Day care

'Working poor' may receive county help

A high teen pregnancy rate, a lot of families in public housing and a large minority population all contribute to make South King County the region's neediest area for day-care programs.

A day-care proposal to help the county's working families with minimal incomes estimates 36,523 South King County children need day care, and nearly 9,000 of those are from low-income families.

The proposal, announced Tuesday by County Executive Tim Hill, would pump \$1 million a year into providing day-care subsidies for 500 to 700 children countywide. Of those, between 345 and 483 would be South King County residents.

It also creates a network to help parents find suitable child care and give information to day-care centers to set up business.

The subsidies target the "working poor," or families whose head-of-household is employed or in training but making between 53 and 70 percent of the state median income. That means a single mother of two children who earns between \$1,250 and \$1,625 a month would be eligible for a subsidy.

With a toddler and a

preschooler, she would get a maximum of \$504 a month to spend in county-approved day-care centers. The average total day-care cost for her two children is \$535 a month, the report states.

THE GOAL of the program is to give parents earning just over what welfare pays an incentive to keep working, said County Councilmember Audrey Gruger, head of the health and human services committee.

But Gruger, whose committee requested the executive to prepare the day-care proposal last May, said after seeing the results, she thinks the program falls short of the council's mark.

Only \$550,000 of the \$1 million the council earmarked for day-care subsidies from a sales tax increase last year would go to parents seeking child care, according to the plan.

The remainder would be split about evenly between administrative costs and the referral network. The plan calls for hiring five new county employees as administrators.

"I would like to put more money into direct subsidies," Gruger said. "It was our intention to do that."

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DARE is headed to Panther Lake

And the winner is (drum roll, please)...Panther Lake Elementary School.

Federal Way School District officials decided Thursday to place a King County police DARE officer at that school because it meets all the criteria set forth by the district and the police, said Sherrelle Walker, assistant superintendent for educational support.

The Federal Way substation recently made its DARE-trained crime prevention officer, Doug MacDonald, available part-time to teach the drug education course at one school. The officer's time is being given free of charge, but the district is paying for program materials, which could range from \$500 to \$2,500, depending on which workbooks and other materials teachers and MacDonald choose to use, Walker said.

PANTHER LAKE was chosen because it met the police department request to reach as many students as possible and because its "Here's Looking at You 2000" drug education program schedule best fit the timing of DARE (Drug Abuse Resistance Education). It also will graduate its 99 sixth-graders into Illahee Junior High, which is starting a pilot drug and alcohol assessment program.

"That will add a nice follow-up," Walker said.

Other schools with high sixth-grade populations send their students to Kilo, Lakota, Sacajawea and Totem junior highs, which will not have the assessment program. Other schools in the running will send some of their sixth-graders on to Illahee, but not all of them, Walker said.

"Panther Lake fit best into the existing structure for DARE," she added.

MacDonald will begin teaching the drug and alcohol awareness program Feb. 13. The course usually is taught one hour a week for 17 weeks, but that is flexible, Walker said.

SOME WERE disappointed at the district's selection of Panther Lake. Sherry Schweizer, who with her husband Bill, has been fighting to bring DARE to all Federal Way schools, thinks that if only one school is to get the King County officers, it should be Brigadoon Elementary.

Brigadoon sixth-graders and PTA members campaigned and collected signatures last year to keep the program at that school. DARE was taught second semester at Brigadoon last year as a pilot program.

"We spent the last year work-

Network's early success signaled lasting appeal

Five years ago at about this time, a room in Mary Gates' home was scattered with tickets, money and membership forms.

"Carolyn Hayek (Federal Way District Court judge) walked in and I told her, 'I think we probably have a success on our hands, and we aren't even an organization yet,'" Gates recalled.

It was the beginning of the Federal Way Women's Network, an organization that wasn't intended to be an organization as such, not until so many Federal Way residents signed on.

As only tickets, not memberships, were sold to the first meeting five years ago, there technically were no members when the Women's Network debuted in the still spanking-new Federal Way Executel. But nearly 200 women came to see what the fledgling

organization was about.

Thirty came with checks in hand. They became the group's first board.

Seven professional organizations offered early financial aid, and they became sponsoring organizations. Now, the network is financially sound and lists those groups as charter organizations.

More by default than design, Gates was the group's first speaker.

"I looked out at that crowd and said, 'Oh my goodness.' That was a huge crowd for Federal Way, unless you're lobbying against something," she said.

TOMORROW NIGHT, the Federal Way Women's Network will celebrate the fifth anniversary of that first meeting. If all goes as it

Voter's pamphlet writers line up

The lines are drawn. Factions for and against the six incorporation and annexation issues facing county voters in March have signed up to write statements for the voter's pamphlet that will be mailed with ballots Feb. 27.

The King County Council will appoint committees Monday.

In the Federal Way election, that won't be hard. State law limits the committee to three members, but allows others to consult.

Incorporation proponents Jim Handmacher and Maryann Mitchell of Federal Way First! and State Representative Jean Marie Brough all expressed interest in writing statements.

Two citizens, John P. Ringler and Ray Tomlinson, signed up to write against incorporation.

Although Tomlinson has not formally withdrawn his name from the list, in the interim since he signed up he has publicly changed his position to favor incorporation.

That leaves Ringler writing the anti-incorporation statement

Closure foes stall vote on Blair Bridge's fate

A controversial vote on a proposal to remove the Blair Bridge on East 11th Street and build an arterial around the Tacoma tideflats has been postponed — again.

The Tacoma City Council and the Port of Tacoma Board of Commissioners have delayed the vote on the joint resolution three times, once for lack of a quorum and twice because of citizen complaints.

The latest vote, scheduled for

Tuesday's city council meeting, was postponed to address questions raised by concerned Northeast Tacoma residents and by property and business owners at the port, said Jack Fabulich, president of the port's board of commissioners.

In a letter to Tacoma Mayor Doug Sutherland last Thursday, Fabulich requested time for port staff to address questions raised by citizens, and to revise the resolution to reflect those concerns.

"There are some good questions we don't have the answers to," Fabulich said. Staff would attempt to answer concerns about the amount of money available to complete the project, the proposed stoplights at some intersections and the road's ability to handle all the traffic, he said.

THE PROPOSED \$150 million arterial calls for building a new four-lane highway from South 21st Street downtown Tacoma eastward over the Puyallup

River to Milwaukee Way. From there, the existing East-West Road would be improved to a four-lane road to Taylor Way.

A portion of Marine View Drive from Taylor Way north to Norpoint Way would be improved to a two- and three-lane road.

Residents and other concerned citizens have voiced other concerns at past council and community meetings about the proposed plan.

THE CITY and port haven't identified enough money to com-

plete the project, say residents who fear that the road would be left incomplete and the Blair Bridge removed, severing their link to the city.

Business and property owners at the port and along East 11th Street have focused their concerns on the loss of traffic by their property, which will translate into lost dollars, they say.

Mark Hamilton, manager of Concerned Citizens for the 11th Street Corridor and Jobs, said

he is pleased about but skeptical of the recent decision to study the issue more before a vote is taken.

"It sounds good. At least they're having some second thoughts about this," Hamilton said.

"But I don't think they're going to convince us that they can build that road."

The environmental effect of the project is another concern of

Feathery victims will return to sky

My extremely limited knowledge of sea birds has improved considerably after four days at Ocean Shores helping with the bird rescue. I've also had the memorable experience of seeing a wide variety of people at their caring best.

The media have reported the bird cleaning details, but for me, there are some indelible images of volunteers, too.

Daughter Michele and I spent one day helping, then I returned for three more.

The bulletin board at the Ocean Shores Convention Center listed over 30 jobs for volunteers, and I worked five of them. Some wanted to be bird washers, but many worked in positions such as housing, clerical or donation-sorter and never had direct contact with the birds. They were there to help any way they could.

Several jobs required on-the-spot training, including bird feeders, who learned to thread a tube down the bird's throat and pump in a vitamin-packed Gatorade-based formula. Feeding was done four times a day, starting at 8 a.m., so they often just finished in time to begin the circuit again. Pens were cleaned simultaneously, also by volunteers.

My first job was taking the just-cleaned birds, rubbing K-Y Jelly on their feet and legs, registering their species and numbered leg band, and transporting them across the huge room — an auditorium or banquet hall in normal use — to sheet-covered, heated pens. On several of my shuttling trips I was aware of two women carefully placing dead birds in plastic bags, after recording information about them. Harsh reality. Those, too, were volunteers.

One morning I scrunched newspapers, used to line the bottom of the pens. My scrunching companions were a doctor and his nurse-wife from Gig Harbor, on their day off.

I worked a few hours answering telephone queries from potential volunteers from as far away as Vancouver B.C. and Kennewick. One B.C. caller was coming by motorcycle, and bringing his sleeping bag. "I'll stay 'til it's over," he said.

One evening I worked in housing, and even at 10 p.m. volunteers were still streaming in. Some of the last ones were four thirtyish men in the strangest outfits and most bizarre hairstyles I'd seen in real life, away from the TV screen. I guessed they might be a punk rock group. Perhaps the earring in the nose of the one with the pure white hair spiking out in all directions inspired that idea. The next day they were the volunteers doing the hardest and sometimes grubbier jobs, including cleaning pens.

The rest of my stay I was a holder for a bird washer. We worked from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. My first washer was a burly, bushy-bearded man from Port Angeles. He'd been there several days, and both arms bore peck wounds up to

his elbows. He refused to wear rubber gloves because he couldn't feel the oil in the feathers. The skin on his hands was white and pruned. Each night his arms were coated with antiseptic and bandaged. He was a computer expert, taking vacation time.

I was surprised the soapy water in the plastic washing tubs was hot. I was sure the birds were cooking, but was told their temperature is 104 degrees. The oil deepens their natural interlocking of feathers, and allowed water or cold to seep in to their skin, causing hypothermia. Keeping them warm had high priority.

The washing averaged 30 minutes, the rinse time was nearly the same.

My second washer was a Virginia college student home in Silverdale for winter break. She'd been a washer two days, and her arms were blotchy red from soap-related irritation. Taping and ripping off the rubber gloves was agony, but she shrugged it off. Experienced washers were needed.

Every bird struggled, but the birds managed searing epithets, even with their beaks held shut. Only the loons were flakier. Several scoters had a peculiar trait of going limp and dropping their heads over the side of the pan. I was sure they were dying, but we'd lift them out of the water and after several minutes lying on the table, they'd perk up, and we'd resume scrubbing. We wondered if they were faking.

We cleaned 104 birds one day, a record to that time. Hundreds more were waiting. The oneness of purpose was exceptional. The birds were our only motivation and focus.

At the end of my stay, I stopped outside where three large water-filled pools held a number of clean birds soon to be released. It was pouring rain, and for a few minutes I watched them splashing, preening furiously, purposefully. I could feel their joy. If they'd been songbirds, they would have been singing. I heard their song, anyway.

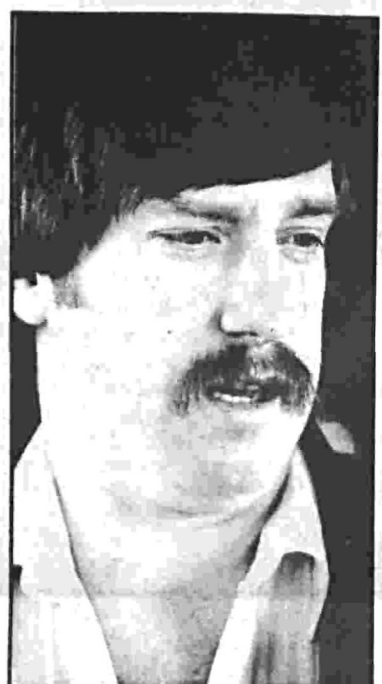
Ty Tallman (Student)

A story more important than Bundy

The day after Ted Bundy died I told my daughter a story.

It was barely 6:30. From the doorway of her bedroom I could not see her eyes in the folds and shadows of her pillow. But I knew she was awake.

She lay on her back, one hand adrift above her face. She likes to do that, inspect her eight-year-old fingers that way, as if they belonged to someone else.

I knelt beside her. "Do you know the story," I said, "of the first girl awake in the world?" Her slow eyes scanned my face.

"It started with the last star of the night, just getting ready to wink out."

As I told her the story, a shadowy figure shuffled in to join us, her little brother, stirred by the mumble of my voice and not wanting to miss a free story.

"See me," said the last star. "See me quick, I'm going out. Make a wish, before I'm gone."

Last stars, I told them, are like the first ones. You can wish on them. Last stars know all the secrets of the night.

My story was short. I said the girl was not sure what she should wish. It had to be a good wish, and she was barely awake.

"What do you think she wished?" I asked my daughter.

"That's not a story," she said. "That's about me." My story went out like a star. Instead of ending, it faded. So we all got up and had cereal.

I didn't mind. I was hoping

to hear what she might wish, but I got something better. She saw through me, and saw it was no story, but a secret mirror I held up to her.

That's what we have to do about Ted Bundy. We have to remember that he is not what he seems. He is not the story. You are the story. The story is you.

The story is your own plain life, you picking up milk at the store, you paying a water bill, licking jelly from a

morning of your life you see that face. You have forgotten the feelings of newness you had as a child. Not knowing your importance, you are easily confused by whatever is bizarre or terrible or deadly.

Television is not a mirror; it is a magnifying glass. Whatever it shows is enlarged, like germs, or giant-sized toothpaste tubes, like dancing bars of soap or beer bottles that play football.

Our brains by now are addicted to novelty. What is weird is wonderful. What is normal is diminished. Don't blame television. If television did a mini-series about a woman folding clothes or a man playing softball with his kids, America would change the channel. What is ordinary is not enough.

So we got Bundy instead. Bundy in the morning. Bundy at night. Bundy in a mini-series. For nearly 20 years, we've been watching him. First he was the invisible stalker. Then the captured killer. Then the topic of psycho-babble, about his arrogant coolness, the

Finally, last week, we heard the pathetic confession, the sob that showed he's human, the pitiful attempt to human it on pornography. On his last day, America woke up early just to see him die. His electrifying exit got great ratings. That night, he shared the front pages with George Bush.

No wonder it's hard for you to feel important. You look across a room at your husband, reading the paper, at your daughter doing homework, and they seem so uneventful, huh?

Well, maybe it's an effort, remembering how important they are, how miraculous is your smallest sigh, how wonderful your getting a glass of water.

Someone who loves you might tell you that, and in the flush of romance, you might believe it. You might say the same thing, putting your fingers to the face of a four-year-old who brought you flowers.

It isn't enough. Say it more often. Think it, whenever you see a headline about a schoolyard murder, and say it out loud, whenever you hear someone else celebrating the sordid or ugly or creepy side show of life.

Make it a habit. Put it on a poster: Everybody has a belly button! Sing it in the kitchen: Show me your elbows!

Be dumb about it. Put signs on the mirror: How's your face? Call your husband at work. ("I just wanted to hear you breathe.") Yeah, he'll give you a funny look when he gets home. When he does, say thanks.

ing our tails off for this program, I've gone on TV, I've gotten media attention...Panther Lake didn't do one thing to get the program," Schweizer said.

"The district is saying to us, 'Thanks for your help, but we're going to give it to another school,'" she added.

Walker is sympathetic to Schweizer's arguments, but said, "That's just one of the problems we face when we have only one of something. There are a lot of disappointed principals and parents."

Sharon Stenerson, principal of Panther Lake isn't one of the disappointed. She's excited to have DARE at her school and is impressed by the program's many facets, especially the police-student relationship it fosters.

"It's information coming from a source that can be respected for that kind of information. They're hearing about things that are a reality of life and

hearing it from a person who sees it on a regular basis."

Although Panther Lake is the only Federal Way school with a King County DARE officer, it isn't the only school to have the program. Sunnycrest Elementary School on Kent's West Hill also has the program this semester, taught by a Kent police officer. Sunnycrest is one of three Kent-area schools to have the program.

Brigadoon won't have a full-fledged DARE program, but its sixth-graders will get a taste of the class, said Principal Dar Springer. Brigadoon is one of several Federal Way schools that will receive a sample DARE lesson from county DARE officers-in-training.

OFFICERS BEING trained in the program will come to schools once to give a sample 20-30 minute lesson. It's a hands-on learning tool for the officers learning to teach DARE, he said.

Walker said Federal Way schools were a training site for

DARE officers last fall, too, and making classes available for the training is one way to "keep the DARE focus in our schools."

The long-term future of DARE is undecided. The sheriff's department still is working out its finances after County Executive Tim Hill's line-item vetoes of the council's budget, spokesmen say.

Eagle boys gun down Gators, 73-55

Federal Way's strong inside play coupled with some pinpoint shooting powered the Eagles past Decatur Friday night, 73-55, in a South Puget Sound League boys' basketball contest. The win boosted Federal Way's record to 4-7 in SPSL play and moved the Eagles to within one game of third-place Sumner (5-6) in the North Division standings.

Decatur fell to 2-9 with the loss heading into Tuesday's 7:30 p.m. home contest with Rogers (9-2).

Federal Way travels to Sumner Tuesday in a battle for third place. A victory by the Eagles would tie them with the Spartans for the third and final playoff spot with only three games to go.

"I thought one of the keys for us was our kids exploited their weaknesses," said Eagle coach Jerome Collins in regards to Friday night's homecourt victory. "It's really gratifying to hit the drawing board, work hard and then see it implemented in the game."

"I've seen them a couple times, I don't know if they've shot as well as they did tonight," stated Decatur coach Lee Anderson.

The Eagles canned 27 of 53 field goals for 51 percent, while the Gators were 19 of 59 from the floor for 32 percent.

JASON SCHMIDT had a big night for Federal Way, as the Eagles' starting center made 8

of 13 field goals and was 4 of 7 at the foul line for a game-high 20 points to go along with his 10 rebounds.

Senior guard Darrin Albright also hit double figures for the Eagles as he was 5 of 8 from the floor, including 2 of 4 from three-point range, and 1 of 2 at the line for 13 points.

Sophomore forward Donny Marshall added 10 points to go with his 11 rebounds and power forward Ed Miller finished with 10 points for the game.

Senior guard Marcus Hentschell led Decatur with 16 points. He was 4 of 8 from three-point territory.

Schmidt scored seven points and Albright hit two three-pointers to offset the two three-point field goals of Hentschell that helped keep the Gators close in the opening quarter. Schmidt's dunk with 33 seconds left in the period gave Federal Way an 18-10 lead.

The teams traded hoops for much of the second period with Federal Way taking a 37-27 lead on a basket inside by Schmidt off a nice feed from guard Dan Afework, who dished out 11 assists. But Decatur's Dan Black scored on a putback with three seconds left in the half to cut the deficit to 37-29 at intermission.

HENTSCHELL NAILED a three-pointer to start the second half and bring Decatur to within five at 37-32.

The Gators trailed by only a

45-37 margin after a basket inside by Marshall for Federal Way before Andy Jerdal hit a three-pointer from the corner for the Eagles.

After Miller scored on a turnaround for the Eagles, Jerdal got lucky on another three-pointer, as the ball nicked the corner of the basket and went in to make it 53-39 in Federal Way's favor.

Miller, Schmidt and Marshall tallied baskets down the stretch of the third quarter to lift the Eagles to a 59-41 lead going into the fourth.

Federal Way led by as many as 19 in the fourth quarter setting on the 73-55 final score as

guard Rod Janson sank a layin at the buzzer.

The loss lowered Jefferson's record to 1-10 in league play and 2-14 overall, while Rogers raised its mark to 9-2 in the South Puget Sound League and 12-4 on the season.

The Rams built up a 20-10 lead after one quarter and maintained a sizable advantage the rest of the night.

"They jumped out early on us, we got down 20-10 the first quarter and that was the difference the rest of the game," said TJ coach Bruce Case. "We didn't get back into it. We just kind of played it out."

The Rams increased the lead to 38-22 by halftime and were ahead 54-37 after three

quarters. Raider center Steve Johnson, who led his team in scoring with 15 points, fouled out of the game with about four minutes left in the third quarter.

Daryn Ditmore and Terry Hornbuckle each had nine points for the Raiders, while Aaron Martin finished with seven, Brad Kolbo had four and Cale Tolmich and Jamie Sonnenfield tallied two apiece.

Jefferson resumes SPSL play at home Tuesday against Puyallup (11-0, 14-2) at 7:30 p.m. The Vikings just slipped by Sumner on Friday, 56-55.

Raiders capture SPSL gym title

The Thomas Jefferson girls' gymnastics team made history Wednesday night.

By sweeping district rivals Federal Way and Decatur, the Raiders won their first South Puget Sound League title in the school's history.

"From top to bottom we had the most consistent performance we've had all year," said Raider gymnastics coach Debbie Hunter, whose team finished SPSL competition this year with a 7-1 record.

Hunter's team scored 149.1 points to defeat Decatur (141.1) and Federal Way (128.8) in the three-way meet at Decatur High School. The Gators finished the SPSL season at 6-2.

"We're kind of right where we hoped to be," said Decatur coach Melanie Madden. "Our goal was to be in the top two teams. Right now that's where we're sitting. That's still our goal for next week."

Rogers placed third in final SPSL standings at 5-3, Federal Way was fourth at 2-6 and Puyallup took fifth with an 0-8 record.

"I feel we had a really good meet," said Federal Way coach Bev McIrvine. "Our numbers are down this year, we can't fill all the places. We're missing a few scores. But actually we have some kids that are just starting out and doing a really good job."

SPSL GYMNASTS are now slated to meet at Federal Way Friday for sub-districts. The top two teams from that meet will advance to the West Central District meet Feb. 11 at Auburn High School along with the top 10 individuals per event and the top

five all-arounds.

Hunter said her team won the meet against Decatur and Federal Way with its solid showing in the floor exercise. The Raiders won all four events, but they did exceptionally well in the floor exercise, edging Decatur by four points.

Before the meet began, Hunter asked Madden if she would switch the order of events so that the floor exercise would be first like it will be at the sub-districts meet. Madden obliged.

"It's good for us to come out and get psyched up and throw some solid floor routines first thing out," said Hunter. "They really did a good job on their floor routines. We just have always done floors last."

Madden noted that she was disappointed in her team's floor exercise scores, but not her team's performances.

"It's such a subjective thing," she said of judging. "They just weren't the same scores we were getting."

KIMMIE MARTON was one Raider gymnast that Hunter was particularly proud of as she came on strong after returning from a knee injury.

"She just really did a good job for us all-around," said Hunter. "It's neat because I've got four sophomores and they've been pretty solid all year long."

Hunter was delighted with hers and the school's first SPSL title.

"We want the banner for the wall, that's the first thing they said afterward," Hunter laughed. While the Raiders may get to hang a championship banner in

This one belonged to the Decatur girls' basketball team.

The Gators celebrated a key, 49-35, win over South Puget Sound League North Division and crosstown rival Federal Way Thursday, avenging a 59-54 loss to the Eagles in the opening game of the season.

"The dog-gone kids kept rising to the occasion," said Decatur head coach Gary Baker, whose team outscored seventh-ranked Federal Way, 16-2, in the last 2:24 of the game to break a 33-33 tie. "We kept going to the hoop. I know the kids are just sky high."

"I thought both teams came in uptight the first half," said Eagle head coach Chuck Czubin. "I've felt all along Decatur was the best team around."

The Gators pulled into a tie for second place in the North Division standings with the Eagles at 9-2 in league play, one game behind Puyallup (10-1) with four to go. Federal Way is 14-2 overall and Decatur 9-6.

The Eagles host Sumner tomorrow and Puyallup Thursday for 7:30 p.m. games, before playing Rogers and Thomas Jefferson next week. The Gators are at Rogers tomorrow and at home against TJ Thursday, with trips to Puyallup and Sumner next week.

Decatur, Puyallup and Federal Way have all but clinched the top three playoff berths out of the division (Rogers is fourth at 5-6), and any ties among them will have to be broken by a playoff prior to the SPSL tournament.

KATHY LAKY scored a game-high 20 points for the Gators in Thursday's win at home, and 6-0 senior center Shelley Richter chipped in 17.

But Richter had to do all of her scoring in quick spurts because of foul trouble, and her absence left the job to 5-11 junior Shannon Barrett. Barrett more than filled the bill defensively, drawing praise from both coaches.

"I thought it looked good when Richter was in foul trouble, but Barrett came in and the others came in and did a good job," said Czubin.

"Every one that played was competitive," said Baker. "But Shannon Barrett had especially good defensive moments when Shelley had to sit out so much."

Defense was the key to Decatur's win, as it held normally-potent Federal Way to just 35 points and kept star shooting guard Jenny Mahlstedt at seven.

"To hold Federal Way to 35 points, that's something because they're a good team," said Baker. "She (Mahlstedt) usual-

ly scores in the 16-17 point range. I think it was just a consciousness of where she was on the court. We didn't let her get alone."

THE GAME looked like it would go down to the wire with just over three minutes to play, as the Eagles' Kelly Czubin scored from underneath to tie the game at 33-33.

But a Federal Way player was called for stepping on the end line soon thereafter, and Laky responded at the other end with a driving layup with 2:24 to go and drew a foul.

Laky missed her free throw but took the rebound, leading to a Richter basket and four underneath 19 seconds later.

Richter made her free throw, and the Gators were up, 38-33.

"The critical point was in the fourth quarter when they got two driving baskets that they (the officials) called the continuation fouls on," said Czubin. "I didn't agree. This is not the NBA."

After an Eagle miss Laky sank a free throw soon thereafter, and later added a put-back and free throw for a three-point play. Laky and Richter each scored once more to complete a 13-point Decatur string that broke the game open.

Laky added 17 rebounds to her 20 points for the game, as the Gators beat the Eagles on the boards, 44-26.

Cyndi Shahan led Federal Way with nine points and 10 rebounds. Mahlstedt scored her seven and had four steals and Czubin hit six, Janelle Oakeley five and Shannon Ohlin and Jennifer Evans four each.

Houston scored four for Decatur to back up Laky and Richter, and Barrett scored three along with Jana Medges, who had five steals. Tanya Fischer hit two with 10 rebounds.

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Raider wrestlers pin Eagles in SPSL finale, 31-21

Federal Way coach Phil Burnett, whose team wrapped up dual league action at 3-7, was impressed with his young

squad's effort.

"Good match," he said. "We wrestled them heads up. We put 12 on the mat and we won six."

FEDERAL WAY gave up six points at 101 on a forfeit as Jason Carr was unable to compete due to an injury.

"I'm disappointed that we didn't beat them, but if you would have had a Jason Carr in there, it might have been a different outcome."

"We're not here to make excuses, though. We're here to get experience."

Trevor Hollis got the win at 101 due to the Eagle forfeit to give TJ an early 6-0 lead.

Federal Way's Doug Lay cut Jefferson's lead in half at 108 with a 6-1 victory over the Raiders' Jim Anderson.

Ken Blevens followed with a hard-fought, 2-1 win over TJ's Tom Pierson at 115 to knot the score at 6-6.

JEFFERSON took a momentary lead when Mike Middlebrooks stopped Brian Sterbens, 5-2, in the 122 pound weight class to bring the count to 9-6.

The Eagles' Ricky Park, wrestling for only the second time this season due to an injury, pulled out a 3-0 victory over TJ's Ken Mickleberry to tie the score again at 9-9.

TJ's Ruck Beigh gave the Raiders the advantage with a 4-0 win over the Eagles' Yao Huang to make it 12-9.

The last tie of the match came after the battle at 141 between Federal Way's Ron Thomas and

returned the favor for the Eagles at 178 with a pin in 1:34 over TJ's Rod Sides.

Steve Cook of Federal Way edged TJ's Loren Miller at 190, 2-1, to bring the score to 25-21 heading into the heavyweight match between Hanson and Peters.

Peters took an early 1-0 lead after Hanson was penalized one point. But Hanson, who had a clear weight advantage, scored two points on a takedown and then added three more on a near fall before putting his opponent's shoulders to the mat to seal the final outcome.

Both Botnen and Burnett liked what they saw in Thursday's match.

"The Federal Way (School) District is coming up well in wrestling," said Botnen, whose team beat Clover Park, 40-19, Wednesday. "They're really im-

proved."

FEDERAL WAY dominated the junior varsity matches Thursday prior to varsity competition, as the Eagles won all nine events.

Yesterday, Federal Way hosted the South Puget Sound League Junior Varsity Qualifying Tournament. Friday and Saturday, Rogers will be the site of sub-regional action, as the qualifiers will advance to regional action the following week also at Rogers. The top five from regionals will then move on to state.
