

## **Uniform policy spelled-out** by Station Commander

MEB are not affected by the policy.

That message is dated Oct. 16 and it's about the fastest written message you're going to get from Saudi Arabia, where mail delivery back to Kaneole Bay has been taking is long as three weeks. "Somehow word has spread back at K-Bay that mall is taking only four or five days," said 3d Marines' Executive Officer Lool, RL. Stevens. "I'm getting letters that my wife sent the first of my letters." "Stevens has been writing recularly for the past month

As a result, he's concerned that family tensions are rising. "The mail has brought some marital problems," said Regimental Chaplain Cmdr. Gordon Scheible. The problems have mani-fested as horror storles circu-inting around 3d Marines' base camp; stories of mes-

During nearly 30 years of active service, Kellogg has proven to those who've know him that the very blood that runs through his veins is rich with love of Corps.



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



"My higgest concern is not so much the families that are on base or those off base who are well-connected." he added. According to Scheible, many Marines here were pleasantly surprised by a full page of messages and photos from home in a recent issue of the Hawaii Marine. In

RETIRES/from A-3 the near lethal blast — thus saving lifs men. "It was a split-second decision, there really wasn't any time to think it over," said Kellogg. "Afterwards, I realized that I was still alive and pieced myself together." He suffered multiple inju-ries to his chest and stomach area and his right shoulder and arm, but Kellogg contin-ued to lead his men until they reached the relative safety of the company's perimeter.

This hereic and decisive action lead to his receipt of the Medal of Honor from President Richard M. Nixon in 1973. Kellogg became the 56th Marine to receive the Nation's highest award for gullantry.

Many of those who have worked with Kellogg say he does not like to be thought of as the Marine with the Medal of Honor, as much as he likes to be thought of as the sergeant major. "He's just as proud to be a sergeant major as he is a Medal of Honor recipient," Legarie said. "Not that he isn't proud to wear the medal, but being a sergeant major is also a very great accomplish-ment."

Kellogg has served in various Hawaii Marine Units since pleking up sergeant major in 1982. His first post at his present rank was with the Marine Barracks. In 1984 he was transferred to the Brigade. He was the ser-geant major of HMM-265, BSSG-1 and the 3d Marine Regiment, before assuming the duties of Brigade sergeant major. As he retires Kellogg see





Mark Curtis, who led the Navy to victory last year with his still unbro-ken record time of 9:26:22 and who had heen in the lead this year, was among several top triathletes who auffered injuries.

Granted, after 2.4 miles in the water and 112 m les on bikes across the wind-blown lava lands in 90 degree heat, even the best marathoners can go to pot, but what happed in the miles ahead was unfortunate. Curtis and John Houfek who had been leading the Navy team; and Castelli and McCavic who were leading the Air Force; were all victims of injury, most of them due to the heat. These were not the only military injuries, but the most significant.

Curtis dropped back from irst place to 14th; Houfek Curtis dropped back from first place to 14th; Houfek went from sixth place all the way back to 21st. Castelli ended up clocking a 12:57:17.7 and was the 24th out of the 27 military triath-letes who finished. McCavic finished 10th.

Luckily for the Air Force, Buonnugurio kept going strong and finished with a 10:02:23 two minutes behind Mulocco. Christopher Lewis (10:45:17) and John Powless (10:49:30) hecame the rest of the Air Force team.

the Air Force team. While not every one of the military triathletes were di-rectly involved in the battle for the trophy, they had their own personal hattle just to finish. They ranged in age from 22 to 53 and included one female; Julie Miller from Pearl Harbor. Miller was coincidentally the young 22-year old. She finished with a 14:55:15 and said she was happy just to have completed the grueling course at all. Rightly so.

Rightly so. Since it's first year in 1978, when only 12 of the 15 starters finished, the Ironman has been denying a small percentage of its entrants the pleasure of finishing. This year, 151 of the 1,386 start-ers from 49 states and 48 countries didn't finish. Two of the 30 military starters were among them. Both had completed past Ironman competitions and both suf-fered injuries on the course. Interestingly, Col. John Dooley, who was the oldest serviceman, was officially retired niter 36 years of active service during a ceremony retired after 38 years of active service during a ceremony held the day following the Ironman Competition. Dooley, with a 14:55:15 this year, has had far better times in the past and has been involved with the race almost as long as the event has existed.

**TRAFFIC CONTROL DEVICES Traffic Schedule No. 90-10** 



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
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
