
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



The Florida Annual Conference

Tuesday June 6, 1972

The hymn, "O For a Thousand Tongues To Sing" was sung as the ministerial candidates processed. Bishop Henley read from the Scriptures I Cor. 13: Whitney Dough led the Conference in singing "And Are We Yet Alive?" after which Bishop Henley led in prayer.

Organization: Bishop Henley declared the 130th session of the Conference to be in order and called on H. Mauriece Felton, Conference Secretary, for the opening organization.

Youth Members: Bishop Henley recognized the youth members of the Annual Conference.

Memorial Roll Call: H. Mauriece Felton, Secretary, read the roll of the deceased of the past year as the Conference stood in silent tribute and memoriam.

Holy Communion: After the singing of the Hymn "Never Further Than Thy Cross" the Conference observed the Lord's Supper, with Bishop Henley as celebrant. Following Communion, the hymn "Blessed Assurance" was sung, and a brief recess followed.

Orientation of Lay Members: Lay Members of the Florida Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church convened in the Annie Pfieffer Chapel on the campus of Florida Southern College, Lakeland, Florida on June 6, 1972, at 11:45 A.M. with William A. Meadows, presiding for a period of orientation. After the opening prayer led by Dr. William Hughlett, former Missionary to Africa and Church Lay Leader of the Cocoa Church, Dr. Richard W. Pierce of Florida Southern College welcomed the delegates. Mr. Meadows then presented General Conference Delegates and Alternates, Jurisdictional Conference Delegates, Members of the Executive Board of the Laity and all District Lay Leaders and Youth Delegates. Mr. Leroy Northrup, Conference Treasurer, was introduced and called the delegates' attention to the budgetary matters for 1973 and financial reports of the churches for 1972. Mr. Meadows introduced Donald F. Kokomoor from the Board of Publication who explained the proposal for the New Florida Methodist and urged that the Lay Delegates support it when it is presented on the Conference Floor. of Church School Publications, led in the Bible Study.

Presentation: After singing "Holy, Holy, Holy," Bishop Henley presented orchids to Mrs. Henry M. Bullock and Mrs. Nina Nailing, his secretary.

Journal: Robert Gisler reported that the committee had examined the minutes, found them to be correct and commended the secretarial staff for their excellent work.

Greetings: H. Mauriece Felton, Conference Secretary moved that greetings be sent to the other Annual Conferences meeting this week. The Conference voted approval.

Program Input: Dr. R. C. Holmes presented and explained the proposals to amend the Charter of the Florida Methodist Foundation to the Conference for future consideration.

Resolutions: H. Mauriece Felton moved that all resolutions be delivered to the Committee on Reference. It was seconded and carried by the Conference.

Episcopal Address: The Episcopal Address was delivered by Bishop James W. Henley.

Statistician's Report: H. M. DeWese, Conference Statistician, presented the 12 months (Jan. 1-Dec. 31, 1971) statistical report of the Conference, which was distributed. (See Reports).

Presiding: Bishop Henley invited Lewis Head to preside over the Conference.

Publishing House: Lewis Head presented William Gosey of The Methodist Publishing House, who spoke briefly emphasizing that the Florida Conference is the largest purchaser of books through the Publishing House, before presenting a check to Bishop Henley for \$10,504.34 for retired ministers, and widows.

Introduction: Bishop Henley returned to the chair and introduced Dr. E. Purnell Bailey, Executive Secretary of the Commission on Chaplains who addressed the Conference briefly and presented all chaplains who were present to the conference.

Program: Ralph Huston, Chairman of the Conference Program Committee, gave guidance concerning the morning program. Eugene West spoke in favor of careful attention being given to Standing Rule III, 8, regarding financial askings of Boards and Agencies. (See Standing Rules).

Adopting of 1973 Program: Robert Blackburn, Vice Chairman of the Conference Program Council, presented Melton Ware, Conference Program Director, who introduced members of the Conference Staff. Robert Blackburn for the Program Council presented the recommendations for the following Age Level Groups; Adult Department, Children's Department, Family Life Department, and Youth Ministries. They were adopted. (See Reports).

Robert Blackburn presented the recommendations for the following Work Areas; Christian Social Concerns, Ecumenical Affairs, Education, Evangelism, Missions, Stewardship, Worship. After the Chairmen of the Work Areas answered questions pertaining to the reports, they were adopted.

Don Mackay nominated Dean Martin, Secretary of the Board of Evangelism. He was elected.

Board of Health and Welfare Ministries: Robert Blackburn presented the following resolution to which Harold Buell, Superintendent of the Miami District and Thornton Lewis, Administrator of the Biscayne Methodist Home spoke:

RESOLUTION FOR THE EXPANSION OF BISCAYNE METHODIST HOME INC.

(Approved by the Miami District, May 8, 1972)

WHEREAS, it is clearly a mission of the Church to minister to the elderly at all stages of the aging process... and

Whereas, South Florida most probably, according to studies made, will have the greatest concentration of persons over 65 anywhere in the United States... and

Whereas, therefore, there is an ever increasing need to be in mission: residentially from vigorous 65 year old-stage of aging to bedridden 110 year old stage; and non-residentially to the elderly community in various needed ways... and

Whereas, in the present Biscayne Methodist Home, licensed as an Institutional Home for the Aged, the Dept. of Health & Rehabilitative Services, Division of Health, of the State of Florida, has declared the present facility no longer adequate, safety-wise, in its 1926 construction materials. ... and

Whereas, the narow range of services now provided is too limited to provide for infirmary care, either temporary or custodial care, due to the type of construction of the present facility according to the Division of Health Services of the State of Florida... and

Whereas, the net assets of Biscayne Methodist Home, Inc., as a going concern are estimated to represent more than the monies the District Churches have contributed and thus these net assets act as a sufficient reserve to make replacement and expansion possible... and

Whereas, in any new construction, it is desirable to relieve the Churches of the Miami District, Florida Annual Conference, of both residual mortgage liability, and apportionments from each of the District Churches for the support of the Home's operating expenses... and

Whereas, preliminary approval for these expansion plans herein after stated have already been secured from the Staff of the General Board of Health & Welfare Ministries, and by the Florida Annual Conference Board of Health & Welfare Ministries... and

Whereas, throughout Methodism in the United States, and unlike any of the other three Homes built in Florida so far, the herein after financial method or its predecessor, of the replacing of existing, outmoded physical plants, and/or their expansion, and the building of new homes have been successfully used including all the homes built by the Methodist Church in Georgia, a model of success, as well as financially successful homes in Maine, Mississippi, Texas, Minnesota and many in other states of large capacity now in the planning or construction stage....

Now Therefore Be It Resolved, that, as the Miami District Conference has given approval, the Florida Annual Conference 1972 give the Corporation known as Biscayne Methodist Home, Inc., approval to proceed with the planning, constructing and building of the new plant under the following guidelines:

- 1. 100% financing of the new facility thru 236 Federal Housing Administration Act and/or similar acts at approximately 1% interest over a long-term span (40-50 years), with *no* request for money from the churches or through any church campaign.
- 2. There shall be no *legal* residual mortgage liability upon the churches of the Miami District or the Florida Annual Conference through the present corporate body or any subsequent corporate body should another one be required.
- 3. The new facility when fully operational shall be self-sustaining which according to the Federal Housing & Development Administration must be planned for, according to law. The new facility shall not require any support by the churches except as voluntarily might be rendered.
- 4. There shall be no additional *moral* residual obligation upon the churches for financial support because no life-care contracts between the facility and the residents shall be executed as no founders fees in the new facility shall be contracted for, so as not to even imply life-care obligations.
- 5. The mission of the church shall be fulfilled as far as feasible to both residents and non-residents alike in the new multi-purpose community, and as defined now or in the future by the Staff of the General Board of Health & Welfare Ministries of the United Methodist Church and the Florida Annual Conference and/or other proper United Methodist Boards.

Motion: Charles Hamilton moved an amendment that the Conference approve the resolution with responsibility. After considerable discussion, the amendment was defeated.

Order of The Day: The order of the day having arrived, the Conference voted to suspend the order of the day to continue consideration of the resolution. After further discussion, the resolution was adopted as read. **Adjournment:** Bishop Henley adjourned the Conference at 12:40 P.M.

Aujournment: Bishop Heney aujourned the Conference at 12.40 1 M.

AFTERNOON SESSION

Wednesday June 7, 1972

Opening: Bishop Henley called the Conference to order. After singing "Come Thou Fount," he led the Conference in prayer.

Order of the Day: Bishop Henley introduced Dr. William Belk, Executive Secretary of the Florida Council of Churches, who addressed the Conference.

Program Council: Dr. Robert M. Blackburn, Vice-chairman of the Conference Council, presented the following programs which were adopted: Board of Health and Welfare Ministries, Committee on Enlistment, Committee on Public Relations and Methodist Information, Conference School of Christian Mission, Commission on Archives and History, Committee on Lay Worker and the budget of The Program Council. The following presented reports: Robert Temple on Ecumenical Affairs, Dan Gill on Family Life and Doug Bolin on Youth.

Nomination: John Hires and Paul Juvenal were nominated as Conference representatives to SEMAR.

Coordinating Committee: Dr. Blackburn introduced Don Mackey, Chairman of the Coordinating Committee who presented the workbook "Planning for Ministries" which was adopted by the Conference. The film strip "Key 73" was then presented.

Announcement: W. L. Joyner announced the showing of a film "A New Wind Blowing" following the evening session in the Auditorium.

Insurance Trust Fund: Dr. R. C. Holmes, chairman of the Property Insurance Committee of the Florida Methodist Foundation introduced Hon. Quillian Yancey who addressed the Conference, after which he made the following recommendation: Bishop Henley, I strongly recommend that the Conference create a committee to study the feasibility and practicability of creating a Florida United Methodist Insurance Trust Fund for the purpose of providing a self Insurance Trust Fund as an effective and efficient means of protecting the investment in real estate and personal property represented by the buildings, and contents, of the Florida United Methodist Churches and to provide for the safety and well being of the membership and other occupants of the Methodist properties in this state; that the committee be authorized to borrow and expend as necessary, a sum of not more than \$6,000 from the Florida Methodist Foundation for the purpose of financing this study; and that the committee make its recommendation to the Bishop and Cabinet as soon as possible; and further that the Cabinet be authorized thereafter to take such action as the cabinet shall deem proper and advisable in this matter.

Motion: Motion was made and seconded to waive the "24 hour" rule in order to consider the matter immediately. The motion was defeated.

Sunday School Attendance: Ray Harrison, Chairman of the Sunday School Attendance Committee, assisted by others, made a dramatic presentation on the need for better Sunday School Attendance. Bishop Henley presented certificates to the churches in each district which had the best percentage increases in Sunday School Attendance during the past year.

Board of Pensions: Waldo Farabee, Chairman of the Board, presented the report. After making the necessary corrections, the Conference voted approval. (See Reports).

Insurance: Rupert Caviness reported for the Committee on Insurance. Discussion and questions were entertained concerning health insurance portion. David Brazelton moved and it was seconded, to amend the report "To read 100% of the premium of the employees." The amedment was defeated. The health insurance portion was then adopted. The life insurance portion was discussed and adopted. (See Reports).

Pension Study Committee: Eldon Simmons, chairman of the Pension Study Committee presented a resolution which the Conference adopted. (See Reports).

Minimum Salary: Gene Zimmerman, chairman of the Commission on Minimum Salary presented the report of the Commission. Bob Standifer moved an Amendment to paragraph 2 which was seconded. After discussion the Commission accepted the amendment.

Extension of Time: The time of adjournment having arrived, Walter Kalaf moved, and after a second was made the Conference voted to extend the time until 5:30.

Ruling from the Chair: R. C. Boggs asked for a ruling from the chair as to whether the amendment made by Bob Standifer did not violate the General Conference ruling that a Conference could not make a rule limiting expense payments short of the full amount. Bishop Henley asked that the ruling be delayed until morning to allow for study of the matter.

Motion: Charles Hamilton moved deferment of the matter until tomorrow. It was seconded and passed by the Conference.

Adjournment: Bishop Henley adjourned the Conference.

Wednesday Evening—June 7, 1972

Opening: The Conference convened at 7:45 P.M. with Lewis Head Presiding. After the singing of "O For A Thousand Tongues To Sing," Roosevelt Dell led in prayer.

Conference Worship Service: Dr. Head thanked the committee which arranged the worship service. Dr. Head then presented L. E. Watkins who introduced Jack Warren, a Florida Southern College Student. Mr. Warren sang, "Lord God of Abraham" and "The Lord's Prayer," accompanied at the piano by Miss Helen Benner, Artist in Residence at Florida Southern College. Following the singing of "Joy To The World," Lewis Head presented Dr. Ira Galloway who delivered the sermon.

Adjournment: After expressing the appreciation of the Conference to Dr. Galloway for his message, and calling attention to the necessary announcements, Lewis Head asked L. E. Watkins to pronounce the benediction. The Conference adjourned at 9:00 P.M.

THIRD DAY

Morning Session—Thursday, June 8, 1972

Opening: The Conference convened at 8:45 A.M. with Lewis Head, Presiding. After the singing of "Lord Speak To Me That I May Speak," and Opening Prayer, Dr. Henry Bullock presented the second in a series of Bible Studies.

Journal: Following the singing of "Break Thou The Bread of Life," Bishop Henley called for the report on the Journal. Thomas Sofge reported that the Committee had examined the Journal and found it to be correct.

Motion: Mauriece Felton made the necessary announcements and moved that registration be closed. The motion carried.

Recognition: Durward McDonell escorted Mrs. Charles T. Thrift to the platform and Bishop Henley presented her an orchid.

Bishop Henley then called to the chancel the men who are celebrating their 25th Anniversary in the Florida Conference and presented them each a certificate.

Minimum Salary: Gene Zimmerman moved a substitution for Paragraph 2 of the Commission on Minimum Salary Report as follows:

AMENDMENT TO THE

COMMISSION ON MINIMUM SALARY REPORT

Paragraph number 2 to read as follows:

Because the payment of an adequate salary is the first responsibility of a local church to its minister, we require a church receiving minimum salary funds to combine its present salary and travel allowance to meet the necessary requirements of the Commission on Minimum Salary. Furthermore, we recommend that after a church has met the requirements of the Commission on Minimum Salary it consult the pastor about his actual travel expense in that parish and fix an adequate amount to cover the cost of the use and maintenance of an automobile in his work. This is in accordance with the recommendation of the Manual for the Pastor-Parish Relation Committee, pages 10 and 11.

The Report was approved

Minimum Salary Foundation: Walter Edwards requested that the Minimum Salary Commission continue the resolution for Minimum Salary Foundation through 1973. (See 1971 Journal, pp. 119 f.).

Quadrennial Emphasis Committee: Ed Dinkins made the report of the on the Fund for Reconciliation and the projects in which they are being used within the Districts of the Conference. He made further recommendations regarding reconciliation. The Report was adopted. (See Reports). Bishop Henley presented the checks for reconciliation projects to the appropriate persons in each District. Kenneth Crossman spoke briefly, expressing appreciation to the Conference for making possible the redemptive work of the Ft. Lauderdale Urban Ministries.

Resolution For Tax Study: Ralph Huston, after making several announcements presented a resolution, for consideration tomorrow, regarding the appointment of a Tax Study Committee to make a Conference Wide Tax Study.

Conference Counseling Center: Kenneth Rogers, Chairman, made two additions to the Conference Counseling Center Report. John Simon, Secretary of the Committee presented an addendum to the Report in which he announced the employment of James Melvin Britt as Conference Counselor. The report requests that the \$5,000 authorized by the 1971 Conference Session be released now.

Amendment: Sam Lewis moved that the report of the Committee be amended to read: "That Ministers and their Families not be charged for these services though contributions would be accepted." The Amendment was defeated.

Amendment: Rogers Fair moved that a Representative from Bethune Cookman College be added to the Conference Counseling Committee. The Amendment was adopted.

Amendment: Edith Goodwin proposed an amendment to the 5th paragraph adding "all full time church related professional staff persons," which was accepted by the Committee. The Report was adopted as amended. (See Reports).

Structure of Program Council Committee: W. S. Bozeman, Chairman of the Committee, brought the Committee report and Resolution.

Amendment: Gary Thomas, Youth Delegate from the Melbourne District made the following Amendment which was adopted: That the Committee on Structure of the Program Council increase its membership to a total of "ten (10) members, one of whom shall be a youth." The Amendment was adopted. (See Reports).

Gainesville District Recognition: Ministers and Laymen of the Gainesville District presented gifts to the Roughton Family as they leave the Gainesville District.

Camp Development Committee: Robert Boggs, Chairman of the Committee made a slide presentation narrated by Warren Willis, showing the present camp facilities at Leesburg and the proposed new Conference Retreat Center there. Robert Boggs then presented Mrs. Allen Watson, Dr. Richard V. Moore, and Dr. Robert Holmes, each of whom spoke briefly in favor of the Committee's Report which adopts preliminary working plans and authorizes the Committee's securing of working drawings and specifications and authorizes trustees borrowing funds from the Conference Foundation for the complete project. After lengthy discussion, Item 1 of the Report was adopted. After lengthy discussion on Item 2 of the Report, Paul Hartsfield called for the Previous Question, which carried. Item 2 of the Report was Rejected.

Extension of Time: The Conference approved the extension of time to hear several guests who were having to leave the Conference before the afternoon session.

Greetings: Greetings were brought by Dr. James Cleland of Duke Divinity School and Dr. Major Jones of Gammon Theological Seminary.

Adjournment: Bishop Henley adjourned the Conference at 12:40 P.M.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON

June 8, 1972

Opening: Bishop Henley called the Conference to order with the singing of "Come Thou Fount" and "Lord Jesus I Love Thee."

Presentation: Bishop Henley presented Certificates to churches observing significant anniversaries.

Wesleyan College: Bishop Henley introduced Dr. Earl Strickland, President of Wesleyan College, who addressed the Conference.

Camp Development Committee: R. C. Boggs, Chairman, continued the report of the committee in the consideration of item 3 of the report.

Motion: Clare Hall moved "the suspension of that portion of Standing Rules VIII no. 2 referring to the time that the purpose and plan of a financial appeal be presented to the Commission on World Service and the cabinet, to allow this matter to be considered by these bodies at this session if possible." It was seconded.

Motion: Pat McBride moved the waiver of Standing Rules to allow immediate consideration of the matter before the Conference. It was seconded and adopted by the conference.

Motion: Walter Rutland made a substitute motion for Paragraph No. 3 as follows: "I move that the Special Gifts committee be named and be authorized to proceed with its work, and that further consideration of this matter be delayed until the Fall Meeting of this Annual Conference."

Substitute Motion: Gene Zimmerman moved for reconsideration of Item 2.

Point of Order: A motion for reconsideration cannot be offered while there was a motion on the floor. Bishop Henley ruled the substitute motion for reconsideration out of order.

Question: The vote was called for on the substitute motion before the house and was adopted by the Conference. (See Reports).

Partners In Education: Dr. Charles Thrift, President of Florida Southern College, presented the report of the Commission On Higher Education and Campus Ministry. Dr. Moore, President of Bethune-Cookman College, presented the report of Bethune Cookman College. Dr. Thrift introduced Mr. Earl Powers, Chairman of the Steering Committee on Partners In Education, who spoke to the report introducing Fletcher Rush, Chairman of the campaign drive. Mr. Rush stated that \$1,643,000 in cash and pledges had been received to date in the campaign.

Motion: Charles Hamilton moved to extend the Partners In Education Campaign through June 1973. It was seconded and adopted by the Conference, after a glowing speech by George Foster in support of the Campaign. (See Reports).

Board of Publication: Clarence Whitley, Chairman of the Board, presented the report as corrected. Mr. Spurgeon Dunham III was introduced and addressed the Conference.

Substitute Motion: Dr. John Rooks proposed a substitute motion as follows: "I move that this session of Florida Annual Conference authorize the publishing of a weekly newspaper as previously approved according to the following steps: First, authorization be given for entering into an agreement with *Texas Methodist* Foundation Inc. for a Florida edition as proposed by the Board of Publication set forth in this report, pages 57, for a period of a full year's trial beginning June 1, 1972; Second, that the conference Board of Publication be asked to bring an evaluation of the tentative publishing venture to 1973 session of our Annual Conference; Third, that the Conference Board of Publication be asked to bring recommendations for a continuing publication program for our conference after full consultation with Conference Program Council Committee of Publishing Interest and the General Board of Publication. Fourth, that the said Conference Publication to 1973 session of Annual Conference which will comply with the Official Publication Program of the United Methodist Church as recommended by the General Council of Ministries." It was seconded by David Denslow. After discussion the motion was defeated.

Question: The question was called on the original report which was adopted by the Conference. (See Reports).

Personal Privilege: Paul Hartsfield requested that no announcements be shown on the wall during the worship or Bible Study periods.

West Palm Beach District Recognition: Ministers and Laymen of the West Palm Beach District presented gifts to Dr. and Mrs. Lewis Head as they leave the District.

Adjournment: After necessary announcements from the Secretary, Bishop Henley adjourned the Conference at 4:55 P.M.

THURSDAY EVENING

June 8, 1972

Conference Worship Service: The Conference Worship Service under the direction of Dewitt Farabee began in the singing of the hymn "Come, Christians Join To Sing." Al Vought then led in prayer and the Conference then joined in singing "O Young And Fearless Prophet." Henry Galloway introduced soloist Curtis Royam who sang "Lord, Make Me An Instrument Of Thy Peace." The evening offering was received, after which J. P. Floyd read the Scripture lesson. Mr. Royam then thrilled the Conference by singing two spirituals. DeWitt Farabee introduced Dr. Virgil Wesley Sexton who preached the evening message. The worship service was closed by singing "God of Grace And God Of Glory."

Opening: Bishop Henley called the Conference to order for a necessary business session.

Board of Ministry: W. S. Bozeman, Chairman, presented the report No. 1 of the Board lifting up the major recommendations.

Amendment: Bill Higgins amended section 1 item c to include Gammon Theological Seminary which was accepted by the Board. The report as amended was then adopted by the Conference. (See Reports).

Preachers Relief Board: Eldon Simmons, Chairman, presented the report of the Board which was adopted by the Conference. (See Reports).

Motion: George Foster, Chairman of the General Conference Delegation, moved that due to the withdrawal of the duly elected former EUB clerical member, the former EUB receiving the highest number of votes after Hector Navas be declared elected as reserve delegate. It was seconded and passed by the Conference. Dr. Foster then brought a report of the General Conference.

Cabinet Nominations: Robert Boggs for the Cabinet, read nominations for various Boards and Agencies. All nominations with corrections and additions were approved. (See Conference Officers.) The following nominations for general church agencies were approved:

General Council on Ministries: Robert M. Blackburn, Mrs. Bruce Gray, Dr. Richard Moore.

General Board of Church and Society: Lloyd Knox, Mrs. Bertha Bankston, Judge P. B. Revels, Ceil Winebrenner. General Board of Discipleship: Walter Rutland, Miss Edith Goodwin,

John A. Grant, Jr., Larry Jacobs. General Board of Global Ministries: Ralph Huston, Mrs. Donald Crist,

Jack Inman, Florence Sapp

General Board of Higher Education and Ministry: Walter Kalaf, Mrs. Olive Leonard, Judge Robert T. Mann.

Resolution: Robert Boggs introduced the following Resolution which was adopted:

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, nominations have been made to the 1972 session of the Florida Annual Conference and elections held for various representation or nomination to general agencies in line with present knowledge both of positions and individuals; and,

Whereas, further instructions from the Secretary of the General or Jurisdictional Conference may modify or change what has been done at this session of the Annual Conference, or persons here nominated may be unable to serve; therefore,

Be It Resolved: that the delegation to the Jurisdictional Conference from the Florida Annual Conference have full authority to act for the Annual Conference in making any adjustments or additional nominations that may be necessary.

The Cabinet, Robert C. Boggs, Secretary

Adjournment: Bishop Henley adjourned the Conference at 10:15 P.M.

FRIDAY MORNING

June 9, 1972

Conference Bible Study: The session began with the Conference singing "O Master Of The Waking World." W. L. Joyner, leader, called upon Walter Edwards to lead in prayer, and then introduced Dr. Henry M. Bullock who conducted the third session in the Bible Study.

Opening: The business session opened with the Conference singing "My Faith Looks Up To Thee" and "Draw Me Nearer."

Greetings: Bishop Henley read telegrams of greetings from the Ken-tucky and South Carolina Conferences of the United Methodist Church which are also in session.

Journal: Walter Edwards, reporting for the Committee on Journal, stated that the Committee had examined the minutes and found them to be correct.

Higher Education: Walter Kalaf, Chairman of the Committee on Higher Education, using a tri-screen technique, presented the work of the Committee through film strips.

Children's Home: Bascom Carlton, Superintendent, presented the work of the Home in an excellent film strip showing the various ministries of the Home. Durward McDonell, Chairman of the Board of Trustees, presented nominations for the Board and they were elected by the Conference. Then he presented the recommendations of the Home which were adopted by the Conference. (See Reports).

Presentation: Bishop Henley presented a plaque to Mrs. Ouida Fletcher, Lay member, honoring the Lay Pastor of the Year, Ray O'Ferrel.

Christian Social Concerns: Judge P. B. Revels, Chairman of the Board, made minor corrections to the printed report and then presented Resolution No. 1 to the Conference.

Substitution Motion: Hugh Westbrook, Lay Member, moved a substitute motion and it was seconded.

Substitute Motion: Luther Stokes moved a substitute for the substitute. Point of Order: George Foster asked if the substitute were not an amendment. Bishop Henley ruled that it was, and was, therefore, out of order.

Previous Question: After considerable debate, Pat McBride moved the Previous Question on the substitute only. It was seconded and approved.

Point of Order: Stewart Austin asked for clarification as to who was eligible to vote and Bishop Henley again explained the bar of the conference and those eligible to vote including youth members elected by districts.

Motion: Don Mackey called for vote by secret ballot.

Point of Order: P. B. Revels ask if the motion were not in fact, a speech. Bishop Henley ruled that it was and was, therefore out of order.

Question: After the maker of the Resolution and of the amendment had given closing statements, the vote was taken and the amendment defeated by the Conference.

Amendment: Luther Stokes, clerical, moved an amendment to Resolution No. 1 and it was seconded.

Substitute Motion: Rick Walker offered a substitute for the motion calling for the Conference to take no action relative to the war in Vietnam. Bishop Henley ruled the motion out of order.

Question: The question was called and the Conference rejected the amendment.

Order of The Day: Bishop Henley explained the time problems and conflicts with the Order of the Day. A break in the Resolutions Report of the Christian Social Concerns Board was approved in order that the Florida Methodist Foundation might hold its corporate meeting.

Florida Methodist Foundation, Inc.: Mrs. H. V. Weems, Second Vice President, called the meeting of the Foundation to order. Charles Hamilton moved that the reading of the minutes be omitted; motion seconded and passed.

Auditor's Report: Leroy Northrup brought the Auditor's Report showing investments in Trust Funds of the Foundation and Savings Accounts. (See Auditor's Report).

Amendment to Articles of Incorporation: Quillian Yancey brought the following Resolution amending the Articles of Incorporation of the Foundation:

RESOLUTION

Amending Article 11, Paragraphs A and B, Articles of Incorporation of THE FLORIDA METHODIST FOUNDATION, INC., (a corporation not for profit); to provide for disbursements of net income of designated funds and undesignated funds.

BE IT, AND IT IS HEREBY, RESOLVED, that Article 11, Paragraphs A and B, be, and they are hereby, amended to read as follows:

A. Designated Funds—The principal amount deposited by or received for the use, benefit or account of any Board, Committee, Commission, Quarterly Conference, Corporation, Trust or other body, which is a subsidiary organization to or agency of the Florida Annual Conference of The Methodist Church, and all income thereon shall be allocated and the net income disbursed quarterly, *semi-annually or annually as directed by the Board of Directors*, for the benefit of each such Board, Committee, Commission, Quarterly Conference, Corporation, Trust or other body in direct proportion to their interest in this corporation, subject only to the lawful directions of the Florida Annual Conference of The Methodist Church or the provisions of a will, trust or other instrument designating the recipient of such amount. The term designated funds shall apply to all amounts received pursuant to a contract between this corporation and the depositing organization and funds received pursuant to a will, trust or other instrument designating a particular organization or agency of the Florida Annual Conference of The Methodist Church as the beneficiary of such will, trust or other instrument. Invested principal and accumulated income may be withdrawn in the same manner as deposited, but at its fair market value on the date of the withdrawal. The Board of Directors shall have authority to require three (3) months' notice of intent to withdraw and may extend the payment of the withdrawal over a period of time, up to five (5) years. For the purpose of this provision all capital gains shall be considered principal.

B. Undesignated Funds—The principal amount deposited by or received by the corporation, from any source, and not designated to or for the benefit of any particular subsidiary organization or agency of the Florida Annual Conference of The Methodist Church shall be held by the corporation for the following uses and purposes:

1. One-half of the net income and realized capital gains derived therefrom shall be allocated and disbursed quarterly. *semi-annually or annually as directed by the Board of Directors*, among the several Boards, Committees, Commissions, Quarterly Conferences, Corporations, Trusts or other organizations of The Florida Annual Conference of The Methodist Church which are members of and have funds invested in this corporation in direct proportion to their respective investment in this corporation from time to time.

2. One-half of the net income and realized capital gains derived and all principal *shall* be subject to the direction of the Florida Annual Conference of The Methodist Church.

Adopted this 9th day of June, 1972, at Lakeland, Polk County, Florida.

Nomination of Directors: Robert Boggs presented the names of those to be elected as follows: Term expiring 1974: John A. Turner; Term expiring 1975: Roy A. Perry, Quillian S. Yancey, M. C. Cleveland, Ralph W. Sedgwick, Charles P. Hamilton. They were elected.

Presentation: Dr. Robert Holmes presented all directors of the Foundation who were present. Assisted by Mrs. Holmes, Dr. Holmes presented orchids to Mrs. H. V. Weems and Mrs. Francis Hanley.

Adjournment: There being no further business, Mrs. Weems adjourned the meeting of the Foundation.

Property Insurance Trust Fund: Richard Pearce presented the Resolution previously introduced (see page 135). Following discussion, the Resolution was adopted. The Committee was elected as follows:

Consecration of Lay Workers: Bishop Henley recognized M. C. Cleveland who read the names of the following Lay Workers to be consecrated: Elizabeth Ann Brown, Mary Margaret Houk, Eva McClamrock, Robert G. Carr, Carole Ann Rooks, Doris Manning, Robert Denniston, Mary Elizabeth Lowery. Bishop Henley led the Consecration Service.

Motion: Larry Webb moved that the Committee on Lay Workers request the Conference Program Committee place the Consecration Service for Lay Workers at a time near the ordination services to underscore its similar significance and that the Committee explore the possibility of Church Administrators being included in the Lay Work category and report a plan for inclusion to the 1973 Session of the Annual Conference.

Trustees of the Florida Conference: Hoyt Tatum brought the report of the Florida Conference Trustees which was approved. (See Reports).

Resolution Regarding Episcopal Residence: Hoyt Tatum brought the following Resolution which was approved:

RESOLUTION REGARDING EPISCOPAL RESIDENCE

Whereas, a new Bishop will be assigned to the Florida Area in July who will have the option either of continuing the present relationship with the Area and the College in supplying a residence or of securing his own residence; therefore,

Be It Resolved, that the Board of Trustees of the Florida Annual Conference and the Episcopal Residence Committee be authorized to communicate with the new Bishop and make arrangements for a residence; and. further.

Be It Resolved that the amount currently held in the Foundation for an Episcopal Residence be at the disposition of the Conference Trustees in providing or furnishing a residence and/or providing an office and cabinet room for the Bishop; and, further

Be It Resolved that the Conference Trustees be authorized to enter into any necessary notes or mortgages that may be involved in the above.

Resoluion Regarding The St. John's River Conference: Hoyt Tatum presented the following Resolution which was adopted:

RESOLUTION

RE: St. Johns River Conference

WHEREAS, St. Johns River Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church was incorporated under the laws of the State of Florida with the corporation name of "The St. Johns River Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church in the United States of America"; and

Whereas, the St. Johns River Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church is now an integral part of the Florida Conference of the United Methodist Church:

Therefore, Be It Resolved that the said St. Johns River Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church in the United States of America be merged and incorporated into the Board of Trustees of the Florida Conference of the United Methodist Church, and that all its assets of whatsoever kind or nature be conveyed, assigned and set over to the said Board of Trustees of the Florida Conference of the United Methodist Church.

Be It Further Resolved, that the proper officers and directors of the said St. Johns River Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church of the United States of America be authorized and directed to take such action as may be necessary to transfer all of its assets to the Board of Trustees of the Florida Conference of the United Methodist Church which shall hold and administer the same under its constitution and by-laws.

Resolution Regarding Restrictive Clause in Deed of Property Sold to Captiva Chapel-By-The-Sea: Hoyt Tatum introduced the following Resolution which was approved.

A RESOLUTION

RE: Restrictive Clause In Deed of Property Sold to Captiva Chapel-By-The-Sea

WHEREAS The Board of Trustees of the Florida Annual Conference of The Methodist Church in a deed dated January 13, 1954 did convey to CAPTIVA CHAPEL-BY-THE-SEA, a corporation, the post office address of which is Captiva, Lee County, Florida, the following described land, situate, lying and being in the County of Lee, State of Florida, to wit: *ITEM 1*: Beginning at a post on the West beach of Captiva, said post being at the West ond of the line dividing lands for every day.

being at the West end of the line dividing lands formerly owned by

H. D. Brainard and W. H. Binder in Section 35, Township 45 South, of range 21 East; thence run North 70 yards; thence east 70 yards, thence south 70 yards to the beach; thence Westerly along the beach to the point of the beginning; being the same lands conveyed by The Board of Public Instruction for the County of Lee, State of Florida, to T. Bryant and others, as Trustees of Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and their successors in office, by deed dated July 7th, 1921, and recorded in Deed Book 60 at page 541, Public Records of Lee County, Florida; and

ITEM 2: A parcel of ground to be used for a Cemetary for the burial of the dead, Located as follows: Being a part of Section 35, Township 45 South, of Range 21 East. Beginning at a cement post or corner on the beach; thence South 220 feet; thence East 200 feet; thence North 220 feet; thence West 200 feet to the point of beginning; containing 1 acre; being the same lands as conveyed by Hattie E. Gore to the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, or their duly elected Trustees and successors in office, by deed dated March 6th, 1936, and recorded in Deed Book 125 at page 267, Public Records of Lee County, Florida, and Whereas the deed to the above described property contained the following restrictive clause, to wit:

"The foregoing real estate is conveyed by the party of the first part to the party of the second part subject to the condition that should the Item 1 property ever be discontinued for use as an evangelical religious meeting place for more than two consecutive years, unless caused by war or similar catastrophe, the titles to the Item 1 and Item 2 property shall revert to the party of the first part or its successors or assigns." AND

Whereas Captiva Chapel-By-The-Sea has continuously carried out and met the above requirements from date of deed to this present time, and

Whereas the Trustees of Captiva Chapel-By-The-Sea through their President, Elmer L. Severinghaug, do come petitioning release of the above restrictive clause, and

Whereas the District Superintendent of the Sarasota District, Charles P. Hamilton, within the bounds of which district the property is situated, by letter dated February 18, 1972, concurs in the granting of this request, now

Therefore Be It Resolved, that the Florida Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church in session assembled this 9th day of June 1972, in Lakeland, Florida, does hereby authorize, empower and instruct the trustees of the said Florida Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church to cause to be prepared and executed such legal documents as shall be required to relieve the restrictive clause in the above mentioned deed.

Extension of Time: The Conference voted in favor of extending the time ten minutes to complete the agenda.

Resolution Regarding Conference Wide Property Inventory: The following Resolution presented by Ralph Huston was approved.

RESOLUTION

RESOLVED, that the Bishop appoint a Florida Annual Conference Legal Committee consisting of the Chairman of the Conference Board of Trustees, who shall convene the Committee, one Methodist attorney at law from each district, and one attorney for each of the several boards and institutions of the United Methodist Church to come together and discuss the problems of tax exemption of United Methodist Church properties; application for tax exemption; the possibility of a Conferencewide property inventory; and the possibility of uniformity of deeds, corporation forms; and such other and further legal problems as are district-wide or Conference-wide which might be solved through cooperative effort. They are directed to report back such recommendations to the Florida Annual Conference meeting in 1973. **Committee on Religion, Race, and Conference Union:** W. W. Roughton, Chairman reported that no problems referred to the Committee between Sessions of the Annual Conference have been serious enough to require a meeting of their Committee. He noted the many encouraging reports of improved Race Relations in every District. (See Reports).

Adjournment: Bishop Henley adjourned the Conference at 12:40 P.M.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON

June 9, 1972

Opening: Bishop Henley called the Conference to order in singing "Come Thou Fount" after which he led the Conference in prayer.

Privilege: Lewis Head called for a matter of privilege. He asked the Conference to send a telegram of greeting and assurance of prayers to Mrs. Byron W. Settle who had fallen in the cafeteria and broken her hip. Bishop Henley reported that Robert Bledsoe had also been taken ill and had returned home. Victor Hitchcock reported the death of Dr. Elbert Wilson. Gaylon Howe reported the illness of Mrs. Archie Hillery. The Conference voted to send appropriate messages to each.

Board of Social Concerns: Judge P. B. Revels, continuing from the morning session, presented Resolution No. 1 to the Conference.

Amendment: Ms. Lee Hatch made a motion for deletion which was seconded.

Previous Question: Vernon Ragsdale, clerical, moved the Previous Question on all that was before the house. It was seconded and adopted by the Conference, which then voted down the amendment. Resolution No. 1 was then adopted by the Conference.

Resolutions 2, 3, 4, and 5 were approved by the Conference.

Resolution No. 6: was presented by Judge Revels.

Amendment: Walter Kalaf moved to amend, which motion was seconded and then defeated by the Conference.

Amendment: George Bourn moved to delete words "On or in United Methodist Church property." It was seconded and then defeated by the Conference. Resolution No. 6 was then adopted by the Conference. (See Reports).

Board of Laity: Judge William A. Meadows, Jr., the Conference Lay Leader, presented the program of the Board. He introduced Ray Redstone who presented the nominations for District Lay Leaders who were unanimously elected. He also announced the officers of the Board of Laity. (See Conference Officers). Dr. Richard V. Moore was presented as the nominee of the Board and was unanimously acclaimed by the Conference as the Conference Lay Leader. Mr. Redstone then introduced Mr. Charles Babcock who presented Judge Meadows with a watch in appreciation for his years of service.

Women's Society of Christian Service: Mrs. Allen Watson, President presented the report of the Women's Society and Wesleyan Guild.

Advisory Committee for Church And Community Work: Mrs. Guy Thomas, chairwoman of the committee, presented the report.

World Service And Finance: Eugene West, Chairman, presented the reports which were adopted by the Conference. (See Reports). Gene West Nominated and the Conference elected, LeRoy Northrup as Conference Treasurer.

Housing For The Aged: Robert M. Blackburn, Chairman of the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries, presented the report of the Committee, which was adopted by the Conference. (See Reports).

Board of Health and Welfare Ministries: Robert M. Blackburn, Chairman presented an addendum to the report which was approved by the Conference. (See Reports).

Committee On Reference: Ed Norman from the Committee on Reference brought the following report of Resolutions: A Resolution to the Conference from Charles E. Busch, regarding Parsonage Standards and Pastor's Personal furnishings was referred to the Cabinet. A Resolution from the Council on Youth Ministries dealing with recycling paper used at Conference was referred to David Readick of the Committee on Entertainment. A Resolution from the Riverside Park United Methodist Church of Jacksonville regarding Pastor-Parish Relations Committee Recommendations and their relationship to the Bishop and Cabinet was referred to the Cabinet. A Resolution from the Community United Methodist Church of Bell Glade regarding a minister of another Conference, was declared not within the administrative prerogative of the Florida Annual Conference. A Resolution by Hugh Westbrook and Richard File regarding Busing in Public Schools was referred to the Board of Christian Social Concerns.

A Resolution from the Memorial United Methodist Church of Fernandina Beach dealing with questions of doctrine and the Vietnam War was referred to the Board of Christian Social Concerns for consideration.

Resolutions, from the Christ United Methodist Church of Neptune Beach, Florida, St. Paul's United Methodist Church of North Miami, Alva United Methodist Church of Alva, and First United Methodist Church of Eustis all dealing with the Vietnam War. These were referred to the Board of Christian Social Concerns for their information.

Motion: Robert Boggs moved that the Resolutions for abandoned Property be adopted without reading, each District Superintendent giving only the name of the property involved, with the full resolution appearing in the Conference Journal. The Motion carried. The Resolutions for Abandoned Property are as follows:

RESOLUTION I

WHEREAS since April, 1970, the entire membership of thirty-two persons of the Shiloh United Methodist Church, in Madison County, of the Tallahassee District, have been members of the Southern Methodist Church, and

Whereas there is no longer a United Methodist member, or charge conference to elect trustees and other officials of the Shiloh United Methodist Church, and

Whereas frequent and patient efforts have been made by the District Superintendent and other United Methodist ministers in the Madison area to work out a peaceful solution to their problem, and

Whereas the official representatives of the Shiloh Southern Methodist church refuse to meet with the District Superintendent, or any of his designated agents, and

Whereas the congregation of the Southern Methodist Church continues to use the facilities of the Shiloh United Methodist Church without request or consent.

Be It Therefore Resolved that the Florida Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church assembled in Lakeland, Florida, June 6-9, 1972, declare the Shiloh United Methodist Church abandoned;

Be It Further Resolved that this session of the Florida Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church, instruct and authorize the Trustees of the Florida Annual Conference to assume title and ownership of former Shiloh United Methodist Church property;

Be It Further Resolved that the Trustees of the Florida Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church, be instructed, authorized and empowered to transfer title and ownership of the former Shiloh United Methodist Church to the Tallahassee District Board of Missions and Church Extension of the United Methodist Church, Inc.

The legal description of the Shiloh United Methodist Church is as follows: Beginning at the N.W. corner of the West ½ of the S.E. quarter of Section 33, Township 3, Range 8 N.E., and run south four chains and seventy-five links, east four chains and seventy-five links, north four chains and seventy-five links and west four chains and seventy-five links to the starting point, containing two and one quarter acres, all being in Madison County, Florida. The trust clause is part of the deed, executed February 25, 1860, and recorded in Deed Book G, page 355, of the public records at the County Courthouse in Madison, Florida.

Appointments: Bishop Henley presented printed booklets of the 1972 appointments. He called upon R. C. Boggs, Secretary of the Cabinet to make the necessary corrections. (See Appointments).

Presentation: Under the direction of Lewis Head, with the assistance of other members of the Cabinet, a "This is Your Life, Bishop Henley" presentation was made featuring the accomplishments of Bishop Henley's twelve years of Episcopal oversight. Highlights were the presentation of voices from the past, the Bishop's family, the establishment of 99 new churches, and growth and development of every area of the life of the Church. Climax of the program was the presentation of a love gift from the laymen of Florida through their churches in the amount of \$17,000. Bishop and Mrs. Henley accepted the gift, expressed their thanks to all those who gave it, their deep appreciation and undying love for the great people of Florida. The Conference then sang "Bless Be The Tie That Binds." While the Bishop and Mrs. Henley made their way to the Eleanor Searle Drawing Room of Joseph-Reynolds Hall where a reception was to be held for them the Conference sang "God Be With You Till We Meet Again." Ralph Huston pronounced the benediction. The Conference was adjourned.

EPISCOPAL MESSAGE

BISHOP JAMES W. HENLEY

This is my last message to you as the presiding officer of this great Conference. You have been loyal and supportive beyond all measure. Your friendships have been cherished in all seasons. Your prayers have strengthened me in moments of trial, sorrow, and joy. To me, you have been a large family, loved and loving. When I came among you I had everything to learn and you were patient and long-suffering, fearful and prayerful. As the years have come and gone I have continued to learn. There have been mistakes; There have been triumphs. I can truthfully say there has never been a moment when I have harbored the slightest bitterness or resentment because of any experience or circumstance. The things that I have had to do have not always been performed as everyone would judge appropriate. But I have tried and you have been patient. I have labored and you have been prayerful. I genuinely feel that we are one family in Christ knit together in the bond of Christian fellowship.

At Christmas time I received a letter from Bishop Arthur J. Moore. I have the feeling that there is no man alive who has contributed so much to world Methodism and, perhaps, so much to the expansion of the Kingdom of Christ, as he in his own lifetime. In his Christmas letter dated December 25, 1971, he has this sentence: "There is an interesting biography in my library bearing the title 'Old Men Forget.' For me a better title would be 'Old Men Remember.' At least this one does. Gratitude is the mother of all virtues and it springs from an awareness of God's goodness to us. About the only offering I have to make to God is a thankful heart, so I join with the Psalmist in saying "Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all his benefits." Next to the mercy of God and the influence of my family, I place the friends with whom I have walked along the way."

Arthur Moore is a master of words. He not only feels deeply, he has a way of making his sentences sing and his words shout the feelings of his heart. Today I adopt the words of Arthur J. Moore which I have just quoted as I thank God for you and those whom you represent. Here is a poem I beg you to remember:

> It is my joy in life to find At every turning of the road The strong arm of some comrade kind To help me onward with my load. But since I have no gold to give And love alone must make amends, My only prayer is, while I live, God make me worthy of my friends.

So let the way wind up the hill or down, Though rough the road, the journey will be joy, Still seeking what I sought, when but a boy, New friendships, high adventure, and a crown. I shall grow old, but never will I lose life's zest, Because the road's last turn will be the best.

THE CHRISTIAN LIFE

The life of the follower of Jesus should be one of exhilaration, confidence, and commitment. There may sometimes be discouragements, but never defeat. There may be perplexities, but no loss of confidence or lack of exhilaration in following the Master. It is a glorious thing to be a Christian. It is a joyous thing to be a part of that fellowship which has inherited the revelation of God's infinite love and redeeming grace. God pity us that we should ever be downhearted. God forgive us that we should ever become lackluster or despondent. Ours, through Jesus Christ, is the victory that overcometh the world.

Our salvation does not set us apart from the world. Rather, it immerses us in the world. We are saved to serve. We are redeemed that we may reconcile. We have been bought with a price and the Cross is the symbol of that price. We are not only a part of the army of the hosts of the redeemed, we are bond servants of the redeemer. Whenever the church is aflame with zeal for God who was in Christ redeeming the world to himself the people of the world sit up and listen, for they are hungry for release from their fears, their bitterness, their despair. Mankind is weary and heavy laden.

Most of our laymen do not manifest in their lives that they have been liberated from fear, bitterness, hatred, or even bondage to their own flesh. Why should the world sit up and take notice of what they say when their lives belie their words? And all too many of us ministers trudge through our labors with very little evidence that we have experienced an inner transport of joy through discovering and being discovered by God's son, and the redeemer. What have we discovered that will transport us with joyous hope and assurance? What message have we to declare with exceeding joy?

My dear friends, to be a follower of the Lord Jesus Christ should humble us at the consideration of our own poverty of soul and powerlessness and to do anything in our own strength that would redound worthily to the glory of God.

We are called to be messengers in an era of despair. We are called to be a revelation of the purity of God revealed in the life of his Son. The love of God as revealed in the cross; the mercy, the purity, the judgment of God are ours to enshrine, to declare to magnify.

THE NEW MORALITY

A great deal is being written in magazines, books, the daily press, television about the new morality. All the excitement would seem to indicate that some new way of life had been discovered which promises to be eminently superior to any manner of living that mankind ever conceived heretofore. A great deal of the discussion revolves around the subject of sex. The implications are that the ten Commandments are no longer relevant since discovery of The Pill. Chastity is treated as a silly virtue, if indeed it is a virtue, in an age of enlightenment. And marital ties are conceived to be entirely too restrictive. Some encourage couples to live together on a trial basis, at least until the advent of children. Others would have us believe that the marriage vows are superfluous even then. The New Morality would have us believe that every person has a right to do with his own body what he chooses and it is no one else's affair to what extent or what excess one may indulge oneself. But the fact does remain that what is being heralded as the New Morality and which is distressingly being embraced even by some in the Departments of Religion Instruction, is nothing more than the old immorality. It seems so exciting, so free, so uninhibited. The fact is that we are observing in contemporary American life the breakdown of the family as a Christian institution. We are undergoing the disintegration of our moral and ethical foundations. Many are deluded by the phrases of those who would imply that something new has been discovered as a way of life which is richer and nobler than any yet known excites the imagination of those who want no inhibitions. As a matter of fact the New Morality is in many

cases the old immorality. If our society persists in it it will damn us as surely as it degraded, impoverished and ultimately destroyed ancient Rome. Believe me, there is no new sin under the heavens, and there is no new virtue. Neither is there any formula made by which that which was evil may be transformed into that which is good. If a man's body does belong to him so that it is no one else's business what he does with it or how he uses it, and if we are going to follow the so-called New Morality we had better write a New Testament and find us a new Christ. In God's name, let us not be duped into believing that the old virtues which are part and parcel of our Christian tradition and emphatically inherent in our Scripture can be negated. In so doing we will be contracting for the disintegration of our own souls, the impotency of the church, and the disintegration of society.

THE CHURCH SCHOOL

I cannot begin to express appreciation for the inspiration that I have received from so many of you who have given your talents, your service, and your prayers to the rebuilding of Sunday School Attendance. I have followed the pattern over the whole Conference. It is as was projected from the beginning—where the minister has been deeply concerned, his people have been inspired. Where the people have been inspired Sunday school attendance has grown. Some have scoffed at the thought of dedicating a measureable part of our efforts to the reaching of numbers, but our commission is to make disciples of all people. This is that to which we as Christian laity and ministry have committed ourselves. It is a sizeable number—all people! No acceptable fraction of those for whom we are locally responsible will be reached by simply announcing that we have a quality educational program which is open to them if they want to come. Someone has to believe in it. Someone must herald the merits and extend the welcome of the Sunday school. The evidence is clear. When the minister has been unconcerned, nothing has happened. Attendance has most often declined. This is so even when the minister has an especially talented director of education assisted by other trained workers. I could call the roll of those who have been willing for their associates to carry the load, but have not given themselves with zeal to the support of Sunday school attendance. The pastor in charge is indispensible.

This does not exclude the inescapable responsibility of church school leaders to provide the most adequate instructional and inspirational programs. There is no "either—or" to the matter. Some say we are in changing times and what once worked won't still work. But they haven't found that something else! On the other hand, the fact is that many of our churches and ministers have proved the contrary. They yearned to reach more people and made careful plans. Their reports are their vindication. It is my correct hore that our United Methodist people in Floride will

It is my earnest hope that our United Methodist people in Florida will face up to the fact that without Christian education in a thorough, compelling, winsome outreaching fashion the church is going to die from year to year. It is just that simple and just that tragic. Let us either use what we have or improve on it. Either way that we elect will require much more effort than is now being expended. And yet—down the road—the comprehension of the gospel and its implications depends upon instruction and outreach.

MISSIONS

The world changes and the emphases which strike either our heart or our fancies change with the times. In one era it is missions. This is the great consuming passion of the church. In another era it is evangelism. Another time it is education. Another time it is social concerns. Unfortunately, we seem to lack the facility of nourishing all these indispensable concerns together. We become obsessed with one holy dream after another, but we tend to prove ourselves incapable of sustaining our concerns and commitments as new enterprises and new visions loom on the horizon. Let me beseech you, seek to cherish all that is holy. Seek to promote all that is good. Seek to hold on to all that which has proved so precious in the life of your religious experience and that of your churches. The world for Christ is our commission. Our conference has written brilliant chapters in its mission concern and support. We need to recapture something of this zeal. We must expand our knowledge and our support. We have been a great "Missionary Conference." Keep this as part of your discipleship alive.

THE LAY RETREATS

I continue to marvel and to rejoice in the retreats of the laymen held at Leesburg. During recent years I have found added cause for assurance because of the type of ministry which has been rendered during these four weekends. The laymen's retreats are markedly evangelical. Men become excited because they have discovered something to which they can commit themselves without reservation. And through that commitment they have discovered a new freedom and a new triumph which enriches their own lives, the lives of their homes and their churches. And during recent years the interpretation of the Christian faith at the Leesburg Retreats has taken on new dimensions. There is a new sense of social responsibility, of obligation to enrich the sense of Christian brotherhood across all the lines of division which serve as walls of partition among us. Brilliant and inspiring speakers have been drawn from the black community and have been received with great ferver and appreciation. The breadth and depth of the gospel has been taking on new dimension.

I regret pastors schools, while addressed by persons of distinction and various academic disciplines and professional commitments, have witnessed very little of the same ferver. This, it seems to me, is lamentable. A pastors school should certainly be a school of the prophets. At the same time it should be richly and unmistakeably imbued with the joy and assurance of those who have been redeemed to the end that they themselves will become in some small measure redeemers of others. I wish to pay high tribute to those laymen who with persistent, consecrated purpose have sought to direct the Leesburg Laymen's Retreats into a more rewarding experience to the end that Christ shall be glorified and the church shall be enriched.

JUDGE WILLIAM A. MEADOWS, JR.

Judge William A. Meadows, Jr. is retiring as the chairman of the Board of the Laity. Frankly, I do not comprehend how this good man has been able to give so extravagantly of his time and his talents in this important work. As a result of his spiritual influence the lives of multiplied thousands have been enriched. The laymen's retreats at Leesburg have become a source of inspiration to the church throughout the nation. On your behalf I must say this word of appreciation to Judge Meadows. He has not only been your friend and servant in Christ, he has been my strong right arm and my spiritual support. May the Lord bless him richly.

LEESBURG

I must not omit Leesburg. The youth camp has become a shrine for a multitude of Florida Methodists, young and old. Many parents of this generation of young people remember with gratitude and fervent emotion the time when they dedicated their lives to Christ at a youth assembly in Leesburg. Many of our youth have had their visions widened and their understanding of the implications of the Christian faith deepened and enriched by their fellowship and study there. Many of the ministers sitting before me today answered the call of Christ to a fulltime service within the church at a summer assembly. Thousands of adults have found new spiritual life and vision in assemblies and retreats held there. In short, Leesburg has provided a place for a setting for religious training and spiritual experience the like of which few conferences in Methodism enjoy.

For each of the past three years I have urged that plans be set in motion and brought to completion as quickly as possible to provide more

adequate accommodations for the ongoing program the future will require. I wish to express personal appreciation to our Committee on Camps and Conferences and to Warren Willis for the tentative proposals that have come from their deliberations. The architect's drawings which they have provided for consideration have much to commend them. The need is tremendous already and the opportunities which expanded and more adequate facilities will provide will open doors for the cultivation and inspiration of a greater and more powerful church during the decades that lie ahead of us. Let me urge you with all the ferver at my command to pursue this project without delay. Some of our sizeable financial commitments will soon have been completed and the Conference will be in favorable position to launch this program for the further enrichment of its life and work.

DISTRICT AND COMMUNITY SERVICES

We have reason to rejoice in the development of ministries within our districts which are calculated for more effective assistance to the spiritual, domestic, social and material welfare of our people who have traditionally suffered privation, poverty, lack of education, outmoded inherited mores and discrimination. These are all God's people. The Christian is called to manifest his brotherhood toward them in every possible way and manner and the church is awakening to this responsibility. Anyone who is familiar with Methodism's role in the areas of social and racial justice will be proud of achievements in Tampa, Miami, Jacksonville, and developing programs in Orlando and elsewhere. Furthermore, we are seeking to make effective the instrumentality of the church through parish programs both in town and country. There is a stirring in the life of the church which lifts our eyes to new horizons and promises new and better tomorrows for the people of God.

THE MINISTRY TO THE SMALL CHURCH

We are making some progress in our ministry to our small congregations. More than half of the United Methodist Churches in Florida have less than 250 members. Many of these churches were established when roads were poor and transportation was difficult. Some of them are four or five miles apart in open country where the population is scattered and sparse. The schools have been merged but the churches have kept their separate identity. Now the roads are good. Almost every home has some means of transportation. It is easier to get to the church eight miles away than it was to the church one mile away fifty years ago. Many of these congregations need to be brought together under one roof and into one fellowship. They can enjoy a better ministry, have better physical facilities, and experience the inspiration of larger programs if they will only concede to the fact that times have changed and our responsibilities have changed with them. Our District Superintendents and many of our ministers are lending assistance to the development of larger parishes and the merger of smaller congregations. We need the support of our laity in this. It is a must. With such mergers come confidence and security. Church property is improved and enlarged. I do trust that the Florida Conference will give especial attention to this urgent facet of its life.

THE GENERAL CONFERENCE

It is only a few weeks since the 1972 session of the General Conference of the United Methodist Church was held in Atlanta, Georgia. Many of you attended at least a part of these sessions. There were ominous reports before the delegates gathered that alarming proposals would be made for the adoption of the Conference particularly in the field of morality, both personal and social. These were unfounded. They really never reached the floor of the Conference for debate or discussion. The major changes were in the field of the general structure of the church. This will undoubtedly affect the annual conference in time and our Florida Structure Committee has asked that we postpone the reconstructuring of Boards and Commissions until the Annual Conference of 1973. By that time it will be clear how the general restructuring of the boards and agencies of the church affects their corresponding bodies on the annual conference level. The changes will not be drastic. There will be some new names for agencies and some new relationships among the agencies, but we will be going about the same work in much the same way.

During the sessions of the General Conference Mr. O. B. Fanning and the Reverend William S. Echols wrote daily reports which were called back to the United Methodist Building where our staff worked feverishly to prepare the day's report and mail it to every preacher in the annual conference so that it would be in hand the following morning. There have been many expressions of appreciation for this service. It came at no small cost to those who rendered it. They labored long and hard in order to keep each local minister and congregation abreast of the things that were transpiring in Atlanta. I wish to express my personal appreciation and the appreciation of the entire conference for these services.

BLACK COLLEGES

One of the real concerns evidenced by the entire church was the inadequacy of support which has been directed to the twelve historically black colleges of Methodism. These schools have been grossly disregarded and funds for them have been totally inadequate. It is a marvel that they have survived, and they all have histories ranging from seventy-five to a hundred and ten years. The indomitable faith of their presidents and faculty have brought them down to this critical moment. Their student bodies are growing. The black community is itself giving added strength and support to the colleges. And the time of their effective contribution to the life of the church and the nation is by no means finished. The General Conference adopted a program by which \$5,000,000 will be asked from the entire United Methodist Church in the United States each of the next four years for the strengthening of these institutions. Beyond this another \$1,000,000 is being apportioned for capital improvements. This type of undergirding will make it possible for the twelve black United Methodist Colleges to raise their scholastic standings and to make their proper contribution to the life of well-trained leadership among the black communiy for the church and for the nation.

The financial asking is distributed to the entire church throughout the United States and not to the conferences of the South where all these colleges are located.

THE FLORIDA METHODIST

For the past 15 years or more the Methodists of Florida have been seeking to devise a Conference paper that will reach the largest number of Methodists with the broadest field of information with regard to the entire church, the conference program, and activities on the local church scene. Every effort has been one of discouragement. None of us have felt at any time that we had found the answer. This conference will hear the report of a committee which has given unstintedly of their time and creative talents in search for the answer to this problem of communication. With the approval of the Conference Council they have provided us a trial run during the past six or eight weeks. I simply make my own personal testimony that I consider it the nearest answer to our problem that we have discovered. I cannot and would not seek to persuade you in your decision. All that I want to do at this time is to commend this committee with my whole heart and to say that I as one person who loves this conference and feels that we need better communication believe this to be the most commendable proposition that has come to us. I only plead with you that you give it your earnest consideration.

THE METHODIST FOUNDATION

The Methodist Foundation continues to grow and to serve. I marvel at the magnitude of this venture. Dr. Robert Holmes had a dream. For many of us it was idealistic and inspiring, but some felt that it was totally impractical. The dream came true. The experimentation has been adventure. The adventure has been a success. The Methodist Foundation is a fact and a glorious fact in the life of this Conference. Local churches, districts, boards and agencies all profit together. We need to encourage our people to remember the Methodist Foundation in their wills and bequests. We need to encourage our churches to invest their funds being raised for future indebtedness through the Methodist Foundation. Every agency of the Conference can profit by utilizing the services of this exemplary agency.

BLACK CHURCH EXTENSION

There are many needs among the churches of Florida. I think, perhaps, the most conspicuous is the need for better churches and better parsonages for those congregations serving the predominately black community. Most of these churches do not have parsonages at all. Some of the parsonages are totally inadequate. We will never develop a locally stationed ministry to serve these congregations unless the ministers and their families have a dwelling place. The congregation themselves will suffer unless they have adequate housing. During this next year it has been proposed that the Conference have a special day for a very special offering for churches serving the predominately black community. I rejoice in the anticipation of this day. I believe our people will respond gladly and abundantly. Wherever the need is known the concern is felt. Do, in Christ's name, make the offering for church extension in the black community one of the great emphases of the new year.

CONFERENCE LEGAL COMMITTEE

During the past few years the laws of the State of Florida have made some little publicized but dramatic changes in regard to the status of taxation of church property. Churches used to be given automatically exemptions for properties used for religious purposes—now each church must apply to their county tax assessor to have the exemption granted to it.

I have been contacted several times by anxious Methodist attorneys concerned that all of our Methodist Churches get their request for exemption filed. I, too, have become anxious over this and have called every district superintendent and have had them contact each minister individually.

In discussing this with some of our Methodist attorneys, I find that the problem is far greater than I previously suspected. All church-owned land has automatically lost the exemption unless applied for. This includes many of our abandoned rural church properties. It also included your church parsonage and any other property owned by the Methodist Churches. As you all know, this may include property we may not be fully aware of which is held by a board of trustees of a defunct church or Methodist organization.

It is a vital concern to all of us that every district and every church check its files and records to determine if it owns any property which must have an application filed for tax exemption—whether church, parsonage, endowment, gift or otherwise.

It seems to me that we must consider having a Conference-wide inventory of all lands. Their tax exempt status must be kept up to date annually or we may run the risk of losing title to some valuable property.

For years, some of our people have been actively proposing some Conference-wide method of handling church corporations, deeds, titles, wills, bequests, etc. It is also becoming apparent that these, too, need some uniformity. It seems to me that we need a central clearing house for legal information at the Conference level to aid Methodist attorneys around the state as they transact our church business.

Therefore, I suggest to you that it might be wise for us to consider the creation of a Conference Legal Committee to consist of lay lawyers from each district and from the major Methodist Boards and institutions to come together and seek to find solutions to the problems of insuring the ownership of our Methodist real estate and perhaps devising methods of creating uniformity of titles, corporations, etc. Such a committee should report to the Annual Conference with recommendations for Conference action.

PARTNERS IN EDUCATION

One year ago now you authorized a campaign within our area for our two United Methodist Related Colleges. The campaign was slow getting off the ground. In many places there was indifference. Why? The reason is perhaps unimportant to analyze just here. Nevertheless, many indispensable persons either declined to participate or did so half-heartedly.

It will be recommended to this conference that the campaign be extended beyond the expected termination date. At least half of the conference has not been solicited in any form. The other half has only been superficially completed. These colleges stand as expressions of the confidence of our people in the indispensable relationship which has historically sifted between the Methodist Church and the enlightenment of the mind.

How can I tell you the depth of my concern and the genuiness of my hope that you will assist Florida Southern and Bethune-Cookman Colleges to become and remain such institutions as shall give training which is commendable in the arts and sciences while building character and Christian faith in the hearts of youth. I wish to express appreciation to all those who have given cooperation in PARTNERS IN EDUCATION and I trust that the request of the Steering Committee will be heard appreciatively on the part of the Conference.

I LOVE FLORIDA, I LOVE FLORIDA UNITED METHODISM

There has been a romance about this peninsula since the first adventurers discovered it and named it "The Land of Flowers." Florida is different. It is different from anywhere and everywhere. There is only one Florida and it is an area of beauty both refreshing and inspiring. It is becoming a new society. There is no way of preventing the change, but there is a way of directing the change and this is the challenge of the church in a unique sense. Just for a moment I would like once more to express the deep satisfactions which have been mine in laboring among you. God has been good to me beyond all measure. My opportunities to serve with you were unmerited, but the memories of our ministry together will live on in my heart and life as long as I have breath and somehow I believe I will carry them over as priceless treasures when the time comes to take my journey beyond the sunset.

BOARD OF THE MINISTRY

REPORT NO. 1

Through its several committees your Board of the Ministry has worked faithfully to discharge the many responsibilities assigned to it. These Committees are: Recruitment and Nurture, Lay Ministry, Psychological Guidance, Doctrine, Pastors School and Continuing Education, Conference Relations, and Two Percent Ministerial Education Fund. The Board sincerely desires to put meaning and purpose into its guidance of candidates who seek to serve Christ and His Church in Florida.

The attention of the Conference is called to the importance of the Two Percent Ministerial Education Fund. There are many men who could not have remained in School without this money. All churches are urged to pay this apportionment in full. In 1971 a total of \$247,115 was apportioned to the Churches of which \$179,241 was paid. One-fourth of this amount came back to the Conference to be used for Florida men. Three-fourths of this amount goes directly to the Seminars. Imagine what we could have done for struggling students and Continuing Education if the full amount had been paid. Please note the following report: During the Conference Year of 1971-1972, 54 full-time students and 35 Lay Pastors (Summer School) were assisted in the amount of \$41,465.

I. Continuing Education:

On the basis of the special study of continuing education authorized by the Annual Conference two years ago, and of long-range planning by the Board of the Ministry in consultation with other Conference agencies concerned with ministerial life, we recommend that as soon as possible, a ministerial member of the Conference be appointed to the Conference staff as an Associate Director whose responsibility shall be to correlate all activity relating to ministerial life, and who shall serve as the Registrar of the Conference Board of the Ministry.

- 1. The primary responsibility of this Associate Director shall be to develop and direct a program of continuing education for ministers within the Annual Conference. This would include:
 - a. Establishing a center for continuing education in the Conference to which men could come to week-long seminars under the leadership of nationally known scholars.
 - b. Organizing short-term workshops and seminars on the District level, utilizing the vast resources of the institutions of higher education in our state for leadership.
 - c. Disseminating information regarding guided reading programs now available from the Department of the Ministry in Nashville, Candler School of Theology, Gammon Theological Seminary, and other seminaries, and assisting in setting up groups of ministers in the various communities of the Conference to participate in these voluntary programs.
 - d. Working closely with each quadrennium's Pastors' School Dean and Committee, thereby providing for greater continuity and more effective long-range planning than is now possible with a totally different administration for the School each quadrennium.
- 2. Other duties of this Associate Director could include:
 - a. The work of the Registrar of the Conference Board of the Ministry, *i.e.*:

(1) Keeping accurate, on-going records for all persons related to our Conference who are not Full Members (This year this involves 165 persons: 30 full-time Lay Pastors, 55 part-time Lay Pastors, 17 student Lay Pastors, and 63 Probationers and candidates).

(2) Maintaining contact with each person yearly by personal interview and by correspondence in order to help him meet Disciplinary and Conference requirements for membership or Conference standing.

(3) Visiting seminaries to talk with Probationary Membership candidates and consult with seminary administrators.

- b. Coordinating the work of the Ministerial Education 2% Fund Committee of the Board of the Ministry.
- c. Coordinating the work of the Preachers' Relief Fund, i.e.:

(1) Maintaining the file on all properties owned by the Trustees of the Preachers' Relief Fund and making recommendations on the maintenance of these properties. (2) Interviewing applicants and making recommendations regarding

residency in these properties.

(3) Visitation of residents in these properties.

d. Coordinating the work of the Board of Pensions (including the (1) Maintaining and verifying years of service records.
(2) Checking, verifying and authorizing distribution of funds to

individual MRPF member accounts.

(3) Maintaining liaison with the General Board of Pensions regarding claimants and annuity benefits.

- e. Coordinating the work of Christian Enlistment.
- 3. Resources currently being expended for these job areas which could be re-directed to the support of this Associate Director are:

II. Other Recommendations:

- 1. That all apportionments to the Ministerial Education 2% Fund be paid in full.
- 2. That 15 percent of the Ministerial Education 2% funds available for use by the Annual Conference be used for scholarship assistance to members of the Conference for short-term study on a university or seminary campus.
- 3. That a program be established by the Bishop and the Cabinet whereby a pastor could take a short term leave of absence from his church on partial salary to be used for continuing education, with a retired man or other available help serving his church in his absence.



Before this is even fully collected, a check for \$1,000 is sent to the widow or the beneficiary.

16. FLORIDA CONFERENCE CREDIT UNION

The Credit Union opened for business January 1, 1970. Prior to that the Annual Conference voted in June 1969 to approve the organization and Bishop Henley chaired a meeting to formally organize. The group prepared and submitted a certificate of organization commonly referred to as a charter. September 5, 1969, Mr. Fred O. Dickinson Jr. Comptroller of Florida issued a charter and at year end, December 31, 1969, forty-seven persons had become charter members and \$1,855 had been deposited in shares.

Bishop Henley, The Cabinet, Dr. John Rooks and the Reverend C. Eugene West are names that loom large in the initial planning and procedure for the organization. A large number of men and women gave loyal support and only time and space makes it impossible to list them all.

Dr. John Rooks, then Executive Secretary of the Program Council, invited The Reverend Clifford M. Fritz, who retired from the Wisconsin Conference, to come to Florida to assume the position of manager.

Unusual growth has ensued due in large measure to an excellent Board of Directors headed by Dr. Richard Pearce—Vice President of Florida Southern. The stability of Board members known and trusted throughout the Conference has inspired confidence and support.

The charter describes the field of membership to include ministers, elected lay members to Conference plus lay members of district conference and institutional boards, and employees and their immediate families who have a common bond of fellowship in the Florida United Methodist Conference.

A completed membership card with at least a minimum share or \$5.25 starts an account. Very few start with the minimum. Each new member receives a pass-sheet showing in detail each deposit to the share account and any member may send in any amount at any time. It is a remarkable fact that the Board of Directors have continuously voted a 5% dividend from the very beginning. So the Credit Union is fairly competitive in making your share dollars earn a good return.

Loans to members is the service value of the Credit Union. A loan application receives the careful attention of the Credit Committee whose members can approve loans up to \$500 on signature only. All loans over that amount must have sufficient collateral to cover the amount borrowed.

Aiding members at a time of financial need is a real ministry in itself made possible by this service project of the Annual Conference. Just talking over family finance and helping with guidance and funds through troubled waters is something we all need and some of the best work the Credit Union has done is to save someone from near disaster and through consolidation help to get a budget started that will prove extremely helpful for the future. Auto loans, appliances, school tuition, health emergencies, and vacations are just a few of the types of loans available. A request for a loan application starts the procedure for requesting help. The cost of loans are reasonable and must be repaid on a monthly basis. In fact the cost of a loan is so competitive that if you can find one cheaper we have already rendered you a service.

Insurance, at no extra cost to the members is two fold (1) Life Protection on share deposits up to \$2000, depending upon age, \$1 for each \$1 deposited up to age 55; 75¢ per dollar from 55 to 60; 50¢ from 60 to 65; 25¢ from 65 to 70 and nothing on money deposited after 70. The amounts do not decrease after deposit—for instance if \$2000 is deposited before 55 it will continue as long as the shares are intact. (2) Loan protection covering any amount up to \$5000 or any unpaid amount, will be paid leaving your estate free from repayment.

The future??? Good solid growth month after month will help us arrive at the break-even point of \$250,000 in loans. We are at the half way mark and another year or two should enable a good cut-back in Conference support.

A Credit Union table at Annual Conference will have applications for membership and for loans along with free pamphlets and leaflets explaining the many services. Members of the Board, Mr. Northrup, treasurer; Mrs. Betty Bray, assistant treasurer; Mrs. Joan Mixon and the Manager will try to have someone present to answer questions you may have.

The Annual Meeting will be held in the collegiate room at the cafeteria Tuesday noon of Conference week to which anyone is invited. It has been a pleasure and privilege to work in the Credit Union and I want personally to thank you for the cordial response you have given me.

ADULT DEPARTMENT

Three Conferences for adults were held during the past year. They were:

(1) The Mature Years Conference—April 26-29, 1971 was held at the Conference Camp at Leesburg. This was the 25th Anniversary of this Conference and was attended by 141 people. Rev. Bill Fisackerly is the advisor to this Conference from our department.

(2) The Conference for Young Singles met at the Conference Camp at Leesburg, September 4-6. Sixty-four persons were present.

(3) An experimental program for young married couples was co-sponsored with the Family Life Department at the Conference Camp, September 9-10. Six couples were present.

In May, eight of the District Adult Coordinators participated in a fortyeight hour training workshop designed by the Board of Education, Local Church Services Department, in Nashville. While in Nashville the group met with representatives of the Board of Education, Local Church, the Board of Evangelism and the Editors of curriculum materials from the Publishing House. The District Adult Coordinators who attended returned to our area with a more certain understanding of how our curriculum materials are designed, what they are intended to do, and what new things are on the horizon for the adults of our church. The following directors went to Nashville and are available as resource persons for our districts and Conference: Reverends Bill Fisackerly, Richard Rohrer, James Crook, John Winters, Ross Denslow, Walter Cross and Charlotte Biedron.

One of the new curriculum resources in the development stage is the Bible series entitled "Our Living Bible." The new series will emphasize spiritual values of the text, will be true to the Wesleyan heritage, and will stress the Biblical concept of covenant. This series will be available in September 1973. In preparation for the publication of this series the Adult Department has accepted the consulting services of the Publishing House. Our consultant will be the Rev. Mr. Harold Minor. In the Fall of 1972 (October 17-20) meetings will be held in the districts under the guidance of Rev. Minor.

The Adult Department had its annual planning meeting September 9-10, 1971. The present year's program was reviewed and plans were made for implementing in 1972 program and the 1973 program was formulated.

FAMILY LIFE DEPARTMENT

In January, 1971, the Family Life Department had a planning session. District Coordinators of Family Ministries remained an additional day for training in this important area.

The Methodist Publishing House cooperated with us in having an excellent Family Life book display at annual conference and also at Pastor's School and the Laymen's Retreats.

Two study books in the Family Life Series are Human Growth and the Family and The One Parent Family. The use of these is encouraged in study groups in the local church. The Christian Home and The Church School magazines are fine resources. The series of parent guidebooks is now completed and are valuable resources for use with parents of various age groups.

The theme of the Young Married Couples Conference at the United Methodist Youth Camp, Leesburg, September 11-12, was "More Joy In Your Marriage". This joint venture of the Adult and Family Life Ministries afforded young couples (ages 18-30) an opportunity to improve communication and understanding and to set some common goals for their marriage.

Four Workshops on Premarital Counseling were held in various sections of our Conference November 1-4. Dr. Leon Smith of our General Board of Education, Nashville, came to lead. He was assisted by the Rev. Charles Penney, our Conference Coordinator of Family Ministries.

An outstanding Family Life Conference is to be held at Florida Southern College in Lakeland June 26-29, 1972. Dr. Tom McGinnis, who has been president of the New Jersey Association of Marriage Counselors and who is an excellent leader and writer in the area of family living, will head the leadership team. Dr. Leon Smith of Nashville will be present also to provide specific training for Coordinators of Family Ministries.

COMMITTEE ON PUBLISHING INTERESTS

The Florida Conference Committee on Publishing Interests is a part of the Program Council and is related to the Methodist Publishing House. During 1971 the Publishing House made a profit of \$663,718 (compared to a loss of more than a million dollars the previous year). The profit of \$663,718 has been contributed to the pension program for Methodist ministers and their dependents, according to a custom of long standing.

Here are some changes that have occurred during the past year in the Methodist Publishing House: Henry M. Bullock, long-time editor of church school publications, has retired and has been succeeded by Dr. Ewart G. Watts, pastor of First United Methodist Church in Topeka, Kansas, since 1956. . . . The Publishing House has recently installed new and larger offset printing presses and cameras to increase its printing capacity. The Publishing House is doing more printing than ever before for other denominations. Curriculum materials developed by our (Methodist) Graded Press are now used by several denominations, often with denominational jackets replacing the Methodist jackets. The Methodist Publishing House has increased ecumenical efforts and will become the retail supplier for the United Presbyterian Church; as of August 1 four Westminster Book Stores (Presbyterian) will cease operation and Cokesbury stores and regional service centers will serve the needs of the United Presbyterian Church and the United Church of Christ. Publications by those denominations will be featured in the retail stores alongside Methodist publications. . . . Roger L. Shinn, professor at Union Theological Seminary, has won the \$5,000 1971 Abingdon Award for his Wars and Rumors of Wars. . . Cokesbury plans to open a retail store in Florida within the next two or three years. The city and precise location will be chosen after careful market surveys.

Printing plants that had been operated in previous years by the United Brethren Church and the Evangelical Church have been sold to corporations formed by employees of the plants. The result is good for all: The Methodist Publishing House does not have the responsibility of operating smaller and older plants, and all the employees were able to keep their jobs without moving their place of residence. The printing plants, under their new employee-owners, are engaging successfully in commercial printing.

At the end of 1971 circulation of TOGETHER magazine was 364,000, down 120,000 during the past year. Circulation of CHRISTIAN ADVOCATE is 12,000. Circulation of RELIGION IN LIFE is 2,700.

The Florida Conference Reading Fellowship, under the chairmanship of the Rev. Walter D. Edwards, has served well in acquainting Florida Methodists with good books. We recommend its continuance. Florida Methodists are invited to write reviews of books they read and submit them to Rev. Edwards. He will choose some of the reviews for publication in a bulletin insert that is printed by Cokesbury and made available to Florida Methodist churches that will use them. From these inserts, Methodists and others may order books directly from Cokesbury. Pastors are urged to write to Cokesbury, Nashville, and indicate how many bulletin inserts they can use. There is no charge for them.

COMMISSION ON ARCHIVES AND HISTORY

As we continue to be thrust into God's new future, we need to remember with appreciation, those of the past whose faith in God has laid a foundation for our present work and witness.

We commend the Reeves Memorial United Methodist Church for celebrating their fiftieth anniversary and for submitting an up-to-date history to Curator; and, the Pine Grove United Methodist Church of the Wellborn Charge for celebrating their one hundred fiftieth anniversary.

We urge churches to plan special celebrations marking each twenty-fifth year interval, and to bring their histories up-to-date for these occasions. We request that these histories be submitted to the Curator not later than December 31st, if possible, in order for recognition to be included in the Conference Journal for the year in which the celebration was held.

We thank Dr. Charles T. Thrift, Jr., and Florida Southern College for space in the Library for the Conference Archives. Mrs. Otye Bly continues to give valuable service with the Archives Materials.

Beginning with the Annual Conference of 1972, the Commission on Archives and History will issue a Certificate of Recognition to ministers who have served twenty-five years. We hope to organize a Conference Historical Society during the session of the Conference. The officers of the Historical Society will be the officers of the Commission on Archives and History. Membership in the Society will be open to the Clergy and the Laity, who are interested in the History of our Conference, and of the Churches in our Conference.

A special celebration was held at Lake Junaluska on Labor Day Weekend, September 1971, celebrating the Bicentennial of the coming of Francis Asbury to America. Outstanding speakers, nationally and internationally gave inspiring lectures on this occasion. Our Conference was well represented by a number of clergy and laity.

COMMITTEE ON THE LAY WORKER

Those persons attaining a lay worker relationship to the Annual Conference are professional in training and position. We believe the matter of their employment should involve a commitment on the part of both the Lay Worker and the employing church for at least one full year. Termination of service on the part of either in less than a year may prove to be traumatic, and will almost certainly militate against the highest level of proficiency as well as good will. We urge both employer and employee to

consider the matter of at least one full year as a contractual agreement. We remind those churches employing Lay Workers of the disciplinary provision which states that pension shall be provided for persons in such a relationship. If we are to retain the services of the best persons in the fields represented and maintain a position of fairness on the part of the church, this committee believes some provision for pension becomes im-perative. We urge all our churches to move immediately to properly providing pensions for lay workers. In order that a role may be available to all, we request the secretary of

the Annual Conference to publish in the Conference Journal a role of those who are Lay Workers and members thereby of the Annual Conference.

Recognizing the change of status on the part of those granted this relationship to the Conference by transferring both into and out of the Annual Conference and by termination of membership because of change of status, the committee has prepared forms and questionnaires which shall be requested of each Lay Worker annually indicating that person's desire to be continued in this relationship and informing the committee of present employment as well as future plans. We believe this will be very beneficial to the keeping of proper records for the Conference as well as a real aid to the persons involved.

The committee has met and interviewed those persons requesting con-secration as Lay Workers by the Florida Annual Conference and will continue to interview those seeking this relationship. It will be our privilege to present the candidates to the Florida Annual Conference for their election to membership and to Bishop Henley for consecration when the Conference meets in June.

ADVISORY COMMITTEE FOR CHURCH AND COMMUNITY WORK

The Church and Community Worker, a professionally qualified person, is employed by the National Division of the Board of Missions and ap-pointed annually in response to requests from Annual Conferences or Districts. Involving persons in rural communities with social issues and human need is a part of the program of the Church and Community Worker.

Of the 81 Church and Community Workers assigned to 40 Conferences two are assigned in Florida. Ms. Masheeta Lindsey was assigned Feb. 1, 1972, to the developing group ministry in Gainesville and Ms. Thelma Crosby was reassigned to the Leon-Wakulla Larger Parish in the Tallahassee District. Two additional Church and Community Workers have been requested, one for the Madison County Larger Parish in the Tallahassee District, and one for the Gainesville District.

Another responsibility of this Committee is the Summer Worker in Town and Country Program providing young adults, with one or more years of college, an opportunity to serve in rural and small town churches for eight weeks.

The Conference staff provides a week of concentrated training in the use of Vacation Church School materials, youth activities, day camping and recreation. An honorarium of \$400 is given each participant. Funding for 1972 was provided in the Conference Program Budget to the amount of \$2200, the Women's Society of Christian Service, \$2375, and

the Wesleyan Service Guild, \$950.

THE CAMP ADVISORY COMMITTEE

Prior to 1948 the Camp and Assembly program of Florida Methodism rented facilities from any available source. It became increasingly evident that we must create our own facilities or be crowded out of church-related camping. Acting on faith, the property at Leesburg was secured and building begun.

In the intervening years we have developed a camp valued at over \$1,000,000, with three satellite campsites in North, South and Central Florida. More than 150,000 youth have participated in summer programs, at least 75,000 adults in non-summer activities, and countless youth for weekend experiences. The camp has become a year-round operation.

No one can really estimate the good done in the lives of people across the years because Florida Methodists ventured the camp at Leesburg. We know that at least 15,000 first commitments to Christ have been made at the camp's altars. The camp's influence has been determinative in the decision of countless men and women to enter the ministry or other full-time church-related service.

Styles change, and what was a modern camp in 1948 is now looked upon as rustic. Increasingly Methodist groups have been renting other, more modern facilities for their programs. Large groups, such as the Lay Retreats and the Pastors' Schools, have been dependent on nearby motels to accommodate many participants. With the increased use of motels and church retreat centers by denominational groups, and the increasing strain on motel space due to the advent of Disney World, it becomes evident that we must develop new facilities to serve our new day.

Recognizing the need, the Conference Council charged its Camp Advisory Committee with the responsibility for developing plans and procedures to insure the future of our work. A competent architect was secured on a contingency basis and preliminary plans developed. A motel-type retreat center of 100 units is projected, together with a central meeting and dining building and an auditorium. The units are so designed that small groups may use a section complete with meeting area and kitchenette, or up to 200 may be accommodated with appropriate meeting places and a cafeteria. We invite your study of the plans, which are still preliminary but seem well designed to meet a variety of needs. Location of the retreat center lies west of the entrance to the present

camp on lovely acreage purchased largely through the efforts of our conference laity across the last few years. The retreat buildings are designed so that every room has a view of the lake. Estimated cost of the complete facility if built by bids from commercial builders is \$1,500,000. It is possible that there could be substantial savings through self-contracting, or sections of 24 units might be built over a period of several years, but this is a decision to be made later.

In view of the deep needs that exist for adult programming by Conference and District agencies and local churches, and the availability of this strategic site, your committee recommends:

- 1. The adoption of the preliminary plans and the authorization for the Camp Advisory Committee to secure working drawings and specifications to build the complete center, subject to financing;
- 2. The Special Gifts Committee be named and be authorized to proceed with its work, and that further consideration of this matter be delayed until the Fall meeting of the Annual Conference.

Suggestion for Use of Camp Facilities:

Recently representatives from the Boards of Health and Welfare, Christian Social Concerns and Education met with Mr. Bob Pitzer, executive secretary of SEMAR, and Mr. Jack McAllister, State director of the Division on Mental Retardation, to discuss the upcoming program "Think of the Retarded" being launched by SEMAR, and to talk with Mr. McAllister regarding ways in which the United Methodist Church can work with state agencies to facilitate and expand work. According to Mr. McAllister, the state agency is anxious to enlist the church in helping provide facilities and volunteer workers in an integrated program to serve the thousands of mentally retarded in our churches, communities, and in the State.

One of the ways the church can help almost immediately is in making our camp facilities available in a cooperative effort, with the state furnishing funds and trained leadership. This leadership in turn will help train some United Methodist personnel. It is the hope of the group working in this area of ministry that our camp facilities may be used in cooperation with the state agency.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

REPORT NO. 1

The Board of Christian Social Concerns held its annual meeting February 4, 5, 1972, at the United Methodist Building in Lakeland. This Board has been very busy during this quadrennium in promotion of the program and work of Christian Social Concerns. The membership of the Board has demonstrated responsible and constructive leadership, and has brought the work of the Board into closer relationship with local churches.

- 1. THE COMMUNITY SERVICE VOLUNTEER PROGRAM: We continue to sponsor and support this program, which is under the sponsorship of the Florida Parole and Probation Commission. Any qualified citizens may become a volunteer probation officer. Many justifiable cases are being denied probation because of the lack of supervisory care. This program does not cost any money. It is an opportunity for individuals of every United Methodist Church across the conference to assist in the rehabilitation of people who have fallen into trouble. It is also a Christian opportunity to be concerned with a person in need of a friend.
- 2. THE CONFERENCE SCHOOL OF CHRISTIAN MISSION: We have contributed personnel and substantial time and effort in the work of the school and feel that it has tremendous potential for good and for spiritual growth in the Florida Conference. Its purpose is: "to provide an opportunity for study and training in the mission of the church with particular emphasis on the current mission study themes and spiritual enrichment as they relate to the task of the several program areas in

the local church both separately and as a whole." The weekend and the week session commence July 21, and conclude on July 28, 1972 at Florida Southern College. We strongly urge every church to send one or more of its members to the school.

- 3. ALCOHOL AND DRUG ABUSE FILM LIBRARY: The Board has established a film library at the United Methodist Building in Lakeland. These filmstrips and films can be used at no rental cost but a service charge of \$1 per film will be assessed. They are available to local churches, church schools, and local church groups. Users are responsible for the proper care and safety and must return the films at the designated time.
- 4. ALCOHOL AND DRUG SEMINARS: The Board has the personnel and resource material to aid the districts in cooperation with the District Superintendents, district officers, and the local churches, to promote such seminars, as time and circumstance will permit. The desire and motivation for such a program must be generated by a local sponsoring group.
- 5. SEMINARS AND WORKSHOPS ON RECONCILIATION: We strongly urge that every church make a survey, become conscious and concerned with the problems of Social Concerns within their own church and community. There are so many problems literally begging for Christian concern in your own local community that it would be impossible to properly handle all of them in this generation. It is the duty of the church to answer the call and cry of the needy, the distressed, the aged, and the many problems of inequality and discrimination that exist within our localities.
- 6. LOCAL CHURCHES AND THE LOCAL COMMUNITIES: The Board and its members stand ready to render whatever assistance, material and resources the local churches desire, and to perform it in a way that will fit into local program and local needs. It is not the purpose of this Board to go into any local community or into the local church and attempt to develop a program unless and until it is requested by a local group. The willingness and desire to do most of the work must be developed within the local organization.
- 7. OUR WORK IS DIVIDED INTO THREE DIVISIONS: The Division of General Welfare; Rev. John Fletcher, Chairman, has the responsibility of 23 major programs centering around Christian Social Concerns. The Division of World Peace; Rev. Jimmy Jones, Chairman, has the responsibility for 14 major programs centering around Social Concerns. The Division of Human Relations; Mr. Cashus Richardson, Chairman, has the responsibility for 18 major programs centering around Christian Social Concerns.
- 8. THE WORK OF THIS BOARD FOR THIS QUADRENNIUM has been well received and very fruitful. We have no special measuring device to tell us statistically the success of our work. We have promoted and pursued the programs of Christian Social Concerns and strengthened the relationship with many local churches. We do know that we have touched the lives of more people each conference year. The members have developed an excellent working relationship and demonstrated a deep sense of Christian dedication. I am honored to be a member of this board and a high privilege to have been chairman of this Board for the past four years.

Resolutions

The Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns approved the following resolutions and submits them to the Annual Conference for its consideration:

1. We commend the plan of the Nixon Administration to withdraw our troops from Viet Nam. In the name of the Prince of Peace we ask that

our nation continue to move in the area of negotiation and reconciliation to bring all the tragic warfare in Southeast Asia to a speedy end. We call upon all churchmen to be ready and eager to take calculated risks for peace, and to be as diligent and sacrificial in the pursuit of peace as nations have been in the prosecution of war. We urge all churches and Christians to undergird all strategy and plans for peace with prayer.

- 2. Whereas Florida has a growing population of Spanish speaking persons, many of whom have very limited knowledge of English, and Whereas, it has come to our attention that some of our courts do not provide interpreters for such persons, Be it resolved that members of the United Methodist Church in Florida be encouraged to investigate this matter in their communities and seek remedies where needed so that justice may prevail.
- 3. În light of an established conference priority to work toward alleviation of economic exploitation, poverty and racism, and in the interest of implementing this goal, we urge that the United Methodist Program Council and every local church work to provide equal employment without regard to race, color, sex, age or national origin.
- 4. Whereas, this conference referred the matter of Project Equality to this Board for study and report its findings, and Whereas Project Equality does not have a regional office in the Southeast and Whereas we have not been able to obtain any estimate of the cost to affiliate; Therefore, be it resolved that no affiliation with Project Equality is recommended; Be it further resolved that the Board of Christian Social Concerns continue its study for future consideration, and to seek the establishment of a regional office of Project Equality in this area.
- 5. Whereas, we are concerned about the welfare and living conditions of the farm workers, and Whereas, we realize the gross injustices in the migrant communities, and the trauma which will be experienced by both grower and worker in the necessary efforts to bargain for better wages, better working and living conditions, Be it resolved that growers be urged to talk with workers and their leaders and make new and dramatic moves to bring about equal treatment for persons in this segment of our society; that we urge workers to respond cooperatively and positively to all efforts toward resolving their many problems in a just and peaceable manner. We further recommend forums be set up throughout the area to hear both grower and worker, and to cooperate with them in resolving this continuing critical problem.
- 6. Whereas the Discipline of the United Methodist Church forbids the use of Church property and facilities for the operation of private segregated schools, and Whereas because busing and a unitary public school system has become a political hassle, a few churches have heretofore become directly or indirectly involved in permitting segregated schools on and in United Methodist Church property, Therefore, be it resolved that the Presiding Bishop and the Cabinet be urged to take steps, including seeking injunctive relief if necessary, to see that all of our churches in Florida Conference are in compliance with the disciplinary requirements on this matter by September, 1972.

COMMISSION ON ECUMENICAL AFFAIRS AND DELEGATION TO THE FLORIDA COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

I

The foremost task of the Commission this year has been that of encouraging and assisting every United Methodist pastor and congregation to cooperate with other churches affiliated with the Consultation on Church Union in the study of and response to the COCU A Plan of Union for the Church of Christ Uniting. The Commission has given aid in this endeavor through brochures, articles, forums, seminars, workshops, distribution of materials, and personal advice and counsel. Efforts have been made to satisfy every local church request made of the Commission in regard to this study. Responses from Florida Conference United Methodist pastors, members, groups, and churches were due April 1, 1972, and a report of the total Conference response will be released at the 1972 session of the Annual Conference.

The Commission has continued to aid local churches in setting up a beginning organization and program in the Work Area of Ecumenical Affairs.

The Commission has made plans for a complete reorganization of the Conference Commission on Ecumenical Affairs and the United Methodist Delegation to the Florida Council of Churches which for the most part have been one and the same organization. The 1971 Annual Conference authorized two separate agencies beginning with the 1972-76 quadrennium.

The Commission has also made efforts in interpreting the work and ministries of the World Council of Churches in the wake of recent criticism. Efforts have been made to respond to every inquiry.

We wish to commend Mrs. Bruce Gray upon her election to the office of President-Elect of the Florida Council of Churches, the first woman to be the President in the history of the Council. We extend our appreciation to twenty-five United Methodist laymen and clergy who serve on the various agencies of the Council.

II

The Commission wishes to propose a four-point program for 1973:

1. We reissue the call to every local pastor and congregation to cooperate with other Consultation churches in initiating studies of the *Plan of Union* even though the deadline for official response is now past. The Commission feels that should the *Plan* not ever be approved and implemented that the interchurch fellowship, study, and mutual search would be a remarkable experience in Christian discipleship and one of great potential to local mission and service.

2. We call our Conference and its respective churches and agencies toward a larger ecumenism in the State of Florida, encouraging interchurch cooperation and sharing in every area and level of church life, including a fellowship of ecumenical officers of denominational judicatories throughout the State, in cooperation with the Commission on Christian Unity of the Florida Council of Churches.

3. We call upon our churches to cooperate fully in the Annual Conference ecumenical evangelistic priority program "Key-73".

4. We encourage our churches to respond to the needs of Florida Christian Migrant Ministry with volunteer services, donations of material resources, and offerings.

BOARD OF EDUCATION (LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT)

REPORT NO. 1

The Conference Board of Education through its Committee on Leadership Development, Committee on Settings and Groupings, Committee on Use of United Methodist Curriculum Materials, Committee on Certification of Directors of Christian Education, Committee on Certification of Directors of Music, Commission on Higher Education and Campus Ministry and the Trustees has made many significant achievements this conference year, as listed in other sections of this Journal, in the areas of Church School Teacher Training, Sunday School Attendance, Seminars, Laboratories, Christian Workers' Schools, Workshops, Enrichment Schools and other training enterprises.

In this section of the Board's Report just one aspect of leadership development will be lifted up in detail—that of Sunday School teacher training.

Fourteen churches of the Gainesville District together identified the following needs:

1. Participation 2. Attendance 3. Teacher reaction to smart aleck re-marks 4. Resources for hard situations 5. Teach Bible—emphasis 6. Feel the publication Real is for urban areas 7. Roots: Learn the Faith before relating 8. Younger children-seems that the vocabulary is too advanced in the materials 9. Group sharing session 10. Direction-Plan and Purpose-How one grows in the Christian tradition 11. Laboratory situation: Have actual teaching and learning situations 12. Parental involvement in at-tendance 13. Ways to interpret 14. Selection of material 15. Use of music and creative activities 16. Invite one of top men from Nashville to hear final evaluation of program 17. Pre-packets-instant solutions

The emerging goal was as follows:

"14 participating churches will have five Tuesday 7:30 P.M. meetings of Sunday's School Teachers for the purpose of planning for teaching of the next Sundays' lessons and evaluating the teaching of last Sunday's lessons beginning September 12 and ending October 10, with the date October 17 to be set as an evaluation session conducted by editors of the General Board of Publications-all meetings to be held at First United Methodist Church, Ocala."

Conference Staff, General Board of Education Publication Editors and local Certified Leaders over the conference agreed to conduct training sessions for church school teachers for the following levels: Wesley Series, Kindergarten; Wesley Series, Elementary I-II, III-IV, V-VI; Youth 7-8, Explore, 9-10 New Creation, 11-12 Real; Youth Fellowship; Adult; Administration.

The results of the Ocala and Ft. Lauderdale Sunday School Teacher Training Pilot Projects will be utilized to best advantage throughout all districts in the Florida Conference.

COMMISSION ON HIGHER EDUCATION AND CAMPUS MINISTRY

Program Recommendations

1. That each district superintendent appoint a district secretary of Higher Education and Campus Ministry to be responsible for keeping before all churches in the districts all of the concerns of its colleges, its Wesley Foundation campus ministries and seminaries.

2. That each local church elect a secretary of Higher Education and

Campus Ministry to be responsible for these concerns in the local church and to recommend financial support for this work through the work area on education, work area on missions and work area on stewardship and finance.

3. That the Florida Conference of the United Methodist Church continue as a minimum goal \$2 per member for colleges and 50ϕ per member for campus ministry, as its financial support.

4. That adjusted long-range financial projections be submitted as soon as possible for all higher education and campus ministry support.

5. That United Methodist campus ministry units in the Florida Conference continue their practice of full cooperation with other communions on their campuses in varying combinations of coordinated or unified ministries as far as personnel and facilities indicate that this strengthens the respective ministry; and that ecumenical ministries be entered into only upon written agreements between communions involved.

6. That Student-Young Adult Study Projects be continued through this quadrennium and that community junior college and metropolitan strategy and ministry receive particular attention.

7. That the Advisory Councils for Florida Southern College and Bethune-Cookman College be continued and commended for their good work.

8. That established Boards/and Agencies be requested to continue to provide through their several groups and programs such as Lay Retreats, the Women's Society of Christian Service meeting and district meetings, opportunities to present the crucial questions facing the church in its mission in higher education and campus ministry in an effort to secure maximum local church thinking in determining future directions.

Campus Ministry in Florida was characterized during 1971 by an upsurge in interest and participation at all major installations on the campuses of Florida State and Florida A&M Universities, at the University of Florida, University of South Florida, Florida Atlantic University, University of Miami, and also at our church-related schools, Bethune-Cookman College. Florida Southern College and Stetson University. In addition more limited ministry continued on the campuses of the University of Tampa, Florida Tech University, Rollins College, New College, Florida Presbyterian College, Jacksonville University and Florida Memorial College. Cooperative work with ecumenical programming, financing and staffing is developing in the areas where community colleges are located. In the Melbourne, Cocoa area is a good example where the Catholic Newman House was renamed a Center For Campus Ministry, near Florida Tech Institute, where all faiths work out of the same center.

Another development during the year was the cooperative study projects by all denominations in the Metropolitan areas of Jacksonville, where the new North Florida University will open in 1973, and Greater Miami where the Florida International University will open the same year, to evaluate the most effective and economical means of providing, cooperatively ministry among the schools and churches of these larger university communities.

Shared observations where ministry is already established and where planning is taken place were:

(1) positive and supportive relations between schools and churches (2) encouraging ecumenical cooperation, (3) an increased interest in religion manifested in excitement about spiritual experiences and intellectual growth.

Florida Southern College

The College opened its academic year on Friday, September 3, 1971. Bishop James W. Henley was the preacher for the opening worship service which was held in Branscomb Memorial Auditorium on Sunday, September 5. The academic year concluded on Sunday, May 7, 1972 with the Commencement Service.

The College opened with 1,388 full-time students and 124 part-time students. (The figures a year ago were 1,344 and 92.) In addition, eight of our students were studying abroad as compared with five last year. A total of 326 students were graduated during the year: 31 received degrees on August 6, 1971 and 295 received degrees on May 7, 1972. (The figures a year ago were 329: 44 in August and 285 in May.)

Deaths in the College family during the past year included the following trustees: L. Day Edge, Spessard L. Holland, William H. Melvin and Mrs. E. T. Roux.

The Enrollment 1971-1972:

1,388 full-time students and 92 part-time students were enrolled for the 1971-1972 academic year. The opening full-time enrollment increased by 44 from the opening enrollment of 1970-71. The number of day students increased by 13, and the number of dormitory students increased by 31.

Enrollment by states revealed that Florida continues to have the largest number of students attending the College. Over 76% of the students from Florida reside in the following counties: Brevard, Broward, Dade, Duval, Hillsborough, Orange, Palm Beach, Pinellas, and Polk. Approximately 40% of the 1,388 students enrolled are affiliated with The United Methodist Church. 64% of those admitted to the College in 1971-72 were ranked in the top 40% of their high school graduating class.

Enrollment for 1972-1973

Last year 80% of those eligible to pre-register (1,005) actually returned (808). The same percentage this year (80% of 1,054 who are eligible to pre-register) would give us 843 students returning. At this time we now expect 425 new students to enroll. At the same time last year we expected 374.

The number of applications received shows no appreciable change from a year ago. Barring a possible increase in cancellations, the projected enrollment for the fall of 1972 should be at least 1,350.

Scholarships:

Scholarships are increasingly vital to many of our young people today. Due to the general slowdown in the economy during 1970 and in the first few months of this year, a rise in unemployment, and the scarcity of summer jobs for students, there was an increase of approximately 6% in the number of students who demonstrated financial need.

Funds available from the State in the form of teacher scholarships and

scholarships from the Board of Regents have been reduced by approximately 35% due to the Legislature making all first year students ineligible for these programs. The funds available from federal sources under the National Defense Student Loan Program, the Work-Study Program and the Educational Opportunity Grant Program declined slightly in amount this year over last year.

During the past year \$66,515 has been received in scholarship funds. Included in this figure is \$10,400 received in current or endowment funds for scholarships during the same period.

R.O.T.C.:

Prior to the end of the last academic year, the decision was made to end mandatory participation in R.O.T.C. Our Professor of Military Science felt there would be as much to be gained by such an action as there was to be lost. He also felt there would be sufficient, voluntary participation to merit the Department of the Army maintaining the program at Florida Southern College.

The transition to a voluntary program has been a smooth one, and student and faculty support have been excellent. When compared to the experience of other colleges which have changed from a mandatory to a voluntary R.O.T.C. program, we did much better in enrollment of sophomores and entering freshmen. 31 juniors enrolled in the Advanced Course. A total of 118 students were in the program in addition to 23 from Polk Community College.

Bethune-Cookman Exchange Program:

The Bethune-Cookman and Florida Southern College Cooperative Program in Education is a grant involving Florida Southern assisting Bethune-Cookman as a developing institution to develop better ways to equip a teacher to teach in a multi-ethnic situation. Bethune-Cookman handles all the funds, and Dr. Roane at Bethune-Cookman is the Director of the Program.

Most of last year was spent in organization and planning. The Colleges presented several seminars, student exchanges and, on several occasions, used faculty exchanges as visiting lecturers between the two schools. Dr. Elizabeth Teigland is the Florida Southern coordinator of this program. This program has become so successful that several leading educators have suggested that Dr. Teigland introduce such a program on their campus.

The concept of a student exchange program could be beneficial in Sociology and/or Government as well as in Education, and possibilities exist that these areas might be developed if a "developing institution" grant can be obtained.

Women's Society of Christian Service Scholarship:

Continuing a program begun in 1969-1970, the Florida Annual Conference Women's Society of Christian Service awarded a scholarship to Miss Ruth Frey through an exchange student arrangement with Isabella Thoburn College in Lucknow, India.

Festival of Fine Arts Series:

This series continues the excellent tradition of the former Concert-Lecture Series and brings outstanding programs to the campus for enjoyment and enrichment of both the student and civic communities. A similar series is being planned for 1972-1973.

Student Government Association:

The President of the Student Government Association was elected as an advisory trustee at the meeting of the Board of Trustees last Spring.

Campus Improvements:

Many improvements to the residence units were made during the past year particularly in the area of remodelled bathrooms. A new bakery room and added equipment improved the Cafeteria facilities. The Gilbert Building was converted to serve as a modern, dual purpose building—gymnastics and R.O.T.C.

Partners in Education Campaign:

The Campaign for Florida Southern College and Bethune-Cookman College, which received final approval at the meeting of the Florida Annual Conference last June, is progressing. As the organizational work progressed, it became apparent quite early that the canvassing of the entire state could not be completed before the end of the calendar year 1972. Most of the Districts, however, will be completed by the end of June.

50th Anniversary in Lakeland:

As the College observed the 87th anniversary of its founding, it also celebrated the 50th anniversary of its move to the city of Lakeland. The City and the College joined hands in celebration and provided an unusual and effective Founders' Week observance in February.

Service to the Florida Annual Conference:

Faculty and staff members of Florida Southern College are happy to be of assistance within the Conference whenever possible. During the past year mary have preached or spoken in churches of the Conference at the invitation of the host pastor. In addition, the College is well represented in churches in the Lakeland area where its personnel are serving on administrative boards, as Sunday School teachers, members of Chancel Choirs, advisers o youth groups, and in other areas of responsibility.

The students, too, are happy to represent the College to the Conference and have particularly done so through the traveling groups: The Vagabonds with their chancel drama presentations; the Concert Choir which has sung for both morning and evening services as well as on tour; the Handbell Choir which has proven a very popular group, and the Concert Band which also had a very successful tour. The opportunity presented in such performances for the students and the members of the Conference to meet each other and become acquainted is a privileged one. It is hoped that even more such opportunities can be presented in the future. Any inquiry concerning the scheduling of one of the performing arts groups should be addressed to The Reverend Jack C. Bethune-Cookman College

Bethune-Cookman College is proud of its association with the Florida Conference of The United Methodist Church, and is happy to report to the 1972 Session of the Florida Annual Conference as we conclude our 68th successful year of service.

Enrollment of the College during the 1971-72 academic year was 1,219 students. Eighty-five per cent were from the State of Florida. I am sure you know it is a rare college these days that is not in serious financial straits, and none of the colleges are hurting more than the small ones, the private ones, the church-related ones and the black ones. So, all of the small, private, church-related black colleges are greatly challenged financially. The 1971-72 current operating budget for Bethune-Cookman College was \$3,107,889.67.

The academic year began on August 29, 1971, with the Faculty Pre-Planning Conference. We have sixty-two full-time Faculty members and six part-time instructors. Forty per cent hold the earned Doctorate Degree, and no teacher has less than the earned Master's Degree. The Faculty-Student ratio is 1:19.

The James E. and Florence Davis Residence Hall for Women was completed at the cost of \$850,000.00, and houses 192 women, with appropriate counselling, recreational and lounging facilities. The Harrison Rhodes Memorial Library is now being renovated and remodelled at a cost of \$250,000.00 and will house the Social Science Division, since the Carl S. Swisher Library was completed and occupied on May 15, 1971.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

Total membership in United Methodist Churches in the Florida Annual Conference has been increasing each year for many years, but for the last 10 years this increase has been at a declining rate. In 1970 the increase was only 445. This trend was reversed in 1971, however, by a net increase in membership in the amount of 1,257, making for a total Conference membership as of December 31, 1971, of 317,467. Total additions in 1971 amounted to 23,441. This figure includes 7,641 received by Profession of Faith and Restored, 11,809 by transfer from other United Methodist Churches, and 3,991 from Other Denominations. Total removed in 1971 was 22,184, of which 3,730 were by death, 7,322 by transfer to other United Methodist Churches, 2,558 to other denominations, and 8,574 by action of the Charge Conference and withdrawal.

The figures written above are meaningless unless they can be understood in relationship to individual lives whose directions have been altered, in whom a new consciousness as to life's meaning has been brought about, and whose relationships to others have been enriched through fellowship and service.

The slight upward turn in membership growth is a source of some encouragement, but in a State that is experiencing a dramatic population increase, this growth is much less than could be expected. Explanations as to why this failure to keep pace with the population expansion will vary with the perspective of the observer: an affluent culture, an increasingly materialistic philosophy, an unsettled and disturbed public mood brought about by rapid change, a church membership that is confused, apathetic, restless, the involvement of the church in controversial issues such as those which deal with social justice, racial brotherhood, the Vietnam War, international affairs, the plight of the poor, etc.

It is the local church where the major battle is taking place and the above conditions are making their impact. But it is also in the local church that God continues to meet his people and call them to a life of loving service to both friend and enemy.

The Conference Board of Evangelism has sought to serve the local church and its ministers in the following ways:

1. Assisted in planning and staffing the 1971 International School of Christian Mission.

2. Planned and carried out an overnight Seminar for ministers in their first and second years of pastoral appointment.

3. Conducted training session for 45 ministers to serve as New Life Missioners.

4. Planned and carried out in cooperation with Conference Council Staff the Bishop's Convocation for Confirmation Classes at Branscomb Memorial Auditorium at Florida Southern College.

5. Provided training opportunities for District Secretaries of Evangelism and other members of the Executive Committee at the Candler Camp Meeting and Southeastern School of Evangelism at Lake Junaluska.

6. Maintained liaison with United Methodist leadership in the field of

evangelism by representation at the New Orleans meeting of the Congress on Evangelism.

7. Maintained liaison with the Conference Advisory Committee on Lay Renewal.

8. Worked through District Secretaries to assist local churches in various fields of evangelism. DONALD M. MACKAY, Chairman

LAY PASTORS FELLOWSHIP

The Annual meeting of the Lay Pastors Fellowship was held at the lunch hour on Wednesday June 7, 1972 in the Collegiate Room with the President Willie Limbric presiding. There were twenty-nine members present.

The Rev. W. S. Bozeman, Chairman of the Board of Ministry and the Rev. Edison Russell also of the Board were present to counsel and guide the Lay Pastors.

We were delighted to have Bishop and Mrs. Henley drop in to share

with us words of encouragement as he spoke on the life of a Lay Pastor. On 'Thursday June 8 the Fellowship met at 1:45 P.M., Room 202, Branscomb, for the selection of the Outstanding Lay Pastor and election of officers.

The Annual Award of the "Lay Pastor of the Year" was presented to the Rev. RAY O'FERRELL of the Gainesville District.

Officers elected for the years 1972-74 were Carroll Brooks, President; Fred Sampson, Vice President, and Richard Campbell, Secretary-Treasurer. The new officers were installed and meeting adjourned.

BOARD OF HEALTH AND WELFARE MINISTRIES

This Board had an active year in 1971. Two meetings of the full board were held with several important items transacted that relate to the in-stitutions and agencies that come under this board: The Children's Home, Methodist Hospital in Jacksonville, and the four retirement facilities: As-bury Towers, Biscayne Manor, Sunny Shores Villas, and Wesley Manor. We are glad to report that all these agencies have had a good year and their financial conditions greatly improved. Individual reports of some of these agencies will be made to this conference.

Some of our board activities have included:

(1) A workshop for all District Directors of Health and Welfare Ministries was held at Enterprise in November. Dr. John Norwood of the General Board of H & W Ministries was the resource leader.

(2) We sent Rev. Ray Boegen to the Jurisdictional workshop for Ministry to the Retarded and in turn he conducted two workshops in Florida on this subject.

(3) We actively participated in the Southeastern Methodist Agency For the Retarded. Rev. John Hires and Mr. Norman James ably represented us in this important work.

(4) We distributed hundreds of copies of our brochure "Because We Care," telling the story of our six agencies.

Board of H. & W. Ministries Recommendations for 1973

A. On-going Program:

That this Board hold the following workshops: (1) For District Directors of H. & W. Ministries. (2) For teachers and workers with the retarded.

That we continue to distribute our brochure telling the pertinent information about the agencies under our board.

B. New Program:

(1) That we conduct a program known as "Think Of The Retarded", an intensive support and training for leadership, plus promotion and publicity to make persons aware of the facts concerning mental retardation and the need for ministries to these persons and their families.

(2) That we approve plans for the expanding and improvement of the physical plant of Biscayne Manor to conform to the standards of Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services, Division of Health of Florida. These plans are to be presented in complete terms by time of the Annual Conference in June of 1972.

(3) That we approve plans outlined in the report of the Florida United Methodist Children's Home.

(4) That we approve plans for the building of a Retirement Village to be supervised and managed by the United Methodist Retirement Center, Inc., of Tampa, Florida. Such retirement village is to conform to the standards of the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services, Division of Health of Florida. Such retirement village is financed from private enterprise and not incur any financial assistance from the United Methodist Retirement Center, Inc., or upon the Florida Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church.

Ministries to the Mentally Retarded

Present Program

A program was outlined by the Program Committee of SEMAR that was designed to sensitize the church to the needs of the retarded and to involve the church in actual "direct service ministries" to the retarded and their families. The program has three facets: (1) Education; (2) Delivery of Services; and (3) Funding of these programs and services.

(1) In the first three years of operation, some type of educational enterprise on "The Church and Mental Retardation" has been or is currently being carried on/or planned in eight of the states in the Jurisdiction.

(2) In the area of the Delivery of Services, SEMAR has helped develop programs for more than 500 retarded persons in day training centers with budgets totalling more than \$1 million dollars, of which the church has approximately \$30,000-church dollars invested.

(3) SEMAR has sought funds needed to match these federal funds from foundations, city and county commissioners, united given organizations, and state agencies. A little over \$200,000 has been raised annually to provide the base for these IV-A programs serving some 500 retarded persons. Application has been made for funding in two states for programs under the new Developmental Disabilities Services Act.

Proposed Program

With the Church's growing awareness of the presence of the mentally retarded in our communities (3% of our population, though in deprived areas this figure may be as high as 7-11%). The Board of Trustees of SEMAR is proposing a new program for the forthcoming Quadrennium to be known as *THINK RETARDED*. We want the total church to *THINK* of the *RETARDED*, and ways by which the church may not only *THINK* of the *RETARDED*, but may become involved in ministering to them and their families. We are asking each Annual Conference Board of Health and Welfare Ministries in the Jurisdiction to adopt this program in the Quadrennium, beginning in 1972.

Beginning at the 1972 Annual Conference session, a concentrated effort will be made through the planned distribution of programed promotional material designed to impact the Annual Conference with the *need* to *THINK* of the *RETARDED*. Material is being prepared for distribution at the Annual Conference session which will articulate ways in which, if a church wants to *THINK* of the *RETARDED* and translate their thinking into action, they may minister to the needs of the retarded and their families.

There are a great many programs which may be carried on by a local church in the community.

Many of these ministries may be carried out with a minimum of cost to a congregation. For example, recreation programs for the retarded may be carried out with volunteer staff with only cost being that of utilities, and a minimal amount of staff time to coordinate and/or direct the program. A few programs become costly, such as day training or adult activity programs for the retarded. Increasingly, the church is being seen as a viable partner in programing for the retarded and operating funds are becoming available for which the church is an eligible and welcome applicant. These include funds for "foster grandparent programs," etc.

Follow Up Material

"How-To" materials are being written and will be available in addition to the basic brochure which will be distributed at Annual Conference and which outline in general what a church may do if it wants to provide ministries to the retarded. These materials will detail the various types of programs such as church school classes, day training services, adult activity centers. recreation programs, etc. which the church may want to provide indicating where information materials and possible public funds may be secured to help underwrite, in addition to church funds, the cost of such programs.

THE FLORIDA UNITED METHODIST CHILDREN'S HOME, INC. REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES TO THE FLORIÐA ANNUAL CONFERENCE THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

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On your behalf, and with resources you largely provided, the Florida United Methodist Children's Home, Inc., has served 211 children and youth and has provided planning and counseling services to a large number of families. There were 231 formal applications for service received, and many additional inquiries concerning the possibility of service. 51,376 days of care were provided in the group care, foster home and pre-adoptive placement services. Seven adoptions for older children were completed.

We believe in taking services to the people when possible. A full-time regional office with a qualified caseworker is now in operation in the Tampa Bay Region. This office provides referral service, counseling to prevent family breakdown, and receives applications for all our services. Other such regional offices are hoped for in the future as we diligently seek to serve persons in need.

A new approach to problem solving for disturbed teenagers has been placed in operation on our campus in the form of a peer pressure group. Blanton Cottage was chosen for this project with ten teenage boys, and soon a similar program for girls will begin in Randall Cottage. The high school girls' Group Home continues to render helpful service in establishing independence for girls who will soon move out into the community. Friends of the late Rowland and Sarah Shannon will be pleased to learn

Friends of the late Rowland and Sarah Shannon will be pleased to learn that a cottage on our campus has been named in their memory. We are happy to announce that Mrs. George A. Wright, a member of First United Methodist Church of Pompano Beach, has contributed \$75,000.00 for construction of a children's cottage on our campus at Enterprise.

We are also pleased to announce that a "Chapel Building Fund" has been opened with our Conference Foundation in Lakeland, using a gift of \$500.00 from Mrs. J. N. Ramey of First United Methodist Church of Miami, to establish the fund. This was quickly followed by a letter from First Urited Methodist Church of St. Petersburg, indicating that \$25,000.00 for chapel furnishings has been set aside.

Support from the churches of the Conference has been splendid. Total church giving through Fifth Sunday and Christmas offerings was \$408,333.00 for a much improved per capita giving of \$1.29. Our "Goal for Giving" was \$1.50 per member for 1971. The entire Tallahassee and Sarasota Districts reached this goal and four others came near. Again this year, Dr. Frank A. Reynolds of Bunnell distinguished himself by donating \$12,141.00 in dental services. Dr. Ashton A. Almand is available for speaking engagements in your churches and in civic organizations, and will arrange visits for your groups who wish to see the campus firsthand.

The appearance of our campus has been greatly enhanced, and the spirit of our service focused, by the erection of a 40-foot high lighted cross, standing on cut marble, and surrounded by brick planters and benches. The 88,000.00 spent for this was a special gift of Mrs. Kathleen Macomber of First United Methodist Church of St. Petersburg.

The Trustees respectfully request the return of Bascom W. Carlton as Superintendent, for his 20th year, and of Ashton A. Almand as Director of Development.

We request of the Conference that the present plan of financing be continued, whereby each church would remit the Church School offering, and the loose (undesignated) offering from morning worship each Fifth Sunday and at Christmas.

It would be our plan in 1973 to continue these aspects of the present program:

- 1. Group Care on the campus (including the Sarah Hunt Division) which would include the Group Home for High School Girls, a peer pressure cottage for boys and a peer pressure cottage for girls, some family style cottages and some cottages for boys and some for girls.
- 2. Foster home care, using some free foster homes and making minimum board payments to others. An agency-subsidized foster home is within our present budget but not in operation only because we have been unable to find a suitable family who are sufficiently interested.
- 3. Adoptive Services, still specializing in the older child, and particularly for those who become adoptable while already under our care.
- 4. Home Care, or Aftercare, for children and their families who need our services for planning and counseling while the children remain at home.
- 5. A full-time Regional Office in the Tampa Bay area, offering access to all the above services, specializing in counseling to prevent family breakdown and providing appropriate referral service.

Financial support for all this program would be under the regular budget of the Home and we would look to the Fifth Sunday and Christmas offerings from the Conference to underwrite the budget. It is anticipated that such a budget in 1973 might be \$594,569.00, using as a guideline a five per cent increase over the budget for 1972.

It would be our plan in 1973 to work toward:

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- 1. Establishment of a half-time Regional Office in Tallahassee and a halftime Regional Office in Jacksonville. The cost of this would be approximately \$16,000.00, and the churches of the Conference would be challenged to underwrite this through increased Fifth Sunday and Christmas offerings.
- 2. To move the Group Home for High School Girls from the campus to DeLand. The present operating budget would prevail and the additional expense would be a house. If such a house is built, the cost of constructing and furnishing it might be \$50,000.00. It is possible that a house might be rented, or it is possible that a house might come to us by gift of some individual. It is not projected to ask the Conference for a special building program in 1973.
- 3. To recruit and establish two additional agency-subsidized foster homes at an approximate cost of \$4,000.00. This would be included in our budget and a special appropriation would not be requested from the Conference.

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BOARD OF MISSIONS

Your Board of Missions takes seriously the proclamation of our Lord to "go into all the world. . . ." We believe "all the world" begins at our own doorstep and keeps moving on to the outer reaches of the earth. Thus diversity is the key word in the work of the Board of Missions.

In the area of rural work, the Board encouraged and aided in the preparation for a Seminar on Town and Country Ministries. A strong effort has been made to get larger parish ministries started.

This year the Board has been concerned with many needs of our former Central Jurisdictional churches. Loans have been made to churches in the amount of over \$150,000.

The Board has attempted to be helpful as an enabler in the area of Mission Action Ministries. These range from work in inner-city situations to rural church extension. Some of the work is experimental, some of it is in racially changing neighborhoods and portions of this work deal with Spanish concerns in our state. The total allotted for these ministries was \$24,000.

The National Division of the General Board of Missions, through your Conference Board, has undergirded major programs in our Conference such as Spanish Ministry, Christian Community Centers in Tampa, Miami, Key West, Jacksonville, Ft. Lauderdale. The United Methodist Hospital in Jacksonville received funds as well as the St. Paul School in Tampa. The cost of these ministries has been \$210,000.

Advance giving this year has increased. World Advance giving was \$199,853. National Advance giving for Spanish Ministry was \$51,417. and National all other was \$35,933. for a total of \$87,350. for all National Advance giving.

United Methodist Overseas Relief sharing came to \$56,850. Conference Advance giving was exceptional. District Church Extension received \$343,-262. and all other Conference Advance giving came to \$119,874. Conference Advance giving for 1971 was \$65,110. more than the previous year. All Advance giving came to \$807,189. or \$62,174. more than the year before.

Close to \$5,000. was given in answer to the appeal for the "Bicycle Fund" for Africe. Fifty churches were involved in this program.

Support for our national and overseas missionaries was strengthened by a display poster which was shared with the local churches. Pictures of the missionaries supported by Florida were featured on the posters.

Your Conference Board of Missions is greatly indebted to Dr. Melton Ware, who, in addition to all his other responsibilities as Conference Program Director, has been of immeasurable help to the Board. Rev. Marvin Sweat and the twelve District Missionary Secretaries have provided guidance, creative ideas and an impetus of Christian concern to get the many tasks of the Board accomplished.

A very special thanks must be expressed on behalf of the Board members for the work of the Board secretary, Rev. Victor Hitchcock. Record keeping is a major necessity for a Board such as ours. Victor has given endless hours of time in taking and recording minutes. Your Board could not have functioned without his careful and painstaking work.

I am grateful for every officer and member of the Board. All have shared in a labor of love. A. A. HEDBERG

BOARD OF THE LAITY

Since this is my last report as President of The Board of The Laity and Conference Lay Leader, it seems appropriate for me to include a few remarks concerning my seven years in this position of high responsibility and, certainly, to make some well-deserved acknowledgments.

Acknowledgments

I am deeply grateful for the privilege of serving as Lay Leader for the Florida Conference since July, 1966. It has provided the opportunity for So, to all of my friends and colleagues in *The Cause*: I say thank you for your help. Many have been involved as we have tried to carry out the responsibilities assigned to us. It isn't possible to list each by name, but to all the district, associate, and local church lay leaders, to all the district superintendents and clergy, to Clare Cotton and Edd Gentry, who encouraged and worked for me from the beginning; to Glenn Gold, Hubert Talton, Louis Roberson, Campbell Thornal, and Fred Noble for their continuing encouragement; to Warren Willis, Ray Redstone, Jack Inman and so many more for their behind the scenes service at Leesburg; to The Executive Committee: O. B. Fanning, Norman Pounds, John Sargeant, Charles Babcock, John Morris, M. L. Turbeville, William Furr, Gus Lyle, Ed Boardman, Jim Jones, John Grant, Richard Moore, Ethel Gray, and Olive Watson; to my pastors during this period: Ralph Huston, Jiles Kirkland and Leo King; and to Bishop Henley. His interest in spreading the Christian Message, his love and understanding and his advice and counsel have meant a great deal to me and to the program we've tried to present.

Accomplishments

These have been exciting years in which to serve. There have been some accomplishments. For one thing, we have survived. These were years of

much criticism from without and within the Church, years of extremism from some quarters and of turmoil and of tension and frustrations from others. I think it is fair to say that, while there are areas unfulfilled, we have, through the unselfish attitude that prevailed among us because of God's presence in our lives, been active participants in the Spiritual Revival that has become a reality. It was, and is, my prayer that His will be done. It was, and is, my hope that whatever has been done has resulted in a larger number of deeply committed Christian disciples and a strengthening of the local church.

I have mentioned the unselfish attitude of those on the Board of Laity. This has been apparent on every hand, but no place any more than when we were involved in the merger with E.U.B. and Central Jurisdiction. The Spirit of God makes all things a joyful possibility.

Primary emphasis during the years that I have been the Conference Lay Leader has been in the area of spiritual renewal. The primary effort in this regard was the Leesburg Retreat. For seven successive years, four weekends have been completely sold out and more and more this Retreat became a totally spiritual experience with opportunity for total commitment each weekend. The Lay Witness Mission, the Ten Brave Christian movement, and the small prayer and study group have all been significant factors in our efforts to encourage prayer and love in all activities of our church. Other aims were:

(1) More participation in inter-denominational activities; I attended four Presidential Prayer Breakfasts as the representative for the Board of Laity of Florida, participated in numerous other types of inter-denominational activities made possible because I was the Conference Lay Leader;

(2) Improvement of relationship between clergy and laity;(3) Increasing interests in Florida Southern, Bethune-Cookman and Emory;

(4) Improving relationship with the Women's Society of Christian Service.

Insufficiences

Much remains to be done. Our vision has not always been broad enough. At times intimidation, emotions, prejudice and envy have influenced our decisiors. Despite increasing interest in things spiritual, those sins that Jesus talked about-materialism, hate, selfishness-are increasingly alarming. We have spent too little on radio and television. We have almost completely ignored the greatest social problem of our time, whiskey. We, too, even the leadership of our church, have at times put our life and faith in man-made laws and principles, forgetting that Christ is everlasting. He doesn't have to be "improved" every year like soap or toothpaste. There's much to be done!

I want to express my appreciation for progress made to the District Directors of Methodist Men and District Lay Leaders and to the many concerned and truly committed men who have given of their time and talents to assisting and spreading the Good News. Our real purpose, of course, is for each man involved to have an individual meaningful experience with the Lord.

1. In accord with paragraph 927 of the Book of Discipline we recommend that travel and other allowances be reported separately from the ministers salary.

2. Because the payment of an adequate salary is the first responsibility of a local church to its minister, we require a church receiving minimum salary funds to combine its present salary and travel allowance to meet the necessary requirements of the Commission on Minimum Salary. Furthermore, we recommend that after a church has met the requirements of the Commission on Minimum Salary it consult the pastor about his actual travel expense in that parish and fix an adequate amount to cover the cost of the use and maintenance of an automobile in his work. This is in accordance with the recommendation of the Manual for the Pastor-Parish Relation Committee, pages 10 and 11.

3. To become a claimant a man must live in the bounds of his parish, provided a home is made available, and give full time service to that charge. Studies pursued in an approved college or university are considered part of the work of the ministry if approved by the District Superintendent.

BOARD OF PENSIONS

We take this opportunity to express appreciation to the people of the Florida Conference for making it possible for us to meet in full all obligations to the pensioners at the established rate for the year 1971-'72, and to the Minister's Reserve Pension Fund for the same period.

Special recognition is in order for the excellent service of our secretary, Eldon Simmons, who is completing eight years on this board and four years in this office. He has carried the lion share of work and has been the stabilizing force through the last two years when three different chairmen were elected to the chief office—John Sikes, J. B. F. Williams and Waldo Farabee. The wise counsel and the supportive help of Dr. Henry Blackburn from the Council Staff deserves the highest of praise from all of us on the Board of Pensions.

BOARD OF PUBLICATION

The Board of Publication has completed a 2 year study to find a way and means to publish a conference newspaper. We have found the need to be for a weekly and to be sent to the present mailing list of The Florida Methodist. The cost will be in the range of what we can expect to be able to afford to do.

Many studies and bids have been asked for and the Board of Publication finds the best program to be one from The Texas Methodist. We can enter into this program and have a 4 page newspaper size weekly. Page 1 would be for the exclusive news of the Florida conference with the other 3 pages containing news of the General Conference, other conference news and also news of general religious interest.

From the time of preparation until actual delivery into the homes, there will be a 8 or 9 day period with corrections and additions being made on Mondays preceding publication thus reducing the time lapse to 3 or 4 days.

We believe that the members of the Annual Conference can vote more intelligibly if they can see and read the paper so we have been able to have a trial period in which time the paper will be sent from late April until the middle of June.

The Board of Publication hopes that the Annual Conference will vote to continue the publication of the "new" Florida Methodist newspaper. To publish the paper at the present number of mailings, we would need actual new monies of \$7,348 for the June 15 to December 31, 1972 period and actual new monies for 1973 of \$15,500. This actual new monies figure is over and above the monies presently allocated for the publication of *The Florida United Methodist*.

The news would be prepared in Lakeland and some 9 days later this would be in the homes of our people.

IMPORTANT ITEMS CONCERNING THE GROUP INSURANCE PLANS OF THE FLORIDA CONFERENCE

Group Health Insurance (Conference may share in the premium payments)

The Committee on Insurance has been aware for some time of the increasingly higher costs of health and hospitalization insurance and, also, the vital necessity to have this insurance coverage. After several months of careful deliberation, the Committee on Insurance has concluded that the time has come for the Florida Conference to share in the payment of the insurance premiums for the ministers and their families who are enrolled in the Florida Conference group health insurance plan. A recommendation from the Committee on Insurance, approved by the Conference Board of Pensions, will be made to the Florida Annual Conference in June, that beginning in 1973 the Florida Conference share in the payment of the quarterly health insurance premiums to the extent of 25% of the premiums paid by all members enrolled in the Florida Conference group health insurance plan.

Those who are not enrolled in the group health insurance plan with Time Insurance Company can make application for enrollment even if they have formerly been enrolled in the plan. These applicants, except for new men during their first 90 days in the conference, will have to furnish a statement of health history in order for the insurance carrier to determine eligibility or ineligibility. No one age 65 or older is eligible to enroll in this plan. (For the necessary application forms, please write Mr. R. A. Cumming, P. O. Box 5687, Jacksonville, Florida 32207.)

Group Life Insurance (Open enrollment Month of June, 1972)

Plans are now being formulated with Ministers Life and Casualty Union, the carrier for our Conference group life insurance plan, to set up an "open enrollment" the month of June, 1972, to allow the enrollment of active members of the Florida Conference, under age 65, who are not presently

enrolled. Physical examinations or statements of health history will not be required for this open enrollment period. However, at least 50% of all those who are currently eligible but not now enrolled would have to enroll in order for Ministers Life and Casualty Union to accept any of the new ap-plications. Those who would like to enroll during this "open enrollment" can do so during Annual Conference at a table that will be provided for the M.L.C.U. representative. As all of us know, this is a very fine supple-mental life insurance coverage. It costs only \$10.00 each quarter for each momber appelled with the helpes of the previous prior and from the member enrolled, with the balance of the premium being paid from the reserve fund accumulated under the former group life insurance program of the conference.

The Committee on Insurance urges all members of the Florida Conference, who are not enrolled in the group health and life insurance plans and who are under age 65, to give serious consideration to applying for enrollment. Both of these plans offer very good coverage at reasonable rates.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. The group health insurance program with Time Insurance Company, Milwaukee, be continued.
- 2. The group life insurance program with Ministers Life and Casualty Union, Minneapolis, be continued.
- 3. Conference participate in payment of the group health insurance premiums each quarter beginning 2-1-73.
- 4. Open enrollment in group life insurance program during June, 1972.

PENSION STUDY COMMITTEE REPORT 1972

On the attached schedule The General Board of Pensions has estimated the future annual costs for the years 1974 through 2004 for the present new entrant program of the Florida Conference and compared them with the annual costs of the proposed full transition program.

They have assumed an annuity rate of \$90 and an average salary of \$8700 would remain constant throughout the period for both programs so that the figures could be compared more easily. They have also assumed that the conference would contribute the full 12% of average salary for all members serving with annuity credit who are enrolled in the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund. The full transition costs assume 660 members will be enrolled for the 12% funding while the present new entrant costs assume an increasing number until a total of 660 are enrolled.

They have included the year 2004 to demonstrate that under the full transition program, the past service costs are to be paid over a 30-year period and in the 31st year which is 2004 the annual costs would drop sharply.

It would be of interest to note that the total annual costs for the full transition costs for the first 30 years of the program would be \$43,320,092. This includes the initial deposit of \$1,654,322 plus the 30 annual deposits of \$1,388,859 each. The total estimated costs of the present program for the same 30-year period would be \$45,868,790. Comparative totals for a longer period of time would result in an even greater difference because of the sharp drop in the full transition costs after the first 30 years. This demonstrates the effect of the interest earned by the higher contributions required under the full transition program during the early years.

Resolution by the Florida Conference Pension Study Committee

WHEREAS, The Florida Annual Conference since 1964 has enrolled new entrants in the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund which is administered by the General Board of Pensions of The United Methodist Church, and

WHEREAS, The Florida Annual Conference Board of Pensions for several years has been giving consideration to the possibility of enrolling all eligible ministers as participating members of The Ministers Reserve Pension Fund, and

WHEREAS, at the request of The Conference Board of Pensions the 1971 session of the Annual Conference elected a Pension Study Committee to pursue the possibility of full transition to the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund, constituted in the following manner: 3 members of the Board of Pensions, 2 members of the Cabinet, 2 from World Service (one of which is the chairman), 2 from the Board of the Laity (including the chairman), and the Bishop as Ex-Officio, and

WHEREAS, having met with two representatives of the General Board of Pensions on October 15, 1971, it is the considered judgment of your Pension Study Committee that ample opportunity should be given for the Annual Conference to study the plan of the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund and to become fully cognizant of the advantages of the Fund to both the individual minister and the Annual Conference;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED.

1. The Pension Study Committee is hereby requested to arrange an exclusive meeting in each of the twelve districts during the conference year 1972-73, constituted of the district superintendent, pastor(s), lay member(s), of the Annual Conference and any other interested lay people from each charge, the dates for such meetings to be scheduled by the Bishop and the Cabinet, and

2. Each meeting to be chaired by the District Superintendent with representatives of the Pension Study Committee and the General Board of Pensions in attendance, during which time the ministers and lay people of the district will be given an opportunity to ask questions and participate in a general discussion after the presentation of the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund plan and our current dual pension program, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, The Pension Study Committee is hereby authorized to present to the 1973 session of the Florida Annual Conference a composite report of the twelve district meetings and at that time report to the Annual Conference with regard to further consideration of full transition to the Ministers Reserve Fund.

COMMISSION ON PUBLIC RELATIONS AND UNITED METHODIST INFORMATION

The Commission serves as the Annual Conference's news agency in the gathering, writing and distribution of news related to United Methodism by way of stories, features and photos to newspapers, radio and television stations, and church periodicals at the state, regional, and national levels.

In December of 1971 an opportunity was given Florida Methodists to express their opinions relative to the "Welcome Billboards" that had been under this Commission's responsibility for several years. The response was overwhelmingly against a continuation of the billboard medium of public relations. The Commission felt it wise to terminate the billboard contract and this was done with an effective date of January 31, 1972.

The Commission is presently designing an attractive multi-color "Welcome to Florida United Methodism" brochure. This brochure will be placed in the state-operated Welcome Stations where more than 2 million visitors stop each year as they enter Florida. The brochure seeks to depict Florida United Methodism from the local church to the several institutions and agencies related to the various districts and the Annual Conference.

We are also responsible for the daily on-the-scene newsletters dispatched from the site of the General Conference and distributed to all our ministers as well as certain laymen and women in Conference leadership positions. This is handled by the Program Council staff and the distribution exceeds more than 1100.

Mr. O. B. Fanning continues to serve us well as our Director of United Methodist Information as a part time member of the Program Council Staff while at the same time continuing his responsibilities as Director of the News Bureau of Florida Southern College.

CONFERENCE COUNSELING CENTER

At the Florida Annual Conference last June (1971) a resolution was adopted to set up a Quadrennial Committee to establish a Conference Counseling Program for ministers and their families who have personal and professional problems, and to supervise the work of the Counselor.

Since this was to be a cooperative venture with Florida Southern College, two members were appointed from the cabinet by Bishop James Henley, three members were named by and from the Board of Ministry, and the Academic Dean of Florida Southern College was asked to represent the College.

At our first meeting Kenneth Rogers was elected Chairman and John Simon as Secretary of our Committee. We then visited with Dr. Charles Thrift, Bishop James Henley, and Dr. Richard Burnette regarding general guidelines, personnel, and structure of the program. Ideally, the Counselor to be hired will have a Doctorate in Counseling,

Ideally, the Counselor to be hired will have a Doctorate in Counseling, work experience, and will have an understanding of the unique role and stresses of the Methodist ministry. He must have adequate academic training and competence, a deep commitment to the Church, some experience and maturity, and a sincere concern for persons.

As a counselor his primary responsibility will be to serve the ministers of the Florida Annual Conference and their families, and all full-time church-related professional staff. He should concentrate on problemcentered counseling and refer cases requiring long-term therapy. He will be serving—at least at the beginning of the program—as a part-time faculty member of Florida Southern College. We tentatively envision the candidate as spending approximately one-half time in conference counseling and onehalf time as an instructor in the College. As the Counseling Center developes, it will require a larger portion of his time until ultimately it should require his full-time service. Office facilities will be provided at Florida Southern College.

Fees for counseling sessions will be set on a sliding scale according to the counselee's ability to pay; and all money received in fees will be applied toward the cost of the program.

At present our Committee is processing applications for the position as Counselor,

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF THE PREACHER'S RELIEF FUND 1972

During the past Conference year the Trustees of the Preacher's Relief Fund have provided housing for forty-nine claimants, and temporary quarters for a few Methodist Cuban refugees and other laymen in properties that were not needed for retired ministers or widows of our preachers. Our executive secretary and property manager has visited the persons occupying our homes to express interest in and concern for their welfare, and to inspect our property and arrange for its maintenance and repair.

Extensive repairs and improvements have been made in a few of our units and several have been painted and given minor repairs. Our Orlando house has been taken over by the Expressway Authority, and three of our oldest cottages, unused by claimants for extended periods, have been sold and the proceeds from the sales placed in our reserve funds. The income from our reserve is needed to provide a substantial percent of our budget. An increasing number of our claimants are providing maintenance, paying the taxes, or otherwise contributing to the cost of our housing program.

One nice home has been deeded to our Board this year, and four other properties have been put in wills and will come to us following life tenure thus increasing our present and potential assets. Appreciation is hereby expressed to the generous laymen and thoughtful pastors who have been responsible for the bequests that have been made to our agency during the last eighty-seven years.

A long-range planning committee has been organized during the year to recommend changes in the charter and by-laws of our corporation and to cooperate with the officers of the Program Council in providing better and more extensive service to our claimants.

We commend Dr. Henry W. Blackburn, the Executive Secretary and Property Manager, for the singular manner in which he continues to direct the business of the Trustees of the Preacher's Relief Fund. His responsibilities have increased greatly in recent years because of growing assets and ever-increasing pressure from taxing agencies throughout the state.

OUADRENNIAL EMPHASIS COMMITTEE

Delegates to the 1968 General Conference of our church were keenly aware that the Sixties had confronted the church with many crucial social and spiritual problems that could no longer be denied. The only answer was "A New Church For A New World." "Reconciliation" became the byword and action of Methodists across America. Reconciliation with one's self, one's God, and one's neighbor. Four years later we realize that God has abundantly blessed the vision and faith of that Conference.

Aware that the only place to begin such an endeavor was in the study of scripture, Methodists ordered over 500,000 copies of the study. "Sermon on the Mount," along with 158,000 copies of the companion leaders text. Dr. Ed Bauman's study, "Life and Teachings of Jesus," has been available only a short time and already over 40,000 copies of it have been requested. Thrilling are the countless stories reflecting results of such study upon the lives of churches and individuals.

United Methodist churches and people can never return to their old ways. Such study of scripture always leads to a concern for sharing its message through spoken and expressed word. Over 1,000 "full-time" volunteers gave of themselves in the fresh and unique United Methodist Voluntary Service. Joining with them, were the tens of thousands of fellow Methodists in every city and many rural areas of America. These volun-teers are twentieth century Good Samaritans, biblical personalities alive in our day.

As a natural result of Bible study and personal involvement, there comes a sharing of material blessings. A Fund For Reconciliation was established, with a clear call for all United Methodists to give sacrificially that projects of reconciliation would be a part of community life across our land. Our goal for the quadrennium was \$20,000,000. As of the 1972 General Conference, over \$13,500,000 had been contributed to this fund. Some might say "we failed." Not so! Reliable conservative estimates indicate that these funds have been used for leverage to generate an additional \$29,000,000 from other sources, besides the millions of hours of voluntary service. Therefore, we are speaking of approximately \$45,000,000.

One half of funds donated were retained for use within the respective annual conferences. Projects too large in scope for any particular conference to sponsor were funded from the general fund. From this \$6,750,000, approximately 50 national projects, United Methodist Voluntary Service, Vietnam Rehabilitation funds, and support for the Commission on Religion and Race were funded.

Appropriately said are the words of Bishop James K. Matthews, Chair-man of the Quadrennial Emphasis. "Someday it is going to dawn upon us United Methodists the magnitude of the undertaking in this quadrennial emphasis, 'A New Church For a New World.' It has put us in a people-topeople relationship with the kind of people that Jesus particularly seems to have loved.'

The Florida Conference

Florida United Methodists had a very vital part in the general church program. Major emphasis was given to the importance of the Sermon on the Mount study. From every district came reports of churches involved in searching for new truths and direction from God's word, Bauman's "Life and Teachings of Jesus" study is now a common subject of conversation among pastors and lay persons. These two study programs are being presented again and again across our Conference, in church-wide groups, cottage meetings, classes, organizations, as well as ecumenical gatherings. United Methodist Voluntary Service in Florida has seen eight men and women giving full-time in this ministry of reconciliation. They have existed financially by minimal subsistance allowances, serving in the Gainesville District Town and Country program, Hardee County Spanish Mission, Belle Glade Day Care for Spanish speaking children, and Miami innercity work among the black and hispanic people, teaching community development and working with children and youth. Without these volunteers, reconciliation within our conference would have been severely handicapped.

Too frequently, the Fund For Reconciliation was interpreted as the Quadrennial Emphasis, when in fact it should have been the fruit of the Emphasis. First priority called for Bible study and personal involvement. Where there was not full accomplishment of desired goals, it was due, largely to seeking to gather the fruit with first cultivation of hearts and minds to the doing of God's will.

Of the \$20,000,000 Fund For Reconciliation, the Florida Conference voluntarily assumed \$533,000 as its share. Through May 31, 1972, the combined total from all sources within our Conference reached \$270,000. One-half of this amount was kept for Conference projects. During the 1971-1972 Conference year, Florida United Methodists donated \$38,911.85 with \$19,455.92 of this remaining for our direction.

Seed money to each district the first two years enabled several projects of reconciliation to be started, one of which is in the Melbourne area. This year proposed funds will give this Day Care Center essential financial support until area sustaining funds are adequate.

In Jacksonville, we have seen the establishment of a Comprehensive Care Program for pregnant school age girls, the opening of a regular care for men on parole, the development of a foster school age program that has placed over 750 volunteers in the public schools, plus a very close working relationship between the United Methodist Church in the Jacksonville District and the city government and the community's various agencies. Proposals for funding of a Youth Hostel and a Housing Opportunity Center have recently been submitted, projects in which the Jacksonville Urban Center pilot project has played the key roll.

have recently been submitted, projects in which the Jacksonville Urban Center pilot project has played the key roll. Now self-supporting from area funds, is Tampa's nationally recognized Intensive Tutorial project. Florida United Methodists may justly be proud of this work, and rejoice that it is being duplicated in other parts of Florida and the nation. Fund For Reconciliation support aided its growth.

Numerous struggling rural churches of the Gainesville District know that we care. Needs here continue to be of such great urgency. They have been encouraged by our support. Reconciliation and cooperative ministry is now

a cherished relationship among these former churches of both the Central Jurisdiction and Southeastern Jurisdiction.

Florida Conference Fund For Reconciliation helped give birth to Ft. Lauderdale's Specialized Urban Ministry. From a meager beginning it is now recognized as one of Boward County's greatest instruments for reconciliation. SUM is an arm of the local churches. It is doing the special tasks that they cannot handle. "It is a penetrating mission work—into the ghettos, into the sanctuaries of the old, into the enclaves of the poor, the rich, and the in between . . . SUM works—" wrote a news reporter. Tutoring, ecumenical inter-racial Vacation Church School, summer camping, housing, mother-to-mother relationships, and youth projects are just a few of SUM's involvement. Area churches of all denominations are increasing their support of this project, and all Florida Methodists may be proud of its ministry.

Your contributions to the Tallahassee Urban Ministries made it possible to create a cooperative fellowship between the pastors of six of the smaller churches of the city of Tallahassee. Through a central office, economic savings have aided the ministry, members of the parish are kept abreast of opportunities being offered by each church, a hospital visitation program has been launched, a working relationship has been established through Community Service Agencies, thus greatly aiding the ministry to the poor, the handicapped, and the disadvantaged.

Add all of this to the tens of thousands of hours invested by volunteers, the hundreds of thousands of dollars invested by sources other than the Fund For Reconciliation, and it adds up to a great and grand total, the sum of which only God has the ability to comprehend. Any one of these projects by itself would have been worth all our efforts.

Any one of these projects by itself would have been worth all our efforts. Put them together, think of the past, think of what can be, and let us oraise God for his blessings.

Of great concern to your Committee are the numerous requests for financial assistance for struggling projects, as well as areas of great need where no effort to minister is currently being made. Again and again we were forced to reply that no funds were available.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. That this Annual Conference, by its adoption of these recommendations, express its thanks to those of the 1968 General Conference who had the vision and courage to launch the Quadrennial Emphasis.
- 2. That the spirit of "A New Church For A New Day" be kept alive in our time until the dream is a reality.

PROGRESS REPORT OF STRUCTURE COMMITTEE Annual Conference, 1972

The Committee on Structure has spent the past year in attempting to understand and interpret Conference Council purpose and structure by consultations with church leaders both within and without the bounds of the Annual Conference, District open "hearings," and much cor-respondence. We express our appreciation to the Bishop and the Cabinet, to these who are the distribution of the bishop and the Cabinet, to those who attended the District meetings, and to the many who wrote suggestions.

Out of these many consultations came the following guidelines for structure:

1. To begin with the local church as the recognized arena in which our

purpose is primarily fulfilled. 2. In structuring to build a supportive organization to the local church, lines of communication and support must be clear and direct.

3. Full lay participation must be provided for and all decision making and program origination must be as close to the point of implementation as possible.

4. To do those things that need to be done at those levels of structure where they can best be done.

5. To begin with a minimum of structure that is highly visible and with definite responsibilities.

These guidelines would seem to suggest that we plan for a District and Conference organization that is patterened after that of the local church. Hopefully it would not be rigid but open to ideas from and response to the other levels of our organizational structure. There is attached a possible structure.

RESOLUTION

"WHEREAS all the ramification of restructuring ordered by the 1972 General Conference are not yet evident; and "WHEREAS it is not at this moment clear to what extent the Florida

Conference should move in the many options left open by the General **Conference**; therefore:

"Be it resolved: 1) That Standing Rule III, Section 12 be suspended for one year, and that all Conference organizations continue as now constituted until the Annual Conference of 1973, subject to those annual adjustments necessary. 2) That the Bishop of the Florida Area be requested to call a one-day session of the Annual Conference prior to Thanksgiving to adopt structure to be implemented in the Annual Conference of 1973. 3) That the Committee on Structure of the Program Council be continued until that Conference; that its membership be increased to a total of ten members, one of whom shall be a youth; and that it be empowered to make recommendations regarding total Conference structure. 4) That the attached model of structure be the basis of discussion across the Confer-ence with final recommendations from the committee to reach each Lay and Clerical member of the Conference no later than 15 days prior to the called session."

We heartily commend the Board of Laity for their recommendation of Dr. Richard V. Moore as the new Conference Lay Leader. His record as an outstanding Christian leader is well established. We congratulate Mrs. Willie L. Pinesett on her election as Conference Vice President of the United Methodist Women. There are other equally encouraging indications of a truly united conference. We recommend continued efforts to make our conference inclusive in all phases of participation and activity.

Let us continue to pray for the strengthening of the bonds of Christian love and brotherhood in our great conference.

SCHOOL OF CHRISTIAN MISSION

The 1971 Conference School of Christian Mission was held at Florida Southern College beginning with a weekend session July 9-11, 1971 and continuing with a week session July 12-16, 1971. The total attendance was 868. This was the largest School of Christian Mission in United Methodism.

The purpose of the school is to provide an opportunity for study and training in the mission of the church with particular emphasis on the current mission study themes and spiritual enrichment as they relate to the task of the several program areas in the local church both separately and as a whole.

The school for 1972 will be at Florida Southern College with the weekend session beginning July 21-23, and the week session beginning July 24-28. The studies will be on Romans, Faith and Justice, and India. There will be four choices of teachers in each of three courses. There will be opportunity for special learning opportunities in the field of Mission and seminars will be sponsored by the major work areas of the conference.

TRUSTEES OF THE FLORIDA CONFERENCE OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

Under authorization of the Florida Conference made in June 1971 the Maxwell Street residence has been sold during the year. The net proceeds totaled \$32,007.40. These funds are on deposit with the Florida Methodist Foundation.

Examination of titles to property owned by the Florida Conference by the attorney retained by the Program Council indicates that some of them need to be up-dated. The Trustees have authorized this work to be done. The cost for this work will be defrayed from the earnings of the funds derived from the sale of the Maxwell Street property, as authorized by Conference action. Since the work is now in process we will need to provide particulars in a future report.

A committee of the Board of Trustees is now engaged in a review of the insurance carried on properties owned by the Conference. It is the desire of the Trustees to provide adequate coverage for each property.

In view of the approaching retirement of our beloved Bishop, James W. Henley, it seems appropriate to bring to the attention of the Conference information about the episcopal residence. This property is owned by Florida Southern College and the Florida Conference as a corporate entity has not equity in it. Its use as a residence and office is on a lease or rental basis with all but \$100.00 per month of the total cost being covered by the housing and office allowance provided by the general Church. The Conference will need to be in readiness to cooperate with our new bishop in providing both housing and office space as will be required to meet his needs.

From the sale of the Episcopal Residence in Jacksonville, plus earnings, the Trustees hold \$18,859.07 which may, if required, be used to assist in meeting this need.

Attached hereto, and a part of this report, is a detail of properties on which there are unpaid obligations of the Conference to which the Trustees hold title for you.

WOMEN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

and

WESLEYAN SERVICE GUILD

The Women's Society of Christian Service and Wesleyan Service Guild made two major changes during the year 1971; the Women's Society voted to hold future Annual Meetings at Branscomb Auditorium in Lakeland and both organizations voted to operate on the calendar year. To adjust to the calendar year required two Annual Meetings. The first was held in Daytona Beach at the Plaza Hotel in April and the second in Lakeland at Branscomb Auditorium in November. The November meeting was the first time the Women's Society and Guild have held a joint Annual Meeting. From this experience we learned that most women prefer a shorter meeting as a result we have scheduled the 1972 Annual Meeting for a twenty-four hour period.

The districts also held two Annual Meetings and are now operating on the calendar year.

Membership over the whole of Women's Division has declined and the Conference Women's Society is no exception we have lost 19 societies and 462 members, however, the Guild has increased 9 units and 18 members.

The membership as of December 31, 1971 was: Women's Society —41,.03 members in 583 societies Guild—3,780 members in 205 units

In spite of the loss of membership the giving increased through the conference treasurer of the society/guild for the calendar year 1971 giving amounted to \$519,245.45 of this amount \$422,254.51 was sent to Women's Division; the Love Offering amounted to \$31,230.88-\$12,950.00 of this was given to work within the Florida Conference also most of the remaining total with only 4.5% used for cultivation, meetings, etc.

We consider the following events have helped us toward reaching our goals:

- 1. Meetings of Chairmen of Missionary Education and District Secretaries of Missions; Chairmen of Spiritual Growth and District Secretaries of Evangelism; Chairmen of Christian Social Relations and District Secretaries of Christian Social Concerns to plan and work cooperatively.
- * 2. Conference and District Retreats.
 - 3. Conference and District Annual Meetings.
 - 4. Conference and District workshops on finance, leadership, social issues, women's involvement in the total church, etc.
- 5. Participation in the Conference School of Christian Mission.
- 6. The untiring efforts of the District Executive Committees to meet the varied needs in the twelve districts.

At this point the new Society/Guild is nineteen months old we have made a good beginning, we have overcome some hurdles, and with God's help we continue to work to become a truly merged group.

COMMISSION ON WORSHIP

SUNDAY SCHOOL ATTENDANCE COMMITTEE

The Annual Conference of 1970 established a Sunday School Committee to give a concerted effort to stem the tide of a declining Sunday School in the Florida Conference. The organization of the committee included Ray Harrison, Chairman, from the Board of Education; Jonell Robinson, President of the Directors of Christian Education; Martha Renfroe, Chairman of the Board of Education Committee on Groups and Settings; Dr. Harold Buell, the Cabinet Representative; and a representative from each of the twelve districts.

The committee met July 13, 1970, to set up some goals and priorities. We established that (1) our counting would include only Sunday morning, which we would refer to as "Sunday School." (2) There was no intention of minimizing the importance of the Church School but we would give ourselves exclusively to Sunday School. (3) Attendance emphasis does not minimize the importance of quality education; however, the problem of this committee was to work exclusively on attendance. (4) The campaign would run from November 1, 1971, to April 30, 1972. (5) Chairman of each district would be responsible for collecting the data from the Sunday School attendance from November 1, 1970, to April 30, 1971, for a comparison. (6) The Sunday School Committee would share creative ideas throughout the Conference but each church would establish its own program of attendance. (7) The reporting blanks for the 71-72 year and the 70-71 year were sent to all local churches.

At the second meeting of the Committee, November 16, 1971, further objectives were defined: (1) to gather grass roots information; (2) set up guidelines for reporting information; (3) build enthusiasm; (4) the reporting would be made on a voluntary basis for Children, Youth and Adult; (5) recognition would be given from the Conference floor to churches having the largest numerical increase and percentage increase; Clinton Logan and Bob Fox, with the Chairman, Ray Harrison will make this presentation. (6) A date will be established with the Cabinet to set up meetings.

The Committee met on January 6, 1972, to clear up any misinformation with regard to attendance. We concluded we were working on totals rather than percentages.

In November, 387 churches reported, with 194 of them showing an increase somewhere. It was gratifying to know that the increases among the Youth were better than anticipated. The population explosion showed a marked decline among Nursery and Kindergarten children; there was a decrease of 472 from the previous year.

In December, 330 churches reported and 237 showed an increase somewhere within the church. There were increases in all three divisions over the November report. There was a decline of 673 from the previous year.

In February, 322 churches reported. Of this number, 219 showed an increase in some area. The saw news is there was a minus of 1,338. It would appear that to have declined during the first four months of our campaign from minus 472 to minus 1338, our efforts were in vain; however, what would be the case if there had been no effort made?

New Sunday Schools have been established as a result of this effort for this year. Many churches have stimulated a growth, such as Brooksville, which showed in the March report a 66% increase over the previous year.

The chairman conducted the area meetings at Tallahassee, Ft. Lauderdale, Orlando, Tampa and Lake City. The churches that participated showed genuine concern and a great spirit of enthusiasm.

It is the Committee's hope that the greater result will be evidenced in another conference year that was merely stimulated by this committee.

We firmly believe in the importance of the Sunday School and we believe that some continuing effort should be made to keep it a vital part of the church. The committee recommends that a standing committee for Sunday School attendance be established as part of the Board of Education, to work in conjunction with the Board of Evangelism in a continuing effort.

REPORT NO. 2

Referring to paragraph 924 in the 1968 Discipline, we concur with the recommendation of the Commission on Minimum Salary for Minimum Support for 1973: Lay Pastors \$5700; Associate Members \$6100; Ministers in Full Connection without B.D. or equivalent \$6500; Probationary Member with B.D. or equivalent \$6800; Ministers in Full Connection with B.D. or equivalent \$7000.

1. The salaries are to become effective January 1973.

- A. Minimum Support Fund shall be administered by the Commission on Minimum Salary. This commission is to be composed of representatives from the Board of Missions, two Cabinet members and representatives from the Board of Ministry and World Service and Finance.
- E. The Commission on Minimum Salary shall see that the amounts of Minimum Support are collected, and they shall be disbursed by the Cabinet.
- C. Payments shall be made quarterly, providing funds are available.
- D. The Commission on World Service and Finance calls the attention of each minister to the Disciplinary requirements concerning ministerial support, pensions and benefit programs as outlined in paragraph 1380.6 and paragraph 921, with special reference to proportional payment and the effect of default in these areas upon pension benefits.
- 2. We recommend that Ministerial Support be a separate budget item in compliance with disciplinary requirements, to be remitted by the treasurer of the local church to the Conference Treasurer. This fund shall be apportioned to each church using the same formula used in computing the Christian Service Fund. The Conference Treasurer shall distribute each item of ministerial support, its prorated share based on budgeted amounts. The amount of Ministerial Support for 1973 is \$1,328,560.
- 3. After study and review of salaries of District Superintendents we recommend that the formula adopted in 1970 be continued. It is based, first on

the top two salaries plus expenses in each of the twelve districts. Then, from the Conference at large the top four salaries and expenses not previously used. The average of these twenty-eight salaries and expenses makes up the formula. We further recommend for 1973 in addition to the formula, \$1000 travel expenses plus expenses for Pre-Conference Cabinet Meetings. District Superintendents salaries for 1972 were \$15,117.32 calculated by the above formula.

- 4. In compliance with paragraph 885 and approval of the General Conference, the Episcopal Fund shall be 2% of the Ministers' salaries.
- 5. We recommend that the Interdenominational Cooperation Fund and Ministerial Education Fund be apportioned to each District, using the same formula as used in the Christian Service Fund. The Apportionment to the local Church shall be made by the District Superintendent over and above the Christian Service Fund.

REPORT NO. 3

Contingency Fund

We recommend setting up the following Contingency Fund from the Conference Reserve Fund:

1. The Conference Contingency Reserve Fund of \$21,700 to be used by the Commission on World Service and Finance for emergency needs of the Conference Boards and Agencies during the year 1973.

REPORT NO. 4

Travel Allowance

We recommend that the car allowance for members of Boards, Commissions, and Committees where allowed, be set at 5ϕ per mile for each member, an additional 3ϕ for one passenger and an additional 2ϕ for two passengers or more, with top mileage of 10ϕ per car plus tolls for roads and bridges. Members who choose to travel to Conference Meetings by other than automobile will be reimbursed at the above highway mileage rate. In addition, meals and lodging for Board members shall be paid at the rate of \$6.85 per diem. We further recommend that the Conference facilities at Lakeland and Leesburg be used by the Boards and Agencies.

REPORT NO. 5

Conference Boards

1. We appreciate the use of the Conference Treasurer's office by all Conference Boards and Agencies and urge them to make full use of this office for both the collection and disbursement of their funds. 2. We call attention to paragraph 2 of the Standing Rule III which requires all Agencies receiving funds through the Commission on World Service and Finance to give an Annual Report or an audit on all monies received and disbursed; and urge more faithful compliance with this rule. This statement shall include all monies held in reserve accounts. We suggest that the reports in question be in the hands of the Commission Chairman within 60 days after the end of the fiscal year. Unless there is compliance with Standing Rule #3, the Commission on World Service and Finance cannot consider requests for funds for the following year.

REPORT NO. 6

Christian Education Sunday Offering

We recommend that the Conference Council be authorized to use the Christian Education Sunday Offering for the work of the twelve District Councils and that the District Superintendent administer the funds received from the offering within their districts.

REPORT NO. 7

- 1. We recommend the Florida Methodist Foundation for its outstanding work and encourage all Agencies of the Conference to make full use of its advantages and to help the Foundation attain its maximum potential for the Conference.
- 2. We recommend, with the concurrence of the Cabinet, that one half of the surplus earnings, current and future of the Florida Methodist Foundation be retained as a Conference Reserve Fund, up to and including the amount of \$200,000. The Conference Reserve Fund shall be used to meet Conference emergencies including emergency of the Florida Methodist Foundation, at the discretion of the World Service and Finance Commission. As the Conference Reserve is less than \$200,000, earnings shall be further retained to bring it up to that amount. At any time the Conference Reserve Fund exceeds \$200,000, the excess shall be available to the Conference.

WILLIAM HAROLD MILLER

We praise and thank God for the life and friendship of William Harold Miller, born August 13, 1928, in Bartow, Florida. He was a graduate of high school in Plant City, Florida; Asbury College, Wilmore, Kentucky; and Candler School of Theology, Emory University, Atlanta, Georgia. He served as student pastor while in college and seminary. His appointments after joining the annual conference in 1950 were Trinity, Lakeland; First, Dade City; Trinity, Bradenton; 31 months as a chaplain in the United States Navy; and Manhattan Avenue, Tampa.

He was married to Muriel Joyce Fritzke on September 5, 1948. They have two daughters, Charlotte Ruth and Martha Louise. Other survivors are his parents, the Rev. and Mrs. W. B. Miller (His dad is a retired minister of our conference), a brother, the Rev. John Robert Miller (a member of our conference), and a sister, Dr. Mary Ruth Miller, Chairman of the English Department at Tennessee Wesleyan College in Athens, Tennessee.

Harold was killed in an automobile accident, June 1, 1971. A service of praise and thanksgiving for his life and ministry was held in the Manhattan Avenue United Methodist Church, June 3, at 1:00 p.m., with Bishop James W. Henley, the Rev. Robert C. Boggs, the Rev. Edward L. Dinkins, the Rev. Jiles E. Kirkland, the Rev. G. Odell Miley, of the United Methodist Church, and Father John Mangrum of the Episcopal Church, officiating. A committal service was held at the graveside in Memorial Park in Plant City, Florida, with the Rev. Robert C. Boggs, the Rev. Herbert L. Bowdoin, the Rev. Dan Gill, and the Rev. J. Arthur Padgett, officiating. The flag was presented on behalf of the United States Navy by the Rev. Brice C. Harris. It isn't easy to verbalize feelings—to describe one of your best friends.

It isn't easy to verbalize feelings—to describe one of your best friends. Harold, Herbert Bowdoin, Jiles Kirkland, Odell Miley, and I, and our wives, were all in high school together. Harold and I worked in revivals together. One night he would lead the singing and I would preach; the next night we would reverse the roles.

Harold was a very talented and versatile person. He loved the ritual and liturgy of the church. He would be a "high churchman" on Sunday morning, then on Sunday night he would get out his trombone and have a "Salvation Army" service. Harold preached in many revival meetings and youth activity weeks. He was a gifted and dedicated preacher.

Wherever he served the church was strengthened under his leadership, the people loved him, and the church grew. He was an effective influence for God and good as he worked in his church program.

He answered the call of God to become a minister in the First Methodist Church of Plant City—while still in high school. As a member of the conference, he served on the Board of Missions, Secretary of the Board of Christian Social Concerns, a member of the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries, Secretary of the founding Board of Directors of Asbury Towers in Bradenton, Florida, and as an appointed delegate to the 1961 World Methodist Conference in Oslo, Norway.

He was active in civic affairs. While pastor in Dade City, he was chairman of the Housing Authority, president of the Dade City Ministerial Association, and a director of the Dade City Rotary Club. He was a delegate to the 1959 Rotary International Convention. He was an active member of the Kiwanis Club in Bradenton, and a director of United Appeal. An Eagle Scout as a boy, he subsequently held district offices with the Gulf-Ridge Council and Sunniland Council of Boy Scouts of America.

Harold was an avid sportsman who loved the out-of-doors. His particular interests were hunting, fishing, and golfing. He felt these were avenues to close communication with God.

He found fulfillment in his Navy service. He cruised the Mediterranean, vas involved in the Dominican Republic crisis in 1965, and in Vietnam. In Vietnam, "circuit riding" by helicopter and small boat, he provided services of worship, counsel and religious instruction, often "under combat conditions and while subject to enemy fire." The pilots of the USS Ticonderoga based bomber squadron dubbed him an "Iron Angel" in appreciation of his ministry to them. Widely traveled in some 42 nations and islands of the world, the Americas, Europe, Africa, and the Far East, he had preached in many parts of the world.

All of us were shocked by Harold's untimely death. This was his second serious accident in less than a year. In August of 1970 he was nearly killed in an automobile accident. This experience of being so near to death is related in a sermon he preached, entitled "The Rustle of Angels' Wings," in which he affirmed his faith: "Death is not defeat! Death is not the end! There is no terror, no fear! I submit to you my confident faith . . . In the face of death, Pilgin, in *Pilgrim's Progress*, was crossing the river, and he turned back to his companions on the shore with the reassuring call to follow him on out into the river crossing from this life to the next, for he said, 'My feet have felt the bottom and it is sound.' And I say to you, My feet have felt the bottom and it is sound.'"

There are some things I can't understand. Harold's death is one of them. But some day we shall be in the Father's house and he will help us to fit all the pieces together.

This prayer of Benediction, given by Harold at our friend Henry Kinard's funeral, was used by Odell Miley at Harold's funeral. These were his words for Henry. They are now our words for Harold:

Almighty God, who calleth unto Thee, and holdeth in Thy care the souls of the righteous, we give thanks to Thee for all the goodly fellowship of Thy servants who have served Thee faithfully in Thy Holy Church, and who now dwell forever in Thy presence. We thank Thee for all those who by their very lives have enabled us to see more perfectly the light of Thy way, and to grasp more completely the knowledge of Thy glory in the presence of Jesus Christ: who have helped and comforted, strengthened and encouraged us on our way: who have bequeathed to us in their witness a glorious pledge of the hope of our calling. Into this blessed company Thou hast called our friend, Thy minister, our loved one: Thy created son, Harold.

Grant that all the good we have seen and known in him may continue to inspire and guide us; and grant that the love which has reached out from Thee to enfold him in Thy very presence, may continue to be as a constant source of watchcare abiding with Muriel, Charlotte, and Martha, with his parents and all the family. Give to them and to us all the assurance that when we have fulfilled our time on earth, we will yet have part with him in Thy heavenly kingdom. Bless the family now with the comfort of Thy presence, that they may have a sure confidence in Thee for all that is to come; until the day breaks and the shadows flee away.

So now unto God's gracious mercy and protection we commend you, Harold. May the Lord bless you and keep you: the Lord make His face to shine upon you, and be gracious to you: the Lord lift up His Countenance upon you, and give you peace. Amen.

WILLIAM BARKER MUNDY

William Barker Mundy was born December 10, 1910, Buchanan, Virginia, son of Mr. and Mrs. Luther T. Mundy. He was the seventh child in a family of nine boys and four girls.

He was married to Julia Sessions of Wauchula, Florida on October 14, 1934.

Besides his widow, two sons, Allen Welch Mundy, Tallahassee, Florida, Robert Wayne Mundy, Bartow, Florida, seven grandchildren, five brothers and three sisters survive him.

At the age of nine while tending his Father's cattle and sheep, Bill heard the call to become a Minister of the Gospel;—a call so urgent that he knelt on the grass in the midst of the herd and prayed for guidance. This remained the predominant drive in his life.

Upon graduation from Buchanan High School in 1930 he entered Randolph Macon College, Ashland, Virginia, later transferring to Florida Southern College, Lakeland, Florida, where he was graduated in 1934.

The same year he was admitted on trial to the Baltimore Conference. While serving Hunterville, West Virginia, he transferred to the Florida Conference in June 1936. He was ordained a Deacon in 1937 in the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and an Elder in 1939 in the Methodist Church. He served the following appointments: Pinecastle; Callahan; Dania; Fleming Street, Key West; Allapattah, Miami; Wesley Memorial, Lakeland; Conference Evangelist; Supply Pastor at Ridge Manor.

He was Alumni Director at Florida Southern College 1953—1959. Then he became Director of Admissions and later of Counseling. After a year of Sabbatical he was appointed as Assistant to the President of Andrew College, Cuthbert, Georgia, for Florida Student Recruitment and Public Relations, in which capacity he served until his death, November 8, 1971.

Bill was primarily evangelistic and his zeal was tempered with a Pastor's heart. He loved the Pulpit, but persons were drawn to him individually.

His life was one that appealed to men, enlisted youth and charmed women. He was never less than a gentleman but ever kept in touch with the humanity of anyone with whom he came in contact. His sense of humor and naturalness were a joy to all.

He found fulfillment in helping young people attend college when at times it seemed impossible for them. Often he was able to find the means for a student to realize his dream of attending a Church Related College.

It was while seeking students to enroll at Andrew College that he was suddenly stricken with a heart attack and his Heavenly Father saw fit to call him to his final appointment.

Funeral Services were conducted at the Wesley Memorial United Methodist Church, Lakeland, Florida, where he once served as Pastor and where he was Chairman of the Building Committee at the time of the construction of the beautiful Sanctuary. Dr. Raymond Alley conducted the Service, assisted by Dr. Robert C. Holmes, Dr. J. Milburn McLeod, The Rev. Orville H. Ripley and the Rev. Rod Ruby. His body was tenderly laid to rest at the Oakhill Cemetery, Lakeland.

The Book of Proverbs states that a man is the candle of the Lord. The burning of God's Light through the life and ministry of William Barker Mundy will ever brighten and warm his family, friends and the lives which his ministry touched and blessed. Dr. George Gambill, President of Andrew College wrote Mrs. Mundy at the time of Bill's death, "He is on the most exciting journey of his life. He is just as real, just as alive, as he ever was. He is only out of sight. His outgoing personality, winsome smile, and loving spirit are as real as ever and live in the hearts of all those who knew him."

CLAUDE HOLMES THOMPSON

All United Methodism mourned the loss of its great evangelical voice last October when Dr. Claude Holmes Thompson died. Theologian, teacher, social prophet, man of God—he was all of these and more. For two decades he instructed and inspired students at Candler School of Theology in the classroom, in the chapel, and above all, in the weekly prayer breakfasts he and Mrs. Thompson held at their home near the campus. Countless men and women preparing for the ministry came under his profound influence and have taken with them indelibly etched memories of his Wesleyan combination of warm heart, agile mind and unstinting devotion.

Dr. Thompson was a man of unusual gifts and unique expression of those gifts. His interests and commitments were wide-ranging and world-embracing. He and Mrs. Thompson throughout their ministry opened the doors of their home to students and friends from abroad. Without display or publicity they shared their modest means with those in need, thereby making it possible for countless students to complete their studies. Such generosity was simply a tangible expression of the way they gave, without stint, in all their relationships. Those blessed by their friendship found them to be friends indeed. Several years ago when they made an extended trip around the world they were entertained and greeted by former students and friends in every country they visited. Like one of St. Paul's journeys, they were able to see for the last time their "children in Christ."

Coupled with his generous spirit was a social passion and prophetic voice. Long before early court decisions and the acceptance of integration, Dr. Thompson spoke out forcefully and determinedly against the exclusiveness of white churches. He had no patience for comfortable religion and selfserving gospel. The gospel he preached was for all men: all men together, everywhere, today. He stood up for what he believed and had the courage of what he stood for. Once he had decided upon what was right under the circumstances, neither threats nor caustic criticism could sway him. Naturally these concerns endeared him to missionaries and the mission of the church, both here and abroad.

Surely the most striking thing about Dr. Thompson was the authenticity of his witness. Forged in the crucible of his own pilgrimage, students responded to his voice because they heard it in echoes of reality and saw in him the genuine article of faith. This was never more manifest than in his last months as he struggled with the cancer that finally took his life. During this time he wrote a sermon that characterized his faith entitled "How Would You Like to Die?" Reprinted many times, it has extended his testimony in eloquent and moving fashion. Students and faculty at Candler will never forget the figure assisted into class those last months, the weakened but clear voice, and anguished but still radiant face. He died as he lived, in undaunted reliance upon his Lord.

For a man who meant so much to the world, he loved his home. He married Sue Chapman Lovelace on September 6, 1932, and they had three daughters, Marilyn, Mary Sue, and Nanci Ann (Mrs. Robert T. Casey, Mrs. Charles W. Stevenson, Mrs. William L. Youngblood), all of whom survive him. As much as anything, the Christian grace animating their home proved the depth of Christian faith and left an abiding imprint upon the many students who shared their fellowship.

Dr. Thompson was born in Bethlehem, Maryland, September 21, 1908. He received his college education at Asbury, graduating with the A.B. in 1932. After several years as a pastor in the Wilmington and Baltimore Conerences, he entered Drew, graduating with the B.D. in 1943, and then again with the Ph.D. in 1949. During his graduate period he also studied at Oxford and Edinburgh. From 1947 until 1950 Dr. Thompson was professor of Christian doctrine at Asbury Theological Seminary. Leaving Asbury, he taught as visiting professor both at Candler and Perkins before being appointed to a professorship at Candler in 1951, where he continued until his death on October 16, 1971. In addition to his remarkable career as teacher and preacher, he was a scholar and published many articles and a book, *Theology of the Kerygma*, in 1962. He was a well-known figure on the major church platforms where he was in great demand as lecturer.

Funeral services were held in Durham Chapel, Emory University, with Dean James T. Laney and Dr. Mack B. Stokes officiating, assisted by Bishop James W. Henley. He was buried in Dawn Memorial Park. He had been a member of the Florida Conference since 1953.

His was a full life—full of achievement, of authentic testimony, of Christian grace. All who knew and loved him stand deeply in his debt, and in abiding gratitude to God for his servant, Claude Holmes Thompson. JAMES T. LANEY

J. B. F. WILLIAMS

He did not walk with arrogance but with humbleness among us; he did not seek the approval of men but only the approval of God; he did not have ambition for greatness but touched with beauty the common task; when afflictions came, he did not question God, but instead \ldots "walked humbly with God \ldots "

humbly with God ..." "J.B.", as I affectionately called him, believed in the eternal will of God and that an all purposeful God was directing his life, thus leading him to a devoted life of service in the ministry of the church. He was possessed with faith. He believed "that beyond this place of wrath and tears..." that there was a "city called heaven."

John Benjamin Franklin Williams was the son of a Methodist preacher who was one of the pioneer ministers of the Florida Annual Conference (CJ). J.B. graduated from Cookman Institute, Jacksonville, Florida in 1917, spent two years in the United States Navy and entered Lincoln University of Pennsylvania in 1924 and graduated from Clark College in Atlanta, Georgia with a B.A. degree in 1928. He married Lauree Wilkins in 1926 by whom he has a son, John B. F. Williams, Jr.

He began teaching at Bethune-Cookman College at Daytona Beach, Florida in 1928 as a math instructor and athletic director for two years. He studied at Teachers' College of Columbia University and earned the M.A. degree in Education in 1932. He was Principal of Excelsior High School of St. Augustine for ten years. He was also Principal of Jackson County Training School of Marianna, Fla. for three years. He served as a teacher of Extension classes at Florida A & M from 1932-37.

J.B. experienced the restlessness of an emptiness from within which gave rise to a hunger for deeper service and was called to the ministry of the church and faith to which his father had dedicated himself. He was ordained Deacon in 1937, Elder in 1942. He served pastorates of St. Joseph, Jacksonville in 1938 and Marianna Mission 1939-42.

J.B. was transferred to the Central Alabama Conference and became pastor of Warren Street Church in Mobile from 1942-48. He was District Superintendent of the Tuskegee District 1948-54 and pastor of Goodsell Church in Lanett 1954-57. While serving on the Tuskegee District, his wife, Lauree, died and was buried in Palatka, Florida. The same year he entered Gammon Theological Seminary, Atlanta, Georgia and in 1957 received his B.D. degree.

J.B. then transferred to Florida and served Ebenezer church, Jacksonville from 1957-61. Being widowed he married Essie Mae Farmby from Fairfax, Alabama in 1961. He was appointed District Superintendent of the North Florida District, Florida Conference (CJ) 1961-67. He was pastor of the Tyer Temple Church, Tampa from 1967-71. The Florida Conference (CJ) and SEJ found again the needed leadership that J.B. possessed in the merger of the two conferences. Because of his faithfulness, overall devotion to the pastoral ministry and administrative ability, Bishop James W. Henley appointed him District Superintendent of the Melbourne District in 1971; the first black man to serve in the office of the Florida Conference. History for him, history for the Conference and history for the church.

He will be remembered in many capacities but "perhaps he will be remembered best for his remarkable leadership . . ." as co-chairman of the Advisory Council on Inter-Jurisdictional Affairs which provided guidance in the merger of the Florida Conference (SEJ) and the Florida Conference (CJ). "He was loved and respected by all."

On September 8, without notice, Florida Methodism lost a faithful minister and a beloved brother. On September 11 at First United Methodist Church, Melbourne a large crowd of earthly friends gathered with the family for the funeral service. Bishop James W. Henley preached the sermon. On the same date at 3:30 PM these friends joined by others at Emmanuel Church, Palatka, for a second service. Ernest W. Newman preached the sermon. The two services focused on J.B. the preacher, a man of love and a man of faith. The two services came to a fitting close with the Recessional Hymn: "How Firm a Foundation."

CLARENCE RUSSELL ANDREW BANKS

The life of Clarence Russell Andrew Banks can be said to have been the personification of the following words of William De Witt Hyde:

"Live in the active voice, rather than the passive. Think more about what you can make happen than what is happening to you.

Live in the indicative mood, rather than in the subjunctive. Be concerned with things as they are, rather than as they might be.

Live in the present tense, facing the duty at hand without regret for the past or worry over the future.

Live in the singular number, caring more for the approval

of your own conscience than for the applause of the crowd."

Clarence R. A. Banks was born to Anna Mae Wills Banks and the late Fred Douglas Banks in Hannibal, Missouri, on March 3, 1895. At the age of twelve, he became a member of Asbury Chapel in Kansas City, Missouri. He was licensed to preach when he was sixteen years old at the Centennial United Methodist, under the leadership of Reverend Richard E. Davis.

After receiving his high school education, in Chicago, he attended Clarke College and Gammon Theological Seminary in Atlanta, Georgia. During World War I, he served for eighteen months in the United States Army.

His first church appointment was in Farrington, Missouri, in 1927. The next year, he moved to a church in Cedar Keys, Florida.

In 1927, he married Rowena Virginia Harley, who passed away December 1, 1966. There were no children of this union.

For thirty-nine years, he served as an active pastor in many of the leading Methodist Churches of Florida. Two terms were served as District Superintendent of the former Central Jurisdiction of the South Florida District of the Florida Conference. Sixteen years were spent in faithful service as pastor of St. John United Methodist Church. Under his leadership, the present St. John Church was built. He retired from active ministry in 1967, although he continued to serve as supply minister for two additional years.

In May of 1970, he was married to Roberta Austin Whitaker. Her daughters, Phyllis and Valerie, were legally adopted by Reverend Banks in November of 1970. He departed this life Saturday, October 23, 1971, in the Broward General Medical Center. He leaves to mourn his loss: His mother, Mrs. Anna Scott; His wife, Roberta; His two daughters, Phyllis and Valerie; and many friends.

His funeral service was conducted in the St. John United Methodist Church by The Reverend Horace W. Lewis, who began his ministry under the administration of Reverend Banks. His body was laid to rest in the Sunset Memorial Gardens Cemetery, Fort Lauderdale.

RICHARD JOHNSON BROYLES

Richard Johnson Broyles was born March 6, 1893, in Atlanta. Upon graduation from Emory University he became a reporter for the Atlanta Constitution. Shortly after that the United States entered World War I, and young Dick enlisted in the Army. He rose to the rank of captain in the infantry. During his service period he was wounded in battle in France.

Stricken with the horrors of war Richard Broyles entered the school of theology at Emory, feeling that only the way of Christ could solve the madness of humanity.

On April 17, 1922, he married Mary Ruth Jones of Macon, who at the time was a medical student. His first pastorate was at Loganville, Georgia. From there he went to Rome and Greensboro. For a time he served as vice-president of Scarritt College in Nashville. Then he became pastor of Peachtree Road Church in Atlanta.

In 1932 Dr. Broyles became pastor at First Church, Gainesville, Florida, where he served for seven years. He entered fully into the life of the University of Florida community, where he was called upon to lecture in philosophy and to speak on many occasions. In 1939 he went to Riverside Church, Miami, where he served for six years. From there he went to Hyde Park, Tampa, then to First Church, Lakeland, where, in his fifth year, 1952, he was forced to retire due to ill health.

Upon retirement he returned to Georgia, where he and Mary settled in the tranquility of a lovely rural setting near Norcross. He died at home of a heart attack on April 19, 1972, just two days after he and Mrs. Broyles had celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary. He is survived by his noble wife, Mary; three children, Dr. Arthur A. Broyles of Gainesville, Dr. Lucy Broyles Golson of Gainesville, and Dr. David Broyles of Winston Salem, N. C.—all university professors; a brother, Julian Broyles of Atlanta; and nine grandchildren.

Funeral services for Richard J. Broyles were held at the Norcross United Methodist Church, with the pastor, the Rev. Burch Fannin, and the Rev. Lloyd Knox officiating.

Few men have enjoyed the full rich life that this man had. He was tremendously gifted and he used his talents fully and well. His life was a celebration! Our lives were enriched by his. It was a joy to know him.

Richard Broyles had a brilliant mind. He was an avid reader who was conversant with the great theologians, philosophers, artists, poets, and musicians. He was a good historian and a fine Bible scholar.

Such intellectual ability coupled with a warm, gentle spirit made him an excellent and gifted preacher. Even in his last year of life this man was so lucid and loving that he intrigued youth who would sit and discuss current events as they are cast in historical perspective. A number of us were inspired to become ministers by his preaching and example.

He was able to relate well to people of all stations of life. He was warmly received by people of rural Georgia during his retirement years, when on occasion he would preach. Yet he was very much at home in the academic world. He was a man of integrity and a fighter for justice. He was a beloved pastor.

In his retirement years he was able to detach himself in his rural retreat, which was for him a "Walden". He did gardening and raised chickens. He loved the beauty of the tall pines. A neighbor said of him: "I have never known a man who loved nature quite so much." He always continued in the mind-stretching pursuit of knowledge through reading Bible commentaries, philosophy and poetry. He took up painting and produced a number of well done objects of art.

It is fitting that one who loved beauty so deeply should have died at the close of the dogwood and azalea season. Dick Broyles once more was able to celebrate with God the beauty of one of Georgia's most glorious spring-times.

As Dick Broyles celebrates the beauty of the deeper life in eternity with Cod, we rejoice and give thanks to God for sharing with us the life of one who so richly blessed us.

Thomas A. Ferguson was born in Holmesville, Mississippi in 1888 and died in Tallahassee, Florida on October 18, 1971 after a brief illness. EDGAR THOMAS STANDIFER

The Reverend Edgar Thomas Standifer was born March 2, 1896 at Montevallo, Alabama. He moved with his family to Tuscaloosa, Alabama when he was twelve years of age. He was wonderfully converted in 1910, and later served with the military forces in France during World War I.

He received his Bachelor of Science degree from the University of Alabama; Master of Arts from Emory University; Bachelor of Divinity from Candler School of Theology; and the Master of Systematic Theology from Union Theological Seminary, New York. Edgar Standifer was a man of fervent prayer. During his days at Emory

Edgar Standifer was a man of fervent prayer. During his days at Emory he often went into the woods to pray. According to his reference to those sacred hours, he committed himself to God and finally said, "Lord, I'll go to Africa, or wherever You will have me go." He offered himself for mission work in Africa, but the Board of Missions did not have funds to send additional missionaries at the time.

After an urgent appeal for twelve volunteers from Emory for mission work in the Northwest, he volunteered and was sent to Bozeman, Montana in 1924, and later to Portland, Oregon as pastor of First Methodist Episcopal Church South. In 1926 he was ordained Deacon and in 1928 Elder by Bishop Samuel R. Hay. Edgar Standifer transferred to the Florida Conference in 1931. It was shortly after his transfer to Florida that this writer became acquainted with this dedicated "Preacher of the Gospel."

While serving Epperson Memorial Church in Jacksonville, he met Miss Victoria Peake. They were married June 8, 1937. She was loved where ever they served. Their marriage further confirmed his belief that Heaven helps to direct human destiny. God blest them with two sons, the Reverend Robert T. Standifer and Wayne E. Standifer. Robert is the very effective pastor of the Cleveland Church, Punta Gorda, and Wayne is still preparing for the field of Education.

A written statement from Wayne indicates the wonderful devotion and respect that he has for his father's memory, and the Christian ties and unity of the entire Standifer family. Below is an excerpt from that statement:

"The key to his life was found in his prayers. He regarded prayer as an art form with the inspiration divine. To hear him at prayer was to hear the flights of his soul battered and uplifted by torments and hopes terrestrial and divine. His New Year's resolutions were always the same: "Father, lead me to a more meaningful prayer life."

During the forty years that I knew Edgar Standifer I never heard him speak an unkind word about another or observe him do a mean thing. He truly went about doing good. He ministered faithfully to the sick, the sorrowing, the sojourners, and the saints. He exemplified Christ by his life. His ear was attuned to every cry of need, and responsive to the voice of the Holy Spirit. He loved God, the Church, his family, and enjoyed fellowship with his friends.

Many lives are richer and fuller because he lived, loved, and served. He invested heavily in my own life as he did in the lives of those to whom he ministered. He served the following charges in the Florida Conference: Pompano; Dinsmore-Epperson; Trinity-Northside, St. Petersburg; Enterprise; Jasper; Seminole; Chattahoochee; Auburndale; Okeechobee; New Port Richey; Oviedo-Geneva; Ellenton-Terra Ceia; Ellenton; Bowling Green; Charlotte Harbor-Cleveland; and Parrish.

He completed his earthly assignment, Sunday, September 26, 1971 in Bradenton. A memorial service of Christian worship was held in The First United Methodist Church, Bradenton, September 28, 1971 at 2 p.m. The three pastors in charge were the Reverends Jiles Kirkland, Charles A. Thompson, and Milton H. Wyatt.

His body now rests in Mansion Memorial Park, Ellenton, Florida, a community that he loved, but the influence of his life will continue to bless the world until time shall be no more.

John Granville Stradley was born in a Methodist parsonage at Ceres, Virginia, April 5, 1897. He is survived by his wife, Laura McMillan Stradley. They were married Feb. 20, 1924, at Emory University, Georgia, by Dr. Franklin N. Parker. Dr. Stradley is survived by a daughter, Katherine Louise Womack of Lexington, N.C. and two grandchildren, Laura Katherine Perlman, of Charlotte, N.C. and Leslie Dods Womack, of Lexington, N.C. A son, John, Jr., was a Marine flier and was killed in an accident in 1949. John was admitted into the Florida Conference On Trial in 1923; and

He served the following appointments: Homestead; Wagg Memorial, West Palm Beach; Williston; First Church, Key West; Broadway, Orlando; Leesburg; Winter Haven; Seminole Heights, Tampa; District Superintendent, Lakeland District; Quincy; First, Ft. Pierce; Co-Pastor, First Church, Orlando; Madison; retirement in 1964.

John's preparation for the ministry began in his parsonage home. His

father and a brother were members of the Holston Conference, and also his grandfather. His father's two sisters were missionaries in Brazil for years. John himself planned to go as a missionary, but a shortage of funds kept the Mission Board from being able to send him when he was ready. Instead he took an appointment in Florida under Bishop Ainsworth. John, Jr. had hoped to go as a missionary after his term of service in the Marine Corps was over. Thus we see the influence of family ties on the direction of our lives. John Stradley attended Hiwassee College and received his B.A. degree from Emory and Henry College. His B.D. was earned at Emory University.

from Emory and Henry College. His B.D. was earned at Emory University. Brother Stradley started at Homestead, Florida, an agricultural community. It offered him ample opportunity for growth and development. It was here that he learned to preach the Word, and he became a thoughtful and helpful preacher throughout his ministry. As "preacher in charge" he assumed leadership and became an able administrator of church affairs. He took seriously the injunction at his ordination "to visit from house to house." He took to it and loved it, for he had within him a heart of compassion, and he loved his people like Jesus loved. He responded to every need at every age level. He was always on the go to see the sick, to comfort the bereaved, and to help the troubled. Dr. J. Richard Spann writing in Pastoral Care has said: "One of the greatest contributions the church has given to the world has been the pastor who was a true shepherd." John excelled as a pastor.

John Stradey was a Leader and Builder in the field of finances. He built an Educational Building at Key West. At Broadway, Orlando, he refinanced the debt and built a parsonage. He also built a beautiful parsonage in Winter Haven in 1940. At Seminole Heights, in Tampa he organized a "Freedom from Debt" Campaign, and paid off the remaining indebtedness there in 1944. Thus it was that Bishop Arthur J. Moore was able to dedicate that great church on January 14, 1945.

During his career John served his Conference on the Board of Education; the Board of Ministerial Training; the Commission on World Service and Finance; and as a Conference Trustee.

John served a full six year term on the Lakeland District. He made a good record and was beloved by both preachers and laymen. At the close of his term Florida Southern College conferred on him the Honorary Doctor of Divinity Degree.

John stood tall, straight and stalwart. He had convictions and the courage to go with them. He was positive and direct in his dealings. On the other hand he was likeable, friendly, and worked well with others. In his work of pastoral care he was warm, tender, gentle, and full of compassion. I consider John Stradley the personification of the Good Shepherd. I rate him above all others I have known in that respect. He knew how to minister to all classes; rich and poor; learned and unlearned; important people and poor folks. Likewise he was at home with all ages: babies, children, youth, adults, and the elderly. He worked at his job incessantly, but he was never too busy or too tired to go to those in need, day or night. Upon retirement Brother Stradley selected Winter Haven as the place

Upon retirement Brother Stradley selected Winter Haven as the place he wanted to live. He became Minister of Visitation for Beymer Memorial United Methodist Church. He became a familiar figure, both in the church gathered together and scattered abroad in the parish. He was always moving about extending tender loving care. This he continued to do even after his first heart attack.

A greatly appreciated tribute came to him and his wife toward the end of his ministry. Beymer Memorial Church named their new Educational Building Stradley Hall, honoring John and Laura.

After retirement several of our families got together once or twice a year for fellowship and fun. We came to know John even more intimately. He had mellowed and matured in Christian love. He simply moved among us with a winsome smile on his face and a kind word for each of us. His presence will be sorely missed.

John Stradley died November 20, 1971 at Winter Haven. His funeral service was conducted from Beymer Memorial Methodist Church, November

22. The Pastor, Rev. James C. Rowan presided and talked. Dr. Henry W. Blackburn gave the eulogy, and Dr. J. Withers Blake led in prayer. His body was laid to rest in Lakeside Memorial Park, Winter Haven.

John Stradley lived a full life of great dedication and usefulness. He left an indelible impression upon thousands of lives.

LEWIS GARNER STURDIVANT

Lewis Garner Sturdivant was born in Greensboro, Alabama on October 18, 1888. His father, Dr. Joel Fletcher Sturdivant, was professor of English in the old Southern University. This institution was later merged with Birmingham College and became Birmingham-Southern. Lewis G. Sturdivant's mother was formerly Sadie Lawson. Her family played an important role in the business and civic life of Alabama for years.

The collegiate education of Lewis G. Sturdivant was gained at Birmingham-Southern. He was licensed to preach at the Birmingham District Conference in 1910. This was the third generation to enter the Methodist itinerary as both his father and grandfather had served in the ministry.

In the years that followed he served a number of prominent appointments in the North Alabama Conference. He was at Walker Memorial in Birmingham, First Church at Huntsville, First Church at Florence, and the Presiding Elder of the Decatur District. He was later transferred to the Virginia Conference where he served as minister of Park Place in Norfolk. A large ministry to servicemen took place here as one of the leading churches in America to provide spiritual help during the time of World War II. He was then transferred to Greene Memorial in Roanoke, and then later to Trinity in Miami, Florida.

Due to serious throat trouble it was necessary for him to retire. He and his wife, Agnes, bought a home in South Miami and lived for a number of years, both active in the work of the church.

Dr. Sturdivant taught a large Sunday School class in the South Miami Methodist Church while his wife taught a similar class at Trinity. Mrs. Sturdivant was the former Agnes Harris of Indianapolis, Indiana. During the ministry of her husband she was a wonderful help-mate. The people admired and loved her. She continues to reside in South Miami and is active in the First United Methodist Church of South Miami.

In the course of the ministry of Lewis G. Sturdivant he was given two honorary degrees—the degree of Doctor of Divinity and Doctor of Humane Languages. He was a thirty-second degree Scottish Rite Mason and a member of the Shrine.

During the period when Dr. Sturdivant was teaching the large Sunday School class in South Miami, the class gave a program in honor of their teacher—"This Is Your Life." Many prominent people paid tribute to the gifted teacher. Bishop Clare Purcell sent a message saying he remembered Dr. Sturdivant's courage. "He was not afraid of the unpopular side." Bishop Arthur Moore added, "I remember Dr. Sturdivant as a high class Christian gentleman."

This sturdy soldier of the cross came to the close of this earthly life on June 11, 1971 at Miami, Florida. The memorial service was held in the First United Methodist Church of South Miami. Rev. Leo F. King, pastor of the church gave the memorial address and Dr. Durward McDonell assisted. Survivors include his wife, Agnes H.; a daughter, Mrs. Arch Dawson, of San Marino, California; a brother, Joel F., of Coral Gables, and two grandchildren.

The Reverend R. Eugene Rutland was born in Fredonia, Alabama, on March 18, 1892, and died in Gainesville, Florida, on May 19, 1972. Having joined the North Georgia Conference in 1914, he served appointments at Thomaston, Blairsville, Ringgold, Zebulon, Stockbridge, Porterdale, Gainesville, Lawrenceville, and Bowman before transferring to Florida in 1933. In Florida, he served at Palmetto, Sarasota, Fort Lauderdale, Winter Haven, Ocala, Lakeland, and Seminole Heights in Tampa, and then was appointed Superintendent of the Gainesvillet District. After that he served in Sanford and then retired to live in McIntosh, where he was appointed as Retired Supply of the church. He served in that capacity for 12 years, and "finally" retired again in 1970.

He is survived by his wife, the former Leila Cotton, with whom he would have celebrated a Golden Wedding Anniversary had he lived 32 days longer. She will continue to live among the beloved people of McIntosh, who have made a warm and welcome place for them in their hearts and in the community. There are also two sons, Gene Junior, and Walter; two daughters-in-law, Martha Jane and Ann Carolyn, who treated him as a much-loved father and whom he loved as much as fathers love their own daughters—and perhaps more because he knew how much they mean to his sons. There should also be acknowledged as survivors a number of other ministers of our Conference who, like his other sons, called him "Pop" and share some indescribable indebtedness to him.

In the latter years of life he came under the care of Dr. William Deal at the J. Hillis Miller Health Center at the University of Florida in Gainesville. There developed a relationship which the family cherishes, for it represents to them not only the highest in professional competence but also the great personal caring which humanizes technical proficiency. There were, nevertheless, a couple of ailments which eluded the most skillful efforts at diagnosis over the final few years. Therefore, it is not at all surprising that he gave his body to the Department of Anatomy. They will not discover those qualities which so endeared him to us, but perhaps they will learn something else of value.

So, his body goes to the researchers, but what he really was goes to that larger dimension of life of which the Christian is certain. Quite possibly, in that life, as in this one, while others nestle around the seats of power, Eugene Rutland will find a place to give candy to the children, put in a garden or a fruit tree, and give encouragement to others. And if indeed there are any Hounds of Heaven, he can teach them to point and to retrieve.

He was for many of us truly like the shade of a great rock in a weary lend. There was within him an inner certainty, not in the knowledge of answers but of depth of commitment to God in Christ, which issued in a sense of wholeness, of meaning, and of joy. Many of us yet aspire to that. His love for us was never threatening or forced; he sometimes disagreed with us, but always believed in us. There were times when we trusted in God primarily because he did, and when we stayed with the church, not because it seemed the thing to do, but because he did. His sturdiness furnished a shade or shelter around and within which many lives were nourished until they could stand on their own.

There was always an affirmative quality in his life which is perhaps symbolized by a sermon outline discovered in his papers after his death. Written probably in his eightieth year, it was a sermon on the possibilities of Christian hope in the space age. Perhaps even more illustrative (and amusing to those who recall receiving letters from him written all over scraps of almost anything) is the fact that the outline was written on the back of a paper which contains a resolution springing from fear and mistrust from a congregation of people at odds with what God has called His church to be in the twentieth century.

He did well all of the tasks a minister is called to do, but most of all he loved being a pastor. He knew and felt the costs of it, for he shared the hurts and disappointments his people experiences; but having somehow learned the need of people to be loved and cared for, he gave himself as one called to the task, with genuine love and artless effectiveness. This is perhaps his most enduring memorial. People will remember the difference his pastoral care made in their lives long after new buildings have been remodeled and sermons forgotten.

We will keep and share the faith he shared with us. It will be done not out of fear but of love, and not by imitating him, but by following the same Master he followed.

A memorial service was held in McIntosh on Sunday afternoon, May 20, 1972. Officiating ministers were R. Gary Perkins, Pastor, Henry Blackburn, Withers Blake, Don Cooke, Bishop James W. Henley, Orville Ripley, Ballard Wilson, and Gene Zimmerman.

PART IX

STANDING RULES OF THE FLORIDA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

I. ORGANIZATION OF THE CONFERENCE

1. The following rules of procedure shall be observed to expedite the business of the Conference:

a. All reports and resolutions shall be typed for submission to the Annual Conference, and shall be submitted to the Secretary in duplicate.

b. No report or resolution shall be acted upon until it has been before the Conference 24 hours, and a copy has been furnished the Conference Secretary, except a resolution extending a vote of thanks. Publication of a report in the Conference Report Book shall be deemed to have fulfilled this requirement.

c. Any resolution not coming from an established board, commission, or committee, shall be referred to the Committee on Reference before discussion on the floor of the Conference.

d. Any report or resolution presented by a regular Committee or Board of the Conference, in accordance with the provisions above, shall be properly before the body of the Conference, when it is presented without a motion or a second.

e. Every resolution requiring implementation shall carry the cost to the Conference, and shall include in the resolution the name of the implementing Board, agency, or officer. All resolutions for communication shall designate the person or persons responsible for the communication. (See also Section III, Article 8)

f. A member of the Conference who wishes to be recognized by the Chairman for a question, point of order, or discussion of a motion, shall address the Chairman and wait for recognition. When he is recognized by the Chairman, he will give his name, whether he is a lay or clerical member; and, if a lay member, he will give the name of his local Church.

g. Debate and discussion of motions will be limited to three minutes per speech, and the speeches will alternate between those for and those against. h. A member of the Conference will be permitted to speak only one time in behalf of, or in opposition to, any motion before the Conference with the following exception: if no one wishes to speak opposite to the preceding speech, a member who has spoken on the motion may speak one more time. It is understood that this rule shall not be construed to debar the maker of a motion from concluding the debate.

i. A motion to call for the previous question may be made at any time, if no one desires to speak. However, as long as there are those desiring to speak, a motion for the call of the previous question may not be made until there have been two speeches for and two speeches against the pending motion.

2. The Secretary shall be elected quadrennially at the first session of the Annual Conference following the General Conference, assuming office on January 1 of the ensuing year, and shall be eligible to serve no more than two consecutive quadrennia. In event of a vacancy, the Cabinet shall have authority to appoint a successor, subject to confirmation by the next session of the Annual Conference.

a. The Secretary shall have such assistants as he may desire, elected by the Conference on his nomination.

b. The Secretary shall edit and publish the Conference Minutes.

c. He shall be the custodian of the books and archives of the Conference and shall annually report where they are kept. He shall cooperate with the Committee on Archives and History in the discharge of this responsibility and shall be an ex officio member of that Committee. d. The Secretary shall be an ex officio member of the Board of Pensions,

and of the Service Years Committee of that Board.

e. A committee on Journal shall be elected at the beginning of each annual session upon nomination of the Secretary, and shall consist of three members of the conference session. Such committee shall examine the daily journal, make any needed corrections, and report back to the next meet-ing, and the adoption of their report shall be the approval of the minutes.

3. The Conference Statistician shall be elected quadrennially at the first session of the Annual Conference following the General Conference, assuming office on January 1 of the ensuing year, and shall be eligible to serve no more than two consecutive quadrennia. In event of a vacancy, the Cabinet shall have authority to appoint a successor, subject to confirmation by the next session of the Annual Conference.

a. The Conference Statistician shall collect the statistics of the Conference, and shall edit the Statistical Tables in the annual Journal.

b. He shall employ such help as is necessary to do the work accurately and expeditiously, any expense to be paid by the Secretary out of the apportionment for "Minutes and Statistics."

c. The cabinet shall determine the date each year after which the Statistician shall accept no reports.

d. Fractions shall not be used in making statistical reports.

e. The Statistician shall see that every report made by a charge or a church agrees with the record of the Conference Treasurer.

4. The Conference Treasurer shall be elected by the Annual Conference and supervised by the Conference Commission on World Service as provided in the Discipline.

a. The Conference Treasurer shall make monthly distributions to the treasurers of the several Annual Conference boards and causes for all Conference work and to the treasurers of the several General Conference Boards and causes for all general work according to the percentage of the apportionments for general and conference work adopted by the Annual Conference. All amounts paid in on all causes beyond the apportioned amounts, other than the percentage for General World Service, shall be placed in the various Conference Reserve Funds at the end of each fiscal year, as stipulated by the Commission on World Service and Finance.

b. The treasurer shall procure from the Conference Statistician or from the district superintendents a report of the apportionments accepted by the several charges within the Conference and shall settle with those charges by that report. He shall have no power to waive or change this rule.

c. He shall regularly furnish each district superintendent a statement of the amounts of monies received by him for all causes from each pastoral charge within that district; each such statement to include all monies received from the closing of the Annual Conference to the date issued.

d. All special day funds shall be remitted through the Conference Treasurer.

e. The Conference Treasurer shall close his books for the year on the date approved by the World Service Commission and the Cabinet. f. The Conference fiscal year shall be the calendar year.

II. DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS

1. The District Superintendents are a standing committee to nominate the officers, boards and committees of the Conference and to nominate persons to fill vacancies thereon, except as otherwise provided by the Discipline, or by these rules.

2. An appointment to the District Superintendency shall vacate membership in any Quadrennial Board, Commission or Committee of the Conference, except Trustees, unless the General or Annual Conference provides otherwise.

3. Each District Superintendent shall, at the earliest possible date, file with the Chairman of the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance, with the Conference Treasurer, and with the Statistical Secretary an accurate statement of the amounts of apportionments accepted by the various Charge Conferences within his district.

III. BOARDS, STANDING COMMITTEES AND COMMISSIONS

1. Each Board, Commission, or Committee of the Conference shall give advance notice of its regular meeting place and time, through the Conference publications, and shall receive any person(s) who may desire to discuss and/or offer program suggestions related to the work of such Board, Commission or Committee.

2. Each board or committee of the Conference shall cause to be printed in the Conference Journal an exact statement of the salaries and expenses paid on account of any person employed by the said board or committee.

3. Each board, committee or institution of the Conference shall make an exact annual report to the Conference of monies it has received and what disposition has been made of them, and each shall file annually with the Bishop and Cabinet and the Chairman of the Commission on World Service and Finance a complete statement of its financial condition, showing all assets and liabilities. This statement shall include all monies held in reserve accounts.

4. The Conference Commission on World Service and Finance shall contract with the Conference Treasurer, subject to the Conference, for his service and the manner in which he shall manage the funds of the Conference; shall take from him an indemnity bond in such amount as shall cover whatever amount may be deposited in the bank, and shall annually have his books and accounts audited by a certified public accountant, and print the report of the same.

5. Unless otherwise ordered by the Conference, the Commission on World Service and Finance shall distribute the apportionments to the districts on a basis agreed upon with the cabinet.

6. The Commission on World Service and Finance shall determine annually what amount shall be necessary to print and publish the Minutes and shall assess the same upon the Conference along with the other apportionments.

7. The Conference Trustees shall hold title to Conference-owned properties, exclusive of institutions given separate identity by action of the Annual Conference. They shall have authority to organize as they determine, to maintain all properties and parsonages under their responsibility, and may set up proper committees for this work. The Trustees are not limited to their own membership for persons to serve on such committees. The Trustees shall have no authority to interfere with the use or programming for such properties by the Conference Council or other authorized agencies.

8. When a Board, Commission, Agency, or individual member recommends to the Conference that a Committee be appointed, or that a task be performed by an existing Board, Commission, Agency, or individual that they either have the financial cost of such project covered in an existing budget asking, or present to the Conference the estimated cost, before final action is taken.

9. The Conference Commission on World Service and Finance shall designate the depository or depositories for Conference funds.

10. No Board or Agency of the Conference shall be allowed to obligate itself beyond its anticipated annual income, except by $\frac{3}{4}$ vote of both the Commission on World Service and Finance, and the Cabinet; provided this restriction does not apply to Florida Southern College and the Florida Methodist Children's Home.

11. No person shall be a member of any Conference commission, board, committee or trustee, if in his private business he has conflict of interest with the purposes or business of such commission, board, committee or trustee, or does or proposes to do business with the same.

12. Membership on a Quadrennial Board, Commission or Committee shall be limited to eight (8) consecutive years for both clerical and lay members. Membership on Boards of Trustees of Conference institutions shall be limited to nine (9) consecutive years for clerical members. Members rotating off any board, commission or committee under these provisions shall become eligible for re-election to such Board after a period of two (2) years. Membership shall not be held in more than one of the quadrennial boards, commissions or committees, provided, however, that this rule does not apply to trustees, to members of the Conference Committee of investigation, or ex-officio members, or to others established by the Discipline or the Standing Rules of the Conference. Beginning in 1970 no man shall serve longer than four years as chairman of the same quadrennial board, commission or committee.

13. Offices in the Annual Conference and membership on the Boards, Committees or Commissions shall be held only by effective clerical members of the Conference, and by laymen who have not reached their 72nd birthday, except ex-officio members. It is recommended that these provisions also apply to the election of delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conferences.

14. Persons serving on General Boards or agencies of the United Methodist Church who are members of the Florida Conference or are members of any Church in the Florida Conference may be full members of the comparable Conference Board or agency; and, of any comparable District Work Area. The rotation rule will not apply for such term of service; but the rule regarding service on two boards shall apply. 15. District Lay Leaders and Associate District Lay Leaders shall be

15. District Lay Leaders and Associate District Lay Leaders shall be elected by the Annual Conference on nomination of the district superintendent and the Conference Lay Leader where no District Board of the Laity is constituted.

16. It shall be the duty of every board or commission holding property to provide the district superintendent with a complete list of its holdings within the district. The list shall include the title under which the property is held, a description of the land, and whether or not the property is exempt from taxes. The secretary of the Board or Commission shall report any changes in the list promptly.

17. The Charter and By Laws of each incorporated Conference Board or Institution shall be filed with the Conference Secretary, who shall print each year in the Conference Journal a notation of where said charter may be found in prior Journals. The Conference Secretary shall be notified immediately of any proposed changes in said charter or by-laws.

IV. THE DISTRICT CONFERENCE

1. Lay membership in the District Conference when existent, shall consist of those lay members from each pastoral charge named in the Discipline. 2. In addition to the above, the Charge Conference shall have the privilege

2. In addition to the above, the Charge Conference shall have the privilege of electing two additional delegates and two reserve delegates.

V. BOARD OF THE MINISTRY

1. The Board of the Ministry shall present to the Conference to be filed among its papers a complete biographical sketch of all persons admitted into full connection and of all persons received by transfer; and of the latter, a sketch of the ministry up to date when received by transfer.

2. The Board of the Ministry shall require each applicant, including those being admitted from other churches, to present a certificate of good health from a practicing physician and an itemized statement of his financial obligations.

3. Any graduate of a seminary not approved by the University Senate desiring to enter the Florida Conference on trial under the Seminary Rule, must have completed one additional full academic year of study in a Seminary approved by the University Senate. 4. All candidates for Probationary Membership, Associate Membership, and Full Connection status shall appear in person before the Board for interviewing.

5. All Candidates for Full Connection shall serve for a minimum of twenty-one months in the Florida Annual Conference under the supervision of a District Superintendent, except that faculty or staff in United Methodist Colleges, Universities, or Seminaries may be permitted to render this service outside the bounds of the Florida Annual Conference.

6. All candidates for Full Connection who have contingenies will meet with the Board of the Ministry annually in the spring meeting after academics until the contingency is satisfied.

7. Candidates from other denominations shall remain On Probation not less than two years.

8. Beginning June 1964 candidates under thirty years of age are required to complete the B.D., or an equivalent degree, before admission into Full Connection.

9. Candidates for Admission on Probation from other conferences shall also be recommended by a District Committee on Ministry of the Florida Conference.

10. Candidates for Admission On Probation shall have satisfactorily completed the Psychological Guidance Program of the Conference; candidates transferred in On Probation shall comply with the Standing Rules of the Florida Conference for candidates for Admission On Probation, including the Psychological Guidance Program.

11. Candidates for readmission from location, except those being readnitted for the purpose of retirement or transfer, shall have completed satisfactorily, immediately prior to being readmitted, the Psychological Guidance Program of the Conference.

- a. The District Committee on the Ministry shall include in its examination for License to Preach, vocational and aptitude tests as authorized by the Discipline, Paragraph 310.5: "A Candidate will make himself available for any psychological and aptitude tests required and provided by the District Committee on the Ministry."
- b. All Candidates for Probationary membership from other areas are to comply with this requirement of vocational and aptitude tests prior to appearing before a District Committee on the Ministry.

12. Candidates for License to Preach under the Course of Study shall do so under supervision of the Department of Ministerial Education, P. O. Box 871, Nashville, Tennessee 37202. All recommendations for License to Preach shall be valid for one year only from date of initial recommendation.

13. All ministerial candidates for conference membership or full-time Lay Pastors, who are beyond the Introductory Studies, shall attend a Summer School for Courses of Study; and that work by correspondence shall be permitted only "in a case of emergency or unusual circumstance" in which the District Superintendent has certified in writing to the nature of the health problem or the financial hardship and his recommendation has been approved by the Board in each case.

14. Target Dates listed herein are requisite to the Board's fulfilling its responsibilities to the candidates and to the Conference. Requested adjustments may be made in exceptional cases if they fall under the Board's jurisdiction.

- 2. March 1: Master Report of the District Superintendent (Manual p. 189)
- 3. March 1: Application for Probationary and Associate Membership, and any other Conference relationships. (Manual p. 26)

- 5. March 15: Lay Pastor's Annual Progress Report (Manual p. 32)
- 6. May 15: Application for Enrollment in Course of Study Summer School (Manual p. 118)

7. May 15: Target Date for Application for Service Loan from Ministerial Education Fund (Manual p. 23)

VI. CONFERENCE ENTERTAINMENT

1. The Annual Conference shall meet upon invitation at such places as may be selected by the conference, or by the Bishop and Cabinet, if so directed by the Conference.

2. Entertainment for pastors with minimum income, retired preachers, Lay Pastors, and men applying for Probationary Membership shall be provided or supplemented as may from time to time be determined by the Commission on World Service and Finance, the Cabinet, and the host Church or Institution.

3. All other preachers and lay delegates shall provide for their own entertainment, but it is recommended to all churches, where possible, that they make provision for such expenses, at least in part.

VII. FINANCIAL APPEALS

1. No financial appeal or fund-raising effort whatsoever shall be made beyond the local charge unless first authorized by action of the Annual Conference, or if in a District, by the District Conference.

2. Authorization of the Conference shall be secured by presenting, prior to the Annual Conference session, the purpose and plan of the appeal to the Board involved, to the Commission on World Service and Finance, and to the Cabinet.

3. Upon authorization of the Annual Conference, the Cabinet shall assign the appeal to a place on the calendar of the Conference.

4. Emergency appeals between sessions of the Conference may be authorized in clearly unusual circumstances of great emergency, only after the combined approval of the Bishop and Cabinet, the Boards involved, and the Commission on World Service and Finance.

VIII. YEARS OF SERVICE FOR ANNUITY CREDIT

A. Ministers on Special Appointment

1) Special Appointments shall be made in the following classifications: I. With Annuity claim:

a. Upon this Annual Conference:

- 1) As full-time employees of the Conference, the Conference assuming annuity responsibility:
- As an employee of a Conference approved agency or institution, the individual or institution assuming annuity responsibility:
- b. Upon a General Board, an Institution, or an Agency of The Methodist Church.

II. Without Annuity Claim Upon this Annual Conference.

- 2) The Conference Treasurer shall keep a record of each special appointee, showing the amount paid by this member or his institution to the Conference Board of Pensions. The individual or institution shall complete payment to the Conference Treasurer by April 15 each year, and the Conference Treasurer shall make a report to the Chairman of the Conference Board of Pensions by April 25 each year.
- 3) The Conference Board of Pensions shall review annually the status of each special appointee and a record of the amount remitted for annuity responsibility during each year shall be submitted to the Secretary of the Annual Conference for publication in the Conference Jour-

nal and such information shall be forwarded to the General Board of Pensions.

- 4) Beginning with the Conference year 1967-68, all members of the Conference under special appointment in Section I a 2) shall be required to pay, or the institution they represent required to pay, an amount to be fixed annually by the Annual Conference for annuity responsibility.
- 5) Beginning with the Conference year 1968-69, conference annuity responsibility shall be assumed for all members of the Annual Conference in special appointments in Section I a 1), except those on sabbatical leave. The Commission on World Service shall be requested to provide from the Conference budget the apportionment for ministerial members of the Conference staff.
- 6) The primary appointment controls liability for annuity payments, with part-time employment disregarded in assuming annuity responsibility.

B. Ministers as Approved Supply Pastors or Lay Pastors

1. In determining eligibility for annuity credit for years of service as an approved supply pastor prior to 1952, applicant must prove full-time service in accordance with disciplinary requirements.

2. No approved supply credit shall be given for years in which the applicant is appointed as a student supply, while preparing for admission on Probation.

3. To be eligible for annuity credit as an approved supply, one must be receiving minimum salary support or the equivalent.

4. A Conference committee on service years shall investigate all cases in which the Cabinet, Conference Secretary, Board of Pension, or other authority questions the eligibility of the applicant for claimed years of service. Said committee shall be composed of one member of the Cabinet appointed by the District Superintendents, one member of the Board of Pensions appointed by said board, and the Conference Secretary. All applicants shall have the right of appeal to the floor of the Annual Conference from the decision of said committee, but lacking such appeal, the decision of the committee is considered final.

5. Nothing in this article shall be construed to interfere in any way with the full supervision over the granting of pension claims by the Board of Pensions when a man has entered the retired relationship. Nor shall this article prevent the Cabinet in clearly unusual cases granting a year of annuity credit under the proper disciplinary question.

6. It shall be the business of each approved supply pastor to ascertain that the Secretary's record of his annuity years is properly carried in the Conference Journal, and that he has been given annuity credit year by year under the proper disciplinary question. After June, 1962, an approved supply minister eligible for annuity credit for a year of service, whose name has not been included in answer to the Disciplinary question, shall be responsible for bringing this matter to the attention of the Conference Secretary, and shall secure a statement from the District Superintendent under whom he served, or his successor, that he is entitled to such year. Failure to do so by the next session of the Annual Conference shall negate any future claim for this year.

IX. CONFERENCE COUNCIL

- 1. The Conference Program Council shall be conducted according to the provisions made in paragraph 841 in the 1968 Discipline.
- 2. The Conference Council shall be composed of the following:
 - The resident Bishop
 - The District Superintendents
 - The Chairman and one other representative elected by each of the following boards or agencies: Education, Missions, Evangelism, Social Concerns

- The Chairman of each of the following boards or agencies: Health and Human Welfare, Ministry, Pensions, Preacher's Relief, Christian Enlistment, Ecumenical Affairs, Church and Community Work in Town and Country, Public Relations and United Methodist Information, Historical Society, Commission on Stewardship and Finance, Worship, Lay Workers, and Commission on Higher Education
- Chairman of the following Conference Institutions: Florida Conference Trustees, Florida Southern College, Florida Methodist Children's Home, Florida Methodist Foundation and a Black Trustee of Bethune-Cookman College

The Conference Secretary

Two representatives of the Conference Youth Organization

Two representatives of the Women's Society of Christian Service, one of whom shall be the President

Conference Lay Leader

One layman from each district nominated by the District Superintendent, elected by the Annual Conference, who will be eligible to serve a maximum of four consecutive years

The members of each of the Conference Council organizations: Interpretation, Publishing Interests, Trafco, Planning and Research, Coordination, Children's Department Adult Department and Femily, Life Department

Children's Department, Adult Department, and Family Life Department Members-at-Large, not to exceed three, may be appointed by the Cabinet annually

Each Board or Agency may elect a reserve representative to attend when the regular representative is unable to do so

- The following shall be members of the Council without vote: Salaried and volunteer conference staff, the conference treasurer, and two members of the Commission on World Service and Finance, one of whom shall be the chairman.
- 3. The Conference Council shall elect a President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer quadrennially. The Council shall meet on the call of the chairman two times a year. The Council shall have an Executive Committee on which the officers of the Council, the Bishop, one District Superintendent, chosen by the Cabinet, the Program Director, the Chairmen of the Conference Boards of Christian Social Concerns, Education, Evangelism, and Missions, the Conference Lay Leader, and the Conference President of the Women's Society of Christian Service, President of the Conference Council on Youth Ministries, Chairman of the Commission on Stewardship and Finance of the Board of the Laity and four members-atlarge, elected by the Council will serve. Approximately one-half of the members of the Executive Committee shall be laymen. The Chairman of Conference World Service and Finance Commission, the Chairman of the following Conference Council Committees—Camp Advisory, Planning and Research, Staff and Personnel, and Coordination, shall serve without vote.

X. AMENDMENTS AND SUSPENSIONS

1. A Committee on Standing Rules shall be nominated annually by the Bishop and the Cabinet, and elected by the Conference.

2. Proposed amendments or changes to the Standing Rules shall be referred to the Committee on Standing Rules for consideration and presentation to the Conference for action.

3. The Standing Rules may be suspended at any time by a majority (counted) of the members present and voting.

4. A two-thirds vote of the members present and voting is necessary to amend or change the Standing Rules.

5. All resolutions requiring the action of the Annual Conference must be received not later than 30 days prior to the opening day of Annual Conference.
