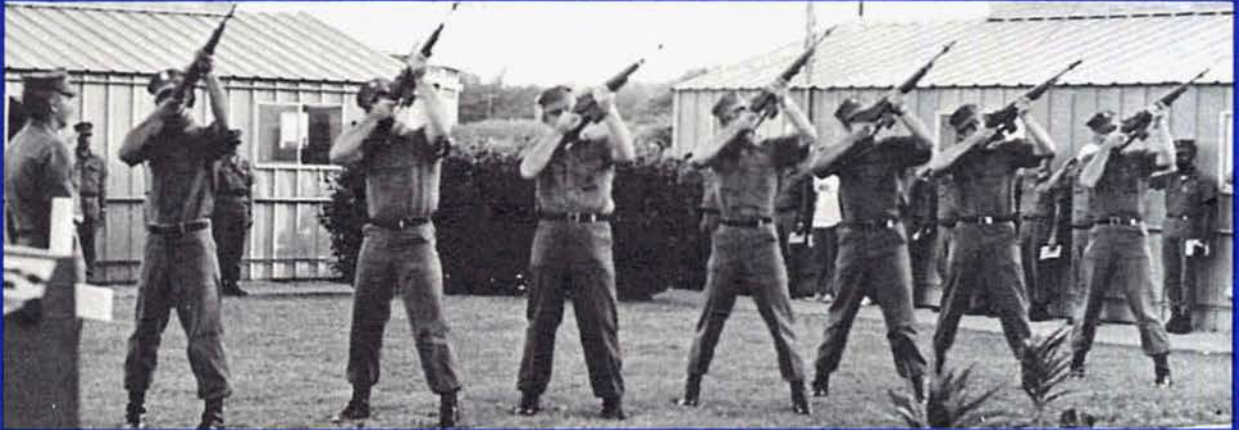

EULOGY.....Our hearts were all saddened by the news of the tragic death of one of our shipmates. We are gathered here on this day, 23 March 1973, for a memorial service. A service in memory of Builder Third Class David A. Bills. Petty Officer Bills was the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Francis Bills of Denver, Colorado. He came on active duty in the United States Navy, July 1971. He was transferred to U.S. Naval Mobile Construction Battalion FOUR on 17 March 1972. He died while serving with our Battalion's detachment at Naval Station Guantanamo Bay, Cuba. He died in the line of duty and in the service of his country.

Our lives as Navymen and as Seabees necessarily exposes us to hazards. Through our history we have had many shipmates who have given the ultimate sacrifice. The Seabees of World War II, Korea and the Vietnam Conflict have repeatedly been willing to expose themselves to the hazards of a war environment coupled with the additional hazards of the construction profession. The job of construction always has been hazardous and despite advancements in occupational safety it always will be. It is an occupation for men who are willing to get the job done. David Bills was such a man. He had a fine record and had great promise at being a success at whatever career he chose. He was a man that did his part to see that the job got done. The loss of David A. Bills is a great tragedy to his family and loved ones, to this Battalion and to myself as his Commanding Officer.

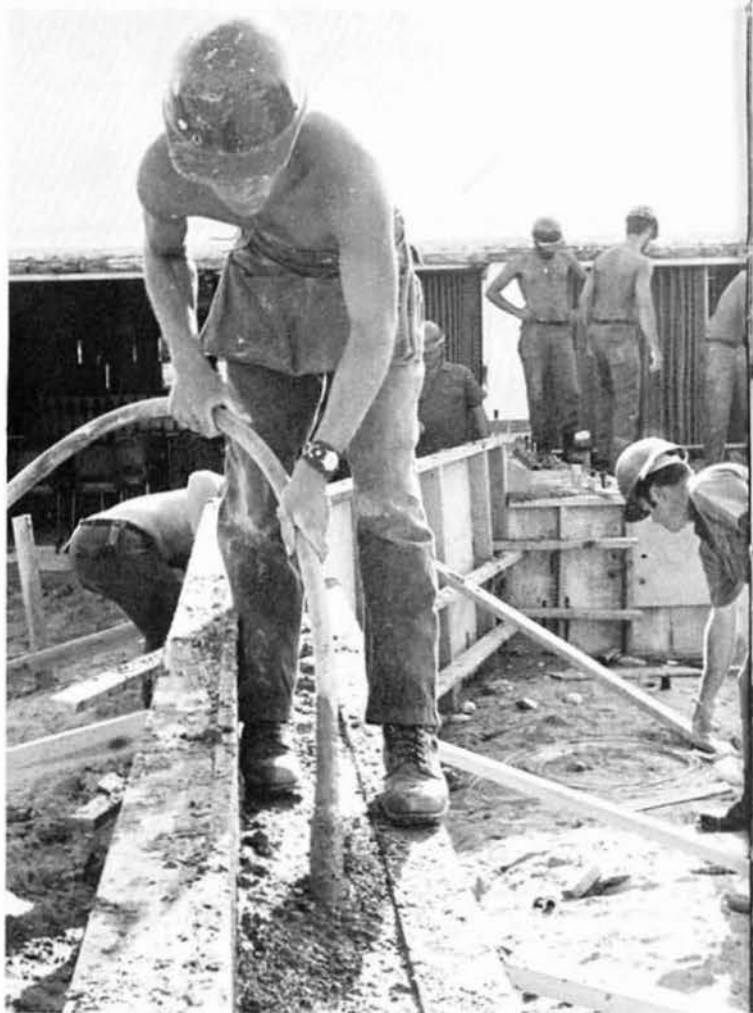

The main body of NMCB-FOUR arrived at the Naval Station, Rota, Spain, to find the Seabee Camp in dire need of repairs. Work began and within a couple months, the Seabee Camp, Ciudad de Plata or Silver City, was transformed into a small city with its own post office, laundromat, exchange, theater, sports arena and traffic signs. FOUR also sent details to England, Scotland, Greece, Sicily and Panama. The mission of these detachments was to rehabilitate office spaces, living quarters and recreational facilities.



U.S. Naval Mobile Construction Battalion Four was commissioned March 8, 1951 at the U.S. Naval Yards and Docks Supply Depot, Davisville, R.I. At that time, FOUR comprised of 8 officers and 282 enlisted men.

The first deployment of FOUR was to U.S. Naval Station, Bermuda, in the West Indies. In the last 22 years, the Battalion has covered millions of miles to carry out their assigned tasks.

Being an East Coast Battalion, FOUR saw duty in Morocco; the Bahamas; Port-au-Prince, Haiti; Newfoundland; Scotland; Puerto Rico; Guantanamo Bay, Cuba; and Rota, Spain.

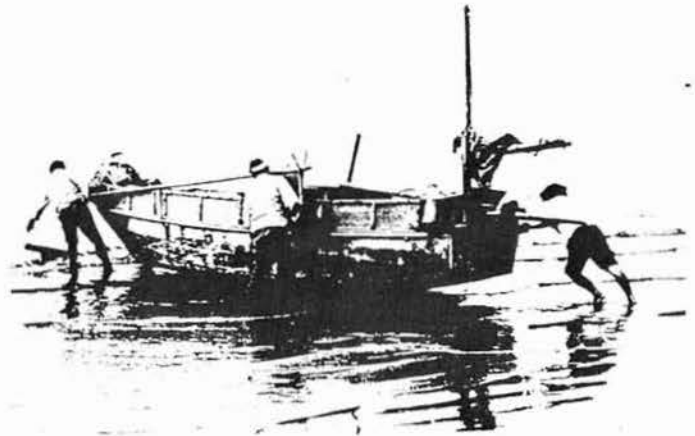
NMCB-FOUR returned to Davisville, R.I. from Rota, Spain in July 1965. Four months later, the entire Battalion was transferred to Construction Battalion Center, Port Hueneme, California, their new permanent duty station. The Vietnam Crisis necessitated the move from East Coast to West Coast. The men received military and technical training with numerous briefings on Vietnam.

New horizons began to unfold for the Battalion. From 1965 to 1969, new names of towns began to leave lasting impressions on the men of FOUR. Vietnam deployments to Chu Lai in 1966; Camp Hoover, Da Nang in 1967 and 1968; Camp Adanir in 1969.

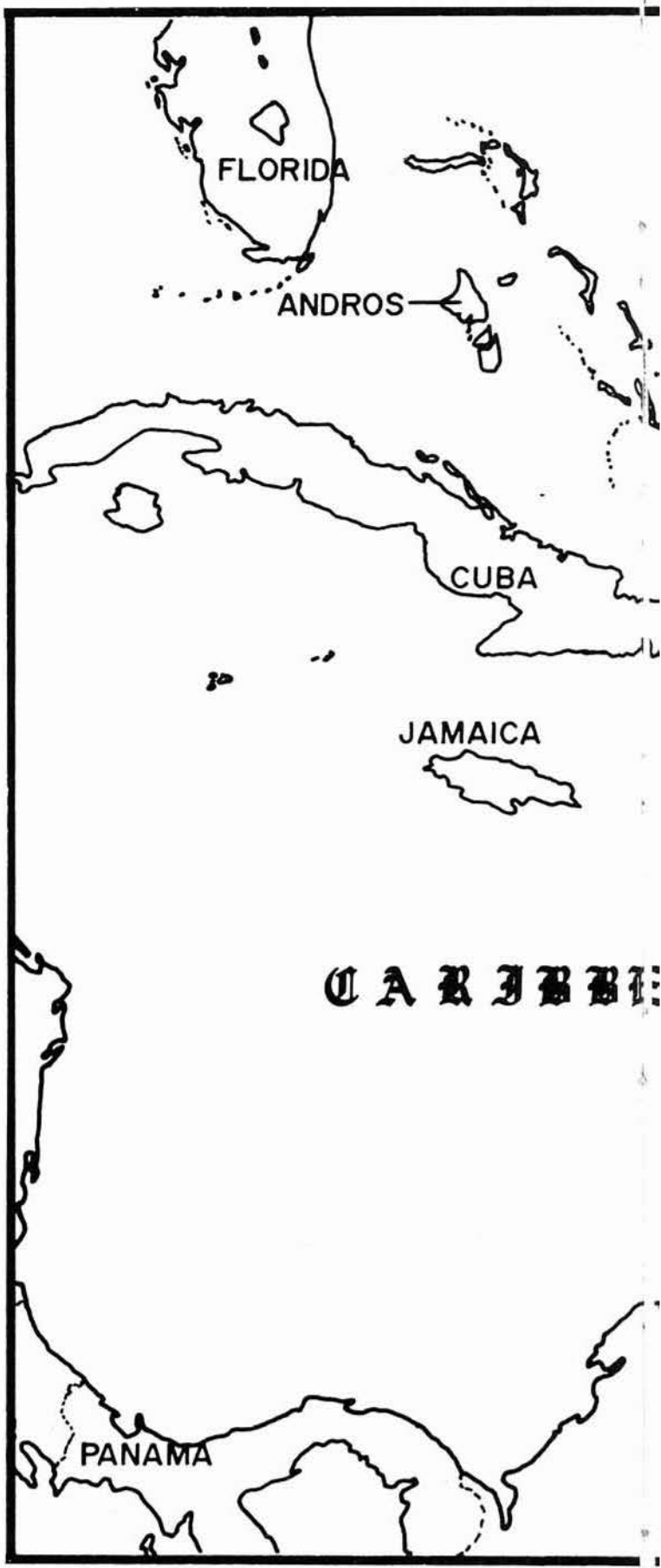
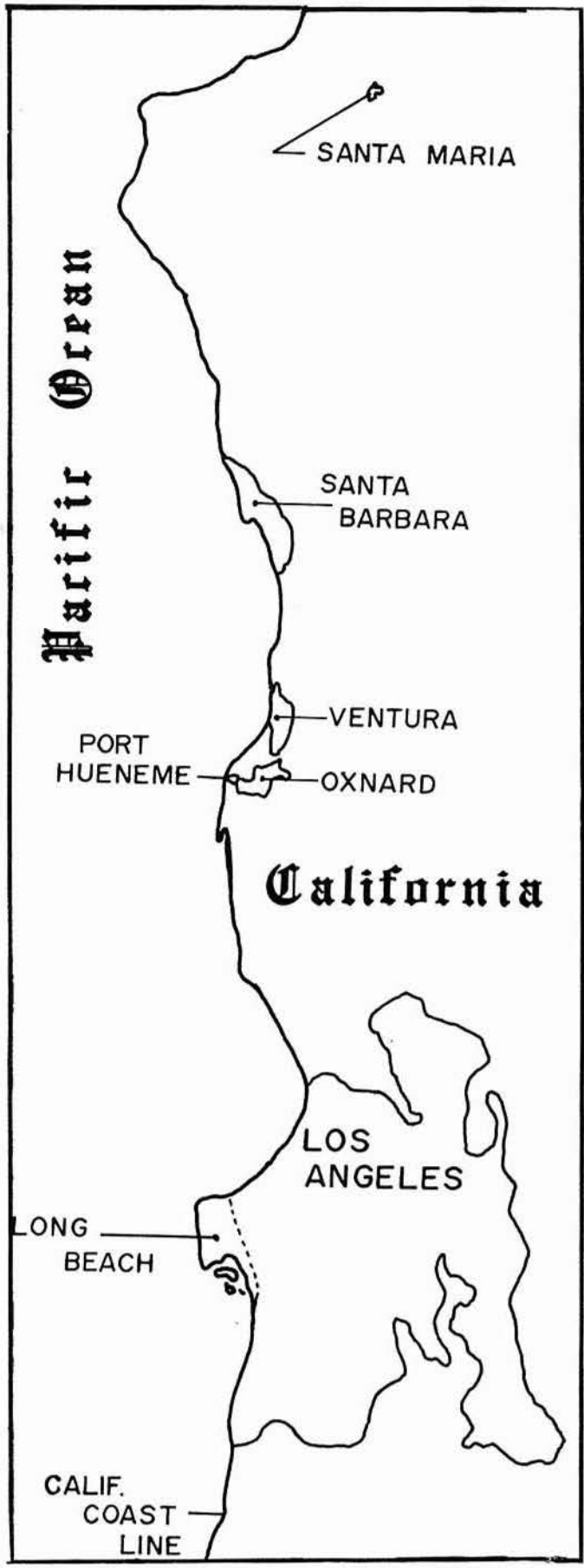
Then in May 1970, NMCB-FOUR began its deployment at Camp Shields, Okinawa, as the Pacific Alert Battalion ready to move out any place in the Pacific on short notice. When FOUR found its next deployment to be in Europe, the peaceful mission of construction was again a reality.

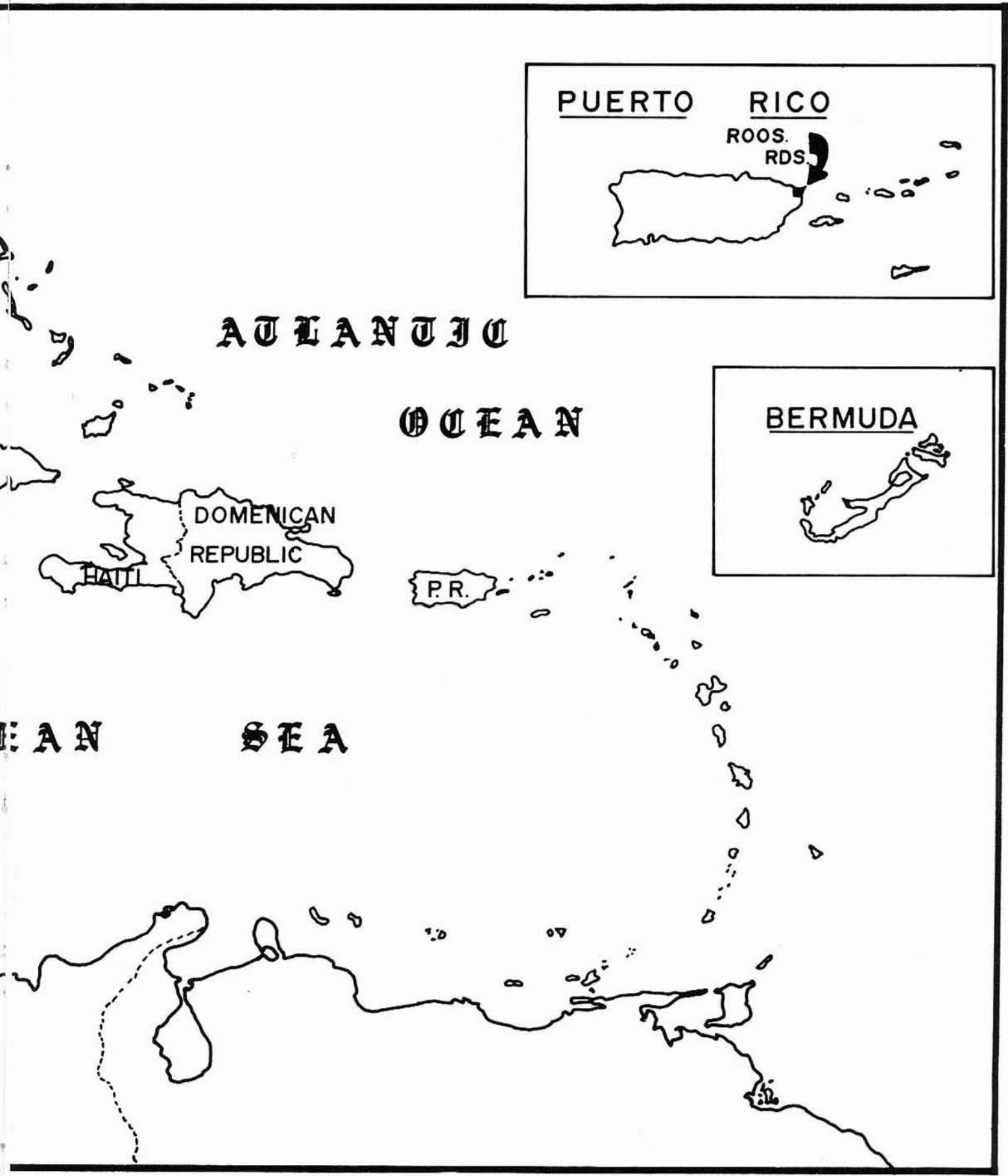
The "Best of Type" Award went to the Battalion for the 1969 Vietnam and 1970 Okinawa deployments, two consecutive years. NMCB-FOUR had won this same award six times while with the Atlantic Fleet.

Commander J.A. RUSCYK, CEC, USN, became the 14th Commanding Officer of NMCB-FOUR when he assumed command of the Battalion on 16 December 1970.

Commander RUSCYK received his commission to Ensign in January 1958. A native of New Britain, Connecticut, he earned his Bachelor of Science Degree from Duke University in 1957. Commander RUSCYK is a Professional Engineer registered in the State of North Carolina.

Commander RUSCYK began his Naval career with NMCB-SIX where he served as a company commander. Completing a tour with naval Schools, Constructions, Port Hueneme, California, as assistant officer-in-charge of Equipment Operators' Schools. He departed the military for a year. During this time he served as a construction engineer on various projects with a civilian enterprise.

Returning to the Naval service as a Lieutenant in 1962, Commander RUSCYK was assigned as Assistant Public Works Officer MCAS, El Toro, California. Following a tour at MCAS, Cherry Point, North Carolina as resident officer-in-charge of construction he served a tour with OICC, Saigon, Vietnam as Construction Coordinator for which he received the Navy Achievement Medal with Combat "V". Returning to the States in 1967, Commander RUSCYK became the Public Works Officer at NASS, Fallon, Nevada. As assignment as Assistant Shore Facilities Systems Officer on the Staff of CINCPACFLT, Hawaii, directly preceded the Commander's attachment NMCB-FOUR.

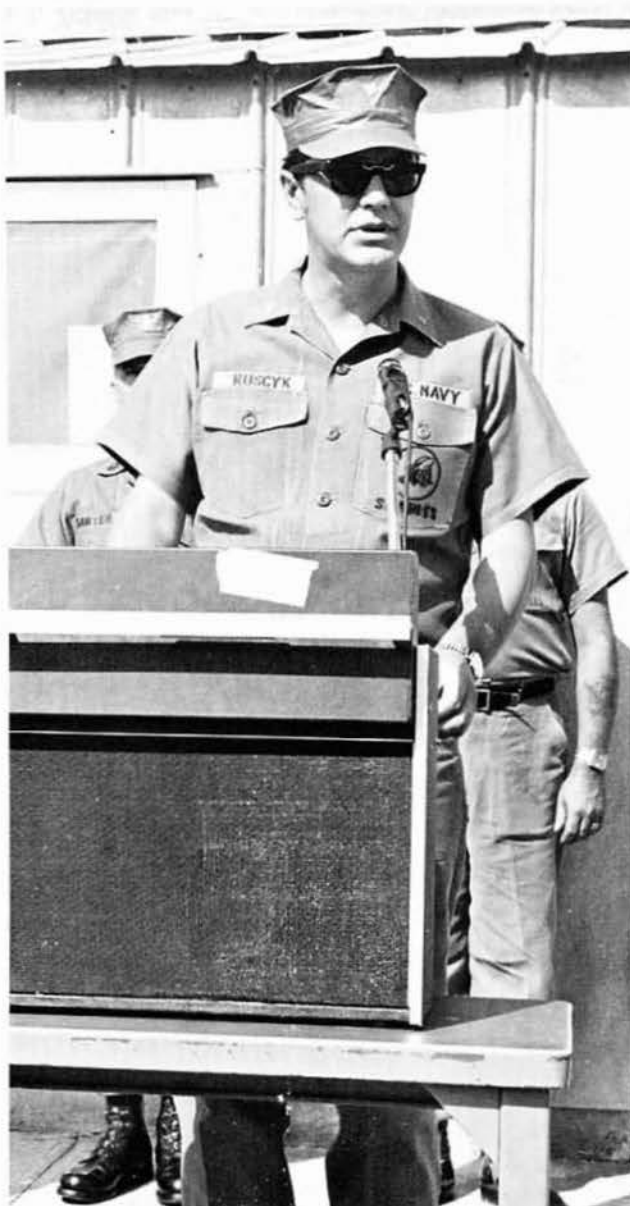

Commander Robert E. ALEXANDER, CEC, USN, received his commission as an Ensign in the U.S. Naval Reserve after graduation from the University of New Mexico, Albuquerque, New Mexico in June of 1958. After attending CECOS at NCBC Port Hueneme, Commander ALEXANDER was assigned to NMCB-NINE serving as company commander during battalion deployments to Okinawa and Alaska. In 1960 Commander ALEXANDER augmented from the U.S. Naval Reserve to the Regular Navy and was reassigned to the Staff of the Commander, Construction Battalions, U.S. Atlantic Fleet, in Davisville, Rhode Island. While with COMCBLANT, Commander ALEXANDER served as Assistant Operations Officer, Flag Administrative Unit. In February 1962 Commander ALEXANDER was Assigned to the Officer-in-Charge -of-Construction, U.S. Naval VLF Communications Facility, Australia and served as Resident Officer in Charge of Construction, Northwest Cape, Australia until March of 1965. In April 1965 Commander ALEXANDER reported as Assistant Public Works Officer, U.S. Naval Air Station, Moffett Field, California. In June 1966 he entered Stanford University for duty under instruction and graduated with a Master of Science Degree in Civil Engineering (Construction). In July 1967 Commander ALEXANDER reported to the Naval Air Training Division, Naval Facilities Engineering Command in Pensacola, Florida as the Facilities Management Officer. From April 1969 to April 1970 he served as the Operations Officer for the THIRTIETH and the THIRTY-SECOND U.S. Naval Construction Regiments in the First Military Region of the Republic of Vietnam. Upon completion of Vietnam service, Commander ALEXANDER served as Head, Resident Officer in Charge of Construction, Pacific Department of the Western Division, Naval Facilities Engineering Command in San Bruno, California.

Commander ALEXANDER is authorized to wear the Bronze Star with Combat "V", the Navy Commendation Medal with Combat "V", the Navy Achievement Medal, the Navy Meritorious Unit Commendation, the Combat Action Ribbon, the National Defense Service Medal, the Vietnam Service Medal with Four Bronze Stars and Fleet Marine Force Combat Operations Insignia, the Vietnam Cross of Gallantry with Silver Star, the Vietnam Armed Forces Meritorious Unit Citation (Gallantry Cross) and the Republic of Vietnam Campaign Medal with Device.

Commander ALEXANDER is a registered professional engineer (Civil Engineer) in the State of California. He is married to the former Elwyn Potter of Dalkieth, Western Australia. The ALEXANDERS have two children, Matthew and Greer.

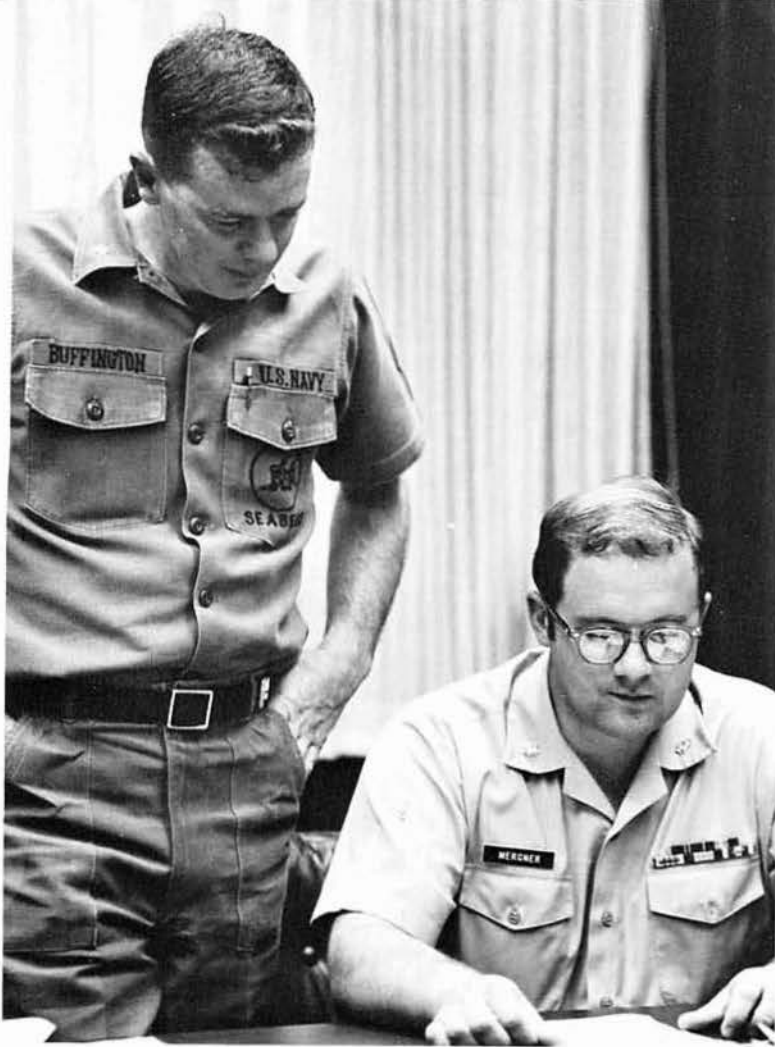


LCDR Mergner was raised in Livingston, New Jersey. Upon graduation from the United States Naval Academy in 1961, he was commissioned as an Ensign in the Civil Engineering Corps and ordered to duty at the Public Works Center, Newport, Rhode Island, where he served as the Assistant to the Operations Officer.

In 1964 he received a Master of Civil Engineering degree from Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute. . After attending CECOS Basic Course and the NBC Warfare Defense (Ashore) Course at the U.S. Army Chemical Corps School, Fort McClellan, Alabama, he reported to the U.S. Naval Station, Keflavik, Iceland, for duty as Public Works Transportation Officer.

Following this tour, LCDR Mergner was assigned as Assistant Resident Officer in Charge of Construction, U.S. Naval Base, Charleston, South Carolina. In April 1968, he was ordered to the Construction Directorate, U.S. Military Assistance Command, Vietnam. He was assigned to the Real Estate Division where he was responsible for real estate acquisition in the I and II Corps Tactical Zones. For this work he was awarded the Bronze Star Medal. Prior to reporting to NMCB-FOUR, he was assigned as Director, Contract Administration Division, Naval School, CEC Officers, Port Hueneme, California.
