DOD recall, back-pay bill mark Day 5

GOVERNMENT SHUTDOWN

WASHINGTON — For days lawmakers have debated which federal workers should be put back to work. Defense Secretary Chuck Hagel ended the argument Saturday for most Pentagon civilian employees, ordering nearly all 350,000 back on the job.

That's a large chunk of the estimated 800,000 federal workers on furlough because of the partial government shutdown. All those in the government off the job or working without paychecks would benefit from a bill the House approved Saturday without dissent that orders them to be paid once the shutdown ends.

The back-pay bill and Hagel's decision, based on a bill supported by Republicans and

back those workers even though the law allowed it.

On Capitol Hill, Republicans and Democrats continued to bicker and to ponder the chasm between their warring parties, each of which seems convinced it's on the winning side morally and politically. House Speaker John Boehner, asked Saturday whether Congress was any closer to resolving the impasse, replied: "No." Aides say he has not figured out how to end the gridlock.

Even the top bipartisan achievement of the shutdown's fifth day — agreeing to pay furloughed federal employees for the work days they are missing — was a thin victory. Congress made the same deal after the mid-1990s shutdowns, and Saturday's 407-0 vote was widely expected.

Speech to focus on plans

Clements: 'I think we're doing great'

Strategic planning, the national landscape for colleges and universities and budget priorities — though no shocking details — should highlight WVU President Jim Clements' State of the University Address set for Monday.

Clements said Saturday that he planned to talk about university budget priorities during his speech. Clements and other officials have previously mentioned the potential of future budget cuts. During the 2012-'13 budget year, WVU lost about \$18 million in state and federal funding. Officials have warned of the potential for further cuts this year.

Clements said he would address some of the budget priorities, though he said not to expect anything too surprising.

"We don't know what the budget is going to be next year," he said.

Officials are reviewing budget plans from various departments as WVU creates its next budget.

Overall, the university is doing well, Clements said.

"I think we're doing great," he said.

This will be Clements' fifth

Kephart said the look on the customer's face was incredible. The 25-year-old tried to give him back the ticket, but he wouldn't take it.

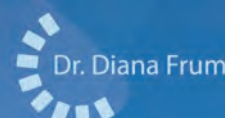
After collecting her money, she gave the patron some of her winnings.

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Kitchen fire destroys Masontown building

MASONTOWN — A two-story structure containing three apartments and a garage burned to the ground Saturday afternoon, Masontown Volunteer Fire Department (VFD) spokesman Dan Luzier reported.

The couple living in one apartment wasn't home at the time, he said. They lost everything in the 2:22 p.m. fire.

The structure is on Koury Run Road, Masontown. It runs between Snake Hill and Bull Run roads, he said.

A neighbor spotted a blaze from the kitchen area and called 911, he said. It is not considered a suspicious blaze.

Only one apartment was

occupied, he said, and he did not have the name of the occupants.

The other two had just been refinished, and had personal items stored in them.

The building belongs to Thomas Murry. A vehicle was destroyed as well, while a second vehicle had front end damage from the blaze, Luzier said.

The Red Cross was notified and is helping the couple, he said.

About 20 firefighters were at the scene, from Masontown, Reedsville and Cheat Lake VFDs, he said.

With temperatures in the 80s at that time, "it was hot," Luzier said. Firefighters were at the scene for four hours. KAMP Ambulance was also on scene.

Fort Hood trial cost government about \$5M

FORT WORTH, Texas — The U.S. government spent nearly \$5 million to court-martial and convict an Army psychiatrist in the 2009 Fort Hood shooting rampage, according to records reviewed by a North Texas television station.

The biggest pre-trial expense in Maj. Nidal Hasan's trial was more than \$1 million for transportation for witnesses, jurors and attorneys, according to Army records obtained by KXAS-TV of Fort Worth and Dallas. About \$90,000 was spent to house the witnesses.

Hasan was convicted in August of killing 13 people during the Nov. 5, 2009, shooting. More than 30 people were wounded.

The records also show that in the months before his trial, Army helicopters ferried Hasan 40 miles from the Bell County Jail to Fort Hood at a cost of more than \$194,000 so he could work on his defense in his private office. More than \$200,000 was spent on

trailers, apparently including the one that housed the private office.

In the past, Army officials have said the helicopter rides were needed to protect Hasan and his team from threats.

Hasan was not allowed to plead guilty to the charges under a military law regarding cases that could bring the death penalty. So, he served as his own defense attorney, called no witnesses and asked few questions.

The records show that another \$1 million was spent in expert witness fees.

Hasan remained on the Army payroll until 10 days after his conviction, collecting nearly \$300,000. Most was donated to charity, Hasan's civil attorney, John Galligan, has told The Associated Press.

The expenditures have outraged many of Hasan's victims and their relatives. Some victims have struggled to find jobs or pay medical bills since Hasan opened fire inside a crowded building on the Central Texas military base.

Bloody clothing visible at Ore. cabin where 2 shot

Michael Piete and his uncle, Kenneth Gilliland, had hunted deer together and with other relatives for years from a remote log cabin in the Blue Mountains of northeastern Oregon.

Their last hunting trip ended with them both being shot dead. Authorities said Piete's 14-year-old foster son shot them both, then ran off, but came back after accidentally shooting himself in the leg. Another of the hunting party held him at gunpoint and taped him to a chair until deputies arrived.

"I am just shocked," Homer Gentry, Piete's for-

mer stepfather, said Friday from his home in Baker City, Ore., upon learning of the Wednesday night shootings. Gentry said he hunted for years with both men, as well as the owner of the cabin, Gilliland's brother, Bill, the owner of a gas station and tire store on the coast. Gentry said he did not know the boy.

Piete, 43, grew up in Baker City, was married, and for a time worked on a state road crew, said Gentry, a retired school bus driver and mechanic for the Baker City schools. More recently Piete had been living on Gilliland's ranch outside Baker City.

Willey St. runoff irks city board

Morgantown Utility Board (MUB) General Manager Tim Ball said he doesn't know why stormwater controls were not put in place at the College Park construction site, off North Willey Street near Mountaineer Middle School.

The former site of the College Park Apartments will be the home of a new, 657-bed apartment complex under the same name.

The project is a public/private venture between WVU and American Campus Communities, which secured a \$44.2 million construction loan to begin work at the site.

Ball told last week's Morgantown City Council Committee of the Whole meeting that none of that money was used to keep water from running off the construction site, down over the wall at Willey Street and into residential areas.

"What we found when we visited the site Monday was that there's literally no stormwater improvements, no stormwater controls on site at this time," Ball said. "How that happens I can't tell

you. There's no reasonable explanation for that. It was, at best, a simple oversight on the part of multiple parties."

Ball said MUB sat with representatives from WVU, March-Westin Co. Inc., the project manager, and Green River Contracting and worked out a timetable for correcting the situation.

High-flying WVU flag returns home

Mountaineer Field at Milan Puskar Stadium at last Saturday's Mountaineers game touched the actual stars.

A Flying WV flag presented to the WVU Alumni Association during the first quarter was part of the last Space Shuttle Endeavour mission.

"I'm hoping people can take satisfaction that WVU was up in space with us, and they can use that to inspire the next generation of explorers," said Col. Mike Fincke, an astronaut who brought the flag aboard the shuttle.

Fincke flew it for WVU alumna Judy Haye. It will be displayed in Morgantown.

Endeavour was hardly Fincke's first time in space. He served two

six-month tours aboard the International Space Station, launching from Russian rockets. Fincke holds the record for most days by an American in space at 381, a record he wants someone to break.

In May 2011, as Endeavour readied for flight, Fincke was on board with a Flying WV flag.

While in space, he said, the crew flew the flag in a cargo container, and the other astronauts enjoyed seeing it hang for the 16-day mission.

Preston home gutted by blaze

MASONTOWN — A couple who live on Bull Run Road are being treated for burns at UPMC Mercy Hospital after an early Sunday fire destroyed their home.

Dan Luzier, Masontown Volunteer Fire Department spokesman, said four people lived at the house.

The owner, Eugene Mitter, and his wife, were taken to the Pittsburgh hospital by STAT MedEvac air ambulance, Luzier said.

A nursing supervisor at Mercy Hospital said Mitter was in critical condition Sunday evening,

while his wife was in serious condition.

A third person, who jumped out a window to escape the fire, was taken to Monongalia General Hospital for treatment of cuts and bruises, Luzier said.

The fire, called in at 4:34 a.m., destroyed the single-story house, a camper and an outbuilding, he said.

Clay-Battelle track star killed in crash

"You couldn't ask for a better kid. She's the best there is."

Those were the words of Clay-Battelle Middle/High School track coach James Dalton, talking about Sydney Rush, 16, who died in a single-vehicle crash Monday night on Mason-Dixon Highway (W.Va. 7).

Rush was a junior at the school and was involved in track as well as many other activities, including secretary of her class, the Senior High National Honor Society, and a member of the cheerleading squad.

Principal David Cottrell said counselors were available at the school Tuesday to help students through the grieving process.

State of the University address. It will be given before the Faculty Senate meeting at 3:15 p.m. Monday, in the Erickson Alumni Center. It will be streamed online at <http://webcast.wvu.edu>.

Clements said he also planned to give an update on where WVU stands at implementing its five goals as part of the 2020 Strategic Plan. The five goals are: To engage students in a challenging academic environment; excel in research; foster diversity; advance global engagement; and enhance the quality of life for West Virginians.

Clements said he planned to talk about the major areas at the university including enrollment, the importance of the land-grant mission and paint a picture about the national landscape for higher education.

Last year's State of the University address was highlighted by Clements

expressing anger and frustration with some students' behavior. His speech came days after numerous fires were set following WVU's football win against Texas.

The university is doing good on student behavior this year, Clements said. He noted the number of incidents referred to the student conduct office have been cut in half since 2009.

Clements said he likes giving the State of the University address, and it is a chance to get together and provide an update of where the university stands.

Faculty Senate Chairwoman Lisa DiBartolomeo said she thinks the speech is important for the faculty and staff. But, it's also good for the community because it lets them know about the university's plan.

DiBartolomeo said that she believes Clements will say that the university's current state is strong, though it is facing increased threats including more budget cuts and trying to do more with less.

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Marshall medical school off probationary status

HUNTINGTON — An accrediting authority for medical education programs has removed probationary status for Marshall University's medical school.

The Huntington university said Saturday that the Liaison Committee on Medical Education (LCME) lifted the probation at a meeting this past week and notified school officials Friday.

Marshall's medical school was placed on probation in June 2011. The board cited nine standards in noncompliance, one standard in compliance with a need for monitoring

and three standards in transition. Marshall lost an appeal of the decision but the school remained fully accredited the entire time.

The noncompliance areas include scholarship support that's well below the national mean, limited programs and practices to support student well-being, and not making efforts to broaden diversity among medical school applicants or recruit faculty and students from demographically diverse backgrounds. The committee also cited the lack of "scholarly activity" by faculty members and the lack of an affiliation agreement with

Riverpark Psychiatric Hospital. The committee said medical education programs must have written affiliation agreements with their clinical affiliates.

A team from the accrediting authority visited this school this summer to meet with administrators, faculty and students. Then reported its findings to the entire board.

"We've worked to create a culture of innovation and creativity in response to the LCME's review," said Joseph Shapiro, the dean of the Marshall University Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine. "Our students, residents, faculty and staff

have been encouraged to provide input, and their ideas have helped us shape what we think is an excellent model for medical education."

President Stephen J. Kopp said Marshall and the medical school will remain vigilant and continue to set the bar for improvement higher.

"This milestone has not been easily achieved and has involved a systemic culture change within the medical school," Kopp said in a statement Saturday. "Accreditation compliance work is ongoing and an incumbent responsibility of all concerned."

W.Va. Blue Book available online

CHARLESTON — The West Virginia Blue Book, now in its 92nd printing, is available for the first time on the West Virginia Legislature's website, Senate President Jeff Kessler, D-Marshall, announced.

First published in 1916, the Blue Book is a comprehensive reference guide of current officials in the executive, legislative and judicial branches of state government; federal officers and political leaders.

The Blue Book also contains information on state and federal agencies; the U.S. and State Constitu-

tions; and statistics on counties, municipalities and statewide organizations.

It is published every year by the Senate Clerk's office.

Senate Clerk Joseph M. Minard said the 2012 Blue Book is the result of hard work by Senate Parliamentarian Karl Lilly, now retired Senate Clerk Darrell E. Holmes and Legislative Services' staff.

"Everyone involved in putting together this book takes great pride in its publishing, both in print and now online," he said.

CHARLESTON, — Gov. Earl Ray Tomblin ordered all U.S. and West Virginia flags to be displayed at half-staff at government facilities today.

The lowering of the flags is part of the National Fallen Firefighters Memorial Service.

Eighty-one fallen firefighters will be honored at the service being held in Maryland. The service marks the beginning of National Fire Prevention Week, which runs through Saturday.

WVU director gets mine safety award

MORGANTOWN — The director of mining and industrial extension at WVU is being recognized for his commitment to coal mining safety.

The school said James Dean received the "Because of You" Safety Professional Award this past week, at the 2013 Spirit of

the Coalfields Miners' Celebration in Beckley.

Following the Sago and Aracoma disasters, Dean served as acting director of the state's Office of Miners' Health, Safety and Training at the request of then-Gov. Joe Manchin.

During his time at WVU, Dean has worked to develop a mobile training gallery and a simulated underground mine for emergency response training.

He serves on the West Virginia Mine Safety Technology Task Force and also is serving on a national committee to study how to equip miners to escape during a disaster.

Program focuses on science, math

INSTITUTE — A new program at West Virginia State University aims to increase the interest of young people in the fields of science, technology, engineering, agriculture and mathematics.

The program funded by the Dow Chemical Co. Foundation is designed for students ranging from kindergarten through

college age.

It will promote biology, chemistry and other science, technology, agriculture and math education, as well as expand opportunities for hands-on research among WVU students.

The \$150,000 commitment from Dow also will establish early college research participation opportunities for undergraduate students through the creation of 15 new internships for WVU freshmen and sophomores.

Officials said the first objective of the program is to increase awareness of and desire to participate in the fields through outreach to more than 6,000 K-12 students.

WVU grant supports child care services

WVU is getting federal funding to support campus-based child care services for low-income students.

The U.S. Department of Education recently awarded nearly \$9.2 million to 58 post-secondary institutions to establish or support campus-based child care services.

The school is getting more than \$161,000 through the Child Care Access Means Parents in School program.

Education officials said the grants help parents stay focused on their studies and graduation goals

so that they can build better lives for themselves and their children.

W.Va. Democrats postpone dinner

CHARLESTON — The West Virginia Democratic Party postponed its annual Jefferson-Jackson dinner due to the federal government shutdown.

West Virginia Democratic chairman Larry Puccio said Saturday that the dinner was rescheduled for Nov. 2 at the

Charleston Civic Center.

Puccio noted that the state's congressional delegation continues to focus on a solution to restore critical government services.

Vice President Joe Biden is set to deliver the keynote address at the dinner that will celebrate U.S. Sen. Jay Rockefeller's 50 years of public service to West Virginia.

Rockefeller announced in January that he will not seek a sixth term in 2014.



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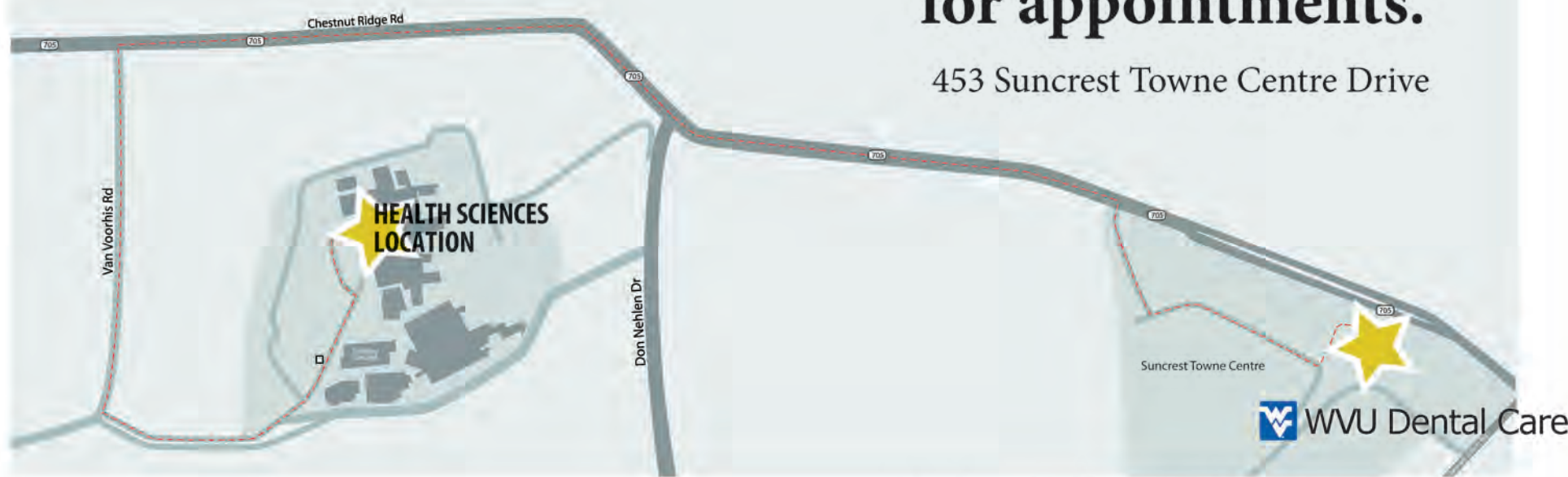

Located on Locust Avenue in Fairmont, the FRCC provides radiation therapy treatments to cancer patients through a machine called a linear accelerator, which delivers high-energy X-rays to tumors.

When the center officially joined WVU Hospitals on May 29, hospital officials announced that it would close on July 1 to allow for upgrades. Some areas of the facility remain unchanged, while others underwent renovations.

Services available at the FRCC include advanced external beam radiation therapy treatment techniques, including Intensity Modulated Radiation Therapy for treatment of tumors in the prostate, head and neck, lung and other appropriate sites.

Patients at the Fairmont Regional Cancer Center will also have access to specialized treatments on the WVU Healthcare campus, including Perfexion Gamma Knife for brain metastases and selected brain tumors, high dose rate brachytherapy for gynecologic tumors and Stereotactic Body Radiation Therapy (SBRT).

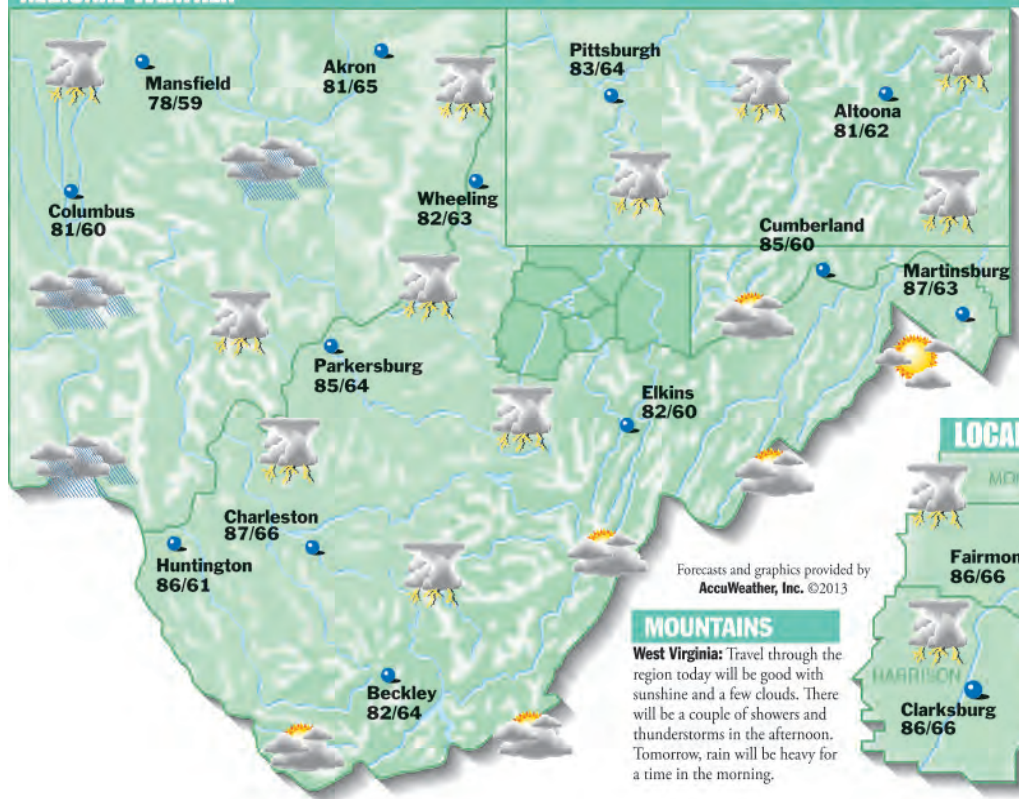

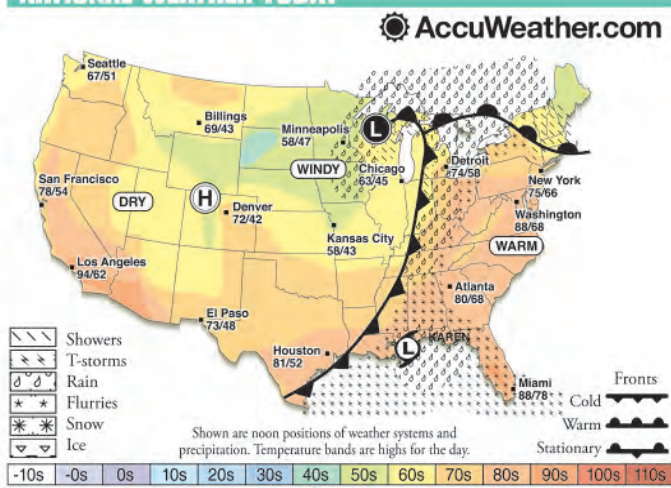

Shutdown makes very little sense

That's not true. I'm just projecting myself into the world of federal employees who find themselves not only not working or getting paid, but also not sure how long their unpaid furlough will continue.

Think about that for a minute. On Monday, you were at your government job, doing what you always do, knowing you'll be paid a certain rate and that you'll collect it on your next payday.

And then the "business" closed for a bit.

Oh, sure, you could use your savings (assuming you have some) and take a little vacation. But how quickly would you dig into the nest egg not knowing how many days you'll be off, or if you'll ever be compensated for this little (we pray) hiatus from the workforce?

The government is big business and what the business considers "nonessential" may be essential to the public.

We don't often think of this, but people get married at federal facilities. Not this week they won't. Those places are closed.

World War II veterans traveled to Washington, D.C., to visit the World War II memorial and had to move barricades to do so.

There's not an elected official in Washington who shouldn't feel shamed by that. Not one, and I don't care which side you're on.

Tygart Dam, which is run by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, is closed, along with the visitors' center, picnic area, restrooms, overlook and parking lot. The parking lot is blocked off. Clearly, it has been deemed nonessential.

We know national parks and monuments are closed. I can't speak for you, but I think the Statue of Liberty, though a gift from France, is essential to our image. Think how you'd feel to save for years to travel to the U.S. only to find out we've locked up all our symbols. Ridiculous.

The Statue of Liberty and our memorials are not "nonessential." They are key to this nation and to our reputation ... everywhere.

To me what is nonessential at this moment in time is the U.S. Congress. And they're still getting paid.

Some of our representatives in the Capitol have said they will donate their paychecks during the shutdown to charities.

I'm moved by their magnanimous gesture.

Not. That's awfully big of them since they're paid about \$500 a day to stay there and not do their jobs. Mighty big of those millionaires to give away some money and write it off on their taxes.

I'm traveling out of the country soon. Our tour group is to visit the U.S. Embassy there. But on Friday, the tour company said that may not happen if the shutdown continues.

That certainly gave me pause. Am I traveling to a country that may be undergoing political strife only to find out that I have no embassy should I need assistance?

I don't want to end up on "Locked Up Abroad."

Green Bank partner sought

WVU unsure about research availability

WVU is looking to partner with the organization that takes over management of the Green Bank Telescope in

Pocahontas County.

The future of the telescope became uncertain after the National Science Foundation received a recommendation to divest funding from the telescope starting in 2017. WVU plans to invest \$500,000 in the Green Bank telescope for each of the next two years. Vice President of Research Fred King described the money as buying a timeshare with the telescope and the investment allows WVU researchers additional

time to use the facility.

"It's a crown jewel of science in West Virginia," he said.

King said they are looking at how they can partner with the facility. Since the process just started, it's unclear what that relationship would entail or cost. In early spring, they hope to learn more about the facility's future, he added.

In a recent report, King wrote that the Green Bank facility has a \$14 million-a-year budget. The Associated Universities Inc.

manages the telescope.

WVU is interested in the telescope for a few reasons, King said. One is from a science perspective. Researchers in WVU's Department of Physics and Astronomy use the facility to detect gravity waves, which can be used to prove Einstein's Theory of Relativity.

One WVU educator who uses Green Bank is Duncan Lorimer. He said the people at

more than 300 mounts in excellent condition from Hudkins' family, and they used several to supplement their collection at the museum.

Several duplicates were included in the collection. All those that the museum could not house will be auctioned off Tuesday.

cal schools and groups use the area as a learning experience.

"This is a perfect spot for children, from kindergartners to sixth-graders learning about their West Virginia wetlands," he said.

Signs though the trail include birds, plants and other animals that can be frequently seen.

A few of the things people can look for are catbirds, spring peeper frogs and painted turtles.

No pesticides are used when clearing the brush from the wetlands.

Mountaineer Challenge Academy cadets visited every two to three weeks to maintain the trail.

Randy Snyder, a four-year volunteer, said he is enthu-

siastic about the trail.

"As a member of the community, it is wonderful to come down and be a part of this project," Snyder said. "To see the progress over the past four years and to know this will be here for years to come and open to the public is wonderful."

Green Bank are happy with WVU's additional investment in the facility.

WVU researchers are just starting to use the first allotment of extra time, Lorimer said.

Radio astronomy is one of WVU's mountain of excellence programs that the university is trying to make stronger.

There is only one other telescope like Green Bank in North America, Lorimer said. So without it, researchers would have to

look overseas to continue their research. But, the Green Bank facility is nice because it lets them see so much of the sky, he said.

In addition to a scientific benefit, King said there is another way the facility benefits WVU's mission.

"As a land-grant university, we also have the commitment to help the state," King said.

About 150 high-end jobs are tied to the facility and King said it is one of the largest employers in the county. The facility also does a tremendous job in education and outreach.

Use of force to be studied in D.C. police chase

WASHINGTON — Police in Washington are reviewing the use of officers' deadly force in the killing of a woman who tried to ram her car through a White House barrier, a shooting her family said was unjustified.

The investigation will reconstruct the car chase and shooting, which briefly put the U.S. Capitol on lockdown, and explore how officers dealt with the driver and whether protocols were followed.

Senate Sergeant at Arms Terrance Gainer said he was confident the officers "did the best they could under the situation." Police guarding national landmarks need to make rapid decisions without the luxury of all the facts, he said.

"This is not a routine highway or city traffic stop. It is simply not that," Gainer said Saturday. "The milieu under which we're operating at the United States Capitol and I suspect at the White House and at icons

up in New York is an anti-terrorism approach, and that is a difference with a huge, huge distinction."

Capitol Police Chief Kim Dine maintained that his officers acted "heroically" to protect the community.

Still, the family of 34-year-old Miriam Carey called the shooting unjustified, and some deadly force experts agree it merits scrutiny.

"We're still very confused as a family why she's not still alive," Amy Carey-Jones said in New York late Friday, after traveling to Washington to identify Miriam Carey's body. "I really feel like it's not justified, not justified." Another sister, retired New York City police officer Valerie Carey, said there was "no need for a gun to be used when there was no gunfire coming from the vehicle."

Secret Service agents and Capitol Police officers fired shots during the Thursday afternoon encounter, which began when Carey — in a

black Infiniti with her 1-year-old daughter — rammed a White House barricade and was pursued by police toward the Capitol during a high-speed chase. D.C. Police Chief Cathy Lanier said she was confident after the shooting that Carey's actions were "not an accident," but the department's internal affairs di-

vision is investigating as part of standard protocol.

Carey struck a Secret Service agent with her car at the White House and reversed her vehicle into a police car, authorities said. A Capitol Police officer was also injured. Both are expected to recover.

Experts in the use of deadly force said there were

more questions than answers. Many police departments direct their officers not to fire at moving vehicles — even if the driver is using the car as a weapon — or permit it under extremely limited circumstances. And experts wondered whether police should have relied on other options — such as establishing a roadblock — to defuse the situation.

"I think the question we have to ask is, 'What threat did she cause?'" said Geoffrey Alpert, an expert on police use of force at the University of South Carolina. "What threat was she to the officers, to the public, to the politicians?"

Chuck Drago, a former Oviedo, Fla., police chief who now works as a police consultant, said he was concerned officers approached the vehicle on foot while the conflict was still unfolding. That kind of direct contact can elevate the tension of an already tense scenario and leave an officer feeling anxious and

vulnerable, he said.

"Their main concern should have been trying to keep that vehicle from moving, and then exposing themselves only adds to the danger and lessens their options in the long run," Drago said.

Authorities were investigating why Miriam Carey, who lived in Connecticut, turned up in Washington on Thursday. A search warrant application for Carey's car seeks bullet fragments, maps or other documents pertaining to the White House, alcohol or drugs, "and/or evidence of a mechanical malfunction or lack thereof."

A federal law enforcement official said Friday that her mental health appeared to be deteriorating in the last year and that she was apparently under the delusion the president was communicating with her. The official was briefed on the investigation but not authorized to discuss it publicly and spoke on condition of anonymity.

Police: Man who set himself ablaze on National Mall dies

WASHINGTON — A man who set himself on fire on the National Mall in the U.S. capital died of his injuries, which were so severe that authorities will have to use DNA and dental records to identify him, District of Columbia police said Saturday.

The man died Friday night, at a Washington hospital, where he had been airlifted, Officer Araz Alali, a police spokesman, said.

The man poured the contents of a red canister of gasoline on himself in the center portion of the mall Friday afternoon. He then set himself on fire, with passing joggers taking off their shirts to help put out the flames. Police had said he was conscious

and breathing at the scene. He was airlifted to MedStar Washington Hospital Center with life-threatening injuries.

Police are investigating the man's possible motives. Lt. Pamela Smith, of the U.S. Park Police, said Friday she was not aware that he had carried any signs with him or had articulated a cause.

One witness, Katy Schefflen, said she did not hear the man say anything intelligible before he set himself on fire. But she said she did notice that another man with a tripod was standing nearby and had disappeared by the time the police arrived. It was not immediately clear whether a recording exists.

Obama answers questions about health care law

President Barack Obama conducted an interview Friday with AP White House Correspondent Julie Pace that covered a wide range of topics — the government shutdown, the debt ceiling, health care, foreign affairs and the name of Washington's professional football team.

Here is a portion of the text of the interview that deals with health care:

Q: There is a lot that I want to ask you about the government shutdown and foreign policy, but I wanted to start with health care. The signature element of your health care law went online this week, and the interest seems to have really exceeded expectations, but there were some serious glitches with the online systems. And our reporting shows that the number of people who actually managed to sign up for insurance in the states using the federal system was in the single digits. How many people have actually signed up for insurance this week?

A: Well, I don't have the numbers yet. What we know is that, as you indicated, the interest way ex-

ceeded expectations and that's the good news. It shows that people really need and want affordable health care. And the product is a really good one. It turns out that choice and competition work. So what's happened is you've got private insurers who have bid to get into this system to offer affordable health care at significantly lower prices than anybody could buy in the individual market, because basically they're now part of a big group.

And it is true that what's happened is the website got overwhelmed by the volume. And folks are working around the clock and have been systematically reducing the wait times, but we are confident that over the course of the six months — because it's important to remember people have six months to sign up — that we are going to probably exceed what anybody expected in terms of the amount of interest that people have.

Q: Do you have a message for those Americans who tried to sign up this week and gave up in frustration?

A: Well, they definitely shouldn't give up. Typically, what happens is when people are shopping for insurance, they visit a site or make phone calls or look at brochures five, six, seven times before they make a final decision. And they're not going to have to pay pre-

miums until December — the insurance doesn't start until January. So they'll have plenty of time.

And my message to them would be, each day the wait times are reduced. Each day, more and more people are signing up, and the product will save you money. People will save hundreds of dollars — in some cases, thousands of dollars — as a consequence of being able to get health insurance that is priced for them and gives them the choices that they need.

So the best example we have is actually Massachusetts, where they have a similar program. And what happened there is that the actual sign-up rate started fairly slowly, partly because people didn't want to pay three or four months ahead of when they would get insurance. But the interest, their ability to window shop, identify what's going to work for them, what suits their pocketbook, what kinds of tax credits they can get — that's already happening. And what we know is that for at least 60 percent of the people who visit that site, they're going to be able to get good-quality health insurance for less than their cellphone or cable bill. And that is something that is — a lot of people, understandably, recognize is going to give them the kind of security they haven't had before.

Q: The health care law is obviously very central to

the government shutdown that's under way right now. Are you prepared — given that you're not going to make concessions on your health care law, as you've said repeatedly, are you prepared to have the government stay shut down up until the nation hits its debt ceiling in mid-October?

A: There's no reason that that should happen, Julie. We can vote to open the government today. We know that there are enough members in the House of Representatives — Democrats and Republicans — who are prepared to vote to reopen the government today. The only thing that is keeping that from happening is Speaker Boehner has made a decision that he is going to hold out to see if he can get additional concessions from us.

And what I've said to him is, we are happy to negotiate on anything. We are happy to talk about the health care law, we're happy to talk about the budget, we're happy to talk about deficit reduction, we're happy to talk about investments. But what we can't do is keep engaging in this sort of brinksmanship where a small faction of the Republican Party ends up forcing them into brinksmanship to see if they can somehow get more from negotiations by threatening to shut down the government or threatening America not paying its bills.

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Weak storm bypassing Miss. coast

BILOXI, Miss. — Mississippi emergency workers scaled back operations Saturday evening as a weak Tropical Storm Karen headed toward Louisiana.

Tropical storm watches were discontinued Saturday afternoon for Mississippi, Alabama and Florida.

"For the most part, everybody's going to keep monitoring overnight," said Brett Carr, spokesman for the Mississippi Emergency Management Agency.

The storm had weakened overnight, and, even before the watch was discontinued, there were few signs of concern in Biloxi. Families played on the beach, joggers trotted along the waterfront and a steady stream of cars passed on the main beach front road. Scattered dark clouds hung over the Gulf in the distance, on an otherwise pleasant and sunny day.

Heavy snows hit Great Plains

The weather is so bad in the Great Plains, even plow trucks are getting stuck.

Heavy snow, strong rain, hail storms and tornadoes hit the region in the last few days, cutting power and stranding drivers while causing at least three deaths.

While the Dakotas are digging out of up to 43 inches of snow, Nebraska and

Iowa are reeling from nine tornadoes that touched down Friday evening.

Rapid City plow driver Jesse Curnow said Saturday morning things weren't moving so smoothly in chest-high drifts after a record 21-inch snowfall.

"I'm trapped. I can kind of move, but only a little bit," Curnow said by telephone from the cab of his truck.

Mormon leader: Essential to have women at home

SALT LAKE CITY — The president of the Mormon church announced Saturday that its worldwide membership has hit 15 million — a three-fold increase in the past three decades — as the Utah-based faith "spreads across the earth" on the strength of the largest missionary force in history.

The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints president Thomas S. Monson made the announcement Saturday morning, during a two-day church conference.

"The church continues to grow steadily and to change the lives of more and more people every year," Monson told about

20,000 members seated in a three-story auditorium.

The biannual general conference brings members together to hear inspirational words from church leaders and to hear church announcements.

Many of the speeches come from the church's Quorum of the Twelve Apostles, which is the second-highest governing body of the church. Modeled after Jesus Christ's apostles, the 12 men serve under the church president and his two counselors.

The ongoing debate about the limited role of women within the Mormon faith came to the forefront Saturday afternoon

during a speech from D. Todd Christofferson, a member of Quorum of the Twelve. He said having women at home remains an essential part of society, saying that the "moral force" of women kept societies on the righteous track for generations.

He criticized feminist thinkers who view "home-making with outright contempt." He cautioned against blurring feminine and masculine differences, saying, "we lose the distinct, complementary gifts of men and women that together produce a greater whole."

He later implored women to dress modestly, and be good and virtuous.

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Kenya identifies 4 shopping center attackers

JOHANNESBURG — Kenyan security officials Saturday named four of the terrorists who attacked a Nairobi shopping mall two weeks ago and released closed-circuit video of four gunmen walking calmly through the mall, talking on cellphones and carrying heavy guns.

Kenyan police said the number of people involved in the attack was four to six, not the 10 to 15 earlier estimated.

AL-Shabab, the Somalia-based militant group, claimed responsibility for

the assault on the mall, which according to official figures killed 61 civilians and six members of the security forces.

The video aired on Kenyan television Saturday showed the gunmen walking around the mall and a limited section of the complex. Attacks on civilians were not shown.

Kenyan Police Chief David Kimaiyo said none of the terrorists managed to escape the building and all had been killed. His comments contradict at least one witness account of terrorists spotted mingling with the crowds escaping

from the mall.

None of the men was a Westerner, contrary to earlier accounts. Police ruled out the involvement of Samantha Lewthwaite, the British widow of one of the suicide bombers who attacked London's transit system in 2005. Kenyan police had previously announced they were seeking Lewthwaite.

Some of the attackers were trained, according to Kenyan police. They were Abu Baara al Sudani, described by Kenyan police as the leader of the group, and as an experienced and trained fighter; Omar Nab-

han, said to be a Kenyan of Arab origin; Khattab al Kene, described as a Somali extremist linked to al-Shabab with experience in explosives and firearms; and a man whose name was given only as Umayr.

Kenyan media reported that the men were well-known terrorism suspects on the police wanted list.

Kenya's security forces have released contradictory accounts during and after the attack. The Interior Ministry had earlier announced that five terrorists were killed and 11 suspects had been arrested.

Official: Undercover cop present at bike rally

NEW YORK — Authorities are investigating whether an undercover police officer present at a motorcycle rally witnessed a violent confrontation between an SUV driver and a swarm of bikers and didn't immediately report it, a law enforcement official said Saturday.

The officer came forward several days after the Sept. 29 rally to say he was present, according to the official, who was not authorized to speak publicly about the investigation and spoke to The Associated Press on condition of anonymity. The

officer has an attorney, and internal affairs detectives are trying to determine whether he witnessed the assault on the SUV driver, the official said.

New York Police Department spokesman John McCarthy said a detective had been stripped of his gun and badge pending the outcome of an internal affairs investigation.

McCarthy said internal affairs was investigating the case and looking into whether any off-duty officers may have been present.

Undercover officers are required to immediately

report being a witness to a crime. Uniformed officers are required to take police action if they see a crime occurring, but the rules are murkier for undercover officers who face blowing their cover, confusing civilians who don't realize the undercover is really a cop and ruining years-long investigations.

Last weekend, dozens of bikers stopped the Range Rover SUV on a highway, attacked the vehicle, then chased the driver and pulled him from the car after he plowed over a motorcyclist while trying to escape, police said.

Arab world searches for democratic future

CAIRO — "For too long, many nations, including my own, tolerated, even excused, oppression in the Middle East in the name of stability. ... We must help the reformers of the Middle East as they work for freedom, and strive to build a community of peaceful, democratic nations." — President George W. Bush in a speech to the U.N. General Assembly, Sept. 21, 2004

Almost a quarter-century ago, a young American political scientist achieved global academic celebrity by suggesting that the collapse of communism had ended the discussion on how to run societies, leaving "Western liberal democracy as the final form of human government."

In Egypt and around the Middle East, after a summer of violence and upheaval, the discussion, however, is still going strong. And almost three years into the Arab Spring revolts, profound uncertainties remain.

That became clear on Ju-

ly 3, when Egyptian generals ousted the country's first freely elected president, Mohammed Morsi, installing a technocratic government in the wake of massive street protests calling for the Islamist leader to step down. He had ruled incompetently for one year and badly overstepped his bounds, they argued. A crackdown on his Muslim Brotherhood has put more than 2,000 of its members in jail and left hundreds dead, and a court has ordered an outright ban on the group. Although new elections are promised, the plans are extremely vague.

All this happened with strong public support, especially among the educated classes where one might expect a strong yearning for democracy. Foreigners in Egypt were frequently stunned at how little many Egyptians cared that Morsi had been democratically elected.

How could that be? Around the region people are asking the question, and the stirrings of a rethink are starting to be felt.

People bristle at any suggestion that the region's culture is somehow at odds with freedom. But with the most populous Arab nation having stumbled so badly in its first attempt, there is now an audience for those saying total democracy must grow from the ground up, needs time to evolve and need not be the same everywhere.

"Democracy is not a mat-

ter of principle or faith for most people" in the region, said political scientist Shadi Hamid, director of research at the Brookings Doha Center. "It is something they believe in to the extent that it brings good results. ... If democracy does not bring those things, then people lose faith in the democratic process."

"That's part of the story in the past three years," he said. "When push comes to shove, many say, democracy is fine in theory, but is not actually improving our lives. If the generals can promise us a greater degree of security and stability, we prefer that instead."

Oil-rich Gulf countries, meanwhile, have largely avoided the Arab Spring as the wealthy ruling families offered what has essentially been a swap — generous handouts such as state jobs and discount-rate housing in exchange for political passivity. The exception is Bahrain, where an uprising has been led by majority Shiites seeking greater rights in the Sunni-ruled kingdom, which is home to the U.S. Navy's 5th Fleet.

"Most of the Arab rulers are trying very hard to give the impression to the West that their peoples are not prepared for democracy because these rulers are afraid that they are going to lose in any fair democratic elections," said Adel al-Baldawi, a history professor at Mustansiriyah University in Baghdad.

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Migrant coffins lined up in Italian airport hangar

LAMPEDUSA, Italy — The coffins of African migrants killed in a shipwreck off the Italian island of Lampedusa were lined up in long rows inside an airport hangar where survivors of the tragedy paid their respects Saturday. All of the caskets had a single white rose on top except for the four of the youngest victims, which had stuffed animals.

The 111 coffins were numbered — a teddy bear wearing a smile and a blue shirt with a heart was placed above casket No. 92.

The ceremony took place hours after Italian fishermen threw a bouquet of yellow flowers near the exact spot where the migrant boat sank, honking their foghorns in tribute to the dead and up to 250 migrants

who may still be missing.

The search to recover more bodies, meanwhile, was called off for a second day because of choppy waters and strong currents.

A parliamentary delegation visited the sur-

vivors amid reports that a boat may have violated the "law of the sea" by failing to help the migrant ship packed with 500 migrants, nearly all from Eritrea, about 650 yards from shore.

"To come to rescue is a duty. Not to come to rescue is a crime," Laura Boldrini, the Italian house speaker who previously and for many years was the U.N. Refugee Agency spokeswoman in Italy told reporters in Lampedusa after visiting the survivors.

The 65-foot migrant boat sank Thursday after a fire was set onboard to attract attention of any passing boats or people on shore when they ran into trouble. They had traveled for two full days and thought they had reached safety when they saw the lights of Lampedusa.

Instead, at least 111 drowned and 155 survived, some of whom were in the water for three hours, clinging to anything buoyant — even empty water bottles.

Military strike reported in southern Somali town

MOGADISHU, Somalia — International military forces carried out a pre-dawn strike Saturday against foreign fighters in the same southern Somalia village where U.S. Navy SEALs four years ago killed a most-wanted al-Qaida operative, officials said.

The strike was carried out in the town of Barawe in the hours before morning prayers against what one official said were "high-profile" targets. The strike comes exactly two weeks after al-Shabab militants attacked Nairobi's Westgate Mall, a four-day terrorist assault that killed at least 67 people in neighboring Kenya.

The leader of al-Shabab, Mukhtar Abu Zubeyr, also known as Ahmed Godane, claimed responsibility for the attack and said it was in retaliation for Kenya's military deployment inside Somalia. In Kenya, a military spokesman re-

leased the names of four men implicated in the mall attack.

A resident of Barawe — a seaside town 150 miles south of Mogadishu — said by telephone that heavy gunfire woke up residents before dawn prayers. An al-Shabab fighter who gave his name as Abu Mohamed said "foreign" soldiers attacked a house, prompting militants to rush to the scene to capture a soldier. Mohamed said that effort was not successful.

The international troops attacked a two-story beachside house in Barawe where foreign fighters lived, battling their way inside, said Mohamed, who said he had visited the scene. Al-Shabab has a formal alliance with al-Qaida, and hundreds of foreign fighters from the U.S., Britain and Middle Eastern countries fight alongside Somali members of al-Shabab.

Greenpeace: Russia actions among worst its 'assaults'

AMSTERDAM — Greenpeace International's director said Russia's seizure of its ship "Arctic Sunrise" and the arrest of its crew is the worst "assault" on the group's environmental activism since its flagship "Rainbow Warrior" was bombed in 1985.

Russia seized "Arctic Sunrise" after a Sept. 18 protest at a Gazprom oil drilling platform located in the Arctic circle, and last

week charged all 30 people on board with piracy, which carries a maximum sentence of 15 years.

Kicking off global Greenpeace protests Saturday, international director Kumi Naidoo said "we will not be bullied and intimidated into silence." He demanded the release of the activists, who come from 18 countries.

In London, several hundred people gathered to protest Russia's actions.

Senate remains in Ireland

DUBLIN — Irish voters have rejected a government plan to abolish the country's Senate, a surprise result that deals a blow to Prime Minister Enda Kenny.

Saturday's official results show that the proposed constitutional amendment to eliminate Ireland's upper house of parliament was defeated with a 51.7 per-

cent "no" vote. All opinion polls during the month-long campaign had suggested easy passage of Friday's referendum question.

Kenny's 2 1/2-year-old government had asked voters to agree to abolish the Senate, because the 60-senator chamber wields no essential powers and costs \$27 million annually to run.

Briles' brilliant Bears batter Mountaineers; any bounceback left?

YOU HAVE YOUR ANSWERS.

You could spin the first five weeks of the WVU football season any way you wanted. Knowing that, you grabbed chips and settled into the gameday chair Saturday evening with questions bouncing around in your head:

Is Baylor for real, or have the Bears just been untested? How good is WVU's defense? And are the real Mountaineers the ones who played at Maryland or against then-No. 11 Oklahoma State?

Wonder no longer.

The Washington Generals have challenged the Harlem Globetrotters longer than the Mountaineers tested Art Briles' Baylor squad in an epic 73-42 defeat. The only time WVU has given up more points in a game was in a 130-0 loss to Michigan, in 1904. The Bears' 864 yards of offense were the most ever allowed by WVU.

We'll start here: When on — and the Bears were humming inside Floyd Casey Stadium — Baylor is the best team in the Big 12 Conference. Oklahoma doesn't have that firepower. Oklahoma State doesn't have that speed. No other team mixes the balance of an imposing offensive line, accurate quarterback, dynamic running back and play-making receivers.

No. 17 Baylor (4-0) deserves credit because Briles and the Bears are what Dana Holgorsen and the Mountaineers hope to be: Innovative, dynamic, relentless and able to execute a seamless transition. The Mountaineers' defense isn't elite. The Bears, who scored TDs on nine of their first 10 drives, are.

Briles' offense has only gotten better since last season, when Nick Florence led the country in passing. Briles has an amazing crop of players, no doubt, but he knows how to use his talent.

Meanwhile, at the midpoint of the season, WVU's offense reverted to what at times looked like a 10-year-old playing a video game. Sure, the Mountaineers were desperate as Baylor built a 42-7 lead 23 minutes into the game, but how many times can a quarterback just chuck it down field?

While WVU lacked creativity in getting the offense jump-started, you have to wonder why Holgorsen kept Clint Trickett, who was obviously in excruciating pain, in as long as he did. Give Trickett props for gutting it out, but man, he was doing everything but throwing the ball with his left (non-throwing) arm, including high-fiving teammates and picking up his helmet.

Bizarrely, WVU scored six TDs but never threatened, and never looked good offensively or defensively.

Instead, Holgorsen and his Mountaineers wake up today — the first of their bye week — wondering if they'll be able to pick themselves off the canvas again.

WVU, which has gotten blown out in two of its past three weeks, is 5-9 in its past 14 games. More concerning is the manner in which they've been defeated. Six of those nine losses were by 21 or more points, meaning when Holgorsen's teams aren't on, they often get blown out. Let that sink in.

This may be what prompted former WVU quarterback Pat White's tweet during Saturday's freefall: "He is not a leader. Players don't believe or trust. #LaneKiffin #PullThePlug."

Not soft words for Holgorsen, whose team's character will be tested more than ever the second half of this season.

WVU bounced back once before. You wonder if it can again.

Bears' offensive outburst crushes Mountaineers

WACO, Texas — Last year's WVU/Baylor game, which featured 133 points, was the highest-scoring contest in WVU football history.

The Bears held up their end of the bargain in Saturday's rematch, but the Mountaineers couldn't keep pace.

Baylor torched WVU for 56 points and 617 yards of offense in the first half alone, both school records, and coasted to a 73-42 victory, in front of 45,467 fans at Floyd Casey Stadium.

It was the second-most points scored by an opponent in WVU history, trailing only Michigan's 130 points, in 1904. Baylor's 864 yards of offense were the most allowed in WVU history.

The No. 17 Bears (4-0, 1-0 Big 12) started fast and buried WVU (3-3, 1-2 Big 12) in an early hole. Baylor scored on the opening possession, when junior quarterback Bryce Petty hit receiver Antwan Goodley for a 61-yard touchdown pass. The scoring drive, which lasted three plays, took just 40 seconds.

It was only the third-shortest scoring possession for Baylor in the game.

The second-quickest score occurred on a one-play drive, on which junior running back Lache Seastrunk rumbled 80 yards in 13 seconds.

The fastest score of the day came when Petty found senior receiver Tevin Reese for a 47-yard touchdown, covering just nine seconds.

It was a career night for Petty, who took over as Baylor's starting quarterback this season. He'd averaged 333 passing yards in the Bears' first three games, with a career-best 351 against Louisiana-Monroe, but threw for 342 yards and two scores in the first half against WVU and finished with 347 in the game.

When Petty wasn't testing WVU's secondary through the air, Seastrunk was giving the Mountaineers headaches on the ground. Seastrunk averaged 11.5 yards per carry with 172 yards and two touchdowns on 15 carries, but did not log a carry in the second half. Redshirt freshman Shock Linwood handled the load in the second half and finished with 126 yards and a touchdown. Six Baylor running backs combined to score eight rushing touchdowns.

Baylor scored on nine of its 10 first-half pos-

Four downs with WVU football

Baylor 73, WVU 42

WACO, Texas — No. 17 Baylor had a record-setting night in demolishing the WVU football team, 73-42, Saturday night, at Floyd Casey Stadium.

Four plays that defined the game

Sign of things to come

On just the third play from scrimmage, Baylor quarterback Bryce Petty dropped back and connected with Antwan Goodley for a 61-yard touchdown pass. Goodley hauled in the ball and just sped past the entire Mountaineers defense. It was just a sign of things to come.

Gamble fails

Perhaps WVU head coach Dana Holgorsen sensed that Baylor was unstoppable on this night and felt his team's only shot was to gamble and to game successfully. Midway through the first quarter, an irritated Holgorsen yanked Clint Trickett from the game on a third-and-10. Paul Millard completed an 8-yard pass to Charles Sims, setting up a fourth-and-2 from his own 49-yard line. Rather than send in punter Nick O'Toole to punt, Holgorsen elected to go for it. Dreamius Smith was knocked back 2 yards, and Baylor took over at its own 47-yard line. And that set up this ...

And then the 1-play drive

The Mountaineers knew they couldn't give the Bears a short field, but that's exactly what they did after the failed fourth down. The creative Art Briles wasted no time, as Petty, found Tevin Reese for a 47-yard touchdown on the ensuing play. Just like that, it was 21-7 midway through the first quarter. The game was over.

Seastrunk to the house

If any doubt still existed, it was put to rest when Lache Seastrunk weaved through WVU's defensive front and sped away for an 80-yard touchdown run with five minutes left in the first quarter. That play exemplified how much faster the Bears were than the

Mountaineers (3-3). It also gave Baylor a commanding 28-7 lead.

Game ball goes to:

Baylor knocked out WVU quickly, and Bears running back Lache Seastrunk was a big reason why. The Oregon transfer said in December he could win the Heisman, and he sure looked like it Saturday. He ran 15 times for 172 yards and two touchdowns, complementing Baylor's deadly passing attack well.

PASS OFFENSE

F While throwing the ball deep on nearly every play may have worked on the video game "Bill Walsh College Football," but it did not do that many favors for WVU quarterback Clint Trickett and the Mountaineers.

Trickett played with an injured shoulder, but was the only option to go deep? WVU's offensive line didn't do much in the way of pass protection. Receiver Kevin White had 130 yards and two TDs.

C This was the Mountaineers' lone bright spot of the night.

Karl Joseph recovered a fumbled punt by Baylor's Levi Norwood in the end zone for WVU's first touchdown of the game.

The Mountaineers were also solid on kickoff returns, but they should have been, seeing how WVU got plenty of practice doing it in this one.

Mountaineer doesn't get bye weeks

WACO, Texas — There's no offseason when it comes to being a Mountaineer. For Jon Kimble, WVU's second-year mascot, it's an every-day job. Not that he's complaining about it.

"To wear the buckskins is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity, so I'm just trying to make the most of it," Kimble said. "It's such a blessing, such an honor, that I want to put them on every day and represent West Virginia, whether its going to the children's hospital, alumni events or elementary school."

Kimble took over as WVU's Mountaineer in April 2012 and, in the past 18 months, has made close to 650 appearances, which averages out to more than a commitment per day on the job. He was on the field before the WVU football team at Baylor's Floyd Casey Stadium and spent more than an hour visiting with fans of both teams, signing autographs and posing for pictures.

"That's the best part," said Kimble, who is pursuing his master's degree in industrial and labor relations. "I love seeing the kids. I've been here this whole time visiting the kids and signing autographs. They all want their picture taken with the Mountaineer."

Kids aren't the only ones. While Kimble posed with a group of elementary school-aged children, plenty of adults lined up to spend a minute with the Moun-

taineer. Kimble is in high demand, and he rarely turns down an opportunity to put a smile on a fan's face.

"I have a hard time saying 'no' if someone wants to see the Mountaineer," Kimble said with a laugh. "The other week I woke up at 5 a.m. to be in Martinsburg at 8 a.m. to speak to a high school, middle school and elementary school. It's a busy schedule, but I love doing it."

It's that enthusiasm that kept Kimble from sleeping in his own bed for all but eight nights during a seven-week stretch last summer. It's also made him the most active Mountaineer in WVU history.

"He's what we call a high achiever," said Sonja Wilson, Kimble's advisor and

schedule coordinator. "I'd say he's done more events than any other Mountaineer. And that's not to disparage anyone else, but he's just in demand so much more."

In addition to appearing at football and men's and women's basketball games, Kimble is a regular at men's and women's soccer, as well as volleyball matches. And that's on top of the non-athletic sanctioned events to which Kimble donates his time.

"We have a map of the state, and one of his goals is to go to every single county in West Virginia," Wilson said. "And at this point, he can't have any more than 10 left. But that's just the kind of person he is."

"He wants to see the

whole state. He wants to go to every event and, when he goes, he's the first one there and the last one to leave. It doesn't get old for him."

The Mountaineer position is a one-year gig and the Mountaineer can only be re-elected once. Kimble's run is set to conclude in April, but that doesn't mean he's ready to see it end.

"It's kind of perfect because I'll finish (being the Mountaineer) in April and get my master's in May, but I really don't want to leave Morgantown," Kimble said with a laugh. "That Ph.D. is looking better and better."

Starting fast

Baylor hasn't scored fewer than 38 points in the first half and is averaging 49.8 points before halftime this season. The Bears continued their hot start against WVU, taking a 56-14 lead into the break. Baylor racked up 369 yards of offense in the first quarter, the most in any quarter by any team in the past decade.

First trip, last trip

WVU's first trip to Baylor's Floyd Casey Stadium was also the Mountaineers' last. Floyd Casey, which opened in 1950 as Baylor Stadium and was renamed for a Waco businessman in 1988, will close its doors at the end of the 2013 season. The Bears will christen a new Baylor Stadium next fall. The new stadium, located closer to the school's campus in Waco, will cost \$250 million and, with a capacity of seating 45,000, will be tied with TCU's Amon G. Carter Stadium as the smallest venue in the Big 12.

Mayfield hurt in Texas Tech rout of Kansas

LAWRENCE, Kan. — Freshman sensation Baker Mayfield passed for 368 yards but was helped off the field with an apparent leg injury in the third quarter of No. 20 Texas Tech's 54-16 victory against Kansas, on Saturday.

Mayfield, a true freshman walk-on who has started every game, was hurt at the end of the third quarter when tackled while passing. There was no penalty. He hobbled very slowly off the field with someone helping him under each arm.

He was 33 of 51 with one interception.

Texas Tech is WVU's next opponent. The teams face off Oct. 19, in Morgantown.

Minutes after the game, Red Raiders coach Kliff Kingsbury said he could not be sure how badly Mayfield was hurt.

After falling behind, 10-0, in the first quarter, the Red Raiders reeled off 54 straight points, going to 5-0 under first-year coach Kingsbury for the first time since 2008.

It's the 22nd straight Big 12 loss by Kansas (2-2, 0-1). Texas Tech rolled up 518 total yards on 100 plays.

Oklahoma opened with seven straight defensive 3-and-outs, after finishing a 35-21 win at Notre Dame this past Saturday with three. The 10 straight 3-and-outs was the longest such streak recorded by the Sooners since at least the 2003 season.

Kyle Busch is out to prove Kansas track can be tamed

KANSAS CITY, Kan. — Just about everything that could go wrong at Kansas Speedway has for Kyle Busch.

During the April race weekend, the driver of the No. 18 Toyota for Joe Gibbs Racing wrecked in practice. He crashed out of the Truck Series race the next day. Then he spun twice more in the Sprint Cup race, finishing 38th after a hard crash ended his afternoon.

Things haven't been a whole lot better this week-

end, either. Busch hit the wall hard in the opening minute of practice Saturday and again will be in a back-up car for the race today.

If there's ever a time to figure things out, it's right now. Busch is off to a strong start in the Chase for the Sprint Cup championship, sitting third in the points. He's within striking distance of leader Matt Kenseth and Jimmie Johnson, two drivers who have fared much better in the heartland.

Busch has strung together three top-five finishes, and after testing Goodyear's new tire at Kansas this summer, he's confident he can turn around his fortunes.

"It's not that you might not like a track or might not like a race or something like that," Busch

said. "It's just a matter of trying to figure it out. Once you kind of get it figured out or get the right situations kind of lined up, you can have a shot."

Kevin Harvick, who is tied with Jeff Gordon for fourth in points, ended a 254-race pole drought and will lead the field to the green flag. He'll start alongside Ricky Stenhouse Jr.

Johnson will start in the second row next to defending series champion Brad Keselowski, who is trying to play spoiler after failing to make the Chase.

Busch has taken the green flag in 12 Cup races at Kansas and has yet to win. It's the only track where he has never finished in the top 5, his best run seventh place, in 2006.

Busch has crashed out

of the past two races at the 1 1/2-mile tri-oval, the first two races at Kansas since a re-grade and repave significantly altered the way it drives.

"I thought we were running decent there last fall. Actually, I was leading and I spun myself out while I was leading," Busch said this week. "So, hopefully, we have a good car like that this time around, and I don't make a mistake like that."

If he does, he could head to Charlotte next weekend in a deep hole.

His JGR teammate, Kenseth, has won the last two races at Kansas, and is carrying momentum into the weekend. He opened the Chase with a pair of wins and was seventh this past week, at Dover, giving him an eight-point lead on Johnson and 12 points on Busch.

stuck with Liriano, signing him at a discount. The Pirates were assured his right arm would heal and his left arm — the one rebuilt during Tommy John surgery in 2007 — would turn out to be a perfect fit at PNC Park.

"If A.J. (Burnett) was going to be our one, he could be our two," manager Clint Hurdle said. "Where that two went, how high it played, I don't think any of us knew."

Higher, it turns out, than Liriano or his perpetually optimistic manager imagined.

Ten months after wondering when — and where — he would pitch again, Liriano can give the resilient Pirates the lead in the NL division series today, when they face St. Louis and right-hander Joe Kelly in Game 3.

Following a 16-8 regular season in which he evolved into Pittsburgh's de facto ace, Liriano became a part of franchise lore in a 6-2 victory against Cincinnati in the NL wild-card game Tuesday. Overpowering the Reds in front of a black-clad crowd aching for postseason success after the Pirates' 21-year absence, Liriano delivered seven sublime innings that left the park in such a frenzy that fans couldn't figure out whether to chant his first name or his last — so separate chants of both broke out.

"Just trying to please the fans as much as I can," Liriano said, "be myself and make some good pitches and just give them the win they want."

One Liriano may have wanted even more. An All-Star as a 22-year-old with the Minnesota Twins, in 2006, Liriano has spent the better part of a decade searching for the form that made him one of the most electrifying lefties. He underwent reconstructive elbow surgery on Nov. 6, 2006, needed more than a year to recover and then worked five middling seasons that made him look more like a cautionary tale than a potential postseason hero.

Pittsburgh is willing to take fliers on players who flamed out elsewhere. It didn't work out in 2012, when Erik Bedard signed a one-year deal only to be cut loose in late-August.

Liriano's broken arm may have turned out to be a blessing. Forced to prepare for the season slowly while his right arm healed, Liriano sent a jolt through the staff when he ar-

rived in mid-May. His slider and breaking ball made more potent by a tweak in his delivery and a fastball that has resumed topping out in the mid-90s, Liriano has been devastating at PNC Park, where long fly balls to left field become innocuous outs.

After making quick work of the Reds, Liriano is 9-1 with a 1.43 ERA at home this season, including a pair of wins against the Cardinals.

"We have a game plan we'll take into tomorrow," St. Louis manager Mike Matheny said. "We understand he's a good pitcher. We also realize we have a very good lineup."

And a guy on the hill who hardly seems concerned by the circumstances. Moved from the bullpen to the starting rotation in July, Kelly went 10-5 with a 2.69 ERA even as Matheny experimented with the 25-year-old's role. He worked at least five innings in each of his last 15 outings, and the Cardinals were a remarkable 12-3 when he started, one of the main reasons they were able to hold off the Pirates in a hotly contested playoff race.

ALDS**Red Sox 7, Rays 4**

BOSTON — David Ortiz homered twice, the second shot chasing David Price in the eighth inning, and Boston beat Tampa Bay to take a 2-0 lead in the AL division series.

It was the first two-homer postseason game for the Red Sox designated hitter: Ortiz was a star for the 2004 Boston team that won the franchise's first World Series title in 86 years and is the only player remaining from that team.

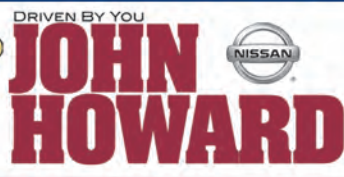

WVU's men smash soccer losing streak

Dominate game against MAC foe

WVU men's soccer midfielder Christian Diaz called it one of the hardest weeks of training he's endured in his young collegiate career.

Mountaineers coach Marlon LeBlanc admitted he "lost his language" a few times during practice for the first time in a long time.

In the end, LeBlanc and his players got just what they needed Saturday night: A 4-0 romp against Mid-American Conference foe Northern Illinois that snapped a four-game losing streak, before a Dick Dlesk Soccer Stadium crowd of 711.

"I've been sore all week, but it's paid off right now," the freshman Diaz said with a smile.

The Mountaineers (4-5-1, 1-1-0 MAC) put it on Northern Illinois in a major way. WVU scored three goals in the first 16:49. The Mountaineers outshot the Huskies, 21-9, took nine shots on-goal to Northern Illinois' three and limited the Huskies to a mere two shots in the second half.

WVU's domination went a long way toward helping ease the frustration the veterans felt after a pair of shutout losses against Northern Illinois (3-7-0, 0-1-0) a year ago.

"We underestimated them last year," said WVU sophomore forward Jamie Merriam, who scored the Mountaineers' third goal. "Tonight, we tried not to do that. We played our game and came out on top."

LeBlanc could find little to fault in his players' performance.

"The guys clicked tonight," he said. "We had a great week of training. We haven't played badly this year. We've played well. We've lost a couple of games we probably didn't deserve to lose."

"At the end of the day, the results are all that matter, and tonight we got the performance to go along with the result."

It's the Mountaineers' first win since a 2-1 triumph against Wright State, on Sept. 13, at Dick Dlesk. WVU was on a roll at that point, coming off a 5-4 double-overtime victory against defending national champion Indiana five days earlier.

What happened from there? One-goal losses against No. 12 St. John's, No. 10 Akron, Michigan and Penn State.

"It's been tough," Diaz said, "but Marlon always said to put the game behind us and don't think about it. Just look forward to the next game."

The players weren't as down as some might suspect after a long losing skid.

"A lot of us really don't know what it's like to go on a losing streak at the college level," Merriam said. "It doesn't really affect us too much."

Besides, LeBlanc said,

the Mountaineers' play didn't dictate falling into a state of depression.

"If we had been played off the pitch in these losses we've taken in this streak, you'd see a confidence deficit in this group," LeBlanc said.

"There's no lack of confidence. We still believe we're a good team. We're arguably the youngest team playing the opponents that we're playing out there. It's a real credit to them that they've continued to press on in regards to what we're trying to do."

After Diaz put WVU on top, 1-0, with his first career goal, the Mountaineers responded four minutes later with a second goal. Andy Bevin settled a cross from Alex Ochoa and banged it home for his team-leading fifth goal.

Merriam made it 3-0 two minutes later with his second tally of the season, with an assist from Bevin. The Mountaineers squandered some other chances to score, but Ryan Cain put a nice capper on the evening when he located the back of the net in the 88th minute.

The Mountaineers return to Dick Dlesk on Tuesday night, to wrap up their five-game homestand. Stony Brook provides the opposition, at 7 p.m.

Diaz sees a bright future for this WVU team.

"We have an extremely young team," he said. "I think we're going to do a great job. I'm excited to see how it's going to be in these next games. I think we're going to do some great stuff."

Shooters open season by beating Buckeyes

The defending NCAA champion WVU rifle team opened the season with a 4657-4648 win against Ohio State, on Saturday, at the WVU Rifle Range.

The Mountaineers won air rifle, 2356-2343, while the Buckeyes (0-1) scored a 2305-2301 victory in smallbore.

WVU junior Maren Prediger shot a career-best 599 (100-100-100-100-100-99) for the air rifle win. Prediger, from Petersaurach, Germany, was one shot short of the NCAA and WVU record.

OSU's Remington Lyman won smallbore with a 584 mark. Mountaineers sophomore Garrett Spurgeon tied Buckeye Deanna Binnie for second with a 581 (193 kneeling, 196 prone, 192 standing) score.

Despite the smallbore team loss, WVU shot seven of the match's top-eight scores. Sojka finished fourth, with a 580 mark, while Sunderman shot 578 and finished fifth. Cover placed sixth with a 576, and Prediger and Kiisk tied for seventh, with 574s.

The WVU scoring squad was made up of Prediger, Kiisk, Spurgeon and juniors Taylor Ciotola and Thomas Kyanko.

WVU is 40-0 all-time against OSU.

What W.Va. thinks about wildlife problems

MOST OF THE TIME, we like to see wildlife around the house. Cathy and I enjoy watching deer eat the apples under the tree in our back yard. It really is fun ... until that doe and two fawns decide to eat our pepper plants or our flowers.

Sure, we can tolerate a little of that. It comes with the territory. But when the damage gets so bad that the deer get more of our vegetables than we do, our appreciation of the deer changes. Bottom line: Some deer are fine. Too many are a nuisance. I'm sure many of my readers agree.

There is a new study out that looked at nuisance wildlife in the Northeast. I've pulled the West Virginia information from that survey and here it is.

Last year, 83 percent of West Virginia residents watched wildlife around the home and 35 percent went so far as to photograph wildlife. Fifty-three percent maintained a bird feeder, and another 26 percent put food out (other than by a bird feeder) for wildlife. Twenty-six percent put out plants to benefit or attract wildlife, and 24 percent used nest

boxes for wildlife. Yes, we West Virginians do enjoy wildlife.

As you would expect, deer were the number one species that caused problems (47 percent). Raccoons were next (29 percent), then coyotes (11 percent), and woodchucks (9 percent). Bears were a bit lower on the list, coming in at 5 percent.

If we are just talking about garden damage, then deer were way up there at 93 percent, followed by raccoons (21 percent) and woodchucks (20 percent).

Nuisance wildlife is very costly. For example, based on data collected, it is estimated that West Virginians spend more than \$11 million a year to manage, replace or repair damage caused by wildlife.

And we are all well aware of

the deer/vehicle collision problems. Ten percent of the people surveyed in this study hit a deer with a car last year, and their average out-of-pocket expenses for those collisions were \$1,926. Of course, the cost to insurance companies was much more. Deer caused a total of \$77 million in auto damage in West Virginia last year. Wow.

Twenty percent of those with wildlife problems said that they or another family member tried to remedy them. Of those, 30 percent tried to kill or relocate the perpetrator, 28 percent tried to fence them out, 23 percent tried repellents and 7 percent allowed hunting on their property.

People are willing to do certain things to reduce nuisance wildlife. Many would use animal-proof garbage containers, and many would put fences around their gardens or yard. But very few would take down bird feeders, even if the feeders were attracting animals that caused problems.

Ninety percent of the people surveyed support hunting rela-

tive to nuisance wildlife; 79 percent support removal and relocation; and 67 percent support the homeowner making changes to his/her property (e.g., fencing, etc.).

Note: You could support more than one option.

While 29 percent strongly support lethal means of control of nuisance wildlife, 25 percent do not. But if they had a wildlife problem in the previous year, that objection to lethal control dropped to 11 percent. I guess that is the old adage: Not in my backyard. I don't want nuisance wildlife killed unless it is causing me a problem.

I have a woodchuck that gets through my garden fence. He just appeared last month, so since safety reasons don't allow me to shoot that rascal, I am borrowing a live trap and hope to catch and move that guy to a new home. Far removed from my yard. I hope.

Discounts this month at state parks

Fall foliage is an invitation to visit West Virginia, and the State Parks and Recreation Section of the state Division of Natural Resources (DNR) is extending that invitation with a number of October discounts.

State parks and forests generally see an increase in day visitors and overnight guests in higher elevations from mid-September through October, due to fall colors.

"As a West Virginia native, it is hard to imagine not having trees, rivers and streams seemingly at the doorstep, but to many park guests, those are the very aspects of West Virginia that are impressive any time of the year, especially in fall," Parks Programming Coordinator Sissie Summers said. "Visitors are wide-eyed at the changing colors that pop from a hillside or valley. It is a naturally occurring, special event."

Visitors who chose mountains as a vacation destination find West

Virginia appealing. "There are generally some rooms and cabins open for last-minute weekend reservations, but for the most part, parks are busier on weekends. It's the nature of travel," she said.

Sundays through Thursdays are becoming more popular travel days in October. Parks such as North Bend and Blackwater Falls offer adjusted rates for mid-week travelers in autumn, and Chief Logan Lodge offers a discount all week through the end of the year.

Whether it is a day trip or to

stay overnight in a lodge room, cabin or campsite, visitors tend to wait a little closer to the date and watch weather patterns.

Blackwater Falls and all lodges, and lodge parks with cabins, offer online reservation services. Discounts are available when making online reservations. Cabin rentals also are available at traditional parks when making phone reservations: Bluestone, Holly River, Lost River, Babcock, Beech Fork and Watoga state parks; and at Cabwaylingo, Kumbrabow, Greenbrier and Seneca state forests.

Online or phone reservations are offered at Cass Scenic Railroad, Blackwater Falls, Cacapon, Canaan Valley, Chief Logan Lodge, Hawks Nest, North Bend, Pipestem, Stonewall, Twin Falls and Tygart Lake state parks.

GO FISH! (W.VA. DNR)

Monongahela River

The river is at a good fishing flow. The best fishing is from 6-9 a.m. and 7-9 p.m. The shoreline from the Morgantown lock to the mouth of Deckers Creek is always a good place to fish from the shore. This is also a good time for large catfish. Sauger and walleye usually begin feeding at dusk in the tailwaters. Jigs with minnows are always good baits, but 3-inch plastic grubs will also be productive. A good pattern for muskies is trolling with large crank baits. Cooler water temperatures for this time of year have increased success rates for muskies. The Uffington boat ramp was recently dredged, so it is now possible to launch trailered boats in the Morgantown Pool. You still have to lift the motor to get out to the river on the left side of Booths Creek.

Cheat Lake

Yellow perch and sunfish have been readily caught in the I-68 bridge area. Channel catfish are doing well: 2- to 3-pounders are abundant throughout the lake but concentrated in the river above Mont Chateau. Night crawlers or cut bait on a No. 6 hook with a one-half to 1-ounce egg sinker cast into 10 to 20 feet of water will catch catfish. A good walleye stocking in 2010 and 2012 should be producing 13- to 20-inch fish. The embayments at Cheat Lake Park are good areas for bank fishermen to catch sunfish and largemouth bass.

Tygart Lake

The lake is about 9 feet below the summer level and falling slowly. Bass tournament success continues to be good. Smallmouth bass can be caught using crank baits or tube jigs along the shoreline. Look for schools of white bass breaking the surface throughout the lake. Use long casts with crank baits or jigs and 3-inch twister tails and follow the school as it moves around. There are lots of trout and walleye in the tailwater. Walleye fishing is best during higher flows (1,500 to 5,000 cubic feet per second) and trout fishing is best at low flows (less than 1,000 cfs). Flow from Tygart Dam is 830 cfs. Call 304-265-5953 for daily lake and tailwater conditions.



October: The *real* start of hunting season

Time surely does fly the older you get.

In years past, I was ready, straining at the bit, in anticipation of October. Each cool morning in September would bring visions of falling, swirling, multicolored leaves. It always reminded me of the vision you get when looking through one of the old kaleidoscopes.

Each evening when I fed the dogs, I could sense nervousness on their part. They don't have a calendar but a built-in sense of coming events.

In the past few years, the season seems to sneak up on me, and I find myself scurrying around the last few days before the opening of the season. I squirrel hunted a morning in September but didn't deer or bear hunt. Now, with October arriving, I was busy checking shotguns and shells for grouse,

woodcock and turkey hunting. Making sure all equipment was ready is a part of the fun of waiting for the seasons of October.

There is no place in West Virginia that compares to the High Country of our north-central mountains in October. There always seems to be a breeze stirring the color-splashed leaves, sending them turning and twisting toward the earth. A light vest feels good in the morning.

Winding along the Cheat River on the way to Tucker County was a beautiful drive. The fog was lifting from the cool water and formed a white ceiling shutting out the morning sun. About halfway up Cheat Mountain I broke through the fog and entered a brilliantly sun-lit landscape.

Part of why I hunt is just being in this country. The solitude, serenity, and lack of traffic and human activity are all a big part of the hunting experience. When I throw in the dogs, a great old

classic American-made shotgun and the health to walk among God's great outdoors, I can ask or expect nothing more. Taking a bird or two will be great for sure and add to the day's experience, but not taking any will not detract from the day. With the clicking off of each mile, the anticipation builds until I am finally at a familiar wide spot on the old logging road.

I am pleased to see that the hawthorn has done well and the thorn apples are hanging heavy. This particular old grown-up farm has both red and yellow haws. During the first part of the season, you can bet that if there is a grouse in the country, he will be close to the old hawthorn trees, where he finds food and shelter. I see that the dogwood and crab apples have also done well. These soft mast types will take the grouse, deer and turkey well into the winter. But it is the oak, the acorns, that adds the

nourishment and fat they need to make it through the harsh mountain winter.

It takes me a minute to stretch and straighten up completely after stepping out of the truck, and the dogs show no patience. They know where we are and why we have come, and delay is not part of the day. With the tiny sleigh bell around Snoopy's neck and a few 20 gauge shells for the Ithaca double in my pocket, it is time to start another year's adventure. Each season is like a new chapter in the hunter's book of life. Enjoy each and every outing to its fullest, for we never know how many chapters the Good Lord has written in our book!

Out of step with safety

Pedestrians face increasingly hazardous conditions in city

Think driving in Morgantown's traffic is alarming?

Just try being a pedestrian.

No one needed a wake-up call about pedestrian safety locally. But we've had two since Aug. 19. Both fatalities: A retiree on South High Street and a WVU student on Pateston Drive.

And we are not the only community in West Virginia that's menaced by this issue.

Since Sept. 26, two fatal pedestrian accidents in Cabell County claimed the lives of three people: A man and a woman in Barboursville and an Ohio woman in Huntington.

However, Morgantown is especially dangerous because of the number of pedestrians. One state survey in 2000 reported Morgantown has the highest percentage of its municipal population — 16 percent — not using a motor vehicle to get back and forth to jobs, classes and elsewhere.

And we suspect that number has increased in step with WVU's enrollment, unemployment and this area's population.

A recent letter to the editor in our newspaper perhaps best put this issue in perspective when she wrote:

"Pedestrian safety should be a priority. Why isn't it?"

Where is the ongoing commitment and spending for sidewalk improvements, crosswalks, traffic signals and signage?

Anyone who takes a walk along Morgantown's streets, especially downtown or other central city areas, and along many state right-of-ways — dubbed city streets — knows the hazards.

Everything from inadequate to poor lighting and little to no buffer between the road and sidewalk are virtually the status quo in our community.

Crosswalks are few and far between and appear to offer, at best, a semblance of safety to pedestrians.

Major intersections across the city don't even offer the most rudimentary signals for pedestrians.

We did note WVU's presentation to the Morgantown Traffic Commission last week, and its commitment to enhancing pedestrian mobility on its Evansdale Campus and curbing traffic.

Obviously, the PRT, our rail trails, Mountain Line and some major sidewalk improvements have contributed to pedestrian safety in our area, too.

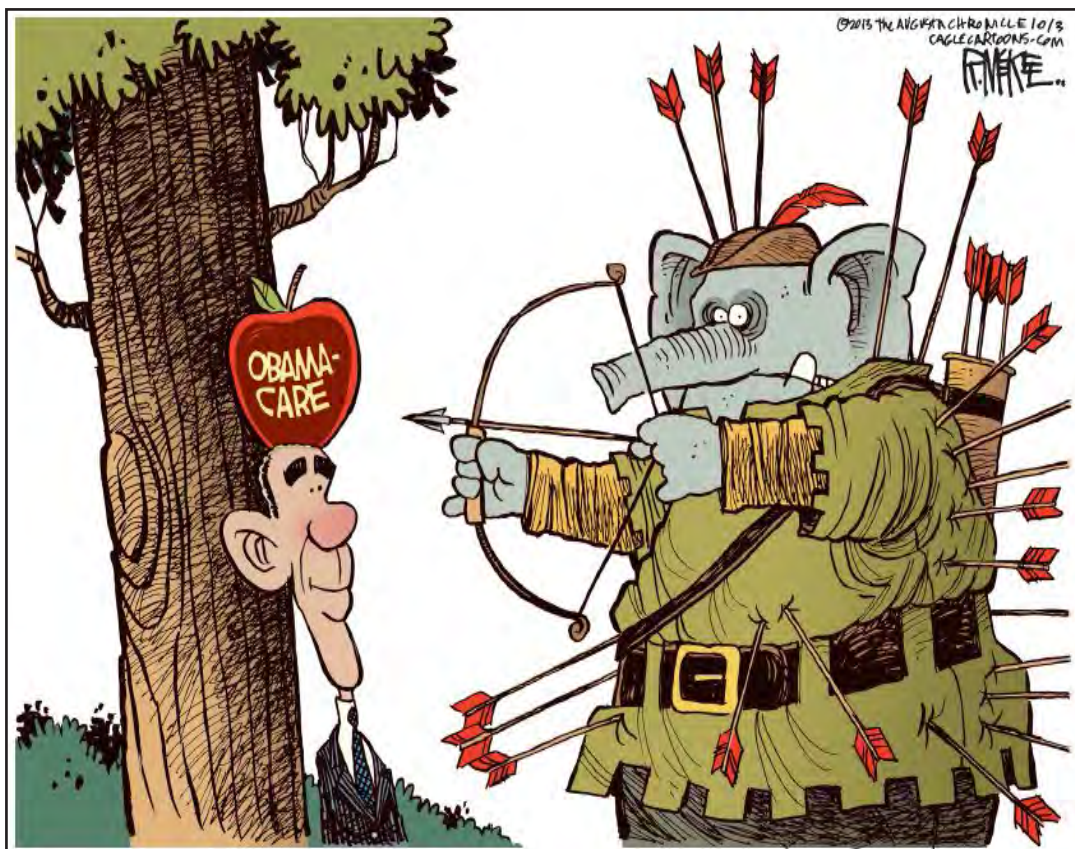
Yet, we would impress upon the city government, the state Department of Transportation and the WVU community, they all need to do more.

Clearly, pedestrians need to take responsibility, too, for complying with traffic laws and their own safety. Jaywalking is a matter of course in many areas of downtown.

Nearly every day there is probably a close call on one street or another in Morgantown that could have resulted in a pedestrian fatality.

The blame for the lack of pedestrian safety can often be assigned.

However, changing the conditions that cause these tragedies is a cause for all of us.

Playing by the rules

How to cancel the government shutdown without really trying

By all accounts, there are enough House Republicans prepared to join with Democrats to fund the government and raise the debt ceiling without demanding provisions attacking Obamacare. The only thing stopping them is the House leadership, which is refusing to allow appropriations bills onto the floor.

But House rules give the majority a way to take this decision out of Speaker John Boehner's hands. By signing a "discharge petition," 218 members can force a bill on to the floor for a decisive vote. The critical date is Oct. 14, because discharge petitions can be presented only on the second and fourth Mondays in a month. That's three days before the government runs up against the debt limit. Some commentators argue that the discharge petition route leads to a dead end. They point out that

House rules don't permit a discharge petition unless a bill has been pending in committee for at least 30 days, which serves to prevent recently submitted bills from gaining too-easy access to the House floor. But several "continuing resolution" and debt ceiling bills were submitted earlier in the session, and these could provide a bipartisan majority with the requisite leverage to overcome the resistance of the Republican leadership.

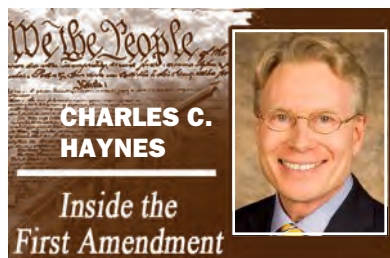
For example, Rep. James Lankford, R-Okla., and other Republicans submitted a "clean" continuing resolution on March 14, which gives Congress four more

months to reach agreement on final appropriations. If an impasse were to continue beyond this period, so would the money to run the government, with a 1-percent-age-point reduction to encourage the appropriations committees to take the necessary action quickly. If a majority approved this measure now, the House would make it plain to the Senate that it was no longer holding Obamacare hostage, and thereby invite serious negotiations.

Similarly, Rep. Mike Honda, D-Calif., introduced a measure early in the session that could serve as a basis for constructive action on the debt limit. His bill would eliminate the ability of a single chamber to veto increases in the national debt. Instead, the president could determine the amount required to avoid default on an annual basis, with both houses of Congress retaining the right to insist on a lower amount by passing a joint resolution.

Other pending bills suggest other approaches. There is no need for us to choose among them to make

Zoning out free speech on campus

ROBERT VAN TUINEN's run-in with campus police would be a funny story — if it weren't such a disturbing example of how freedom of speech is under assault on many American college and university campuses.

As reported in *The Daily Caller* and elsewhere, Van Tuinen, a student at Modesto Junior College in California, was stopped from handing out copies of the Constitution on Sept. 17 — the 226th anniversary of the signing of the Constitution.

College officials informed Van Tuinen that he could get permission to distribute the Constitution, but only if he pre-registered for time in the "free speech zone" — a tiny concrete slab big enough for two people.

Looking over the calendar, an administrator told Van Tuinen that she has "two people on campus right now, so you'd have to wait until either the 20th, 27th, or you can go into October."

Virtually everything about the Modesto Junior College "free speech" policy is wrongheaded and unconstitutional.

As Robert Shibley of the Foundation for Individual Rights in Education (FIRE) explains, the college "sent police to enforce an unconstitutional rule, said that students could not freely distribute literature, placed a waiting period on free speech, produced an artificial scarcity of room for free speech with a tiny 'free speech area,' and limited the number of speakers on campus to two at a time."

According to research conducted by FIRE, one in six of the nation's 400 top colleges and universities have "free speech zones," Orwellian doublespeak for "restrict speech zones."

When challenged, colleges sometimes back down — or lose in court. In 2012, for example, a federal judge ruled that the University of Cincinnati's "free speech zone" violated the First Amendment. But many policies limiting free speech on campus remain in force as instruments for limiting freedom of expression at scores of schools nationwide.

Why have so many American institutions of higher learning, reputed bastions of intellectual freedom, retreated into fear of freedom? Are school officials afraid of debate and dissent? Are they trying to keep people (outside the zone) from hearing words that may offend someone?

Whatever the bureaucratic anxieties that underlie speech restrictions on campus, "free speech zones" send the message to students that freedom of speech is a privilege doled out by administrators — not a fundamental human right.

Van Tuinen's classmates appear to have gotten the message. According to Van Tuinen, student government leaders criticized him for besmirching the name of the college.

I encountered a like attitude on a visit to a major university. When I asked the newly elected student body president what he planned to do in office, he described his proposal to establish a "free speech zone" on campus. He explained that students need a place to speak out for what they believe.

When I suggested that in the land of the free, the entire campus should be a "free speech zone," he just stared at me as though I were speaking gibberish.

One can only hope that Van Tuinen's simple act of civil disobedience inspires other like-minded students to challenge unconstitutional regulations on free speech at public colleges and universities across America.

They should take a page from Van Tuinen's playbook and hand out copies of the Bill of Rights outside the zone — and challenge school officials to explain why students are barred from exercising their right to free speech as guaranteed by the First Amendment to the U.S. Constitution.

WVU leading many positive trends in city

We agree with your Sept. 18 editorial stance that “Leaders should agree to disagree,” but want to set the record straight on some of the misstatements and false perceptions of WVU’s interaction with Morgantown and Monongalia County officials regarding comprehensive planning, current development projects and the university’s contributions to the city’s tax revenues.

Specifically, WVU officials were an integral part of the city’s comprehensive master planning process. In fact, one of WVU’s key facilities planners was on the Comprehensive Plan Steering Committee and senior leaders met as a stakeholder group with the city’s consulting team.

WVU also hosted several stakeholder meetings and public workshops, and WVU’s Bureau of Business and Economic Research provided economic forecasting and market data.

As a result, several key strategies were included in the city’s comprehensive plan related to traffic, transportation, zoning, joint recreational programming, improved communication and tax revenues.

In addition, city and WVU planners continue to meet and consult regularly on development issues and new and current projects.

It is also important to correct the statement that WVU has been involved in a “land grab.” That reference suggests a large-scale acquisition of land — and is simply not correct. WVU has purchased approximately 45 acres — within the thousands of acres of land in our city — for recent capital projects.

These projects are not only revenue-friendly ones for the Morgantown community, but several serve to clean up blighted areas — bringing not only aesthetic improvements to our city’s landscape, but providing safe modern housing for our students within walking distance of our campus and downtown Morgantown.

These capital projects, including the public-private ones, are generating several varieties of additional tax revenue for the city (B&O and personal property taxes) as well as fire service fees.

One example of this revenue enhancement is College Park, a new public-private mixed use housing development near Willey Street. WVU owns the land where it operated a residential complex for many years. Through a new partnership, it is estimated that the city will realize about \$72,000 in B&O and fire service fees annually from this project, and that construction-related B&O taxes will generate an additional \$700,000 in the initial phase.

It is estimated that the public/private partnerships alone — University Place, College Park, University Park — will provide more than \$150 million in new construction and more than \$3 million in capital B&O taxes — as well as provide a new tax base of more than \$400,000 annually to the city of Morgantown’s general fund.

In total, the City of Morgantown will realize about \$10 million in new capital B&O taxes during the next five years as many shovel-ready projects take shape — not including the tax revenue that will be forthcoming from the WVU hospital expansion.

WVU also pays more than a half million dollars annually in fire service fees to the city.

Generating jobs, putting local and state contractors to work, revitalizing neighborhoods and, in many cases, spurring further economic development in our city are all positive trends.

As to the fundamental premise of agreeing to disagree sometimes — absolutely, we should — but those discussions should be rooted in facts.

WVU values our relationship with our city, and wants to continue to build strong partnerships that lead to job creation, long term economic stability, and a high-quality of life in Morgantown.

the key point. If a majority signs a discharge petition for a strong initiative, it would push the House into a posture that would enable serious negotiations with the Senate to begin.

Once 218 members sign a discharge petition, a single signatory can move for the bill’s immediate consideration on the floor of the House. This motion is specially privileged. The full House must vote on it at once, and if it passes, resolutions related to it must be considered immediately and cannot be pushed off the floor by further parliamentary maneuvers. The rules explicitly require that it must remain the business of the House “until it is disposed of.”

There is no need to wait until Oct. 14 for the majority to take action. Democrats and Republicans should declare right now that they will sign a discharge petition when the moment comes. Even if a clean CR or a raised debt-ceiling means the Republican leadership alienates its right wing, it will suffer more from a humiliating defeat by moderate Republicans making an end run around the speaker and breaking his stranglehold over House proceedings.

Since the founding of the nation, Americans have looked to the people’s House as a special place for the realization of democratic values. The discharge petition is a fundamental mechanism for sustaining this claim. In using it as a tool to break the undemocratic effort by the Republican leadership to muzzle the majority, a bipartisan House coalition would not only be acting within its legal authority, it would be redeeming a basic principle of American government.

Efforts to end Obamacare doomed; let’s fix it instead

EVEN SOME OF ITS strongest supporters concede that President Barack Obama’s Affordable Care Act is an imperfect law, passed in an imperfect way.

“Anytime you implement something like this,” longtime Obama confidante David Axelrod said last August on MSNBC’s “Morning Joe” program, “it’s new and there’s no doubt that it’s complicated, there will be changes along — there should be changes along the way.”

But Republicans have chosen to mock the technical glitches accompanying its launching and make repeated doomed efforts to use the measures renewing government funding or extending the legal debt ceiling as vehicles to scuttle or delay it.

These GOP critics have been trying to do the wrong thing. Instead of using Obamacare as a political lever to satisfy their tea party base, they ought to attempt working with the administration to fix its shortcomings or trying to use their House majority to replace it.

After all, the goal of expanded health insurance is one most Americans share. Indeed, the 2010 Republican mantra implicitly acknowledged that by reiterating over and over that their goal was to “repeal and replace” it.

Indeed, if so complex a bill had been passed at a time before polarizing partisanship paralyzed the political system, the two parties would have joined in the ap-

propriate congressional committees to draft “technical fixes” improving its operation.

But that requires the cooperation that nowadays seems impossible.

The proof: The failed 2009 effort by Senate Finance Committee Democrats to craft a bipartisan health bill with their GOP counterparts, killed by GOP party pressure to stand firm against any bill.

Still, even before last week’s rollout of access to Obamacare, there have been suggestions of ways to improve it. Many, however, came from either fervent supporters or bitter opponents, creating doubts they could attract the broad support needed to pass.

For example, the pro-Obama heads of three major unions urged revision of a provision encouraging small business employers to avoid providing health insurance by limiting their workers to fewer than 30 hours per week. They also objected to the fact that nonprofit insurance plans in union contracts won’t get the same federal subsidies as for-profit plans.

Meanwhile, conservative publisher Steve Forbes urged GOP lawmakers to replace Obamacare with a measure allowing participants to choose their benefits, rather than accept mandated ones; preventing use of Medicare money to fund health insurance plans; and expanding tax deductions for insurance premiums.

Rather than trying to defund the law, which he called “even more unpopular than the bill itself,” Forbes said Republicans “should take the president up on his taunt that the Republicans have no alternative.”

Even former President Bill Clinton, who sought to spur Obamacare participation in a strongly pro-administration speech last month, took the occasion to call for bipartisan federal and state cooperation to fix some of its flaws.

Noting the provision requiring large employers to provide health insurance for their employees, he added that it doesn’t cover family members who are required to have insurance but are ineligible for federal subsidies to buy it.

“It’s not clear to me that anybody intended this,” Clinton said. “Congress should fix it.”

He also said tax credits to help small businesses afford health insurance for their workers are too small and limited to too few companies.

And he cited problems in states such as Texas that took advantage of the Supreme Court

ruling that they don’t have to provide expanded Medicaid coverage, designed to benefit millions of low-income Americans.

Republican Sen. Roy Blunt of Missouri was right Tuesday when he said the heavily partisan way the bill was initially passed has made it harder to fix, and that this was everybody’s fault.

Still, Congress ought to be debating proposals to improve Obamacare, rather than pursuing a path that, in the end, will neither defund it nor fix its shortcomings.

The fourth quarter has historically been the strongest for both the U.S. and foreign markets. Japan, Germany and other developed markets have had an average monthly return of 1.3 percent during the last quarter of the year, for example. That compares with an average return of 0.7 percent across all 12 months for the MSCI EAFE index, which was established in 1970. No clear reason exists for why the end of the year has been so strong, but much of the boost comes from December. The MSCI EAFE has had an average return of 2.9 percent during the month. Emerging markets have been even stronger, posting an average December return of 4.3 percent.

S&P 500 returns since 1945, developed markets since 1970 and emerging markets since 1988

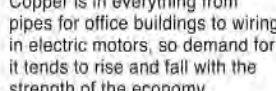

Copper is in everything from pipes for office buildings to wiring in electric motors, so demand for it tends to rise and fall with the strength of the economy. Investors call the commodity Dr. Copper: It offers a quick way to gauge the health of the economy. The price of copper has recovered in recent months on hopes that demand will strengthen. But investors should remember that's just one influence on a commodity's price: Supply matters too, and it may be on the rise soon for copper. Mine growth has been strong this year, second only to the record high of 2004, Barclays Capital says.

Copper price per pound

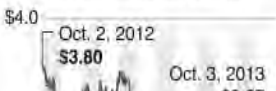

Oct. 10, 2012 — NEW YORK — Standard & Poor's downgraded its rating of Spain's debt Wednesday by two notches, leaving it on the cusp of junk status. A grinding recession, high unemployment and social unrest are limiting the government's options for stemming the country's financial crisis, S&P said.

One year later, the credit-rating agency continues to rate debt issued by Spain at "BBB-," its lowest investment-grade status. S&P still has a negative outlook on the country's debt rating, which means it could be further downgraded if Spain's economic conditions erode further.

S&P affirmed its debt rating on Spain in June, estimating that the nation's economy will contract by 1.5 percent this year before slowly beginning to recover in 2014.

Spain has been in recession for most of the past four years, although the government predicts the economy will grow this year.

In the second quarter of this year, the nation's unofficial unemployment rate stood at 26.3 percent.

Last month, Spain's economy minister said that higher taxes, lower interest payments on government-issued debt and spending cuts are helping the country move toward a budget deficit of 6.5 percent for 2013.

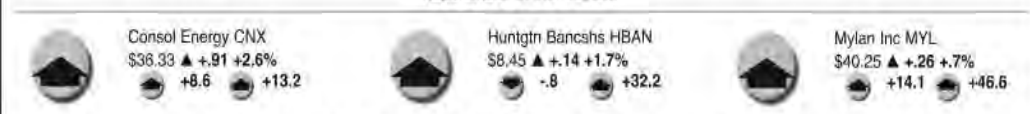

Investors hungrier for stock funds, but finicky

Investors are giving stock mutual funds another shot after getting burned during the financial crisis, but they're being choosy.

From January through August, investors put more money into stock funds than they pulled out, according to the most recent data from the Investment Company Institute. They invested a net total of \$106.5 billion, which is more than IBM's revenue for all of last year. It marks a sharp turnaround: Investors had yanked more from stock funds than they put in for 19 of the 20 preceding months, withdrawing a net total of \$320.4 billion.

Some analysts earlier this year were predicting a "Great Rotation," in which investors would migrate en masse from bonds into stocks. The thinking was that investors would get tired of low bond interest rates and would fear that their bond funds would lose money when interest rates rose. Instead, they'd switch over to

stocks, which have continued to surge. But memories of the painful losses suffered by stock funds in 2008 and early 2009 linger. So although investor interest in stock funds has increased in 2013, it's been only for certain kinds.

Some of that sting has investors looking abroad. Of the money taken in by stock funds this year, 86 percent went to world stock mutual funds. They're drawing interest in part because Japan has been one of the world's best markets. Europe's economy has also finally begun growing again, following six quarters of contraction.

Among U.S. stock mutual funds, investors have been more discriminating. A look at which types have been winners and losers:

— VALUE FUNDS

These funds aren't afraid to buy a stock when it's down. Value managers look for stocks in which they believe the market's expectations are too low. That may be due to an earnings setback or some other challenge. After buying a cheap stock, value funds are content to wait for the price to rise as expectations reset over time.

These funds have been popular: Large-cap value

stock funds have attracted \$7 billion in net new investment through the first eight months of 2013, according to Morningstar.

One big attraction is the dividends that value stock funds tend to pay, says Michael Rawson, fund analyst at Morningstar.

The dollars are flowing into value funds, though, when value managers say they're finding fewer stocks worth buying. "We've gotten to a point where stock prices are probably fair at best, and there just aren't that many bargains out there," says Brad Hinton, director of research at Weitz Funds.

— GROWTH FUNDS

Companies whose revenue and earnings are rising more quickly than the rest of the market are the main staple of growth funds. Think of Amazon.com or Google.

Investors are still leery: They yanked a net \$17.7 billion out of large-cap growth stock funds through August, according to Morningstar. In August alone, they withdrew a net \$3.2 billion.

Growth stocks can be risky. They're often more expensive than the rest of the market, as measured by their prices relative to their earnings. During the dot-

com boom, investors bid up technology and other growth stocks on expectations that the Internet would fuel tremendous earnings growth. But when the bubble burst in 2000, growth stocks in the Russell 3000 index lost 22.4 percent. That same year, value stocks returned 8 percent. The Russell 3000 covers 98 percent of the U.S. stock market.

Managers of growth stock funds argue that this is a good time for them. The global economic recovery has been tepid, which means investors will be willing to pay even more for growth, says Ryan Crane, chief investment officer of Stephens Investment Management Group.

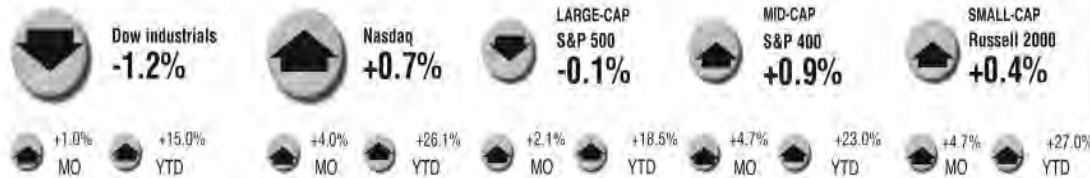
— BLEND FUNDS

Blend stock funds invest in a mix of both value and growth stocks, and they have been the most popular this year. Large-cap blend funds have attracted a net \$14.9 billion, according to Morningstar.

Much of that is due to a rising interest in index mutual funds. These funds keep it simple by trying only to mimic stock indexes, rather than trying to beat them. The most popular fund in August based on net investment was Vanguard's Total Stock Market Index fund. It drew \$2.3 billion and now has \$272.9 billion in assets.

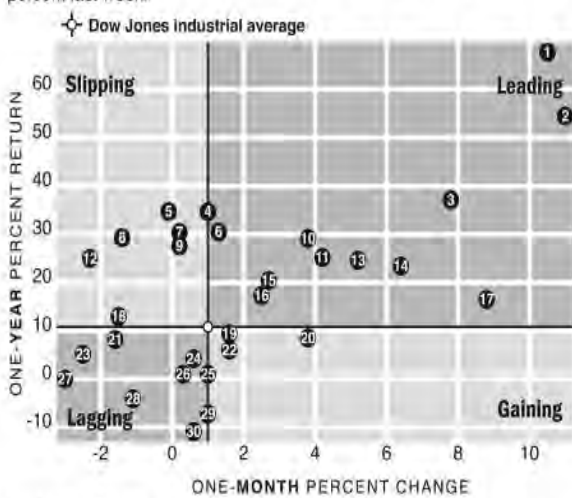

Falling estimates

Companies are lining up to report their latest quarterly results and analysts have been busy lowering the bar. They've slashed their forecasts for third-quarter earnings repeatedly, to the point where Wall Street now expects the weakest growth in a year.

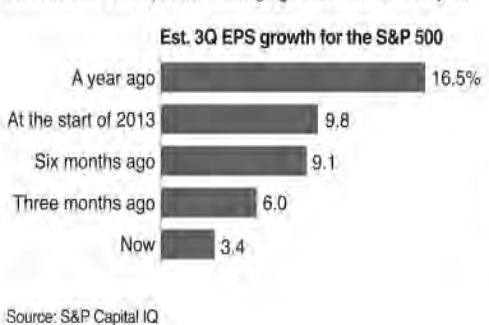
It's quite a change from a year ago when analysts were forecasting that companies in the Standard & Poor's 500 index would report a 16.5 percent jump in earnings per share. Now, they're looking for 3.4 percent growth in the July-through-September quarter, according to S&P Capital IQ.

The lowered expectations are a result of the still-mediocre global

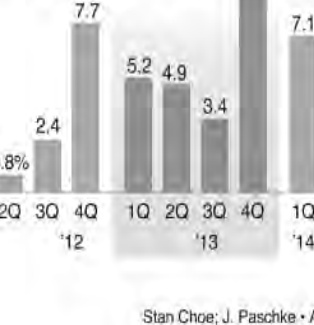
economic recovery. Higher oil prices and interest rates have also made it more challenging for many companies to grow profits.

But this is a familiar playbook. Analysts often underestimate how much companies will earn. At the start of second-quarter earnings season, analysts projected growth of 2.9 percent. That was after similarly slashing their forecasts repeatedly, down from an estimate of 8.9 percent growth at the start of the year. In the end, nearly two thirds of companies in the S&P 500 ended up beating analysts' expectations, and the index's earnings rose 4.9 percent in the second quarter from the year prior.

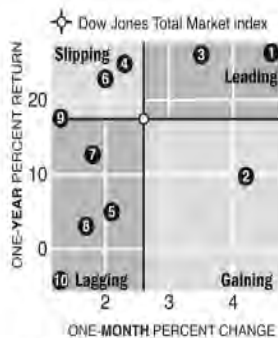
Dimming expectations Analysts have been slashing their forecasts for third-quarter earnings growth over the last year.

Health care

The health care industry is at the center of the debate in Washington that has partially shut down the federal government.

But the acronym hasn't affected stocks in the industry. Health care stocks returned an average of 1 percent last week, second-most among the 10 sectors that make up the total market. The sector has also been one of the top ones over the last year, returning an average of 24.9 percent.

Health care providers helped lead the way last week. Hospital owner HCA Holdings (HCA) rose 9.6 percent, for example. The stock has returned 53.4 percent over the last year. The government's overhaul of health care would mean more patients with insurance to pay the bills.

The Main Event Welcome to earnings season

Alcoa is set to report its third-quarter results on Tuesday, an event that used to signal the start of earnings reporting season for investors.

The aluminum maker was traditionally the first stock in the Dow Jones industrial average to report its quarterly results, and it heralded a rush of other companies to do so over the subsequent weeks. But Alcoa dropped out of the Dow on Sept. 20.

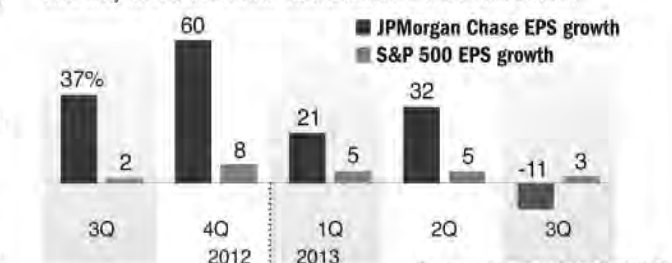
Nike, a new entry into the Dow, reported its results on Sept. 26, but it runs on a different fiscal calendar. The results it reported were for the June-through-August quarter. That means JPMorgan on Friday will be the first Dow stock to

report July-through-September results.

Analysts have low expectations, forecasting the banking giant will report an 11 percent drop in third-quarter earnings per share from a year ago. It's part of

widespread skepticism about bank earnings. Analysts expect earnings across all the financial stocks in the S&P 500 to fall 2.4 percent from a year earlier. A slowdown in bond trading has hurt revenue for the industry.

JPMorgan's strong profit growth likely ended last quarter, analysts say, and they forecast a similar slowdown for the broader market.



Why the Fed didn't blink

Most investors expected the Federal Reserve to announce a slowdown in its stimulus for the economy at its policy meeting last month. Interest rates climbed in anticipation, and stock prices wavered, but the Fed jolted the market when it announced it was holding steady on its bond-buying program. Rex Macey explains why the Fed did what it did, and what it changes.

Were you surprised that the Federal Reserve didn't slow its bond-buying program?
Yes and no. When you look at the data, the Fed has been saying it will be data dependent. Inflation has been going down, and any chart that we look at shows the economy is growing, but growing modestly. We're not seeing an acceleration in growth. So it's hard to see why the Fed needs to taper now when unemployment is still high, and inflation is going the wrong direction. I think the Fed has good justification for not tapering now, but it did catch the market off guard.

Housing is what got us into the crisis, and you've seen mortgage rates increase since they made the announcement about tapering. That probably spooked the Fed too. In a sense, they almost got the effect of tapering just by jawboning and talking about it, and they didn't feel the need to actually act.

Does it change anything for you, in terms of your investment decisions?
Clearly, short-term investors have to be very sensitive to Fed policies and actions. We've seen how abrupt markets move when the Fed meets. If that's where you are, you've got to be very careful.

It means that some of the trades we thought you'd have to unwind earlier — like utility stocks or certain kinds of bonds — you've got a little more runway, more time. But I think the signals are clear: When the Fed does start removing the punch bowl, that could be a time of concern.

Japanese stocks have been some of the year's best. Do you think that run can continue?
That market has recovered quite a bit, quickly. I think we need to see if the underlying economy is improving as the stock market suggests.

So wait a year or two for the economic numbers to catch up?
I think that's about right. People need to be careful about trying to look at the economy to judge the stock market. The stock market does a better job of predicting the economy than the economy does of predicting the stock market.

How about Europe?
It seems to be working through its problems. We think they're set up for positive surprises better than the U.S. The U.S. is viewed as having solved its problems: the Fed has done the right things, we've got this low-cost energy and a manufacturing renaissance. There's a slightly more attractive story in Europe, for the price. But it is more risk.

In Monongalia County, more than 300 4-H members and 100 volunteers are involved in 4-H clubs. Through community clubs, camps, school enrichment and afterschool programs, there were 9,618 youth involved in 4-H program in Monongalia County last year.

When combined with all of the state data, 1 in 4 West Virginia youth are served through our programs.

We have eight community clubs that meet throughout the county to plan community service, social, promotional and fundraising activities. These clubs are led by volunteers within each community.

You do not need to live

on a farm or be interested in livestock to be in 4-H. 4-H is a service-based club, where youth learn life skills such as leadership, teamwork, communication and cooperation. Monongalia County also has a shooting sports 4-H club that focuses on air rifle in the fall and archery in the spring.

We also take part in the regional 4-H shot gun club that meets monthly in Marion County. I have the great opportunity to advise the WVU collegiate 4-H Club, which any student can join, as well as assist with our county teen leader club, which is open to any teen in Monongalia County. We

have lots of opportunities for youth to learn more about 4-H and participate in a club.

"Overall, my 4-H experience has made me a better person," Monongalia County 4-H member Courtney Spears said. "The adult leaders and the adults that have helped through 4-H have made the largest impact on me. I have adults that care for me and want to see me succeed. 4-H is the best thing that I've ever experienced."

Courtney is a member of the Wadestown Busy Bees 4-H Club, Monongalia County 4-H Teen Leader Association and is a freshman at Fairmont

State University.

The goals of 4-H are to develop life and leadership skills; build self-esteem and character; foster citizenship and service; and teach healthy habits. Membership is free, and open to youths ages 9-21.

\$1.5 million or 13 cents per share on a basic and diluted basis for the quarter ended July 31, 2012.

The company reported net income from discontinued operations for the quarters ended July 31, 2013 and 2012 of \$216,000 and \$920,000 or 2 cents and 8 cents on a basic and diluted per share basis.

Net loss from continuing operations for the nine months ended July 31, 2013 was \$5.6 million or 49 cents per share on a basic and diluted basis.

At July 31, the company had about \$24.7 million of interest bearing debt, of which \$21.7 million is syndicated. The contractual

syndicated debt has been reduced by about \$64.6 million since inception of the debt, which resulted primarily from the acquisition of *The Herald-Dispatch* in September 2007.

This debt was paid down during a significant economic downturn and severe secular decline within

our printing and former newspaper segments. The company has achieved this debt reduction through a combination of earnings, cash flow, assets sales, equity additions and working capital management.

Due to the short term nature of our current Forbearance Agreement, our

ability to operate as a going concern is dependent on our ability to address our current credit situation.

AllStar Ecology receives grant

Area company AllStar Ecology LLC has received a West Virginia Division of Natural Resources Cooperative Research Grant to search for potential freshwater mussel populations in tributaries of the Monongahela River.

West Virginia supports nine federally endangered freshwater mussel species.

Freshwater mussels are important food sources for mammals, waterfowl and fish, and important water quality indicators.

Populations of all freshwater mussels have been drastically reduced in West Virginia's streams and rivers. Little is known about freshwater mussel populations in tributaries of the Monongahela River Basin.

The Cooperative Research Grant Program

will finance a survey of freshwater mussel populations in 26 Group One streams of the Monongahela River Basin.

The first targets are the Dunkard Creek, Paw Paw Creek and Booths Creek watersheds, as they are of the most interest to the WVDNR at this time.

With the recent fish and mussel kill in Dunkard Creek, this watershed is of particular interest to the WVDNR for future mussel restoration efforts.

Eleven other direct tributaries of the Monongahela River in Harrison, Monongalia, Marion and Taylor counties will be surveyed.

AllStar Ecology is a locally owned environmental consulting company started by graduates of the WVU Division of Forestry Wildlife and Fisheries program.

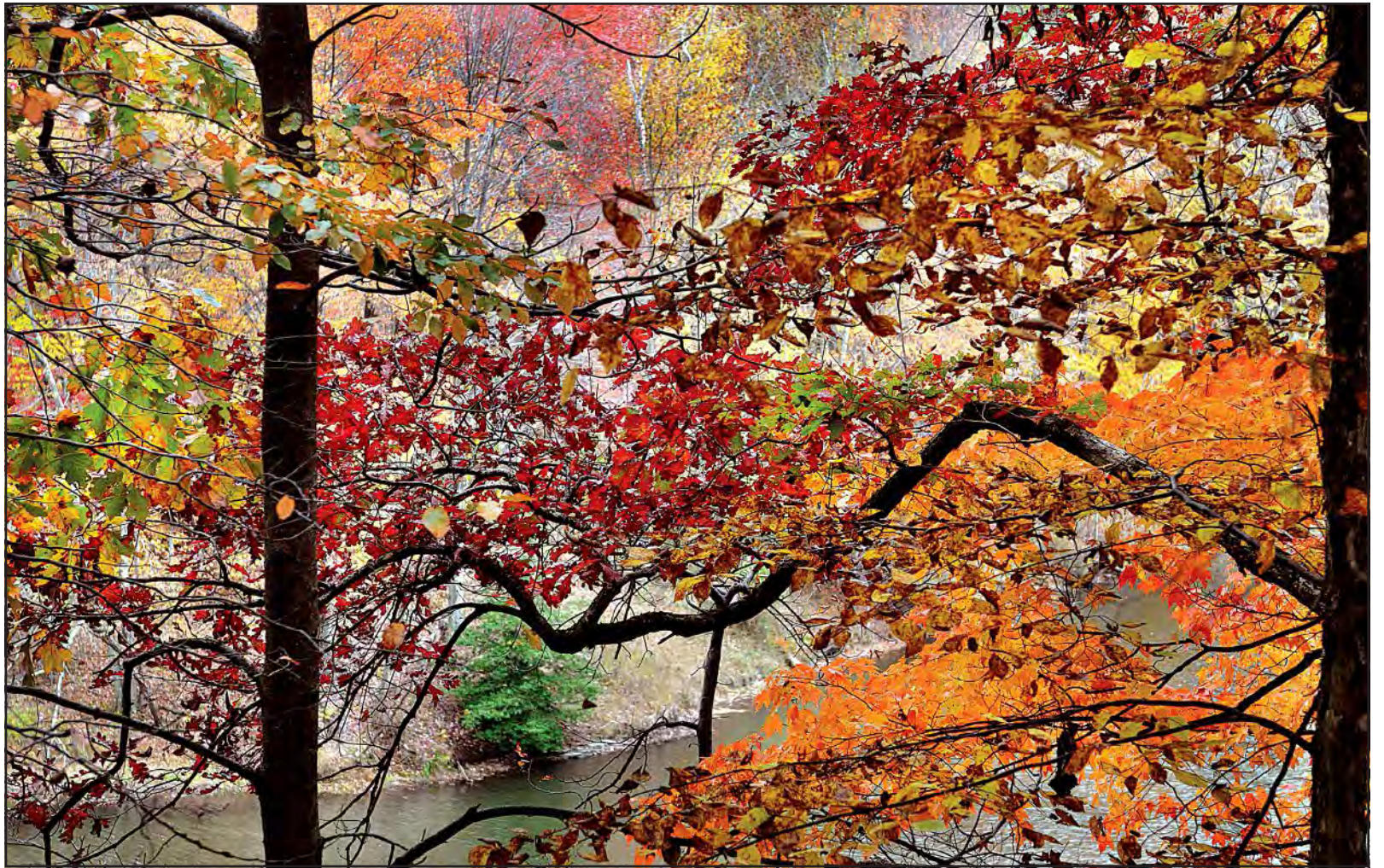
And I'm still obsessing over it, five days later. Which, from a clinical standpoint, is probably far more frightening than a predilection for low-budget horror films.

Well, we here at *The Dominion Post* have put together a bit of information to help you better understand — and, of course, enjoy — this all-too-short, color-soaked time of year.



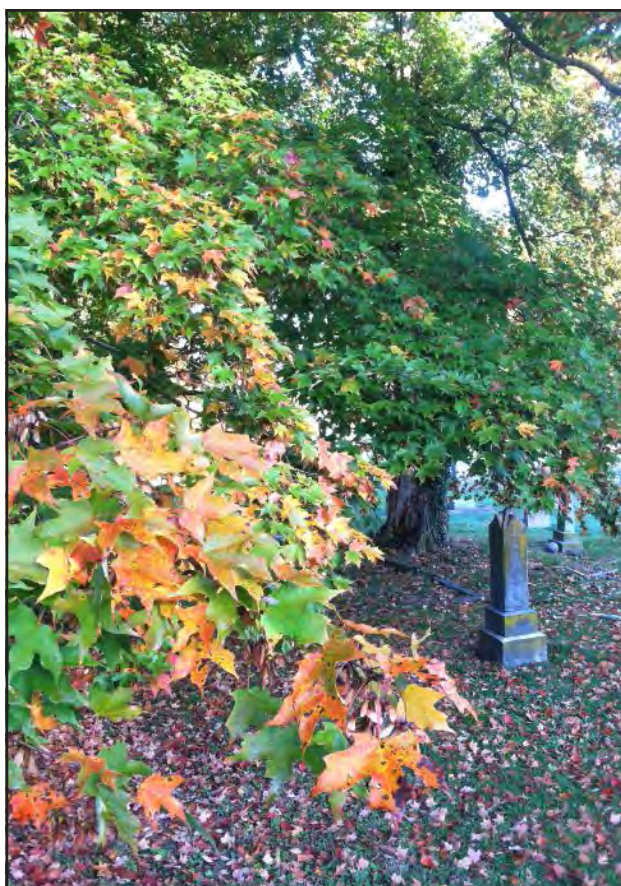

Why do the leaves turn different colors?

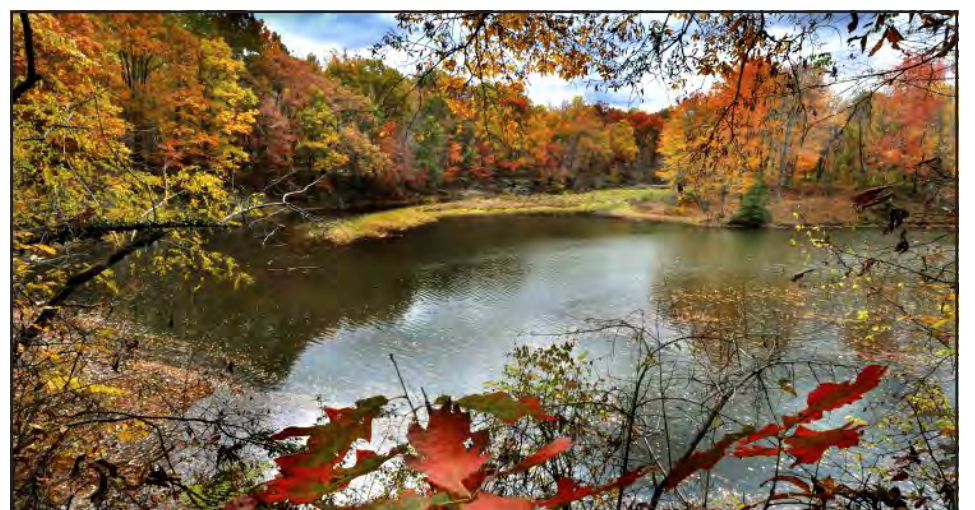

According to naturalist John Northheimer, writing for wvs.tateparks.com, the Official Site of West Virginia State Parks & Forests, the beauty of our state's autumn colors is far more than skin deep.

Beginning in August, and continuing in some areas through late October, the leaves on the trees begin to respond to the increasingly shorter days and cooler temperatures of fall.

"Our broad-leaved trees use leaves

during the summer months to produce food through the process of photosynthesis," Northheimer writes. "The green pigment chlorophyll is necessary for this process to function. When the leaf is actively producing food, chlorophyll occurs at a level that hides or masks two other types of pigments that are also present—carotenoids and xanthophylls. These two pigments are responsible for the yellow and orange colors. The tree slows its production of chlorophyll when the daylight period starts to decrease in late summer. The chlorophyll eventually disappears altogether, revealing these underlying colors.

"Another pigment comes into play when certain conditions exist. When night temperatures are low (but above freezing) and days are warm, the level of anthocyanins — those pigments that produce the brilliant reds and purples — increase in the leaf. This is a result of the conducting tissue narrowing and blocking fluid flow to the leaf at the point where the leaf stem is attached to the tree. This blockage traps sugar in the leaf. The combination of

trapped sugar and sunlight produces anthocyanins."

Eventually, the leaves completely sever their connections to the trees, and drop to the forest floor, where they will break down and serve as fertilizer — thus con-

tinuing the trees' lifecycles.

Morgantown lies right on the cusp between areas that peak in late September — including Blackwater Falls, Canaan Valley, Lost River, Cass and Watoga — and those that see their best colors during mid-October, such as Valley Falls, Tygart Lake, Summersville, North Bend and Parkersburg.

The most eastern, western and southern areas of the state — including the Eastern Panhandle (Berkeley Springs, Martinsburg), western areas such as Huntington and Ripley, and southern counties and cities, including Charleston, Bluefield and Lewisburg, all tend

From Kanye to Pharrell, rap stars embrace Cyrus

NEW YORK — While Miley Cyrus has a batch of critics, there is a group rallying behind her and praising her as a vital talent: Rappers.

Pharrell produced several songs on Cyrus' new album. She has been featured on the latest albums from Snoop Lion and will.i.am. Big Sean requested her as the star of his "Fire" music video. And to top it off, Kanye West invited her to appear on the remix to "Black Skinhead," his anti-racism rant from his eerie and dark "Yeezus" album.

Cyrus' album "Bangerz," out Tuesday, features guest spots from Big Sean, Nelly, Future and French Montana. In an interview, Juicy J called the 20-year-old "a genius." 50 Cent, who hasn't yet worked with her, added that Cyrus "can be on anything hip-hop orientated because (she's) rebellious."

The idea of the former "Hannah Montana" star becoming a muse for rap stars seems odd to some, but Mike Will Made-It, who executive produced "Bangerz," said the singer has struck a chord with rappers because she isn't following in the footsteps of pop stars such as Katy Perry but creating

her own bold path.

"People like Kanye are fans of music, people like Pharrell are fans of all types of music. ... It all boils down to her being very talented and not scared to do new things," said the producer, whose new single, "23," features Cyrus, Wiz Khalifa and Juicy J.

"Her voice is incredible. It's one of a kind ... no limitations," added Mike Will Made-It, who is behind hits such as Juicy J's "Bandz a Make Her Dance" and Rihanna's "Pour It Up."

Others aren't sure if talent is the reason behind it.

"Whether you're a Miley fan or not, she is the girl of the moment," said Cori Murray, entertainment director at *Essence* magazine. "Business is business. They're in the music business; she's the girl of the moment, so why not get on record with the girl of the moment? That's as basic as it's going to get."

Cyrus has been the girl of the moment for months now. It started with her transformation from teen queen to twerk queen, rising with her edgy "We Can't Stop" party-style music video. Of course, she hit new heights (or to some, new depths) with her

eye-popping, sexually charged MTV Video Music Awards performance in August. It featured the scantily dressed singer twerking, gyrating on Robin

Thicke and what's become her signature move — sticking out her tongue.

The wild child antics — from being nude in the music video for her first No. 1 hit, "Wrecking Ball," to her embrace of drug culture in a recent *Rolling Stone* interview — have made headlines. But her VMA performance and twerking with black female dancers caused another stir, with many questioning if Cyrus is wrongfully appropriating black culture as a path to success.

"That's a very ignorant statement to say like, 'Oh, she's misrepresenting the black culture 'cause she's twerking.' If that's the only thing that represents the black culture, that's sad," Mike Will Made-It said. "We got a whole bunch of (stuff) that represents the black culture."

Murray, who said she and other editors at *Essence* discussed Cyrus after her VMA performance, echoed the producer's thoughts.

"I think the black culture that she is influenced by, I think it's black culture that has become popular culture. There is so much to (black culture) and we're so complicated and she is just what mainstream America thinks about black cul-

ture," she said.

But while the star is a product of hip-hop culture, "Bangerz" is far from a hip-hop album. The 13-track set has moments that are downbeat, others are up-tempo dance numbers and electronic. It also features Britney Spears and production and songwriting work from pop master Dr. Luke.

While Cyrus has her rap cheerleaders, not everyone has embraced her. When asked about Cyrus' high profile rap collaborations, Ahmir "Questlove" Thompson jumped in with: "Or the idea of Miley using us as accessories? I don't know."

"I kind of felt same sort of way when Gwen Stefani went through her Asian phase as accessories. At the end of the day, it's like, is that objectifying us? Hip-hop is already a one-dimensional view as far as us looking like caricatures," the Roots leader said.

"Yeah, I'm all for collaborating, my life is based on collaborations, but I'm more concerned about what it's based in. Is it genuine interest or is it like a benign curiosity about a culture? I don't want her to just take that we're just good for twerking and having big (butts)."

Bullock calls 'Gravity' her 'best life decision'

LOS ANGELES — Sandra Bullock says making the lost-in-space movie "Gravity" with director Alfonso Cuaron was "the best life decision I think I ever made."

Cuaron coaxed Bullock into playing an astronaut coping with disaster at the International Space Station after she had intentionally taken a break from Hollywood following her Oscar-winning performance in "The Blind Side," subsequent divorce and then adoption of son Louis.

"What I got out of it personally outweighed everything else," Bullock said in an interview. "I'm glad I got to meet the human being — Alfonso — that led me to say, 'OK, let me investigate if I can even do this.'"

Bullock's priority had been spending time with her son, who is now 3, and Cuaron assured her that she wouldn't miss anything while shooting the film, which also features George Clooney and landed in theaters Friday.

"It has to be a great time for my son. I can't miss him. If I miss him, I will be of no use to you," Bullock recalled telling Cuaron and producers. "You know, he's just learning how to walk. So guess what's going to

happen? I have to go! He's taking steps! But they made it so (nice for Louis)."

For much of the "Gravity" shoot, Bullock was hooked up to innovative rigs to simulate weightlessness — sometimes in complete darkness — on a soundstage in London. She was mostly the only actor on set, making it even more difficult to convey the emotions of her character, medical engineer Ryan Stone.

"I would feel sorry for her all the time," said Cuaron, who co-wrote the script with his son Jonas and spent four years developing the film using new technology for weightless effects.

But the 49-year-old actress talks about the process, in which she had to carefully move her body to match lighting and cameras, as if it were therapy.

"You're frustrated because you can't accomplish something. There's no control. I was always out of my element," she said. "I learned so much on a daily basis. And I just went wow, isn't that funny how being miserable every day physically and then emotionally because of work then turns — makes you open to whatever is coming your way."

'Scandal' cast gets mannequin treatment at store

Shoppers unmask Halloween spirit

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. — Jessika Jaramillo went shopping Tuesday, looking for severed body parts, blood and scarred skin.

Sounds a bit ghoulish, but she's just gearing up to celebrate Halloween.

As the Oct. 31 holiday creeps up, folks such as Jaramillo are heading to stores with shopping lists that also include spider webs, skeletons, and cute or often frightening costumes.

"I'll be a tiger, and he'll be a zookeeper that got attacked. He'll be full of blood and scars," Jaramillo, 26, said as she and her boyfriend browsed an accessories aisle at a Spirit Halloween store in Davie, Fla.

Jaramillo said they plan on spending up to \$200 on costumes and an additional \$100 on decorations for their favorite holiday. That's a bit more than the projected national average. The National Retail Federation estimates that consumers will spend about \$75 each on Halloween décor, costumes, candy and parties, down from \$79.82 last

year. About a third of those surveyed said they'll do their spooky shopping before the end of September.

Halloween is only surpassed by Christmas when it comes to spending on decorations, the NRF said. This year, revelers are projected to spend nearly \$2 billion on haunting décor. Overall, Halloween spending is expected to reach

\$6.9 billion.

Some Halloween stores are "pop-up" locations that have short-term leases and usually feature merchandise tied to various holidays. Spirit Halloween is one such store. It has a "Lawn Scares" section for shoppers who want to terrify their neighbors and trick-or-treaters.

"There's everything

you'll find on a lawn, but it's been zombi-fied," said John Gravano, special projects manager in South Florida for the New Jersey-based chain. The popular retailer opens stores in early September and shuts them down Nov. 1. The company has eight in Broward County and seven in Palm Beach County.

Don't be surprised if you

see a bunch of Doc McStuffins trotting around this Halloween. Gravano said the Disney animated television character promises to be a top seller among children's costumes this year. For adults, the fascination with zombie and superhero costumes will continue, he said.

And for pets? "For some reason, and I can't explain, there's a popularity with bacon," Gravano said. "It's an outfit they put on dogs. The top is flat so it looks like bacon."

Perhaps more understandable, and also expected to be a hit again this year, are the sexy costumes.

"Sexy is the new traditional," said Lenny Rapp, owner of Masquerade Costumes, a year-round costume store in Hollywood, Fla., that includes sexy versions of a French maid or school girl, or characters like Wonder Woman. "Those will always be the most popular ones."

Rapp said he's had customers shopping for Halloween outfits as early as August.

"Because if they wait," he said, "they'll get what's there instead of what they want."

For Halloween fans, that's a scary thought.

Q: My 3-year-old Russian Blue cat likes to bite my face. He'll bite my chin, my nose, my forehead and my cheekbone. He only bites my husband's arm. He never breaks the skin, but just holds on unless we pull away. One time, the cat held onto my husband's arm so long that he (the cat) fell asleep and began to drool. Is there a logical explanation for this behavior?

A: It sounds like your cat loves you and your

husband. According to certified cat behavior consultant Jacqueline Munera, of Tampa, Fla., "Your cat isn't aggressive or biting hard. It sounds as though he may be suckling. Cats will sometimes do this on people or inanimate objects (such as pillows or blankets). I wonder if he purrs or kneads while doing this. These are signs of contentment, as is drooling."

Allowing any pet to bite (even benignly) at your face is worrisome. Perhaps, the cat finds your husband's face less appealing than yours, or perhaps he likes your husband's cologne. Your

husband may simply discourage the cat from nibbling at his face. An arm is a better option. If the love-sucking bothers you, offer your cat something else to suck on (such as a blanket), or distract him with an interactive toy (such as a fishing pole type toy with a feather) or catnip when he's poised to offer a love nibble.

Grand Bash to benefit WVU Children's Hospital

WHAT DO A 2014 Mercedes Benz, a 2014 Harley Davidson and a diamond ring all have in common? They're among the dozens of prizes up for grabs during the West Virginia Grand Bash, which will be from 1-7 p.m. Oct. 26 at the Ruby Community Center at Mylan Park in Morgantown. Proceeds will benefit WVU Children's Hospital at Ruby Memorial.

Gates open at 11 a.m. The drawing starts at 1 p.m. with the Mercedes. Tickets will be drawn every five minutes until 7 p.m. The winner of the \$100,000 grand prize will be the ticket holder with the number that exactly matches the West Virginia Daily 4 Lottery on that day. It was first thought that Meg was going to be a high level quadriplegic complete, which meant that she would have no hope of regaining muscle movement below the point of injury, and she would depend on a ventilator to breathe for the rest of her life.

Dr. John France, orthopaedic surgeon, performed surgery on Meg's

neck, and Dr. Jennifer Knight, a surgeon in Ruby's Jon Michael Moore Trauma Center, implanted a diaphragm pacemaker, which eventually allowed her to breathe without the use of a ventilator. Following surgery, Meg spent time in the Pediatric Intensive Care Unit at WVU Children's Hospital before being transferred to the Shepherd Center in Atlanta, Ga.

At Shepherd, she began to slowly regain movement throughout her whole body. During the last year and a half, she has made an astonishing recovery. Meg now walks and breathes completely on her own.

"We will be forever indebted to WVU Children's Hospital for all that they did during the days following Meg's accident," John Throckmorton said. "The medical procedures and treatments that she received during her stay sparked an amazing recovery. The hospital is a vital and integral part of this region."

Questions about suicide always be hard to answer

Q: This past summer, I've had to deal with not one, but two deaths by suicide. Each of these men seemed to have so much to live for, but unfortunately, we really never know what someone else is thinking.

My question is "What happens to these men's souls after they die?" I'd hate to think their souls would have to live as tortured an existence in the afterlife as they had to live on earth. Both were good men, but their demons obviously got the better of them. It breaks my heart. — A., Valley Stream, NY, via god squadquestion@aol.com)

A: Your question breaks my heart, as well. The recent suicide of a friend of my friend still haunts me. The teaching of the Abrahamic faiths (Judaism, Christianity and Islam) about suicide perfectly reflects our own divided souls on this terrible matter.

On the one hand, we all want to condemn suicide in the strongest possible terms. On the other hand, we want to have compassion for the poor tormented souls who've blundered into a broken place where hope was fatally elusive. Our religions speak to both sides

of this human tragedy.

On the condemnatory side of religious beliefs about suicide — I would actually prefer to call this the life-affirming side — is the belief that murder, including self-murder, is the worst of all sins because it takes away God's greatest gift, the gift of life.

We did not give ourselves life, so we are not allowed to usurp God's right to take it away from us. Deuteronomy 30:19-20, reminds us that God has set before us life and death and our job is to choose life, no matter how difficult that choice might be:

"I call heaven and earth to record this day against you, that I have set before you life and death, blessing and cursing: Therefore choose life, that both thou and thy seed may live: That thou mayest love the Lord thy God, and that thou mayest obey his voice, and that thou mayest cleave unto him: For he is thy life, and the length of thy days ..." (KJV)

Seen in the light of this text, suicide is not just a rejection of life but a rejection of love and a rejection of God. No despair, no matter how deep, should drive us to throw away every supremely good thing in life.

One of many Christian Testament texts expressing a similar anti-suicidal sentiment is 1 Corinthians 3:16-17:

"Know ye not that ye are the temple of God, and that the Spirit of God dwelleth in you? If any man defile the temple of God, him shall God destroy; for the temple of God is holy, which temple ye are." (KJV)

The Qur'an 4:29-30 follows this life-affirming prohibition against self murder or any murder:

"Nor kill (or destroy) yourselves: For verily God hath been to you Most Merciful!"

So the consequences of killing yourself are the same as the consequences of killing any other innocent person, and those consequences reflect the sanctity of life.

However, all these traditions have another more merciful element in their teachings about suicide that reflects our compassion for

all murder victims, including those who murder themselves. After all, sometimes suicide is a cry for help that goes too far.

Sometimes suicide is the result of an accidental or impulsive overdose of drugs. Sometimes suicide is the result of risky behavior that suddenly becomes fatally risky. And, sometimes suicide is the result of severe mental illness that was not or could not be treated.

So, for example, in Judaism, although a person who commits suicide cannot be buried in a Jewish cemetery, when actually confronted with a suicide victim, rabbis will always rule that the person should be allowed to be buried in the cemetery anyway because perhaps he or she died of fear before the suicide. It makes no sense, I know, but if you're trying to fit compassion into tragedy it makes all the sense in the world.

In Christianity, the belief that those who have truly accepted Christ will absolutely be saved regardless of their works in life enables Christians to hope that the suicide victim will be saved and brought to heaven because of their faith.

Dreams: Full of meaning or a reflex of the brain?

LOS ANGELES — It's a question that has long fascinated and flummoxed those who study human behavior: From whence comes the impulse to dream? Are dreams generated from the brain's "top" — the high-flying cortical structures that allow us to reason, perceive, act and remember? Or do they come from the brain's "bottom" — the unheralded brainstem, which quietly oversees such basic bodily functions as respiration, heart rate, salivation and temperature control?

At stake is what to make of the funny, sexual, scary and just plain bizarre mental scenarios that play themselves out in our heads while we sleep. Are our subconscious fantasies coming up for a breath of air, as Sigmund Freud believed? Is our brain consolidating lessons learned and pitching out unneeded data, as neuroscientists suggest? Or are dreams no more meaningful than a spontaneous run of erratic heartbeats, a hot flash or the frisson we feel at the sight of an attractive passer-by?

A study published this week in the journal *Brain* suggests that the impulse to dream may be little more than a tickle sent up from the brainstem to the brain's sensory cortex.

The full dream experience — the complex scenarios, the feelings of fear, delight or longing — may require the further input of the brain's higher-order cortical areas, the new research suggests. But even people with grievous injury to the brain's prime motivational machinery are

capable of dreams, the study found.

The latest research looked for sleep-time "mentation" — thoughts, essentially — in a small group of very unusual patients. These patients — 13 in all — had suffered damage within their brains' limbic system, the seat of our basic desires and motivations — for sex, for food, for pleasurable sensations brought on by drugs and friendship and whatever else turns us on.

As a result of that damage, they had a neuropsychological syndrome called auto-activation deficit, or AAD: Even while fully conscious, they could sit completely idle and mope for hours if they were not prodded to action or speech by caregivers. In fact, they were more than unmotivated to do anything; when asked about their thoughts, they would frequently report that their mind was completely blank. When prompted, they could often do math, sing a song or conjure up memories. But left on their own, these pa-

tients might have no spontaneous thoughts at all.

Do these people dream? The answer might suggest the answer to the question of where dreams come from.

Indeed, they do dream — or at least some of them did, in an experiment that compared the nighttime mentations of normal, healthy subjects with subjects who suffered from AAD. When awakened from rapid eye movement (REM) sleep — the sleep stage at which dreams are thought to be most common and complex — four of the patients with AAD — 31 percent of them — reported mentations.

That was a lot less dreaming than was happening in the healthy subjects, 92 percent of whom reported dreams — and much more colorful and bizarre ones — when they were awakened from REM sleep.

In the AAD patients, the dreams were rarer, shorter and less complex: They said they dreamed of things like shaving, taking a walk or seeing a relative. But even these rudimentary dreams

cast them in situations that, in a conscious state, they were unlikely to think of unprompted.

That these inert patients could generate dreams was a "most unexpected result," said the study's authors, a team of French neurologists, neuroscientists and sleep specialists based in several institutes in Paris. It supports the hypothesis that "dreams are generated through bottom-up processes," they concluded.

The "top-down theory" — that dreams originate from the brain's higher-order cortex, the place from which imagination springs — "is not supported here," the authors said, "as patients with AAD who have a mental emptiness and no imagination during wakefulness do report some dream mentations upon emerging from sleep."

Of course, the dreams of healthy subjects may be embellished by input from the cortical areas that are the seats of perception, memory, emotion and reason, the authors said: That is demonstrated by the vastly richer dreams described by normal subjects.

A lot of dream research in humans has been based on subjects with bizarre damage to the brain. People who have had frontal lobotomies, for instance, report an abrupt cessation of dream activity — an observation that had rallied the top-down view of the dream impulse.

It's an imperfect method of research, since such subjects are rare and no two have exactly the same injuries. So, while the rest of us dream away unbothered, this intriguing debate is likely to remain open for some time to come.

Pain causes numerous sick days at U.S. companies, costs billions

depression and arthritis. Workers with pain were also five times more likely to report being limited in their ability to do their work.

Three of the five most common health problems reported in the survey — neck pain, back pain and arthritis — are musculoskeletal in nature. These are conditions that can be managed very effectively by a doctor of chiropractic. The authors of the study believe that designing programs targeting musculoskeletal conditions will offer companies a win-win situation for all involved.

In our state, chiropractors are losing the ability to be the primary treating physicians for the injured worker. This bodes poorly for the employer trying to get the worker back to the

workplace, as statistically, the chiropractor typically creates the greatest short-term and long-term outcomes for the worker. This is especially true when chiropractic is combined with physical therapy.

If you or an employee of yours is losing work or is out because of an injury, it makes sense to request that a chiropractor is part of the team in treating the injury and getting back to productivity.

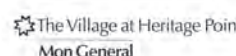

Experimenting in Orbit

International Space Station

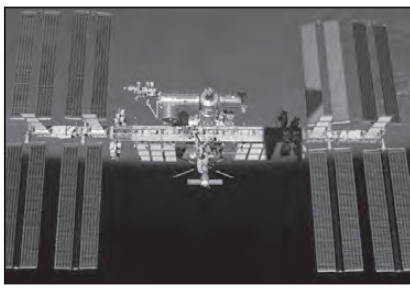
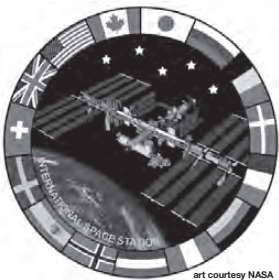
Far from Earth, about 220 miles up in space, astronauts and cosmonauts are performing experiments. On the International Space Station, or ISS, scientists can conduct tests in conditions that are impossible to create on Earth.

In order to learn more about these important experiments, The Mini Page talked with an ISS program scientist.

Experimenting onboard ISS

About 150 experiments are going on at any time in the space station. Many experiments last six months or longer. As with most scientific testing, it can take three to five years before experts realize benefits from the experiments.

Five space agencies, from Japan, Canada, Europe, Russia and the United States, helped build and operate the station. All the partners can perform experiments onboard the station, and scientists share results with everyone else.



The first crew began living onboard the International Space Station in 2000. People have been living there ever since.

A tiny pull of gravity

The space station is **unique** (you-NEEK), or unlike anything else, because of microgravity. **Microgravity** is a state, or condition, where the force of gravity seems to be tiny. "Micro" means "very small." With microgravity, things seem to be weightless.

Gravity is a force that pulls people and things toward physical bodies, such as Earth. The ISS is close enough to Earth that the Earth's gravity is still strong. The gravity is about 90 percent of that on Earth.

But things act as if they weigh almost nothing on the station. This is because of a condition called **free fall**.

Free fall

Gravity pulls on everything the same way. It doesn't matter if things are different sizes or shapes. If there were no air, a feather would fall as fast as a bowling ball. But on Earth, the air slows the feather down.

In space, the station, the crew and everything in the station are falling around Earth at the same speed. Because everything is falling together, everything seems to float. This is called free fall.

But the space station is orbiting the Earth at just the right speed, about 17,500 miles per hour, so the spacecraft never falls all the way to Earth, but keeps orbiting it.

Rookie Cookie's Recipe Turkey and Cheese Noodle Casserole

You'll need:

• 1 (12-ounce) package egg noodles	• 1 (8-ounce) package reduced-fat cream cheese
• 1 pound ground turkey	• 1 (8-ounce) carton reduced-fat sour cream
• 1 cup onion, chopped	• 1 (24-ounce) jar spaghetti sauce
• 1 cup green pepper, chopped	• 2 cups shredded cheddar cheese

What to do:

1. Cook noodles according to package directions; drain.
2. Brown ground turkey with onion and green pepper in large skillet.
3. In a medium bowl, combine cream cheese and sour cream.
4. Pour noodles into a 9-by-13-inch baking dish and mix with one cup spaghetti sauce.
5. Mix remaining sauce with turkey and vegetables. Spread on top of noodles.
6. Layer cream cheese mixture next, spreading evenly over turkey mixture.
7. Top with cheddar cheese.
8. Bake in 350-degree oven for 25 to 30 minutes, until cheese is melted and casserole is bubbling.
9. Allow to sit for 5 minutes before cutting into squares. Serves 8.

Why not? After all, the All-Star right-hander had charged to a big-league best 19-2 record by early September, a major reason the Tigers led their division.

Scherzer, a former college All-American at the University of Missouri, baffles batters with different pitches, including a blazing fastball. He recorded 209 strikeouts in his first 190-plus innings.

The Space Laboratory

Everything changes

Everything we know — all biological, chemical and physical processes — developed in the gravity on Earth. When we take away Earth's gravity, things act differently. For example, crystals grow larger, flames are rounder, and plant roots not only grow down, but out toward food.

The ISS allows us to study how things change in microgravity. This helps us learn why things act the way they do on Earth. In microgravity, things don't always act the way scientists expect.



On Earth, flames form a teardrop shape (left). In microgravity, flames grow into a rounder shape.

Success story

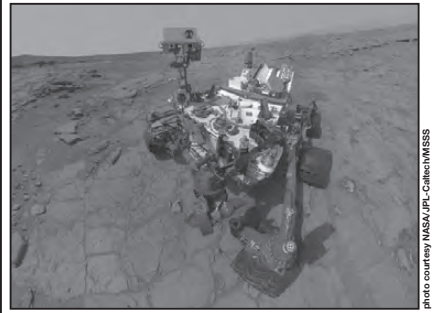
A disease called Duchenne muscular dystrophy (DIS-troe-fee) affects about 1 in 3,500 boys. It causes muscles to waste away.

In microgravity, crystals grow bigger and more regularly shaped. This lets researchers get a better look at protein crystals involved in this disease. They have identified a substance in the protein that they couldn't find on Earth. This is helping scientists develop better treatments.

The effects of outer space

Space radiation, temperature differences and other conditions in outer space can destroy materials. Experiments mounted on the outside of the ISS are helping scientists figure out which materials last longest in space.

One of the samples from ISS experiments survived so well that it was used to create a coating for Curiosity, the rover now exploring Mars.

Humans in Space

Protecting our health

Some of the most important research onboard the ISS has involved the study of humans living in space. For example, studies have shown that people's **immune systems**, or the systems battling disease, are weaker in microgravity. This is a problem for people living in space for long periods.

Astronauts lose about 2 percent of their bone mass each month they are in space. This is much higher than bone loss on Earth.

After 40 years of experimenting in space, researchers from the U.S. have found the right mix of exercise and nutrition to prevent bone loss in astronauts. These findings are helping to treat bedridden patients and the elderly on Earth, who are in special danger for bone loss.

More than 43 million students from 49 countries have worked with researchers on space station experiments. Middle school, high school and college students all work on ISS experiments.

Cells of the body

Animal and human cells act very differently in space. Cells form into more circular shapes. Because fluids flow differently in microgravity, the fluids in cells act differently. Cells do not communicate with each other in the same way.

These different ways of acting can cause problems for scientists. But they can also help researchers see things in new ways. For example, by studying how cells act in space, scientists hope to learn how to better control cancer cells, which also act differently than normal cells.



Salmonella bacteria, which cause food poisoning, are especially dangerous in space. ISS researchers are trying to find a vaccine against them.

Technology

Experiments on the ISS have helped experts make better machines for use on Earth. For example, knowledge gained from building the station's robotic arm has led to a special robot. It can perform surgery too tiny and precise for a human surgeon.

This technology is especially useful for performing surgeries on children and babies and has saved dozens of lives.

Experimenters are working to develop techniques to refuel satellites. Now, satellites may work for about 25 years, but then they quit working.

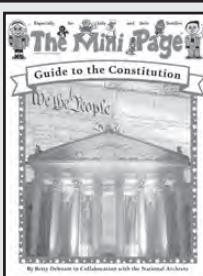

How to choose the best offer on your home

HERE'S SOME simple steps to help buyers decide which offer is best for them.

Understand the process

All offers are negotiable, as your agent will tell you. When you receive an offer, you can accept it, reject it, or respond by asking that terms be modified.

Set baselines

Decide in advance what terms are most important to you. For instance, if price is most important, you may need to be flexible on your closing date. Or if you want certainty that the transaction won't fall apart because the buyer can't get a mortgage, require a prequalified or cash buyer.

Use a review process

If you think your home will receive multiple offers, work with your agent to establish a time frame during which buyers must submit offers. That gives your agent time to market your home to as many potential buyers as possible, and you time to review all the offers you receive.

Business

Selling your home can be emotional. But it's simply a business transaction, and you should treat it that way. If your agent tells you a buyer complained that your kitchen is horribly outdated, justifying a lowball offer, don't be offended. Consider it a sign the buyer is interested and understand that those comments are a negotiating tactic. Negotiate in kind.

Review every term

Carefully evaluate all the terms of each offer. Price is important, but so are other terms. Is the buyer asking for property or fixtures — such as appliances, furniture, or window treatments — to be included in the sale?

Is the amount of earnest money the buyer has offered sufficient? The lower the earnest money, the less painful it will be for the buyer to forfeit those funds by walking away from the purchase if problems arise.

Is the buyer asking you to make concessions, like covering some closing costs? Are you willing, and can you afford to do that? Does the buyer's proposed closing date mesh with your timeline?

Be creative

If you've received an unacceptable offer through your agent, ask questions to determine what's most important to the buyer and see if you can meet that need. You may learn the buyer has to move quickly. That may allow you to stand firm on price but offer to close quickly. The key to successfully negotiating the sale is to remain flexible.

Big changes coming to office buildings

With the lines between our work lives and personal time blurring as new technology unchains us from our desks, the notion of what a desirable office looks like is also changing.

Corporate America is moving away from conventional layouts where an employee's status is measured by the amount of space he occupies. Instead, more compact, playful designs are coming into favor.

People can do their jobs almost anywhere with their cell phones and laptops, the reasoning goes, so let's make the office a place where people are stimulated by close interaction at their workstations and chance meetings in inviting public spaces such as lounges and coffee bars.

This gradual but pervasive shift in workplace culture that packs more employees into less room has been a blow to conventional office buildings in downtown Los Angeles and other financial centers. Acres of space lie vacant even though the economy is improving and many businesses are adding workers.

Making underused office properties desirable again may require radical modifications inside and out, real estate experts say. Few owners have taken bold actions yet, but architects and urban planners are scheming about how such transformations might be accomplished.

Cutting out chunks of an office building's interior to create an atrium or theater, adding loft-like mezzanines on floors with high ceilings, or grafting on outdoor staircases are among the ways that structures could be dramatically remodeled to be more efficient and appeal to changing tastes.

Such changes could also make it possible for office buildings to accommodate multiple uses. In a real estate industry idea competition last year, architecture firm Gensler suggested that the 40-story Union Bank Plaza in Los Angeles could be renovated to have auditoriums and classrooms for a school on its lower floors and a large fitness center above. Higher floors could house hotel rooms, apartments and a spa — and still leave room for offices.

Union Bank Plaza is nearly fully occupied with office tenants, but other buildings including US Bank Tower, the tallest tower in the West, suffer from persistent vacancy.

Big changes in conventional offices are eventually going to be needed because formal workplaces where men and women

arrive "dressed for success" in tailored suits after long drives from suburbia are dying out, said Peter Miscovich, managing director of strategy and innovation and real estate brokerage Jones Lang LaSalle.

Many of them are moving to urban centers to be closer to their jobs and leisure activities. The population of downtown Los Angeles, for example, has swelled since 2000, yet office vacancy has hovered

stubbornly around 20 percent in the same period.

Both landlords and tenants are under pressure to make their offices less square — in both senses of the word — as they seek to attract top workers while using space more efficiently.

One tenant that has taken the plunge is Gensler, which moved downtown in late 2011 after 20 years in Santa Monica, Calif. Architects at the firm came up with a plan to trans-

form a building that was once a prominent branch of Bank of America into an example of a futuristic workplace and a showcase for Gensler's work.

Gensler demolished the core of the granite-clad 1970s building, creating an interior staircase under a new skylight cut into the roof. The firm also suspended a new mezzanine, turning a staid building into a three-story showplace that hosts numerous public events in its built-in amphitheater.

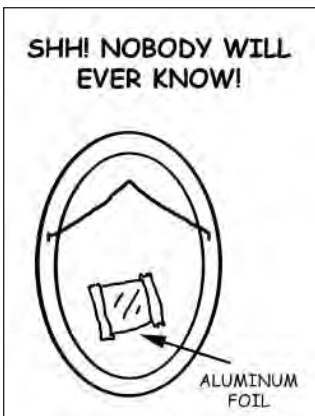

Antique toys take much inspiration from everyday life

OLD TOYS are very different from those made today. Toy-makers of long ago did not try to encourage creativity. A toy was made to resemble a known part of life — a house, car or pet — or perhaps a fantasy — a rocketship or robot. Or they were puzzles meant to teach the alphabet or arithmetic, or character dolls from stories that told of good behavior or gave lessons from the Bible. In the late-19th century, a group of cast-iron bell-ringer toys became popular. These were pull toys with a platform and four wheels. The figures on the platform moved when the toy's wheels turned. The "Trick Elephant Bell Ringer," with its name in raised letters on the side, was made by the Gong Bell Manufacturing Co. of East Hampton, Conn. When the toy was pulled, the wheels moved and the elephant turned and hit the bell. The elephant stands on a pierced and painted platform, suggesting that he is a circus performer. The painted iron toy, about 5 inches high and 8 inches long, sold for \$1,230 at a Skinner auction in Boston.

A: Chairs with arms that end in animal heads were popular in Victorian times and later. Dog heads are the ones most often found. Your chair is unusual because the heads

are slightly different, but whether or not they represent a male and female dog is something only the maker would know. It's not possible to give an accurate value for your chair since the maker and age are unknown, but you can be sure that your wife got a good value for \$9 and an

Q: We have a Marx metal dollhouse, purchased in 1956, that's still in its original, unopened carton. Please tell us what it's worth today.

A: Louis Marx and Co. was founded in New York City in 1919 and closed in 1978. In the early 1950s, it was the largest toy company in the world. Marx introduced its first metal dollhouses in 1949 and continued to sell a variety of dollhouses into the 1970s. Most sets included plastic furniture and dollhouse-size plastic dolls. The value of your unopened dollhouse set depends on the house's design and size. It could sell for \$200 to \$350. (A furnished house that has been played with would sell for only about \$25 to \$50.)

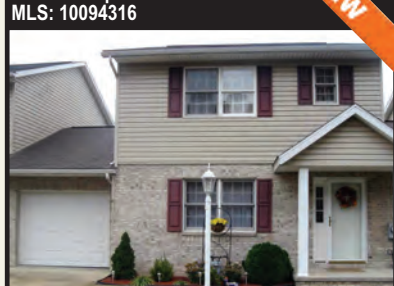

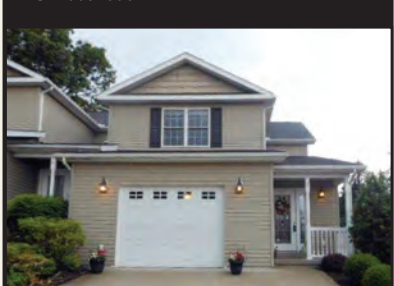

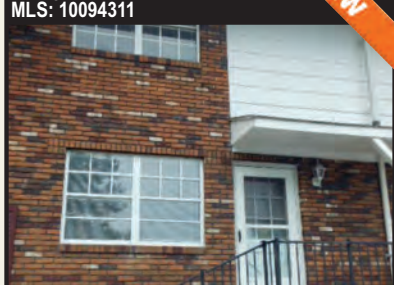

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Mortgage rates fall for third week

Mortgage rates have tumbled for the third straight week, with Freddie Mac pegging the 30-year fixed loan at an average of 4.22 percent, down from 4.32 percent last week to the lowest level since June.

But what good is a low rate if a lender can't process your application?

A protracted government shutdown would hamper the ability of lenders to confirm borrowers' incomes and identities, as well as threatening loans that are backed by agencies such as the Federal Housing Administration.

"The federal government shutdown will have a growing impact on the housing market the longer it continues," David H. Stevens, president and chief executive of the Mortgage Bankers Association, said in a statement Thursday.

"Lenders processing loans that need tax transcripts, Social Security number verification or FHA home loans face longer delays and reduced functionality," Stevens said, warning of "confusion and fear among borrowers about whether they will be able to close on a home purchase or refinance."

Sales of rental properties awaiting FHA financing

could be held up as well, Stevens said.

Experts said mortgage seekers should discuss timelines and expectations with their lender, and inquire about longer commitments, longer rate locks and extension policies for each.

"If the government shutdown is only for a few days, it should be minimally disruptive," said Keith Gumbinger, vice president of HSH.com, which tracks mortgage rates.

"Most loans are closed toward the end of the month, so a few days' delay in getting documentation shouldn't derail too many deals," Gumbinger said.

Firespikes' blossoms bringing in butterflies and hummingbirds

A plant known as a firespike or scarlet flame should tell you immediately this is special. And if you are an adventurous gardener, right now they are showing out in your landscape and attracting both hummingbirds and butterflies. They are indeed among the best for the backyard nature habitat.

The firespike is known botanically as *Odontonema strictum* and is native to Central America. It is in the acanthus family, which offers many of our finest landscape flowers and foliage, such as the Brazilian plume flower, yellow shrimp plant and sanchezia. The list is long and the firespike is among the best.

Though it is a tropical, and will remain evergreen in zones 10 and higher, gardeners in zones 8 and 9 will find

them returning from the ground after typical winters. And in zone 7, a protective layer of mulch and a southern exposure may entice a spring return. Even in northern zones, it is worthy as an annual, and propagates with ease, giving you the opportunity to have small but manageable plants to overwinter indoors.

You will be thrilled with the large, dark green, glossy succulent-like leaves and fiery red tubular blossoms borne on spikey panicles reaching up to 12 inches in length. At the Coastal Botanical Garden in Savannah, Ga., ours are pushing 5 feet tall and, like many other flowers in the family, seem to be the perfect treat for hummingbirds and a host of butterflies — including yellow sulphurs. The sulphurs help create a special pizzazz and color

partnership. In colder zones, they will be 24 to 36 inches tall. Know that from late summer through frost, these will be among the showiest plants in the garden.

I love them when grown in high, shifting light, where they are tolerating shade one minute and then the next sunlight is hitting their blossoms with what many consider the showiest red available for the garden. They perform well in full sun, but it is the part-shade gardens where I become mesmerized by their beauty.

The firespike thrives in well-drained, fertile, organic-rich soil. Space your plants 2 to 3 feet apart. Though they can tolerate a little dryness or drought, you will like the look and lushness of the plant better if you give it a little supplemental water. The plant spreads underground but not invasively — just the right amount — giving you a nice, manageable clump.

Include kids in college savings plan

Q: Our daughter is 11 years old, and we save \$50 a month for her. Right now, we've accumulated \$4,200 for college, a car or just savings in general. Should we be investing this money, instead of putting it in a savings account? — Jill

A: If I'm in your shoes, I'd choose college as the focal point over the other things you've mentioned. My advice would be to move that money into a 529 Plan with mutual funds inside. That way, it will grow tax-free from this point forward. Then, if you continue to set \$50 a month aside for her for seven more years — and the stock market averages 11 to 12 percent — you'd have about \$16,000 sitting there when she turned 18. That wouldn't fully pay for college, but it'd be a great start. Plus, she can apply for scholarships and grants and work and save to help make it happen.

As far as a car is concerned, I'd set up a separate savings account and agree to match whatever she saves. That way, if she can put aside \$3,000 to \$4,000, with the match, she'll have a pretty nice car. But in my mind, college is the most important thing here. If you guys can afford these contributions, and she wants to go to college and will hold up her end of the deal, you can work together as a family and make the idea of a college education a reality.

Q: Should families who are struggling to pay off debt still give their kids commissions for doing chores? — Steve

A: Yes, but it doesn't have to be a lot of money. When it comes to paying kids commissions for chores, the biggest thing we're trying to do is find teachable moments. We want the kids to learn that money is tied to work. Then, when they have some money, we want to teach them about the three uses for money — spending, saving and giving.

Teaching them wise ways to do those three things while you're teaching them to work is the key. And you can do that for a small amount of money.

Q: How long should it take someone to fully fund their emergency fund?

A: On average, building an emergency fund takes six months to a year. It takes about 18 to 24 months for most people to pay off all of their debt, except for the house. That's if they're gazelle intense, and have no life other than getting control of their finances.

Baby Step 1 is saving \$1,000, and not paying extra on your debts until you have that money in the bank. Once you've got a \$1,000 starter emergency fund, then your list all of your debts except the house from smallest to largest and attack them with a vengeance. All you do is work and pay off debt until you clean up the mess. Once that's done, you move on to the next Baby Step, which is adding to your emergency fund until you have three to six months of expenses set aside. Most people can accomplish that in six months to a year.

There are always various factors involved because everyone's situation is different. But in most cases, if you approach my plan with the kind of intensity I talk about, you can become debt-free except for your house and have a fully loaded emergency fund in place in just two or three years.

Consumers may not feel like health care insurance costs are under control, but a leading indicator projects the third straight year of 5 percent-or-under cost increases for employers who offer employment-based plans.

A preliminary survey by the Mercer consultancy, released Tuesday, finds that employers' average health benefit costs per employee are expected to rise by 4.8 percent in 2014.

To be sure, part of the relatively slow cost increase for employers is because they have re-

vamped their plans. If they made no changes, their costs would rise by 7 percent, Mercer said.

The survey also noted the unknowns associated with implementation of the Affordable Care Act. About half of the employers in the survey expect additional costs from rising enrollments and new fees imposed by the health care reform law.

Mercer cautioned that the projections are preliminary and actual cost growth may differ. Meanwhile, it seemed apparent that 2014 health insurance costs to employers would rise more than the 4.1 percent cost increase for 2012.

The expected increase for employers in 2013, still to be finalized, was 5 percent.

Many employers are managing their cost increases by implementing consumer-directed health plans, which give employees financial incentives to spend less on health care by taking a wellness, or preventive approach. These plans usually are paired with an employee-controlled account.

Tracy Watts, a Mercer partner, said that slower growth in employers' costs "will be overshadowed by additional costs from higher enrollment and fees."

One factor that will increase

some large employers' costs is the reform act requirement that they offer coverage to employees who work 30 or more hours a week.

The Mercer report said about a third of large employers — with 500 or more employees — do not currently offer coverage to all employees working 30 or more hours per week. Thus, industries with a heavy share of part-time workers "will be the hardest hit by this rule," Mercer said.

About half of employers in retail and hospitality do not offer coverage to all employees working 30 or more hours per week, the report indicated.

Workers delay retirement longer

Before the recession, Madie Green's home day care was normally full. As parents lost their jobs and pulled kids out, the 55-year-old District Heights, Md., woman spent through her savings to keep up on her mortgage and auto payments.

Her business still hasn't recovered to what it once was, and now she's so worried about whether she'll be able to retire that she is expanding into an after-school program for elementary- and middle-school students.

Retirement seems more distant than ever.

"It's no longer the golden years," Green said.

These days, the sentiment is more common.

Though stock prices are rising, unemployment is falling and the economy is growing, more workers are choosing to stay in the labor force longer. The trend reverses decades of steadily falling retirement ages. During the recession, delaying retirement was spurred by job losses, salary reductions, depressed home prices and depleted savings. Now, workers anticipate smaller returns on their investments. Health benefits for retirees also are eroding even as costs are rising. Meanwhile, people are living longer, healthier lives — all of which adds to a need to work and save longer.

The share of workers nationwide aged 45 to 60 who planned to delay retirement soared to 62 percent last year, the Conference Board reported, up from 42 percent in 2010.

Separately, analysts at the University of Michigan's Insti-

tute for Social Research found that about 40 percent of older Americans have delayed their planned retirement since the end of the recession.

Since the recession ended, "a lot of people spent more than they earned and had to continue to deplete their savings, and that makes them less prepared for retirement," said Gad Levanon, director of macroeconomic research for the Conference Board. "People were unemployed for a while, or worked part-time or got significant pay cuts and were unable to cover their expenses. Savings shrank and made them more willing to delay retirement."

The Conference Board found that workers 45 to 60 who have lost a job, had a salary cut, or saw their home decline in value are more likely than others to plan to delay retirement. But even workers who were not significantly hurt by the recession are more likely than before to plan to work longer. That trend held true across all ethnic, gender and income lines.

CareerBuilder found 60 percent of workers aged 60 or older planned to look for another job after retiring from their current company — up from 57 percent last year. About three-quarters of respondents planned to work another one to six years, and more than 1 in 10 of 680 workers surveyed said they probably never would be able to retire.

On average, those who delayed retirement are waiting about 1 1/2 years longer than they originally planned to leave their jobs, said Brooke Helppie McFall, an economist with Michigan's Institute for Social Research.

Many workers have lost too much value in savings and other assets or were forced to draw down on those assets, McFall said. A typical household lost about 5 percent of its total wealth between the summers of 2008 and 2009. The biggest asset for most people is their home, and housing prices still have not recovered pre-recession levels.

The recession exerted particular influence on the retirement plans of men 55 to 64, U.S. Labor Department statistics show.

"Their retirement is less secure than they had thought," said labor economist Heidi Shierholz, either because of a decrease in assets or a loss of a job that left a long-term income gap.

"More of them are in the labor force than there would be if the Great Recession hadn't happened," said Shierholz, with the Washington-based Economic Policy Institute, who compared Bureau of Labor Statistics pre-recession projections to actual employment figures.

Jeff Miller realized two years ago he would not meet his goal of retiring at 62.

A computer server engineer at a Frederick, Md., data center for Marriott International, Miller suffered losses in the value of his 401(k) and his home. Plus, he has seven more years to pay off a student loan for his son.

At 61, he expects to work at least six more years.

"I was hoping for 62, but that went out the window when the economy went south," Miller said. "And I couldn't have sold my house four years ago."

Career books may not give best wisdom

IT'S PRETTY CLEAR that if you have a job and don't write a book of workplace wisdom, your life is essentially worthless.

Many of these books are not so much published as they are pumped — at high velocity — from a bottomless well.

And most of them are as useful as a handkerchief made of cheese.

Still, in the interest of my readers' legacies, I've paddled up this endless stream of books and brought back tips that should allow anyone to crank out an inspirational career tome that's at least on par with the ones I'm using to build my work ark. Here goes:

■ The last thing you need to worry about is content. At least half of all workplace-themed books are just blank pages wrapped in an irresistible cover.

So the key is the title. You need a title that makes people believe they will die in poverty if they don't buy your book.

■ "Always start your chapters with a quotation, for that is the soil from which wisdom grows." —Rex Huppke

Every workplace book worth its salt starts each chapter with a quote from someone who is clearly far more intelligent than the book's author. In just the past week, I received three books that used this technique.

■ If at all possible, use your book to create a buzzword. There are two reasons for this: 1) Buzzwords have the potential to help you sell T-shirts containing them, and everyone knows the big money is in T-shirts; 2) It's easier to make up a word than to try to get your point across using actual words.

■ Now that you have your title, your chapter quotes and your buzzword, you need to fill in roughly 200 pages. Piece of cake.

Spend the first third of the book describing what the book is going to be about. It doesn't really have to be about much of anything, as long as you liberally sprinkle in some of the 30 words listed in the first step.

The middle third of the book is where you provide concrete "tips" or "steps to success." It's best to dispense these in easily digestible list form.

The final third of the book is the easiest. Recap what the book was about!

That's it! You're on your way to writing fabulous, inspirational, motivational, extraordinary workplace books. All I ask is that you use the following dedication:

"For Rex, America's most-beloved workplace advice columnist, crushed to death by career books while building his work ark. He will be missed."

Clarify values to help land a best-fit job

Q: I'm on the job market. The last job I had was an unqualified disaster because of company culture and lack of commitment to the alleged goals of my position. What can I do to be sure that the next role I take is a better fit?

A: Ask the right questions of the right people, and listen to your gut.

You're frustrated and upset. Yes, I get that, but you need to let it go. The unresolved anger will show to future employers, and could very well attract just the type of environment that you don't want.

Commit to a course of healing from the negative experience and understanding your own role in bringing it about.

Realistically, you're not going to think about this once and have it figured out. So each time you settle in to consider it, create a reflective environment in a calming setting, and use your breath to focus.

What is important to you in a job? Money? Challenge? Status? Relationships?

All of these are valid; however, having a misfit will make you unhappy in the end.

Envision a variety of scenarios: a job that is high-paying but too easy; one that is personally meaningful but lower-paying; or one that is interesting but has incompatible co-workers. Also, think about past roles.

Use all of this to understand your primary values.

Now, thinking back on your most recent job, how does it match up with your values? Odds are that it wasn't a good fit.

Having clarified your values, what would you have done differently when you were considering taking that position?

First of all, you need to know the type of role you want and the type of company that appeals to you.

If you need some help sorting that out, try talking with a career coach, or a trusted friend or mentor. If part of the problem was that you wanted to make entrepreneurial-style decisions but worked in a large bureaucracy, this step will help.

Then, once you find an opportunity and land an interview, make sure that you check out the place as thoroughly as they check you out.

One would always expect to interview with a hiring manager, but it is less common to interview with potential peers or direct reports. Given your concerns about culture, this should probably be on your "must have" list of steps before accepting an offer.

Focus hard in the interview with your prospective boss on the goals for the position and explore how you'll know if they've been achieved.

Also, seek information on how the goals fit with the corporate direction as a whole; if they seem to be outliers, that will be a red flag.

Finally, think about your intuition. Looking back, did you have any unacknowledged concerns?

If so, let this be a lesson to trust yourself. If not, think about ways you could enlist other people to help you take an objective look at new opportunities.

Know what you want and don't settle. That will help you land in a better situation next time.

Telecommuting adds flexibility to lives

Two years ago, Candace Ragsdale's job changed in a way that seemed almost too good to be true.

She suddenly had more money, more time — and less stress.

Yet her job, as a customer service representative with Chico's clothing company, was exactly the same. The only thing that changed was where she

worked. She shifted from clocking in at an office about 25 minutes away to working at home in Dacula, Ga.

"It was like a fairy tale," Ragsdale said about the work setup.

Working on a specially equipped computer and phone, she can perform her job duties just as she would at the Chico's headquarters. In fact, today's technology allows her supervisors to see a mirror image of her com-

puter screen from a distance.

Telecommuting has been buoyed by advances in technology — from video conferencing to instant messaging to software allowing supervisors to see their employees' every keystroke from miles away. From an environmental standpoint, every mile off the road reduces air pollution.

Telecommuting also offers benefits for the telecommuter: cost sav-

ings, from gas and wear and tear on the car to avoiding dry cleaning or restaurant meals; health benefits, from not having to battle bumper-to-chrome traffic; and time savings from eliminating a commute. Experts also say employers have a lot to gain, from saving costs on brick and mortar buildings to holding on to talented employees.

Experts also agree telecommuting isn't for everyone. Some employ-

ees feel isolated and crave face-to-face contact with colleagues. Working from home can blur the lines between work and home, making it difficult to turn "off."

Tedra Cheatham, executive director of The Clean Air Campaign, said her nonprofit has worked with about 250 companies for several years to start or expand telework programs. Working remotely, she said, requires planning and preparation.

Grads take jobs that don't require degrees

In a packed pub in midtown Manhattan, Ryan Flaherty is surrounded on three sides by people clamoring for his attention.

He spins one way and pours a shot of vodka into a glass, then turns around and wedges a lime into a bottle of beer, pushing it across the counter. Ignoring the annoyed gaze of a bulky man on his right, he turns again to a touch-screen register to ring up the sales.

It's just a minute out of the grueling and physically demanding eight-hour shift that will last long into the night. But Flaherty, 28, isn't complaining.

With the generous tips of New Yorkers and his pick of shifts, he pulls in around \$80,000 a year as a bartender. It's more than he was offered for various office jobs he considered when he arrived in the city, even though he's highly educated.

"I have a master's in economics and I'm bartending in New York," he said with a shrug. "It's a good way to make money."

A college degree once all but guaranteed a well-paying job and high-

er earnings than high school graduates. But fewer of these good jobs are now available because of both long-term economic changes and the lingering effects of the Great Recession.

People such as Flaherty with college and advanced degrees are working jobs that don't require them, whether by choice or necessity. That in turn pushes people without college degrees out of those jobs.

In 1970, only 2 percent of firefighters had college degrees; now 18 percent do, according to Richard Vedder, an economist at Ohio University. Less than 1 percent of taxi drivers had a college degree in 1970; now 15 percent do. About 25 percent of retail sales clerks have college degrees, Vedder said.

"The main reason is a pretty simple one," he said. "The number of college graduates has grown vastly faster than the number of jobs that require high-level education skills."

In the 1980s and 1990s, the demand for college graduates started booming, especially in the lead-up to the tech boom,

said Paul Beaudry, an economist at the University of British Columbia, who has studied this trend. Wages grew and a college education paid off.

But when the tech bubble burst, the economy was left with an oversupply of college graduates. Some went into industries related to housing or finance, and then the recession wiped out those jobs. No industry has emerged to employ all the people who got college degrees in that time, he said.

As more college graduates have flooded the market, employers are able to offer lower wages. The earnings of college graduates have fallen about 13 percent in the past decade, according to Drexel University economist Paul Harrington.

Saim Montakim has a bachelor's degree in accounting but drives a New York City taxicab. It's strenuous work, but he can make \$200 on a good day. On a bad day, he barely can pay the rent for the taxi and the cost of gas.

He's getting a master's degree in human resource management and hoping that his dual degrees will help him find a better job.

The accounting jobs he was offered upon graduation were all entry-level, paying \$10 an hour. He prefers driving a taxi to being stuck in an office from 9 to 5 at that wage, he says.

Montakim, who is from Bangladesh, came to the U.S. to get an education. He figured that with a college degree, he'd be able to find a good job and build a life for himself in America. Now he acknowledges that his idea that a job comes with a college education might have been unrealistic.

Because college is so expensive, many students are facing a dilemma: If they go to college, they still might not get a job that requires a college degree, and they'll be on the hook for big student loan payments. But if they don't go to college, they might be pushed out of entry-level jobs by overqualified college graduates who can't find other work.

"It puts college grads in a condition that's unique out of the last 30 to 40 years," Harrington said. "The yield from investing in college, students' ability to pay off debt, has diminished."

Bad apples causing rot for bosses

THE BAD APPLES are blowing it. They've turned "employee" into a bad word.

Strong words? You bet. But after a recent morning, spent with a group of small-business executives, it was apparent to me that even those who want to do well by their workers are having trouble creating the workplaces they'd like.

Why? Because bad-apple employees shatter their trust, dominate their attention and make them so wary of lawsuits that they're almost paralyzed.

One of the casualties appears to be using open-book management — a practice in which the company's financial details are shared so that employees understand the business, how they fit in and, theoretically, how they share in the rewards when things go well. Opening the books is scary if you don't trust your employees to care about the business as much as you do.

It also appears that many CEOs are so busy running their operations that they've lost touch with their hiring processes. They bemoan not finding good workers, but that's partly because their hiring systems aren't finding the qualified and able people out there.

Payroll often is the biggest cost of doing business, and owners have every right, and even duty, to get their money's worth. Unfortunately, problem workers drain resources and make it tough for owners to reward good employees. The result: "us versus them" instead of "us."

What's needed is improved hiring processes to get good folks in the door; careful performance evaluations and courageous firing of workers who don't cut it. And, no, it isn't easy.

When leaving a job, it's best to mention back pay after resigning

Q: I need to have a difficult discussion with my boss, who is the owner of a small family business. For twelve years, "Craig" and I have had a wonderful working relationship.

Despite loving my job, I have always hoped to eventually spend more time with my children. My husband now makes enough to support our family, so we have agreed that I should become a full-time mom. But I'm afraid Craig may misinterpret my decision.

Recently, our business has been going through tough times. Because of declining sales, employees have lost benefits,

and paychecks are frequently late. When I announce my resignation, Craig could feel betrayed and assume that I've just given up on the company.

To make matters worse, I also need to ask for three months of back pay that he owes me. How should I approach this conversation?

A: Combining a warm, grateful farewell with a request for money is like putting hot peppers on ice

cream. The two simply don't go well together. Therefore, a wiser approach would be to separate these radically different topics. First, meet with Craig to explain your family circumstances and express your feelings about leaving.

Give Craig a few days to absorb this news, then politely mention the past-due paychecks. If you haven't been reimbursed by the time you depart, be sure to get a signed acknowledgement of the debt. Even when relationships are good, financial agreements need to be documented.

Q: My manager always answers her phone, even when

we're discussing an important issue. This makes me feel as though I'm not as important as the person who is calling. I think she should let these calls go to voice mail and return them later. Should I suggest that?

A: Your distractible boss probably doesn't intend to be rude or insulting. Some people simply have an almost irresistible impulse to respond immediately to any stimulus in their perceptual field. This knee-jerk reaction may be triggered by ringing phones, incoming emails or someone standing in the doorway.

Unlike some annoying habits, this one can be controlled with a little ef-

fort. For example, your manager probably ignores such distractions when talking with her own boss. The question for you, however, is whether critiquing her behavior would be to your benefit.

If your boss is receptive to feedback, she may appreciate hearing your point of view. But if she tends to react defensively, raising this issue could be risky. In that case, just keep reminding yourself that these interruptions reflect her lack of self-control, not your lack of significance.

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Grant will help for research of petrochemicals

Brian Popp, assistant professor in the C. Eugene Bennett Department of Chemistry at WVU, has been awarded an American Chemistry Society-Petroleum Research Fund Doctoral New Investigator Grant for his research on transition-metal-catalyzed reactions of petrochemical raw materials.

The grant, which is offered to professors with research groups at institutions offering doctorates in chemistry, is a form of "seed funding" to help launch their independent research careers.

"Petrochemicals are derived from a small fraction of every barrel of crude oil and serve as the starting materials for many consumer goods, including plastics, medicines and some textile goods, to name only a few," Popp said.

Most of the processes that transform petrochemicals into consumer goods employ a variety of catalytic reactions that use a catalyst that acts to "jump-start" the reaction and allows reactions to proceed that normally would not.

Popp's research group focuses on reactions employing catalysts based on earth-abundant metals, such as iron and cobalt, and precious metals, such as rhodium, iridium and platinum.

The funded research is specifically focused on synthesizing new metal catalysts that are zwitterions, neutrally charged molecules with both a positive and negative electrical charge, to study how these catalysts affect how the petrochemical substrates react.

The area of zwitterionic-transition-metal catalysts, Popp said, is relatively unexplored and ripe with potential for discovery.

His ultimate goal, he added, is to develop the science of the catalysts and the corresponding catalytic reactions to be suitable for application in a variety of fields.

Anti-bullying expert, author to speak at WVU

Walter G. Meyer, author of three published books, will speak about his most recent book, "Rounding Third," at 7 p.m. Oct. 8 in the Gluck Theatre, as part of WVU's observance of LGBTQ (lesbians, gay men, bisexuals, transgendered, questioning) history and anti-bullying month.

"Rounding Third" has received rave reviews and garnered Meyer numerous requests to speak and write about teen bullying and suicide as those hot topics are the crux of the novel. "Rounding Third" was nominated for a Lambda Literary Award and was a finalist for a San Diego Book Award.

As a victim of bullying and the teenage angst caused by his crush on one of his teammates, Meyer digs into the beginnings of his story and creates a mosaic with others' journeys in his book. Although the characters and the town are fictional, the incidents in the book are all true.

"I feel a special connection to Morgantown. My brother and nephew are both WVU alumni. Having grown up not that far away in Pittsburgh's southern suburbs, I know the area and the culture well," said Meyer, a Penn State University alumnus.

Meyer has written hundreds of articles about bullying and tolerance for dozen of newspapers and magazines including the *Pittsburgh Post-Gazette*, the *Orange County Register*, *San Diego Union-Tribune*, and numerous websites. He has been a guest on NPR's Pittsburgh affiliate WESA, and has created webinars on workplace bullying.

The program is hosted by the Office of Multicultural Program's Cecilia Rollins Brown Bag Film & Discussion Series and is free. A reception and book signing will follow Meyer's presentation.

Professor awarded \$100K grant

Fabien Goulay, assistant professor in WVU's C. Eugene Bennett Department of Chemistry, has been awarded a \$100,000 American Chemical Society — Petroleum Research Fund Doctoral New Investigator Grant for his research uncovering new ways to produce cleaner energy sources and lower emissions.

The New Investigator Grant, which is offered to pro-

fessors with research groups at institutions offering doctorates in chemistry, is a form of "seed funding" to help launch their independent research careers.

Goulay is working to reduce soot and carbon dioxide from the atmosphere by lowering emissions from burning fossil fuels. His research, he said, could improve the efficiency of energy production and aid in the reduction of carbon dioxide emis-

sions from vehicles and lower energy costs.

Consider the complex chemistry within a car that begins when gasoline, a liquid, is vaporized into a gas. The result is heat and pressure, which are transferred into energy to make the car move.

Cars are powered using fossil fuels, which release a significant amount of carbon dioxide into the atmosphere.

Hydrogen, Goulay said, offers

a promising alternative for clean energy, but it's produced by combustion of fossil fuels. Developing a clean source of it is key.

"Hydrogen will be a good source of energy, only if we can find a cheap and efficient way of making it," he said.

Goulay came to WVU in 2011 and specializes in physical chemistry.

Student gets help from alumni

Like most students nearing graduation, Ryan Sellers, a senior industrial and management systems engineering major from Oakland, Md., is on top of the world. In Sellers' case, the analogy also has a real-world component.

For the past few months Sellers has been completing a cooperative education program with Kalkreuth Roofing and Sheet Metal, overseeing the roofing projects on WVU's College of Law building and WVU Healthcare's Rosenbaum Family House.

Kalkreuth Roofing and Sheet Metal is headquartered in Wheeling and its president, John Kalkreuth, and executive vice president, Jim Hurlley, are graduates of the industrial and management systems engineering program. All told, the company employs seven alumni, including Brendan Ball, the project manager for the projects at WVU.

"An IMSE degree is the right training for our industry," Kalkreuth said. "We are not strict discipline engineers. Industrial engineering provides the blend of the management and technical skills we look for."

At the end of the spring semester, Sellers was in need

of an internship. After an unsuccessful search at the college's Career Fair, he turned to Jack Byrd Jr., professor of industrial and management systems engineering, for help.

"I asked him if he could find me something in the area," Sellers said. "He emailed me back about a week later and said that Kalkreuth was looking for somebody and they had projects going on in Morgantown."

Byrd said he has been in contact with Kalkreuth ever since John graduated and has given the company interns almost yearly.

"Jack's a pest," Kalkreuth laughed. "Just recently, I was in Denver and met a woman who was also a Jack Byrd prodigy. There is such a strong network amongst IMSE grads. No matter where you go or where you turn, you're bound to run into someone from WVU. It says a lot about the program and a lot about Jack."

Sellers was thrown into the fire when he started his internship in May.

"They just threw me into it," Sellers said. "I don't know if (Ball) just trusted me or if it was Dr. Byrd's recommendations, but he sent me the prints, said to measure things, and then I pretty much learned off the foremen and other laborers on the job."

Sellers was the on-site project manager for KRSM, because Ball had other projects in different locations. This put him in charge of the operations on a day-to-day basis, which meant he was ultimately responsible for the workers.

"I showed up one day and no one was there," Sellers said. "I was like, 'what's going on?'"

As it turned out, one of the project's other managers called the workers off the project and sent them to another job that day. This was a problem because the masonry team was ready to work on their part of the project with the roofing team that day.

"I was the head of roll there and had to take responsibility," Sellers said. He had to contact the managers and foremen of the other teams and explain to them the situation at hand.

Though that experience was not pleasurable, Sellers knows that kind of experience is exactly why students need internships.

"You don't take human interaction courses ... how to deal with other people," Sellers said. "It's how to cope with problems you face. That's what an internship is good for."

"You can't replace that in terms of resume value," Byrd said of the internship experience.

School to offer parent-child interaction workshop

The School of Social Work at WVU is hosting a Parent-Child Interaction Therapy workshop from 8:30 a.m.-5 p.m. Oct. 17, in the WVU Erickson Alumni Center.

The workshop will be led by Cheryl B. McNeil, psychology professor in the university's clinical child program.

The workshop is an introduction to parent-child interaction therapy and applies aspects of the Integrated Mental and Behavioral Health Training Program, a program designed to train graduate-level social work students who are involved in advanced levels of clinical practice.

Participants will learn about evidence-based behavioral treatment for children with disruptive behavior disorders using videotape review, handouts,

experiential exercises, therapist coding and coaching skills training.

"Parent-child interaction therapy is an evidence-based model. So anyone working with families and children would be well-served to get exposure to that model of practice," said Carrie Rishel, director of the WVU Integrated Mental and Behavioral Health Training Program.

Trainees in the program and their field instructors can attend the workshop for free. All other workshop participants must pay a \$75 registration fee.

The program is funded by a three-year, roughly \$476,000 Mental and Behavioral Health Education and Training Grant from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, Health Resources and Services Administration.

Seventy-five percent of the

grant funds are awarded as \$10,000 stipends to graduate students who are training in the program. The other 25 percent is used for scheduling programming, such as workshops.

"(The grant) allows us to attract high-quality students who may not otherwise be able to afford graduate school," Rishel said.

McNeil has trained nationwide and internationally on parent-child interaction therapy. Her clinical and research interests include program development and evaluation, specifically with regard to abusive parenting and managing disruptive behaviors of young children in school and home settings.

Programs help internationals adjust to move

Imagine making the first steps into your future, in a new country, a new place, a new beginning. Everything is different from home. You realize that you aren't at home anymore and that nothing seems familiar.

This is the feeling that many international students have when they arrive at WVU, some with just a suitcase, others with their entire family.

But, many international students arrive without basic home necessities.

This is where WVU's International HomeStart Closet steps in and helps. The Closet greets all new International students to WVU with welcoming gifts on behalf of the university and the people of Morgantown. Those who need sleeping arrangements or food receive high priority.

"As an international student, coming into a different place where you don't know anyone is a daunting task," said Kombe Kapatamoyo, a political science major from Zambia. "A program like the HomeStart Closet goes a long way to relieve most of one's nerves."

"The program helps with the basic essentials to start a life here. It's also an opportunity to meet new folks. It's unlike any other program I have heard of at any school in the U.S., where the university and the community come together to help its international student body."

The International HomeStart Closet was established by the Division of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion, in cooperation with the Office of International Students and Scholars in summer 2006 and was fully operational the following year.

"I see the closet as being not only a help, but a comfort to incoming international students. When I first arrived, I came with only three pieces of luggage full of clothes and books," said Claire Ambang, a former WVU student from Cameroon. "With no easy access mode of transportation, my mother and I had a hard time moving all over town trying to figure out which stores carried what, and for a little while, I lacked the basics. I'm truly comforted by the idea that the closet delivers the things students need."

Jennifer McIntosh, special assistant to the chief of staff at WVU, developed the program to help international students feel comfortable in Morgantown and at the university.

"People don't realize how important having a bed is," she said. "We have seen students sleeping on the floor, on newspapers. Mattresses are something we always desperately need."

"When the international students arrive, we want them to feel at home. We tell them thank you for coming, and welcome to WVU. That's what the closet helps us do."

Basic household necessities are often available to international students including sheets, towels, blankets, pillows, dishes, flatware, glasses, mugs, kettles, pots, pans, skillets, microwaves, coffee makers and rice cookers. Large furniture items are occasionally available.

Donations are accepted based on items, available transportation and storage space.

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Mazda CX-9 an understated contender

Some vehicles are glamorous, meant to evoke envy from your friends and neighbors; others live out their lives in quiet competence, delivering exactly what's expected of them without fanfare, just quiet admiration.

The CX-9 seven-passenger crossover SUV is the latter. People won't envy you — unless they know just how good the CX-9 is.

For 2013, the CX-9 received a fresh face, with Mazda's handsome new five-point grille anchoring the re-sculpted front end. Inside, there's a revised infotainment system.

Originally developed from the same Ford Motor Co. platform that underpins the five-passenger Ford Edge, the CX-9 shares more. Both crossovers use the same 3.7-liter double-overhead-cam V-6, which develops 273 horsepower, matched to a six-speed automatic transmission and either front-wheel or all-wheel drive.

The CX-9 has enough power to safely navigate pokey parkways and crumbling interstates. Handling is a pleasant surprise. Ride motions are well controlled, but not overly firm. Cornering behavior reveals minimal body lean, and the steering returns

some feedback, instilling driver confidence. While this vehicle is a bit too large to live up to Mazda's zoom-zoom image, it is agile enough to be very enjoyable to drive, while delivering a quiet, compliant ride.

How perfect is that? Very.

And, if you have a toy to tow,

you might be happy to know that all CX-9 front-wheel-drive models can yank 2,000 pounds of trailer. The Towing Prep Package — optional with front-wheel drive, standard with all-wheel drive — bumps the rating to 3,500 lbs.

Styling aside, the CX-9's cabin carries over unchanged.

The three ascending trim levels are Sport, Touring and Grand Touring. Even base models come with a generous amount of standard gear, including cloth seats with optional front-seat heaters, tri-zone climate control and Bluetooth connectivity. Stepping up to the mid-level Touring adds the

sort of gear most buyers appreciate, including leather seats, eight-way power driver seat with power lumbar support, auto on/off headlights, blind spot monitoring, rear backup sensors and a rearview camera. The top trim level gilds the lily, but doesn't seem essential.

A new 5.8-inch information screen is standard on all CX-9s for 2013, while the audio system has added HD Radio and Pandora to its arsenal of entertainment options. It resides in an instrument panel that's blessedly simple to use.

The CX-9 starts at \$29,785, with the test vehicle, a fully loaded Grand Touring model with all-wheel drive, coming in just under \$40,000.

Given the CX-9's agile handling and newfound dose of style, this crossover may finally earn the notoriety it deserves, even if it will never be glamorous.

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Acura adds comfort to redesigned MDX

Acura's MDX midsize crossover enters its third generation for 2014, and continues to be one of the benchmarks in the premium crossover segment, offering a great combination of family-friendly features, a stylish exterior and impressive performance.

The seven-passenger MDX arguably is one of the most family-friendly vehicles ever created, with nearly every aspect designed to accommodate the driver and the passengers.

With the upgrade comes more passenger and cargo space. The new MDX is 2 inches longer than before, and has a wheelbase 2.8 inches longer.

Prices for 2014 start at \$42,290 for the base front-wheel-drive model, and range as high as \$56,505 for the fully-equipped all-wheel-drive version with Technology, Advance and Entertainment packages — basically everything that can be added to the vehicle. That's the model we tested.

The base front-drive model is \$990 less than it was for 2013, even though there are enhancements and additional features.

Above the base model, there are three trim levels, each determined by the options packages added to it. But all four levels are available either with front drive or Acura's Super Handling All-Wheel Drive, bringing the total to eight choices of models.

All-wheel-drive models begin at \$44,290; that model includes everything that's on the base front-drive version. The \$2,000 extra cost for all-wheel drive is maintained throughout the line-up.

Even at the base price, the MDX is well-equipped.

Leather upholstery is standard on the first- and second-row seats, and the front seats are heated. Also included are interior LED lighting; an Extended Slide Second-row seat with One-Touch Walk-In for access to the third row access; an eight-inch driver-information system with touch screen; and expanded-view outside driver's mirror; and acoustic glass front windows and windshield.

Other standard features include keyless entry (front doors and tailgate) and push-button start, a 432-watt audio system with eight-speakers, 18-inch alloy wheels, and "jewel eye" LED headlights.

Adding the Technology Package package brings 19-inch alloy wheels, keyless access for all four doors, the Acura navigation system with voice recognition, a 501-watt Acura/ELS Studio audio system with 10 speakers, forward collision warning, lane departure warning and the blind spot information system.

The Entertainment Package adds a 529-watt Acura/ELS Studio audio system with 11-speakers and HD Radio, a DVD rear entertainment system with 9-inch display, rear-passenger window sunshades, and more.

Advance Package extras include unique seven-spoke, 19-inch alloy wheels; a 605-watt Acura/ELS Studio audio system with 12 speakers; a rear DVD entertainment system with 16.2-inch display; perforated Milano leather first- and second-row seats; heated and ventilated front seats; front and rear parking assist; remote engine start; lane keeping assist system; collision mitigation brake system; and

adaptive cruise control with low-speed follow.

Standalone options include a heated steering wheel, LED fog lights and a trailer-towing package (hitch and transmission cooler), allowing towing of trailers up to 5,000 pounds.

Under the hood of all MDX models is a new direct-injected 3.5-liter V-6 engine rated at 290 horsepower and 267 pound-feet of torque. That's down slightly from the 300 horsepower and 270 foot-pounds of torque in the previous model's 3.7-liter V-6.

But Acura says performance actually is better than before because the new model is 275 pounds lighter and the engine is more efficient. The engine is connected to a new six-speed automatic transmission with Sequential Sport Shift for manual shifting.

We took the vehicle on a week-long vacation trip to the East Coast, with two teenagers on board, and found the MDX to be perfect for such a long family outing.

The seats were quite comfortable, but even with the One-Touch Walk-In feature for third-row access, that seat is better left to kids or young, nimble

adults. On some outings, we had to load the vehicle up with people, and the older adults didn't particularly like having to negotiate their way into the third row.

On the cross-country jaunts, the teens had the middle row to themselves and kept themselves occupied with the wide-screen DVD player and their portable devices. There were no complaints about the comfort of the seats.

The middle row's slide feature allows it to be moved forward or backward up to 6 inches, but to keep the third-row kneed and legroom suitable for adults and teens, it can't be pushed all the way back. When the kids were alone in the middle row, though, they enjoyed the extra room the seat gave them when it was in its rear-most position.

Up front, our bucket seats were equally pleasant for the long drive, and even in the driver's seat over a whole day's trek I never felt uncomfortable.

Our route took us over the Great Smoky Mountains — twice — and there was plenty of power from the V-6 engine even with the vehicle loaded with four people and enough

luggage and gear for a week at the beach.

I enjoyed hearing the tunes on my iPhone played through the great in-dash audio system, and at the same time, the kids were able to watch their movies and listen to the sound on the provided wireless headphones — with no interference from my music up front.

The MDX comes with a standard Integrated Dynamics System that lets the driver choose a driving mode — comfort, normal or sport. We kept it on comfort most of the time to keep the ride cushier for all on board.

Also standard is Agile Handling Assist, which Acura says "uses the vehicle's brakes to improve corner traceability and impart confident handling feel." It operates seamlessly, I suppose, because I never detected it working, even on the curvy mountain grades through the Smokies.

We filled the cargo area with our gear, but had to fold down one-half of the third row to accommodate everything we needed for our trip. There is 15.8 cubic feet of cargo space behind the rear seat, about the same as the trunk of a mid-

size car. We could have packed a bit better and gotten everything behind the third seat if we had to, I suppose. But the cargo area expands to 45.1 cubic feet with the entire third seat folded down, and to nearly 91 cubic feet with both rows of rear seats folded.

In the front, we enjoyed the large center console between the front seats. It has a comfy leather armrest on top, and inside, it's roomy enough to keep purses, a laptop and other electronics and valuables out of sight. There are numerous cubbies and storage spaces throughout the MDX cabin, a hallmark of Honda/Acura family vehicles.

The MDX comes with the next-generation AcuraLink system, which links to the Internet through a connected smartphone with a (better be generous) data plan. The system also has lots of features similar to GM's OnStar, including collision notification, remote unlocking, stolen-vehicle tracking and traffic information, all through a built-in cellular connection with subscription fees.

For safety, the MDX uses Honda's Advanced Compatibility Engineering body structure. There are seven air bags, including a new driver's knee bag. The MDX received the highest safety rating from the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety — the "Top Safety Pick Plus" designation.

The manual says premium fuel is "recommended," but unlike its predecessor, not required.

On our trip, we compromised and put mid-grade fuel in the tank, but noticed no degradation of performance from our first tank of premium fuel. Regular gas is already pricey enough; premium is ridiculous.

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McLaren 12C Spider an addictive convertible

The only missing element was the Houston countdown as I pressed the launch button on the McLaren 12C Spider. Left foot planted on the brake pedal, right foot goosing the gas, the twin-turbocharged V-8 spooled for my imminent catapult across the asphalt. Six seconds and 200 yards later, I felt lighter, having expelled all the available air in my lungs through an irrepressibly giddy scream.

The fact that I was doing this in a convertible speaks volumes for McLaren engineering and its Formula 1 racing legacy.

Being on a track, I was, of course, driving with the roof locked in place and a helmet strapped to my noggin. But the Spider, which was designed in parallel with McLaren Automotive's fixed-roof 12C coupe, comes with almost no performance penalty. The 0-to-62-mph acceleration time is the same, lickety-split 3.1 seconds. The convertible gained 88 pounds, but just 3 mph were sheared off the 207 mph maximum speed of the hardtop.

The greatest penalty, in fact, is the price. The Spider costs about \$30,000 more than the \$231,400 coupe — but that's pennies for McLaren's rarefied buyership.

Designed as a track car that's civilized enough for the street and, now, versatile enough to allow tanning at mach speed, the 12C Spider has been available in the U.S. since January.

Still, the British super-car maker, which produces just 1,800 units annually, hasn't had enough cars to satisfy the West Coast automotive media's relentless need for speed until last week, when it cordoned off the asphalt at Auto Club Speedway in Fontana, Calif. — a suitable environment to showcase its streetable F1 technology.

Entering the two-seater 12C Spider through its dihedral doors requires a gymnastic level of limberness to avoid impalement from the sharp angle of the steeply raked windshield, which, once you're settled in the low-slung and cocooning cockpit, offers great visibility. Visible over the ultra-low dashboard are two distinct humps on either side of the bonnet that orient the driver to the wheels.

The 12C Spider is constructed with the same car-

bon fiber MonoCell its sister company, McLaren Racing, has been using in Formula 1 since 1981. Isolated by an aluminum crush structure, should the driver crash, the molded carbon cockpit is lightweight, strong and rigid for high-speed flogging — and muscular enough that it negates the need for the usual chassis reinforcements required when jet-tisoning a fixed roof for a spider variant.

It takes 17 seconds for the electronically operated retractable hardtop to fully lift or lower into a tonneau cover whose color is matched to the body, which, on my test car, was a shade of orange so fiery it looked combustible. The roof can be operated at speeds up to 19 mph. In other words, it's best done when stopped, so drivers can take full advantage of the 12C Spider's capabilities.

The Spider is, like the 12C coupe, powered with the upgraded 625PS, or 616-horsepower, engine first deployed for the 2013 model year. Encased in glass like the high-performance art piece it is, the engine — which uses a pair of small, quick-spinning turbochargers to nullify discernible turbo lag and provide more boost at lower revs — can be operated in normal, sport and track modes. They activate different shift points on the seven-speed, dual-clutch transmission when driven as an automatic, and channel increasingly deafening levels of engine intake noise to the cabin.

The only part of the powertrain that was changed for the Spider is the exhaust. Redesigned to work in harmony with the silhouette of the retractable roof, it evacuates up and over the rear axle to avoid coming through the rear suspension. The suspension is likewise adjustable in normal, sport and track modes, independent of the powertrain settings.

It was in track mode that I spun out during my sashay of a fast chicane and started drifting toward a concrete wall at 100 mph, having lifted my foot from the accelerator with the steering wheel cranked from a turn. In sport suspension mode, the car would have intervened and kept my rear wheels plant-

ed, but in track mode you're on your own.

Unique to McLaren, this second suspension-mode panel operates hydraulically interlinked dampers that increase or reduce pressure as needed to affect the stiffness of the suspension and negate the need for sway bars. A Z bar on the rear end acts like a spring, working with the air brake to keep the back axle in better contact with the road and distribute brake force most effectively.

As I careened through corner after corner in the 12C Spider, the air brake was truly something to behold during the occasional split seconds I was able to take my eyes off the track and glance in the rear view mirror. Stomping the brake pedal at speeds above 62 mph instantly activates the

F1-derived rear wing that ordinarily nestles in the car's hindquarters and only glides into place to quicken slowdowns and to keep the car's rear end from lifting.

For street driving, the rear window can likewise move up and down, regardless of the roof's position. With the roof lowered, the rear glass automatically finds the most aerodynamic position to reduce buffeting. The audio controls also automatically adjust to compensate for extra noise when the roof is stowed, while the climate control fan is calibrated to the vehicle's speed.

For 2014, the 12C's in-cabin technology has been upgraded with a center console swipe screen that is vertically oriented, similar to a smartphone. It

can be operated by touch or with a voice-recognition system similar to the iPhone's Siri, only McLaren's personal assistant is known as Iris, and the voice is male.

Driving the 12C Spider on the street, Iris occasionally scolded: "You are over the speed limit."

Buyers of the McLaren 12C Spider are likely to hear that often.

Oldsmobile flashes lights when it's least expected

UNDER THE HOOD

Q: The headlights on my 2002 Oldsmobile Silhouette turn on and off unpredictably, whether it's running or not. All lights work properly otherwise. I have to remove the headlight bulbs while parked to save the battery. — George W. Barfield

A: In a follow-up communication, George verified no other lights were remaining on when the Olds is parked. I wanted to be sure, as there can be some confusion between misbehaving daytime running lights, which are headlamps only, and automatic lights, which are head and parking lamps. After looking over the wiring diagrams for this vehicle, it appears the only way this symptom could occur would be due to a fault within the daytime running lights, or DRL, control module.

The DRL control module is under the left side of the instrument panel; it's fairly easily accessed after removing the under-dash hush panel. Parts availability may be tough, other than via a recycled part from a wrecking yard. Another option, and it's an easy one, is to put the DRLs out of their misery by removing the blue 10A DRL fuse from the

passenger-side instrument panel fuse box.

Q: The left-side daytime headlight on my 2007 Chevrolet Silverado stopped working and looks terrible this way. How is this fixed? Can I do it myself? — Jim Conner

A: This couldn't be easier. General Motors did a nice job making the daytime running lamps accessible for service. With the hood open, locate the horizontal "L" pin atop the headlamp housing. Rotate/unlatch the L to allow the pin to be wiggled inboard and removed completely. The headlamp housing can now be lifted up and away from the body and set aside; unplugging headlamp connectors is preferable to letting the housing dangle.

The DRL lamp is now readily accessible below the vacated space. Press in on the small tab and rotate the lamp socket to disengage it. The bulb can now be removed and renewed. Plan ahead and purchase two 4114K bulbs before disassembly, and do both sides — they're about \$3-\$4 apiece. Reassembly of the parts is the opposite of disassembly.

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Get dealer to VIN-dicate problem with downshifting

Q: My 2009 Hyundai Sonata has an ongoing shifting problem. When I am slowing and the speedometer is crossing the 20-mile-per-hour mark, it “surges” as though I can feel the downshift. First we tried a transmission fluid flush, but that did not help. A second mechanic said it is just the way the car is and there is nothing functionally wrong. What do you think?

A: I’m not sure the transmission is the issue. Sensing or feeling a “surge” as the transmission downshifts might indicate an electronic control issue with the engine control module, or ECM, and/or transmission control module, or TCM. My Alldata automotive database pulled up several Hyundai service bulletins addressing shift quality issues. TSB No. 11-AT-003 addresses deceleration downshifts and TSB No. 12-AT-023 identifies an

“improperly functioning transmission oil temperature sensor” that might affect shift quality and generate DTC fault codes D0711/P0712/P0713.

Hyundai has issued several programming updates for the ECM and TCM to address these issues. I’d suggest having your dealer check the VIN of your car to see if any of these updates have been done. If not, a scan tool might pull up specific DTC fault codes, and the updated programming may smooth out the downshifts.

Q: I have a 1999 Mercury Grand Marquis 4.6-liter with 135,000 miles. It has a Gold Diehard battery that is about a year and a half old. On cold starts, no problems, but if I drive several miles and then turn the car off for a few minutes to an hour, the battery light comes on

when I start it. After a few miles or a few minutes, it goes off. The battery and alternator test fine with my multimeter, but I can’t re-create the “light on” scenario in the garage while testing. It just comes on at startup and then goes off.

A: By definition, the battery warning light illuminates when system voltage does not increase above battery voltage, indicating that the charging system isn’t recharging the battery. When the engine is started, the alternator’s “field” circuit must be electrically energized with battery voltage to create the magnetic field necessary to generate current.

On a restart where the “batt” light stays illuminated, try leaving the car in park and gently raising the engine rpm to 2,000 or so. If the warning light goes off, it means the voltage regulator built into the alternator has recognized the need to charge the battery.

With the key on but the

engine not running, check fuse 3 (5-amp) and the “gen” fuse (10-amp) in the power distribution block to make sure they’re clean with solid connections, and check for battery voltage at the “F” (field) terminal on the back of the alternator.

Keep an eye out for a good deal on an alternator; you might need a new one in the near future.

Q: I own a 2005 9-2 Saab. It is due for new brake rotors. I understand there are four main types of replacement rotors on the market: Flat (the usual OEM rotors), drilled, slotted and the combination of both. I’m looking to increase stopping power and reduce stopping distance while keeping the rotors from warping. Is there really a benefit to any these aftermarket rotors?

A: The different styles of rotors won’t really affect stopping “power” or distance. As long as the brakes have the “power” to lock the wheels and tires, it’s the

tires that influence stopping distance the most. Better stopping power would require larger brakes and higher-grip tires. Look at it this way: Brakes are engines that work in reverse, so to speak. Brakes convert the energy of motion into heat. The bigger the brake, the more efficient the engine.

Slotted, drilled and vented rotors do offer one major advantage — they dissipate heat better, thus allowing more frequent and harder braking without overheating/fading/warping in high-performance and racing applications.

In your case, higher-performance brake pads would have a greater influence on stopping power than different style rotors.

Losing it

'The Biggest Loser' sheds weight of its own in Season 15

Network television is about to shed a few pounds.

"The Biggest Loser" is taking some of its own advice and slimming down. As the weight-loss reality series gears up for its 15th season — which premieres Tuesday, Oct. 8, on the peacock network — NBC has announced that this year's episodes will be one hour in length, as opposed to its previously standard two hours.

The show won't lose any of its charm, though. In the past, episodes have occasionally been pared down to one hour without any issue — in fact, many fans are looking forward to the extra hour being cut, eager for the show's focus to stay on the challenges, weigh-ins and eliminations and away from any unnecessary drama. "The Biggest Loser" has become a major television event for millions of viewers, and NBC is confident that a shorter duration will make the show more accessible to audiences, not less.

The extra hour isn't the only weight that will be shed this season — the cast of Season 15 is eager to start losing pounds. Leading this year's cast of losers is the one and only Ruben Studdard, winner of Season 2 of "American Idol." Studdard has had a very successful career since his "American Idol" win, releasing five albums, acting in small television and film roles and starring on stage in a revival tour of the musical "Ain't Misbehavin'."

"I don't think my size has really affected my singing career at all," Studdard said in an NBC promo video. "I've been able to do everything I've wanted to do musically. But the one thing that has eluded me is the picture of optimal health, and that is what I really want. ... I could not pass up this opportunity to change my life in that way."

It will be inspiring for viewers to see the weight-loss struggle of a star that shines as bright as

Studdard. Speaking of his many previous attempts to lose weight, he said he's tried "all kinds of weight-loss techniques. I've worked out with trainers, I was a vegan for three years ... I think the reason why it didn't work is because I really hadn't focused on making a real lifestyle change." He hopes his stay at the ranch will change all that: "America is full of fad diets ... but the most important thing that people can't seem to do is figure out how to keep the weight off, and that's what they do really well here at 'The Biggest Loser Ranch,' they teach people how to change their lives."

Trainers (and fan-favorites) Jillian Michaels, Bob Harper and Dolvett Quince will be returning this season to teach the contestants those all-important life lessons. "He's a funny guy, he's a likeable guy, he's a sweet guy," says

Michaels of Studdard, "but like all 'Biggest Loser' contestants, there's definitely an underlying pain, sadness and anger under the whole funny facade."

This season, the roles of the trainers have changed somewhat. Harper says on NBC.com, "This season on 'The Biggest Loser,' the trainers had a huge part in picking the contestants. I've been on the show since Season 1 and we've never done that before." This new responsibility has affected the trainers in very different ways. Being involved in the casting process was not Harper's cup of tea: "It was heart-wrenching," he said, "All I could think was, 'Wait, we have to take all these people that are here telling us these stories and only get 15 of them to come onto our show?' ... It was just gut-wrenching for me."

Michaels and Quince, on the other hand, relished their new part in the process. Michaels feels that the trainers' input is valuable because of how closely they work with the contestants — they have learned what qualities someone needs to succeed. "For me," says Michaels, "I'm looking for somebody that is self-aware, because if you're too deep in denial, too unconscious about your issues and why you're being self-destructive, I'm not going to be able to help you. Things move too quickly ... I also need an individual who is able to experience hope ... if you cannot be hopeful as a contestant here, you also cannot be successful." Quince agrees, saying: "A lot of people want the big gift, the 'I lost x amount of weight,' but they don't realize how hard it is to get to that space." The trainers' ability to screen contestants gives them a chance to choose the people who they feel will most benefit from their rigorous program — meaning the end results could be better than ever for the contestants.

But that's not all the trainers will be doing this season. Also on NBC.com, Quince comments on the other change in his job description: "Another big thing is the 'Save.' For the first time ever on the show, we as trainers get one Save, an opportunity when someone's getting voted off to say 'I'm not done with them yet.' I've always want-

ed that, so I'm excited about that part." He goes on to explain how sometimes all it takes is a couple of bad days to get a player sent home. He singles out Lisa Rambo, a Season 14 contestant who Quince thinks was eliminated far too early in the competition. He relishes the idea of giving

second chances to those who, like Rambo, really deserve them.

With all of these changes and some famous contestants, this is shaping up to be the most exciting season yet. Tune in to NBC Tuesday, Oct. 8, as Season 15 of "The Biggest Loser" gets underway.

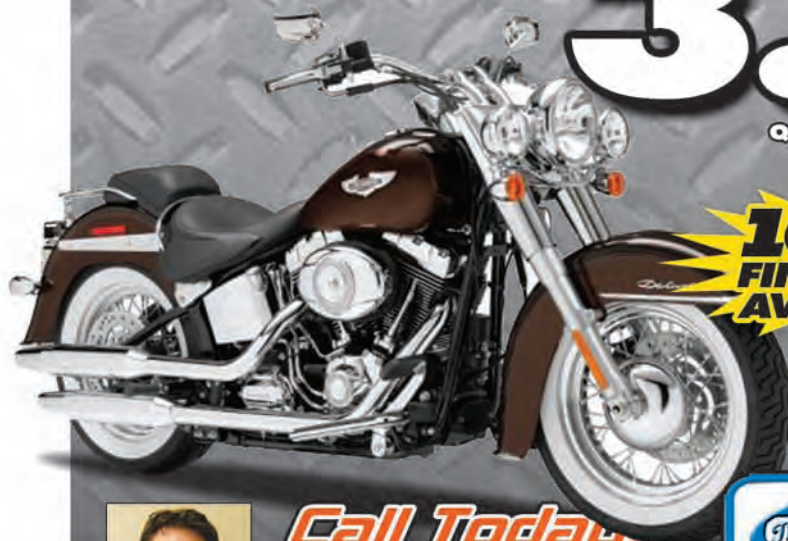

BBC celebrates 50 years of 'Doctor Who'

The Doctor is in: Fifty years is a long time for anyone — well, except for one of "Doctor Who's" Time Lords.

The long-running BBC series (which airs on BBC America on this side of the pond) has been teasing its upcoming 50th anniversary for some time now, and fans young and old of this legendary program are finally being granted a peek at this very special event.

Make no mistake about it:

"The Day of the Doctor" is going to be a big deal. While series producer Marcus Wilson has called this event drama a "love letter to the fans," and based solely on the information that they've leaked, that doesn't look like it's an exaggeration.

Both the current actor to play the titular character (in this case, the 11th doctor), Matt Smith ("Clone," 2010), and his predecessor, David Tennant ("Harry Potter and the Goblet of Fire," 2005), are starring in the special, which has been penned by the series' legendary head writer, Steven Moffat.

It may well be good

news that two iterations of the doctor are in house. It's been confirmed that the Daleks, one of his oldest and certainly most recognizable enemies, will be up to no good once again, and this time around they won't be the only foes on screen. The Zygons, a mysterious race of alien shape shifters, are returning to plague the doctor again, despite having only one appearance on screen more than 30 years ago.

"Doctor Who" is widely considered to be one of Britain's greatest television programs. It originally ran from 1963 to 1989 and was revived with great fanfare in 2005. Matt Smith is wrapping up his time as the Doctor, with the 12th actor to play the role, Peter Capaldi ("Torchwood"), taking over during this season's Christmas special.

He'll be putting that experience as a writer and executive producer to good work again. He's serving in both roles on "Show & Tell," but he won't be alone. He's teaming up with "Grey's Anatomy" and "Private Practice" creator Shonda Rhimes and "Grey's Anatomy" executive producer Betsy Beers for the project — a trifecta of talent that's certain to make "Show & Tell" into a surefire hit.

"Show & Tell" will be based on Bucatinsky's best-selling book, which is a collection of stories about parenthood.

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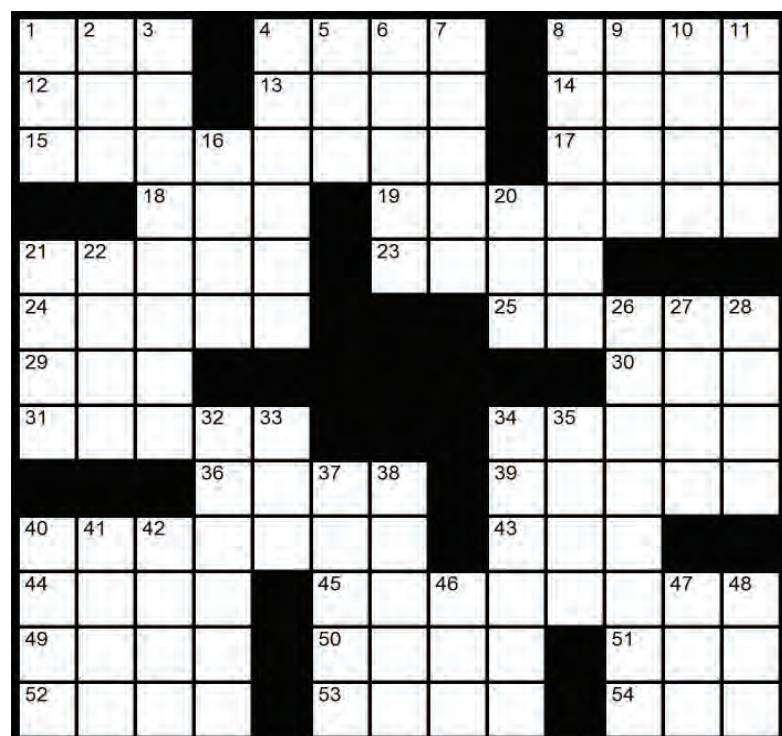

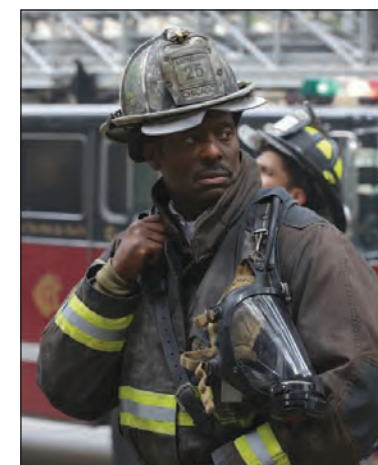

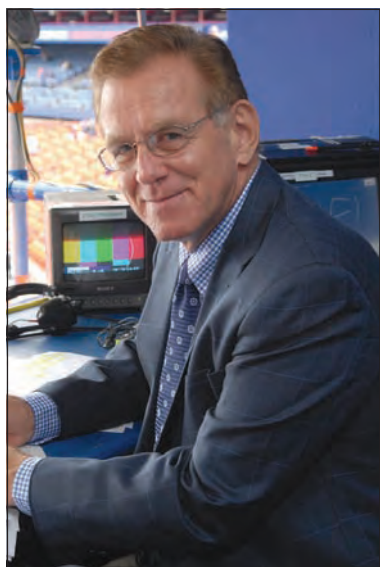
