



FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S DESK

In my last letter from the Executive Director's desk, I wrote to you about the combined strategic planning and accreditation process upon which Eastern Christian had embarked in the autumn of 2008. Much progress has been made since that letter – some of which will be evident in this issue. I wanted to update you on the tasks that have been accomplished thus far, provide a perspective which will be evident in this issue. I wanted to update you on the tasks that all of this effort is important.



In thinking about the progress that has been made during the past year, I cannot help but recognize the hundreds of hours that have been volunteered by some four dozen members of our school community – analyzing survey responses from the broader EC community, dissecting our Mission and Belief Statements to ensure that we remained true to the mission for which we were founded over 117 years ago, profiling the aspirations that we hold dear for our graduates, and drawing the educational blue-print for our students for the best part of the next decade. We have learned much about the wonderful impact that Eastern Christian has had upon the lives of our graduates and those whom they serve. We have focused on the incredible opportunities that lie ahead of us – tremendous opportunities to prepare young people to be people of Christian vision and influence on the doorstep of one of the most important and influential cities in the world. We have thought about ways in which we serve the students that God has entrusted to us – the methods that are working well and those that need to change.

This work has resulted in a revised Mission and Belief Statement that reaffirms the mission for which we were founded and sets forth our core beliefs regarding Christian education – beliefs regarding our God's sovereignty, His redemptive work, and the role to which He has called us as His image bearers. This work has resulted in a Graduate Profile clearly stating our school community's aspirations for our students as they complete their education at Eastern Christian. The 2009-10 school year will be another year of planning, implementation and study for the Eastern Christian community. Our Board will meet with our Strategic Planning Consultant from Christian Schools International to receive a final report and begin the implementation of a number of strategic recommendations. Our accreditation teams will develop plans for the implementation of the educational goals established for the next seven years. We will receive a comprehensive review by a 10-member visiting team of the educational goals established for the next seven years. We will receive the implementation of our plans. 

Students Take Their Vision Worldwide

his year, Eastern Christian students from preschool to 12th grade set out to transform the world. Together, the students at Eastern Christian organized and supported close to 30 fundraisers, service projects, and mission trips in the 2008-09 school year.

Middle School students organized at least four MAD (Make a Difference) projects in every grade level. (For more on this endeavor, read the article on page 5.)

In the Elementary School this year,

students were asked to ponder their theme from Mark 12—loving God with all their heart, soul, mind, and strength—and how to put that into action. Each class chose an organization to treat as their neighbor, and raised money or held service projects for them. The preschoolers and 1st graders prayed for and wrote to US troops overseas. The 3rd graders sent money to World Vision and World Missions. The 4th graders held a mathathon for St. Jude's Children's Hospital.

In the High School, for the first time ever, there were two overseas mission trips during spring break. These trips were organized by teacher **Debbie Ayars**, who also works for Touch the World Ministries. Touch the World provided the logistical support for the trips. One group of 11 students went to Honduras and worked in an orphanage, while six other students went to Uganda.

The mission trips were tough, eye-opening experiences. The team helped out in Honduras by playing with the kids, running a vacation Bible school for the kids in the village, and doing construction at the orphanage. A few students got sick from all the sudden changes in their daily life, and all students were required to take malaria pills. Freshman **Briana Caro** said, "Honduras was life-changing. I definitely want to go back. Our group got really close."

In Uganda, the team visited children at St. Mary Kevin Orphanage, at the EC sister school St. Stephens, and at a refugee camp in Gulu. Faced with abject poverty and suffering, the experiences continue to haunt and change those that went. Senior **Andrew Abadeer** said, "In the orphan-

The Uganda team spent a lot of time in devotions, prayer and discussion while considering the extreme ramifications of being called to "love their neighbor as themselves."

The Uganda mission trip galvanized many students throughout the school

system to action. In the 2nd grade, each student prayed for an orphan in Uganda. They raised money for the orphanage and sent homemade picture frames with the mission teams to bring to their neighbors from across the ocean. A 7th grade MAD project that focused on poverty also took up the challenge of helping Uganda. They held t-shirt drives and raised money for supplies for both the Uganda and Honduras mission trips. When the teams left on their trips, they were loaded down with gifts and donations from EC students to give to their new neighbors.

The High School National Honor Society organized a fundraiser for St. Stephens. The students at St. Stephens spend an inordinate amount of time carrying safe drinking water, daily walking miles from their only water source to the school and village. With a solar pump, the village could have its own well, and allow the students to spend more time in class.

Various fundraisers were held throughout the year to try to achieve the goal of \$6,000 for the water pump. Again, the 7th grade MAD team was able to help out. Bible teacher **Betsy Tyvoll**, the group's supervisor, said, "I had them walk around our school several times with buckets of water one morning, to show them what it must be like for these folks to have to do this everyday. They had a fundraiser to contribute to the High School's funds for these solar panels. We challenged all the faculty to offer their (crazy) antics to be performed on the roof of the school. We raised \$400!" The funds for this ambitious project have not yet reached the goal, but EC students are determined to continue their efforts.

USAF Major General Speaks to Middle School

n May 11, retired Air Force Major General Jonathan Scott Gration, special envoy for President Barack Obama to Sudan, spoke in a special assembly to the Eastern Christian Middle School about his life and his experiences. Just weeks away from flying to Sudan, Gration spoke to the 209 students at the Middle School about his often-harrowing experiences, which he used to display the fact that God can be trusted.

Middle School Principal

Richard Van Yperen said, "Challenging our students to seek God's purpose for them even as middle school students as they attempt to make a difference in 2009, he related how God had directed his life through some of the most recent historically important events, emphasizing that God has a purpose for each of us to serve others and make a difference in the world for God's kingdom."

Gration said he grew up in the Democratic Republic of Congo, where his parents were missionaries. They were evacuated three times in the 1960s due to violence and rebel activity. After moving back to America, Gration attended Ridgewood High School and Rutgers University, and received a degree in mechanical engineering. Following his graduation, he

joined the Air Force where he logged over 5,000 flight hours and received a bronze star for his valor in air missions during the Gulf War.

After the war, Gration felt called to fly volunteer missions in Uganda, he said. He spent five weeks living at a hospital repairing the local villages. He had his tools stolen on his flight, at night the air was filled gun shots and screams, and living conditions were terrible.

Gration said that one day, while he was feeling sorry for himself and the terrible living conditions, he saw two children playing in the street. It dawned on him that these children had never tasted salt nor sugar. He said that he realized how good his life was, and that he should not have a poor outlook because of his temporary living conditions. Following the five weeks in Uganda, Gration returned to Kenya, working with the Air Force in training missions.

Another life-threatening, life-changing experience occurred while Gration was stationed in at the Khobar Barracks in Saudi Arabia in 1996. Terrorists bombed the entire building, leaving many dead and Gration injured. He realized that "life itself is a gift, and God's hand was on my life." Gration said he was at his desk at the Pentagon on September 11, 2001. Gration spoke of how these experiences changed his life and life goals, and for the last 12 years his goal has been to stop extremists in Iraq and around the world.

As a concluding statement, Gration said, "I wouldn't want to lose all personal possessions through my experiences again, but I'm thankful for them because they have helped me live a more oriented and a more motivated life."

Sportsmanship Reigns at EC

Eastern Christian has been chosen as the top school for sportsmanship in the Bergen/Passaic Scholastic League for the 2008-09 school year. Throughout the year, coaches of all the schools have been ranking the coach, teams and fans. Eastern Christian was the overall winner not only for our division, but also for the entire league.

Athletic Director Steve King said, "The goal in our program is not to be number one, but instead to continue the tradition of sportsmanship that has been an integral part of our athletic program. What greater witness on the field of play than to constantly display the Christian perspective of competition and sportsmanship intertwined. Eastern Christian continues to lead by example in this area in league, county and state competition."

In addition, Eastern Christian remains the only co-ed high school in the NJSIAA that has been disqualification-free since statistics were started in 1991. Mr. King said, "To remain disqualification free is extremely important to me as the Athletic Director. It shows the leadership in our coaching and in our athletic play. To have this continue since 1991 is an honor not only for our athletic program, but for Eastern Christian in general." Eastern Christian will be receiving a sportsmanship banner at the NJSIAA business meeting next fall.

his year, two Eastern Christian coaches hit important milestones in their careers. Girls' soccer coach Barry Veenstra won his 300th game in the fall, while this winter Steve King won his 500th game as girls' basketball coach.

Mr. King is only the second coach in Passaic County history to reach this milestone, which happened during a game against neighboring Manchester High School on January 27. However, in over 30 years of coaching, Mr. King has never defined his career by wins, but by sportsmanship and learning life lessons both on and off the court. In a celebration ceremony during a boys' basketball game on February 6, the Eastern Christian School Board presented Mr. King with a plaque commemorating his wins and his service.

In the ceremony, Principal Jan Lucas said, "While 500 wins is a milestone, winning has never been the top goal for Steve. Fair play, consistent with who we are as Christians, has permeated Steve's career, and that is what makes the 500th win so significant."

Mr. King said that winning 500 games simply "means I've been coaching a long time; but I'm very proud, because we aren't a power house athletic school—we are competitive. I coach for the love of coaching."

Mr. King's players describe him as an inspiring coach who encourages them to play hard, even when the underdog in a game. "Mr. King pushes us to our potential and knows each of our unique traits in basketball," said Arrielle Dreher, senior. "Mr. King knows what we can and can't do. He knows our strengths and weaknesses, and encourages us to do better and achieve our best."

Mr. Veenstra, who has coached for 26 years, also downplayed his milestone. After beating rival Hawthorne Christian to clinch the 300th win, the team gave him a gift certificate to his favorite restaurant. He told the team that the prize was better than the actual achievement.

Junior Dara Veenstra, Barry's daughter, said, "Not only do I love him as my dad, but also as my coach, even if he is pretty tough sometimes. I'm really happy about his 300th win. He is pretty modest about the whole thing, but it was a great achievement!"

Middle School Projects Make a Difference

As the second semester approached, the students were required to form a final project to help solve the issue they were studying. The focus shifted from learning to action.

From January on, the students and teachers brainstormed ideas and possible organizations that could benefit from their particular groups. Seventh grader **Priscilla Winston** was a part of the Environment group.

Her group specialized in cleaning up parks and planting in order to improve the environment one day at a time. Her favorite part of the project was cleaning up Sandy Hook State Park. "I loved cleaning [the beach at] Sandy Hook. I got to learn how to recycle and not just throw things away," said Priscilla. Seventh grader **Cheryl Steenstra** was also a part of the Environment group. She said, "It was incredible learning how much you can do to help. Knowing you can do it everyday is pretty cool. I would probably continue helping with planting gardens because it was a lot of fun to do."

Seventh grader **Justin Miller** was active with the Poverty group. "My favorite part of the group was probably helping with little kids. It was cool to have fun while serving the Lord. One thing I would do to continue serving is donating money to charities," said Justin.

Biology Students Find New Opportunities

he High School Biology Department has explored some new statewide opportunities and challenges this year. One has been collaborating with Drew University in a series of interesting opportunities.

One of those new opportunities was participation in the state-wide Environthon competition on March 29. The High School's new Envirothon team won the Horizon award for best presentation by a first year competitor. The team, made up of sophomores **Madeline Kosten**, **Taylor Lee**, **Jackie Santhouse**, and **Marina Youssef**, was organized by biology teacher **Ms. Anne Bazanowski**.

The Envirothon competition involved 43 teams from New Jersey high schools. The competition is held to get the next generation's opinion on natural resource problems. Marina said, "Teamwork was key in the Envirothon. If we didn't have it, I don't think we would have gotten an award. We had to come together and create a presentation and every one needed to be involved."

This year's competition focused on researching White-Nose Syndrome (WNS), a sudden disease that seems to be decimating bat populations in eastern states. This problem was posted on the Envirothon webpage one week before the competition. Students then prepared their presentation for the competition, worked together to find solutions to the issue, and presented their work without any assistance from their teachers and/or aides.

On June 12, Mr. Richard Belcher, the Director of the Envirothon,



made a presentation at Eastern Christian High School to award the team for their efforts.

The Biology Department is also working with Drew University to explore new research collaborations. On June 10, Dr. Sarah Webb, the Director of Environmental Education at Drew, visited the High School and toured the forest on EC's campus with biology students. Dr. Webb talked to the students about invasive species, and identified the invasive Norway Maple trees in the EC woods. Dr. Webb is investigating how Drew and EC can work together in the upcoming school year to further these studies.

Language Arts Students Win Accolades

iddle School students have been recognized this spring for their achievements in language arts both nation-wide and locally. Eastern Christian had 35 7th grade students were published in "A Celebration of Poets," a book that 7th to 9th graders from across the nation can submit their poems for a chance to be published. The students submitted their poems after finishing their poetry unit. The poems that the students submitted had to be free verse and about the issues they are facing in middle school. Seventh grader **Hannah Flim** said, "I loved the different styles of poetry we got to learn and experience in class." Hannah was inspired by nature to write her poem called *Free*. This poem was about the dark and quietness in nature. Her poem is able to capture the emotion of how she feels about being one with nature.

With such a large number of poems accepted, Eastern Christian students make up 10% of the national publication. English teacher **Mrs. Laura Kuehlke** said the book was a good way for Eastern Christian to get publicity, and that people across our nation will get to see our school and see that

it is one of the top contributors to the book.

Meanwhile, a 5th grade team worked on solving illiteracy, conducting a book drive for their MAD project. The group of 13 students were able to collect 780 books. Bergen County's Project Literacy honored the class with a special recognition plaque at their June 11 awards banquet. **Mrs. Stephanie Tanis**, 5th grade language arts teacher, headed up the project.

Mrs. Tanis said, "The students were very honored that Project Literacy would provide them with such a beautiful way to thank them for their help. Eastern Christian Middle School was the only school this year to be presented an award. Our students were not expecting to be honored for their service. Two team members and I were able to go to the awards ceremony. When the remaining 5th graders were shown the plaque and certificate they received the next day, they were overjoyed by the fact that their work went recognized, and what they did was truly important. These 5th graders learned a lot about giving and understanding other people's needs. It will be an experience they will never forget!"

Twisting, Looping and Tugging in Physics Class

t may sound dangerous for a scientist to experiment upon oneself, but that is just what the High School physics class did this spring with their annual trip to Six Flags. "The great thing about physics," said teacher **Phil Verrengia**, "is that there are always applications. You can place yourself inside the experiment and feel the forces for yourself."

To prepare for the field trip, the physics class first completed a workbook exploring all the concepts and calculations that they would experience on the park's rides. They learned about centripetal force (the center-seeking force when objects move in a circle), centripetal acceleration and the force factor (the feelings of heaviness or lightness), as well as the conversion of potential energy to kinetic energy. Students studied how most of the rides at Six Flags use these concepts. They also built trial roller coasters in the lab, using Hot Wheel car tracks.

At the park, students choose two rides to study for themselves. Bringing stopwatches and force meters on the roller coasters, students could measure the G-forces at the tops and bottoms of every hill, loop, and twist. Of course, some things, like fun, cannot be measured so easily. Senior Justin Tyvoll said, "The extreme drops, turns, and loops prompted the release of a lot of adrenaline, creating a very enjoyable experience for all of us." Senior Michelle Van Lenten agreed, "Let's just say that Kingda Ka was awesome. The entire day was a complete success."

Back in the classroom, students were able to complete the calculations from their measurements to compare their real-world results with the expectations they had worked out earlier. Amusement parks incorporate so many of the ideas of physics that Mr. Verrengia said he was able to create the entire final exam with his own made-up rides and the calculations that would go into testing them.


In addition to the trip to Six Flags, students were also able to test the laws of physics while preparing for the annual Tug of War contest at the end of the year picnic. Using Newton's Third Law (for every action there is an equal and opposite reaction), students pulled on ropes while sitting on rolling chairs to see how strength alone cannot win a tug of war fight. Students discovered that more impor-

tant than strength is finding ways to allow friction to aid you when combating that equal and opposite force. Students discovered that digging their feet into the ground, or knocking the other team off balance, were keys to a successful tug of war game. (with reporting by Emily

Senior Wins State Trig Contest



Senior Da Bin Moon has been making quite a stir in the Math Department of the High School, as well as the whole state of NJ. He was recently named champion of the Trig Star Competition for the entire state of New Jersey. Moon was the only student to attain a perfect 100% on the state-wide test. The prize included a sum of \$450.

The Trig Star test was one hour long, and the person with the highest score won. If there was a tie for the highest score, the student with the fastest time would then be declared the winner. Moon had the highest score, but not the fastest time. He finished with a time of 22:14, behind junior James Fylstra, who had the best EC time at 14:00. Moon said, "To be honest, the problems themselves were easy, but this was the slowest I ever worked. I usually finish around 15:00, so I was pretty surprised to see the result."

Moon has already taken AP Calculus Independent Study, which is one of the highest math courses available at EC. His brilliant knack for numbers has encouraged him to major in either mathematics or applied mathematics at Boston College this fall. egional music ensembles give talented musicians a chance to really hone their skills and be challenged to perform advanced music with limited rehearsals. This year, Eastern Christian had three students who rose to meet these challenges.

At the High School, senior Ashley Ronco and junior Victoria **Anderson** were selected for the North Jersey High School Regional

Chorus. They auditioned for the parts in an all-day Saturday session in Paramus, NJ, where there were 300 other sopranos and altos audtioning for parts. The north regional is the most competitive region in New Jersey.

The practices were in Nutley, NJ in March, and ran for five hours with dinner and short breaks. "Being in an honors choir is very difficult. It puts you in a completely new environment. Everyone is there because they all love to sing and they have a focus that you would not find in a normal classroom. You sit down with the music ready to go, get pitches, and just start singing. You don't really learn the notes; they are expected of you," said Ashley. Ashley has been in All-County Choir and Regional Choir two years in a row.

Seventh grader Michelle Suh took part in the North Jersey Junior High School Regional



sight-reading music. The entire audition is done in one minute. For Michelle, Ashley, and Victoria, they each auditioned twice, once in a semi-final round and then the final round.

After five intense rehearsals, Michelle played in a final concert in February with a full 100-piece orchestra made up of the best musicians in northern NJ around her.

Orchestra. The junior high program is for students from grades seven to nine, and is almost entirely made up of the 9th graders. However, in Michelle's auditions, she placed 12th out of 199 musicians.

Auditions for the regional groups last all day, but contain just a few moments to make a lasting impression. An audition consists of playing a scale, playing an excerpt from a practiced solo, and

A String Festival Makes an EC Connection



his past January, four Middle School Orchestra players took part in the annual Ridgewood Symphony Festival of Strings. Tara Kleinmanns, Sarah Mulcock, Kathryn Post, and Michelle Van Dyke each participated in the festival this year. Interestingly, they weren't the only Eastern Christian members in the festival.

This year, the festival featured guest conductor **Todd Van**

Beveren '92. Todd is the Orchestra Director at Columbia High School, as well as the artistic director of the Northern NJ Youth Orchestra and the Performance Chairman for the NJ All State Orchestra. The Festival of Strings is for orchestra students in grades six to nine who are recommended by their orchestra director. There are a series of four-hour rehearsals in January leading up to a concert at the end of January. The orchestra is made up of more than 100 string players from the Bergen/Passaic area.

Orchestra Director **Cathy Clark** said that the festival is great for "meeting other kids outside of EC who share the same interests. They meet new friends by having stand partners and having dinner together each rehearsal."

Amusement Park Rings with EC Music

On May 15 the Middle School's music ensembles performed in the ongoing Music in the Parks program at Six Flags Great Adventure and achieved success in the competition. Each week in the spring, eight to nine schools from the area compete in this program. In the May 15 competition, the Middle School Chorus placed fourth in their division, the Band placed first in their division, and the Orchestra placed first in their division and first overall of all groups that performed that day.

Orchestra conductor **Cathy Clark** said that the competition, "is a good experience to strive for our best, knowing that we'll be evaluated. It encourages us to perform to high standards and to have musical excellence, and allows us to see how we fit in compared to other schools."

During the competition, which is scheduled in the morning and located close to the Six Flag amusement park, two judges evaluate the performance to determine winners. However, the judges, who are well-respected conductors from area colleges, also produce an audio tape during the performance with specific positive constructive comments. The school conductor and group can later listen to their performance and see exactly what the judges liked about their music and what they can work on to get better.

Of course, after the performances, the students had the chance to have fun at Six Flags. With 13 chaperones, EC's students got to stay at the park from 12pm to 6pm. At 5:30, right before the park closed, an award ceremony was held, where the EC Orchestra was announced as the winner of the competition.



The Graduate Profile



May we stand up for what is right, living radically for the Lord."

Happy 90th Birthday EC High School

eptember, 2009 marks the 90th birthday of Eastern Christian High School. On September 3, 1919, the newly approved "Christelijk Middelbaar Onderwijs" (Christian High School) opened under the name Christian High School for Paterson and Vicinity. The school opened with 17 freshmen enrollees, and held classes initially in the middle room on the first floor of the North 4th Street Christian School. For the first three weeks, work was carried on at tables resting on wooden horses, which were soon replaced by 30 desks which arrived from Chicago.

All students took the following basic courses: Latin, history, algebra, English, American history, high school arithmetic, geography and drawing.


The first principal was Mr. G. Bos, and the first teacher was Mr. B. Schooland, who was hired at an annual salary of \$1,400 a year.

In order to keep parental expense for sending children to the school to a minimum, all text books were

provided by the school and the annual tuition was set as low as possible. Pupils who came from Paterson paid \$25, those from Passaic \$18, and those from Midland Park \$12.50 per year.

Finances were very tight in the early days of the High School, with the average monthly income of \$200 barely adequate to pay teachers' salaries and overhead. In spite of this, there was a reported ending balance of \$350 after all expenses were paid at the end of the first year!

The most important reason for the creation of a Christian high school was to provide a distinctive Christian education. The leadership of the day was filled with spiritual vigor, and sought the glory of God in education as well as in other spheres of life. They saw the inadequacy of a seemingly innocuous public school system which paid lip service to God, but had no appreciation for a God-centered life in which a person's first concern was His



glory. These leaders were interested in developing the whole of human personality so that students would be better equipped for Christian service.

In 2009, 90 years later, we are still interested in these same goals and commitments as we strive to provide a distinctively Christian education with a Christian world and life view at Eastern Christian High School!

This is the first of several articles that will be presented in connection with the High School's 90th anniversary. Future articles will appear in the EC Times as well as future issues of The Herald. The source of this information comes from Cornelius Bontekoe's "An Historical Review of Eastern Academy," which was written in connection with the 25th anniversary of Eastern Academy.

It's a Christian foundation that provides planned giving services to its nearly 200 Christian member organizations and their constituents. Eastern Christian School Association is a proud member of Barnabas Foundation. What is Barnabas Foundation?

2. What type of services do they offer?

- In confidential meetings, their professionally trained staff review your personal situation with you and provide estate planning guidance with a distinctly Christian perspective. They cover everything from the need for a basic will to more advanced strategies such as charitable trusts and life income agreements.
- They offer a donor-advised fund called the Stewards Fund. This fund allows a donor to make a single gift and receive the income tax deduction immediately, but defer the contributions to ministries to a later (even indefinite) date. This fund is often used to make a single gift of appreciated assets such as stock, real estate and business interests that will benefit multiple ministries. It helps Christians give "the right asset at the right time" to obtain the maximum tax advantage.

 - They issue and manage charitable gift annuities that provide the donor with guaranteed fixed payments for They act as Trustee of Charitable Remainder Trusts. life, as well as possible tax advantages. Upon the death of the donor, designated ministries receive the balance

Tidbits from the Foundation Office

In view of the significant financial struggles of some of our parents in the current economic conditions, we researched the archives to better understand how our parents and grandparents handled their Christian education obligations during the Depression of 1929. Here are some interesting facts to consider:

- 1. Giving in 1929 (in 2009 dollars) was \$123,770 when the graduating class totaled 30 students. Today's giving is about the same as in 1929, as our current giving is about three times the 1929 levels and our graduating class is about three times the 1929 level.
- 2. Giving dropped by two thirds as the Depression progressed, hitting a low in 1934. Giving levels did not return to the 1929 levels until after World War II.
- 3. Tuition payments were not forgiven during this period, but rather deferred. Parents were requested to sign a contract for the complete repayment of all tuition after graduation.

During the next school year we will be focusing on the 90^{th} anniversary of our High School, which opened in September, 1919. If you or anyone you know has a interesting story to share about the early days of Eastern Christian, please contact the Foundation Office and we will do our best to include it in future articles.



Near the end of June, John departed the United States to work for six months for an organization called Partners Worldwide. Partners Worldwide grew out of the Christian Reformed World Relief Committee as an outreach to business people in developing countries. Partners, now its own entity, connects entrepreneurs in low income countries to successful business people in North America. Through training, mentoring, and access to capital, Partners operates with the ultimate goal of eliminating poverty through the creation of jobs.



John got connected with Partners Worldwide through a position he held at the Christian Reformed Church denomination office in Grand Rapids, Michigan. While John attended Calvin College, he worked as an intern in the financial services department. As part of his job, he got the opportunity to work on the accounting of Partners. 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
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


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
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EC SPORTS

Senior Brian Sietsma was named second team all-county, while sophomore Scott De Jong and senior Kendall Everett were named to the honorable mention allcounty team.



Sophomore Leah Groenewal (pictured) and the girls' JV softball team were coached by first year coaches Chrissy Porochniak and Erin Fisher. Coach Porochniak said, "We just have the greatest team.
