

Mother charged in drowning death of daughter

Last Friday evening Kayla M. Pagan, 25, of Marlboro, was arrested and charged with Criminally Negligent Homicide, a class E felony, in the drowning death of her 10-month-old daughter.

After an investigation conducted by



the NYS Troop \mathbf{F} Forensic Identification Unit, the Town of Marlborough Police and the Ulster County District Attorney, it was determined that at about 7:30 p.m., Friday Pagan was giving her daughter

bath but left her unsupervised "for an unreasonable amount of time" as the bath continued to fill with water this resulted in the drowning death of her daughter, according to a press release by the New York State Police.

several times with library trustees to discuss the possible sale of the town owned structure and the land to them. The Library is located at 2047 Rte. 32 in Modena.

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Milton guitarist to cut live album

Rest week local guitarist Dylan Doyle will step out onto the stage with his trio at Spillianfest 2016 to record his first live album. It will be a moment of truth for the 18 year-old Milton musician, when he must quiet all fears so that his creative side can shine and show what he was born to do.

The two-hour concert will be performed without intermission and is set for Saturday, July 23 starting at 6 p.m. at 50 Fleischmanns Heights Rd, in Fleischmanns, NY. For more information call 800-811-3351 or go to spillian.com.

Doyle described the setting for the concert.

"It's the last of the Fleischmann mansions still standing [and] a couple named Mark and Leigh, [whom Doyle calls true people of the arts] turned it into weekend retreat and a bed & breakfast type of thing," he said. "The stage is outside in a meadow and there is a chandelier over it and lights going all throughout the forest...you feel you're in a magic forest."

Dylan said his band performed there last year to great acclaim and were invited back for a return engagement.

"So this year we even wanted to do it bigger so I said why don't we do a live album there and that's how its all fallen into place," he said.

Doyle's new band includes members Chuck Torres on bass and Dorian Randolph on drums.


"In my opinion I think it's the best lineup I think I've ever had behind me," he said. "There is just complete harmony between our personalities and we all hear music the same way."

Doyle said the heart of the show will be original music, a few cover tunes "sprinkled in" and he has invited a few special guests, such as drummer Randy Ciarlante, who was in the last iteration of The Band, sitting beside Levon Helm.

Doyle likened performing a live concert as walking a tightrope without a net.

"If we mess up it's a permanent mess up," he laughed. "We've actually had this set written up for two months now and we've got just about every second of the set, except for the guitar solos, nailed down. We've been working these songs out almost like we're in boot camp. The set's so prepared its almost going to be second nature to us."

Doyle said recently he finds himself shifting gears musically, moving from his

trademark rock and blues "to more of a roots rock, soul, R&B and funk feel." He said he is gravitating toward songs that have a more melodic melody, challenging chord changes and complex lyric turns.

Doyle said his interests and influences are wide-ranging.

"I've been listening and reading a lot more and I think my writing is starting to reflect that, like John Prine [he breaks into the chorus of 'Storm Windows' with Don't let your baby down], Bob Dylan and reading a lot of Charles Bukowski [American poet, novelist and short story writer 1920-1994] and Leonard Cohen lately."

Doyle said he lives day to day "but in two years I definitely see myself doing a lot more with my music and travelling a lot more [and] playing to bigger crowds. That is just based on the rate of growth that its been going. If it continues steadily at that rate, which may plateau or it may speed up." He said no matter where his

we've come to the point where the library board is going to get together and present some sort of a formal proposal [to the town]," he said.

Delgado said they have told the trustees to put their idea of purchasing the building from the town in a formal letter of intent that would outline their plans.

DePew said he stressed to the trustees that the seniors would continue to be allowed to meet in the lower level of the library as they have for years. He also said the town would like to keep the existing structure and have any modifications added to it.

Delgado said the trustees would have to have an appraisal done on the building and have the water and land tested.

"Basically they're going to do their due diligence," she said.

DePew said once this happens, money would be put in escrow by the trustees and the terms of the sale would be reviewed by attorneys but it is up to the library board to take the next step.

"I don't know if there is going to be some other type of a situation that the board will come up to a conclusion and follow but at this point [its] strictly business," he said. "I don't want to and I hope I am not there under false pretenses. I don't want to dictate to the library board what they're going to do and what they're not going to do."

DePew said the trustees have indicated they might wish to construct a second building of approximately the same size that is attached with a foyer in-between. It would meet the requirements for those who are disabled.

Delgado said a letter from the trustees to the board would be meaningful.

"That way we know they're serious [and] they know we're serious and now we can take the next step," she said, adding that the trustees were told this entire process would take time. "It is not going to happen overnight and do not start taking hammer to nail. We told them unfortunately it is a long process, please have patience, we will get through this."

DePew added, "I think they were both positive meetings."

Lynn Ridgeway, President of the Library Board of Trustees, said her board is still "seriously considering" a property that is also on Route 32 but is on the opposite side of the road and just to the south of the present library. She said if the trustees were to go with this parcel,

the former cider mill building that is on it would be demolished and a new structure erected in its place.

Ridgeway said the idea of acquiring the present library and expanding off of that "has been way in the background for about a year." She said the slow response from the owner of the other property is what prompted the casual discussions on the current library that have taken place with the Town Board.

Ridgeway said the trustees will be meeting on July 14 and she expects the requested letter of intent will be on their agenda for discussion. She said at this point, the town has not indicated if they will donate the library or will attach a sale price to it "or anything like that."

Ridgeway said the library board is trying to make the best decision for the residents of Plattekill.

"By the best I mean that which will be most usable by them and most cost effective," she said. "That's our main decision between the two parcels."

Library Board Trustee William Farrell favors moving forward with the present library.

"Not everyone in the Town of Plattekill realizes that the [existing] library site is owned by the town, not the library. I think it's a great idea to take a look at the possibility of the library acquiring this property," he said. "I am glad to say that the meetings between the library trustees and the Town Board have been very positive and appreciate the Town Board

musical journey takes him he would always be tied to the Hudson Valley.

"This place is too magical with music to not be a part of it," he confessed.

Doyle has deep agricultural roots here; his grandparents Anita and Eugene Coy are long-time apple farmers.

"One of my friends calls my grandmother the 'Apple Country Queen," he said. "She and my grandfather are still alive and kicking."

Doyle sometimes worries about technical problems that surround pulling off a live show, but he has great confidence in his crew, who will be handling the sound and the recording of the show.

They are "not too big and not too small but just the right size," he said.

In addition, the show will be filmed using multiple cameras at different angles and with contrasting perspectives. He laughs saying he will one day have to give his crew a clever name and issue them all jerseys.

Never one to rest on his laurels, Doyle said in some respects this concert marks the end of an era for material he has been performing for a long time.

"After this set we will be completely revamping all the songs we will be doing, trying a whole bunch of new stuff and almost using this as a Grand Finale for the rock and blues that we've been doing," he said.

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Marlboro educator Marie Toombs retires

After a 37-year career in education, Marlboro teacher and administrator Marie Toombs decided it was the right time for her to retire at the end of the 2015-16 school year. Toombs, who was born Marie Fernandez in Yonkers, NY, met her future husband, Joseph Toombs, at SUNY Brockport where they were both athletes majoring in Physical Education. Though the two had similar circles of friends, they did not date at that time. After earning their degrees he took a job with the Marlboro School District while she began her career in the Mamaroneck School district.

After just a year, however, Marie left teaching and took a job as a stewardess with United Airlines based out of Chicago, blaming her impetuous move on being single and "I had like ants in my pants." She recalled that once on a red-eye flight she wrote a newsy, catch-up letter to Joe that elicited an invitation for her to visit.

"That's when I first came to Marlborough; I came up for a platonic visit," she laughed. While on the drive back to the airport several days later Marie recalled that Joseph told her he loved her. Marie said only after boarding the plane did she comprehend that her long-time friend "was being serious and he was being sincere" She dashed off the plane, ran through the airport and found him and apologized for her lack of a sincere response. The two returned to the plane but "as we were getting back to the gate the nose of the plane was pulling out," leaving her to wait overnight for another flight out. She got back home just in time to work a morning flight. The weekend rendezvous in Marlborough happened in September 1979 and in July 1980 the two were married - "It was a very quick romance."

Marie continued her punishing commute to Chicago from her new home base in Marlborough but she knew her stewardess days were numbered "because when I was flying I missed teaching immediately." Toombs began her return to education by substitute teaching, mostly in the Middle and High School in Marlboro.

Marie eventually found full time employment in the Poughkeepsie Middle School, remaining there for a decade. She said these years were "some of the most memorable in my lifetime." She earned a Masters Degree in Elementary Education, received a Certificate of Advanced Study in Educational Administration and

fulfilled her administrative internship requirements while she and her husband welcomed three angels into their lives - Joseph (b.1983) Ashley (b.1985) and Amanda (b.1988).

Toombs made a lateral move to the Highland School District and was hired on as a Physical Education teacher in the High School. Later in the fall of 1996, she filled an opening in the Elementary School as Assistant Principal.

"It was something that professionally I wanted to do. I did it and I liked it a lot," she said.

Toombs said a little more than a year after taking on this position, her husband passed away suddenly from a massive heart attack, leaving her a widow at 41 with three young children. She recalled this deep personal loss a "very numbing time. I think I was going through things perfunctorily; it was just rote," she recalled. "T'm very fortunate that I had wonderful colleagues [and] the people of Marlboro were very good and watched out for my children in school."

Toombs decided to come home to

Marlboro and spent two years as the Assistant Principal of the Middle School and then transferred to the Elementary School, serving as the Principal. Six years latter, in 2005, she took over as Principal of the newly built Intermediate School, calling this "one of the highlights of my career" and the position an "educator's dream."

"Watching your building emerge from raw materials, opening a new facility, a staff that was phenomenal and once again those same little faces, smiles and innocence and potential along with families that loved them. What was there not to be proud of?" she asked.

Toombs remained there until 2011 when she moved to the k-2 primary setting of the Middle Hope School, finding herself "immersed" in early education literature and research.

"While there, there wasn't a day that I didn't feel like I was in a safe and very unique place," she said.

An Assistant Superintendent for Curriculum and Instruction followed in the Central Administration office, calling this position a "personal and professional goal that had evolved over the years." This came at a time when the district was reeling from the economic impacts due to the power plant bankruptcies and eventual closure of two schools and numerous layoffs. This was enough to propel her to return to the Elementary School where she worked with Darren Corsetti. She said the two of them were a "dream team" that worked through a very unsettled time in the district.

Toombs said she is a firm believer in public education "because that's what I feel this country was based on, the rights for all students and all people to have the opportunity to grow and to learn and I'm very, very passionate about that."

Toombs hopes her philosophy permeates throughout the Marlboro district.

"I want our kids to effect the world. I want people to say, wow, you're from Marlboro, not in a snotty way but [that] you produce good people, you produce smart kids, you produce athletes that are good in sportsmanship," she said.

Toombs said her desire to retire was due, in part, to her 12 hour workdays.

"That takes a toll on you physically and it takes a toll on your personal and your family life," she said.

To honor her retirement, which coincided with her 60th birthday, her children surprised her and just recently took her to Florida for an extended weekend of celebrations.

"In 40 years you've seen an arc, you've seen many things and at this point its just time. Its not so much about what I am leaving, its about what I am doing next," she said.

Toombs said she will enjoy the simple pleasure of not rushing when she sits down to eat a meal. She plans to travel more, study a few languages "and most importantly spend more time with my friends and family." She said her first day of retirement was "wonderful."


"I think I can get used to this," she laughed.

Toombs recalled her transition to retirement.

"People have gone out of their way to be so kind and to express such wonderful things to me in the last couple of weeks and its been a gift and its been a blessing. I couldn't have orchestrated it any better and thats so tremendous," she said. "I will always thank the Marlborough community above and beyond whatever could be be expressed for what they've done for me and my family. I will always wish them the best."

Making sure that all lives matter

hese are turbulent times. Separate events in our region this week reflect the turmoil and anguish of the past few weeks.

On Tuesday. Law enforcement officials were expected to gather in Goshen for a vigil to pay tribute to five Dallas, TX police officers who were killed by a sniper last Thursday. It is the deadliest incident for law enforcement in the U.S. since 9/11, according to the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial Fund

The gunman, identified as Micah Xavier Johnson, a black Army Veteran who served in Afghanistan, is believed to have acted alone. He was killed by an explosion detonated by a remotecontrolled device.

The unfathomable execution of the police officers has promted expressions of horror and anguish. President Obama called the murders "a vicious, calculated and despicable attack on law enforcement." Congressman Sean Patrick Maloney said it was a painful and horrifying reminder of the sacrifices these heroic men and women make to keep our families safe.

"These police officers are emblematic of the values we cherish as a country," Maloney said, "and we must honor their memories by coming together now across all our lines of difference to build respect and reduce violence in a stronger and safer America."

The memorial service came one day after a gathering took place in front of City Hall, Newburgh, in response to yet another police shooting of an African American.

CNN reports that at least 309 people have been arrested over the weekend in New York and Chicago, and in St. Paul, Minnesota, and Baton Rouge. LA, respective sites of the shootings of Philando Castile and Alton Sterling by police.

Rage and anguish comes from all sides in these times. It comes from the families of slain police officers and from the families of those who died at the hands of police. To some, it offers a built-in excuse to further justify senseless violence that



Lloyd zoning While trying to find the "silver lining" in the fact the Town of Lloyd has been revisiting the PRD Zoning Ordinance due to the development next to us, I am quite perplexed. My neighbor and I have sent letters with our concerns and we attended the last Planning Board Meeting and the PRD was on the agenda. It was acknowledged that we are the reason for the changes in the language. We were in hope of other residents not having to face buildings that just don't fit in their neighborhoods, three stories high removing any prior privacy merely a few feet from them. Residential and PUD properties have more restrictions then a PRD does. Why have PRD at all if PUD is almost identical? We keep hearing that they will apply restrictions per parcel with the exception of some change

in setbacks. There are loopholes to be found by future developers. No minimum road frontage, no minimum lot size, no buffers etc. we feel unless the language is more specific those "loopholes" are there for the taking. Having been referred to the "Comprehensive Plan Density Strategy" many times over the past few years and knowing the players in writing the Comprehensive Plan almost everything in it seems questionable.

I would like to thank the Planning Board for allowing my neighbor and myself the opportunity to speak at their last meeting.

The United States does not compare well in the social progress index

he Social Progress Index for 2016 ranks the United States No. 19 among 133 countries in the world, behind Ireland, France, Canada and New Zealand,

and just ahead of Slovenia and Portugal. Last year the United States was ranked 16th. Italy is ranked 24th this vear. The United States has a score of 84.62 and Italy. 82.49. Canada is listed as the second best country to live in with a score of 89.49.

Contributing to its decrease in ranking is that the United States is not considered a safe country. It has 15 times the gun deaths per thousand as the countries of Europe. Also the United States is not big on infrastructure. The Republicans in Congress want to save money, and in turn the infrastructure is falling apart.

"The United States spends more than any other country on health care, but only ranks 69th in the world for the health of its citizens," said Michael CRAIG MCKINNEY Green, the executive director of the Social Progress Imperative. "The suicide rate is higher than those other countries; and obesity rates are higher as well."



As I See It

Next year the United States overall ranking may drop again because the Republicans in Congress, who were asked in February by President Barack Obama to approve and fund \$1.8 billion to help the United States take action on the Zika Virus, has done nothing.

"The Index is produced by the U.S.-based nonprofit Social Progress Imperative, and is based on the work of leading economists, which include Amartya Sen and Joseph Stiglitz. It measures how well countries perform delivering social goods to their people, including education, health and wellness, housing, opportunity, personal rights, personal safety and tolerance."

"Sad to say, the United States has the dubious distinction of being the one major industrial nation that is significantly under performing on its social progress, relative to its GDP," said Michael Green.

He said, "With per-capita GDP of \$52,118, the U.S. delivers poor outcomes relative to its economic capacity in basic education, health and wellness, environmental quality, personal safety and freedom. The level of socialprogress under performance in the U.S. is comparable to countries like Russia, China, Iran, Nigeria and Saudi Arabia."

The top performers on the Index (ranked one to five) are Finland, Canada, Denmark, Australia and Switzerland. But countries with much lower GDP and capacity for government spending on public services also perform well. The so-called "over performers" in the 2016 Index include Costa Rica, Ghana, Uruguay, and Senegal. Costa Rica, for example, delivers a comparable level of social progress as South Korea, with just half

the per-capita GDP (\$14,232 vs. \$33,629).

Green said, "Certainly the U.S. population has something to be angry about, The U.S. is performing less well than countries at similar levels of economic development."The U.S. lagged other strong economies in five specific areas," Green explained. The U.S. has a worse homicide and traffic death rate than other major economies, the high school dropout rate is a weakness. on Environmental quality: This measure considered greenhouse gasses as well as water quality. The U.S. ranked 36th globally, and on personal rights: The U.S. did surprisingly badly on this measure, thanks to restrictive laws around labor unions and the right to assemble, Green said. There has also been a effort to take away the voting rights of Blacks and Latinos.

Another Marlboro graduate with Laborers Local 17

Immediately following the 2015 graduation of Marlboro High School, three of its graduates joined Laborers Local 17 of Newburgh as apprentices at a salary of \$17 an hour. This year, right after graduation, one Marlboro student joined the Local. The apprenticeship lasts four years and then the salaries of the these members get bumped to \$27 an hour.

L. Todd Diorio of the Local is very proud of the job that it does in helping local high school students take this first step in what hopefully will be a lifetime career, which makes it possible for the young person to be able to afford a home and a family.

Also playing a role in this is the guidance department at Marlboro High School. Marlboro again is sending a student to the United States Military Academy at West Point. There a student receives a \$300,000 four year education, free of tuition, room and board. And the student gets a job as an officer in the Army for at least the next five years.

Indian Cemeteries In The Town of Esopus

On Black Creek Road in Esopus is an historic and old cemetery and on the wall in front of it is the name Beaver. It is a rare cemetery of native Americans, in this Lenape Indians. The cemetery is for members of the Beaver family, and relatives. Buried there are John Oliver Beaver, 1838-1914. John Oliver Beaver, 1816-1888. and John Oliver Litts. Today there is another John Oliver Litts, the younger brother of Ulster County Legislator Herb Litts.

There are names in Ulster County of native Americans including Goodchild, Clearwater, Countryman and Beaver. (One year-old Ben Bragg of Lloyd is the son of Mae Beaver, whose parents and grandparents are buried in the Beaver Cemetery.

Highland School enrollment getting smaller

In 1981, Highland High School had a record sized graduating class of 181. The members of the class were born in 1963, the year before the birth control pill went on sale. Did the women of Catholic Highland start using the pill? They sure did. In 1964 Highland birth numbers dropped and continuing to decline. One mother said then, "I am not going to go through what my Mother went through" when Mothers in Highland were often having 10 or more children. In the early 1990s Highland's birth numbers went up and peaked at 192. Helping to push them up were all the new families at Bridgeview.

In 1993 IBM downsized and laid off 9,000 people. And with it the birth numbers plunged. In 1981 Highland was considering expanding the high school. Now the district has a much different outlook.

In 1992 the families of Highland had good paying jobs. That changed radically in 1993. After that, birth numbers began going down and family income was one of the reasons.

The residents of the Highland School District as of the latest earnings report had an average income of \$40,046, far below the national average of \$46,049.

In June 2016, Highland High School graduated 134 students. Until a few years ago Highland had about 1,900 students and now the number has dropped to 1,778, and there are indications based on the latest birth numbers between 2002 and 2014 that the district's enrollment will drop to 1,650 students.

One reason is that more couples are only having one child. A cause is that some of these couples are living pay check to paycheck and they can only afford one child.

What a softball career Emily McDonough had at St. Bonaventure

Four years ago, Emily McDonough, in her senior year at Marlboro High School, was the state's best hitter in softball competition and she was going to St. Bonaventure on a full Division One athletic scholarship. St. Bonaventure got a bargain of both a great athlete and a great academic student.

Her senior year exploits were extraordinary in softball. Here they are: "Named to the Atlantic 10 Conference second team as well as the Academic All-Conference Team ... worked her way into the Bona record books as her .429 batting average is the secondbest single season average in program history, and was the second best in the conference ... broke both the program's single season and career hits record with 66 on the season and 213 for her career ... finished her career with a .382 batting average, good for third best

Prefer permanent tax relief

I am grateful to the New York State legislature and Governor Cuomo for the passage and enactment into law of the tax levy cap. The lawmakers and governor reached an overwhelming consensus that something had to be done to lighten the tax load borne by our state residenthomeowners. This law has been in effect for some time now and hopefully will be on the books for years to come.

Without getting into the legislation specifics and possibly causing some confusion, simply put the law establishes a spending increase constraint on public school budgets, namely a tax levy cap or limit if you will of 2%(may not be 2% after possible exemptions are factored in the calculation) or the rate of inflation whichever is less. Of course this fiscal constraint on the spending plans of school districts provides, to a certain degree, much-needed tax relief for homeowners. It, in part, loosens the grip that's squeezing the financial life out of the taxpaying public. Hopefully the tax levy cap will prod school district administrators and school board members to don their outside-the-box thinking hats to come up with cost controls instead of seeking ways to generate more revenue to balance school budgets; just maybe this cap will steer them to focus more so on the expenditure rather than the revenue side of the budget ledger. This indeed may well be the best strategy to adopt in light of a prolonged low-inflation environment. Local municipalities are also subject to this same tax levy cap. They too might want to exercise a similar budgetary process in such an environment.

I personally would appreciate long-lasting tax relief and prefer the tax levy cap be made permanent by Albany. I know I speak for a great many homeowners who share this same preference. Sadly, permanence is not in the cards right now. The governor and Senate favor it but the Assembly chamber lacks the votes to make the law permanent. Postscript: I believe school districts would be more receptive to the tax levy limit if firstly, Albany eliminates the frivolous unfunded state mandates squandering our schools' valuable time and secondly, Albany foots the bill for our schools' presently unfunded state mandates that are necessary and have value. With this done, school districts would encounter far less difficulty in the budget construction process.

Pipeline document

As a concerned citizen, I attended several very informative meetings sponsored by RAPP(Residents Against the Pipeline).The Pilgrim Pipeline Company maintains that this project is vital to the economy of the region. From my understanding, the company would employ their own crews to excavate and install



the pipelines and the compressor stations would also be operated by employees of their company. The volatile oil products would be sent back to Albany to be shipped out.

Some people believe that the dual pipeline project would reduce the need for rail and barge transports of these toxic materials but in fact the oil industry is aiming to produce and sell as much product as possible so the pipelines will allow them to increase their export capacity.

I am deeply troubled by the detrimental impact to our environment. Pipelines leak and have leaked more than any other means of transport. Products such as gasoline and kerosene would be toxic to Chadwick Reservoir and its watershed. The Delaware Aquaduct Tap and the Catskill Aquaduct Tap would be affected as well. Many areas are served by private wells directly near the proposed routes of the pipelines. Inspections are carried out but with 178 miles of dual pipelines it is a formidable task to regularly inspect them. The crude oil and refined products are extremely volatile and pipelines have exploded which would pollute our air quality and perhaps even cause evacuations of our homes.

I am very concerned about the potential negative impact to our children's health, and the health of my fellow citizens and to the well-being of future generations. Let's keep our Hudson Valley a beautiful place. I implore my fellow residents to attend town hall meetings, join RAPP and tell Gov. Cuomo to refuse these new efforts to ruin our land and quality of life. Please, we need to speak up.

Pine Bush man dies in single motorcycle accident after fleeing police

A Pine Bush man was killed last Tuesday after losing control of his motorcycle while leading police on a high speed chase through the Town of Newburgh.

New York State Police, Highland BCI was called to assist the Town of Newburgh Police Department with a motorcycle accident investigation which resulted in the death of Ryan M. Dinonno, 22, of Pine Bush.

At approximately 9:22 p.m. on July 5, an officer in a marked unit from the Town of Newburgh Police Department observed Dinonno traveling at a high rate of speed while operating a 1997 Kawasaki motorcycle without a helmet on State Route 32 in the Town of Newburgh.

Police report that the officer activated his lights and siren in an attempt to stop Dinonno, but Dinonno failed to comply and continued west on Route 300 and then north onto Orchard Drive into the Town of Plattekill, Ulster County. The officer lost sight of Dinonno on Orchard Drive and then ultimately came accross the scene of an accident at a sharp curve on Orchard Drive. Dinonno lost control of his motorcycle which resulted in serious internal injuries.

Resuscitative efforts were made by officers at the scene and continued throughout his transport to St. Lukes Cornwall Hospital in Newburgh, where he was ultimately pronounced dead. The accident investigation is still ongoing.

LoCicero re-elected Wallkill School Board President

Joseph LoCicero begins his seventh year on the Wallkill Board of Education and his third term as board president. He was unanimously elected to the top spot by his fellow board members at last week's re-organization meeting.

The board also welcomed back Tom Frisbie who was re-elected board president and new board member Dustin Palen who was elected to his first term in May. Palen, and incumbents LoCicero and Leif Spencer were administered the Oath of Office by District Clerk Kelli Corcoran at the start of the meeting.

The board president, fresh from his own re-election and the passage of the school budget, is happy to maintain the status quo.

"We are looking to stay where we are as we move in a very tight knit machine," he said.

The district received a \$2.6 million grant recently for the advancement of technology in the schools. Thus far, they have been able to bring in Smart Boards and a new sound system. But those are only two of the ways they will be improving the technology for the district.

The outside is also receiving a facelift as they are building brand new tennis courts and a multi-purpose field.

"We just hired two new assistant principals which we are excited about and the new teachers and aids and a whole new freshman class," LoCicero said. "A new senior class that has to step up and our baseball team went to the final four this year so next years has to go even

further!"

The board also approved the re-appointment of Superintendent Kevin Castle, covering the period from July 1, 2016 through June 30, 2021.

Mother charged in drowning death of daughter

The baby's father returned home from work and found the child in the tub and attempted CPR. The child was transported to St. Luke's Hospital in Newburgh where she was later pronounced deceased.

Pagan was charged with one count of Criminally Negligent Homicide. She was arraigned before Marlborough Town Justice Michael Kraiza and remanded to the Ulster County Jail on \$100,000 cash/\$200,000 bond.

Pagan was returned to the Marlborough Town Court by Ulster County Sheriff's Officers on Tuesday, July 12 for a Preliminary Hearing. She was wearing an orange jumpsuit, was shackled and handcuffed and often kept her head bowed down to her lap. Pagan was represented by Public Defender Andrew Kossover and the people were represented by Ulster County Assistant District Attorney Emmanuel Nneji.

Judge Kraiza provided each attorney with a copy of the Ulster County Probation Pre-Trial report. In addition,

each attorney acknowledged they had received copies of the death certificate as well as statements Pagan had made to the Police and a transcript of the 911 call. They are awaiting copies of the police and autopsy reports.

Kossover requested a lower bail of \$10,000/\$20,000, telling the judge that she is indigent and is living in a trailer. He said his client has lived in the Hudson Valley all her life, attended Highland High School through the 10th grade and her mother lives in Marlborough and her father in Napanoch. Pagan's other child, a 6-year-old son is presently being cared for by her grandparents.

Nneji said that Pagan's young child "did not have a chance for a life" and that she was left alone and ignored her. He requested that the terms of bail remain as is in order to allow time to determine exactly what happened last Friday evening.

Kraiza cited a probation report that stated that Pagan had at one time suffered from depression and is now seeking help, calling that a little too late. The Judge did not lower the bail and said there was probable cause for this matter to be sent to the Grand Jury.

After the hearing, Kossover praised Tim Jordan and District Attorney Holly Carnright for not overcharging in this case. He called the matter a horrible tragedy.

"No matter how this plays out, it is going to be a continuing tragedy for Kayla and her family," he said.

Kossover declined to comment on why or how much time elapsed while the young child was in the bathtub but stressed that alcohol, opioids or substance abuse were not factors in this case. He said eventually it will be determined if this is a criminal or a civil matter.

"She said years ago she had a bout with depression and it is impossible to determine what this has to do with anything [today]," he said.

Nneji said it is too early to make a full determination in this case as the investigation is ongoing. Once it wraps up there is a period of time to review the facts and then deicide what to do.

A place of history Historic plaque to be unveiled at Algonquin Park

n Wednesday, July 13 at 10 a.m, the Town of Newburgh will be holding the reveal of a historic plaque in Algonquin Park. This plaque explains the history of the old Mill buildings, also known as Orange Mills, found in Algonquin Park.


"The town is fortunate to have such a beautiful County Park located in the Town of Newburgh,": said Gil Piaquadio, Newburgh Town Supervisor.

The 42-acre park is located at the site of a former black powder manufacturing complex built by Asa Taylor in 1816. The complex was then used by the Laflin and Rand Powder Company from 1869 to 1901 when the mill was closed. All of the machines used were water powered, supplied by a stream fed by Orange Lake. The majority of the powder created here was utilized by locals for hunting, although the higher quality powder was used by the Union Army during the Civil War.

After the mill was closed in the early 20th century, most of the land was divided into building lots. The remaining land included the property that comprised the main part of the powder manufacturing complex. Frederic Delano, the uncle of Franklin D. Roosevelt, purchased this land and donated it to the City of Newburgh in 1935. After improvements were made by the City of Newburgh, the property, now a park, was opened to the public. Many old stone buildings were incorporated into the park in order for the natural and rustic beauty of the site was retained.

The City of Newburgh retained ownership of

Algonquin Park until the mid-1970s, when they gave up ownership due to its cost. Orange County later purchased the park. Today, Algonquin Park remains a part of the Orange County Parks and Recreation system. It is the only remaining 20th century gunpowder manufacturing site in New York State and is the center of the Town of Newburgh's only historic district. Orange Mills is listed on the National Register of Historic Places, the highest level of significance of cultural resources worthy of preservation.

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
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Peter George Behrens Sr.


Pale Ale on tap, while the band, the Hooley Shooters provided entertainment.


