the Academy that Destafney decided to become a Marine

"I was going to be a surface line officer in the Navy," said Destafney "But, the thing that interested me in the Marine Corps was the Marine instructors at the Academy. The quality of the Marine officers there was outstanding, and I decided that's what I wanted to be a part of."

"My brother Tom, who is a year

older than I, surprised us all by joining the Navy. He went to the University of Florida and got a degree in Civil Engineering. In his senior year of college, he went to a Civil Engineer Corps presentation put on by the Navy

Tom saw that the Navy would provide him with the opportunity to work in the civil engineering field right away and that he wouldn't have to start at the bottom of some firm and work his way up. So there was no real pressure. We were presented an opportunity and took advantage

Capt. Destafney has two more brothers and a sister who are not in the military.

"They share our pride in serving in the Navy and Marine Corps, said Destafney. "The military has always been a part of our family and I guess you can say we followed our father's footsteps."

before we knew it we were training at Marine Corps Air Station, El Toro, Calif., and then we were in Atami Japan By this time, we were ready to go."

The rugged terrain of a bleak Inchon peninsula in northern South Korea was Armstrong's first introduction to the war in late 1950. Not only was this a new country and new situation for the mechanic but he was working with jets in a combat situation for the first time.

"The terrain was different and the circumstances slightly altered but we were all there for the same reason. We had a job to do and we were going to do it come hell or high water" he said proudly, raising seven rows of ribbons as he inhaled, "We had reached 90 percent efficiency with the props so we all knew that jets would be in the future of aviation There was nowhere else to go. We worked in the horribly cold environment as best we could providing the Marines on the ground with close air support That was our mission. Keeping them in the air was mine I got a chill running up my spine as those old F-9F Grumman Panthers ripped a black trail through the overcast skies of Korea.

Armstrong hated to see the props take second place to the jets but knew inside they were better.

"The jets were fine aircraft. The finest there were," continued the aviation mechanic. "Things began to get complicated in the aviation field though. It used to be, the first person the pilot saw was the mechanic and the last person he saw after his mission was the

"When fighting in Vietnam broke out, it was a time of decision for me," pondered Armstrong, "I chose to go active duty instead of waiting for my reserve squadron to be called back. I figured that Vietnam was going to become a fullfledged war so I decided to get in and get a good spot before it got too crowded.

In April 1969, he was shipped over to Vietnam. He spent his oneyear tour at Marble Mountain before returning stateside in the spring of 1970.

accelerated across about 90 feet of open parking lot, crashing through a chest-high, 20-foot-deep barbed wire fence separating the public area of the airport from the Marine compound and entering a second parking lot used by

The truck crossed about 100 feet of the second parking lot, then went around or over a seven-foothigh sandbag emplacement, comprising a Marine guard post, to confront a waist-high brick and concrete wall extending well to either side of the Marine headquarters building and the building that was destroyed. The truck crashed through a 15-foot-wide chain link fence in the center of that wall.

The truck bounced over a final barrier of buried steel sewer pipes projecting about two feet above the ground and drove into the building, reaching at least the lobby, and possibly the atrium farther inside the building.

Jordan, the Marine spokesman in Beirut, said that a sentry fired five shots at the truck and that a guard sergeant managed to radio an alert to the nearby Marine headquarters building just before the explosion.

"Many who survived were the ones blown out of the building.

Jordan said. "The dead, the dying and the living were all mixed up

with the debris. The Los Angeles Times Service article also stated that almost simultaneously, the same grisly scene took place at the building housing the French. That structure was not nearly so heavily guarded as the Marine compound and General Cann, the French commander, said two French troops were killed trying to stop the truck.

The truck, which apparently carried less explosives than the

was driven into the front of thebuilding and detonated.

The eight-story building was lifted from its foundation by the blast and collapsed in a heap, the story stated.

Six and a half hours after the explosion, Colonel Timothy Geraghty, the U.S. Marine commander in Lebanon, issued a statement saying: "These kinds of things just harden our resolve in that we will continue to do what we came here to do and that is to provide assistance for a free and independent Lebanon," the article

Station removes asbestos

Down through the ages, products have been invented to make life better.

Although products are created for the good of mankind, occasionally some are discovered to have adverse side effects. One such product is

In small quantities, asbestos does not pose a health threat. In fact, asbestos is present in many products that people come in contact with every day.

It can be found in everything from cement and heat-resistant textiles to gaskets and brake linings. Due to its many uses - plus its natural existence - asbestos fibers are found in the air, water and in food.

Asbestos as a product has been known and used for more than 2,000 years. The ancient Romans dressed their dead in robes made of asbestos to retain their ashes after cremation. The French emperor Charlemagne had linens made from asbestos. These he would pass through fire to clean in an effort to impress his captured enemies.

Today, due to its ability to resist heat and chemical attack, coupled with its flexibility and high tensile strength, asbestos is found in thousands of commercial products.

But with all of this asbestos around, at what point does it begin to present a health hazard?

Asbestos in small quantities or in an undisturbed condition is not a health risk," said Gunnery Sergeant John Bednar, safety noncommissioned officer with the Station Safety Office. "When asbestos is damaged, it releases dust-like fibers into the air. Breathing in these fibers causes the health problems."

Identifying damaged asbestos is only one of the many missions of the Station Safety Office.

They also monitor asbestos clean-ups and enforce proper disposal of asbestos wastes.

"If we receive a call on damaged asbestos, we respond immediately," said Bednar. "We take a sample of the suspected asbestos and have an industrial hygienist at Naval Regional Medical Center, Pearl Harbor, run tests on it. If it tests positive, we make arrangements through the Facilities Department to have the damaged asbestos removed as soon as possible.

Before the Facilities Department workers begin removing asbestos, the Station Safety Office monitors the asbestos level in the area to establish a base-line of how much asbestos fiber is in the air.

While the asbestos is being removed, fiber levels are again monitored to determine the amount of fibers being breathed by the workers. Extreme precautions are taken to protect the

workers from exposure to asbestos during removal projects. According to Cecil Hasegawa, Facilities

Department, workers are required to wear respirators and full-body coveralls when involved with asbestos clean-ups. "We ensure that our people are as safe as

possible when they deal with asbestos," said Hasegawa. "But then, safety is the whole idea behind asbestos removal." Once the asbestos has been removed from an

area, the Station Safety Officer takes another fiber count. This final count is to ensure the asbestos levels in that area are within standards set by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration.

The final stage of an asbestos removal project is the disposal of the waste.

First, the asbestos waste is wetted down to keep dust and airborne fibers to a minimum. Next, the asbestos is placed in an industrial strength plastic bag and sealed. This is then placed in another plastic bag and sealed as a further safety precaution.

The final stage of the disposal ensures that no one will come into contact with the asbestos for

a very long time - possibly forever. "When we have a load of asbestos to dispose of, we have it buried at the Kapaa Landfill,' said Hasegawa, "We contact the landfill when we are ready to dispose of it, and they prepare a special area for us. Once we unload the bags of asbestos, they are buried immediately.

But as useful as these plastic bags are, they have caused trouble for the Station Safety Office on more than one occasion.

According to Bednar, the bright red plastic bags with "CAUTION ASBESTOS" in large white letters on the side, are readily available for purchase at Serv Mart. .

Some units buy the bags at Serv Mart because they are stronger than regular trash bags," said Bednar. "We receive calls from concerned individuals telling us they saw these big red bags, full of who-knows-what, sitting somewhere. We investigate every call, so this becomes quite time-consuming.

Bednar added that these "false alarms" subtract from the time the Station Safety Office could be devoting to other asbestos related projects.

One such recently completed project was in the lower deck of Building 220.

The ceiling in one section of the building was made of asbestos insulation. The insulation had been badly damaged by someone wielding a pool stick.

Once the area had been identified as a potential health hazard, the Station Safety

MULE locates targets

A laser that will "light the way" for laser-guided weapons and conventional artillery has been ordered into production for the Marine Corps

The device, called Modular Universal Laser Equipment (MULE). is a combination laser rangefinder and target designator that can be hand held or used with a tripod.

Hughes Aircraft Company's Electro Optical and Data Systems Group will produce 131 MULEs under a contract managed for the

Marine Corps by the Army Missile Command. MULE passed rugged operational tests conducted under simulated combat conditions at the Marine Corps Air/Ground

Combat Training Center, 29 Palms, Calif. During these tests, MULE designated targets for Copperhead, a 155mm laser-guided artillery projectile; laser-guided bombs; and the Hellfire laser-guided missile. It also pinpointed targets for

aircraft equipped with laser spot trackers. Laser-homing weapons sense the laser light reflected, invisible, pulsed light with aerodynamic control surfaces or other steering





Navy Relief nurses donate medical time

Since 1922, Navy Relief Visiting Nurses have been an important part of the support provided to Navy and Marine Corps communities at selected auxiliaries world-wide

These nurses, whether Society employees or selfless volunteers, are licensed, registered nurses who work closely with military medical facilities to provide home nursing assistance.

The Hawaiian Auxiliary nurses spend most of their time visiting first and second-time mothers and their infants. The arrival of a new family member means added responsibilities for all sea service parents, and many here in Hawaii keenly feel the absence of deployed family members.

The visiting nurse instructs these new parents on current child care techniques, provides home health education, encouragement and support, and acts as a liaison to community health programs. If further medical attention is required for mother or child, the nurses' close working relationship with their medical facility's staff will provide prompt referral and treatment.

As maternal/child case load permits, Navy Relief nurses also visit retirees, elderly widows or widowers, and post-operative patients who may need assistance.

Although the nurses do not provide bedside nursing, they will teach basic bedside care techniques to family members so that patients may remain in their home environment. These home visits can be particularly comforting to concerned family members, knowing that the military community is vitally interested in their

well-being. Navy Relief Visiting Nurse service is free. Referrals to the nurses are made by military medical officers, civilian health care providers, local commands, interested friends and

relatives To request a visit, call 423-1314. Because the nurses spend most of their days on the road, requests will be noted by a Society volunteer, and a nurse will return the call.

Office and Facilities Department quickly moved in to rectify the situation.

Using every safety precaution available, the asbestos was removed and disposed of to minimize the chance of anyone being exposed to the asbestos fibers. But what happens if someone has possibly

been exposed to asbestos?

According to Lieutenant Commander Douglas Eubanks, asbestos officer and flight surgeon with Naval Regional Medical Clinic, Kancohe Bay, possible victims of asbestos exposure are monitored for years to ensure any negative effects are identified and treated as soon as possible.

"As soon as someone has been exposed, we give them an asbestos physical," said Eubanks. The physical is broken down into two parts. The first is a test to determine the amount of air the individual can inhale and exhale. The second part is a series of X-rays of the lungs.

"The amount of asbestos we think that person was exposed to regulates whether he returns for another asbestos physical every one, three, or five years. The tests conducted at the initial asbestos physical give us a base-line to measure his condition in later years.

The job of monitoring asbestos and its related problems is by no means an easy or uncomplicated task. The group of professionals assigned this mission ensure that every possible precaution is taken to put an extra margin of safety between the residents of the air station and possibly harmful exposure to

The unit is not capable of generating certificates of registration or ownership, but will offer motor vehicle information and forms for all types of transactions. The unit will also issue out-of-state vehicle permits. Hawaii licensing for out-of-state registered vehicles being registered in Hawaii for the first time and processing of renewals are available.

Parents may rate IDs

WASHINGTON - Marines providing principle support (at least 51 percent) for their parents or parents in law, should be aware that those dependents may be eligible for an ID card authorizing commissary, theater and exchange privileges.

However, officials emphasize that medical care for dependent parents in uniformed services facilities is on a space available basis only. Parents and parents-in-law are not eligible for medical care under the Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Uniformed Services under any circumstances.

Unfortunately, some service members may have been "lulled" into the false security of "presuming" that there is available medical care when, in fact, there may not be.

It is possible that military medical services could be available initially, but conditions could change, requiring a parent or parents-in-law to be discharged from the military facility to civilian sources of care. In these instances, when the dependent parent is no longer provided care from military facilities, the service will not pick up the cost, officials explained.

The fact that availability of direct medical care for dependent parents or parents-in-law is not guaranteed must be stressed, officials said. Sponsors are urged to check Item 15B of the ID card issued to their dependent parent. If it indicates eligibility for care from civilian medical sources, it is in error and should be turned in immediately for a correct card.

Additionally, staff judge advocate officials explained that for a parent or parent in law to be classified as a dependent, they must reside with their military sponsor.



Alcohol impairs actions

The National Institute of Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism has published the following behavioral impairments at specified blood alcohol content levels:

At .03 percent - a person's ability to distinguish close but separately moving objects

At .05 percent - there are discernible changes in one's capacity for thought and judgement, i.e., skill performance such as parking maneuvers.

At .08 percent - significant impairment in adapting to variations in light and dividing attention between tasks takes place.

At .10 percent - voluntary motor actions such as hand and arm movements, walking and speech, become impaired,

At .20 percent - control by the entire motor area of the brain becomes significantly impaired. Individual is extremely uncoordinated.

At .30 percent - individual becomes unconscious.

How do BAC's add up from vision fuzziness to unconsciousness? The following is a brief list of what one drink will do, BAD-wise, for a person weighing 180 pounds:

Regular beer (12 ounce serving; 4 percent alcohol) - .02 BAC.

Red/white wine (3 ounce serving; 12 percent alcohol) - .02 BAC.

Hard liquor (whiskey, vodka, etc; 1 ounce serving at 45 percent alcohol) - .02 BAC.

Old fashioned, daiquiri or alexander (4 ounce serving at 15 percent alcohol) - .03 BAC.

Highballs (8 ounce serving; 7 percent alcohol) .03 BAC.

Martini, manhattan (3.5 ounce serving at 30

percent alcohol) - .04 BAC. For lighter persons, the BAC would be proportionately higher, for heavier people, lower. The four factors which influence an individual's BAC are: amount of alcohol, whether the drinker has eaten prior to or during

drinking, how much a person weighs and how

NIAAA warns that how you think you feel after a couple of drinks is not a good enough indicator to put your life, or someone else's, in jeopardy by driving after drinking. While how much alcohol is consumed, how much one eats, how much one weighs, and how quickly the drinks are consumed all make for variable BAC's, the fact that alcohol does impair a much time expires after drinking or between person's behavior and judgement remains drinks. Alcohol leaves the body at constant.
