
















Tough season for girls










Soccer Girls promote team spirit





Overall, the evening provided an informal setting for new acquaintances to be made. Sadie Hawkins proved to be an enjoyable evening for all.


A grand welcome for Dr. Eagen






The Grand Finale

Herb Nehlsen, Tom Kyle and Marilyn Laszlo kept the Student


Missionary Society informed about worldwide missions.

Other highlights of the year's missionary meetings included the 1981 Parade of AYCers, the Spring installation with cake and punch, and the AYC footwashing ceremony.










