# State Budget, Sports Betting, and Beyond

**NEW YORK THOROUGHBRED BREEDERS** is consumed in Albany from mid-January, when the budget season begins, through the conclusion of the legislative session in late June. Currently we are analyzing the industry-related provisions of Gov. Andrew Cuomo's executive budget proposal for 2018-19 (FY 2019) and laying out the priorities of our legislative agenda. At the same time we are hard at work on the newest pressing issue for our industry, which might be new to many of you also: the possibility of legalized sports betting in New York State.

By the time you read this, NYTb will have joined representatives from the New York Racing Association and New York Thoroughbred Horsemen's Association in presenting testimony at a hearing of the Senate Standing Committee on Racing, Gaming, and Wagering (Sen. John Bonacic, Chair) on the potential future for sports betting in the state.

Although legalization hinges on a Supreme Court decision in a case involving New Jersey, all agree with the state that New York must get ahead of the issue so that it can become a national leader should sports betting become legal.

Currently, through the Upstate New York Gaming Economic Development Act of 2013, only brick and mortar casinos are authorized to host legalized sports betting. Our position is that the state, which has already shown a deep commitment to the success of breeding and racing in the state, should also allow sports betting at New York's racetracks. Obviously we seek to give the Thoroughbred industry an edge in the ever-intensifying competition for wagering dollars in the state. At the same time we contend that the racing sector is uniquely situated to contribute to the success of this new enterprise and can give New York an edge nationally.

Racing is already accustomed to working in a highly regulated environment and has extensive experience in electronic betting platforms. Moreover, in recent years the industry has invested considerable resources in attracting a larger, younger, more

diverse wagering pool, a de facto "ready-made" base of potential sports bettors. Racing also has the infrastructure in place in the form of the "NYRA Bets" online platform, which already has tens of thousands of active customers, aka potential sports bettors.

Because sports betting is a logical extension of the services already provided by the Thoroughbred racing industry, we maintain the state would benefit considerably from integrating legalized sports betting into racinos, racetracks, OTBs, and NYRA Bets. This move would drive revenue to all parties involved and position New York to be a leader in streamlined gaming opportunities.

As the state sorts through this complex new legislation, we will, no doubt, be living with this issue for some time.

On more familiar ground, I can report that the governor's budget proposal contains no real surprises for us. The state currently has a budget deficit of at least \$4.4 billion, and by some estimates, a good deal more.

That being said, the governor's proposal does include several racing and gaming issues relevant to breeders. First and foremost, it authorizes the New York State Thoroughbred Breeding and Development Fund (the Fund) and Agriculture Breeding Fund (Harness) to provide money for aftercare at their sole discretion, effective immediately. The Fund makes six-figure contributions to aftercare each year but has never before had a statutory line-item for it. This is a positive public relations news item.

Also of interest to breeders is an amendment of racing law to authorize NYRA to conduct night racing under specific circumstances for four years. This is an interesting experiment, such as the New York Islanders/Belmont project, that could drive new revenue and clientele toward racing, which benefits us all.

The status of equine drug testing, research, and funding in the state will be explored by a committee (study, due Dec. 1). NYTb's position is that funding should be fairly distributed among all sectors, and the harness industry should pay its fair share, which it currently does not do.

Finally, we will continue to work with the state on the issue of revenue lost to racing and breeding following Genting's arrangement with Nassau OTB to host its video lottery terminals at Resorts World. From 2016-17 the Fund lost \$1.89 million in revenue, and purses lost \$4.5 million. Last year the state Senate passed legislation to make the racing sector whole, but the Assembly did not take up the issue. We expect the Senate to follow suit this year and will focus our attention on Assembly cooperation.

In the meantime, I wish you all the best for your new foals and the upcoming breeding season. 🐾

## GIANT EXPECTATIONS CLOSES OUT BIG '17 FOR STATE-BREDS

New York-breds had an exceptional year in 2017 while stepping outside the state-bred ranks and winning 19 graded stakes on the year (see chart on page 11). Saving his best effort for his last of the season, Giant Expectations took the 1 $\frac{1}{16}$ -mile San Antonio Stakes (G2) at Santa Anita, cruising to a 3 $\frac{3}{4}$ -length win over Accelerate.

The victory sets the son of Frost Giant—who also won the seven-furlong Pat O'Brien Stakes (G2) last August at Del Mar—up for a run at the Jan. 27 \$16 million Pegasus World Cup Invitational Stakes (G1).

Giant Expectations was bred by Sunrise Stables. General manager Andrew Cohen manages the stallion career of Frost Giant, along with Big Brown and Heavy Breathing.

Giant Expectations sold twice, bringing \$85,000 as “short yearling” at the 2014 Keeneland January sale, and \$135,000 at 2 at the 2015 Ocala Breeders’ Sales’ March sale. Trained by Peter Eurton, he races for Exline-Border Racing (Ryan Exline and Justin Border), Gatto Racing, and Garrett Zubok.

While New York Racing Association tracks were

## A SHIN FORWARD RETURNING HOME

In 2012 A Shin Forward, a star turf runner in Japan and the second all-time leading New York-bred earner, began his stallion career at Lex Stud on the island of Hokkaido in Japan. In February he will take up stud duties in his home state after relocating to Rockridge Stud near

Hudson, N.Y., where he will stand for a private fee as the property Vivien Malloy's Edition Farm.

Bred by Malloy, A Shin Forward is by Forest Wildcat out of Wake Up Kiss, by Cure the Blues. He sold as a Fasig-Tipton New York-bred preferred yearling in 2006

for \$125,000 before being purchased by Hirotsugo Hirai the following March at the Fasig-Tipton Florida sale for \$290,000. He raced for five seasons in Japan for Eishindo Co., which prefixes many horse names with "A Shin" or "Eishin."

The defining victory of A Shin Forward's racing career came in the 2010 Mile Championship (G1). The same year he also won the Hankyu Hai (G3). Over five campaigns A Shin Forward won three stakes and placed in five more, and retired with \$3,416,216 in earnings.

"We are so pleased to have A Shin Forward back," Malloy said. "He is the best horse Edition has bred, and competed at the highest international levels. He gives New York breeders access to the Storm Cat line and he hails from Fappiano's family. We will send several nice mares to him."

## FIRST FOALS

New York-based **War Dancer** was represented by his first foal Jan. 6 with the arrival of a colt at Waldorf Farm near North Chatham.

The youngster is out of Bruce McConnell and Linda McConnell's Sadie's Song, by Unbridled's Song.

Sadie's Song's first foal, J C's Not Brown, by Big Brown is a multiple winner on turf. The newborn is her fifth New York offspring.

War Dancer, a multiple graded stakes-winning son of War Front, stands at Lere Visagie's Rockridge Stud near Hudson.

Becky Thomas announced that winning Freud mare Looksgoodfromhere foaled a healthy colt by **Laoban** Jan. 17 at Saratoga Glen Farm. The bay is the first reported foal for the young stallion.

"He's gorgeous," said happy owner Kathy Barraclough.

Laoban (by Uncle Mo) stands at Sequel Stallions New York near Hudson for Southern Equine Stables, Sequel Thoroughbreds, McMahan of Saratoga Thoroughbreds, and Woodford Thoroughbreds.

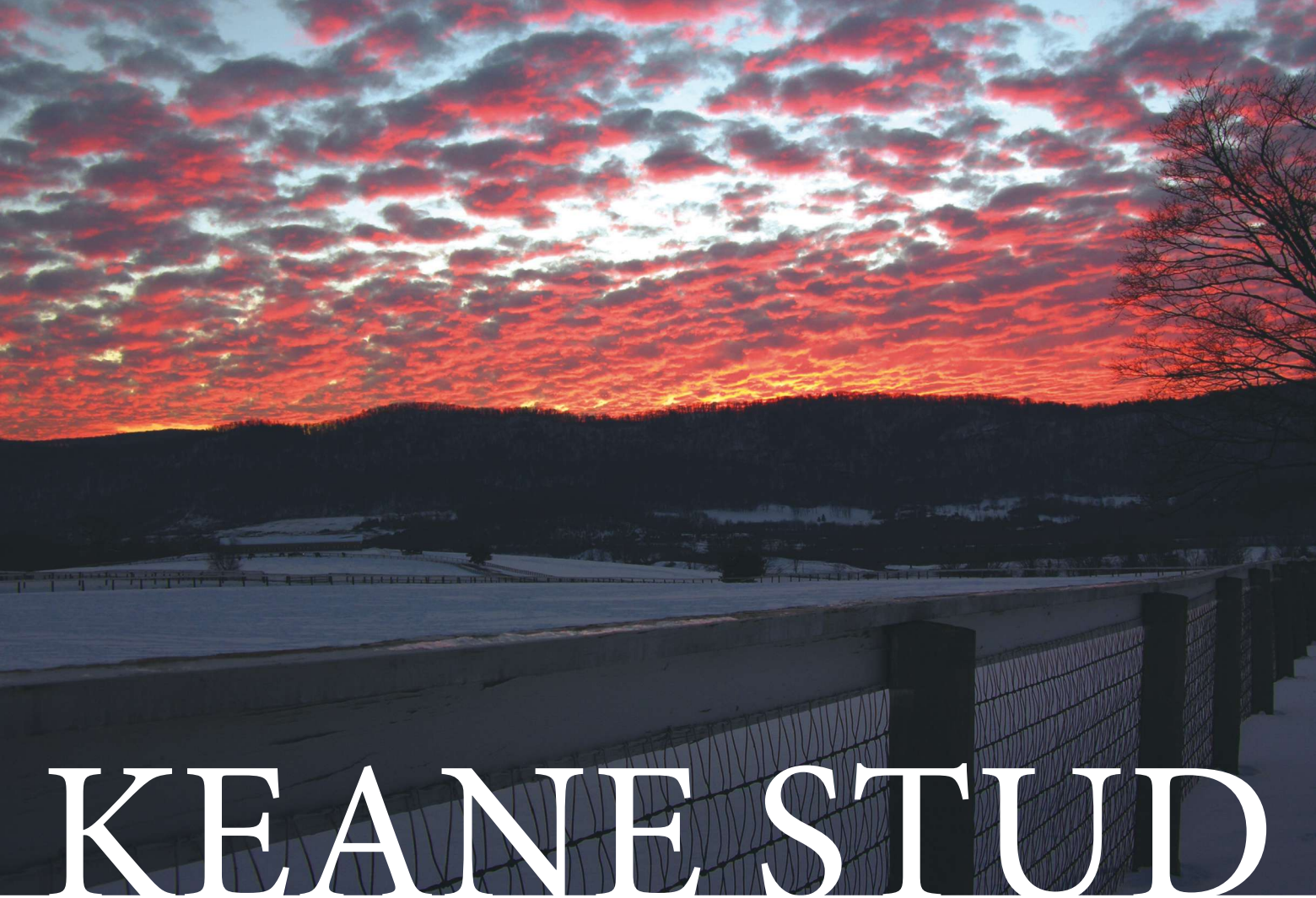

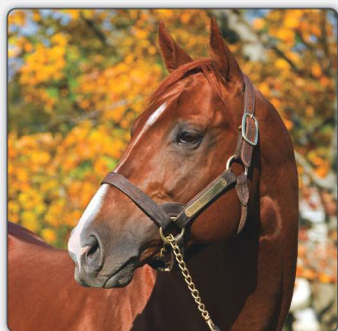

# Freud Does It Again

## Son of Storm Cat leads New York sires list for fourth time

**THE OLD MAN JUST KEEPS ON GOING.** For the third time in the past four years, and fourth time overall, Freud is the leading sire in New York by progeny earnings. In 2017 he even outdid himself, with more than \$6.3 million in progeny earnings, a high for him.

The 20-year-old son of Storm Cat—Mariah’s Storm, by Rahy, is a younger brother to three-time North American leading sire Giant’s Causeway, who stands at Ashford Stud in Central Kentucky. Freud has stood his entire career at Sequel Stallions New York and shuttled two seasons to Haras La Leyenda in Argentina.

History has proved full siblings rarely replicate the form or figures of their more famous brothers and sisters.

“Freud defies the whole full brother phenomenon,” said Sequel Stallions’ Becky Thomas. “Imagine if he had the mares Giant’s Causeway has had. We never had the book size, and we definitely didn’t have the quality.”

While Giant’s Causeway has sired a freakish 195 stakes winners, Freud has 58, which puts him well clear of the state-bred competition and on par with some standing for higher fees in Central Kentucky.

Freud’s fee for 2018 will be \$7,500.

“It’s a long road to be able to prove a regional sire, just like any of the stallions standing in Kentucky for \$10,000 or under,” Thomas said. “The reality is if you are under the \$10,000 fee, you are in a precarious spot to compete with the legitimate sires standing in New York because we are insulated. But we do have to produce winners. We work really hard to get winners.”

And winners Freud got. He was represented by 94 winners in 2017, second to New York-based Bellamy Road (102). Freud’s

four black-type stakes winners on the year was co-tops with Big Brown while Freud's 10 black-type stakes wins were twice as many as the runner-up's.

For the first time in many seasons, state-bred Lubash wasn't among Freud's stakes winners for the year, but he has been replaced on the turf circuit at New York Racing Association tracks by Fourstar Crook. Bred by Kathleen M. Feron and racing for Michael Dubb, Bethlehem Stables, and Gary Aisquith, Fourstar Crook won three turf stakes in 2017—the May 29 Mt. Vernon Stakes, Parx Racing's Dr. James Penny Memorial Stakes (G3T) July 4, and the Sept. 24 John Hettinger Stakes at Belmont—and earned \$344,116.

Freud had a pair of sharp 2-year-old stakes winners in Therapist and Berning Rose. Oak Bluff Stable's homebred Therapist (co-bred with trainer Christophe Clement) won twice against open company in the six-furlong Laurel Futurity and Belmont's Awad Stakes at a mile on the turf. Robert Rosenthal and Bradford Bernstein's homebred Berning Rose landed a \$73,000 maiden special weight at Saratoga and later tacked on \$150,000 for winning the Oct. 21 Maid of the Mist Stakes on Showcase Day.

However, Freud's top runner of the

year was one of the few non-New York-breds: Sharp Azteca. Ivan Rodriguez' runner won four of seven starts and \$1,390,490 on the year, starring in a runner-up role behind Battle of Midway in the Las Vegas Breeders' Cup Dirt Mile (G1) and winning the Dec. 2 Cigar Mile Handicap Presented by NYRA Bets (G1).

Out of the Saint Liam mare So Sharp, Sharp Azteca was bred by Cloyce C. Clark Jr.

"He wanted to foal the horse in Louisiana," Thomas explained. "We had some mares for him. He ended up going to Kentucky. He was never going to foal in New York. I hate that for him. If you added up what he would have won in breeders awards, I'm thinking it's more than \$100,000. It's crazy."

Sharp Azteca is still going strong and was a strong candidate for the \$16 million Jan. 27 Pegasus World Cup Invitational Stakes (G1) at Gulfstream Park.

Despite Freud's many crowns, competition for mares remains fierce.

"He is in that older stallion scenario," Thomas said. "It happens to those horses that are proven producers, but in our polarized economy we look to other stallions who are new and fashionable. It's hard to be competitive. Books for those kinds of stallions are declining, but he should get a bump up because of his success. We should get more mares because of Sharp Azteca. That's encouraging."

Don't count out Freud's chances for a fifth title next year. 🐾

have high hopes for as well.”

Davison stated that he and partner Randy Gullatt send about 15 mares a year to breed to Mission Impazible and added that Twin Creeks will likely keep Pure Silver when her race career is over to join to its broodmare band. Davison credited Thomas for her work in getting mares to Mission Impazible.

“In this region—as everywhere else—you need support,” Thomas said. “Twin Creeks has supported him heavily, and continues to do so. Sequel has also supported him. I try really hard to stand behind my product. Mission Impazible had a great year, and he'll get a pick-up in the number of mares going to him this year.”

Mission Impazible's other noteworthy 2-year-old runners include Inalienable Rights, who placed second in the Funny Cide Stakes and Bertram F. Bongard Stakes and third in the Sleepy Hollow Stakes, earning \$142,700; Spectacular Kid, who was third in the New York Stallion Series Stakes; and Collective Effort, third in the Aspirant Stakes and New York Breeders' Futurity. In addition to Pure Silver, multiple winners on the year among Mission Impazible's 2-year-olds were Ben Z Rolls, Double Naught Spy, and Dreams Are Pazible.

Among this crop to sell as yearlings in 2016, 31 were purchased at public auctions for an average of \$36,920. 🐾

## Mission Impazible tops New York's juvenile sires list

**MISSION IMPAZIBLE**, somewhat of a tough-luck horse in his racing days, climbed to the top of the juvenile sires list in New York for 2017 following his debut season where he was the leading first-crop sire and second leading juvenile sire. The gray son of Unbridled's Song—La Paz, by Hold Your Peace, stands at Becky Thomas' Sequel Stallions.

In 2017, 34 of Mission Impazible's 2-year-olds made it to the racetrack, 12 of which became winners on the year. As a group, they earned nearly \$1.1 million. Leading the pack was Pure Silver, who journeyed to Saratoga to take the Adirondack Stakes (G2). Pure Silver, out of Jehan, also won the Lynbrook Stakes and finished second in the Key Cents Stakes and New York Stallion Series Stakes, banking \$286,367 for Twin Creeks Racing Stables.

Pure Silver was particularly rewarding for Twin Creeks, which also bred her. Twin Creeks raced Mission Impazible after buying him as a Keeneland September yearling for \$200,000. Bred by Summer Wind Farm in Kentucky, Mission Impazible won the 2010 Louisiana Derby (G2) and the following year's New Orleans Handicap (G2). He missed earning a grade 1 victory by a nose in the 2012 Donn Handicap and by a neck in the 2011 Stephen Foster Handicap. Nevertheless, he earned nearly \$1.3 million from 21 starts for Twin Creeks.

“He's been a horse we have a lot of history with,” said Twin Creeks owner Steve Davison. “We raced La Paz and owned her for part of her broodmare career as well (before selling her for \$1.6 million). Mission Impazible was the first horse to take us to national graded stakes races, so we have a love affair with him and are tickled that his babies are running. We're hoping for bigger and better things in the future from him, and we have Pure Silver's full brother (Mission Statement) whom we

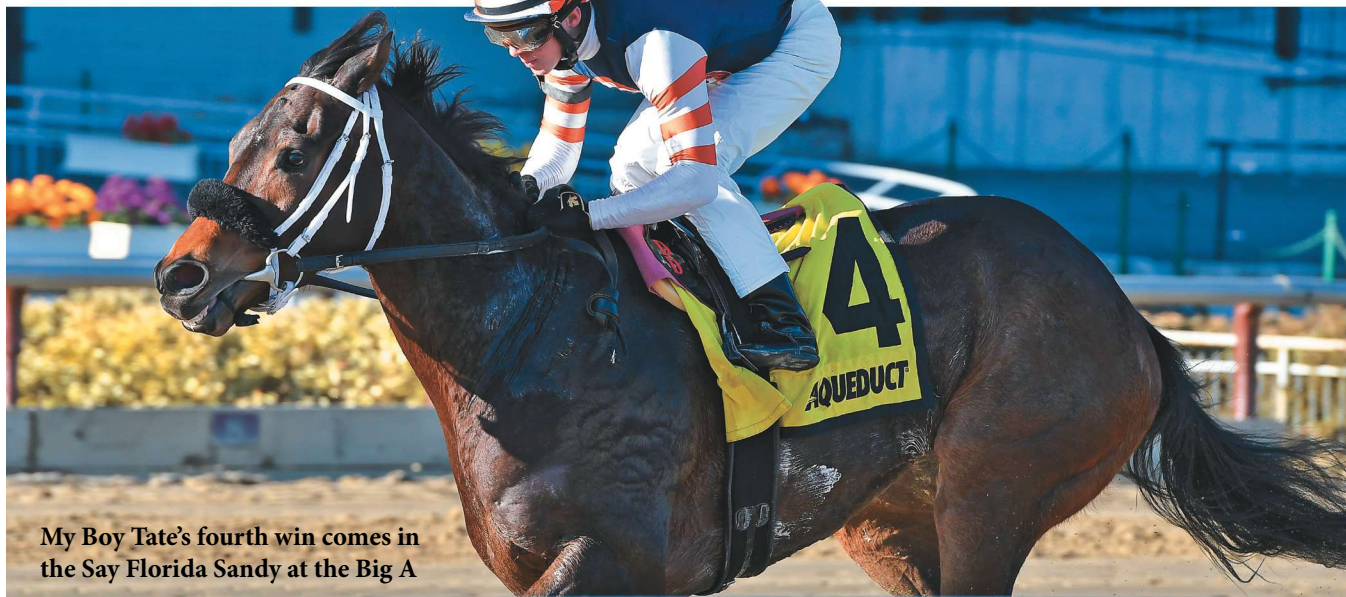

# LATE START

## Trio of state-bred stakes finally gets called to the post

**THE NEW YEAR GREETED** New York City with sub-freezing temperatures, forcing a number of Aqueduct's New York-bred stakes to be rescheduled. The hearty Empire State stock, however, weathered numerous delays and eventually returned to the racetrack to give inspired performances.

When trainer Michelle Nevin bred My Boy Tate (by Boys At Tosconova), she was actually performing a bit of old-fashioned matchmaking.

"I used to gallop his mom (Backslash, by Sharp Humor), and I used to gallop Boys At Tosconova. They were my two loves on the track. So I thought, 'Why not?' I thought they matched together well," said Nevin.

She was spot-on with that assumption, as the gelded 4-year-old My Boy Tate reeled off his fourth consecutive victory, a dominant three-length triumph Jan. 13 in his first stakes try, the inaugural running of the \$100,000 Say Florida Sandy Stakes.

Owned jointly by Nevin and Little Red Feather Racing (a California-based partnership managed by Billy Koch), My Boy Tate—after winning his previous three contests against state-breds by a combined 20¾ lengths—carried the mantle of 11-10 favorite, as well as jockey Dylan Davis.

My Boy Tate quickly grabbed the early lead in the seven-furlong Say Florida Sandy, establishing a measured 1½-length advantage over the closest of his seven rivals, without much coaxing from his rider.

"It wasn't like it was a plan to go right to the lead or anything. I basically told Dylan to play the break. I expected to see more speed in the race," said Nevin. "It's always a good feeling to see the jock just sitting on your horse and cruising."

Racing through the latter portion of the far turn, My Boy Tate opened up of his own accord.

"Dylan did a great job just sitting and waiting on his run," said Nevin. "When it was time to ask him, he responded again."

The contest was over at the eighth pole.

“It got so quiet because there was nobody around him,” said Davis. “I wanted to take care of him and got him engaged again at the eighth pole.”

Frank Paolangelì’s homebred Gold for the King (by Posse), winner of several state-bred stakes for trainer Charlton Baker, put in a strong run through the stretch to claim second, but his late kick appeared understated in the wake of My Boy Tate’s performance.

The final time was 1:27.14 over the muddy/sealed track.

My Boy Tate has won four of seven starts with earnings of \$192,300.

“We’re thrilled to also own part of My Boy Tate’s little (half) brother, Charlie McCoy (by Bluegrass Cat), who is almost ready to debut,” said Dave Lyon, one of approximately nine minority owners brought to the winner’s circle by Little Red Feather Racing. “Dylan Davis graduated from Saratoga (High School), like myself and (another part owner). So we had some real Blue Streak (SHS’s mascot) pride going on out there. This horse is special to watch and seems like he has another gear that we haven’t seen yet.”

Zilla Racing Stables’ Celtic Chaos (by Dublin) finished third.

Among the most legendary of New York-breds was Say Florida Sandy (by Personal Flag), who made an incredible 98 starts, winning 33 times and earning \$2,085,408. Sanford Bacon’s homebred

was claimed for \$70,000 as a 3-year-old and eventually captured 19 stakes, including the True North Handicap (G2) and Gravesend Handicap (G3, 1998 and 2000). He won several state-bred championships and was the New York-bred Horse of the Year of 2002. Say Florida Sandy retired at the age of 9 in 2003 and is the sixth all-time state-bred earner.

### BODY ENGLISH

A plethora of owners celebrated in the winner’s circle when Mike Piazza’s Zilla Racing Stables—a Saratoga-based partnership—sent out English Soul to her first stakes victory, and second straight impressive tally, in the \$100,000 East View Stakes Jan. 14.

The 3-year-old daughter of English Channel, out of Soul Possession, by Belong to Me, broke on top in the one-turn mile event and was never headed.

Saddled by Ray Handal and ridden by Manny Franco, English Soul, who had previously shown promise on the turf, made her strongest statement yet on the main track, registering a 2¾-length win in 1:42.32.

“She’s a talented horse, period. Just a stone-cold runner,” said Handal. “For now we’ll keep her on the dirt and maybe try open company.”

Bred by Dr. Mia Gallo, Dave Stack, and Arlene Wilkins, English Soul is the last foal of Soul Possession, who passed away from melanoma about a year af-

ter the filly's birth. The cross to English Channel was suggested by geneticist Alan Porter, who helps advise Gallo and her husband, Tom Gallo (president of New York Thoroughbred Breeders). The Gallos run TJG Sales Agency and Blue Stone Farm near Cambridge.

"She was tough and strong-willed from the day she was born," Mia Gallo said. "She was always first to the gate and the leader of the pack. It's no surprise she's turning into a superior race filly. I'm very proud of her."

English Soul notched her third win from five starts, increasing her earnings to \$145,134.

Dr. William Wilmot and Dr. Joan Taylor's homebred Midnight Disguise (by Midnight Lute) closed stoutly through the stretch for second after spending several days in quarantine when the barn of trainer Linda Rice was found to have an unraced 3-year-old diagnosed with equine herpesvirus (EHV-1).

### WINNING ON THE LINE

Promise can spring from disappointment. That's the way it was in late May of last year for Terry Finley, president of West Point Thoroughbreds and co-owner of Kentucky Derby Presented by Yum! Brands (G1) winner Always Dreaming, who finished a disappointing eighth in the Preakness Stakes (G1).

"We were all licking our wounds from the Preakness and Always Dreaming. A few days later (at the Fasig-Tip-

ton Mid-Atlantic 2-year-olds in training sale), we went after this big, strong colt (Empire Line, by Morning Line), who looked like a real runner," said Finley, whose stable co-owns the colt with RAP Racing. "The fact he was a New York-bred only added to our intrigue in possibly buying him. We had a pretty good battle to land him (for \$180,000), but we're sure glad we did."

In a gutsy and professional performance, Empire Line, from the barn of trainer George Weaver and ridden by Eric Cancel, stretched out to a mile Jan. 15 in the \$100,000 Damon Runyon Stakes after breaking his maiden sprinting in his December debut.

The 3-year-old Empire Line, out of Homecoming Dance, by Vindication, assumed the lead in mid-stretch of the Damon Runyon and then stubbornly held off the powerful late kick

of R and H Stable's Evaluator (by leading first-crop sire Overanalyze) to score by a nose in 1:38.75 in a field of seven sophomores.

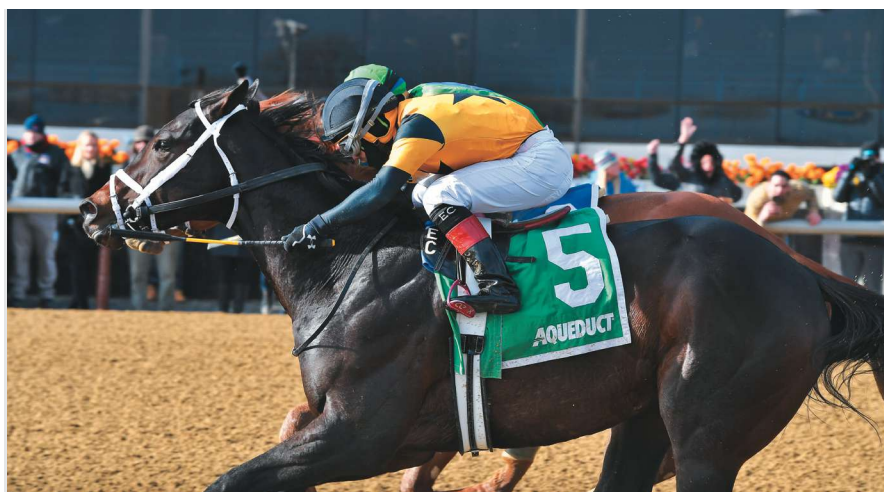
Bred by Fred Hertrich III and John Fielding, Empire Line increased his earnings to \$93,000.

Damon Runyon was a well-known New York reporter and sportswriter during the first-third of the 20th century. His fictional tales of gamblers were the basis for the Broadway play "Guys and Dolls" and his distinctive street-wise characters came to be described as Runyonesque.

Pat Lynch, a former Turf writer and vice president of the New York Racing Association, who now rests in Arlington National Cemetery, once said of Runyon's forays to the racetrack, "He'd say, 'Don't tip me the name of a winning horse. Tip me onto a good story.'" 🐾

# Confidence

**Quezon rolls in the La Verdad; Frost Wise, Control Group also score**

**BREEDERS JANE AND BILL MORIARTY** of Apache Farm in Rembert, S.C., knew Quezon (by Tiz Wonderful), owned by Marc Keller and trained by Bobby Ribaud, would be running Jan. 19 in the \$100,000 La Verdad Stakes at Aqueduct. Earlier that day the couple set their DVR to record the race with plans to watch the mare they'd bred back in 2012 later in the evening, when things on the farm were quieter.

That plan got scuttled for Jane, though, after she picked up the phone and the reporter on the other end congratulated her. She preceded to give her comments in a quiet voice. That way Bill wouldn't overhear and could experience Quezon's dominating victory for himself.

"Quezon's mother, Kalookan Dancer (by Olympio) was a multiple stakes winner in California, just a fabulous racehorse. We went to Tiz Wonderful because we wanted to produce something commercial," said Jane Moriarty, a transplanted New Yorker. "Quezon just keeps getting better (with age), and I really credit her owner and trainer for managing her career so beautifully."

During the initial stages of the seven-furlong La Verdad, Quezon, who was coming off a solid last-out win in December's Garland of Roses Stakes, rated in fourth beneath Joe Rocco Jr. as the 7-10 favorite in the field of six older fillies and mares.

The opening quarter-mile went in a swift :22.96 and the half-mile in :46.07.

The second choice, Absatootly (by Mineshaft), who'd defeated Quezon in last October's Iroquois Stakes by a half-length, moved up outside of the early pacesetters. But Rocco quickly rallied Quezon with a deft inside-out move to sidle up alongside of her. Quezon surged to the fore at the top of the lane, switched leads on cue, and then drew off by 4½ lengths in 1:22.67.

"We were very confident going into this. Even with all the missed training over the last couple of weeks (due to the inclement weather), she was able to get enough in," said Ribaud. "I think the cold weather helps (her). Last year she didn't get good until the fall. That was one of the reasons we kept her here this winter and it looks like it's held true."

The 6-year-old Quezon has won seven of 18 starts, compiling earnings of \$754,200.

"I think the goal here is the Barbara Fritchie (grade 2—Feb.17 at Laurel Park)



because the thing that's eluded her is the graded win," Ribaudo said. "That's what I'm going to point for, then decide whether to lay her up for a while and bring her back or go ahead and breed her."

The runner-up in the La Verdad was Cutair Racing's Palladian Bridge (by Girolamo), from the barn of trainer Ray Handal. Walking L Thoroughbreds and Magdalena Racing's Wonderment (by Cosmonaut), sent out by Kenny McPeck, finished third.

The La Verdad Stakes is named for Sheila Rosenblum's Eclipse Award-winning female sprint champion of 2015.

## FROSTY FINISH

Tactics, race-riding, and a main track tilted toward inside speed all came into play as a competitive quartet of older fillies and mares battled Jan. 18 in the nine-furlong \$100,000 Bay Ridge Stakes.

George and Stephanie Autry's 4-year-old Frost Wise (by Frost Giant), a dominating 16¼-length winner in a one-mile allowance race at Aqueduct in late November, was looking to stretch her speed an extra furlong in the Bay Ridge as the 7-5 post-time favorite. She even had jockey Kendrick Carmouche, who excels at rating a horse on the lead. But when the starting gates opened, Frostie Anne, one of a pair of Rudy Rodriguez-trained horses in the field, laid down the gauntlet, intent on the lead under Junior Alvarado.

That's when Carmouche made the split-second decision to take back into second.

The opening quarter-mile was raced in a quick :23.47 and the half-mile in :47.72.

"Kendrick is an experienced jockey and decided to take off that pace. It made all the difference for us," said Michael Dilger, the conditioner of Frost Wise.

Moving midway on the far turn, Carmouche roused Frost Wise to challenge the leader. But directly to her outside, the Charlton Baker-owned and -trained Riot Worthy (by Patriot Act) was making a serious bid to sweep past them both.

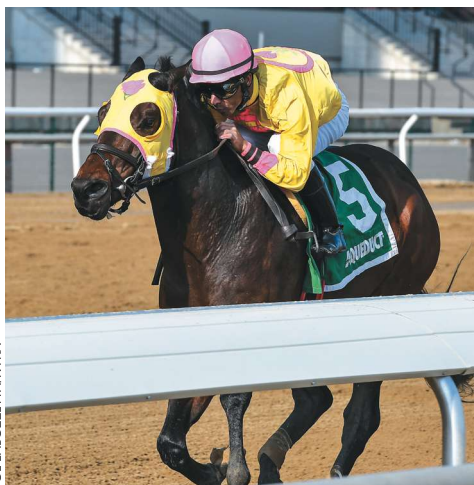

Frost Wise fought gamely in between rivals to maintain her position.

Into the stretch the rallying pair left the pacesetter behind, with Frost Wise pinned along the rail. The entire length of the straightaway it appeared as if Riot Worthy, beneath Manny Franco, would get the win. But Frost Wise showed tremendous resolve, digging deep through the final yards and winning by a determined nose.

"Mike (Dilger) said she doesn't close too much. But she did today because they bumped her a little at the quarter pole and squeezed her and she wanted to fight more," said Carmouche, who celebrated his 34th birthday with a trio of victories on the day. "I just put my head down and rode her to the wire."

The final time was 1:53.89.

"She's starting to show a new level of maturity," said Dilger. "We're going to enjoy this, for owners George and Stephanie Autry; I believe it's their second ever stakes win."

Bred by Gabriel Duignan out of the winning Smart Strike mare Watch Smartly, Frost Wise has won three of 10 starts and has earned \$187,738.

"I bought the mare already in foal. But I was a big fan of Frost Giant, and it's a very good cross (with the Smart Strike) family," said Duignan. "This is a very nice filly, and she has a real future

ahead of her."

Riot Worthy was the tough-luck runner-up in the Bay Ridge, followed by Frostie Anne and Frosty Margarita—as Frost Giant, who stands at Irish Hill & Dutchess Views Stallions, sired three of the four contestants.

## TOTAL CONTROL

Control Group (by Posse), a three-length winner of the Discovery Stakes (G3) last November, returned to Aqueduct Jan. 21 and easily annexed the nine-furlong Alex M. Robb Stakes. Owned by Michael Dubb—who accumulated the most wins (72) by an owner on the New York Racing Association circuit in 2017 for the fourth straight season—and David Simon, the 4-year-old colt went directly to the front beneath Carmouche and drew off from the competition on the latter portion of the far turn.

Bred by Alan Goldberg and Colts Neck Stable, Control Group, who carried 123 pounds and spotted as many as eight pounds to his four rivals, posted a four-length triumph in 1:52.19.

"I knew he was only going to get stronger coming off the race he ran last time (in the Discovery)," said Rodriguez. "We were giving a lot of weight to the other horses in the field, but we were confident in his ability and it showed today."

The winner is out of We Kept Her, by Victory Gallop. 🐾

# THE NEW DEAL

Robin Malatino mixes things up while marketing War Dancer

**NEVER LET IT BE SAID** that Robin Malatino shies from a challenge.

Twenty-five years ago she was part of a group of investors who purchased Saratoga Mineral Water, the Saratoga Springs company that had been in operation for a century before Evian shut it down in the early 1990s. The man who became her husband, Capital Region native Anthony Malatino, couldn't bear to see the local institution perish, so he initiated the sale estimated to be between \$4 and \$5 million.

Under Robin's leadership as CEO and chairperson of the Saratoga Beverage Group, Saratoga Spring Water became a national brand and a Nasdaq-traded company with annual sales of \$10 million, and eight years after purchasing the company, she sold it for \$58.5 million.

Speaking by phone recently from Florida, where she and her husband spend

half the year, Malatino recalled a pivotal moment in the company's growth.

"I was in a meeting at the Plaza Hotel in Manhattan with their food and beverage manager," she said. "We were competing against Poland Springs for a contract, and our bid was more expensive than theirs. He said to me, 'You know, Robin, it's just water in a bottle.'"

"I thought, 'Jeez, he's right.'"

So she reenvisioned the product. The company created the distinctive deep blue bottle with gold script, a design still in use and immediately recognizable, and she went back to the Plaza.

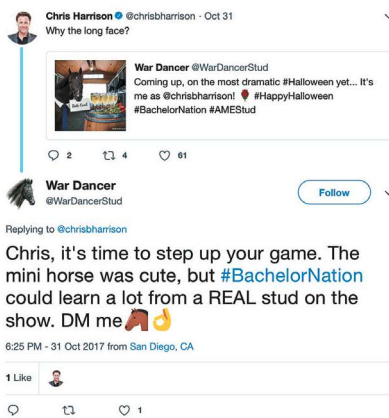
"We increased our price because the cost was higher to produce it," she said, "and he took it. It was still the same water, but it was about marketing and packaging."

Now the senior vice president of Malatino and Associates at Morgan Stanley in Celebration, Fla., and the owner with Anthony of an 80-acre horse farm near Saratoga Springs, she entered the racing business about a decade ago with the same intrepidity, creativity,

and single-mindedness with which she won that Plaza contract, meeting its challenges with equal success.

After the Malatinos began buying horses, Robin insisted that they needed a farm, initially envisioned as a place to retire them safely. Anthony was less convinced, but he agreed, provided she could find one within the limits of the city of Saratoga Springs, which is not exactly known for its open spaces.

Perhaps unsurprisingly, Robin found one, less than two miles from Saratoga Race Course. That it was owned and inhabited was no deterrent.

"I knocked on the owner's door," said Robin, "and I said, 'I need to buy your property. I have horses and I need a farm. He said, 'It's not for sale.'"

Eight months later the farm was theirs.

But now, as the Malatinos enter the stallion business, Robin is facing a challenge that even she acknowledges is a little daunting. A year ago, when their multiple graded stakes winner War Dancer was set to begin his stud career at Rockridge Stud near Hudson, Malatino spoke confidently of a first-year book of 100 mares.

"I ate those words," she admitted. "I was much more naïve than I am now. This whole making of a stallion is a tough, tough business."

Drawing on her experience with Saratoga Water, she realized she needed to do something to make War

Dancer stand out. Sure, he's a millionaire son of War Front out of a graded stakes-placed mare, but that wasn't bringing mares to New York to breed to him, so Malatino regrouped and launched a multi-pronged campaign.

When she talks about War Dancer, she talks about him much as she would talk about a person, delighting in his personality, and she knew that she needed to bring that personality to life. She hired Grand Slam Social to create a War Dancer Instagram account, and

she put out a press release announcing a parody on the romance reality show "The Bachelor," "America's Most Eligible Stud."

"You don't know how people in the industry are going to react," she acknowledged. "But you get a huge bang for your buck with social media. One of our social media team was doing a farm tour in Florida, and she mentioned that she works with War Dancer. The farm manager was an older gentleman, and he said, 'Oh, I know him. He's the Bachelor Stud.'"

"It was like, 'Bingo.' That was the goal."

In conjunction with the social media campaign, the Malatinos also ran the New York breeding numbers, and realized they'd have to be able to get mares from out of state. They knew that the lucrative New York breeding program could be a draw, but to be part of it for an out-of-state mare would entail high shipping and boarding costs.

"So we thought," said Malatino, "what if we were to shift the risk of those expenses from them to us?"

They established criteria for the sort of mares to which they'd breed War Dancer—stakes performer or stakes producer, crosses through body type

or nicking, age—and offered to pay the travel expenses and 90 days' board, continuing the reality show theme by calling it "Breeding with the Stars."

They built it and the mares came, from a half dozen states and Canada, 40 of them that shipped in and bred to War Dancer at his \$5,000 stud fee.

their New York-bred Honor Up (To Honor and Serve—Unobstructed View, by Yes It's True), a \$65,000 purchase at the 2016 Fasig-Tipton Saratoga sale of preferred New York-bred yearlings, broke his maiden at Aqueduct Dec. 9 by 11¾ lengths. At the recent Keeneland November sale of breeding stock,

locals, the last-named in the hope of bringing new people into the racing industry.

"I think it will be a blast," she said. "People will have a chance to show off the baby in a wonderful, gentle environment, not the stress of a sale. Seeing the mother and the baby is different from seeing the baby alone, and I want people to see how beautiful that is."

As she embarks on a new endeavor with horses at the beginning of their lives, she continues to think about what happens to them when their careers are at an end, recalling her experience at Parx when War Dancer won the listed PTHA President's Cup Stakes.

"We were in a room for people with horses in stakes races," she recounted. "There's a buffet, the bar's open, and set up in the room is a booth for Parx's aftercare program Turning for Home."

"They engaged me in conversation; they noticed that we were the favorite. We were excited and I said, 'If we win this race, you meet me in the winner's circle.'"

They did win the \$200,000 race, and, said Malatino, "They were in the winner's circle before we got there. It was very smart: I wrote them a check. You've got to get people in this business in that moment of happiness and excitement—not when they've got a horse that's about to retire."

"People spend silly money for yearlings and 2-year-olds," she continued. "If you just ding them a little bit at that point, they don't feel it. We need to all do our part. You can't have the 5% carrying the 95%. Those numbers don't work."

Malatino would love, at some point, to take an official role in Thoroughbred aftercare, but with a full-time job and her War Dancer enterprise, there's not a lot of time left in the day to take on yet another time-consuming project. Plus, she's got a lot to get ready for in early 2018, when War Dancer's first foals hit the ground.

"I'm not going to be able to breathe," she said. "I'm going to be a grandmother!" 🐾

"We had people who'd never set foot in New York State," she said. "They're excited about the New York-bred program. Think about it: If you sell your baby, you continue to get paid an annuity. When you sell a baby in Kentucky, that's it. Here, it's just the beginning."

The program was so successful the Malatinos will limit the 2018 crop of new out-of-state mares to 25, with the expectation that many of this year's breedings will be repeated.

Continuing the romance, the War Dancer team sends out cards, love notes, and candy to the mares bred to him, leading one mare owner to comment, "I've been doing this for 45 years, and you're the first person to send us gifts. Usually, we just get a bill."

Despite the focus on establishing War Dancer as a stallion, the Malatinos continue to buy and race horses;

they bought six mares to breed to War Dancer next year, signing the ticket in the name of "War Dancer's Ladies," adding to the 15 mares they already have. They run horses in the name of Saratoga Seven, Diamond M Stable, and Double M Thoroughbreds, owning in partnership about a dozen runners.

Next summer the Malatinos' Sugar Plum Farm will host a showcase day for War Dancer's foals. Malatino envisions it as a mare/foal runway show, inspired by a similar event at Vivien Malloy's Edition Farm. "We'll have War Dancer there, too, so there will be a family photo op: mom, dad, baby," she said. "You never see that."

In preparation for next year's Fasig-Tipton Horses of All Ages in October and the 2019 Fasig-Tipton New York-bred sale, she'll invite pinhookers, other interested industry people, and

# AMERICAN ECLIPSE

**AMERICAN ECLIPSE (1814)** by Duroc out of Miller's Damsel, by Messenger, was bred by Gen. Nathaniel Coles. Coles was a Revolutionary War hero and prosperous mill owner who had an active horse breeding operation at Dosoris, Long Island, which is now called Glen Cove. Coles later wrote a detailed memorandum on how American Eclipse was reared and fed that became a classic narrative on the methods that were used to raise and nurture horses during that time period.

American Eclipse won his first start at 4 in 1818 in straight heats, although at that time it was illegal to race horses. He was retired for the rest of the year and on March 15, 1819, he was sold to prominent New York horseman Cornelius Van

Ranst. After winning two more heat races, also illegally, he was retired to stud duty.

When the Union Course opened in Queens County in 1821, its president, John Cox Stevens, persuaded Van Ranst to bring his undefeated horse out of retirement to lend his new track some prestige. On opening day American Eclipse faced the celebrated 9-year-old mare Lady Lightfoot. Although the mare was favored at 2-1, American Eclipse exhibited no rust by winning in straight heats, this time legally.

American Eclipse came back in 1822 to win three straight heat races. His last victory in that streak was galling to southern horsemen since it took place in the South's backyard, Washington, D.C.

Col. William R. Johnson, the most prominent southern horse owner of his time, proposed a match race for \$20,000 to be held at the Union Course between American Eclipse and a southern horse of Johnson's choosing. The proposal was accepted, and after several trial races Johnson settled on Lemuel Long's 4-year-old Sir Henry.

In his book *The Great Match Race*, author John Eisenberg provided this description of Sir Henry: "His leg bones were

long and elegant. His running action was flawless. And what a burst of speed! His full sprint lasted as long as his jockey would allow. There was no telling how long he would go.”

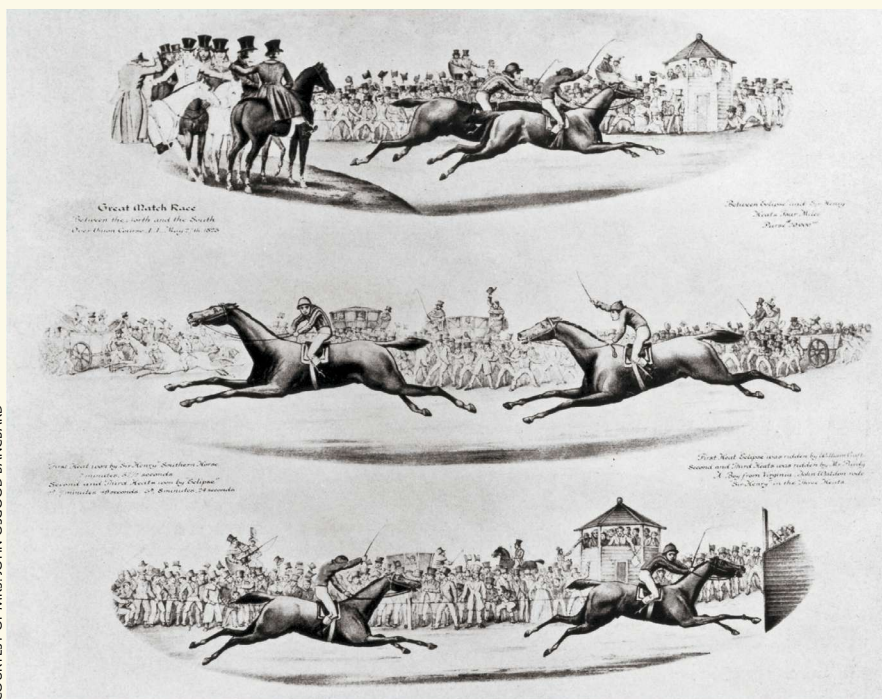
Eisenberg also had high praise for American Eclipse: “Eclipse was still a majestic athlete...Even at nine years old, he made the task of running a four-mile heat seem like a leisurely gallop.”

On May 27, 1823, an estimated 50,000 people poured into the Union Course to watch the race. In the Sept. 30, 1830, *American Turf Register and Sporting Magazine*, Cadwallader R. Colden, writing under the pen name “An Old Turfman,” described the scene before the race: “The road from New York to the course, a distance of eight miles, was covered by horsemen, and a triple line of carriages, in an unbroken chain, from the dawn of day until one o’clock, the appointed hour of starting. The stands on the ground, for the reception of spectators, were crowded to excess at an early hour...The whole track, or nearly so, for a mile distance in circuit, was lined on the inside by carriages and horsemen, and the throng of pedestrians surpassed all belief.”

The race was best two out of three four-mile-heats, with a half-hour break between heats. To put this in perspective, Hall of Famer Ghostzapper’s entire four-year career of 11 races totaled 82 furlongs, compared to Henry and Eclipse’s 96 furlongs in about 1½ hours.

The newly turned 4-year-old Sir Henry (in those days all Thoroughbreds’ birthdays occurred on May 1, rather than the present Jan. 1) carried 108 pounds, while his 9-year-old opponent carried 126 pounds. Eclipse was ridden by 25-year-old William Crafts, which surprised most observers since his regular jockey was the 38-year-old Samuel Purdy.

Van Rans’s reasoning, which subsequently shown to be seriously flawed, was that Purdy was too old to ride in such an important race. Henry’s jockey was John Walden.

The first heat was won by Sir Henry in wire-to-wire fashion, much to the dismay of the northerners. The youthful Crafts was not skilled or strong enough to control his horse, so to compensate he resorted to excessive whipping.

As Colden observed: “I clearly saw that Crafts was making every exertion with both spur and whip to get Eclipse forward, and scored him sorely, both before and behind his girth...Craft (sic) continued to make free use of the whip; his right hand in so doing was raised high in the air, his body thrown abroad, and his seat loose and unsteady...”

The final time, 7:37½ seconds, set an American record for the distance.

Colden described Eclipse when he was resting between the first and second heats: “The injudicious manner in which he had been rode (sic), had certainly annoyed and unnecessarily distressed him; the cause of his throwing out his tail, and flirting it up and down...was now apparent; Craft (sic) in using his whip wildly, had struck him too far back, and had cut him not only upon his sheath, but had made a deep incision upon his testicles,

and it was no doubt the violent pain occasioned thereby, that caused the noble animal to complain, and motion with his tail, indicative of the torture he suffered. The blood flowed profusely from one or both of these foul cuts, and trickled down the inside of his hind legs...and gave a more doleful appearance to the discouraging scene of a lost heat.”

During the break between heats, an observer told Van Rans that Purdy was among the spectators. Realizing he had made a disastrous decision in replacing Purdy, he sent an aid to find his former jockey and persuade him to ride American Eclipse for the rest of the match. The mission was accomplished, and Eclipse was reunited with his regular jockey.

Fortunately, at least for the northern contingent, the wounds inflicted on Eclipse were only superficial. Under Purdy’s skillful handling Henry was allowed to take the lead for most of the second heat, and at the three-mile-pole he snuck by Henry on the inside, catching Walden by surprise, and the match was even at one heat apiece. The time of the second heat was 7:09, an American

record for that distance in a second heat.

The third heat was the South's turn to change jockeys, with Walden being replaced by the retired Arthur Taylor. The result was a romp for Eclipse, with the exhausted Henry offering little resistance. Colden concluded: "Thus terminated the most interesting race ever run in the United States. Besides the original stake of \$20,000 each, it was judged that upward of \$200,000 changed hands (in side bets)."

American Eclipse was retired for good after the match race. The first heat in his match with Sir Henry was the only heat he lost in his eight-race career, and his great effort in that race was undoubtedly the reason he and Purdy were inducted into the Hall of Fame.

In addition to being a great race horse, American Eclipse became an outstanding sire on both sides of the Mason-Dixon line. Three other New York-breds stood out in the pre-Civil War era, and all were sired by American Eclipse.

The first was the filly Ariel (1822), out of Young Empress, by Financier, bred by Gerrit Vanderveer of Flatbush, Long Island. An article in the September 1844 *American Turf Register and Sporting Magazine* stated that "Ariel certainly ranks with the best racehorses of any age or clime...With reference to English works and to our own pages, we find no account of any horse that has either run or won as many races." The article concluded: "Thus it appears that Ariel has run more than 345 miles in 57 races, of which she won 42, 17 of them four mile heats."

In summing up her career, John Hervey quoted William Henry Herbert, known by the pen name Frank Forester, an Englishman who was often critical of American horses: "This noble mare's performances, in regard to stoutness more particularly, were almost miraculous."

The next of American Eclipse's notable New York-bred get was Black Maria (1826), out of the famous Sir Archy mare Lady Lightfoot, whom American

Eclipse had defeated on opening day of the Union Course. She was bred by Col. John Tayloe and was owned by John C. Stevens.

In addition to being a great race horse, American Eclipse became an outstanding sire on both sides of the Mason-Dixon line.

The *Daily Racing Form* described Hall as "that celebrated breeder, promoter, and benefactor of agricultural interests of the continent."

In 1827 she was sold to John C. Stevens, the owner of the Union Course. She began her racing career as a 3-year-old, compiling four wins from six starts in her first two years. As a 5-year-old she won one of three four-mile heat races before traveling to Baltimore to win the Post Stakes, taking the last two four-mile heats. Three days later she lost the Jockey Club Purse in straight four-mile heats. Thus she ended her 1831 season racing 20 miles in four days.

Black Maria began her 1832 season by splitting two four-mile heats, followed by a win in a three-mile heat race. On Oct. 13, 1832, on a heavy track on the Union Course, she participated in what Hervey described, perhaps erroneously due to its demanding conditions, as "one of the great historical events of the American turf."

It consisted of an exhausting best of five four-mile heats. Black Maria won the race, but, like the other three con-

testants, Slim, Trifle, and Lady Relief, who competed in the race (one dropped out after being distanced in the second heat), the race took its toll. She was a ghost of herself until two months after the race; Trifle was unable to race again until the fall of 1833; and Lady Relief died two weeks later from the effects of a cold and exhaustion.

Black Maria was retired in the spring of 1835 with a career record of 25 starts, winning 13 of 17 four-mile heats, with earnings of approximately \$15,000.

Medoc, the third of American Eclipse's outstanding New York-breds, was born in 1829, out of Young Maid of the Oaks, by Financier. He was bred by James Bathgate of West Farms in Westchester County, located a mile north of Fordham.

Bathgate raced Medoc at 3 before selling him to the ubiquitous John C. Stevens, making him a stablemate of Black Maria. Medoc's career was short, winning four of five races, but it was enough for Hervey to call him American Eclipse's greatest son.

Medoc's forced retirement due to an injury was felt deeply by Stevens, especially since Medoc consistently beat Black Maria in trial races. He also had a short but spectacular career as a stallion in Kentucky, leading the sires list in 1840 and 1841.

His life ended in the fall of 1839 when at the age of 10 he broke his foreleg. A memorial printed shortly after his death in the January 1840 issue of *American Turf Register and Sporting Magazine* described Medoc as "the most popular native stallion in America...His stock is almost invariably characterized by great symmetry of proportions, with fine limbs and coats like satin; they have a remarkable turn of speed, and what is better, they promise to go the distance and train on." 🐾

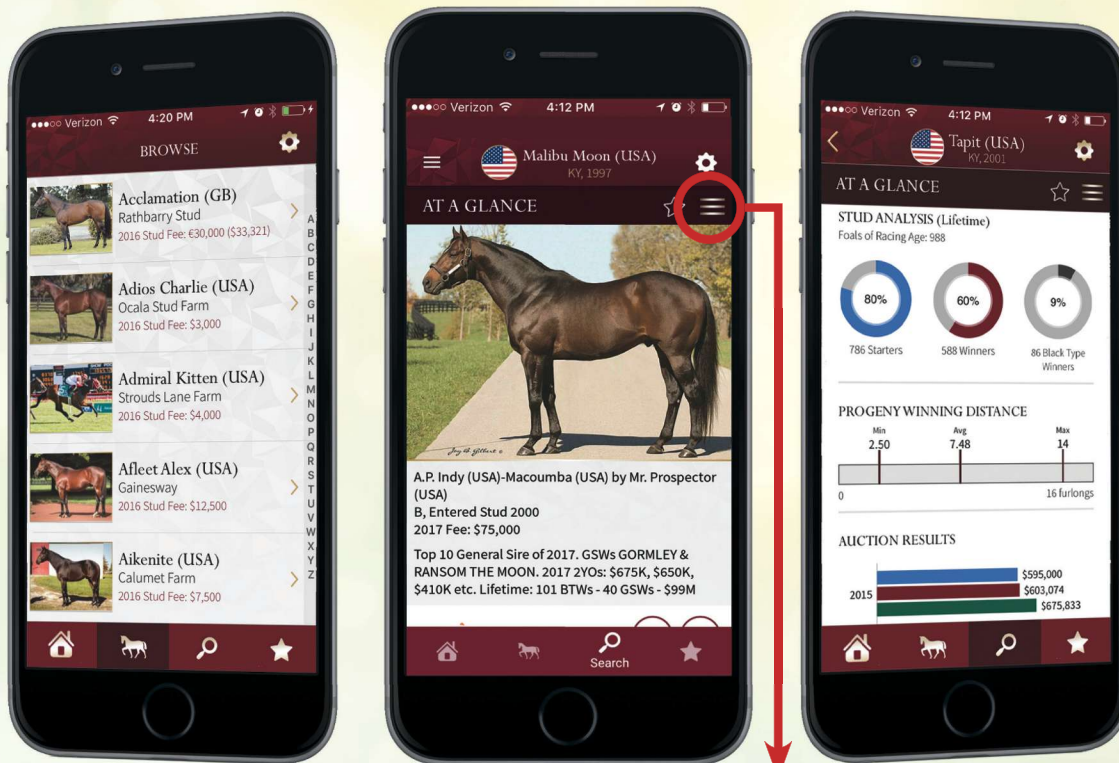
