# UNITED STATES NAVAL MOBILE CONSTRUCTION BATTALION ELEVEN 

## HISTORY

On Monday, 14 September 1953, at 1605, the following entry was placed in the first MCB-11 Officer of the Day Log:
"In compliance with OPNAV Notice 5440 (Classified) and COMSERVPAC Message 130044Z, MCB-11 is formally commissioned. LCDR James C. Castanes, CEC, USN, has assumed command. Colors were presented by CAPT W. C. G. Church, CEC, USN, with Mrs. James C. Castanes as National Color Sponsor and Mrs. Scott E. Wright as Battalion Color Sponsor. The invocation was said by LT D. W. Kennedy, CHC, USNR. The battalion passed in review."

MCB-11 was then officially known as "the Newest Battalion in Existence." LCDR Castanes had the honor of being the first "Skipper", with LCDR A. D. Froman, CEC, USNR, as his Executive Officer.

By 1 October 1953, the Supply Department had the P-1 component in shape, and on 16 October the "Natural Battalion" boarded USNS Barrett and headed for the Republic of the Philippines. Fifteen days later the Battalion disembarked at Cubi Point Naval Air Facility and became a part of the Thirtieth Naval Construction Regiment.

After a few rain-soaked days of setting up Battalion equipment, MCB-11 was ready to undertake its first assignment with all the "Can Do" spirit of a new team working together for the first time.

The large number of difficult and varied assignments received by the Battalion included construction work on permanent facilities, such as the new concrete barracks for Enlisted Men, subsistence building, and steam plant; the construction of temporary facilities, which included four new shops and warehouses; the new heavy equipment repair shop, which was the largest single building of the project; earthmoving for the construction of seaplane parking areas, roads, and building sites; and the maintenance and operation of camp facilities, consisting of central building shops, boiler shop, roads and paver, and refrigeration and water supply systems. The last project assigned to the Battalion was the construction of the steel sheet pile bulkhead in the seaplane parking area, in which the men of this Battalionworking under most difficult conditions-set new records for waterfront construction, including driving more pilings during one day than was ever before accomplished by any other construction group.

The "Natural Battalion" made a name for itself in the P. I.'s that will not easily be forgotten. With the tireless spirit of a good team of horses they earned a "Well Done" with their "Can Do" spirit, and on 10 November 1954, boarded USNS Morton for the return to the United States.

Thirty days leave was granted to the men upon return to the States, and was followed by a month and a half of military training. This military training, as such, came to a halt 23 February 1955, when the Battalion boarded USNS Marine Phoenix, bound for the Big Bear country on the Island of Kodiak, Territory of Alaska.

The long train of men and supplies started down the gangplank 6 March 1955, and the Battalion was soon ready to undertake the many and varied projects assigned them.

The tasks assigned to the Battalion at Kodiak included Dental Clinic alterations and repairs; steam cleaning rack; construction of one bridge and repairs to five others; repairs to three piers and one cargo dock; approximately nine and one-half miles of roads, including culverts, manholes, drains, etc.; roofing; erosion protection and covering of magazines; crusher and asphalt plant operation; exterior painting of 63 buildings and waterfront structures; replacement of gasoline valves and installation of steam control valves; interior painting on 14 buildings; complete rehabilitation of the Civilian Cafeteria; improving three athletic fields, including building of bleachers and repairs of backstops; and demolition of a marine service pier.

Much of this work was done under very difficult conditions. The work on the piers and docks had to be done at low tides, and the exterior painting and road construction could only be accomplished when it was not raining or snowing; but the jobs were done and done well-once again ELEVEN changed "Can Do" to "Have Done".

Five September 1955, and the Battalion went aboard MSTS Funston for the return to "Stateside " and leave. Leaving the ship at Seattle, the Battalion was transported by train to Port Hueneme, where leave was granted.

When the men returned from leave, the wheels were put in motion to prepare the Battalion for deployment to Kwajalein, in the Marshall Islands. On 26 October USNS Ainsworth pulled out of Port Hueneme loaded with Bees from ELEVEN. Twelve days later, on 8 November 1955, the Ainsworth gave its cargo of Seabees and equipment to the Naval Station, Kwajalein. Battalion gear was set up, crews were assigned, and work commenced.

The Battalion's job on Kwajalein was different from any of the other assignments it had been given in that there was only one major project-requiring various specialized skills rather than a general knowledge-instead of scattered projects. Although there were two extra projects, they did not take up much of the Battalion's time. One was the roads, and the other was rehabilitation of 20 existing temporary buildings for short-time use.

The overall project of the Battalion on Kwajalein was construction of 78 buildings for Department of Defense Housing. These buildings were of four different types, and comprised 175 family living units. Individual projects leading up to the final completion were: Subgrade operations, building up and compacting 5,750 cubic yards of coral fill for 14 buildings; form work, consisting of building up and removing 269,000 square feet of forms for the pouring of concrete; steel work, cutting, bending, and placing of 560 tons of reinforcing steel in 14 base slabs, 45 second deck slabs, and 78 roofs; concrete work, which was the pouring, finishing, and curing of 6,937 cubic yards of concrete for 14 base slabs, 45 second decks, 78 roofs, and the mixing and pouring of concrete grout for vertical cells in concrete block walls; block masonry, the erection of 348,000 square feet of block masonry walls for the exterior and interior of all 175 units in the 78 buildings; plumbing, which consisted of installation of all rough and finish plumbing within the 175 units and rough plumbing in 14 base slabs; electrical operations, most of the rough and all of the finish electrical work necessary to connect up 11,060 junction boxes, outlets, and fixtures in the 175 units, and conduits and stud-ups in 14 base slabs; cementitious painting, the preparation and painting of 855,626 square feet of interior and exterior concrete and masonry surfaces in all 175 units; ceramic tile, which consisted of laying up a total of 7,000 square feet of ceramic tile in 175 bathtub alcoves and one shower; roofing, consisting of applying 132,956 square feet of 4 -ply built-up felt, tar, and gravel roofing on 43 buildings, and vent flashings on all 78 buildings; millwork-doors and windows, installing doors and windows in 3,849 openings in the buildings, and the trim involved; millwork-cabinets, manufacturing and installing 8 types of cabinets and shelves in the 175 units and miscellaneous items such as shoe racks, stair rails, and closet shelves; finish painting, the preparation and painting of 477,500 square feet of surface on cabinets, windows, doors, and other trim work; and asphalt tile, consisting of the laying of 149,087 square feet of asphalt tile on the floors of all units.

During its deployment on Kwajalein the Battalion participated in many of the Naval Station Base Defense Drills, which helped to keep the Battalion in tip-top military shape while doing its main job of construction.

The constant wish of MCB-11 to make " Can Do " into "Have Done " produced an energy in the men that one does not often find. Although inexperienced, the Battalion dispatched the construction work on Kwajalein in very good time, proving the aptness of the Battalion's motto: "Constructing the Future".


It is with justifiable pride and unfeigned esteem that we salute Mobile Construction Battalion ELEVEN. Christian peoples have for centuries kept a reserved seal among the councils of men for those who excell in the skilled crafts. Great piles of architectural magnificence bear witness to the genius of men who plan and men who build.

The genius of building experts is elicited not merely by the physical needs of human society but also by the aesthetic sense of developing an appreciation of beauty and expression in material things of the higher aspirations of the soul. Great cathedrals are not only fitting structures for the proper worship of God, but they are also mute expressions of the faith of the men who build them and those who use them.

Private residences enbody the similar expressions of personal and civic pride, while fulfilling a basic need for shelter.

The Seabees have been outstanding in transferring and incorporating all of these elements in filling a need in the military. The Navy and our country look with pride on the great work they have accomplished in war and in peace.

The Navy will long hence be proud of the fine houses constructed by Mobile Construction Battalion ELEVEN. during the past year on Kwajalein Island. As Naval personnel assigned to duty on this far-away island enjoy the comforts of house and home with their families, I am sure they will often whisper a heart-felt "thank God" for the untiring work and devotion, to the traditions of the builders arts, of the Officers and Men of MCB-11.

We have completed very comfortable living quarters for 175 families, an accomplishment which will substantially contribute to a happier life for those that come after us. This project involved a large variety of work including cleaning areas for construction, grading, pouring concrete, placing steel, laying interior and exterior concrete blocks, interior and exterior painting, plumbing, electrical, millwork, asphalt and ceramic tile, surveying, and roadwork.

While a battalion is completely self-supporting and can be deployed as a functional unit at any time, personnel rates and equipment required considerable "tailoring" in connection with some of the unusual assignments made during our Kwajalein deployment. I especially appreciate the contribution made by those personnel employed outside their normal rating.

In personal appearance and training we have supported the policies of the Tenth Naval Construction Brigade under the very able leadership of Rear Admiral J. F. Jelly.

In behalf of myself and the officers and men of my command, I wish to express our sincere appreciation for the kind hospitality and the excellent support the Commanding Officer of the U.S. Naval Station, Kwajalein and the officers and men of his command gave the Battalion throughout our stay at Kwajalein.

I wish to express appreciation for the excellent perior,nance and many long hours of hard work by the officers and men over the past year. Through your efforts we have maintained an outstanding record. In the years to come each and every man in the Battalion can be proud of the work we have accomplished on this project. It is with a great sense of pride in the capabilities and performance of Battalion personnel that I feel that it has been an honor and a privilege to have served with each and every man in the Battalion. We can all look back with great satisfaction on the "Can Do" spirit of the Seabees in our accomplishments at Kwajalein for a job WELL DONE.






This is the man all of us have referred to sometime or other as Skipper, CO, or Captain; but most often as Captain. This is a biographical summary of a man who has kept a constant vigil over his Battalion.

Commander Dougherty breathed his first at Fond Du Lac, Wisconsin, on 26 November 1913. Archibald M. and Mary Louise Dougherty, the proud parents, also had one other son and daughter.

Our Skipper attended St. Joseph's Parochial School in Fond Du Lac during his childhood. After his parochial school training young Dougherty left his home town and moved to Milwaukee, Wisconsin, where he spent four years at St. John's Cathedral High School, graduating in June, 1933. In the fall of 1933 Commander Dougherty enrolled at Marquette University and subsequently graduated in June, 1938 with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Civil Engineering. The Skipper is also a registered professional engineer in the State of Wisconsin.

After graduation the Skipper was employed as an associate consulting engineer on the construction of an Army camp in Florida. On 9 July 1942, the Commander resigned as a consulting engineer and was commissioned as an Ensign at the U. S. Naval Air Station, Jacksonville, Florida.

Our Skipper was given two month's indoctrination training at Cornell University and was then transferred to Harvard University for a two mopth's electronics course. He was then given his first assignment as a member of the staff of Admiral Marc Mitscher, Commander, Fleet Air South Pacific, located at Noumea, New Caledonia. The command moved on up to Espiritus Santos 6 June 1943, and then to Guadalcanal 15 February 1944. On 1 July 1943 our Skipper was promoted to Lieutenant, Junior Grade.

Our Skipper returned to the states and was assigned duty at the U. S. Naval Air Station, Boca Chica, Florida in the Public Works Department as Telephone Officer, Postal Officer, and Fire Marshal.

We next find our Skipper on the staff of the District Public Works Officer, Ninth Naval District, where he spent eighteen months as Resident Officer in Charge of a Cost Plus Fixed Fee contract, constructing the electronics school building at Great Lakes, Illinois. The remainder of his tour of duty on the staff of the District Public Works Officer was as Project Manager.

Commander Dougherty was then transferred to the U. S. Naval Station, Rodman, Canal Zone, as Public Works Officer. After two years there, his next duty was as Public Works Officer and Resident Officer in Charge of Construction at the U. S. Naval Hospital, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

During May, 1953, orders were received assigning Commander Dougherty to the U. S. Naval School, CEC Officers, Port Hueneme, California, as Executive Officer, and in September 1955, he was transferred to his present assignment as Commanding Officer, United States Naval Mobile Construction Battalion ELEVEN.

Our Skipper and his lovely wife, Elnore, are the proud parents of four sons, John A., Jr., Richard, Thomas, and Joseph Patrick-all good prospective Seabees.

The Captain's hobbies include hunting, fishing, and 'all winter sports.
Commander Dougherty is authorized to wear the American Defense Service Medal, American Campaign Medal, Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Medal, and the World War II Victory Medal.


LCDR William R. Reese, Battalion Executive Officer, born in Baton Rouge, Louisiana 23 August 1919, moved with his family to Jacksonville, Florida in 1924. He attended the University of Florida receiving a Bachelor of Science degree in Chemical Engineering in 1943. During his college days he worked in the University radio station and in a Kraft Paper Mill.

Following college he was commissioned a line Ensign in the Naval Reserve in 1943. During the 3 years that followed he was assigned to amphibious landing craft as Engineering Officer seeing action in both the Philippines and during the Okinawa campaign, and entered north China with the first Marine Division. In early 1945 he returned to the U. S. and married Mary Anne Gemmill from Arlington, Virginia. In October 1945 he was accepted into the Civil Engineer Corps of the regular Navy as a Lieutenant Junior Grade.

From October 1946 to July 1948 he served in the Public Works Department of the Boston Naval Shipyard, and from August 1948 to January 1950 as Assistant Public Works Officer at the Naval Supply Center on Guam where he was promoted to Lieutenant. From February 1950 to April 1952, he served under the District Public Works Officer in the Fourth Naval District as Co-ordinator for Design and Construction and Civil Works Contracts. In 1952 Mr. Reese attended Renssalaer Polytechnic Institute in Troy, New York where he earned his second college degree in Civil Engineering. In late 1953 he became a registered professional engineer in the state of New York and was transferred to the U. S. Naval Civil Engineering Research and Evaluation Laboratory at Port Hueneme, California. During this assignment he conducted an evaluation on the Greenland Ice Cap in 1954, living in isolation with Seabees engaged in the unique task of constructing runways from compacted snow. He was promoted to Lieutenant Commander following this assignment. January of 1955 found Mr. Reese at Big Delta (interior) Alaska engaged in cross country skiing with the Army and living on the trail.

LCDR Reese holds the American Area Medal, Asiatic Pacific Area Medal with one star, World War II Victory Medal, China Service Medal, Navy Occupation Service Medal, the Philippine Liberation Ribbon with one star, and the National Service Defense Medal. He is a member of the Florida Engineering Society, the Society of American Military Engineers and an Associate Member of the American Society of Civil Engineers.
