Tony Otero, fire chief since '76, retires Wed.

"On my first fire emergency on post as assistant fire chief, I was issued size 13 boots (I normally wear size 9), an antique helmet that was too small, and pants that we so long, I had to fold them up to be able to walk. I was ready for a transfer," said Fire Chief Tony Otero. Otero retired Wednesday after five years as fire chief and with 30 years of federal service.

Otero came to WSMR in 1976 as assistant fire chief. "For one year my office was the engine room, which included the trucks and their fumes," Otero said.

One year later Otero became fire chief. "I immediately set goals with high standards of professionalism," said the fire chief. "The main goal was to make this fire department the best in fire protection and fire prevention in the Department of Defense."

Emergency equipment was updated for safety and offices were built for the assistant fire chiefs and four station captain positions were established.

Several facilities on post have since been provided new sprinkler systems, manual pull boxes with local alarms, and smoke detectors. Computer rooms are provided with halon extinguishers and all Army vehicles now have chemical extinguishers.

Otero was the first from WSMR to receive the TECOM Professional Certificate and the WSMR Manager of the Year award. He is a member of the International Association of Fire Chiefs, Inc.

Otero began his federal career at age 21. He was hired by the range's fire department in 1953 as firefighter trainee. In 1963 he was transferred to the Holloman Air Force Base Fire Department as a driver - operator. In 1967 he became crew chief, and in 1974 station captain. He return to WSMR in 1976 as assistant fire chief.

The off - post dignataries who attended the fire chief's retirement luncheon Wednesday at the Post Officers Club included Fire Chief Walter Henegar and Deputy Fire Chief Juan Ortiz from Fort Bliss, Fire Chief Juan Apodaca from Las Cruces, Tony Gomez, acting city manager of Las Cruces, and Col. Frances Geisel (Ret.), former WSMR Facilities Engineering director.

An Installation Reserve Force (IRF) has been established for on call emergencies. The IRF consists of about 150 military troops from Troop Command Headquarters. Classes are given quarterly to keep the IRF updated in firefighting procedures and because of the turnover of military personnel.

Firefighters are required to stay at the fire station on 24 - hour shifts. A dishwasher and an ice machine were provided and a pool table was installed for fire personnel morale. The drab - green fire station was also painted white. "The remodeling and painting of the fire station was 80 percent self - help," Otero

A fire prevention program was developed with standard procedures and forms. Otero was then asked by DAR-COM to give a lecture to all Army fire chiefs at the U.S. Fire Administration, Washington, D.C., on a fire prevention program and reorganization.

During Otero's administration, a 1,500 gallon water truck was converted into a water and foam truck. Besides brush and grass fires, this truck can be used against aircraft and fuel fires.

* Use standard time style rather than the 24-hour clock. (Say 3 p.m. rather than 1500)

* Include your name and a telephone number where you can be reached in case I need additional information.

All material submitted to the Missile Ranger should be double spaced if possible. This saves time in retyping.

The deadline for submitting articles to

the Missile Ranger is close of business Tuesday. Anything received after that will not appear in the Missile Ranger that week. Bring your items to the Public Affairs Office, Building 122, or send it through distribution to: Monte Creek, Missile Ranger editor, DP-P. A DF isn't necessary.

When you see something you have submitted in the Missile Ranger, it may not appear as you originally wrote it. All articles, even the ones from the public Affairs Office, are edited for accuracy, brevity and journalistic style.

The manner in which I edit copy is not a random process. I follow newswriting and editing guidlines defined by the Army. My objective is to make all the material as clear as possible. Also, since there is only a limited amount of space

Book review

Computer security

COMPUTER SECURITY
MANAGEMENT
by Don Parker
(Reston Publishing Comapny, Inc.,
308 pgs. \$24.95)

The name Don Parker has become synonymous with the term "computer crime." For the last 11 years Parker has investigated the vulnerabilities of computer systems, with particular attention to the misuse of automatic data processing resources for criminal gain. His latest book, "Computer Security Management," represents the logical end product of his reasearch into the nature of computer security programs as an information security management consultant at Stanford Research Institute International.

The theme of Parker's book is stated in the preface: "If any single conclusion is to be drawn from the 11 years of research and consulting, it is that computer security is not primarily a technological subject. It is a subject of psychological and sociological behavior of people." This conclusion leads him to concentrate on those safeguards or counter measures which are available today to protect computer resources. The emphasis is on the positive techniques which can be employed in any ADP operation.

Parker begins by emphasizing that the computer security specialist must understand the strengths, weaknesses, and politics of an organization. This instruction could also apply to the data processing manager and auditor. Organizational problems not only complicate the effective implementation of safeguards, but also increase vulnerabilities. If people are "unhappy" in an ADP activity, then the potential for the misuse of a computer resource is increased. The potential for human error, even if unintentional, is also magnified, Parker says.

His chapters on risk assessment and on the identification, selection, and implementation of safeguards are particularly relevant for anyone with serious concerns about computer security. It will be the data processing manager, security specialist, auditor, and risk management officer who will find Parker's book of interest. While this book does not require technical knowledge of computer science or of security management, it is doubtful that the general reader will have the curiosity to open a cover which does not exploit the sensational aspects of computer crime.

This is unfortunate. Parker has presented a very measured, rational approach which could be applied to other resource protection programs outside of the ADP arena.

"Ridesharing is a term that includes carpooling, vanpooling or other alternatives to the one-person-per-car trip pattern," said Stephen Sanchez, director of the Sunpool program.

Ridesharing may not be for everyone. But for many people even part - time carpooling could mean saving hundreds of dollars a year in driving and auto maintenance costs. Other benefits include reducing traffic congestion, reducing carbon monoxide pollution, and the convenience of not having to drive all the time.

The Sunpool program is run from the Offices of the Southern Rio Grande Council of Governments. The program is funded by a federal grant from the U.S. Department of Transportation Federal Highway Administration through the New Mexico Energy and Minerals De-

"We believe there's a real need for a program like this in our area," Sanchez said. He said that a telephone survey of about 160 persons conducted in May indicated a good deal of support for the ridesharing concept.

"We asked people if they thought a free carpool matching service would be good for the community and 90 percent of those responding to the question favored the idea. Also, about 60 percent of those surveyed said they would consider carpooling," Sanchez said.

The project hopes to involve major employers, community groups, civic leaders, and others in an effort to persuade people to try carpooling, reduce vehicle miles travelled, increase vehicle occupancy rates and reduce auto emis-

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THE SECOND FRONT

Oktoberfest tradition dates back over 170 years

WSMR's third annual celebration of Oktoberfest will be held Sept. 22 at the Officers Club. All adult members of the post community are invited to attend the six hours of merry - making that begin at 6 p.m.

While the range's observance of the German festival began only in 1980, Oktoberfest is a tradition that goes back more than 170 years in German Bavaria.

In 1810, King Max Joseph of Barvaria threw a wedding reception so enormous for his sone Ludwig and his bride Therese that the Munich City Council petitioned the King to repeat the celebration every year.

In Munich, the principal city of Bavavia, Oktoberfest has become the dominant social event of the year, perhaps even surpassing New Orlean's Mardi Gras.

According to scholar of German culture Richard Thonger, "Das Munchner Oktoberfest" gets underway when, "The Burgomaster of Munich (a sort of city council president of mayor) leads a throng of beer - wagons drawn by splendid greys, decorated carriages driven by brewers, and huge floats peopled by strong- armed waitresses, toward the

first barrel. . .At noon he downs his mug and thousands of revellers pour in; oxen are roasted whole, chickens turn on the spit and lake fish are grilled over wood fires, while beer flows in a mightly river."

Despite its name, the Oktoberfest is traditionally held in late September, to take advantage of the last warm days of the summer.

While no one should expect "a throng of beer wagons drawn by splendid greys," an evening of elaborate entertainment is planned for WSMR's Oktoberfest. The evening's menu of German food a la carte will include bratwurst, knockwurst, German potato salad, schnitzel sandwiches, and a variety of beers and wines. Dance and sing-along music will be provided by Bavaria's "Lenchenfelder Blasmusik," as well as the folksong duo of Hans and Ellen Kollmannsberge, also of Bavaria. Several contests are planned, and souvenirs will be sold.

Admission to the Oktoberfest will be free. Oktoberfest organizers emphasise that all adult members of the post community are invited to attend -- enlisted personnel, officers, civilians, and adult family members.



Calif. lab tests alternate power source at range

One of only two alternate energy tests scheduled this year for the WSMR solar furnace was conducted recently.

A team from Lawrence Livermore Laboratory (LLL), Livermore, Calif., was at the facility during the past two weeks experimenting with the decomposition of zinc sulfate in a rotary kiln.

Pam Shell, the chemist with the team, explained their objective was to try to couple solar thermal power to thermochemical cycles to produce hydrogen. In these thermochemical cycles, water is made to react with a series of chemicals plus heat to generate hydrogen.

Hydrogen is used to process some of the available, tarry fossil fuels to more usable products such as gasoline. It also is used to make fertilizers without which food production would drastically fall off. Hydrogen is used to process formaldehyde, a raw material used for making plastics.

The United States uses large amounts

of hydrogen today. Most of it comes from fossil fuels. Officials estimate that by the year 2000 the United States will need more than five times the current usage. Fossil fuel sources could be exhausted by

Currently, three power sources are envisioned to operate a thermochemical cycle: fission, fussion and thermal solar. According to Shell, fission is possible but currently unpopular and fusion technology is not now available. Therefore solar thermal power is gaining popularity.

"Our experiments are designed to study the advantages of the high temperatures and rapid heating provided by solar thermal power," Shell said. "Many people believe solid sulfates, which are white, won't absorb the solar energy. They feel the energy will either be reflected by, or pass through, the material. Our tests will demonstrate the use of a rotating kiln designed to work with low absorptive materials.

Several thermochemical cycles under

advanced development decompose sulfuric acid in the high temperature step of the hydrogen - producing cycle. Shell's experiment modifies the sulfuric acid - based thermochemical cycles. Rather than using sulfuric acid, which is highly corrosive, her experiment decomposes zinc sulfate, a solid, in the high temperature step. She said this eliminates the need to build an expensive corrosive - resistant test chamber.

Commenting on the test results, Shell said, "Other than the rainy weather, we had only one other problem. The zinc sulfate tended to get sticky and wouldn't feed through the kiln properly.

"However, we were able to overcome this problem by both a mechanical and a chemical means," she explained. "Mechanically we hung chains in the kiln need to break up the solids continuously. Then the zinc sulfate would feed through the kiln and decompose. Chemically, we added aluminum oxide, an inert material, a compose to the zinc sulfate. This prevented the zinc sulfate from sticking to itself. Again, gy.

advanced development decompose it could pass through the kiln to decomsulfuric acid in the high temperature step pose.

"We were able to demonstrate we could decompose zinc sulfate using solar power at temperatures between 850 and 1,150 degrees Celsius."

Shell said the WSMR solar furnance, operated by the range's Army Materiel Test and Evaluation Directorate, was selected because it creates the high temperatures needed. Also, because some of the LLL apparatus is ceramic, the experiment required the WSMR solar facility's ability to bring things slowly to high temperatures using the attenuators, or venetian blind - type shutters, which control the amount of solar energy entering the test chamber. The facility also produces a horizontal beam, which is necessary for the operation of the kiln.

Shell was assisted in the experiment by two other LLL personnel: Roberto Ruiz, a mechanical technician, and Conrad Yu, a chemical technician. Their experiment was funded by the Department of Energy.

Medicare to take 1.3% of federal paychecks The tax revenue bill that President Reagan recently signed places federal employees under Medicare coverage. This coverage will cost civil servants 1.3% of their gross annual pay starting Jan 1. The 1.3% tax will apply only the the first \$35,100 of salary, however. This would make the maximum annual Medicare payment \$456.

Federal retirees will not be covered by Medicare unless they qualify through non-federal employment.

Baby toy pulled off shelves

Toy rattles that could pose a choking hazard for babies are being recalled by two firms. While no injuries have been reported from them, those being recalled do not meet the Consumer Product Safety Standards.

The rattles entered the market in the last year.

Rattles that could become caught in the throats of children were banned by the commission in 1978.

Montgomery Schoolhouse Incorporated of Montgomery, Vt. is recalling about 61,000 hardwood rattles. Some have colored parts, while others have a clear varnish finish.

Some of them were sold in plastic packages labeled "rattle, heirloom quality, hardwood, childsafe color." Others came in plastic bags with a paper insert and others were sold without packaging.

The rattles should be returned to the place of purchase for an exchange. Or, they can be sent directly to Mont-Incorporated, Schoolhouse Montgomery, Vt., 05470.

Also being recalled are about 2,900 rattles imported by Schowanek of Amev. These should be returned to the place of purchase for a refund or exchange.

The rattles involved are: number 10875-2, a duck on a handle; number 10875-33, dumbbell shape; 10876-17, bowling pin; 10876-3, dumbbell shape with pieces of wood on a shaft; 10876-26, barbell with four wooden rings on the shaft; 10876-8, handle with the head and arms; and 10876-19, cylinder with six holes and bell inside.

Enlist now, report after graduation

A lot of parents think the Army's great -- for somebody else's son or daughter.

According to Lt. Col. Robert Karlseng, commander of Army recruiting activities in New Mexico and West Texas, there's a program which allows young men and women to join the Army now and report for duty after their high school graduation. When parents understand its provisions, they rest a lot easier.

It's called the Delayed Entry Program (DEP). It works like this: a young person signs up now, even if they're still in high school. They get to choose either the skill training they want to learn or the first place they'd like to be stationed. An Army guidance counselor will work out a suitable date for them to report for duty after graduation.

College is still in the picture. Through the Army College Fund, soldiers can accumulate up to \$15,200 during a two year enlistment, or up to \$20,100 for three years. The fund combines qualified soldiers' savings with government matching funds and Army supplements.

"Young people can have the times of their lives in the Army. Choice of location, for example, could allow them to travel to West Germany, or stay near home if they prefer. Qualified soldiers can be trained in their choice of over 300 skills taught in today's Army. Many of those skills can also be used in civilian life," said Karlseng.

There's no rush. The DEP gives young people time to prepare for what the Army has guaranteed them.


No disability pay for users of excess leave

According to a recent decision by the U.S. Comptroller General, service members who suffer a physical disability while on excess leave will not receive disability retired pay.

A soldier is in "excess leave status" when he or she takes more leave than has been accrued, but does not have enough time remaining the current term of ser-

vice to earn the extra leave. This is different from advance leave, when a soldier goes "in the hole" but has enough time in service to earn the leave days.

The disability ruling was made on the basis that soldiers are not entitled to pay and allowances while on excess leave, and must therefore forfeit disability entitlement as well. (ARNews)

Persons marking block 12 of DD Form 1610 (Tequest and Authorization for TDY Travel) supply a cost comparison between the use of a privately owned vehicle and the least expensive form or commerical transportation.

This cost comparison is required for both military and civilian personnel.

When the use of a privately owned vehicle is authorized for travel within the limits or immediate vicinity of a temporary duty station, a statement of the circumstances justifying the mileage must be included in the "remarks" portion of the form.






