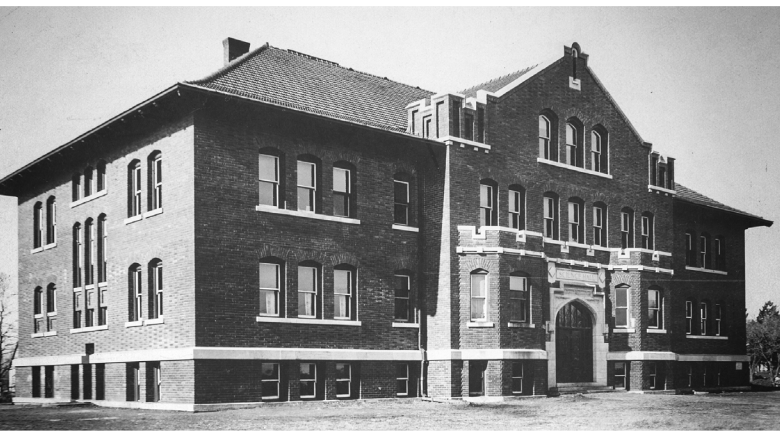

A BRIEF HISTORY OF **CENTRAL**



● 1884

Central Christian College of KS began on the plains of Nebraska as Orleans Seminary. Free Methodist preacher, Rev. C.M. Damon, and his wife started the school for all grade levels – from elementary through post-high school.

● 1914

The school was moved to its present location in McPherson, Kansas, and took on the new name Central Academy and College.

● 1923

Central receives accreditation from the state of Kansas as a Junior College, starting the institution down the path to becoming the oldest junior college in the state of Kansas.

● 1991

Transitioning from a junior college to a four-year institution, Central received accreditation from the North Central Association to award its first bachelor's degree in Ministry followed soon after with a Business Degree.

● 1999

Central changed its name to Central Christian College of Kansas to reflect its new status as a regional four-year baccalaureate Christian institution of higher education.

● 2011

Central launched its online program, the School of Professional Education.

NEW PARAPROFESSIONAL PROGRAM

LAUNCHING 2019

For most students, one of the most daunting, difficult steps on the path to adulthood is the ground between graduating with their degree and getting their first job. As students start the hunt for an occupational home, the loudest lament is nearly always, "...but they want me to have two years of experience." It's the age old battle between needing a job to get experience and a job requiring applicants to have experience in order to be considered. In the eyes of about-to-be-graduated students, this situation can feel hopeless. This past year, Central's Education Department developed a program geared towards helping its students navigate these murky waters.

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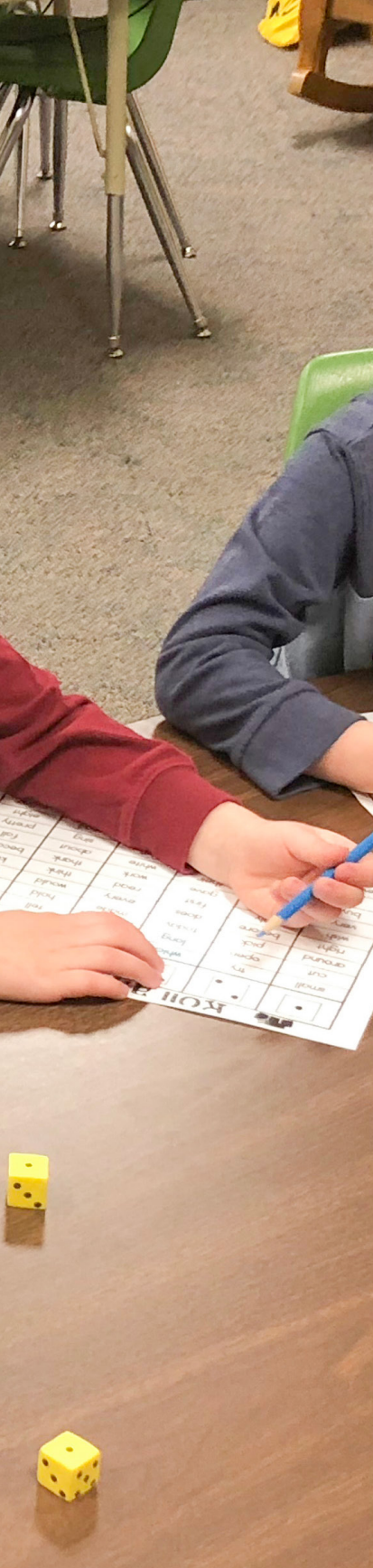
Our new Paraprofessional Program is an opportunity for outstanding Education majors to get real-life, on-the-job experience in the classroom while they earn their degree at Central. Over the past year, the Teacher Education Department has been working hard to nurture a good relationship with the McPherson school district, and in doing so even secured sizable funding to help underwrite an after-school program at Roosevelt Elementary School. This Paraprofessional Program is another unifying measure that deepens the connection between Central and the McPherson community – all while enriching the learning experience of our future teachers.

All Central Education majors who find themselves in good academic standing can apply for the program. Receiving a recommendation from Central's Education Department automatically guarantees our

students an interview and places them at the top of the list of applicants for the available positions. For students who get hired on in the program, they will be able to meet necessary classroom time requirements while getting paid above minimum wage for up to 17 hours a week. Instead of completing some degree requirements as an unpaid student, they gain the same level of hands-on experience while being an actual employee of the school for which they are working.

When these students graduate with their degree, they also graduate with 2 years of on-the-job experience in their field. Central students who successfully complete the Paraprofessional Program will not only cultivate an outstanding educational resume, but will also have garnered tangible work knowledge. This program offers them the opportunity to develop relationships with local teachers, principals, and superintendents – all of which are worthwhile connections for young graduates on the hunt for their first teaching job. The Paraprofessional Program will offer Central's Education Department students workplace mentorship and a unique environment to put their classroom learning to use. Unlike most off-campus jobs, the Paraprofessional Program is specifically designed for busy college students with hectic class and athletic schedules: it is tailor made for Central's students.

The mission of Central Christian College of Kansas is to provide an education for the whole student: heart, mind, soul, and body. The Paraprofessional Program is a bright and shining example of our commitment to that mission. Our heart for the students who come to this campus extends beyond the classroom. In fact, the classroom is just a small piece of the puzzle. These opportunities are about more than the success of our graduates: they're about helping our students find God's calling for their lives. The future of our Education Department is limitless, and, because of their tireless dedication to our students, so is the future of Central Christian College of Kansas.

STEVEN BRUNS, PH. D.
*Chair of the Ministry and
Theology Department*

Dr. Steven Bruns joined Central's faculty in 2016. Prior to CCKK, he was a pastor with the United Methodist Church and currently pastoring within the Free Methodist Church. Dr. Bruns received his B.A. from the University of Florida in 1997; his M.Div. from Asbury Theological Seminary in 2001; his M.A. from St. Vladimir's Orthodox Theological Seminary in 2013; and his Ph.D. from Middlesex University/London School of Theology in 2011.

BRUNS PUBLISHES TWO NEW BOOKS

Dr. Steven Bruns published two books in 2018: *Full Tables, Closed Doors, Open Fields: The Changing Shape of Grace as American Methodists Move from Immigrant Society to Indigenous Church* (2018), and *Introduction to Christian Worship: Grammar, Theology, & Practice* (2018). Dr. Bruns penned these works while serving as the Chairman of our Ministry and Theology Department, where he holds the title of Edris & Albert Chaney Bible Lecturer. While most of his time is spent challenging minds in the classroom at Central, Bruns' passion for historical theology and ministry has overflowed to outside of the walls Central Christian College of Kansas.

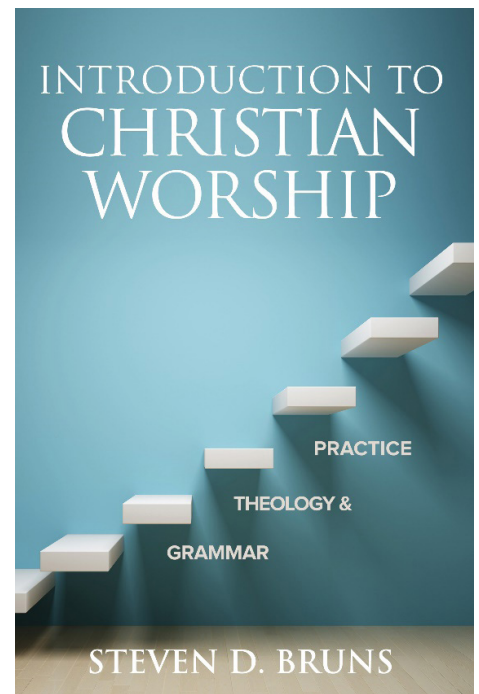
For *Introduction to Christian Worship*, Bruns explained that he wanted to provide a more relatable conversation about worship. He states, "I wrote this book because, while there are several good resources available on specific issues in worship or specific types of worship, there was not a broad overview of worship. Also, much of the writing on worship is geared towards theologians or ministry professionals. This book is written so that people without a theological background can understand it." He keeps the conversation applicable to real-life Father-worship, totally avoiding making his assertions off-putting or too high-brow: theologians and everyman alike can benefit from his work.

In the book, Dr. Bruns challenges the contemporary role of worship as a tool in evangelism. He asserts that, by definition, worship is God-focused and evangelism is people-focused, and that churches that confuse the two do neither well. Dr. Bruns explains that worship has always been meant for humans gathering together to offer praise and thanksgiving back to God for the grace they had received, while evangelism has always been concerned with introducing new people to the grace-giving God in Jesus Christ.

Bruns uses the metaphor of grammar to explain the function and form of worship: sentences can take on many forms of sim-

licity or complexity, but, as long as they follow the rules of grammar, they are correct. Worship can be looked at in the same way. It can take on a multitude of forms and styles, but, as long as it contains two movements, it is worship. To put it simply, worship must contain two movements to be correct: an opportunity for us to draw near to God, and then for God to draw near to us. Bruns explains all of this in a way that is honest, authentic, and a little bit earthy. Readers won't need a degree in Theology to understand and benefit from Bruns' sharp, fascinating writing.

It's one thing to be an impressive person, but it is undeniably more impressive to be an accomplished person with a meaningful purpose in life. That's the beauty of a place like Central: no one finds their way here without the Lord directing their steps. We are immersed in a sea of students, faculty, staff, and leaders who are all steadfast in hearing the Father's voice as He speaks their calling. The accomplishments of our faculty in 2018 are a tangible reminder of the grandeur of our God and the vision He has for Central Christian College of Kansas.

Dr. Dean Kroeker has recently published a book, *From the Land of Pigs and Indians*. His gripping non-fiction novel tells the story of Dr. Kroeker and the love of his life, Betty, and their time as a young family living as missionaries in the jungles of Brazil.

From near-death experiences to showing native groups the wonder of a power saw, Dr. Kroeker reminds us how wonderful and powerful God is through his storytelling. "As we began unabashedly following where the Lord was leading, we discovered how He had made us into exactly who we needed to be for this journey. The abnormal loves of our lives led us on a journey of serving and sharing the love of God to the hidden people of the world. And it all started with a man who was obsessed with pigs and a woman who was obsessed with Indians," Kroeker details.

STATE LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE

This year, Central attended the 68th annual Phi Beta Lambda State Leadership Conference at Butler Community College. CAMPUS LIFE

At Central Christian College, we believe that life-long learning happens outside of the classroom, as well as in. We encourage and attempt to facilitate an atmosphere where Central invites students to share their talents, skills, and interests with the campus community. Getting involved is one of the best things each student can do to develop new friendships, create new experiences, and make the most of their Central experience.

A yearly tradition, Connections Week is a week full of activities for new and returning students, sponsored by our student government association. This is a great time to forge new friendships that will last the entire year, and Lord willing – a lifetime. Student government also sponsors intramural athletics for the entire campus community. On top of that, campus activities board (CAB) sponsors many social events on campus, including \$3 Tuesday movies downtown, late night breakfast, and more.

This year we conducted our first ever Engage, or “Spiritual Emphasis Days”. We invited pastor, author, and speaker Andy

Addis of Crosspoint Church of Hutchinson, Kansas, to come deliver meaningful messages on what it means to Engage with eternal things: God, God’s Word, and People. During the sessions, many heard the Gospel of Christ for the first time and responded by entering into a relationship with Him. At the culmination of Engage, the entire school shut down to serve the broader community of McPherson. In total, we saved the city of McPherson and surrounding communities a near total of \$10,000 in labor.

After Engage was completed, a need arose to mentor the young men and women who needed to be connected to someone who could teach more about Christ. Thus, Connect was born. Connect is a formal way to plug students who desire a relationship with Christ to be connected to a staff member for discipleship.

In addition to Engage and Connect, we have weekly Convocations and Chapels for our student body to attend. Convocations are a time to engage a topic from an academic viewpoint (or a supplement of the curriculum) from a Christian Worldview. Chapels are a time of worship and



exegetical preaching. These too, have been an extraordinary time of bringing people before the throne of Christ.

The total of these efforts culminates with a student experience that is well-rounded and holistic and supports the student in the seven areas of wellness as well as the Fit Four mission statement.

WOMEN'S WRESTLING



In the first official season for the Central Christian College of Kansas women's wrestling, the Lady Tigers were invited to the 2019 NAIA Women's Wrestling National Championships in Jamestown, North Dakota. They finished their inaugural season as the #19 team in the country.

Coach Don Schreimann travelled with Citli Palifox, Kim Lambert, and Pella Wisniowski to the tournament. Wisniowski made Tiger history as the first Lady Tiger to collect a win at the NAIA Women's Wrestling National Championships. Coach Schreimann expressed his pleasure with his team's performance, saying, *"Pella wrestled extremely well. She stepped up to the competition and fought hard. It was a fantastic learning experience for all of them. Next year they will be able to lead our team having been to the big show already."*

STUDENT-ATHLETES HIGHLIGHTS



WOMEN'S SOCCER

For the third time in four seasons, the Central Christian College of Kansas women's soccer team made an appearance in the NCCAA National Championship. In 2015, 2016, and 2018, the Lady Tigers received an at-large bid to compete for the NCCAA National Tournament. The Tigers headed into the tournament as the 7th seed.

The Lady Tigers garnered attention for their competitive efforts, with 7 players receiving NCCAA All-Region recognition for the Central Region. Coming into the tournament, they were slated to play against two of the top seeded teams and two of the top teams in the nation. This uphill battle was fought valiantly, and even with such tough competition, two Lady Tigers walked away with all conference recognition, De Ann Jo Balencia on the All-Tournament Team, and Alexa Riddle bringing in a Second Team All-Tournament. Riddle and Alyssa Emery also received Second Team All-Sooner Athletic Conference.



MEN'S & WOMEN'S GOLF



The Central Christian College of Kansas men's and women's golf teams finished their three day run at the NCCAA Golf National Championship with the men finishing 9th out of 12 teams, and the women finishing in the top ten teams. This was the first time in over 10 years that the Tigers had sent a full men's team to the national tournament, while there has never been a women's team to represent Central at the national tournament.

On the men's side, Tigers Lowell Stephens, Collin Duckworth, Fischer Kautsch, Nathan Segler, and Trehern McGill were the team's top five on the tournament. The Tiger men's total team score ended up being 966.

On the women's side, Kendra Jellison, Kari Kirl, Bailly Bowman, Vanessa Warner, Alyssa Ramirez were the top five that led the team to competitive play at the tournament. The team total for the tournament was 1124.

HALL OF FAME

Seventy-five years ago, Central Christian College, as it is known today, played a critical role in starting intercollegiate athletics at the Free Methodist colleges. J.T. Pyle (father of Ed and Glenn) and G. Ray Phillippi, both Central College Trustees, successfully proposed to the General Conference the creation of a basketball league for the colleges affiliated with the church.

Without our pivotal vote in 1943, the denominational schools would not have received over 58 national championship titles and launched the athletic careers of numerous Olympians. Since this pivotal moment, Central has grown to include 15 athletic programs made up of both men's and women's sports. To celebrate the 75th anniversary of intercollegiate sports, Central hosted a momentous Hall of Fame event on February 26, 2019, where they inducted eight memorable alumni into the HOF: Howard Krober (CC'46), Mike Saxton (CC'64), Marvin Sellberg (CC'46), Milt Fuller (CC'61), Tom Griffith (CC'58), Don Mason (CC'57), Galen Myers (CC'62), and Johnny Taylor (CC'61).





AN INTERVIEW WITH THE MALONES

There's a common quote in the motivational speaking circuit that goes something to the tune of "show me your five closest friends and I'll show you your future." If we, as individuals, are all supposedly a sum of the people closest to us, then the higher-educational equivalent to such a thought would have to be measured through alumni. Our Central family tree is the very definition of who WE are as an institution. We are our alumni and our alumni are us: our future is undoubtedly created by the kind of people that come out of Central Christian College of Kansas. This thought – this fact, really – is just another reminder that Central is a special place filled with special people. Our future history is created by who we associate ourselves with today. The world knows the Legend of Central through our alumni family.

In a world that often feels like it's getting more and more self-centered, it is incredibly rare to find people dedicated to put the notion of more, more, more totally out of their lifestyle – and yet, there are people like the Jerry and Nancy Malone out there doing just that. We were honored to have an opportunity to learn more about what the Malones are doing

in the world and left feeling incredibly lucky to have such interesting, daring people in our family tree.

Q: How do you explain what you two are doing right now?

A: We are serving missionaries and pastors around the world. In addition, we have served two Christian Colleges: Central and Greenville. We want to bless them and encourage them in their work. We also are seeing the world in a "living" sort of way – not as tourists, but by living in the countries for at least 3 months ([which is] the length of time that [we are allowed to stay] on a normal passport).

Q: How did you go from planning for retirement to starting a new direction of ministry?

A: Actually, it doesn't feel like a new direction of ministry. It just seems like a retirement that is different from playing golf and enjoying one's leisure time, [which] seems to be many retirees' dream. Our lives have been spent working in non-profit institutions, so why would that change in retirement?

Q: How do you think God has prepared you for this adventure?

A: It seems that He has prepared us over our lifetime to do this: He gave us a passion for missions. He gave us opportunities to do many short term missions with Adam Vincent and Al Mellinger. Jerry taught Sociology and Psychology and so, we love other cultures and how they live and do life. We saw Carpenters for Christ serving during their retirement, so we had a model of serving to follow – we just didn't see the USA because we have already seen much of America. We have always been involved in serving by working at Central Christian College and serving students, as well as serving at the NCCAA. We love people and love to serve. We have served on missions committees at all the churches that we have attended. We love to travel and see new things. We love adventures and are willing to take risks.

Q: So, do you literally only own just a tub and a suitcase?

A: We actually have 3 tubs of important items we leave in St. Louis, and we have kept our car. We leave the car with our son, Mike, who uses it. Literally, when we travel, we have 2 carry-on suitcases, 2 checked bags, and each of us carry a small backpack.

Q: How has God proven faithful in this process?

A: He has kept us safe and relatively healthy. He has also provided us with places to live that have been wonderful and reasonably priced. He has given us amazing experiences and we have made new friends for life.

Q: What has been the hardest part of leaving your life and becoming full-time missionaries?

A: We want to make it clear that we ARE NOT full-time missionaries. We actually really are not qualified or called to be missionaries. We just want to serve missionaries and those people that are serving full-time. We want to serve them and not the people they work with because it might hinder their work if we worked directly with their people. BUT by serving them (the missionaries), we can leave after 3 months and they have hopefully been refreshed and encouraged. [But], the hardest part of leaving is, of course, leaving family and friends for an extended period of time.

Q: Where have you served – who have you served with?

A: We do not work with any agency because they did not know what to do with us, so we just contact missionaries we know. Contacts have referred us to others and so the network is growing. We have served in London with a SERGE family, in Israel with a Baptist pastor, in Greece with FM missionaries who serve refugees, in the Dominican Republic and Costa Rica with SCORE International. We left March 5 to serve with FM's in Madrid and Bulgaria and back to Israel again.

Q: What is your goal for this season of life?

A: Our goal is simple: serve the people in any way we can and see the world.

Q: Do you have a life mission statement?

A: God gave us this scripture, Genesis 12: 1-3: "Go from your country, your people, and your father's household to the land I will show you. [I] will bless you and [you] will be a blessing to all nations[, all] peoples

of the earth will be blessed through you." This is the calling of Abraham, but, as believers, it now becomes our calling to bless all those we come into contact with because God has blessed us so that we can share that blessing.

Q: How has your marriage grown through this process?

A: Oh, my! It has been like a long honeymoon. When you get away from friends, family, and familiar surroundings and have only each other to depend upon, it can either make or break a marriage. In our case, it has enhanced our marriage a hundredfold. This was a big surprise and we did not expect it at all.

Q: What do you miss the most about the security and consistency of a "normal" retirement or life?

A: There is nothing we miss. As a matter of fact, we will never go back to the way things were because being free of possessions and "stuff" is wonderful. We can do things that we could never do before. We can live where we want for as long as we want – we are mobile and God can call us on a moment's notice and we can go. We do not like to be tied down anymore. Actually, we feel very secure in what we are doing. Normal retirement seems boring and selfish (all about us) and we can't do that. As believers, we are called to do more.

Q: What has been the biggest lesson you have learned through this process?

A: God loves the whole world – not just the United States. He is at work all over the world, especially with Muslims. It has made us more [sensitive] in terms of politics and we wish the USA would welcome immigrants because they need what we have: freedom and opportunities to work. We have fallen in love with other cultures. The world is hurting and God is the solution. God is listening to their cries and is calling people to bind up their wounds and heal the brokenhearted.

Q: How has your view of God been altered?

A: Oh – a bunch. Seeing the refugee crisis all over Europe and how God is sending people to serve them shows us that He sees and He cares. America is full of churches that could help but they only care about themselves, their safety, their possessions, their money, and suffer from the sin of pride and selfishness.

Q: How do you square your current lifestyle with that of most modern families?

A: It is counter-cultural. We are doing the opposite of what everyone is supposed to do and it was scary at first, but now that we are two years into the adventure, it seems normal.

In Memorium



JOHN FERRELL (1930 – 2019) AKA "MR. CENTRAL COLLEGE"

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In 1956, John was hired on at Central Christian College (then known as, simply, Central College). He would go on to serve in many capacities at Central including high school principal, college professor, Dean of Students, Director of Public Relations, Registrar, and Vice President of Development and Admissions. The College recognized him as an Academè of Achiever in 1985. He led numerous capital campaigns including the building of Wesley Black Auditorium, Briner Library/Reimer Business Center, Gillespie Hall, Kline Hall, Alleman Industrial Education Building, and the Mingenback Family Life Center.

John also instituted many new programs and projects including the Share Team Program, which focused on performing contemporary Christian music, the Resident Assistant Program, the Federal Work Study Program, the guidance office, the McPherson Business Drive, the Central Christian College/Wessington Springs College Archives and countless other strategies to help advance the institution. He had a keen intuition for understanding the present and seeing the future of Christian higher education. In 1993, John retired. Over the decades, he was known to many as "Mr. Central College".



KNELDRITH KLINE (1923 – 2019) AKA "KAY" | CCK FIRST LADY | 1964 – 1980

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In 1944, Kneldrith "Kay" married Bruce L. Kline with whom she shared 73 years and 79 days of married life. A graduate of Greenville College, Greenville, IL, Kay began teaching in 1945 at Wessington Springs College in SD, where Bruce taught and was an administrator. In 1959, Bruce joined the faculty at Central College in McPherson, KS. He was elected college president in 1964 and Kay became the first lady, energetically engaging with students, faculty and community.

In 1980, Kay and Bruce moved to Indiana to work for the Free Methodist Church of North America. Kay was a respected speaker for spiritual retreats, a noted editor, and an excellent writer. One of her books, Taking Charge, is in its 4th printing. In addition, Kay and Bruce invested time and resources in the Hungarian Evangelical Fellowship (HEF) in Budapest, Hungary for over 25 years. Bruce served as president of the HEF's John Wesley Theological College senate and Kay taught English and ministered, founding a program that provides shoes for needy Hungarian children. They lived in Budapest for a year in the early 1990's and returned 30 times to participate in HEF ministries. Kay and Bruce traveled internationally, deepening their appreciation for the breadth of God's kingdom.



MARGIE MASON (1937 – 2019)

CCCK FIRST LADY | 1996 – 2005

As first lady of this institution, Margie provided inspiration and care. Not only was she a stalwart companion to President Don Mason, she was a friend and help to every individual that called CCCK home. Caring for the sick, encouraging the down-trodden, cheering the participant, even to the point of committing to travelling with the cross-country team – if there was a place that kindness and grace could find root, there was Margie.

When asked about Margie, Calvin Hawkins, CC '65, reminisced with the following statement. "Margie was a sweet,

compassionate, caring person who was interested in every person she interacted with. She was an excellent First Lady for Central who enjoyed traveling with President Mason and visiting with alumni and friends across the US. When Don chose also to serve for a time as the Cross Country coach, she was by his side at team practices and meets, encouraging the student runners and providing healthy nourishment at practices. "

President Favara remembers how Margie was known for being a prolific writer of letters and notes. Margie touched lives of so many, encouraging them and exhorting them with the love of the Lord. Be-

hind each one of those notes and letters was a myriad of prayers. Fervently, Margie sought the Lord's ears on behalf of family, friends, students, even strangers. So deep was her love of others that she was known to include the names of those on the covers of magazines and periodicals.

Margie's love of God, support of her husband, and guidance and love of her children while reaching out in compassion to those around her has characterized her life. She ministered to so many and was especially known for her very encouraging notes and letters. She was truly a reflection of the virtuous woman of Proverbs 31.

Proverbs 31 held a special place in the heart of Margie. That passage provided her with a model, a standard by which to measure her own faithfulness and devotion to God. A review of the passage and familiarity with the love of Margie, demonstrates a life in alignment. However, we should be careful not to assume that Margie simply used this passage as a checklist. In verse 30, the passage reminds the reader that the real accomplishment is a life lived in fear of the Lord, demonstrated through humble submission and loving obedience. That is where Margie found the power to fulfill the role of a worthy woman.

We will miss her quiet, caring spirit but know that she's now in perfect health and in the care of her Heavenly Father.

I think about the amount of time it takes me to keep up with my studies and how consuming the extra curricular activities I'm involved in are. Honestly, when I think about how Central is impacting me today I find that 98% of the time I'm extremely exhausted! But what is college for, right?

As I think about it longer, however, I am hit with an overwhelming reality. Looking back on the last three years and reflecting on all that I have been involved in since enrolling at Central three things specifically stood out to me. I think of the positions I hold or have held on campus.

One: I spent a year serving as a Resident

Advisor. Two: I am currently serving as the Student Body Chaplain of Community. Three: I was just recently elected as Student Body President for the 2019-2020 Academic School Year.

Now, I don't share this with you to toot my own horn or to reveal to you the things I've accomplished since being a student here. I share this with you because it is my desire that you see the impact that Central has on the students here - specifically me.

I came in as a freshman desiring really only one thing - an education in the field I am passionate about and called to. While I have absolutely received that, I have received so much more.
